ABSTRACT

Based on the latest survey of work experience of the population, this article presents highlights of the survey, discusses the extent of employment, and analyzes the rise in unemployment with respect to age, sex, race, and other factors. Among the highlights noted were: (1) Over 95 million men and women 16 years old and above looked for work at some time during 1970, (2) The 1970 labor force increase was proportionately less than the population increase, (3) Six out of 10 women who headed families worked during the year, (4) One-half of all married women had jobs at some time during the year, and (5) 15.3 percent of all who worked or looked for work were unemployed at some time during the year, the largest proportion in several years. 

# Work experience of the population in 1970

THE ECONOMIC SLOWDOWN of 1970 led to the first decrease in over a decade in the number of year-round full-time workers. The reduction in the number who worked all year at full-time jobs was associated with an increase in the number and proportion of the work force who experienced some unemployment during the year. However, the total number of men and women who worked at some time during the year continued to expand, but at a much slower pace than in recent years. The increase was about one-half that of 1969 and the smallest since 1965.

The impact of the slowdown on the regularity of employment varied considerably from one labor force group to another. Year-round full-time employment declined among men, but remained unchanged among women. The cutback in full-year work was relatively greater for men age 25 to 44 than for other men, and relatively greater for white men than for black.

This article is based on the latest survey of work experience of the population.<sup>1</sup> It presents some highlights from the survey, discusses the extent of employment, and analyzes the rise in unemployment with respect to age, sex, race, and other factors.

## Highlights

Following are the major findings of the 1970 survey of the working age population:

Almost 95½ million men and women 16 years old and over worked or looked for work at some time during 1970. They constituted 69 percent of the population in those ages.

The 1970 labor force increase was proportionately less than the population increase, in contrast to the preceding 2 years when labor force growth was relatively greater than population growth.

93.6 million persons 16 years old and over worked at some time during 1970—1.1 million more than in 1969.

52 million persons worked all year at full-time jobs, 800,000 fewer than a year earlier. The decline was entirely among men. This was the first time since 1958 that the number of year-round full-time workers decreased significantly.

Six out of 10 women who headed families worked during the year—a total of 3.6 million. Over half of them worked all year at full-time jobs.

One-half of all married women had jobs at some time during the year. Of the 23 million who worked, 4 out of 10 worked all year at full-time jobs.

14.6 million persons were unemployed at some time during the year, a rise of 2.8 million over 1969.

15.3 percent of all who worked or looked for work were unemployed at some time during the year, the largest proportion in several years.

The increases in the proportions with some unemployment were greater for men than for women, for whites than for Negroes, and for craftsmen than for laborers.

4.5 million persons were jobless for a total of 15 weeks or more during the year, up nearly 2 million over 1969.

## Employment

Some 93.6 million persons 16 years old and over worked at some time during 1970, about 1.1 million more than in 1969. The increases occurred among both men and women. However, while the proportion of women who worked remained unchanged at 53 percent, the proportion of men decreased 1 percentage point to 84 percent. (See table 1.)

The number of men who worked all year at full-time jobs declined significantly, for the first time since 1958, as cutbacks in aerospace and defense-related industries and in other sectors caused layoffs and rising unemployment. About 36.3 million men

worked all year at full-time jobs, 865,000 fewer than a year earlier. The number employed for 27 to 49 weeks increased by nearly the same amount. Among women, however, both the number and the proportion of the employed who worked all year at full-time jobs remained unchanged from 1969.

### Race

A smaller proportion of Negro<sup>2</sup> than white men had work experience during the year, and the difference in rates widened between 1969 and 1970. The proportion of Negro men who worked dropped over 3 percentage points to 79 percent, while the proportion of white men remained substantially the same at 85 percent.

Of those with work experience, the proportion of black men who worked year round full time remained unchanged at about 60 percent, but the proportion of white men declined to 67 percent. The drop was especially large for white men 25 to 44 years old. Nonetheless, for men in the prime working ages, the proportion of whites working year round full time remained substantially higher than the proportion of blacks.

As in past years, a greater proportion of Negro

than white women 25 years and older worked during the year, probably because of greater economic necessity. Among younger women, the situation is reversed, with 68 percent of the white women 16 to 24 years old working in 1970, compared with 56 percent of the black women. This may reflect the fact that a greater proportion of young Negro women have children requiring maternal care, which tends to reduce labor force participation.

### Married workers

Married men are most likely to be in the labor force and exhibit the most stable labor force activity. Excluding those over 65, more than 9 out of 10 married men in each age group worked at some time in 1970. The percentage of married men with work experience was essentially unchanged; however, of those who worked, only 77 percent held full-time jobs year round, down from 80 percent in 1969. Larger proportions of married than of single men worked year round at full-time jobs.

The proportion of married women who worked at some time during 1970 was the same as in 1969—about half. Similarly, the proportion of working wives who held full-time jobs all year held steady at

40 percent. Married women under 25 years old were more likely than those over 25 to have work experience, but married women workers 45 to 64 were most likely to have been employed year round full time, and they were more likely than younger women to be in the labor force all year. Undoubtedly, they have a stronger attachment to the labor force due to lessening home responsibilities.

### Women who are heads of households

One out of 9 household heads<sup>3</sup> is a woman. Frequently their earnings are the primary source of family income. On the one hand, the presence of dependents may exert constraints upon their labor force participation, yet on the other, precisely because of these responsibilities, economic pressures to work are often greater for them than for other women.

About 61 percent of these female household heads worked in 1970, slightly over half of them year round at full-time jobs. These proportions were about the same as in 1969 and, as in past years, were higher than the comparable figure for married women. The proportion with work experience varied little by age, except that of the female household heads who were 65 and over, fewer than one-fifth worked, and most who did worked only part time. Although the proportions who worked were about the same among Negro and white household heads, relatively more of the white women held year-round full-time jobs and relatively more of the black women held part-time jobs.

### 16- to 21-year-olds

The number of 16- to 21-year-olds increased by 750,000 in the year ending in March 1971, but the number who worked remained virtually unchanged at 14.6 million. The decline in percent with work experience was mostly among men who were enrolled in school in March 1971.

Persons 16 to 21 years old who were students at the time of the survey were less likely than nonstudents to have worked during 1970. As might be expected, of those students who worked, very few were employed year round full time. Over two-thirds of the students with work experience were part-time workers; another fifth held full-time jobs for 13 weeks or less, probably during summer vacation or during holiday periods. In contrast, over one-fourth

of the young nonstudent workers were employed year round full time and only one-third held part-time jobs.

Among both students and nonstudents, a smaller proportion of black than white youths were employed in 1970. Among male students, the proportion who worked declined, more sharply for blacks than for whites; among male nonstudents, such a decline occurred only among blacks. The proportions of women who held jobs remained unchanged over the year.

### Industry and occupation

Service and trade industries accounted for most of the 1.1 million net increase in the number of persons who worked at some time in 1970. The number whose longest job was in manufacturing declined by 1.1 million from 1969, mostly in durable goods. The number who worked in the service industry increased by a like number, and the number who worked in trade increased by almost 1 million.

Service-producing industries are less subject to cyclical fluctuations than goods-producing industries. Generally, industries in the goods-producing sector of the economy have had the widest fluctuation in proportion of year-round full-time workers. The proportion of durable goods manufacturing workers who worked at full-time jobs the whole year (67 percent) was 3 percentage points lower than in 1969, while the proportion in the service industry remained constant at 50 percent.

Primarily because of cutbacks in the number who worked in manufacturing, the number employed as operatives during 1970 declined, by 1.2 million. On the other hand, there were substantial increases in the numbers of service workers, managers and administrators, and nonfarm laborers.

Among men, the proportions working year round at full-time jobs in 1970 dropped significantly from 1969 levels only among those whose longest job during the year was as a craftsman or an operative—down 4 percentage points compared with an average decline of 2 points for all men. About 70 percent of the craftsmen and 61 percent of the operatives worked year round at full-time jobs.

Among both men and women, managers and professionals were most likely to have worked at full-time jobs during all of 1970, while relatively small proportions of laborers and service workers had such extensive work experience. Only one-fourth of female

salesworkers were employed year round full time. The majority were part-time workers. Almost 9 out of 10 women salesworkers were in retail trade, where part-time and peak-season work are common.

### Part-year workers

Those who work fewer than 50 weeks during the year are called "part-year" workers. Primarily because of an increase in the number of workers who were unemployed at some time during the year, the number of part-year workers increased by 1.9 million in 1970, to 35 million. The greatest increase occurred among men 25 to 44 years old, for whom the number working less than a full year because of unemployment was half again as large as in 1969. Part-year workers made up 38 percent of all persons with work experience during 1970, up from 36 percent in 1969.

The main reason given for working only part of the year varies by age and sex. Among teenagers, attendance at school is by far the main reason they cannot work all year; only about 12 percent of these young workers gave unemployment as the main reason, but unemployment accounted for all of the rise in the number of teenage part-year workers. (See table 2.) Among men 20 to 64 years old, unemployment was the predominant reason, while among men

65 years and over, retirement was the main reason for part-year work.

Over the year, the number of adult men giving unemployment as the main reason increased by 1.6 million and the proportion rose to 42 percent, from 33 percent. About 17 percent of the adult men reported illness or disability as their main reason for part-year work.

More than half the adult women who worked part year in 1970 reported that taking care of the home was their main reason for not working all year. The number giving unemployment as their main reason increased substantially over the year; as a result, the proportion rose to 17 percent, from 12 percent in 1969.

Long-term workers were more likely than short-term workers to cite unemployment as their main reason for part-year work. Among full-time workers, 48 percent of those who worked 40 to 49 weeks gave unemployment as the main reason for not working a full year, but only 12 percent of those who worked 1 to 13 weeks. Among the latter group the most frequent reasons were going to school or taking care of the home.

Unemployment was a much less frequent cause of part-year work among part-time workers than among full-time workers. Among men, school and retirement were more important factors for part-time than

for full-time workers, reflecting the fact that most male part-time workers are under 25 or over 64 years old.

Negro men were more likely than white men to have worked less than a full year and were more likely to report unemployment and disability as the main reasons. Greater proportions of Negro than white women also gave these two reasons.

**The unemployed**

Persons who entered the labor market for the first time in 1970, or were laid off and seeking new jobs, were faced with an economic slowdown which resulted in stable or contracting employment in most industries. The number of persons who were unemployed a week or more increased over the year by 2.8 million, to 14.6 million—the highest since the

early 1960's. The proportion of the work force who were unemployed at some time during the year increased by 3 percentage points, to 15.3 percent. (See table 3.)

Over half (58 percent) of the increase in the number with unemployment was among men and women 20 to 34 years of age, who also experienced the largest increases in the proportions with unemployment. With their lower seniority, this age group was particularly affected by layoffs of both production workers and professional staff in goods-producing industries. Overall, the increase in the proportion with unemployment was greater for men than for women, because the slowdown was greater in construction and manufacturing than in services and finance, the industry that employs the largest proportion of women workers.

The proportion of workers unemployed at some



time during the year continued higher for Negroes than for whites (22 and 14 percent, respectively), but the increase in this proportion was relatively

greater among whites. In all age groups under 65, the proportions of white men with unemployment increased. However, in the youngest and oldest age groups, the proportions of Negro men unemployed at some time during the year did not significantly increase. The same was true among white women. Unemployment among Negro women did not increase in any age group, but the proportion of Negro women with unemployment remained about half again as high as the proportion of white women.

Married workers, both men and women, were less likely to experience unemployment than single workers, but the general increase in unemployment in 1970 was no respecter of marital status. The greatest percentage point increase in unemployment was among single men, from 20 to 25 percent. (See chart 1.) Married men, the group with the most stable work experience, also had a rise in the proportion with unemployment, from 10 percent to 12.5 percent. This is their highest level since 1964. Of the 1.1 million increase over the year in the number of married men (wife present) who experienced some unemployment, 6 out of 10 were in the 25- to 44-year-old group.

The number of women who were unemployed at some time during 1970 (6 million) increased by about one-fifth over 1969 in each marital status category. Half of the women who were unemployed at some time during 1970 were married and living with their husbands. However, the marital status group showing the highest proportion with some unemployment was single women, of whom 20 percent experienced unemployment, compared with 13 percent of the married women. This is not surprising, since young persons predominate among the singles and unemployment rates are higher for youths than for older persons.

#### Long-term unemployment

The looser labor market in 1970 resulted not only in a rise in the number who experienced unemployment, but also in a sharp increase in the number unemployed for a total of 15 weeks or more. Persons unemployed for this length of time—whether for consecutive weeks or the aggregate of several spells of unemployment—are called long-term unemployed.

Approximately 4.5 million persons were in this category in 1970, a rise of 1.9 million or 73 percent over the preceding year. Within this group, the proportion of men who had unemployment totaling 27

weeks or more was slightly larger than in 1969. Both the number of persons with long-term unemployment and the proportion they constituted of all persons with unemployment were the highest since 1964. The increase in the number of long-term unemployed was sharper for workers 25 to 44 years old than for younger or older persons. About 1.6 million workers in this age group were jobless for at least weeks in 1970, nearly double the 1969 total.

Another way to measure the impact of long-term unemployment is to compare the number of persons unemployed for 15 weeks or more with the total number in the labor force at some time during the year. In 1970, 5 percent of the persons who were in the labor force at some time during the year had long-term unemployment, compared with 3 percent in 1969.

The rise over the year in the number jobless 15 weeks or more was twice as sharp for white persons as for Negroes (81 and 44 percent, respectively). Nevertheless, the proportion of unemployed Negro workers with long-term unemployment continued to exceed that of white workers, as shown in the following tabulation:

Among whites, both men and women experienced sharp increases in proportions with long-term unemployment. The comparable proportion for Negro men also increased, but among Negro women, whose rate was already high, the increase was not statistically significant. Among Negro men, the largest increases in proportion with long-term unemployment was at the younger ages, while among white men the increases varied little by age.

A smaller proportion of married men than of others are jobless during the year, and they are also less likely to accumulate long-term unemployment. However, in 1970, about 1.5 million married men were jobless for 15 weeks or more, and the proportionate increase was about the same as that for other men.

Some 900,000 of the long-term unemployed were married women, but their over-the-year increase was not as sharp as for single women. Of the women heading families who were unemployed during the year, about 200,000 or 32 percent, had been jobless for a total of at least 15 weeks. These women were somewhat more likely than married women to be unemployed during the year. However, the proportions unemployed for 15 weeks or more were the same for the two groups.

Unemployment rates tend to decrease with age, because those with most seniority are usually the last to be laid off. However, once a person becomes unemployed, the likelihood of long-term unemployment tends to increase with age. Of the unemployed under age 25, about 27 percent were jobless for at least 15 weeks, compared with 42 percent of those 55 years and over.

Nearly half (48 percent) of the part-year workers jobless for 15 weeks or more accumulated all of their unemployment in one spell of unemployment; that is, they were jobless for at least that many consecutive weeks. On the other hand, about 31 percent had three spells or more of unemployment.

Unemployed persons who had worked at full-time jobs were more likely than part-time workers to have accumulated their 15 weeks in one spell. This is not surprising since full-time workers are probably less likely to make frequent moves into and out of the job market.

#### Unemployment by industry and occupation

Among wage and salary workers, the proportion with some unemployment rose over the year to about 15 percent, 2.5 percentage points higher than in 1969. In many industries the proportions of long-term unemployed were greater than in 1969. (See table 4.)

Employment in the construction and durable goods manufacturing industries was most severely affected by the decline in business activity. The tight money market which prevailed in 1969 had an adverse effect on employment in housing and nonresidential construction in 1970. Also, employment in the construction industry is strongly affected by both cyclical and seasonal fluctuations. Historically, the percentage of construction workers jobless at some time during the year is greater than for any other major industry group, and this situation continued in 1970. About 31 percent of the wage and salary

workers whose longest job during the year was in the construction industry had been unemployed in the course of the year, a rise of 6 percentage points over 1969. Long-term unemployment was also more prevalent in construction than in any other nonagricultural industry. About 36 percent of the construction workers who had been unemployed were out of work for a total of 15 weeks or more, compared with an average of 31 percent for all jobless wage and salary workers.

Also, although a high proportion of those whose longest job was in the durable goods industry were unemployed at some time in 1970, persons who worked in this industry were no more likely to be unemployed 15 weeks or more than the average in other industries. The number of persons who worked during the year in durable goods industries decreased in 1970 because of cutbacks in spending on defense and aerospace activities, and relative weakness in sales of automobiles and aircraft. About 19 percent of the workers in durable goods industries had some unemployment during the year (compared with 14 percent in 1969), with the percentages reaching 32 percent in automobiles and 27 percent in lumber and wood products, except furniture.

Compared with durable goods workers, those in

nondurable goods manufacturing industries are less subject to fluctuation caused by cyclical or monetary factors. About 16 percent of the workers in nondurable goods industries were unemployed at least once in 1970, and the increase in the rate was much smaller than for durable goods industries. Workers in the trade and service industries also experienced significant increases in the proportions having some unemployment, reaching 16 percent and 10 percent, respectively. The proportions of workers with some unemployment were lowest among those employed in transportation, service, and public administration.

Changes in the proportions unemployed in various occupations reflected developments by industry. Among men, the proportions with unemployment were largest among those whose longest jobs were as nonfarm laborers, operatives, or craftsmen (26 percent, 22 percent, and 18 percent, respectively). These three occupations also had the largest rise over 1969 in proportions with unemployment, about 5 percentage points. Among men, over-the-year changes in proportions with unemployment in the professional, managerial, and other white-collar groups and among farmworkers were less than the average for all men. Among women, the proportion experiencing some unemployment increased significantly only among operatives.

Although the incidence of unemployment among the various occupation groups generally showed little increase over the year, there was a substantial increase in long-term unemployment among workers in some occupations. The likelihood of unemployment was comparatively low for professional workers, managers, and clerical workers; of those who did become unemployed, the proportion jobless 15 weeks or more increased very sharply, doubling in the case of managers, both men and women, and of male clerical workers. The increase in the proportion of craftsmen and operatives with long-term unemployment was about equal to the average increase.

### Spells of unemployment

In spite of the general increase in unemployment the pattern of spells of unemployment showed little change over the year. About one-third of the part-year workers with some unemployment had two spells or more of joblessness in both 1969 and 1970. The proportions with multiple spells were higher for men than for women, and for Negroes than for

whites. Among both men and women, the proportions with multiple spells of unemployment varied little by age.

There was no significant change by occupation in the proportion of jobless men who had two spells or more of unemployment—somewhat over 40 percent of laborers, and slightly more than a third of the craftsmen, operatives, and service workers. Among women, close to half (45 percent) of the jobless private household workers had more than one spell of unemployment. Among both men and women, the smallest proportion with more than one spell was among white-collar workers.

#### Nonworkers who looked for work

The number of persons who looked for work for at least 1 week during the year but did not find it rose from 1.2 million in 1969 to 1.7 million in 1970, in contrast to the past few years during which the number in this category remained relatively unchanged while the total number of persons working or looking for work rose steadily. The increases over the year were somewhat greater for men than for women, for single persons than for married persons, and for whites than for Negroes. A large proportion of those who look for work but do not find it are married women and students, most of whom probably look for temporary or seasonal jobs; in 1970 fewer than 10 percent were married men.

Almost two-thirds of the rise in the number of men who looked for but did not find work was among those 16 to 24 years old and among single persons. This group included not only students who may have looked for summer or other temporary jobs, but also some men discharged from the Armed Forces during the year. The latter are eligible for unemployment compensation while looking for work, and they could afford to be selective in the kinds of jobs they were willing to accept.

Even though the number of nonworkers who looked for work increased faster among whites than Negroes, the blacks remained disproportionately represented. Blacks were 24 percent of these jobseekers, but only 11 percent of those who worked during the year.

Women nonworkers who looked for work generally looked for only a short period of time: over half (54 percent) for a total of 4 weeks or less and only 23 percent for a total of 15 weeks or more, virtually

the same proportions as in 1969. Men, however, especially married men, were more persistent in their job search. In 1970 only 30 percent looked for fewer than 5 weeks; 42 percent continued their efforts for at least 15 weeks, a much higher proportion than a year earlier. Of the married men who looked, over half—54 percent—did so for at least 15 weeks.

#### Employment status in March 1971

Overall, 81 percent of all persons who worked during 1970 were employed at the time of the survey in March 1971, about 4 percent were unemployed, and 15 percent were no longer in the labor force. The proportions in these categories vary not only by age and sex, but also by the extent of unemployment during the previous year.

Among persons who had worked less than 50 weeks in 1970, those who had been unemployed at some time during the year were more likely to be in the labor force and to be unemployed in March 1971 than persons who had not had any unemployment. This is not surprising since many part-year workers who do not have any unemployment are students, housewives, and older persons with only marginal or intermittent attachment to the labor force. They are in the labor force only when they work and leave it when the job ends.

A large proportion (21 percent) of the men 20 to 64 years old who had been unemployed at some time during 1970 were also unemployed in March 1971; only 8 percent were not in the labor force. Among men in this age group who had not had any unemployment, only 5 percent were unemployed but 25 percent were not in the labor force. The proportion unemployed in March was not significantly different from that a year earlier for the comparable groups of men who had been jobless during 1969, and the proportions not in the labor force were also about the same.

A worker's unemployment status in March 1971 was also directly related to the number of weeks he had been unemployed in 1970. Among men and women 20 to 64 years old, smaller proportions of those who had been jobless for 1 to 4 weeks were looking for work in March 1971 than of those who had been jobless for 15 weeks or more. Among men, for example, 11 percent of those who had been jobless for 1 to 4 weeks were unemployed, compared with over 35 percent of those who had been jobless

for 27 weeks or more. The problems that prevented their employment in 1970 apparently persisted in 1971.

Even though unemployment was more extensive in 1970 than in 1969, there was no indication that greater proportions of the long-term unemployed had

left the labor force. As a matter of fact, of those men and women who had been unemployed for 15 weeks or more in 1970, a smaller proportion were out of the labor force in March 1971 than had obtained among the comparable group of persons a year earlier. □

<sup>1</sup> Since the annual survey of the work experience of the population during a given year is made in March of the following year, the information obtained relates to the civilian work experience of those persons 16 years old and over in the civilian noninstitutional population as of the March date. Thus, the work experience of persons who were in the civilian labor force during 1970 but not in the civilian noninstitutional population as of March 1971 is not included; similarly, persons who died during the course of 1970 or in the 1971 period preceding the survey date are also not reflected in the figures. On the other hand, those persons who reached age 16 in January, February, and March 1971 are included. The data are compiled from supplementary questions to the March 1971 monthly survey of the labor force, conducted for the Bureau of Labor

Statistics by the Bureau of the Census through its Current Population Survey.

This is the latest in a series of reports on this subject. Data from the March 1970 survey were published in the *Monthly Labor Review*, January 1971, pp. 45-52, and reprinted with additional tabular data and explanatory notes as Special Labor Force Report 127.

## Explanatory note

ESTIMATES in this report are based on supplementary questions in the March 1971 Current Population Survey conducted and tabulated for the Bureau of Labor Statistics by the Bureau of the Census. Basic labor force concepts, sample design, estimating methods, and reliability of the data are described briefly in the following sections.<sup>1</sup>

### DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Population Coverage. Each month trained interviewers collect information from a sample of about 50,000 households in 449 areas in 863 counties and independent cities with coverage in each of the 50 States and the District of Columbia. Estimates in this report are for persons 16 years of age and over in the civilian noninstitutional population during the calendar week ending March 13, 1971. The civilian noninstitutional population excludes all members of the Armed Forces and inmates of institutions, such as homes for the aged and correctional institutions. All persons were asked how many weeks they worked and whether they looked for work during 1970. Persons who worked less than 50 weeks were asked detailed questions on reasons for part-year work and whether they had more than one period of unemployment.

Work Experience. Persons with work experience are those who worked as civilians at any time during the year at full-time or part-time jobs.

Part-Time and Full-Time Jobs. Persons are classified as having worked at full-time jobs if they worked 35 hours or more per week in a majority of the weeks worked during the year. They are classified as having worked at part-time jobs if they worked 1 to 34 hours per week in a majority of the weeks worked during the year. In tables E-1 and E-2, persons are classified as full-time or part-time workers in accordance with the number of hours they usually work each week at the job held during the survey week in March 1971.

Weeks Worked. Persons with work experience are classified according to the number of weeks in which they did any work during the year as civilians for pay or profit (including paid vacations and sick leave) or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business.

Year-Round Full-Time Workers. Year-round full-time workers are persons who worked primarily at full-time jobs for 50 weeks or more.

Part-Year Workers. Part-year workers are persons who worked either full time or part time for 1 to 49 weeks.

Major Reason for Part-Year Work. Part-year workers are classified by major reason for part-year work on the basis of what they were doing most of the weeks in which they did not work. Their reasons are reported as unemployment or layoff from a job, illness or disability (not including paid sick leave), taking care of home, going to school, retirement, in the Armed Forces, and other reasons. The "going to school" category was restricted to persons under 30 years of age, "taking care of home" was restricted to women, and "in the Armed Forces" was restricted to men.

Nonworkers. Nonworkers are persons who did not work during the year. They are asked whether they looked for work during the year and, if they looked, for how many weeks. Nonworkers are classified according to the main reason for not working. Their reasons are reported as illness or disability, taking care of home, going to school, inability to find work, retired, in the Armed Forces, and other reasons.

Longest Job. A person's longest job during the year is the one at which he worked the greatest number of weeks. For most wage and salary workers, a job is defined as all the time worked for the same employer. The only exception is work for private families (domestic service, baby-sitting, odd jobs and the like) which is counted as a single job regardless of number of employers. Self-employment and unpaid work in family-operated enterprises are also designated as jobs for purposes of this survey.

Occupation, Industry, and Class of Worker. The data on occupation, industry, and class of worker refer to the job held longest during the year. Persons who held two jobs or more are reported in the job at which they worked the greatest number of weeks.

The occupation and industry categories used here are those used in the 1960 Census of Population. The class-of-worker breakdown specifies "wage and salary workers," "self-employed workers," and "unpaid family workers." Wage and salary workers are persons working for a wage, salary, commission, tips, payment in kind, or at piece rates for a private employer or any government unit. Self-employed workers are persons working in their own unincorporated business, profession, or trade, or operating a farm for profit or fees. Unpaid family workers are persons working without pay on a farm or in a business operated by a member of the household to whom they are related by blood or marriage.

Spell of Unemployment. A spell of unemployment is a continuous period of unemployment of at least 1 week's duration. A spell is terminated by employment or withdrawal from the labor force.

Duration of Unemployment. The number of weeks accumulated in all spells of unemployment represents the total number of weeks of unemployment during the year.

Employed in March 1971. Employed persons are all those who during the survey week (a) did any work at all as paid employees or in their own business or profession, or on their own farm, or worked 15 hours or more

as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family or (b) did not work but had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labor-management dispute, or personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for the time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs.

Unemployed in March 1971. Unemployed persons are all those who did not work during the survey week, made specific efforts to find a job within the preceding 4 weeks, and were available for work during the survey week or would have been available except for temporary illness. Also included as unemployed are those who did not work at all, were available for work, and (a) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off, or (b) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Civilian Labor Force in March 1971. The civilian labor force comprises all civilian persons classified as employed or unemployed according to the above definitions.

Not in Civilian Labor Force in March 1971. Persons not classified as employed or unemployed are defined as not in the labor force. Persons doing only incidental unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are also classified as not in the labor force.

Age. The age classification is based on the age of the person at his last birthday.

Color. The term "color" refers to the division of the population into two groups--white and Negro and other races. "Other races" include American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, and any other race except Negro and white.

Marital Status. Persons are classified into the following categories according to their marital status at the time of interview: Single, married, spouse present, and other marital status. The classification "married, spouse present" applies to husband and wife if both are reported as members of the same household even though one may be temporarily absent on business, vacation, on a visit, in a hospital, and the like at the time of interview. The term "other marital status" applies to persons who are married with spouse absent, widowed, or divorced.

Sums of Distributions. Sums of individual items, whether absolute numbers or percentages, may not equal totals because of independent rounding of totals and components. Percentage totals, however, are always shown as 100 percent.

#### RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

Estimating Procedure. The estimating procedure used in this survey inflates weighted sample results to independent estimates of the civilian

noninstitutional population by age, sex, and color. These independent estimates were based on statistics from the 1960 Census of Population and other data on births, deaths, immigration, emigration, and strength of the Armed Forces.

Variability. Since the estimates are based on a sample, they may differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same schedules and procedures. As in any survey, the results are also subject to errors of response and reporting. These may be relatively large in the case of persons with irregular attachment to the labor force.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability, that is, of the variations that might occur by chance because a sample rather than the entire population is surveyed. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially measures the effect of response and enumeration errors but does not measure any systematic biases in the data. The chances are about 2 out of 3 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census by less than the standard error. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

Tables 1 and 2 show approximations of the standard errors of various characteristics and should be interpreted as providing an indication of the order of magnitude of the standard error rather than a precise standard error for any specific item.

The following examples illustrate their use. An estimated 14,565,000 persons 16 years old and over were unemployed at some time in 1970. Table 1 shows the standard error on this estimate to be approximately 159,000. The chances are about 2 out of 3 that the difference between the sample estimate and a complete census count would be less than 159,000. The chances are 19 out of 20 that the difference would have been less than 318,000.

The 14,565,000 persons represented 15.3 percent of the 95,342,000 people 16 years old and over in the labor force at some time in 1970. Table 2 shows the standard error of 15.3 percent with a base of 95,342,000 to be about 0.2 percent. Consequently, the chances are 2 out of 3 that a complete census would have disclosed the figures to be between 15.1 and 15.5 percent, and 19 out of 20 that the figure would have been between 14.9 and 15.7 percent.

The reliability of an estimated percentage that is based on sample data for both numerator and denominator depends on both the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which the percentage is based. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding absolute estimates of the numerator of the percentage, particularly if the percentage is large (50 percent or greater).
