Analyses of population statistics for persons with Spanish surnames in California in 1960 indicate a movement from rural to urban areas, although not to the extent that Negro or total nonwhite populations have become urbanized. Unemployment rates for persons with Spanish surnames remain above those for the total white population, and automation and technological change threaten the types of jobs held by members of this group. The median annual income in 1959 for persons with Spanish surnames was lower than that of the total white population, but generally higher than that for nonwhite families. Statistics reflect a greater concentration of persons with Spanish surnames in lower age brackets (70.4 percent under age 35) and larger family size than either nonwhite or total white population. Statistics on population, education, employment, and income are presented in table form at the end of the document. (JEH)

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HIGHLIGHTS

1. Population

There were more persons of Spanish surname in California in 1960 (1,426,538) than in Texas (1,417,810), New Mexico (269,122), Arizona (194,356), or Colorado (157,173).

California's Spanish surname population grew much more rapidly between 1950 and 1960, by 88.1 percent, than did the State's total population, which grew by 48.5 percent.

Persons of Spanish surname comprised 9.1 percent of the State's total population in 1960, compared with 5.6 percent for Negroes.

Forty-four percent of the State's Spanish-American population resided in the Los Angeles-Long Beach Metropolitan Area; 12 percent in the San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area.

Persons of Spanish surname outnumbered Negroes in all metropolitan areas except one--the San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area.

Counties with the highest proportion of Spanish-American residents were Imperial (33.1 percent) and San Benito (30.2 percent).

2. Birth and Parentage

A very large proportion, 80 percent, of California's Spanish surname population in 1960 was native-born (born in the United States, its territories, or possessions). Among the 20 percent foreign-born, 16 percent had been born in Mexico.

Forty-six percent of the Spanish surname population was of native parentage; 34 percent were of foreign or mixed parentage.

In-migrants from Mexico during 1955-60 accounted for 5.1 percent of California's Spanish surname population five years old and over in 1960.

3. Age and Size of Family

California's Spanish surname population was concentrated in the younger age brackets--in 1960, 70.4 percent were under the age of 35.

Almost one-fourth of California's Spanish-American families were comprised of six or more persons.

4. Educational Attainment

More than half of the Spanish surname men and almost half of the women 14 years old and over had not gone beyond the eighth grade in school.

No schooling at all was reported for 8.3 percent of the Spanish surname men and 6.3 percent of the women.

5. Employment and Unemployment

Manufacturing, trade, and agricultural industries accounted for 60.4 percent of all employed persons of Spanish surname in 1960.

Spanish surname men, representing 8.7 percent of all employed men, comprised 41.9 percent of all men employed as farm laborers and foremen.

Spanish surname women, representing 6.5 percent of all employed women, comprised 28.6 percent of all female farm laborers.

Unemployment rates were higher for both men and women of Spanish surname (7.7 percent and 11.2 percent) than for total white men and women (5.5 percent and 6.3 percent).

The unemployment rate was lower for men of Spanish surname, 7.7 percent, than for nonwhite men, 10.1 percent.

For women, the unemployment rate was higher among those of Spanish surname, 11.2 percent, than among nonwhite women, 9.8 percent.

6. Income

The median income in 1959 of Spanish surname men, \$3,849, was lower than that of total whites, \$5,109, but higher than that of nonwhite men, \$3,515.


The median income in 1959 of Spanish surname women, \$1,534, was lower than that of total whites, \$1,812, and also lower than that of nonwhite women, \$1,583.

The highest median income in 1959 of Spanish surname men, \$4,729, and of women, \$1,879, were in the San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area.

Almost one-fifth (19.0 percent) of the Spanish surname families had incomes of under \$3,000 in 1959.

Median incomes in 1959 of Spanish surname families were lowest in the San Joaquin Valley area: Madera County (\$3,295), Tulare (\$3,527), Kings (\$3,627), Fresno (\$3,661), and Merced (\$3,862).

CALIFORNIANS OF SPANISH SURNAME

This publication, like its predecessor, *Negro Californians*,¹ is a part of the educational program of the Fair Employment Practice Commission. It is concerned with Californians of Spanish surname in 1960--where they were born and where they live, their education, employment, unemployment and income. Derived from the 1960 Census of Population, the statistical tables were compiled by the California Division of Labor Statistics and Research, Maurice I. Gershenson, Chief.

Although attention has been centered on the severe social and economic problems of Negroes, these statistics will show that there is another ethnic minority--one that is more numerous in California and the Southwestern states--which shares many of the Negro's problems.

Mexican-Americans and others of Spanish-speaking origin lag seriously behind the majority of Americans in schooling, jobs and income. Displaced more and more from the farming and laboring occupations that were their mainstay in the past, they are among the hard-core unemployed in some areas. Their young people are often discouraged or alienated from preparation for skills--thus the circle of poverty is closed.

Social and economic discrimination against newcomers from Mexico and other Spanish-speaking countries, and against their children and grandchildren--especially if their skin is dark or if they retain the language or other cultural characteristics of their forebears--continues to affect the status of this large minority in California. Despite the fact that Spanish and Mexican people pioneered this area and made important contributions to its history, hundreds of thousands of Mexican-Americans are relegated, like nonwhites, to inferior jobs and poverty-stricken neighborhoods.

We are dealing, of course, with statistics. Not all persons of Spanish surname suffer social and economic disadvantages. It may be helpful to make clear what criteria the Census Bureau adopted in gathering the data involved in this report. The Bureau's objective 'was considerably more than the mere identification of persons of Mexican birth or parentage...It involves an attempt to identify the third and later generations of such immigrants, as well as the descendants of Spanish-Colonial inhabitants of the Southwest.' Relatively small numbers of persons of other national origin or ancestry are included: Cuban, Puerto Rican, Central and South American, Spanish. The data relate only to white persons of Spanish surname. Nonwhite persons of Spanish surname were excluded. (See 'Technical Notes,' page 53.)

As to the special nature of this group's minority status, a recent student of intergroup relations in one California metropolis commented:

"The Mexican-American minority is frequently treated as if it were a 'racial' as well as a nationality, religious, and linguistic minority.

Sociologically, Mexican-Americans can be thought of as a distinct group whose physical characteristics, coupled with their cultural traits, lead to their being discriminated against in a variety of ways by the dominant 'white' elements in the culture, and to their occupying a general position closely akin to that of the Negro. It is the Mexican's cultural disparity more than his color that sets him apart, and cultural disparity is more readily shucked than is pigmentation."²

For some time in the future, it appears, cultural, language and educational handicaps and discriminatory practices which persist in some areas will prevent Mexican-Americans and others of Spanish surname from participating fully in the mainstream of California's economy. Meanwhile, automation and technological change threaten to eliminate a substantial portion of the jobs which have supported families of this group.

Analyzing the employment problems of Mexican-Americans, a spokesman for the California State Employment Service summarized the situation:

"Unskilled jobs, whether on the farm or in the cities, and many of the semi-skilled manufacturing occupations are occupations with an unusually high hazard of unemployment. Most of these occupations can be entered without experience and with less than a full education. Many do not offer the prospect of a good livelihood for a lifetime of employment. Furthermore, these occupations are subject to fluctuations in demand so that they often do not offer a prospect of steady employment. Some of them are seasonal, as in the canneries, construction, and farm labor. Some of them are intermittent. Some of them are very easily and profitably eliminated by automation and technological change or, if the demand for the product is increasing rapidly enough, are kept from expanding (as has been the case with cannery employment in this State). Others of these jobs involve personal services which can easily be replaced by laundromats, self-service dry cleaning establishments and comparable arrangements by which the consumer of the service or product no longer needs the workers on whom he formerly depended."³

The Fair Employment Practice Commission and the Division of Fair Employment Practices have been charged with responsibility for acting to establish equal opportunities for all. Data in this report, like those in *Negro Californians*, measure to some degree the extent to which disadvantages and inequities exist for a sizable ethnic minority.

Government agencies, Federal, State, and local, as well as educational institutions, community groups, and citizens generally, share the obligation to find and implement solutions to the problems posed by these inequities. It is for their information that this compilation is published.

POPULATION

While the total California population increased by about one-half (48.5 percent) during the decade 1950-60, the Spanish surname population grew much more rapidly, by 88.1 percent. The rate of population growth for persons of Spanish surname was only slightly less than that of California's Negro population, 91.2 percent.

Persons of Spanish surname outnumbered Negroes in California in both 1950 and 1960. The Spanish surname population represented 9.1 percent of California's total population in 1960, compared with 5.6 percent for Negroes.

BIRTH AND PARENTAGE

A very large proportion (80 percent) of the California Spanish surname population in 1960 was native-born (born in the United States, its territories, or possessions). Forty-six percent were also of native parentage (both parents born in the United States, its territories, or possessions); 34 percent were of foreign or mixed (one parent foreign-born) parentage. Among the 20 percent foreign-born, 16 percent had been born in Mexico.

In 1950, 78 percent of the California Spanish surname population was native-born. Thirty-five percent were of native parentage and 43 percent of foreign or mixed parentage. A sizable population growth of second-generation (or more)

persons of this group was indicated by the ten-year increase in the proportion of Spanish surname population of native parentage.

In 1960, in-migrants from Mexico during the previous five years accounted for 5.1 percent of the Spanish surname population five years old and over. In-migrants from other states accounted for 7.1 percent.

AGE AND SIZE OF FAMILY

California's Spanish surname population was concentrated in the younger age brackets--70.4 percent were under age 35. This compares with 64.7 percent of nonwhites and 56.5 percent of the total white population.

Spanish surname families tended to be larger than nonwhite or other white families. Almost one-fourth (24.1 percent) of the Spanish surname families were comprised of six or more persons. Among nonwhite families, 18.6 percent had six or more persons and among total white families, 10.0 percent had six or more family members.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

The level of education reached by the Spanish surname population in 1960 was considerably below that of the total population and below that of the nonwhite population as well. More than half of the Spanish surname men and almost half of the women 14 years old and over had not gone beyond the eighth grade.

No schooling at all was reported for 8.3 percent of the Spanish surname men and 6.3 percent of the women. This compares with 1.8 percent and 1.4 percent for men and women in the total population and 3.7 percent and 2.9 percent for nonwhite men and women.

In all metropolitan areas for which 1960 figures were available, the median number of school years completed was lower for the Spanish surname population, male and female, than for both the total population and the nonwhite population. The median number of school years completed by the Spanish surname group was lowest in the Fresno Metropolitan Area: 5.7 years for men and 6.5 years for women.

AREA OF RESIDENCE

A comparison of 1950 and 1960 figures indicates a movement of California's Spanish surname population from rural to urban areas. The proportion in urban areas increased from 75.8 percent in 1950 to 85.4 percent in 1960.

The Spanish surname population, however, was not as highly urbanized in 1960 as either the total nonwhite or Negro populations, of whom 91.4 percent and 94.4 percent, respectively, resided in urban areas.

A comparison of the metropolitan area distribution of California's Spanish surname and Negro populations in 1960 is shown on the following page. The Spanish surname population was more widely dispersed throughout the State, particularly in agricultural areas such as Fresno, San Bernardino-Riverside-Ontario, and San Jose. In addition, a much larger proportion of the Spanish surname than of the Negro population resided outside of these metropolitan areas.

By far the largest proportion of the State's Spanish surname population, 44.1 percent of the total, resided in the Los Angeles-Long Beach Metropolitan Area. The San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area accounted for 12.4 percent. In comparison, 52.5 percent of the State's Negro population resided in the Los Angeles-Long Beach Metropolitan Area and 27.0 percent in the San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area.

A comparison of Spanish surname and Negro to total population in each metropolitan area is shown below. The area having the largest proportion of Spanish surname persons among its residents was Fresno, where 16.8 percent of the total population was of this group. Next was San Jose, with 12.1 percent, followed by the San Bernardino-Riverside-Ontario area with 11.9 percent.

Persons of Spanish surname formed a larger proportion of the total population than did Negroes in all areas except one. This was the San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area, where 8.6 percent of the total population was Negro, as compared with 6.4 percent Spanish surname.

Figures on the number and percent of Spanish surname persons in each county separately are shown in tables 7 and 8. Imperial County had the largest proportion of Spanish surnames among its residents, 33.1 percent, followed by San Benito County, with 30.2 percent.

INDUSTRY DISTRIBUTION

In 1960, three industry divisions together accounted for 60.4 percent of California's employed persons of Spanish surname: *manufacturing*, 29.6 percent; *wholesale and retail trade*, 15.9 percent; and *agriculture, forestry, and fisheries*, 14.9 percent.

In five of the eight metropolitan areas, *manufacturing* industries accounted for the largest proportion of employed persons of Spanish surname. These were:

In the three remaining areas, *agriculture, forestry, and fisheries* accounted for the largest proportion of the Spanish surname employees.

Table 15 shows the racial composition of employment in California's major industry divisions. The industry having the largest proportion of persons of Spanish surname was *agriculture, forestry, and fisheries*--25.6 percent of all employees in this industry division were of this group. Nonwhite persons comprised 12.4 percent of the total employment in *agriculture, forestry, and fisheries*.

Persons of Spanish surname represented a smaller proportion of total employment than did nonwhite persons in: *personal services*, 7.4 percent Spanish surname compared with 19.7 percent nonwhite; *professional and related services*, 3.5 percent Spanish surname compared with 6.9 percent nonwhite; and *public administration*, 4.8 percent Spanish surname compared with 11.3 percent nonwhite.

OCCUPATION

Since manufacturing industries employed a larger number of Spanish surname persons than any other industry division, it is not surprising that *operatives and kindred workers* comprised the largest occupational group--24.0 percent of the Spanish surname men and 32.4 percent of the women were in this category.

For Spanish surname men, the second largest occupational group consisted of *craftsmen, foremen, and kindred workers* (16.3 percent), followed by *farm laborers and foremen* (15.7 percent).

The occupational group accounting for the second largest proportion of Spanish surname women was *clerical and kindred workers* (24.3 percent), followed by *service workers, except private household* (11.6 percent).

An analysis was made of the racial composition of various occupational groups, insofar as Spanish surname and nonwhite persons were concerned. Spanish surname men, representing 8.7 percent of all employed men in the State, comprised 41.9 percent of all men employed as *farm laborers and foremen*. Spanish surname women, representing 6.5 percent of all employed women, comprised 28.6 percent of all female *farm laborers*. Nonfarm laborers also included relatively high proportions of Spanish surname persons--18.1 percent of the men and 18.8 percent of the women were of this group.

In several occupational groups, nonwhite persons outnumbered those with Spanish surnames. The difference was greatest for *private household workers*, as shown below:

UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment rates in 1960 were higher for both men and women of Spanish surname (7.7 and 11.2 percent, respectively) than for total white men and women (5.5 and 6.3 percent, respectively).

The unemployment rate was lower for men of Spanish surname, 7.7 percent, than for nonwhite men, 10.1 percent. For women, the unemployment rate was higher among those of Spanish surname, 11.2 percent, than among nonwhite women, 9.8 percent.

For men, the highest unemployment rates for the Spanish surname population were in the Fresno Metropolitan Area, 13.8 percent; Bakersfield Metropolitan Area, 10.8 percent; and Sacramento Metropolitan Area, 10.0 percent.

For women of Spanish surname, the highest unemployment rates were in the San Jose Metropolitan Area, 22.6 percent; Fresno, 20.6 percent; and Bakersfield, 17.0 percent.

INCOME

The median annual income in 1959 of persons of Spanish surname 14 years old and older, both male and female, was lower than that of the total white population. For women, the median annual income of the Spanish surname population was also below that of nonwhite women; for men, the Spanish surname median was higher than that of nonwhite men. 'Income' includes wage and salary earnings, self-employment income, and all other income. The income question was asked of all persons 14 years old and over who had any income in 1959. Both part-time and full-time workers were included.

Median income in 1959 of the Spanish surname population varied by metropolitan area, with the lowest for men in Fresno, \$2,309, and Bakersfield, \$2,623. The lowest for women was also in these two areas--below \$1,000 per year in each.

The highest median income for Spanish surname men, \$4,729, and for women, \$1,879, was in the San Francisco-Oakland Metropolitan Area.

A distribution of families by 1959 income level revealed that almost one-fifth (19.0 percent) of the Spanish surname families in California had annual incomes of under \$3,000. This was a smaller proportion than for nonwhite families--24.8 percent. Of total white families, 13.3 percent had incomes in 1959 of under \$3,000 per year.

In five of 32 California counties for which family income data were available, the median income in 1959 of Spanish surname families was under \$4,000. These counties, all in the San Joaquin Valley, were: Madera (\$3,295), Tulare (\$3,527), Kings (\$3,627), Fresno (\$3,661), and Merced (\$3,862). The median income of Spanish surname families was generally higher than for nonwhite families in the 32 counties. In only four counties was the median family income lower for Spanish surname than for nonwhite families. These counties were:

TECHNICAL NOTES ON COMPILATION OF DATA

SCOPE OF REPORT

Persons covered in this report were white persons with Spanish surnames. Nonwhite persons with Spanish surnames such as Indians, Negroes, Filipinos, and other nonwhite races were excluded.

SOURCE OF DATA

Data for 1960 were compiled from the following report, which was based on a 25-percent sample of the total population:

Data for 1950 were compiled from the following report, which included some tables based on the complete population count and some based on a 20-percent sample.

METHOD USED BY CENSUS BUREAU IN IDENTIFYING PERSONS OF SPANISH SURNAME

In both the 1950 and 1960 Census, persons of Spanish surname were identified as part of the general coding operation. In processing the 1960 Census schedules, coders classified all persons, regardless of race, as having a Spanish or a non-Spanish surname. For this purpose, the coders used a list of about 7,000 Spanish surnames compiled originally by the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service. Other names of apparent Spanish origin were referred to specialists who had been instructed on those characteristics of Spanish surnames which differentiate them from surnames in other Romance languages, such as Portuguese, French, and Italian. Although persons of all races with Spanish surnames were identified, only white persons with Spanish surnames were included in the Census Bureau's report, *Persons of Spanish Surname*. (Note: The Census Bureau made a special tabulation, based on a 5-percent sample, of all persons of Spanish surname by race. It was found that in California, 97.5 percent of all persons with Spanish surnames were of white races, 1.2 percent were Filipinos, 0.4 percent were Indians, and 0.9 percent were of other races.)

The Census Bureau states that its objective in identifying persons of Spanish surname "was considerably more than the mere identification of persons of Mexican birth or parentage already available from the questions on birthplace of the respondent and his parents. It involves an attempt to identify the third and later generations of such immigrants, as well as the descendants of Spanish-Colonial inhabitants of the Southwest."

RACE AND COLOR

The term "color" refers to the division of the population into two groups, white and nonwhite. The color group designated as "nonwhite" includes Negroes, American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, Filipinos, Koreans, Hawaiians, Asian Indians, Malaysians, Eskimos, Aleuts, etc. Persons of Mexican birth or ancestry who were not definitely of Indian or other nonwhite race were classified as white.

OTHER DEFINITIONS

Definitions and technical explanations of other census terms such as urban and rural, nativity, school enrollment, years of school completed, employed, unemployed, civilian labor force, income, etc., are defined in the Census volumes.
