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PREFACE

The first edition of this bibliography was prepared for use in an introductory course on the community/junior college. Because of the widespread interest, the decision was made to update the listing in a second edition and publish it. This new edition is divided into 14 subject areas of the community/junior colleges to make it useful to more groups of people.

Compiling a bibliography of this type has been difficult because of the vast amount of literature written about America's embryonic educational institution. For purposes of limiting the volume of entries, most material prior to 1956 has been eliminated. Most of the earlier works are very adequately covered in the bibliographies listed herein.

Also eliminated from consideration were references dealing with higher education in general even though many of these are just as pertinent to the community/junior college as to 4-year institutions. An example: Material on how to choose a college president would apply to 2-year schools equally as well as to 4-year colleges and universities.

Some selected references on adult education and vocational education are included because these fields are so important to the community/junior college concept.

A film section has been added to this edition to give the reader samples of a growing number of good motion pictures and filmstrips emerging. Many excellent films have been obviously omitted simply because they are not listed in the nationally distributed catalogs. These films, their content and usefulness can be estimated by the brief description. Sources given may have new or additional items in the community/junior college field.

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INTRODUCTION

The community/junior college is at the threshold of colossal development. Institutions and enrollments are growing rapidly. More and better prepared faculty are needed to carry out the teaching and administrative assignments. Colleges and universities are beginning to teach courses designed for the potential staff member of these "All American Colleges".

This bibliography has been developed by two students of the community/junior college movement for the next generation of students, so they can spend more time reading and less time hunting. The first edition was used throughout the country and in several foreign lands. The acceptance was so great it became necessary to expand and update to include items to January 1967.

It is impossible to provide a description of each item for this kind of work. The material is classified and grouped in categories that make it easier to find items than in the previous edition. Research students will find the author index helpful in locating a particular item.

The authors wish to acknowledge the help of many colleagues in the field who have made valuable contributions and suggestions. We appreciate the work of the Division of Continuing Education of the Oregon State System of Higher Education for printing and making this edition available to you.
