ABSTRACT

Results of a follow-up study of the graduates of Hagerstown Junior College during its existence (1948-1973 inclusive) are provided. During the 26-year period, 1,797 people received either a degree or a one-year certificate from the college. Questionnaires were mailed to all graduates, and 1,359 (77%) were returned. The data are tabulated as to present status, employment, education, and evaluation of Hagerstown Junior College. An appendix provides a copy of the questionnaire. (DB)

Introduction and Purpose

The last follow-up study of Hagerstown Junior College graduates was done in 1967 and included all those who graduated from 1948 (the first graduating class) through 1966. The major purpose of both this 1967 study and the current one is to provide information which will help HJC to improve its services to its students. More specifically, it sought information in the following areas:

- The year and curriculum of graduation;
- An update of the graduate's permanent address (for alumni records);
- What the graduate is doing now and plans to do;
- The highest degree held;
- Details about any who are employed full-time: job title and employer, salary range, job location, and relation of his job to his HJC curriculum;
- Details about any who are full-time students: school, status, major, relation to HJC curriculum, and GPA;
- Their evaluation of various aspects of HJC;
- Personal reactions as to reattending and/or recommending HJC; and
- Selected comments and suggestions for improvement.

Basic Assumptions

It was assumed that HJC would not be merely content to have its graduates praise the school. Rather, when inadequacies became evident, it was presumed that appropriate corrective action would be taken.

Further, it was assumed that certain information collected in this study could be used for other purposes by various segments of the College.

Population

This follow-up study deals only with the graduates of HJC during its existence -- 1948-73 inclusive. (The College was founded in 1946.) During this twenty-six year period, 1,797 people received a degree (or, in the more recent years, a one-year certificate) from HJC. A number of these people have been lost and some were deceased so that only 1,767 questionnaires were mailed. A total of 1,359 or 77% of these questionnaires were returned.

Methodology

Each member of the population was sent a three-page questionnaire (see Appendix) to complete and a cover letter from the president of the College. After six - eight weeks, follow-up requests were sent to those who had not yet responded.

The responses were tabulated by year and the results are found in the following tables.

RESPONSE SUMMARY

This table summarizes the number of graduates for each year (100%) from 1948 through 1973 and lists the number and percentage of responses for each class, as well as totals.

Overall, 1,359 of 1,767 graduates or 77% responded to the questionnaire. On a yearly basis, the percentage of return ranges from a low of 63% (1962) to a high of 100% (1954).

CURRICULA OF GRADUATES

This table shows the curricula of the 1,359 respondents by year and by transfer vs. career.

The increase in career programs is evident as between 90 and 100% of the graduates each year through 1968 were from transfer curricula. However, from 1969 through 1973 the breakdown was 75% transfer and 25% career. Furthermore, the trend has approached a 50-50 breakdown as the 1973 graduates show a 65-35 distribution.

The curriculum with the highest number of graduates is Teacher Education, followed by the Arts Sequence and Business Administration. These three curricula alone account for over 70% of the graduates.

Of the career curricula, the one with the highest number of graduates is Nursing, which alone accounts for 22% of the career program graduates.

This table is designed to assess the current activities of the 1948-73 graduates. (See the questionnaire in Appendix for the full wording of these categories.)

Predictably, nearly all of the earlier graduates are employed full-time and many are attending college on either a full-time or part-time basis. More of the recent graduates (after 1969) are enrolled on a full-time basis.

Overall, about 30% of the respondents are currently enrolled on either a full-time or part-time basis. Similarly, 1,120 or 82% of the respondents are employed on either a full-time or part-time basis. Of this 1,120 people, 997 are employed full-time.

This table measures the current educational goals of the graduates.

Of the total number of respondents, 224 or 16% are currently enrolled full-time while another 188 or 14% are attending part-time. Nearly another 30% have plans to return to college.

The percentage of graduates who are not enrolled and who do not plan on continuing their education is predictably higher for earlier classes than for the more recent ones.

This table outlines by year the highest degree held by each graduate from 1948-73.

When the 1971, 72, and 73 graduates are subtracted (they have not all had sufficient time to have completed any degree above the A.A.), approximately 30% of the graduates have an A.A. while nearly 50% have a bachelor's.

Overall, 172 or 13% of the respondents have earned graduate or professional degrees beyond the bachelor's.

This table shows the number of respondents by year who are employed full-time and who fell into the various salary ranges indicated.

Predictably, the earlier graduates earn more per year than the more recent graduates. This trend is evident as the chart shows the responses tend to "cluster" from lower left (recent graduates, lower salaries) to upper right (earlier graduates, higher salaries). Sub-totals were also included to further outline this trend.

Of the pre-1960 graduates, over 30% are earning in excess of \$20,000 per year while only about 6% are earning less than \$10,000.

Of the 1960-69 group, only 5% earn over \$20,000 while 46% earn under \$10,000. And, predictably, no one in the 1970-73 group is earning over \$15,000 per year and 84% earn under \$10,000 per year.

Assuming the salaries are evenly distributed in the categories, the median salary for all respondents is just under \$10,000 per year.

These tables summarize the ratings by the respondents of certain selected aspects of HJC. The findings were divided into three groups: 1948-1956 (while the College was located in Hagerstown High School), 1957-1966 (while HJC was in its new building at South Hagerstown High School), and 1967-1973 (after the school had moved to its present campus).

When the two rating categories of "Excellent or Superior" and "Good or Above Average" are combined to indicate a favorable or high rating for any given aspect, several aspects rate very highly over the years. The three aspects receiving the highest ratings were Teaching Faculty (with responses in the combined top two rating categories for each of the three groups of 84%, 89%, and 90%), Student-Teacher Relations (92%, 89%, 82%), and Administration (78%, 84%, 77%). In addition, Learning Atmosphere (59%, 66%, 69%) and Fellow Students (71%, 60%, 60%) are highly rated.

In the second group of five aspects, Course Selection (48%, 54%, 59%) and Curriculum Selection (44%, 50%, 59%) not only rate highly but have shown marked improvement over the years. Counseling (52%, 45%, 58%) and Registration and Records (57%, 57%, 54%) also rate consistently high.

Inter-collegiate Athletics (11%, 17%, 25%), Intramurals (5%, 10%, 19%), Job Placement (8%, 9%, 14%), and Financial Aid (18%, 18%, 27%) all have shown notable improvement over the years. The most dramatic change in ratings, however, are in the improvements shown by the last five aspects. Cafeteria-Food Service (3%, 10%, 42%), Bookstore (6%, 20%, 40%), Facilities (4%, 21%, 69%), Library (4%, 17%, 79%), and Learning Resource Centers (4%, 8%, 46%) have all received higher ratings as the HJC facilities have improved.

The only aspect which has shown a decline in ratings is Freshman Orientation. The percentages who rated it "Excellent or Superior" or "Good or Above Average" declined (37%, 32%, 21%) while the percentages rating it "Fair, Below Average, or Of Little Value" or "Poor" increased (8%, 14%, 30%).

Overall, the results of the ratings of all aspects can be summarized as follows:

This table presents the answers to the hypothetical question of whether the graduates would enroll at HJC if they had it to do over again.

An overwhelming 92% of the respondents said they would do it all over again. The range for each year varies from a low of 84% (1948) to a high of 100% (for eight different years). Only 41 of the 1,359 respondents (3%) said they would not enroll again.

The respondents were also asked to indicate why they answered as they did. Of those who responded "Yes" they would enroll again, their reasons seemed generally to fall into these major categories:

- (1) Those graduates who just referred to the high ratings they had given the selected aspects of HJC in Question #13;
- (2) Those who specifically mentioned the good faculty-student relations and the favorable faculty-student ratio; and
- (3) Those who said the low cost and convenience of HJC was the only thing that made their education possible.

Most of the "No" responses listed their reason as the fact that all of their credits did not transfer.

This table outlines the answers to whether they would recommend HJC.

Over 96% of the respondents said they would recommend HJC. Only 9 of the 1,359 respondents (less than 1%) said they would not recommend HJC and only 6 were doubtful.

Of those who said they would recommend HJC, many added that they already had recommended it many times.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

In questions 13-17, an opportunity was provided for the graduates to make comments, provide reasons, and offer suggestions for improvements.

- Many of graduates said they would like to see HJC become a four-year college, and a few even suggested graduate work would be nice.
- Nearly all of the earlier graduates said their suggestions have been implemented now that HJC has its own campus.
- While most of the earlier graduates commented favorably on HJC's growth and expansion, at least one cautioned, "Don't grow too much more."
- Many respondents said that even though they have furthered their education at various colleges and universities, they never had better instructors or learned more than at HJC.
- Many felt their educational goals had been changed because HJC gave them a chance and they subsequently furthered their education.
- One of the most frequently mentioned strengths of HJC was the excellent student-teacher relations.
- Overall, the assets most frequently mentioned were cost, location, size, and quality of instruction.

SPECIFIC COMMENTS

- A dentist was a vocational high school graduate but HJC gave him the necessary background to continue college and go to professional school.
- A botany professor gives HJC "all the credit for 'turning me on' to education ... I can never thank them sufficiently."
- An attorney stated he would not be where he is today if it hadn't been for HJC.
- A 1967 graduate said that "HJC's environment restored my interest in further education which a prior college had just about killed."
- "I owe a great deal to HJC."
- "Without doubt, the best two years of my life!"
- "It was like one big happy family."
- "I got a good education."
- "Super Staff!"

- "Best thing I ever did!"

- "A truly outstanding community service."

- "HJC was a tremendous experience!"

- "I loved it!"

Finally, one graduate was thankful for receiving his questionnaire and, alluding to the purpose of this study, admonished HJC to "KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK."
