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ABSTRACT

This annotated, worldwide listing of 42 individuals and organizations represents an initial attempt to define ongoing futures documentation activity in its broadest sense. Due to the limited resources available, the list is incomplete, and descriptions of projects sketchy. As additions and changes appear in quantity, notices will be published in the World Future Society Bulletin. Annotations include mention of publications and reports already completed by the author or organization, as well as ongoing activities and future plans. Scope of the listing covers both general futures groups, such as the World Future Society, and special topics, such as education, peace research, technological change, and world resources. Subject, source nation, and individual name indices to the listing are provided. (Author/JLB)

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NOTE: All or part of this listing may be duplicated without permission or acknowledgement of the compiler. However, it would be appreciated if feedback is nevertheless provided as to how this listing is used and how it can be improved. Hopefully, such a listing will become an appendix to every bibliography, directory, and manual dealing with the future, so that all readers can be given access to the wider futures information system that is rapidly emerging.

This rudimentary list of 42 individuals and organizations is an initial attempt to define on-going futures documentation activity in its broadest sense. Many of the individuals listed here have indicated a willingness to join in a "Futures Information Consortium," in order to improve quality and avoid duplication of work, and to promote futures thinking everywhere. However, to the Europeans, "Consortium" suggests a business combine--which is hardly the intention of cooperation-minded North American futurists. A globally accepted title will surely emerge in the near future, perhaps along with some standardized procedures for documentation and exchange.

The limitations to this listing should be made as explicit as possible. Without extensive phoning, writing, and visiting, estimates of ongoing projects are skimpy at best. This is especially true for European activities, where reliance has been placed on listings from the IRADES directory (items 32-42). Nevertheless, for this particular form of documentation, it is felt that a few wisps of knowledge are better than no mention at all; that immediate sharing is preferable to withholding and polishing.

Even North American activity may be severely underestimated. Obviously, everyone does not wish to divulge all or even part of his or her plans. Others may simply have no plans and wish to avoid firming their objectives. Nevertheless, there are many who see the many mutual benefits of describing their ongoing or intended documentation projects to others. Even with the best of intentions, however, it is recognized that plans change, and one should not be held to the forecasts of one's output (which always seem to be sooner--often considerably sooner--than the actual event of publication). Again, a crude estimate of time, quantity, and quality is considered more valuable than none at all.

Those who are listed here are encouraged to volunteer further information on their activities as plans are expanded, abandoned, clarified, or otherwise changed. (Note "volunteer": this is not a funded activity, and there is neither time nor money for extensive questionnaires and/or phone calls.) Those engaged in relevant activity who are not listed here are encouraged to make themselves visible. Those who know of relevant activity not listed here are encouraged to contact the neglected compilers and ask them to write to the address provided below. (Again, there is neither time nor money to solicit new listings.)

Your cooperation is requested so that we might all benefit by learning more about who is thinking what about the future and where.

Possibly an index and curves showing distribution of entries in each bibliography over time. Rough draft available September 1971 in order to gain "support necessary to prepare a more complete version."

Among his many projects, a World Survey of Futures Research is planned, which extends the above compilation.

Co-compiler with Rojas of the Future Studies Syllabus (see No. 4) and has written several critical articles on the quantity and quality of college-level futures courses. Eldredge plans to write a definitive paper on futures education (assisted by Rojas) in Spring 1972.

Has issued several editions of a "Political Futuristics Bibliography," and is presently working through the Social Science Research Institute on a non-annotated computer-access bibliography of futures materials with about 40 categories.

Bibliography completed for course on political futures; about 500 items (two-thirds books, one-third articles); unannotated; copies available. To be updated late fall 1971.

No present plans to publish, but the card file on which the above was based is continually being expanded. May put together a bibliography on citizen participation in planning and new communications technologies.

Although NPA has not yet engaged in any documentation activity, interest has been expressed in initiating a comprehensive effort.

Stevenson, Project Director; in association with F. H. Armstrong, Judson D. Purdy, William B. Hamilton, and Douglas J. Ray.

A selective bibliography of 150 items from Canadian sources and/or by Canadian authors will be published in October 1971 by the History of Education Dept. at UWO. Most of the items are in English, some in French; all will be critically annotated in both English and French, with cross-references. Breakdown of 80% articles, 15% books and book-length reports, and 5% A-V materials; emphasis of material on general and educational futures in the 1967-1971 period. Nominal charge to be determined.

A full bibliography of about 1000 items, similar to the above, will be published sometime in 1972.

Depending on available support, a general compilation will be available in early 1972. Alternative Futures for Mankind: An Annotated Bibliography of Societal Trends, Forecasts, and Proposals will be similar to and overlapping with Alternative Futures for Learning, containing about 1000-1500 items, largely English-language books and book-length reports. Updating of earlier work will hopefully follow publication of this general compilation.

This bi-monthly compilation, published since May 1971 (individual subscription, \$15), offers an array of review essays on books, proposals for institutional change, dialogues offered by institutional leaders, and surveys of literature related to institutional change. The July 1971 issue, for example, mentions about 140 books and papers, each being made available to readers through the bulletin's "Archives of Institutional Change."

The first section--Communications--will run about 160 pages and will be ready to print by May 1971." (flier information)

Although weak for North America, this valuable directory is nevertheless the best available portrait of futurist activity on a global scale.

Further documentation activities include Social and Human Forecasting for 1972, Abstracts of Recent Contributions (series on Social Change and Forecasting, Education, Family and Religion; 3 issues for 1971; about 300 items each), a Newsletter to provide interim updating of Documentation 1971 and a basis for the 1972 edition, and a project on international documentation and information services (studying retrieval, classification, norms, etc.).
