ABSTRACT

This poll was administered to a total of 282 prospective college freshmen at the State University of New York at Buffalo to elicit their attitudes toward and opinions of such items as drug use and addiction, violence as opposed to nonviolence in civil protests, and the 18 year-old vote. At least 74% of the students responding to Youthpoll disagreed with: violence in demonstrations, taking of hard drugs, and characterizing the activist as a "mental case." At least 78% approved of: writing to public officials, circulating petitions, nonviolent change, protesting nonviolently, tutoring, 18 year-old voting, and campaigning for public officials. (HS)

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YOUTH POLL RESULTS

The Youthpoll was administered twice during the 1972 Summer Planning Conferences to a total group of two hundred eighty-two respondents. The randomly selected session dates were June 28th and July 31st. There were somewhat more resident students than commuters in the sample, and more males than females. Results may not be generalized to the entire 1972 Freshman Class since the participants in the SPC were not randomly selected.

Table 1 displays information about values of the group, i.e., approval, personal participation, and future participation of a variety of general activities.

Table 2 presents the same data in percents.

Tables 1 and 2 show the variety of value combinations. Such combinations range from those who approve but exclude themselves from present or future participation, to those who approve of an activity but have not participated in it and are uncertain as to future participation.

Table 3 displays data about student opinions on such topics as student unrest on campus, ecology i.e., pollution, population control, and military involvement. The three basic divisions within the table are coded as Agree, Disagree, and Undecided. Agree is a combination of the options strongly agree and agree with this statement; Disagree combines strongly disagree and disagree, and Undecided represents the choice of uncertain about this statement. The symbol # appearing before statements in the percents column shows that the total percent did not equal 100. This is due to lack of response or uncodable responses.

Table 4 is a rank order based on individual percentage and total nomination percents of problems reported by the respondents. Problems offered for consideration ranged from drug addiction to superficiality and lack of meaning in life. Respondents were asked to rank three problems only, in descending order of importance. An option "Other" was available for a single written problem within the desired options. There were a number of students who took advantage of this option to express a first, second or third rated problem.

Both Tables 5 and 6 show responses to questions about family relations, personal interactions with others, future goals upon completion of a formal education, and planned residence status for the Fall 1972 semester. The data reported in these two tables is in percent. A category labeled omit/blank indicates the absence of response for a particular issue or question.

SUMMARY

At least 74% of the students responding to Youthpoll disagreed with:

- violence in demonstrations
- taking of hard drugs
- characterizing the activist as a 'mental case'.

At least 78% approved of:

- writing to public officials
- circulating petitions
- non-violent change
- protesting non-violently
- tutoring
- 18 year old voting
- campaigning for public officials.
