A Philippine-born artist pictures, with lively cartoon-style drawings in soft greens and browns, the clever delaying tactics of a small boy who saves himself from the ungrateful crocodile whose life *he* has saved. (K-Gr 2)

Benchley, Nathaniel. *Small Wolf*. Pictures by Joan Sandin. New York, Harper & Row. 64 p. col. illus. (An I can read history book) \$2.50 (lib. ed., \$2.92) 70-183170

As the white man's settlement on Manhattan expanded, Small Wolf and his Indian family were mercilessly forced to move again and again. (Gr 1-2)

Brandenberg, Alikì. *June 7!* by Alikì. New York, Macmillan. [32] p. \$4.95 72-75347

In a steady stream and group by group, hosts of relatives arrive to celebrate a special day, June 7. The text describes the kinship of all the relatives in several generations, leaving the lively double-spread illustrations to tell the actual story. (K-Gr 2)

The Bun; a Tale From Russia [by] Marcia Brown. New York, Harcourt Brace Jovanovich. [32] p. \$4.95 75-167832

Pictures crammed with action enliven this old tale of the mischievous bun who fools the hare, the wolf, the bear—but, alas, not the fox. (K-Gr 2)

A brisk number book—for counting up and down—about a persuasive fowl that urges animals, in groups of two to five, to gather for a journey around the world and then to disband, leaving him a rooster alone again. (PreS-Gr 1)

Carle, Eric. *The Secret Birthday Message*. New York, Crowell. [26] p. \$4.50 75-168726

In this gaily colored picture book with intriguing cut-outs, a coded message leads a little boy to his birthday present. (PreS-Gr 1)

Domanska, Janina. *I Saw a Ship A-Sailing*. New York, Macmillan. [33] p. \$4.95 75-185147

The dazzling design and buoyant rhythm of illustrations rendered in sweeping line and vibrant color expand the old verse into an exciting account of a voyage to a never-never land. (K-Gr 2)

Freschet, Berniece. *The Web in the Grass*. Illustrated by Roger Duvoisin. New York, Scribner. [32] p. \$5.95 72-1165

The important aspects of a spider's life are revealed in handsome color illustrations that help a child feel he knows spiders almost first-hand. (K-Gr 3)

Goodall, John S. *Jacko*. New York, Harcourt Brace Jovanovich. [60] p. \$3.50 72-149750

A happy, surprise ending caps a wordless picture story which depicts the adventures of a charming monkey who has escaped from an organ grinder. Soft color and the half-page format used so successfully in earlier titles by this artist make this an engaging volume. (PreS-Gr 1)

Hoban, Lillian. *Arthur's Christmas Cookies*. Words and pictures by Lillian Hoban. New York, Harper & Row. 63 p. (An I can read book) \$2.50 (lib. ed., \$2.92) 72-76496

Pictorial fun shows Arthur and his accomplices—all monkeys—making Christmas cookies. Salt-filled by mistake and hard as clay, the cookies are inventively converted into Christmas tree decorations. (K-Gr 2)

Hoban, Tana. *Push, Pull, Empty, Full; a Book of Opposites*. New York, Macmillan. [33] p. illus. \$4.95 72-90410

A turtle's head, in and out of the shell; rubber boots in a puddle and sneakered feet rustling dry leaves; these and other contrasting images, seen with childlike clarity through the camera's eye, give visual substance to opposing concepts. (PreS-Gr 1)

Hoban, Tana. *Count and See*. New York, Macmillan. [41] p. \$4.95 72-175597

In a visually exciting counting book, stunning photographs clarify concepts represented by common objects and events. (PreS-Gr 1)

Holland, Viki. *We Are Having a Baby*. Photographs by the author. New York, Scribner. [62] p. \$5.50 70-179441

Revealing photographs and simple text graphically interpret the concerns of a little girl on the arrival of a first sibling. (K-Gr 2)

Hutchins, Pat. *Good Night, Owl!* New York, Macmillan. [33] p. \$4.95 72-186355

An owl who sleeps by day turns the tables on his noisy fellow tree-dwellers. Gay illustrations, repetition of animal sounds, and a punch ending should please the youngest listener. (PrS-K)

Keats, Ezra Jack. *Pet Show!* New York, Macmillan. [36] p. \$4.95 73-156843

Older now and looking quite mod in his knitted beret, Archie wins the prize for the quietest pet in the show—a germ in a glass jar. His friend Peter is there, too, with Willie. Keats' paintings have his usual rich colors and lively humor. (Gr 1-3)

Koren, Edward. *Behind the Wheel*. New York, Holt, Rinehart & Winston. [32] p. illus. \$1.25. paper (lib. ed., \$3.97) 79-150034

Transportation fantasies are invited, with intriguing creatures driving steamshovels, speedboats, bulldozers, and trains--their dashboards laid open for the reader. A glossary with such entries as "magnetic compensation halls" and "peep whistle" is appended. (K-Gr 3)

Lobel, Arnold. *Frog and Toad Together*. New York, Harper & Row. 64 p. (An I can read book) \$2.50 (lib. ed., \$2.92) 73-183163

In a delightful sequel presenting five more adventures of the two best friends, the author-artist has sustained the engaging childlike quality of his honor-winning *Frog and Toad*. (PreS-Gr 2)

Lobel, Arnold. *Mouse Tales*. New York, Harper & Row. 61 p. (An I can read book) \$2.50 (lib. ed., \$2.92) 72-76511

Seven simple but fantastic bedtime stories are spun by a papa mouse for his seven mouse sons, with humorous illustrations to match the fun of the words. (K-Gr 2)

McNamara, Louise. *Henry's Pennies*. Pictures by Emily McCully. New York, F. Watts. [40] p. \$4.95 74-161836

Henry's dream of buying a white elephant at his playground fair is happily resolved in a gentle, intensely childlike story animated by expressive drawings that are touched with bright pink and yellow. (K-Gr 2)

Human frailties of carelessness, curiosity, and straying from the truth are exemplified in the behavior of two hippo friends delightfully portrayed in the author's amusing, diminutive color pictures. (PreS-Gr 1)

[Martin, Sarah C.] *Old Mother Hubbard and Her Dog*. Illustrated by Evaline Ness. New York, Holt, Rinehart & Winston. 32 p. \$4.95 (lib. ed., \$4.59) 74-182788

Mother Hubbard's companion is a beguiling shaggy sheep dog who quite outshines his mistress in this fully pictured version of the old nursery rhyme. (PreS-Gr 1)

Olsen, Ib S. *Smoke*. Translated by Virginia Allen Jensen. New York, Coward, McCann & Geoghegan. [34] p. col. illus. \$4.95 78-171614

An entertaining look at air pollution by a prize-winning Danish artist who shows a picnicking family making amusing attempts to clean up the environment. (K-Gr 2)

Oppenheim, Joanne. *On the Other Side of the River*. Illustrated by Ailiki. New York, F. Watts. 32 p. \$4.95 71-185925

Color illustrations full of lively detail show how villagers on two sides of a river engaged in frequent battles until, after a wild night, their bridge collapsed and they began to learn that they needed each other. (K-Gr 3)

Oxenbury, Helen. *Helen Oxenbury's ABC of Things*. New York, F. Watts. [55] p. \$4.95 72-175022

A British prize-winning artist's alphabet book that is meaningful for young children has clear capital and small letters with four "things" for each. It is also a good game of identifying the objects and creatures in a colorful, composite picture. (PreS-Gr 1)

Rockwell, Anne F., and Harlow Rockwell. *Thruway*. New York, Macmillan. [24] p. col. illus. \$4.95 70-156842

Cloverleaf overpasses, bridges, exits, and traffic lines are illustrated with maximum clarity in pictures which show toylike cars and trucks moving over the highway. For youngest listeners to earliest readers. (PreS-Gr 1)

Scott, Ann H. *On Mother's Lap*. Drawings by Glo Coalson. New York, McGraw-Hill. [39] p. \$4.95 76-39726

A reassuring book for the very young about a little boy who learns that there is room for two on mother's lap. Striking crayon drawings of an Eskimo family. (PreS-K)

Shub, Elizabeth. *Uncle Harry* [by] Gerlinde Schneider. Pictures by Lilo Fromm. Adapted from the German by Elizabeth Shub. New York, Macmillan. [32] p. \$3.95 79-181575

A simple tale of kindly Uncle Harry who rescues a stray kitten and gives it a home when no one else will accept it--pictured graphically in clear line drawings. (PreS-Gr 1)

Spier, Peter. *Crash! Bang! Boom!* Garden City, N.Y., Doubleday. [44] p. \$4.95 70-157625

A cacophony is heard with accompanying detailed, action-filled drawings, in categories of noise ranging from those of the kitchen, nature, and toys to sounds of tools, machines, and sports. Their variety may challenge adult vocal chords but compel child participation. (PreS-Gr 2)

Suteev, Vladimir G. *The Chick and the Duckling*. Translated from the Russian of V. Suteyev, by Mirra Ginsburg. Pictures by Jose & Ariane Aruego. New York, Macmillan. [32] p. \$4.95 74-188773

The bouncy, gay illustrations have an exuberant sparkle which expands with humor and drama the brief, simple story of a just-hatched chick and a duckling. (PreS-Gr 1)

The small Quaker boy of old Nantucket has problems with credulity in his family because of his penchant for telling big stories—until his tale about “a great big wolf” is seen to have some truth in it. A lively text brightly illustrated by the author. (PreS-K)

Brian Wildsmith's interpretations of the lively sequence of presents “my true love gave to me” are like holiday ornaments in their dazzling brilliance of color. (K-Gr 3)

STORIES FOR THE MIDDLE GROUP

In a distinctively designed volume, this famous fairy tale has many striking, fine-line drawings fully suggestive of ice and frost. (Gr 3-6)

A mysterious, thin little boy dressed in old-fashioned clothes becomes the catalyst of this skillfully wrought suspense story, as Kate and her friends try to find out if he is really Rupert, Kate's younger brother missing and

A young shepherd boy has a revealing encounter with animal instincts when a coyote steals and tries to raise a collie pup. Picture-book format, with large illustrations. (Gr 3-5)

Doodle, a very real boy, invents a number of projects to earn a go-cart and is near success when he perceives something more important than this personal gratification. Set in the Georgia countryside. (Gr 3-6)
