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SECTION I

Statement of the Problem - In spite of modern technology which has revolutionized communication, learning, information processing, information storage and retrieval as well as information dissemination, much of rural America continues to "get by" with the same type of inadequate fragmented library facilities which were common 50 years ago. This research project raises three questions about library resources and learning needs in rural areas. The first question is "What learning resources are available in rural areas?" The second question is "What learning and informational needs are not currently being met by present resources?" The third question is "How do areas which have had special projects compare with areas which have not had such programs?"

For several years, categorical funding programs have made huge sums of money available to various institutions such as elementary schools, secondary schools, colleges and universities, and public libraries for materials and facilities for libraries. However, it appears that these programs have not been successful in bringing about the intended change in library and learning resources. Although more materials are available, their utilization is hampered by antiquated delivery systems, concentration in specific geographical areas or in specific institutions and lack of consistent quality of materials. In fact, data are not available to determine the quality of library materials and services in rural areas. Institutions continue to express a need for more funds to improve

the quality of library materials and facilities. In the absence of research data, these funds continue to be forthcoming and continue to be spent for products which may or may not be contributing to the solution of the problem involved.

Accountability demands that researchers make a thorough study of rural library needs and resources. Although this will not provide a direct evaluation of present funding approaches, it will determine the extent to which needs are being met at the present time. This will provide an indication whether or not innovative approaches to the problem of delivery of library services are needed.

A review of the literature reveals some interesting things about the development of library services. First of all, the majority of learning centers have been established in metropolitan areas.¹ This not only means that we are doing less in the rural areas about learning centers but it also means that we know less about rural library needs and resources.²

The fact is that the development of services has followed federal funding patterns and these services have been developed within existing organizational patterns rather than providing "integrated services."³ Specifically, there have been numerous demonstration projects involving public libraries and the delivery of public library services to rural areas through bookmobiles and cooperative library arrangements. Also, there have been numerous demonstrations of media, instructional or learning centers but these have been developed for elementary and secondary schools. Further, many of these are for narrow user groups.⁴ Regional

Medical Programs have resulted in increased library services for hospitals. College library services have been improved through federal funds in this area. This seems to have resulted in many inequities as well as unnecessary duplication. In fact, there are so many different programs under the control of so many different institutions that it is very difficult to determine what needs and resources are available in rural areas.

Also, a search of the literature did not yield a demonstration project which "put it all together" and provided for integrated services instead of public library services, law library service, elementary and secondary school library services, and college library services. The need studies which have been done have been narrow in scope and specifically tied to the federal or state funding program involved. The present study is different from preceding projects because it is comprehensive in nature and has implications for developing coordinated services. The present project also involves a unique opportunity to compare innovative and traditional programs and evaluate the overall impact of the respective approaches. The first objective of this project is gather data regarding resources and needs in the following areas: a. Library materials and services; b. basic adult education and continuing education; c. testing, evaluation and counseling services for adults and youth; d. special and remedial educational services, learning disabilities and handicapped; e. audio-visual equipment and materials; f. medical information and educational services. The second objective of this study is to determine what learning and informational needs are not currently being met by present resources. The third objective is to compare learning resources and need in areas which have access to innovative learning library resources with areas where such services are not available.

Target Area - The rural area selected for this project is the ten-county district which coincides with the Southern Oklahoma Development Association district and official Oklahoma State Planning Region #IV. This area covers 6,833

square miles and has a population (1970 census) of 163,997. Of that total 4.2% is Negro and 4.6% is American Indian. The median educational attainment is a grade level of 8.8. Unemployment averages 7.1% with 44% of the families having an income of \$3,000 or less. It is predominately a rural area with Ardmore, 21,915 population, the largest town.

This target area was selected because it contains a unique combination of the new and the old in library and learning resources. Six of the counties in this ten-county area are affiliated with the Chickasaw Library System which is a public library delivery system that uses bookmobiles to disseminate information and materials. Since there are four counties in this target area which are not a part of this system and there are many institutions such as schools and colleges which do not participate directly this will allow a comparison of one innovative delivery system with the traditional pattern of dissemination of library and learning resources.

Procedures for Gathering Data

Sources of Data - The first few weeks of the project were spent in organizing the research team and in making contacts with individuals who would have the information that would be needed for the project. Individuals from the Chickasaw Library System, the Oklahoma National Library, the Oklahoma Department of Libraries, the Oklahoma Department of Education, Valley View Hospital, Southern Oklahoma Developmental Agencies, the Oklahoma Department of Special Education, East Central State College Library, and the Regional Guidance Center III were contacted regarding the proposal as sources of information. One immediate problem that developed was that by the time all contacts were made, the school year had come to an end and direct information from the schools was not available from enough schools to make it profitable in that aspect. Considerable time had been spent in discussion before the project was proposed. Yet upon contacting these

agencies after the proposal had been started, there was still considerable difficulty in determining what the most relevant source of information might be. Several questions arose concerning possible sources of information, which needed to be included. These sources of data are discussed in more detail in chapter two. These sources of data can be categorized as being statewide, regional, or local. Many of the agencies involved in the planning of this project also were in a position to provide data regarding resources and needs.

Instruments for Data Gathering - Two basic approaches are used in gathering data for this study, the first approach is to take data in the form already available from state agencies such as the State Department of Education or the State Library. This generally involves published annual statistical reports. Some work had already been done on public libraries in six of the counties. The other approach is to develop and administer special questionnaires. A total of three questionnaires have been developed. These questionnaires are in chapter three and are discussed in more detail there.

Procedures for Analyzing Data - These procedures involve description, graphic presentation of results and statistical analysis. Chapter four contains a description of library learning resources and needs. Chapter five discusses needs not currently being met by present resources. Chapter six involves an analysis of differences in the area. Conclusions and recommendations from the data analysis are presented in the final chapter.

SECTION II

SOURCES OF DATA

The basis concept dealt with in this study is "Library-learning resources". This is a broad term and involves a number of agencies. Initial planning indicated that there are Statewide, regional and local agencies providing learning resources. Most of the Statewide agencies are of a co-ordinating nature. Some provide services directly but most provide their services through local agencies such as schools, County Health Department, and County Department of Institutions, Social and Rehabilitative Services. Some Regional agencies are of a planning and co-ordinating nature and others provide direct services.

Table 1 provides a list of Statewide, regional, and local agencies which involve some aspect of learning resources in this ten-county area.

SECTION III
MEASUREMENT TECHNIQUES

Out of 217 schools in this ten county area, only three completed this questionnaire. Two conclusions were drawn from these results. First of all, it was evident, that this questionnaire was too unstructured to be meaningful to participants. Furthermore, the meager response suggested that it would be necessary to have an interviewer obtain information rather than rely on questionnaires being returned by mail.

Other preliminary efforts to obtain data included information available from state or overall co-ordinating agencies. These data were in the form of published reports.

From these preliminary inquiries it was learned that surveys of Public Schools and Public Libraries had been made some time prior to this study on this ten-county region.

The questionnaires used in these earlier studies were modified and expanded for the purpose of the present study.

SUMMARY OF RESOURCES

In summary, respondents identified library books as the greatest learning resource in this ten county area. Respondents indicated the presence of 611,222 library books. Of this total, 256,300 are located in Public Libraries, 337,154 in school libraries and 17,768 in special libraries. This reveals that the greatest concentration of library books in this ten-county area is in public schools (337,154) and the second largest concentration of library books in public libraries (256,300). An interpretation of these data should take into account that a total of 37 public schools reported and only 11 public libraries reported. Corresponding to the resource of library books is library personnel. Public schools reported a total of 76 librarians; and 271 aides while public libraries reported a total of 12 librarians and 36 aides. The special libraries such as medical and law libraries did not indicate that they have individuals with the job title of librarians.

In addition to library books, there is the related resource of periodicals. Respondents indicated that they subscribe to a total of 3,839 periodicals. Out of this total, 2,301 periodicals are in public schools, 191 in public libraries and 1,397 in special libraries.

Audio-visual resources are viewed by respondents as second to library books and periodicals in learning resources. Sixteen mm film seems to be the greatest audio-visual resource (4,848). The bulk of the 16mm film is in the public schools with 4,295 followed by public libraries with 530. Schools have 14,151 filmstrips and public libraries 929.

Cassettes are also an important resource with respondents indicating a total of 2,894 in their possession. Only a small percentage of public schools reported that they have audio-visual personnel and no public libraries or special libraries reported that they have audio-visual personnel.

The majority of respondents have 16mm projectors (74%) with a total of 249 reported. Also 64% of respondents report that they have slide projectors with a total of 289 reported.

Copying machines are an important audio-visual resource with 77% of respondents indicating that they have them and a total of 225 reported.

Guidance counselors are reported as a resource of the schools. A total of 28 full-time and 41 part-time counselors were reported. A number of specialized guidance services are provided in this ten-county guidance center with headquarters in Ada. Special Education resources are provided chiefly in the form of classes for the educable mentally handicapped with a total of 39½ such classes in this ten-county area. There are also 15 classes for trainable mentally retarded. Also there are 9 classes for children with learning disabilities.

Special education resources are also concentrated in two special projects: one of these is located in Ardmore and the other in Ada. These provide a wealth of material and resources in these two areas.



SECTION V

UNMET NEEDS

Two different dimensions of needs were tapped by this study. The first was "expressed need." Respondents were given an opportunity to indicate needs as well as resources. These are operationally considered as "felt needs." These needs were presented in Section IV and will be summarized and discussed in subsequent paragraphs. The second dimension of need involves the "lack of a resource." If the items in the data gathering instruments can be considered as important learning resources, then the absence of such a resource can operationally be defined as an indication of a need. For the purpose of this study, these needs are referred to as "apparent needs."

Felt Needs - The most significant finding of this study is the fact that respondents seem to be fairly well satisfied with present resources. The greatest felt need was for librarians with 16% of respondents indicating a need for additional library staff and the total number reported to be needed was 35. As can be seen in Table 323, 14% of the reporting institutions report no librarians or no need for librarians. This would mean that of the institutions having a library staff, 70% apparently consider their staffing adequate.

Along with librarians is the finding that 11% of reporting institutions feel a need for library aides. However, 47% of respondents report that they do not have any library aides and do not need any.

The data indicates a felt or expressed need for audio-visual materials and equipment in the form of cassettes (12%), filmstrips (11%), 16mm Projectors (10%). Also, there was an expressed need for audiovisual personnel.

A need for adult education and career education classes were expressed by 6% of the respondents. However 82% of respondents indicated that they do not have adult education classes and do not feel a need for them. Moreover, 86% indicated that they do not have career education classes and do not feel a need for them.

Lack of Resources or apparent need - The resource most lacking seems to be school nurses. An analysis of the data indicates that most schools utilize county public health nurses and do not feel a need for nurses on the school payroll.

There seemed to very little VD education or Sex education and very little interest in obtaining it.

As already reported, there is a lack of adult education classes and career education in this ten county area and little felt need by respondents for them.

Audio-visual personnel seem to be lacking as well as 8mm films, 8mm projectors, microfilm, and microfilm readers, television sets, and television classes.

There seems to be a shortage of counselors especially in elementary schools in this ten-county area.

Discussion of Needs - One of the most apparent things from this study is the implication that most of the respondents had no systematic way of determining needs. The majority of respondents seemed to be satisfied with what they have. This seemed to be the case even when there was a reported lack of resources.

SECTION VI

DISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES

One objective of this study was to examine patterns of resources with implications for a delivery system. The most obvious and expected relationship is between size and resources. A Spearman Rho was computed between ranking based on size (1970 census) and ranking based on reported resources. A rho of .92 was obtained.

There are three "innovative" delivery systems of learning resources operating in this ten county area which merit consideration. These systems have to do with public library services, guidance services and medical information and services.

Public Libraries - as can be seen in Table 314, there are a total of nine public libraries in this ten county area. The Chickasaw Library System operates bookmobiles in six of the ten counties (Carter, Coal, Aroka, Johnston, Love and Murray). The headquarters for this system is located in the most densely populated county in the area (Carter). The remaining counties are comprised of the most sparsely populated areas. The Chickasaw Library System has a larger amount of resources (books, staff, and other learning materials) than any of the other libraries in the area but it serves a significantly larger population (73,022) in comparison to the library reporting the next amount of resources which services a population of 20,831. The Chickasaw Library Service is provided in those counties which have voted a tax to support the service. It would appear that this tax has been approved in counties which did not already have some type of public library serving the county. This program has also tended to be adopted in counties which have received a demonstration grant to provide the service for one year before asking for tax support.

Garvin County has one county library and city libraries in Pauls Valley, Lindsay, and Wynnewood. Pontotoc County is served by the Ada Public Library. Durant is served by the Robert Lee Williams Public Library. Marshall County is served by the Chickasaw System but it also has a public library not affiliated with that system. This means that there are public library facilities in all of the ten counties.

Theoretically, a rural area such as the one being studied could provide more expedient inter-library system. The present data bear on the question but does not answer it. There are more resources in the population centers which are not served by the Chickasaw system than is available to the Chickasaw System. If the library service is comparable then it would appear that some type of public library cooperative program would be more efficient. Unfortunately there is no ready measure of quality of service.

Regional Guidance Center - Psychological services are provided in this area by the Regional Guidance Center III with headquarters in Ada. Data are available on the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 1972. During this statistical year, services were extended to all of the counties in the region but five of the counties were served only five months. Services to individuals are available to all residents of the region who come to the headquarters in Ada for such service. Services to individuals are also provided to counties which provide financial support to the Center (Atoka, Bryan, Garvin, Murray, and Pontotoc). Consultative services are provided throughout the region to schools, and social service agencies working with people. Regional Guidance Center III seems to be hampered by funding patterns which require local matching support to obtain services.

Health and Medical Services - The bulk of public health information and services is provided by county health departments coordinated by a district health department.

The most innovative medical service in the region is the Regional Medical program operated by Valley View hospital. Area hospitals are connected by teleconference facilities which transeunt medical information. Also, various educational programs are transeunted including college-credit courses from East Central State College.

SECTION VII
SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

This study involves a survey of library-learning resources in a ten county district which coincides with the Southern Oklahoma Development Association District and Official Oklahoma State Planning Region #IV. The bulk of the data were gathered by an interviewer using a survey approach. Three dimensions are involved in the study. The first aspect is the identification of library-learning resources. The second dimension involves identification of needs not being met at the present time. The third aspect involves a comparison of resources in the area with implications for a delivery system.

The following conclusion may be reached from the present data:

1. The greatest concentrations of learning resources in this region is in the public schools with library books and librarians leading the list followed by audio-visual materials and equipment with public libraries providing the second greatest concentration of resources;
2. Respondents seemed to have no systematic basis on which to establish needs but need patterns tended to follow resources with the greatest needs expressed for books, audio-visual materials, etc.;
3. Respondents tended to express satisfaction with present resources even though they may be meager;
4. Present delivery of learning resources seems to be based on geographical boundaries and associated with funding and administration patterns;

5. Innovative delivery systems seem to be working but are hampered by funding problems;
6. Fragmentation and isolation of resources point to the need for more coordination, planning, cooperation and more efficient delivery of library-learning resources in this area.
