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ABSTRACT

Interest in law-related citizenship education has grown enormously in the past few years. This directory is the result of a survey of school-related law and citizenship projects, and is intended to provide information about projects and prevent duplication of effort. Arranged alphabetically by states, the description of each project includes information compiled under the following headings: Subjects (subject areas taught); Activities (classroom teaching, training teachers, developing curriculum materials); Materials (noted only if developed by the project); Staff (teaching and administrative); Students (the number reached by the program during the last academic year and grade levels); Sponsors; and Sources of Funding (if any). Some projects of special interest are described in a second section and in a third is a cross reference to bar association activities. A sheet is included for organizations to submit up to date information for the next edition. (JMB)

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Many Americans seem to lack the understanding necessary to live successfully within our legal system or to utilize the democratic process in order to improve it. Americans increasingly respond to public crises with confusion, frustration, violence or (perhaps worst of all) apathy. While there are many theories as to the causes of this complex and disturbing situation, one fact stands out: For too long an operative understanding of law and the legal system has largely been available only to those who had a law school education. Yet the law permeates the daily lives of all of us. Every consumer purchase, lease, divorce, petty crime or traffic violation brings the citizen into contact with the law. Everyone cannot attend law school. However, aspects of legal training, including the development of analytical skills and the capacity for clear thinking, can be modified and adapted for use in elementary and secondary education.

Recognizing this urgent need the ABA established the Special Committee on Youth Education for Citizenship. YEFC is supporting the creation and improvement of interdisciplinary programs in communities throughout the country. We are not, however, establishing a proprietary interest in any curriculum materials, teacher-training institutes or project models. Our function is entirely facilitative. Through the distribution of this Directory of Law-Related Educational Activities, which lists approximately 175 projects, we hope to stimulate interest and encourage coordination in this field. Soon, we will also publish a bibliography of curriculum and teacher-training materials. In addition, YEFC is providing coordination for all projects in this field and serving as a national clearinghouse for information. Finally, members of YEFC staff spend a portion of their time in the field consulting with community leadership including the organized bar, school authorities and law enforcement agencies in the development of local programs.

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Introduction

Interest in law-related citizenship education has grown enormously in the past few years. Teachers, lawyers, school administrators, judges, law enforcement officials and other concerned citizens have joined together in communities throughout the United States to develop new approaches to teaching about law, legal institutions and citizenship. Many of those actively involved in this important and growing field have expressed interest in learning about other projects and despair at the current lack of coordination among them. While every community must respond to its own unique needs and interests, we believe that needless duplication of effort can be reduced and new projects stimulated by making available the information that follows on activities in this field.

This Directory could not have been published less than six months after the YEFC staff was assembled without the help of many other groups and individuals. Many of the projects described below responded to the "Survey of School-Related Law and Citizenship Projects" jointly undertaken by the Special Committee on Youth Education for Citizenship and the Constitutional Rights Foundation with the cooperation of the American Association of Law Schools through its President, Prof. Richard Maxwell. This Survey was designed to provide data for the study of law-related citizenship education projects undertaken by Vivian Monroe, Executive Director of the Constitutional Rights Foundation, under a Ford Foundation grant. We gratefully acknowledge the substantial assistance which Ms. Monroe and the staff of the Constitutional Rights Foundation have provided in the preparation of this directory. In addition, we have received the cooperation of many others. Any list of friends and colleagues who helped is bound to be incomplete. Virtually all of the major projects listed in Section II below have assisted in developing this directory. Within our staff, Norman Gross undertook the greatest share of responsibility for the preparation of the Directory and deserves much credit for its prompt publication. Ann Kearney and Jeanne Wilson managed cheerfully to type many revised drafts and demonstrated considerable editing skill as well.

The description of projects includes information compiled under the following headings:

Subjects—Subject areas taught. Subjects most often offered include the Constitution, Bill of Rights, legal process, and substantive law (e.g., consumer, criminal, juvenile, torts and property law).

Activities—Most of the projects provide classroom teaching of the "subjects". Some also train teachers, develop curriculum materials or provide facilitative services to individuals and groups in this field.

Materials—Materials are noted only if they have been developed by the project.

Staff—This category is divided into two sections, "teaching" and "administrative". "Teaching" staff includes volunteer lawyers, educators, law enforcement officers and others as well as full-time teachers. "Administrative" staff includes only those who are paid in whole or part to administer the project.

Students—Two items of information are included: The number of students reached by the program during the last academic year and the grade levels for which the project is conducted.

Sponsors—The organizations which initiated and/or actively support the program.

\$\$\$\$—Sources of funding (if any).

These projects range from one that is funded at over a half million dollars, serving the entire state of California, to others in small towns, operating without money or administrative staff. Obviously we have more information on some than on others. The Directory also includes a special section on projects of general interest. These projects can provide you with services or information to help initiate or expand your own program. Finally, we have included a cross-reference to bar association activities.

Our apologies in advance for those we have left out and those whose entries are not current or complete. We will make it up to you in the second edition if you keep us informed of your progress. For this purpose, a special form is included in the back of the directory. If you can provide us with information on more than one project, kindly duplicate the form and send us a separate copy for each project. We will happily provide you with more forms if necessary.

We hope this Directory will be useful to you.

II. Some Projects of General Interest

The following projects can formally or informally provide assistance in your efforts to develop an effective and comprehensive law-related educational program.

ABA SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON YOUTH EDUCATION FOR CITIZENSHIP

The ABA Special Committee on Youth Education for Citizenship was established in 1971 to provide coordination for groups interested or involved in law-related education, and to serve as a national clearinghouse for information regarding curriculum materials, teacher-training and other law-related activities. This Directory, its Working Notes for Bar Associations and a bibliography of available curriculum and teacher-training materials (to be published soon) is part of this effort. Through the ABA network of over 300 state and local bar associations, with extensive formal and informal contacts with the ABA and its 158,000 members, YEFC is helping to establish community support in these programs. In some communities lawyers have also been extremely valuable in securing needed funds, participating in

teacher-training, serving as a reservoir of legal expertise, and assisting in special classroom experiences and field excursions. YEFC also provides members of its staff and other leaders in the field as consultants for interested groups throughout the country. Since the demand for such assistance is great, YEFC is producing a film to indicate the variety of ways in which lawyers and educators can cooperate in developing programs suited to their community's unique needs and interests. This film will be designed for use in connection with printed material and "live" discussions. YEFC is also working in conjunction with some of the projects listed in this section and others in the field to improve and amplify existing programs and to produce innovative methods and approaches in law-related education.

CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS FOUNDATION

The Constitutional Rights Foundation has been sponsoring conferences, workshops and institutes for students, teachers, law enforcement personnel and other members of the community since 1963. These include teacher/student conferences on "Schools and Democracy," "Criminal Procedure" and "Youth and the Police," 18 State College Summer Workshops and 4 statewide Leadership Training Workshops, as well as 6 Weekend Camp Seminars for students from 6 Los Angeles High Schools. A recently initiated CRF program, "An Introduction to the Administration of Justice," enabled teachers to spend 10 days in the field, *not on tours*, actually working with police, judges, district attorneys, public defenders, parole and probation officers, and field consultants from the Department of Community Services while they carry out

their duties. They have also sponsored, in conjunction with the San Fernando Valley Bar Association, an ABA award-winning program designed to assist schools in their efforts to improve student understanding of the American legal system. In addition to its widely distributed semi-annual *Bill of Rights Newsletters*, CRF has published a *Source Book and Hand Book* on the Bill of Rights, a simulation entitled *Police Patrol* and other law-related materials. The CRF staff, also well-known for its expertise in the area of simulation games, role play and intergroup relations, provides limited consulting services to interested groups throughout the country without charge, under a grant from the Danforth Foundation.

LAW IN A FREE SOCIETY

Initiated by the State Bar of California in 1970, Law In A Free Society is in the third year of a six year program designed to develop a comprehensive K-12 curriculum in legal and political education throughout the California public schools. Utilizing a network of coordinated regional centers, LIFS is basing its curriculum upon eight concepts: authority, justice, freedom, participation, diversity, privacy, property, and responsibility. Case books, guidelines for the development of lesson plans, sample lesson plans and in-service guides have been prepared in these areas. (Some of these are presently available—all will be published by March, 1973). Over

100 educators, lawyers and law enforcement personnel have served as instructors in their 30 and 60 hour in-service programs for teachers. The participation of these individuals is part of LIFS' endeavors to involve members of the community as supervisory and resource personnel in its program. Detailed evaluation procedures are being developed to test its materials, techniques, and approaches and to measure the teachers' ability to use various analytical frameworks in dealing with complex issues. Also members of the LIFS staff are available on a limited basis as consultants to interested groups.

NATIONAL CENTER FOR LAW-FOCUSED EDUCATION

The National Center for Law-Focused Education provides law projects throughout the nation with a variety of services, including intensive four-week summer teacher training institutes. These institutes have been conducted annually since 1966 and are complemented throughout the year with staff and material assistance in the conduct of project in-service training programs. Teams instructed in the institutes have come from Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Dallas, Los Angeles, St. Louis, Seattle, and Illinois. Instruction has included both the substantive and methodological aspects of law-focused education. Center staff, including specialists in both elementary and secondary education, provide orientation programs as well as organizational and staff training to interested groups throughout the United States. Services offered include a

research model for both outcome and continuous assessment evaluation and a comprehensive curriculum package for the elementary, junior, and senior high school levels. Curriculum materials include the six volumes and teacher's guide of the *Justice in Urban America* series and the three volumes, decisions supplements, and teacher's guides of the *Trailmarks of Liberty* series, a comprehensive constitutional law curriculum for elementary through senior high school. The National Center also offers the services of the Clearinghouse for Resource Materials, which features listings of films, books, reports and other materials useful to projects interested in law-focused education, as well as a materials lending library. The National Center also publishes *Law in American Society*, a journal dealing with law-focused education.

THE LINCOLN FILENE CENTER FOR CITIZENSHIP AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Tufts Lincoln Filene Center for Citizenship and Public Affairs has been developing curriculum materials and innovative approaches in citizenship education since 1956. Current programs at the Center include "Future Shock and Civic Education," "Arts for Intergroup Relations Education," "Law and the Social Studies," and "Politics 18" as well as their continuing efforts towards improving social studies materials and curriculum. During the past summer, they conducted four institutes for teachers in the areas of politics, economics and government, the Boston Flexible Campus Program and intergroup relations. The Center has an extensive library of instructional resources for both teachers and students. These resources include programs on the Dimensions of Citizenship (*Effective Citizenship: Upton Sinclair and the Jungle; Citizenship Denied: Diary of a Young Girl;*

Citizenship Affirmed: The Story of Frederick Douglas; Civil Disobedience: A Higher Law?), Urban Problems and Prospects (*The Police: Fact and Fiction; Welfare: A Way of Life?*), The Law and Citizenship (*Lessons in Conflict: Legal Education Materials for Secondary Schools; Civil Liberties: Case Studies and the Law; Law in the Social Studies, Grades 3 through 7*), and Current Affairs (*Protest; Due Process of Law; Politics*). They also have films and other audio-visual aids in these areas. Its Intergroup Relations Curriculum: A Program for Elementary School Education (Volumes I & II) is especially helpful since it can easily be incorporated into an elementary school law-related education program. The center also provides consulting services to interested groups throughout the country.
