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## INTRODUCTION

Over the last several months, the Centre collected a number of documents relevant to the Programme on Institutional Management in Higher Education. In addition to making requests for documents through the mail, the staff of the Centre have personally obtained the documents during their various missions to Member countries. The collection was particularly boosted as a result of a two-man C.E.R.I. Mission to Canada and the United States during February 1970.

The purpose of this List is to disseminate information on current work in the field of university management in Member countries. A vast number of the documents, particularly from the United States, are hard to come by in other Member countries. Several of these have not been published or widely circulated. Nevertheless, these documents constitute important reference material. These will be useful for the research and development effort in the field of university management at the Centre and in the Joint Projects, as well as elsewhere.

The Centre proposes to continue its effort to collect recent documents in the field. A bi-monthly addendum to this document will be issued which will include new acquisitions. We also propose to complete the annotations for the items included in future publication.

The documents are arranged under three broad headings. The first section deals with Higher Education Planning, Management and Organisation. The second section deals with Institutional Management Techniques Applied to Specific Institutions. The third section includes Reference Documents. University calendars and handbooks and programme descriptions are not included.

By means of a simple example relating bottlenecks and performance indices it is shown how ideas from control theory may be applied to educational planning. Two different criteria for several different a priori distributions are shown to lead to markedly different optimal sequences of decisions. These optimal strategies are compared with non-optimal strategies which in some sense resemble what educational planners in the far more complex real world would be forced to do. The robustness of the solutions is tested by demonstrating that the optimum solution for one criterion can yield very poor results in another criterion.

Various methods by which the responsible officials of colleges and universities might make projections of enrollment for their respective institutions are presented in this report. The point is made that institutional enrollment projection is not a simple assignment. Many factors must be considered, analyzed, and, if possible, controlled in order to do the best job of forecasting. Before making an enrollment projection, each institution should define its aims and purposes in order to identify its long range goals. The enrollment projection

techniques include a discussion of - (1) curve fitting, (2) ratio method, (3) cohort-survival method, (4) combined ratio and cohort-survival method, and (5) correlation analysis. Short range enrolment estimates for budget purposes and educational planning are discussed as are long range projection based on increasing population. A final chapter presents a brief review of guiding principles to aid the person designing tables or graphs for presentation. A substantial bibliography of books, periodicals, and reports concerned with enrolment projection is included.

The dynamic effects of alternative manpower policies and programs can be "pretested" in a computer based simulation. It is generally recognized that the production of Doctorates depends to a large degree on the Doctorate-holding faculty. Because the Doctorate holders are in great demand by the other sectors of the economy, a circular or a "feedback" situation exists. The problem is further complicated by the availability of developed student talent and by various socio-economic conditions existing at different periods of time within two or three decades prior to the time a study is made.

This paper attempts to develop a conceptual and a mathematical model to study the production of Doctorates, Masters' and Baccalaureate degrees and their feedback into higher education. The model consisting of over 200 non-linear difference equations is programmed for computer simulation and validation against historical data. Currently simulation is used to describe what has happened in the past. Once this phase is accomplished, the model can be used to prescribe what will happen in the future with a fair level of confidence.

This paper was presented at a conference on "New Directions in Research on Educational Administration". Two schemes of research methodology were discussed. The first idea was "facet design and analysis" originated by Louis Guttman.

Facet design was defined as a way of laying out a domain for research, while facet analysis enables one to test the validity of the assessment of the entire domain. The second scheme was "Theory of Data" by Clyde Coombs. This deals with the stages of gathering data out of observations and of making variables. The phases discussed in the "Theory of Data" here (1) selecting a domain of investigation, (2) recording observations, (3) converting observations into data, (4) classifying the individuals or objects (scaling), and (5) seeking relations among variables. These schemes were suggested to be of use as tools by those who will be developing new methods in research.

The report has two principal parts; a general flow model of an educational system and its application to secondary school in Ontario, and a set of sub-models which are concerned with the transition by students from the final grade of secondary school to the first year of tertiary education.

In the first of these major sections, the mathematical structure of the basic flow model is introduced and some problems of implementation are mentioned. The basic model is demonstrated by its application to the system of secondary education in Ontario around 1960. The main data source, the Carnegie Study of Identification and Utilization of Talent in High School and College, is described, as is a unique method developed by the author called the "method of synthetic cohorts", by which the principal variables of the model, the transition proportions, are obtained. Matrices of transition proportions for males and females in the system are given, and simulated enrolments are compared with actual enrolments over a period of several years. The population is partitioned into various categories or classes on the basis of certain attributes such as sex, educational achievement of a parent, community, etc., and a separate transition matrix is given for each population category. Certain revealing differences between the matrices of the different groups are discussed.

The movement of faculty within the College of Engineering at the University of California, Berkeley, is analysed for the nine-year period 1960 - 1968. Movements within the system and between the system and the outside world are assumed to be homogeneous over time. Faculty promotions and departures from various ranks are determined by aggregating yearly totals. These aggregates are then used to estimate the transition matrix of a Markov Chain model that predicts future faculty distributions based upon present distributions and known appointment policies. Predicted distributions for the years 1966 - 1968 are compared with actual data.

The implementation of year-round operation has often been suggested as a means for increasing the graduation rate of a university campus of fixed size. This paper demonstrates how the graduation rate may be computed as a function of the proportion of students who belong to various cohorts with common workload requirements and attendance patterns. Data gathered at the University of California Berkeley campus is then used to estimate these proportions for a campus which offers a year-round programme and does not attempt to exert control over student attendance patterns. From these estimates is derived a value for the overall graduation rate and the ratio of summer enrolment to average non-summer enrolment. These values are compared with those obtained for a campus which does not offer a year-round programme of instruction. A sensitivity analysis investigates the effect of an increasing proportion of accelerating students upon the graduation rate.

A survey is made of the more important technological and managerial problems in the planning of university library services and recommendations are made for a positive programme of innovation and development. Two approaches are explored in considerable detail. The first is the use of operations research models of the acquisition and storage functions. Elementary models and decision rules, based on the assumptions of exponential growth, independence of item usage, and obsolescence, are used to minimize average costs of circulation and to suggest more general models for library services.

This is an exploratory study of the problems in library planning. This report does not pretend to offer a definitive statement on the subject; it does not provide any well-tested models, data for the design of library systems, nor a thorough analysis of jointly dependent items. It does attempt an assessment of the current state of the art and to identify some promising and different directions for the development of planning criteria and techniques of analysis.

The approach to library planning studied in this Report is the use of accounting models to measure library costs and implement programme budgets. A cost-flow model for a university library is developed and tested with historical data from the Berkeley General Library. Various comparisons of an exploratory nature are made of the unit costs for different parts of the Berkeley system.

This paper develops a simple deterministic model that relates student admissions and enrolments to the final demand for educated students. It includes the effects of drop-out rates and student-teacher ratios upon student enrolments, faculty staffing levels, and indices that measure academic and institutional productivity. Certain technological requirements are known and given. These, as well as the laws of flow conservation and the relationships between equilibrium inventory levels and average flow rates, are used in the model to predict the important effects of specific administrative policies and institutional controls at the campus level.

A mathematical model is developed for the expansion of facilities at different campuses of the University of California for a given sequence of

enrolment forecasts. Based on total projected enrolments for the University system, the model, computes a minimum total cost expansion programme, i.e., the stages at which to expand existing campuses or to build new ones, and the enrolments that should be allocated to those campuses. It is formulated as a network flow problem in which nonzero flows on certain arcs incur fixed charges; a minimum cost flow is found by a branch-and-bound technique. The model does not include such factors as graduate-undergraduate mix, departmental mix, departmental sizes, or restrictions on tenure faculty, but rather is oriented towards a method of accommodating gross enrolments.

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The Georgia Educational Model programme for teacher education, (one of nine development projects funded by the Research Branch--U.S.O.E.) has developed a model for the training of elementary teachers (pre-service and inservice). Teacher performance behaviours and a teacher job analysis provide the foundation on which the model is built, and system analysis was the technique utilized for the programme.

The rationale for the development of the model is based on the hypothesis that an effective teacher education programme is built upon the job which the teacher performs. Determining what the teacher does required the sequential development of goals, objectives, and pupil learning behaviours for the elementary school. Pupil learning behaviours provided a primary basis for ascertaining teacher teaching behaviours and, consequently, a teacher job analysis. Finally, teacher performance specifications were developed that provide the objective and content for the teacher education programme.

The products of the project include, in addition to the teacher performance specifications, specifications for the selection of candidates for the programme; for evaluation of the total programme; and for implementation of a programme based on the teacher performance specifications.
