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## ABSTRACT

Reports submitted by local school districts and intermediate education district offices were reviewed, analyzed, and compared to previous surveys. Information was obtained about all students K-12 and all school personnel, including aides and community agents. The survey information was analyzed to determine what, if any, changes had been made in the racial and ethnic composition of students and school district employees. Information regarding the racial and ethnic distribution of students by district and county, the racial and ethnic distribution of school personnel, the enrollment patterns of minority students in 10th, 11th, and 12th grades by district and county, and the total K-12 statewide minority enrollment as compared to the statewide number of seniors were presented in tabular form. A summary of the data indicated (1) that Spanish-surname and Russians showed the greatest increase in enrollment patterns; (2) that over the past 2 years, the proportion of Black students remained consistently segregated, particularly at the elementary level; (3) that Spanish-surname and American Indians were also racially isolated; (4) that the number of minority educators was low; (5) that there was an urgent need for the establishment of a statewide data collection system pertinent to school achievement, reading and mathematics scores, dropout rate, and follow-up on minority students; and (6) that there had been a stabilization in enrollment patterns over the past year. 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

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# FOREWORD



Since 1969, the State Intergroup Human Relations Commission staff has conducted annual racial and ethnic surveys to determine the distribution of minority students and school personnel in Oregon schools.

The information contained herein is comprehensive and detailed in an effort to present clearly the racial composition of pupils and staff in Oregon schools. In our attempt to improve services for minority students, we must identify our clients and then target special services to meet these clients at the point of greatest need.

Thank you for your cooperation and your attention to this report.

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In establishing the State Intergroup Human Relations Commission, the State Board of Education recognized the very urgent need to assess, evaluate and develop alternatives for improving education for all students.

The Commission, in carrying out its Charge and Duties, has conducted annual racial and ethnic surveys in an attempt to determine the racial and ethnic composition of Oregon schools. The Commission's staff again received excellent cooperation from the school districts.

This report represents the fourth survey, and includes data on student enrollment patterns of minority students, as well as staffing patterns.

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This report represents the survey data and information collected and analyzed from the state's fourth racial and ethnic survey of Oregon schools. The State Department of Education, again, received excellent cooperation from school districts in providing the necessary data to make this report possible.

This survey provides current information corresponding to that collected in the last three surveys. The results of the survey were analyzed and compared with those from the last two surveys.

The 1971-72 survey covers four areas of major concern:

- Information regarding the racial and ethnic distribution of students by district and county.
- Information regarding the racial and ethnic distribution of schools and IED personnel.
- Information regarding enrollment patterns of minority students in 10th, 11th, and 12th grades by district and county.
- Information pertaining to the total K-12 statewide minority enrollment as compared to the statewide number of seniors.

Information was obtained about all students K-12 and all school personnel, including instructional aides and community agents. Preliminary results from the survey data will indicate the extent of racial and ethnic isolation in schools over the past year. Based on a formula developed by the State Intergroup Human Relations Commission, numerous schools have been selected as "identifiable (segregated) minority" schools.

In lieu of having all districts submit Title VI Civil Rights Compliance reports to the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare only eight randomly selected districts submitted a compliance report to HEW. All other school districts submitted survey reports to our office.

# PRELIMINARY CONSIDERATIONS ON EQUAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY 2/3

The concept of equal educational opportunity has historical and legal foundations. These foundations merit consideration by educators and school boards charged with the responsibility of providing equality of opportunity for *all* students. Let us examine three major legal documents that lend credence to desegregation as the law of the land.

## 1.0 Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution

"Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States... are citizens of the United States and of the state within which they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the *equal protection* of the laws."

## 2.0 Brown vs. Board of Education

In 1954, the Supreme Court held that separate schools are inherently unequal and found that the Topeka School Board had violated the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution. Further, the Court asserted that segregation of children by race in the schools "generates a feeling of inferiority as to their status in the community that may affect their hearts and minds in a way unlikely ever to be undone." The court decision was tantamount to a judicial mandate to desegregate. The Brown decision tied the concept of equal educational opportunity to desegregation.

## 3.0 Civil Rights Act

In 1964, Congress took a firm stand on the

issue by passing the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This legislation was designed to rectify previous injustices and assure the rights of minority children as a result of area isolation and discrimination. Further, the Act called for a report to the President and Congress after two years. This work was done by James Coleman and was based on a survey. (The Coleman Report)

4.0 Dr. Guillermo Lopez, in a presentation to school administrators on school desegregation, formulated the following components in attempting to define equal educational opportunity.

4.1 *Treats* students as individuals—each with unique potentials—and attempts to develop those potentials.

4.2 *Demands* that when the children come to school with unequal starting levels, that what the school contributes *must be* unequal and individualized to assure that what the school produces is at least equal.

4.3 *Presents* in an equitable manner the historical contributions and roles of *all* groups in the development of this country.

4.4 *Seeks* to enhance uniqueness, richness, and values of various cultural groups rather than enhancing the fallacy of the "melting pot" concept.

4.5 *Results* in the improved academic achievement and/or skill levels in students of all racial and ethnic groups.

4.6 *Does not* force the minority into the mold of the majority—at the expense of the minority.

Survey data indicates that during this current school year some 22,000 K-12 minority students attended Oregon schools. This is in comparison with last year's figure of approximately 23,000 minority students.

- Table I will reflect the substantial increases in minority students over a three-year span, but a stabilization has occurred in enrollment patterns this year.
- Table II represents the total statewide figures (over two years) for minority seniors in contrast to the statewide total number of minorities. One of the primary factors contributing to the low figure of minority seniors is a high dropout rate.
- Table III compares (over a three-year period) the statewide totals of minority educators and Anglo educators. It clearly indicates that very little change has occurred in terms of staffing schools with minority educators. In several instances, particularly when attendance patterns in elementary schools and the ethnic composition of the teaching and administrative staffs are examined, it appears that school staffs do not adequately reflect the proportion of minority student enrollment. It cannot be over-emphasized that the minority students' educational experience is further enhanced by providing them with positive role models from their own ethnic background. The apparent increase in minority district personnel (Table III) is a

result of minority teacher aides and community agents.

- Table IV represents the number of minority administrators over a two-year period.
- Table V identifies major areas of minority student enrollment and segregated schools. Obviously, segregation occurs primarily at the elementary level. Even though many minority students attend desegregated schools, the problems occasioned by this process are still prevalent.

### Methods of Analyzing Survey Data

The reports submitted by local school districts and intermediate education district offices were reviewed, analyzed, and compared to previous surveys. The survey information was analyzed to determine what, if any, changes had been made in the racial and ethnic composition of students and school district employees.

- All school districts and IEDs were sent survey instruments.
- Survey data indicates that 96 percent of all school districts returned the completed survey. The remaining four percent had no appreciable percentage of minority students.
- Eight major areas (pages 7 and 8) were identified as having a significant percentage of minority students.

# SUMMARY OF RACIAL AND ETHNIC SURVEY DATA

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- 1.0 Spanish-surname and Russians show the greatest increase in enrollment patterns.
- 2.0 Over the past two years, the proportion of Black students has remained consistently segregated, particularly at the elementary level.
- 3.0 Spanish-surname and Indians are also racially isolated—cultural and linguistic isolation.
- 4.0 There is an alarmingly low number of minority educators.
- 5.0 There is an urgent need for the establishment of a statewide data collection system pertinent to school achievement, reading and mathematics scores, dropout rate, and follow-up on minority students.
- 6.0 There seems to be a stabilization in enrollment patterns over the past year.
- 7.0 If a minority child is to have equality of opportunity, then the traditional slant of Anglo-oriented education must be changed. Educators must be prepared to teach students from diverse backgrounds. We must subscribe to the premise which suggests that quality education rests on an educational principle of integrated experiences. At this point, the greatest single barrier to progress is the continued racial and cultural isolation of students in schools. In this state, minority students from diverse backgrounds account for slightly more than six percent of the student population, yet, these students are victims of cultural barriers, discrimination, and restrictive residential patterns.
