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ABSTRACT

This annotated listing of curriculum materials is provided to inform planners, administrators, vocational educators, and others interested in vocational education programs of the available curriculum materials in home economics education developed by the various States. The materials have been identified with the instructional titles and codes from the classification system of the Office of Education. These titles and codes link vocational education programs to occupations. Using the codes in this listing relates the curriculum materials to the instructional program. Publications are listed by States in the subject areas for homemaking, clothing, consumer education, family relations, foods, housing, and home furnishings. Instructions for ordering specific materials from the appropriate State sources are included. (Author/MF)



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EXPLANATION OF CODING SYSTEM

In recent years it has become apparent that a strong relationship exists between the world of education and the world of work. Emphasis is on the concept that the development of our human resources is vital to the well-being and growth of our society. In order to implement this belief, leaders in all fields have focused their attention on education and especially on vocational education.

This annotated listing of curriculum materials is provided in order to apprise planners, administrators, vocational educators, and others interested in offering or involved in vocational education programs of the available curriculum materials developed by the various States.

The curriculum materials have been identified with the instructional titles and codes from the classification system of the Office of Education. These titles and codes link vocational education programs to occupations. Utilizing the codes in this listing relates the curriculum materials to the instructional program. Seven major vocational education areas are identified in separate listings and coded as follows:

HOMEMAKING: 09.01

Comprehensive Homemaking or Home Economics: 09.0101

ALABAMA

State Course of Study in Home Economics - Volume III.
Teacher's Guide, 1964, 528 pages, \$5.00, Offset.

Provides teachers of Home Economics with guidelines for planning and developing local programs. Content provides course outlines, suggested course content for work in the Junior and Senior High Schools of the State. Detailed material is developed under the following section titles: Art in Individual and Family Living, Clothing and Textiles, Foods and Nutrition, Home Management and Family Economics, Housing, and Human Development and the Family.

ALASKA

Guidelines for Home Economics in Alaska. Instructor's Guide, 1965, 157 pages, Free, Offset.

Designed for junior and senior high school students. It contains a suggested course outline for seventh and eighth grade home economics, and home economics I and II. Also, a suggested course outline for courses in family relationship, home management, housing and home furnishings, advanced food and nutrition, clothing and textiles, and family living. In addition, it contains suggested learning experiences for the course outlines, a bibliography, and selected resources.

OHIO

Home Economics Curriculum Guide. Curriculum Guide, 1966, 477 pages, \$3.85, Offset.

Developed for home economics instruction in Ohio's schools in grades 7-12, inclusive. It is adaptable to any home economics program in any State. Its purpose is to provide a program of education which has as its major goal the development of our young people into homemakers and family members. Content contains the suggested scope and sequence

of units of work for each grade level. In addition, resource materials for students and teachers are included.

Home Economics Guide for Planning. Planning Guide, 1967 (Reprint), 63 pages, \$1.50, Offset.

Contains suggestions for making the most effective use of home economics space and equipment. Administrators, Boards of Education, Architects, Educational Consultants, and Home Economics Teachers will find this material useful for reference purposes. Photographs and diagrams amplify the text. Resource materials are included.

Suggested Space and Equipment Costs for Job Training Programs. Planning Guide, 1967, 53 pages, \$1.50, Offset.

Prepared to assist school administrators, architects, home economics teachers, and others plan and develop programs in high schools and joint vocational schools. Details for space and equipment have been developed at an optimum level. The facilities suggested would provide for self-contained work experience opportunities within the school. Illustrated. A bibliography is included.

OKLAHOMA

Adult Education. Teacher's Resource, 1969, 80 pages, \$.50, Offset.

Provides insights into planning, organizing, and teaching adults. The publication is divided into three parts. Part I, Organizing an Adult Action Program, charts the strategy of a three-year plan of adult education. Part II entitled, Why Not Try These?, contains many helpful suggestions for meeting gainful employment needs, working with low-income families and the like. Part III, These Have Worked, gives examples such as: An Adult Series for a Two-Year Period, An Adult Class in Family Finance, and several other adult education topics.

Clothing and Textiles: 09.0103

NEW JERSEY

The Art of Sewing. Student's Manual, 1969, 249 pages, \$2.50, Offset.

This is a basic text containing 11 units covering such topics as handsewing, stitches, seams, hems, bias binding, buttonholes, pockets and some more. The material is well illustrated and contains an assignment at the end of each lesson.

Dress Design - 2; The Problem Figure. Student's Manual, 1969, 86 pages, \$1.50, Offset.

Content consists of six units divided into 36 lessons dealing with the problem figure. Units include material such as the fashion figure, principles of design, lines and the figure, designing for the problem figure and others.

Learning to Sew - Part 1. Student's Manual, 1969, 172 pages, \$2.00, Offset.

This is an introduction to sewing and the lessons include illustrations and descriptions of the basic processes. Information includes such items as hand tools, measurements, sewing machine adjustments, machine-care and the like. The material is paced for the slower student.

Consumer Education: 09.0104

MISSISSIPPI

Home Economics Consumer Education. Curriculum Guide, 1970, 211 pages, \$2.00, Offset.

This is a resource unit in consumer education for high school instruction in home economics. The units have been divided into concepts and objectives, learning activities (including problems and projects) and teaching aids.

OHIO

Consumer Education. Curriculum Guide, 1970, 164 pages, \$2.50 plus 25¢ postage and handling, Offset.

This curriculum guide provides units of instruction for grades K through 12. The guide offers opportunity for versatility in teaching a number of consumer education concepts of fundamental importance in real life situations.

Treated in the guide are such broad areas as units for elementary grades, units for students in grades 7-12, consumer education for educable mentally retarded and the socio-economically disadvantaged. In addition to a bibliography selected for each of the topics listed above, there is an extensive bibliography for consumer education in general.

Consumer Education, Curriculum Guide for Ohio, Grades K-12. Teacher's Guide, 1970, 102 pages, \$1.25 plus 25¢ postage and handling, Offset.

The guide launches into concepts, suggested learning and evaluation experiences and suggested resources.

Manual of Operation. Teacher's Manual, 1970, 49 pages, \$1.25 plus 25¢ postage and handling, Offset.

Prepared primarily for teachers, administrators and supervisors, the content covers the operation of secondary, post-secondary and adult level consumer education programs. Topics include such items as consumer and homemaking education program initiation and expansion, job training, adult education programs and technical programs at the post-high school level.

OKLAHOMA

Consumer Education. Curriculum Guide, 1970, 229 pages plus record-keeping forms and originals for transparencies, \$2.00, Offset.

This guide provides assistance for teachers in improving courses in the consumer education area of vocational home economics. The approach to learning taken is one of inquiry with the objective of preparing learners to seek information, identify values, and develop the understanding needed to cope with everyday problems. Material is arranged for teaching at the beginning level (Grades 9-10); at the intermediate level (Grades 10-11); and, at the advanced level (Grades 11-12, and young adults).

SOUTH CAROLINA

Guide for Consumer and Home Economics Education. Curriculum Guide, 1970, 288 pages, \$3.50, Offset.

This curriculum guide has been prepared to assist teachers in instilling in the minds of students sound intellectual, moral, and social foundations for family life. It is responsive to the concept that up-to-date, flexible homemaking and consumer education directed to current and future needs of the family is essential to help each individual face new problems and to live a more meaningful life.

The guide is a resource for home economics teachers to use in planning local programs.

Measuring, Weighing, Valuing, Consumer and Home Economics Education. Teacher's Guide, 1970, 150 pages, \$2.50, Offset.

The guide provides criteria helpful in effective evaluation in the teaching and learning process. The purposes of the guide are threefold:

To provide an increased understanding of evaluation;
To provide ideas for evaluating home economics programs;
To provide increased understanding of evaluation as a means of making teaching more effective.

TEXAS (TTU)

Consumer Education for Families with Limited Income.
Teacher's-Student's Manual, 1971, 300 pages, \$8.00,
Offset.

The manual is designed as an aid for teaching adults with limited incomes. The content is presented in three sections. Section one is an overview for preparing the teacher to handle the content in teaching consumer education to disadvantaged adults. Section two includes units in ten areas of consumer education. The material is designed for use with groups having fourth to sixth grade educational levels.

Section three should aid the teacher in working on a one-to-one basis with families. It includes guidelines for person-to-person instruction and many more items.

Consumer Education, Part One. Teacher's-Student's Manual, 1971, 161 pages, \$6.50, Offset.

The manual is a part one of a two-part bulletin arrangement designed for a one-semester course for both boys and girls at the 11th and 12th grade levels. Both parts one and two contain four sections: Allocation of Resources, Consumer Buying, Consumer Citizenship, and the Consumer in the Economy. Both parts are closely interrelated and supplement each other. Behavioral objectives are stressed throughout.

Part Two. Teacher's-Student's Manual, 1971, 306 pages, \$6.50, Offset.

This is a companion piece to the consumer education publication designed for both boys and girls. The publication is well illustrated. It also is divided into four sections with several teaching-learning units in each section. There are included in the material suggestions for transparencies, skits, posters, case studies, simulated games, tests, programmed instruction, crossword puzzles and cartoons.

Family Health: 09.0105

INDIANA

Human Development and the Family. Resource Guide, 1965, 97 pages, \$.65, Offset.

The resource guide is organized under broad concepts on two levels, basic and advanced. The prime purpose of this guide is to assist students to develop the ability to think independently by using decision making and problem solving methods.

Family Relations: 09.0106

ALASKA

Guidelines for Home Experiences. Instructor's Guide, 1967, 53 pages, Free, Offset.

The guide has been developed to assist instructors to initiate a program of home learning experiences related to home and family problems which are planned and carried out in the home of the student under supervision of the instructor with the cooperation of the family.

IDAHO

Family Relationships and Child Development. Instructor's Guide, 1967, 185 pages, \$4.00, Offset.

The guide was developed to help students to identify and develop certain fundamental competencies that will be effective in personal and family living, regardless of the circumstances of the individual or the family.

IOWA

Human Development and The Family. Teacher's Guide, 1967, 33 pages, \$3.25, Mimeo.

The guide is a pool of ideas developed as a possible resource for teaching a course in human development and the family. The content outline sets up a four-column arrangement to provide content, generalizations, learning experiences, and resources.

OKLAHOMA

Human Development and The Family. Curriculum Guide, 1969, 380 pages, \$3.00, Offset.

Presented to aid the teacher in curriculum planning are behavioral objectives, concepts and generalizations, learning experiences, and suggestions for program evaluation. In addition to presenting resource units for Comprehensive Home Economics I, II, and III, there are Special Emphasis Courses, Suggestions for Planning Human Development, and Family Programs for Special Groups.

Foods and Nutrition: 09.0107

ARKANSAS

Foods and Nutrition. Teacher's Guide, 1969, 327 pages, Free, Offset.

This guide has been prepared as a resource for the selection of subject matter and learning experiences for home economics. Its content emphasizes the importance of good nutrition, helps students gain an understanding of factors to consider when buying foods, planning, preparing, and serving family meals. The content will be found helpful to the homemaker in the dual role of wage earner and head of a family in meeting the basic needs of good nutrition.

Housing and Home Furnishings: 09.0109

IOWA

Housing and Home Furnishing Equipment. Curriculum Guide, 1969, 231 pages, \$2.75, Mimeo.

The guide is prepared for three levels of instruction, early adolescence, middle adolescence, and late adolescence. Emphasis is on the individual in early adolescence, on family in middle adolescence, and on the community in late adolescence. The appendix includes visual, discussion, and evaluative materials. There are check sheets that may be used for field trips, home experience, or classroom discussion.

Homemaking, Other: 09.0199

ARKANSAS

Human Development and The Family. Teacher's Guide, 1968, 201 pages, Free, Mimeo.

The guide has been prepared to provide pertinent information for the teacher in the area of human development and the family. Objectives and learning experiences are suggested to assist in developing units of study. Resource materials and drawings are included to assist the teacher in making maximum use of the guide.

INDIANA

Advisory Committees for Home Economics. Teacher's Manual, 1969, 17 pages, \$.20, Offset.

The manual was written to help teachers with the organization and implementation of an Advisory Committee. Covered are such topics as what is an advisory committee, guidelines for establishing a committee, steps in organizing and implementing the committee, programs, memberships, purposes and many similar timely items.

The Instruction of Home Economics Related Concepts Included
in the Curriculum of Selected Indiana Elementary Schools.
Teacher's Resource, 1969, 38 pages, \$.60, Offset.

An investigation of the conceptual structure of most home economics programs reveals that these concepts which are being taught in the elementary grades are again being taught in the junior high and senior high school home economics classes.

OHIO

In-Betweens. Curriculum Guide, 1969, 119 pages, \$1.75
plus 25¢ postage and handling, Offset.

This is a curriculum guide for home economics teachers of students with special learning needs. It presents examples of the kinds of activities which will give these students concrete experiences in the basic skills most needed to become a socially mature individual, capable of functioning successfully in an adult society. Treated in the guide are such appropriate areas as personal and family development, housing, home care, food and nutrition, clothing and games for learning.

NEW JERSEY

Guidelines for Home Economics Education in Secondary Schools.
Teacher's Guide, 1968, 144 pages, \$2.50, Offset.

The first part of this teacher manual deals with the fundamental aspects of Home Economics curriculum planning. The second part contains detailed guides for developing teaching plan for Foods, Housing and Home Furnishing Equipment, Textiles and Clothing, Home Management, and Family and Child Care. The guides are all aimed at the middle and late adolescent student.

PENNSYLVANIA

Teacher Education Resource Materials for Home Economics.
Teacher Education, 1966, 124 pages, \$1.06, Offset.

In addition to the title this publication is identified as "Teacher Education Leadership Guide No. 1 - Home Economics Education." This is a progress report in curriculum development in home economics which began in 1957. While the work is directed primarily toward curriculum development at the teacher education level, the report will probably have value for teachers of home economics at the secondary school level as well. The material is assembled under ten chapter headings. Eight goals, identified as competencies, are developed in individual chapters.

OCCUPATIONAL PREPARATION: 09.02

Care and Guidance of Children: 09.0201

NEW YORK

Child Care Services Training Guide. Teacher's Guide, 1969, 100 pages, \$.75, Offset.

Content includes establishing the child care services training program, developing the local course of study, orientation to the world of work, development of competencies in child care service occupations, and a selected resource list.

PENNSYLVANIA

Preparing for Employment in Child Care Services in Pennsylvania Schools. Instructor's Guide, 1966, 58 pages, \$.27, Offset.

A State bulletin containing resource materials for planning, initiating, and conducting programs to prepare trained personnel for employment. School administrators, vocational directors, advisory committee members, and others interested in providing training for persons to enter this kind of employment will find useful information in this bulletin. The material is divided under the following general headings: Program Organization, Curriculum Guide, Space and Facilities. The appendix includes room layout and facilities, a bibliography and other pertinent information.

TEXAS (T.T.U.)

Child Care Aide. Course of Study, 1969, 510 pages, \$10.00, Teacher's Copy, Offset. (Cooperative Training).

This course of study consists of: (1) An overview and job description, (2) a job analysis, (3) a course outline, (4) instructional materials for student use, (5) units tests; and, (6) a list of references required for use with the course of instruction. The instructional materials for student use cover such areas as the child care aide as a member of a team, the child and his family, children's food and eating habits, children's play, and many more.

_____. Student's Manual, 1969, 296 pages, \$6.50, Offset.

Contains 12 units with lessons within each unit providing objectives, references, activities, questions, and assignments for students training for the role of child care aide.

Clothing Management, Production, and Services: 09.0202

NEW JERSEY

Patternmaking and Design - I. Student's Manual, 1967,
\$2.50, Offset.

Covers the basic year content of flat patternmaking in the occupation of dressmaking and design relating to women's garments. Content is divided into ten units as: Introduction to Patternmaking and Design, Slopers, Waists, Necklines, Closing and Extensions, Collars, Sleeves, Skirts, Pockets, and Belts. The units are broken down into 62 lessons. A test for each unit and bibliography are included.

Power Sewing. Student's Manual, 1967, 261 pages, \$2.00,
Offset.

Prepared for a specific occupational training need to teach power sewing to deaf students. Material is well illustrated. Content is divided into eight units as: Let Us Learn About the Power Sewing Machine, The Single - Needle Lockstitch Machine, Primary Sewing Operations, Single - Needle Sewing Projects, The Zig-Zag Machine, Two - Needle Lockstitch Machine, Special Machines, and Odds and Ends. The units are broken down into a total of 75 lessons each of which contain specific objectives and assignment.

PENNSYLVANIA

Preparing for Employment in Clothing and Home Furnishing Services. Instructor's Guide, 1968, 57 pages, \$.25.
Offset.

The purpose of this bulletin is to provide guidelines for local school districts for use in developing educational programs to prepare students for employment in clothing services. It includes materials for motivating students to train for the world of work, basic material on job orientation and how to get a job as well as the concepts to be used in developing programs in either the comprehensive high school or area vocational technical school.

TEXAS (T.T.U.)

Clothing Assistant. Course of Study, 1969, 488 pages,
\$10.00, Offset. (Cooperative Training)

This course of study was made available to assist teacher-coordinators in promoting and/or teaching home economics cooperative education programs. The course is based upon a job analysis developed from interviews with employers

and employees in alteration departments and in dry cleaning establishments. Each topic of the instructional materials begins with the task to which the topic is related and a statement of behavioral objectives. Answer keys are provided to assist in assessing student performance.

_____. Student's Manual, 1969, 260 pages, \$6.50, Offset.

Contains 11 units covering repairing and altering clothing, working in dry cleaning establishments, guiding customers in fabric selection, or making garments for others.

Food Management, Production and Services: 09,0203
INDIANA

Instructional Materials for Occupational Home Economics Food Service Area. Instructor's Guide, 1967, 342 pages, \$2.00, Offset.

The guide has been designed for use in a cooperative work program in the food service occupations. It is divided into six major parts, grooming and public relations; counter and cafeteria service; dining room service; food preparation; cleaning and equipment; and sanitation and safety. It also contains assignment sheets, task sheets, operation sheets, an appendix, and a bibliography.

NEW JERSEY

Nutrition - Part 1. Student's Manual, 196 pages, \$2.00, Offset.

Content includes a general analysis of nutrition and dietetics designed to provide related information for vocational students in the foods occupations, practical nursing and public health occupations. There are 10 units of basic nutrition. Included is information and examination questions on nutrition for pregnancy and lactation; nutrition for infants, teen-agers, adults, senior citizens and others.

_____. Part 2. Student's Manual, 1969, 169 pages, \$2.00, Offset.

This manual contains information relating to dietetics. There are five units of study that cover food measurements and terms, special diets, the food budget, meal planning, food fads and the like.

OREGON.

Food Service Occupations. Curriculum Guide, 1970, 163 pages, \$2.50, Offset.

Major areas covered in the guide include such topics as employment in the food service industry, sanitation and safety, serving food, preparing food and managing a food service establishment.

PENNSYLVANIA

Curriculum Guide for Food Service Instructional Programs in Pennsylvania. Instructor's Guide, 1967, 44 pages, \$.23, Offset.

The purpose of this bulletin is to provide guidelines for local school districts for use in developing educational programs to prepare students for employment in food service preparation. For use in the comprehensive high school or in the area technical school.

TEXAS (T.T.U.)

Dietitian Aide. Course of Study, 1969, 422 pages, \$10.00, Offset. (Cooperative Training).

The course of study is based upon a job analysis which is included in the materials. The content was prepared by experienced home economists in cooperation with cooperative education teacher-coordinators and subject matter specialists. Answer keys are available in this manual which is intended only for teacher-coordinator use.

_____. Student's Manual, 1969, 226 pages, \$6.50, Offset.

The student instructional materials have been prepared to provide part of the classroom instruction and are designed to give an increased understanding of the tasks they perform on the job. Content relates to food services for patient care in hospitals, nursing homes, or other health care facilities. These are available in nine units, including 39 individual lessons dealing with food services.

Food Service Employees. Course of Study, 1969, 488 pages, \$10.00, Offset. (Cooperative Training).

The course of study has been developed to be of assistance to those who prepare home economics cooperative education students for gainful employment in the food service operation of a restaurant, cafeteria, drive-in, specialty

house, hospital, nursing home, industrial establishment or educational institution. The content relates the tasks to the general objectives and competencies needed by students to perform effectively on the job. The competencies listed as "abilities" are gained primarily from on-the-job training while those listed as "understandings" are to be gained from classroom experiences.

_____. Student's Manual, 1969, 260 pages, \$6.50, Offset.

Contains nine units of instructional material dealing with such topics as sanitation, safety, commercial kitchen equipment, techniques of food preparation, table service techniques, and procedures for receiving and storing foods.

Home Furnishings, Equipment, and Services: 09.0204

NEW JERSEY

Drapery Making - I. Student's Manual, 1970, 196 pages, \$2.00, Offset.

This is an introductory text for students entering drapery making as a vocation. A simple vocabulary has been used and the text defines technical terms used throughout the book. An assignment is given at the end of each lesson and an achievement test at the end of each unit. Content was prepared for teaching deaf students.

TEXAS (T.T.U.)

Home Furnishings Aide. Course of Study, 1969, 570 pages, \$10.50, Offset. (Cooperative Training).

This teacher's copy of a course of study contains an overview and job description, a job analysis, a course outline, instructional materials for student use, unit tests, and a list of reference materials. The course, like others in the series, opens with a discussion of what are the career opportunities and the personal qualities and abilities of an aide.

_____. Student's Manual, 1969, 354 pages, \$7.00, Offset.

This student material contains lessons covering eight units helpful to those employed in interior design studios, department stores, drapery or upholstery work rooms. A programmed unit on drapery construction is included in the material as well.

Institutional and Home Management and Supporting Services:

NEW YORK

Management Services. Curriculum Handbook, 1968, 95 pages, \$.50, Offset.

The content is designed to be of assistance to directors of adult education programs and instructors of home economics occupational education. The two main sections deal with units covering family service occupations and managerial occupations. There is included as well a glossary of terms and a listing of resource materials.

TEXAS (T.T.U.)
