ABSTRACT

The bibliography provides access to some of the latest research findings or developments in community education. Thirty-nine documents and 47 journal articles published between 1956 and 1973 (with the majority between 1969 and 1973) are cited. The citations and abstracts have appeared in "Research in Education" and in "Current Index to Journals in Education". Citations cover a variety of community education resource materials, including adult education, community action, community involvement, community schools, and school community relationships. A subject index facilitates locating documents in a specific area. Pricing information and document availabilities are also provided. (NQ)
