I N T R O D U C T I O N

The "Inventory of Federal Programs that Support Health Manpower Training--1970" was compiled by the Bureau of Health Manpower Education in response to a request of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, through Senator Warren G. Magnuson, for a "comprehensive and carefully documented report that covers the current status and relationships of all major Federal programs concerned with health manpower."

The Inventory lists 144 separately identified Federal programs through which health manpower training was supported in fiscal year 1970. Eight Departments and five Independent Agencies of the Federal Government received legislative authorizations and appropriations from the Congress to administer one or more of these programs. Of these 144 programs, 94 were exclusively for health manpower training. The aggregate Federal investment approximated \$1,094 million.

Two earlier inventories were compiled by this Bureau. The first was issued in 1967 as "Appendix A -- Federal Aid Available for Education and Training of Health Service Personnel" in Health Manpower Perspective: 1967. In that year, 90 separately identified health manpower training programs were in operation; aggregate funds totaled about \$400 million. The second compilation, showing funds and program data for fiscal year 1968, was published in the Congressional Record of September 16, 1969, and in the Public Health Service Publication No. 263, Health Manpower Source Book, Section 21, "Allied Health Manpower, 1950-80." A total of 117 Federal manpower training activities were included in the second inventory of which 83 were exclusively for health occupations training; aggregate funds totaled approximately \$800 million.

Although the information in the current Inventory was compiled as of September 1970, primarily for a Congressional Committee, and was subsequently distributed to the 13 Federal Departments and Independent Agencies that so graciously and quickly supplied the information, the Division of Manpower Intelligence in the Bureau believes that a wider distribution of the Inventory for FY 1970, even though the data are a year older, would still be both valid and useful. It is therefore being issued in published form as a service to those concerned with the ever-increasing problem of health manpower training.

The Assistant Secretary for Health and Scientific Affairs expressed the hope that "the Division of Manpower Intelligence recently established within the Bureau of Health Manpower Education will be able to undertake the compilation of similar information on a continuing basis..."

That charge the Division of Manpower Intelligence has accepted. Work has already been initiated by the National Clearinghouse for Health Manpower Information of the Division, in the compilation of data to cover Federally-supported health manpower training programs as of fiscal year 1971 and fiscal year 1972.

The National Clearinghouse for Health Manpower Information would welcome any comments, suggestions, or criticisms of the current Inventory that would make future inventories more useful.

In particular, there is need for the development of uniform definitions and format of data presentation to facilitate comparability of data in future compilations.

Data will be updated on a regular basis, at time intervals to be determined by the nature of the data and the changes in legislative requirements.

P R E F A C E

This Inventory of Federal programs through which health manpower training has been or could be supported was compiled by staff members of diverse Divisions in the Bureau of Health Manpower Education, National Institutes of Health, from information submitted by the various Departments and Independent Agencies. Organizations and programs are given as they existed in September 1970.

Funding of programs is for fiscal year ending June 30, 1970, unless otherwise noted. Program data for FY 1970 are, for the most part, estimates, inasmuch as final figures were not available at the time of compilation. In considering this inventory, it should also be borne in mind that the program count is somewhat arbitrary, since no uniform format could be imposed upon all Agencies. Data listed under the category "Institutions or Individuals Supported" refer only to health occupations, unless otherwise specified.

The funds shown in the Inventory are principally obligations; but where these were not available, appropriations or expenditures were listed. When precise budgetary data were not available at the time of compilation of the report, agencies were encouraged to report estimates. These financial data, therefore, are useful only to show the order of magnitude of the programs and will not agree with fiscal data from other sources.

The figures generally under-represent total funds for health manpower training, because, in a number of individual programs, monies specifically for health manpower training were not identifiable.

In some programs, health manpower training activities are conducted as part of a broader mission--for example, those of the Office of Education and the Department of Labor. In these instances, funds for the health manpower training component are either not separately identifiable or can only be approximated. In other programs, such as those of the Department of Defense or the Veterans Administration, health manpower programs are supported specifically to provide staff for mandated health service activities; but costs were unavailable at the time of compilation of this report.

Assessment of the impact or cost of Federal student-loan programs requires a special approach beyond the scope of this

Inventory. The allocation of Federal funds to loan-granting institutions such as schools or banks in any one fiscal year is not a valid measure of the size of the program. In a guaranteed-loan program, these sums merely represent lenders' losses made good. In loan programs administered by schools, the sums represent the Federal capital contribution to revolving loan funds; therefore, the amounts available for new loans in that year may be considerable in excess of the annual Federal contribution. Moreover, in revolving loan funds, repayment is expected to recapture a substantial proportion of the Federal funds invested.

Distribution of the 144 programs by the 13 Federal Departments and Independent Agencies listed in the Inventory is given in Table 1. Table 2 shows the distribution of the 97 programs for which the DHEW has responsibility out of a total of 144 Federal health manpower training programs. Table 3 gives the key to the abbreviations used in the "Level of Education" category of the Inventory.

An alphabetical index of Federally-supported health manpower training programs, by title and agency, has been added at the end of the Inventory to make the listing more usable. The abbreviations used to indicate the Federal Department or Independent Agency with legislative responsibility for the program appear at the beginning of the index.
