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This second report in a series is designed to inform the college of certain opinions held by former students. A 38-item questionnaire was sent to 2288 non-graduate alumni; only 376 (167) replied. In spite of the small return, a few pertinent observations can be made on the results of the analysis. From the meager response, it appears that most dropouts felt no residual affinity for the college. Most of those who did reply, however, felt that the college, especially the General Education courses, had helped them. Some were slightly disappointed with the counseling, except when given by the faculty. Many felt that personal development was an important aspect of their attendance (an aspect the writer feels should receive more attention). Contradicting their expressed satisfaction with the General Education courses, the curricular change they felt most needed was fewer of these and more technical courses. Half the respondents said they continued their education elsewhere toward a bachelor's--a figure the writer considers unreliable, as transfers would be more likely to reply and thus distort the response to this item. The dropouts had nearly the same number of transfer credits as those who graduated; those who transferred felt well prepared by the college for advanced work. Most respondents felt that the rules of dress and attendance were personally valuable. They also held the faculty in high regard and felt a sense of close student-teacher relationship. (HH)

This survey was conducted for the Middle States Steering Committee by Professors P. Utter and M. CuvIELlo. As in the first report, the analysis is simple and few inferences have been drawn from the data.

The third and final phase of this project will be an analysis by individual department. These will not be published for general consumption but will be distributed only to those concerned with each report.

ALUMNI SURVEY 1968

NON-GRADUATES

The survey was conducted for the Middle States Accreditation Steering Committee by Professors CuvIELLO and Utter. A total of 2288 questionnaires were mailed and 376 questionnaires were returned and processed. This is a net return of 16% which makes the following data and analysis very questionable. Irregardless of the size of the return, the analysis will be completed.

Questions 1, 2, and 3 refer to last year of attendance, sex, curriculum, and number of terms successfully completed. The most frequent of terms completed was the third term in which 30% of those who responded indicated they had finished their first year of college. The next two highest were the first and second terms.

Question 4: Upon leaving school did you take a full-time job related to your course work at E.C.T.I.? Two-hundred and fifteen responded no and one responded yes. This is quite logical due to the fact that they had not completed their educations and therefore were not qualified to assume positions in their area of specialization for the most part.

Question 5: To what extent did your course work at E.C.T.I. prepare you for this first job upon leaving E.C.T.I.? Satisfactory to very satisfactory accounted for almost 54% of the respondents. Approximately one-fourth said that their course work was unsatisfactory in preparing them for their first job. Seeing as very few took full-time jobs in their area of specialization, it is not unusual to find such a large proportion of unsatisfactory respondents.

Were your Technical courses useful? Approximately 22% indicated very satisfactory. Satisfactory was quite low. Unsatisfactory was approximately 22%, and a large percentage indicated "no opinion".

Were your general education courses useful? It is interesting to note that approximately three-fourths of the dropouts indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory in this category.

Question 6: What was the salary range of the first job? There was no attempt to investigate these figures due to the fact that over half continued their education as full or part-time students. The questionnaire also failed to differentiate between the two types of people -- those who worked full time and those who worked part time.

Question 17: How would you rate the counseling services you received at E.C.T.I.? A very small percentage indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. Over 30% indicated unsatisfactory. It seems that there is great deal of missing data in this question when one analyzes the other responses referring to the same basic question.

How would you rate the counseling services from the Dean of Students office? A large proportion (45%) indicated satisfactory but again a large proportion (27%) indicated unsatisfactory.

Counseling from your Department Chairman? A fair proportion indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory (58%).

Counseling from faculty members? As was the case in the Graduate survey, the non-graduates indicated that the faculty were very helpful to them in the area of counseling. A very large proportion (75%) indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory.

Question 18: If you could start over, indicate the first choice of a college. This was spread evenly over the whole range. Approximately one-fourth of the respondents indicated they would return to E.C.T.I. in the day division. One-fourth indicated that they would rather have gone to a four-year college for Liberal Arts. Approximately 30% indicated a four-year engineering college.

Question 19: If you could start over, indicate your first choice of curriculum. Half of the respondents indicated they would have gone into the same field. The particular choice of the other curriculum (Question 20) will not be analyzed as the data is readily available to the reader.

Question 21: What would you consider the most important aspect of your education at E.C.T.I.? This was pretty much a draw between academic matters and personal development. An unusual, very even response for second choice was made for all three -- academic matters,

interpersonal relations, and personal development. The third or last choice in the hierarchy of importance was academic matters.

Question 22: Indicate desired changes in your curriculum. Approximately 40% indicated that they desired fewer education and more technical courses. This compares strikingly with a 3% response for this same item in the Graduate survey.

Question 7: What did you do upon leaving E.C.T.I.? 30% took a full-time job in an unrelated area. Some 51 went in the armed forces, and 96 did neither.

Question 8: Did you continue your education as a full-time student? Approximately one-fourth indicated yes and another quarter indicated they continued their education as a part-time student. The type of program (Question 9) in which the educations were continued resulted in either a BS or BA degree primarily.

Question 10: Did you complete the program? Approximately 10% of the total respondents and 20% of those who continued their educations indicated that they had completed their programs. Due to a lack of information, there are no means by which we can determine how many failed out or are still in their programs.

Question 12: Was the additional education in the area of specialization studied at E.C.T.I.? 21% indicated yes and 127 (34%) indicated no. The fields in which the education was continued may be obtained by referring to the computer output at the end of this report.

Question 14: How many credits did you receive from the work you completed at E.C.T.I.? 10% indicated full credit which would be 20% of those who went on as full-time students. Approximately 10% indicated more than three-fourths credit, and of those who went on as full-time students this would be another 20% and more than one-half credit, 50 indicated that they received more than one-half credit from the courses taken at E.C.T.I. Of those who continued their educations at another institution, over 65% received transfer credit for more than half of their work at E.C.T.I.

Question 15: Did you fail to receive transfer credits because of poor grades? 41 (21%) indicated yes and 121 (61%) indicated no (of those who continued).

Question 16: Did the studies at E.C.T.I. prepare you for advanced studies? Approximately 75% of those who continued indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory preparation.

Question 23: Indicate how your needs were served by the Student Activities Program? One-hundred and one (27%) indicated that their needs were not served at all by the Student Activities Program. Only 47 (13%) indicated that their needs were served to a high degree in the Athletic Program. Approximately 126 or one-third indicated that their needs were not served at all by the Athletic Program. The Library, as in the Graduate survey, received a high vote of confidence. Two-thirds of the respondents indicated that their needs were served by the Library.

Question 24: Relative to the rules at E.C.T.I. concerning class attendance and tardiness, would you say that in the development of a sense of values and in the practice of independent judgment, these rules helped, hindered, or you don't know? One-hundred and seventy four indicated that it helped and 126 said it hindered. Again it is interesting to note that of the people who have left the institution, a good share feel that the rules did help them later on.

Question 25: Did the rules concerning dress and grooming help develop a sense of values and independent judgment? Approximately 204 indicated it helped. As in the Graduate survey, the students realize these rules were, in fact, helpful to them.

Question 26: Relative to the Student Government at E.C.T.I., would you say it helped to develop a sense of values and the practice of independent judgment? A very large percentage (45%) indicated no. The reason could be due to the small number of students participating in Student Government. This was a similar response pattern to that of the Graduates.

Question 27: Have you participated in Alumni activities? Although they are not considered Alumni, some 10% indicated they have participated in Alumni activities.

Question 28: Do you favor additional Alumni activities? Over half indicated yes.

Question 29: Would you participate in Alumni activities?

About half said yes although they are not by definition alumni.

Question 30: Does the evening and extension division at E.C.T.I. offer any programs which you would consider for continuing your education? One-hundred and thirty-four or one-third indicated yes, and approximately the same amount indicated no.

Question 31: The salary range of your present job? No differentiation between part-time and full-time students or non-students, therefore, the data is meaningless.

Question 32: Do you attribute your present position and salary to the education you received at E.C.T.I.? Over one-third indicated that their present job was not due to the training received at E.C.T.I. A very low percentage (10%) indicated that the position was absolutely due to the training.

Question 33: How well did the objectives of the Technical training at E.C.T.I. fulfill your goals? Over one-half responded that the training, limited as it was, satisfactorily fulfilled their personal goals.

Question 34: Was the attainment of your goals helped by the number of courses offered, their content, organization, and quality of instruction? More than half (56%) of the respondents indicated the attainment of their goals was satisfactorily aided by the courses taken during their limited stay at E.C.T.I. This is lower than the corresponding Graduate response but in retrospect is not surprising. Also in this item was a reference to laboratory facilities and their role in the students experience. More than 70% of the respondents replied that these facilities were satisfactory or better. This is only slightly lower than the corresponding Graduate impression (85%).

Question 35: Did the faculty at E.C.T.I. help in the attainment of personal goals? A fair percentage (58%) indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. A small percentage, approximately 18% indicated the faculty did not help at all.

Question 36: Rate the faculty in general on the following items: Knowledge of course material -- some 93% indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. Interest in teaching the subject -- 81%

indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. Speaking Ability -- there seems to be some missing data in the survey. Creating a classroom atmosphere conducive to learning -- satisfactory to very satisfactory represented 58%, a sharp drop from the previous data. Making the course content understandable -- a high proportion, some 72%, indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. Willingness to listen to students -- an increase in the very satisfactory range and approximately the same amount in satisfactory -- 76% of the non-graduates indicated that the faculty were willing to listen to them. The availability of the faculty -- approximately 72% indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. Ability to control the classroom -- 85% indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. In all of these questions referring to the faculty a very, very small percentage indicated the "not at all" response position for the faculty members. This coincides with the Graduate opinion of the faculty which could be summarized as "excellent".

Question 37: How well did the Department Heads and Administrative personnel help in the attainment of your personal goals? A little better than one-half indicated satisfactory to very satisfactory. Eighty-seven of the respondents indicated "not at all" to this question. Whether this is an "across the board" sentiment or isolated to a few departments remains to be seen.

Rate the Department Heads and Administrative personnel on the following items: Availability -- very high (70%). Interest and concern in your problem -- medium (62%).

SUMMARY

The very fact that only 16% of the questionnaires were returned casts a shadow on the reliability of this survey. One gets the impression that the "drop outs" have left the college with bitterness and no longer feel any connection even to the point of completing a questionnaire. This is not an unusual occurrence but a normal defense mechanism that we all regret.

The non-graduates found that their studies at the college did help them, for the most part, especially the General Education courses. There was a mild sense of discontent with the counseling services with the exception of those rendered by the faculty. Even those who did not finish their course of study agreed with the alumni in the existence of a strong rapport with the faculty.

They felt that personal development was an important aspect of their stay with the college. One could title this as "Coming of Age at E.C.T.I.". This writer feels that too little concern is given to this facet of our students problems and could very well explain their sometimes "odd" behavior.

The non-graduates disagreed with the graduates on curricular changes. They felt a need for fewer general education courses and more technical. This contradicts their earlier impression of the general education courses which they found very helpful.

The one-half who continued their educations, full or part-time, enrolled in courses leading to the baccalaureate degree. This, I think, is a totally unreliable figure. It would be easy to assume that the majority of the non-respondents were failures, and the transfer student would more readily respond to the survey, thereby upsetting the true balance of this particular item.

The data showing amount of transfer credit received was almost identical to that of the alumni^{*} and those who transferred found their studies at E.C.T.I. well prepared them for advanced work.

The majority of the respondents felt the rules concerning dress and attendance were helpful in developing their sense of values. This again corresponds to the graduate sentiment. They also rated the

faculty very highly on all items further strengthening the sense of a close student-teacher relationship.

The non-graduates generally displayed, with some notable exceptions, a fair degree of satisfaction with the institution and its effect on them.
