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ABSTRACT


The booklet contains a brief listing of supplementary projects and activities for Wisconsin American Indians in which the Department of Public Instruction assumes a primary role. Examples of the projects and activities are: American Indian enrichment project, audio listening center, audio-visual program development on post-high school opportunities for Indian students, drug education, Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Title I project offering services to Indians, and workshops for teachers of Indian children. 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INTRODUCTION

This booklet contains a brief listing of those supplementary projects and activities for Wisconsin Native Americans in which the Department of Public Instruction assumes a primary role. Special funds provided to local public school districts for eligible Indian students on non-taxable lands under the Johnson-O'Malley basic support program and the Federally Impacted Aid program have not been included. In addition, there are several programs funded with state and/or federal resources which benefit Indian students but also are provided to non-Indian students and therefore have not been listed.

TITLE: American Indian Enrichment: An Intercultural Program Based On Selected Library Materials for Wisconsin Schools With A High Concentration of Native Americans

DESCRIPTION: This project sees the library as a resource center in which the Native Americans, through their local Indian Education Committees, can enhance the development and expansion of American Indian cultural materials in the selected public and private K-12 schools of Wisconsin with the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council Education Committee.

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TITLE: Food Service Programs

National School Lunch Program

DESCRIPTION: The various Food Service Programs are designed to provide for the nutritional needs of the recipient. Free lunches and breakfasts are provided to needy eligible students so determined by the district's eligibility standards and are fully reimbursed by federal and state funds. The extent to which the Indian children benefit from the programs is directly related to the extent the programs are offered in the schools which they attend.

20 cent reimbursement for breakfast served to needy children.
5 cents reimbursement for breakfast served to students not eligible to receive free lunches. (paying students)

Special Milk Program (Federal funds)

4 cents per 1/2 pint of milk consumed by students exclusive of the 1/2 pint that is provided as a component of the lunch and breakfast program.

Commodity Distribution Program

The DPI has administrative responsibility for the distribution of USDA donated foods to 25 counties operating needy family assistance programs, to the extent that Indian families reside in these counties and meet the income-family size eligibility scales they are eligible to receive the available foods distributed through the County Social Service Agency.

TITLE: Home-School Coordinator Training Program

DESCRIPTION: This highly field-oriented program developed at the University of Wisconsin-Stout is an educational training strategy designed to prepare Native Americans to function effectively in Wisconsin's public schools (where there is a significant Native American population) as a liaison between the school community and the home. In particular, the coordinator will develop the competencies necessary to counsel Native American students with respect to motivation, behavior and to the student's attitudes about himself and his social environment. The coordinator will assist with administering and interpreting evaluative tests of Native American children. He will also deliver services such as providing information about career opportunities available in post-high school vocational or academic settings; enhancing communication between parents and school authorities; and assisting teachers in their efforts to more effectively teach Native American youngsters.

This ten-month program (August 1, 1972 to June 15, 1973) is a cooperative effort with the Department of Public Instruction through the Education Professions Development Act, Part B-2, the Johnson-O'Malley Program, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Higher Educational Aids Board and the University of Wisconsin-Stout in cooperation with the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council Education Committee and the following public school districts:

DESCRIPTION: The Instructional Materials Center staff of Abraham Lincoln Middle School has made strong efforts to select materials which include minority groups to promote better human relations within their student body. Their primary need now is to implement the sixth grade curriculum study of Early Man. At this time they wish to concentrate on materials about the American Indian. Selection of these materials will be made by the sixth grade Learning Coordinator, teachers and students and the Audiovisual and Library Consultant using standard selection tools, bibliographies such as the one prepared by the State Historical Society on Wisconsin Indians, and the University of Minnesota. In addition to increasing awareness of other cultures and appreciation of one's own, more minority oriented materials would strengthen the communication skills of reading, reference, critical thinking, writing and speaking. Presentations such as skits, plays, tapes and slide programs could be planned and prepared through the resources and equipment housed in the library/media area.
