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ABSTRACT

This annotated bibliography was prepared to assist research in planning for colleges and universities. Subject topics cover educational policy--general and statewide; university-community relationships; enrollment and space utilization studies; enrollment statistics; campus planning--general, planning and scheduling models, medical school plans and planning, parking and circulation, and history; campus plan reports; university architecture--general, academic buildings, libraries, housing, student centers and sports facilities, and other buildings. Other bibliographies and an author and article title index are included. (MJM)

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INTRODUCTION

This bibliography has been prepared to assist research in planning for colleges and universities. The first edition was published by the Council of Planning Librarians as Exchange Bibliography No. 22. In the spring of 1964 a revised edition with over one hundred more items was published as Exchange Bibliography No. 30. The present edition, published by the Society for College and University Planning, includes approximately 350 new listings and an alphabetical author-item title index which should increase its usefulness.

The number of institutions and government agencies actively engaged in long-range college and university planning and the literature in the field has increased markedly in recent years. The continuing surge of research on campus problems and the proliferation of books and articles of interest to campus planners now covers so wide a range of topics that this bibliography can make no claim of completeness. However, by abstracting and organizing the literature in the field it should help facilitate the flow of information.

In the compilation emphasis was placed on recent publications and articles. However, a few older items of historical and general interest have been included. An attempt has been made to place each reference under the heading that most closely describes its subject matter and/or purpose. For example, both the sections on Campus Planning and University Architecture may include items with information on Campus Plans. In the case of the former the principal subject matter may be an evaluation of a plan or may describe a planning procedure or element of a plan. In the case of the latter the main content may be the discussion of a particular building or group of buildings supplemented by an illustration of the Campus Plan.

Most of the reports prepared by planning staffs or consultants and many of the published plans are quite limited in availability and probably available for distribution only to those actively engaged in college or university planning.

A number of people have provided assistance in the compilation of this bibliography. Messrs. George O. Webber, Director of Physical Plant at the University of Maryland, Dr. Thomas R. Mason, Director of Institutional Research, University of Colorado, and Mr. Herman H. Field, Director of Planning for the Tufts-New England Medical Center each provided a number of references. Caudill, Rowlett and Scott's Survey of College and University Planning was useful in locating material on Campus Plans. Messrs. James Clark, Albert Wagner, Robert Koski, Jack Telfer and many other staff campus planners, consultants, and university officials were helpful in providing references and publications. David Shearer, Fine Arts Librarian at Cornell, checked most of the references. Mr. Edward L. Preston, Martin H. Kramer, Richard Ragatz and Stephen Fuller, graduate assistants in the Department of City and Regional Planning at Cornell University, contributed substantially to the research, preparation of notes, and editing for the earlier editions.

A crystallization of a series of "University Pamphlets" by various authors (published by SCM Press) dealing with questions of fundamental principle in university education. Written from a Christian standpoint. Seeks to find a strong sense of purpose for the university in the modern world.

Nash, Arnold S. The University and the Modern World. New York: The Macmillan Co., 1943. 312 pp.

An essay in the philosophy of university education. Its thesis is that the modern university has built its curriculum and elaborated its educational procedures upon the basis of an inadequate philosophy which assumes that the scientific method and spirit, which can have no sense of meaning of life or history, are an adequate guide in the pursuit of knowledge.

Skims problem and urges some power of public acquisition for private institutions. Mentions Utah and Tennessee statutes dealing with this matter.

A balanced discussion of the trend toward more rational management procedures in higher education.
