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
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
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ABSTRACT

In a sample survey in November of 1969, the U.S. Bureau of Census found that approximately 9.2 million persons living in the 50 states of the United States and the District of Columbia identified themselves as being of Spanish origin. Three characteristics--Spanish origin, mother tongue, and language usually spoken at home--were used to identify the Spanish population. The survey identified 5.1 million persons of Mexican origin; 1.5 million of Puerto Rican origin; 600,000 each of Cuban, and Central or South American origin; and 1.6 million of other Spanish origin. The report focuses on the social and economic characteristics of this population. The table of contents lists the following major divisions: (1) Type of Spanish Origin, (2) Language, (3) Educational Attainment and Literacy, (4) Employment Status and Occupation, and (5) Income. 

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Persons of Spanish Origin in the United States: November 1969

INTRODUCTION

A sample survey in November 1969 found that 9.2 million persons living in the 50 States of the United States and the District of Columbia identified themselves as being of Spanish origin. The following statistical report focuses on the social and economic characteristics of this population group. Data are presented on type of Spanish origin, mother tongue, language usually spoken in the home, educational attainment and literacy, employment status and broad occupation group, and income.

The data for November 1969 for persons of Spanish origin were derived from replies to a question on specific types of Spanish origin. The total of 9.2 million persons classified as Spanish was comprised of about 5.1 million persons of Mexican origin, 1.5 million of Puerto Rican origin, 600,000 each of Cuban, and Central or South American origin, and 1.6 million of Other Spanish origin. These data based on origin are more inclusive than data previously provided on the Spanish population. Earlier data were based on various measures: in 1950 and 1960 on Spanish surname for the five Southwestern States, in 1940 on Spanish mother tongue, in 1930 on the classification of Mexican, and in each of the censuses from 1890 to 1960 on the birthplace of the person and his parents.

In this report Spanish origin, mother tongue, and language usually spoken in the home were used to identify the Spanish population. The number of persons with combinations of these three characteristics are shown in table A.

SURVEY FINDINGS

About 5 percent of the approximately 200 million people in the United States reported that they were of Spanish origin. Four out of every five Spanish origin persons were born in the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or in outlying areas of the United States. Spanish is currently spoken in the homes of about one-half of the population of Spanish origin. With the exception of English, Spanish is spoken by more persons than any other language in the United States. The continued use of Spanish is an indicator of the strength of those bonds which tie Spanish persons to each other and to their past.

Of the 9.2 million persons of Spanish origin identified in the November Survey, 55 percent were of Mexican origin, 16 percent of Puerto Rican origin, 6 percent of Cuban origin, 6 percent of Central or South American origin, and the remaining 17 percent of Other Spanish origin. A large portion of the Spanish origin population (61 percent) was concentrated in the five Southwestern States of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas.

Persons of Spanish origin were on the average about 8 years younger than other persons in the United States. Among the Spanish origin groups, those of Mexican origin had a median age of 17.8 years compared with 28.4 years reported for persons of Cuban origin.

The educational level of the population of Spanish origin 35 years old or older lagged behind that of persons of other origins of the same age, 8.5 years of school completed compared with 12.0 years, respectively. However, this gap should be somewhat smaller in the future as evidenced by the difference between the median educational attainment for young adults 25 to 34 years of age of Spanish and other origins, 11.7 and 12.6 years, respectively.

Comparison of the survey results for the Spanish origin population with other groups revealed that:

Spanish origin family income was on the average \$5,600, about 70 percent of that of other families.

Spanish origin persons had an unemployment rate of 6.0 percent, about 1.7 times the unemployment rate of all other persons in the labor force.

Spanish origin workers were less likely to hold white-collar jobs than the remaining employed population of the United States. Only 25 percent of the employed Spanish origin men and 41 percent of employed Spanish women held white-collar positions in comparison to 41 percent for all other men and 61 percent for all other women.

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I Type of Spanish Origin

In the November 1969 Current Population Survey, 9.2 million persons identified themselves as of Spanish origin. Of these persons, 55 percent classified themselves as Mexican, 16 percent as Puerto Rican, 6 percent as Cuban, 6 percent as Central or South American, and 17 percent as Other Spanish. Three-fifths of the Spanish origin population lived in the five Southwestern States of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas. In the Southwest, 79 percent of the Spanish population was of Mexican origin. In the remaining 45 States and the District of Columbia, persons of Puerto Rican origin represented 37 percent of the Spanish population and were the largest of the five types of Spanish origin population groups.

Most of the persons of Spanish origin (79 percent) were born in the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or in outlying areas of the United States. A majority (61 percent) of the 7.3 million native of Spanish origin lived in the five Southwestern States (Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas). Among the native Spanish origin population, 823,000 were born in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

Foreign-born persons of Spanish origin constituted the largest group of foreign-born persons living in the United States. Among the 10.9 million foreign-born persons, 1.9 million were persons of Spanish origin who were born in a foreign country.

Persons of Spanish origin were younger than the total population of the United States. One-half of the persons of Spanish origin in 1969 were under 19.9 years of age, whereas half of the residents of the United States as a whole were under 28.0 years of age. The proportion of persons of Spanish origin under 16 years old was substantially larger, and the proportion 65 and over was considerably smaller, than the corresponding proportions for the entire country.

Three out of every four married persons of Spanish origin were married to a partner whose origin was Spanish. About seven out of every ten married persons of Spanish origin were married to a person of identical Spanish origin. Mexicans tended to marry Mexicans, Cubans tended to marry Cubans, and persons of Puerto Rican origin tended to choose a spouse of Puerto Rican origin. Yet, one out of every four married persons of Spanish origin was married to a partner whose origin was not Spanish. When a person of Spanish origin did not choose a spouse of his own specific origin, the possibility that another Spanish person would be chosen was low (one in six). Inter-marriage between the five types of Spanish origin involved only 5 percent of all married Spanish persons.

In 1969 there were 4.1 million related persons of Spanish origin under 18 years old who were living in households where both the household head and his wife were present. (Most of these related persons were children living with both parents.) About two-thirds of these children lived in households in which both the head and the wife were of Spanish origin.

Within the Spanish community, there was a stronger tendency to maintain lines of Spanish descent among persons of Mexican and Puerto Rican origin than among those of Central or South American or Other Spanish origin. For example, both parents of four-fifths of the children of Mexican origin were of Spanish origin, whereas only one-sixth of the children classified as Other Spanish had parents both of whom were Spanish. Of children with one or both parents of Central or South American origin, one-half were exclusively of Spanish origin.

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II. Language

Although 95 percent of all persons reporting Spanish as their mother tongue in 1969 were of Spanish origin, 31 percent of the population of Spanish origin reported some other language, principally English, as their mother tongue. English was reported as the mother tongue of about one-fourth of the persons of Mexican and of Central or South American origin; corresponding figures were 16 percent for Puerto Rican, 5 percent for Cuban, and 57 percent for persons of Other Spanish origin. Persons of Spanish origin comprised only 5 percent of the total population of the United States but 19 percent of all persons reporting a mother tongue other than English.

The median age of persons in the United States reporting Spanish mother tongue in 1969 was 26.0 years. These persons were older, on the average, than persons of Spanish origin as a whole (19.9 years) and younger than the entire population of the United States (28.0 years). Among those who reported Spanish as their mother tongue, native were younger (22.7 years) than the foreign born (35.1 years).

About 32.8 million persons reported a mother tongue other than English. Of these, 6.7 million reported Spanish.

Of the 6.7 million persons with Spanish mother tongue, 1.8 million were born in foreign countries. Persons reporting Spanish as their mother tongue constituted one-fifth of all persons who reported that their mother tongue was a language other than English.

About 64 percent of the native population with Spanish mother tongue lived in the five Southwestern States of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas. Approximately one-half of foreign-born persons of Spanish mother tongue lived in that portion of the Nation. Three out of every four persons in the Southwest reporting Spanish mother tongue were native; for the remainder of the Nation, a smaller proportion--two out of every three--of the persons of Spanish mother tongue were native. About 90 percent of persons reporting Spanish mother tongue who were born in Mexico lived in the Southwest, whereas 12 percent of the persons born in Cuba with Spanish mother tongue lived in that area.

In 1969, about one-half of all persons of Spanish origin reported English as the language usually spoken in their home. Within the Spanish origin group, English was reported as the language usually spoken in the home by 52 percent of persons of Mexican origin, 27 percent of Puerto Rican, 12 percent of Cuban, 43 percent of Central or South American, and 83 percent of persons of Other Spanish origin.

Persons of Spanish origin comprised 5 percent of the total population of the United States, but about half of all persons reporting a language other than English usually spoken in their home.

About 4.6 million persons reported that Spanish was usually spoken in their home at the time of the 1969 survey. Spanish was reported as spoken in the home by 55 percent of all persons reporting a language other than English. The average age of persons reporting Spanish was 21.5 years in contrast with 28.0 years for the total population of the United States and 41.9 years for persons who reported a language other than Spanish or English.

The language usually spoken in a person's home is related to nativity and mother tongue. It is to be expected that persons of second, third, and later generations of immigrant stock will be less likely to speak a foreign language in their home than their foreign-born ancestors. This relationship existed among persons who reported Spanish as their mother tongue. The 1969 survey showed that 81 percent of the foreign born and 64 percent of the native population reported their mother tongue--Spanish--as the language usually spoken in their home. Among persons who reported a mother tongue other than English or Spanish, a similar relationship existed--31 percent of the foreign born but only 6 percent of the native population continued to speak their mother tongue.

Of the 4.6 million persons reporting that Spanish was usually spoken in their home, about two-thirds were born in the United States or Puerto Rico. Of these native-born persons, 58 percent were living in the five Southwestern States. A similar proportion of the foreign-born Spanish speakers were also living in the Southwestern United States. About half of the foreign born were born in Mexico, and 92 percent of these persons lived in the five Southwestern States. Only 13 percent of Cuban-born Spanish-speaking persons lived in the Southwest.

18/20 *III Educational Attainment and Literacy*

Persons of Spanish origin had a lower level of educational attainment than other Americans. Significant differences in educational attainment of persons of Spanish origin existed between persons 35 years old and over and those 25 to 34 years. Thus, one-half of those persons 35 years old and over had completed only 8.5 years or more of school as compared with 11.7 years for the younger group. Within the Mexican origin group, comparable medians were 7.3 and 10.8 years.

About two out of every five (39 percent) persons, 16 to 24, who were literate in their Spanish mother tongue, had completed at least 4 years of high school. For those literate in their English mother tongue, the ratio was three out of five (59 percent). Among their elders, about 23 percent of those literate in Spanish, but 48 percent of those literate in English, had completed at least 4 years of high school.

Among the 5.1 million persons 14 years old and over who reported that Spanish was their mother tongue, 75 percent reported they were literate in English. The same proportion also reported being literate in Spanish. The proportion reporting English tended to decline with age from 96 percent for persons 14 and 15 years old to 72 percent for persons 35 to 44 years old, and 42 percent for persons 65 years old and over. Among those who reported being literate in Spanish, the proportion for young persons 16 to 24 years old and for persons 65 years old and over was below that reported for those in the 25 to 44 and 45 to 64 year age groups.

Of the 3 million persons 14 years old and over in whose home Spanish was usually spoken, 60 percent reported they could read and write English. The proportion able to read and write English declined from 95 percent for persons 14 and 15 years old to 59 percent for persons 25 to 34 years old; for the group 65 years old and over, the proportion was only 23 percent. The 3 million persons also reported on their ability to read and write Spanish. Of these, approximately 79 percent reported that they were literate in Spanish.

About three-fifths of the Spanish origin population was in the labor force; this is about the same proportion as for the Nation as a whole. However, 6.0 percent of the Spanish origin population was unemployed in comparison with 3.5 percent for the remainder of the civilian noninstitutional population. This relationship existed for both men and women. For Spanish origin males, the unemployment rate was 5.1 percent in contrast to 2.7 percent for other men. The unemployment rate for Spanish origin women was 7.5 percent as compared with 4.7 percent for other women.

Both the male and female Spanish origin workers were concentrated in the lower paying occupations. Only 25 percent of the employed Spanish origin men were in white-collar jobs in comparison to 41 percent for men of all other origins. Similarly, 41 percent of the employed Spanish origin women held white-collar jobs in comparison with 61 percent for females of all other origins.

Of the 19.8 million persons 16 years old and over who reported that they could read and write English and another language, 2.6 million reported they were able to read and write both English and Spanish. Of this 2.6 million, 85 percent of the males and about half of the females were in the labor force. The unemployment rate for these males was somewhat higher than that for men who were literate in English only or in English and a language other than Spanish. There is some evidence that the same relationship existed among females.

Appendix

NOTES

This report is an expansion of the report, P-20, No. 195, published in February 1970. The data shown here were derived from detailed tabulations of the replies to the questions on origin or descent, and on birthplace, language, and literacy asked in the November 1969 Current Population Survey. See page 40 for the wording of the questions.

The category "native" includes persons born in the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, outlying areas of the United States, and persons for whom country of birth was not reported. It excludes the small number of persons born abroad of American parents.

"Mother tongue" is the language reported as spoken in the person's home when he was a child. "Current language" is the language reported as the one usually spoken in the home at the time of the survey. The category "Spanish speaking" refers to persons who reported that Spanish was usually spoken in their home (see page 40, items 39 and 42).

The numbers in this report are in thousands. The figures may differ slightly from table to table since individual numbers were rounded to the nearest thousand without being adjusted to group totals.

SOURCE AND RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

The estimates are based on data obtained November 1969 in the Current Population Survey of the Bureau of the Census. The sample is spread over 449 areas comprising 863 counties and independent cities with coverage in each of the 50 States and District of Columbia. Approximately 50,000 occupied households are eligible for interview each month. Of this number, 2,250 occupied units, on the average, are visited but interviews are not obtained because the occupants are not found at home after repeated calls or are unavailable for some other reason. In addition to the 50,000, there are also about 8,500 sample units in an average month which are visited but are found to be vacant or otherwise not to be interviewed.

The estimating procedure used in this survey involved the inflation of the weighted sample results to independent estimates of the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States by age, race, and sex. These independent estimates were based on statistics from the 1960 Census of Population;

statistics of births, deaths, immigration, and emigration; and statistics on the strength of the Armed Forces.

Reliability of the estimates. Since the estimates are based on a sample, they may differ somewhat from figures obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same schedules, instructions, and enumerators. As in any survey work, the results are subject to errors of response and of reporting as well as being subject to sampling variability.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability, that is, of the variations that occur by chance because a sample rather than the whole of the population is surveyed. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially measures the effect of response and enumeration errors but does not measure any systematic biases in the data. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census figure by less than the standard error. The chances are about 95 out of 100 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

The figures presented in tables B and C are approximations to the standard errors of various estimates shown in this report. In order to derive standard errors that would be applicable to a wide variety of items and could be prepared at a moderate cost, a number of approximations were required. As a result, the tables of standard errors provide an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard errors rather than the precise standard error for any specific item. Table B shows standard errors of estimated numbers.

The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which

the percentage is based. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding estimates of the numerators of the percentages, particularly if the percentages are 50 percent or more. Table C contains the standard errors of estimated percentages.

Illustration of the use of tables of standard errors. Table 9 of this report shows that in November 1969, 4,081,000 persons with Spanish mother tongue lived in the five Southwestern States of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas. Table B shows the standard error on an estimate of this size to be approximately 125,000. The chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimate would have been a figure differing from a complete

census by less than 125,000. The chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimate would have been a figure differing from a complete census by less than 250,000.

Of these 4,081,000 persons, 982,000, or 24.1 percent, were foreign born. Table C shows the standard error of 24.1 percent on a base of 4,081,000 to be approximately 1.4 percent. Consequently, chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimated 24.1 percent would be within 1.4 percentage points of a complete census figure; and chances are 95 out of 100 that the estimate would be within 2.8 percentage points of a census figure; i.e., this 95 percent confidence interval would be from 21.3 to 26.9 percent.
