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
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THE 11TH ANNUAL REPORT OF CHARACTERISTICS OF STUDENTS AT DIABLO VALLEY COLLEGE INCLUDES SEPARATE INFORMATION CONCERNING DAY AND EVENING STUDENTS ON EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND, FAMILY, EMPLOYMENT, RESIDENCE, ASPIRATIONS, AND TEST SCORES AT ENTRANCE. DETAILED TABULAR PRESENTATIONS ARE MADE IN 30 CATEGORIES. THE TYPICAL EVENING STUDENT IS SUMMARIZED AS MALE, FROM 21 TO 40 YEARS OF AGE, WORKING 40 OR MORE HOURS WEEKLY AS A CRAFTSMAN, BUSINESSMAN, OR PROFESSIONAL, A NONVETERAN, ENROLLED IN THREE TO SIX UNITS, WITH FEWER THAN 30 UNITS COMPLETED. TRENDS NOTED AMONG DAY STUDENTS INCLUDE INCREASES IN RECENCY OF HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION, GENERAL AND VOCATIONAL STUDENTS, STUDENTS WITH MINIMAL CLASS LOADS, STUDENTS PLANNING TO GRADUATE, WORKING STUDENTS, FOREIGN STUDENTS, AND YOUNGER STUDENTS. RELATIVELY STABLE STUDENT CHARACTERISTICS INCLUDE SCHOOL AND COLLEGE ABILITY TEST SCORES, WHICH ARE CONSIDERABLY ABOVE CALIFORNIA JUNIOR COLLEGE NORMS, CLASSIFICATION BY GRADE LEVEL. DECREASES WERE NOTED IN VETERANS AND MARRIED STUDENTS. (WO)




80% of our student body are graduates of our local feeder high schools. 68% of the student body are recent June, 1965 high school graduates and new to Diablo Valley College.

There has been a 2% decrease in college preparatory students over the past two years. 1% of this decrease has been added to the general category and 1% to vocationally prepared high school students. The college staff has been trying to encourage more non-college preparatory students to attend Diablo Valley College for the past few years. This course of action through our local community high school counselor coordinators seems to be paying dividends.

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


**FIRST SEMESTER OF ENROLLMENT AT DIABLO VALLEY COLLEGE**



This is the first year we have asked our students for this information and we find, surprisingly, that 43.6% of the students' fathers have attended some college. The 1960 census for Contra Costa County showed that 29% of all males 36 years of age or older had attended some college. It is not surprising to find a greater number of students attending Diablo Valley College from homes in which the father has had at least one year of college. It should, however, reinforce our commitment to encourage more students to attend the junior college whose fathers have not had a college background.



### SUMMARY

Based upon the evidence presented in this report, the typical Diablo Valley College Evening Student may be described as having the following characteristics:

He is a male who graduated from a high school outside California within the last ten years--completing a general or a college preparatory program.

He carries from three to six units in the Evening Program and has completed less than 30 units thus far in his pursuit of specific occupational or general transfer goals.

He first registered at Diablo Valley College within the last two years, and if he is undertaking a transfer program, plans to transfer to one of the California State colleges or one of the campuses of the University of California.

The typical Diablo Valley College Evening Student works 40 hours or more per week, pursuing a career as a craftsman, as a professional person, or as a businessman.

He is between 21 and 40 years of age.

He is married and lives in the Pleasant Hill-Concord-Walnut Creek area.

He is a non-veteran and a citizen of the United States, although he was born outside the State of California.
