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ABSTRACT

Provided are information on financial assistance for careers in special education, a listing of 18 other sources of career information, information on paraprofessional training, a listing of State directors of special education, and a listing of approximately 360 teacher training programs. Special education is seen to include services such as special class placement, clinical psychological services, early intervention programs, teacher preparation, and research. Addresses are given for information on sources of Federal and private financial educational assistance. Described are programs of financial assistance offered by 19 States. Provided for most teacher training programs (which are listed by State) are address, areas of study (such as administration, emotionally disturbed, or learning disabilities) and degree levels (whether undergraduate, masters, advanced or state certification, or doctoral), and current funding status. 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WHAT IS SPECIAL EDUCATION?

Some children, usually referred to as exceptional children, have special educational needs. They may be gifted, or they may be handicapped or potentially handicapped. They all have in common the need for special education services.

The programs and services which exceptional children require are provided through special education in one or more of the following ways: (a) special classroom placement in regular or special schools; (b) special assistance through resource rooms and crisis teachers to exceptional children in regular classrooms; (c) clinical services in psychology; (d) remedial education; (e) speech therapy; (f) music therapy; (g) art therapy; (h) early intervention programs; (i) supervision and administration of special education programs; (j) preparation of teachers and others concerned with the education of exceptional children; and (k) research. The goal of special education is to enable exceptional children to achieve the same kinds of objectives we seek for all children.

Special education training programs understand the importance of personal and humanistic, as well as academic experience, in preparing competent and sensitive teachers and administrative personnel.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Employment data recently compiled from across the country has confirmed the growing suspicion that the present supply of trained general classroom teachers now exceeds the demand. In special education, that field devoted to the education of exceptional children—the handicapped and gifted, there is a vastly different situation. The same survey data has also revealed that huge numbers of specially trained teachers are needed to meet the needs of exceptional children.

The Bureau of Education for the Handicapped of the U.S. Office of Education estimates that there are now 6 million handicapped children of school age in the United States. Of these 2½ million, or 39 percent, are currently receiving the special services required for them to learn, another 2½ million although in school are being denied access to special education services and the remaining 1 million are not receiving educational services of any kind. Based on a ratio of 20 children per teacher, it would take a total of 370,000 teachers for all of these children to be properly educated. Since there are 130,000 teachers currently employed (1/3 of whom, unfortunately, are not properly trained), the field is left with a shortage of 240,000 persons. In addition if preschool programs for the handicapped were to become a nationwide reality, an additional 60,000 early childhood specialists would be needed.

Increasingly, the nation's legal and moral responsibility to provide these children like all other children with an appropriate education is becoming clear. State law and judicial action have led many states and school districts to recognize their responsibility and create programs where none existed and expand those that did.

Other factors contributing to the recognized need to build programs to serve those children include the very existence of more handicapped children as a result of medical advances. Improved techniques of screening and identification have also led to greater awareness of the extent to which handicapping conditions are present in children of all backgrounds and socio-economic levels. Another factor is the positive effect of providing training programs to very young handicapped children in reducing the necessity for many of these children to continue to receive special education services. Finally, there is the national movement to reduce the populations in institutions for handicapped persons by returning them to their home communities and schools.

These trends and the goal of the United States Office of Education that all handicapped children receive appropriate services by 1980, point to the need for trained teachers, administrators, and support personnel in special education. The State-Federal Information Clearinghouse for Exceptional Children (SFICEC) of The Council for Exceptional Children has developed this

paper regarding various forms of financial assistance which can be used by persons interested in obtaining special education training.

P.L. 85-926 and Amendments

Perhaps the most significant assistance program comes from the federal government under Public Law 85-926 as amended by Part D, Title VI, P.L. 91-230, which provides for junior and senior year traineeships and masters and doctoral traineeships. Funds for fiscal year 1974 total over \$41 million. The program is administered by the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped USOE which allocates funds by disability area.

The Bureau has two ways of distributing these funds. The first is direct payment to colleges which offer appropriate training programs which in turn channel aid to students. Persons applying for these funds contact individual colleges usually by March for the ensuing summer and academic year. The second method is an allocation to state departments of education, which use some of their funds for summer institutes and special training programs as well as for traditional academic programs. These funds are applied for directly to individual state departments (see appendix for list). A helpful booklet which lists by disability and organization where the funds for each academic year have been allocated is published by the Bureau. It can be obtained by writing the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped, United States Office of Education, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, 7th and D Streets, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20202.

National Defense Education Act

NDEA loans are an excellent source of funds for the prospective teacher of the following handicaps: mentally retarded, hard of hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, emotionally disturbed and other "health impaired." Forgiveness, or automatic repayment of the loan through service occurs if the recipient teaches handicapped children after completing his/her education. The loan may be fully "forgiven" in five years at the following rates: 15 percent for the first and second years of teaching; 20 percent for the third and fourth years; and 50 percent for the fifth year. If a loan recipient does not teach, he/she has up to 10 years in which to repay the amount of money borrowed. Applications for NDEA loans should be made through the financial officer of a college or university.

Other Federal Assistance

State Assistance

Although state scholarship programs do not exist in all states and are generally less comprehensive than federal programs, they can be a valuable source of assistance. A description of existing laws in this area is presented below. Additional specific information may be obtained from the department of special education within the education department of each state.

ALABAMA

The state board of education may make training grants to professional persons seeking special training in exceptional child education to qualify them to meet state board regulations for personnel. Grants are limited to persons under contract to work in the exceptional child program in the state, the training schools, the child training centers, and at various residential facilities for exceptional children throughout the state. The grants are made to regular students planning to work in the state's exceptional child program if they enter into an agreement that they will take any appropriate, available job at any location within the state upon completion of their study. These commitments are binding upon those who sign them and receive scholarship aid, but the state board may waive enforcement in the case of extreme and unforeseen hardships.

Each grant covers the cost of tuition, housing and food. The courses for which scholarships may be made available are most often on the campuses of the state colleges and universities. If appropriate courses are not offered within the state, the recipient may attend approved out-of-state institutions.

CALIFORNIA

An employee of a district holding a position requiring certification or a certificated person under contract, may receive financial assistance from the governing board of the school district. Grants are made for summer study in specialized preparation for teaching physically handicapped or mentally retarded children. The amount of the grant is equal to the number of semester hours taken, multiplied by \$50 (a student taking six semester hours would receive \$300). For subsequent grants to be made to the same student, no more than five years will have elapsed from the time of his first grant.

In cooperation with an accredited college or university, the state may authorize California's schools for the neurologically handicapped to maintain teacher training courses to prepare teachers to teach such children in special classes in the public school system. Courses conducted in the schools will be counted toward the requirements for the credential in the area of the educationally handicapped. The state may also authorize the California Schools for the Deaf and Blind to establish teacher training courses for teachers of the deaf and blind.

CONNECTICUT

If it is determined by the commissioner of higher education that there are no approved programs of teacher education available within the state to prepare teachers of deaf children or children with perceptual learning disabilities, the commissioner may

approve scholarships for them to attend approved programs in out-of-state schools. The commissioner will determine the amount of the scholarship aid in each case, but the total amount available each year for all applicants may not exceed \$6,000. In order to be eligible for scholarship aid, the applicant must agree to teach such children in Connecticut for at least three years.

FLORIDA

Teachers who seek special training in special education to meet professional requirements may receive training grants from the state department of education. These grants are limited to teachers under contract in an exceptional child program in the state, the Sunland Training Centers, the child training centers, or Florida Schools for the Deaf and the Blind. Each grant covers the cost of tuition, housing, and food and may be a maximum of \$200 for residential enrollment in specific courses approved by the department of certification in special education. Summer fellowships are also available.

Courses are offered at institutions of higher learning in the state and through the Florida Institute for Continuing University Studies. If the courses are unavailable in the state in the subject area required for certification, the recipient may receive a grant for attending an out-of-state institution of higher learning approved by the department of education in order to meet the professional requirements of the state.

A scholarship loan for the preparation of teachers of exceptional children is available to undergraduates for as many as four semesters. Recipients must sign a pledge agreeing to teach in the state immediately following graduation for one year per year of scholarship assistance received. Awards are made on the basis of the student's showing on a competitive examination held each October. Information and application forms may be obtained from the Exceptional Child Section or the Scholarships and Loans Section of the State Department of Education.

GEORGIA

The state superintendent of schools may grant scholarships to persons interested in working in the education of exceptional children for either part-time or full-time study. To qualify for a scholarship, a person must have earned at least 90 quarter hours of college credit and must be a student at a recognized college or university. Part-time and summer students may be awarded grants on a pro-rata basis. The amount of grants is not specified within the law.

ILLINOIS

The superintendent of public instruction may make trainee or fellowship grants available to persons interested in working in the education of handicapped children for either part-time or full-time study. To

qualify for a traineeship a student must have earned at least 60 semester hours of college credit. To qualify for a fellowship, he must be a graduate of a recognized college or university. No more than 200 such grants will be given in any academic year and may not exceed \$1,600 per academic year for traineeships and \$3,000 for fellowships. An additional amount may be allowed to any approved institution of higher learning in Illinois for tuition and fees. Grants to summer and part-time students are awarded on a prorated basis.

Following the completion of an academic program, recipients are expected to obtain, within one year, employment in an approved special education program in Illinois. They must continue this employment for one-half year for each year of their traineeship or fellowship. If this requirement is not fulfilled they may be required to remit to the state all or part of their grant.

INDIANA

The state scholarship commission may make student loans to persons who are interested in working in the education of handicapped children, for either part-time or full-time study in programs designed to qualify them for Indiana certification. Eligibility is limited to persons who desire training to qualify as special education teachers, speech and hearing therapists, physical therapists, occupational therapists, directors of special education, supervisors of special education, special education consultants, school psychometrists and school psychologists. Undergraduate loans are limited to students of junior standing or above. Loans must not exceed \$1,000 per academic year for undergraduate students and \$1,500 for graduate students. Part-time students and summer session students may be awarded loans on a prorata basis.

Following completion of the program, the recipient must accept employment within one year in an approved special education program in Indiana. Employment must continue for two years per each year of training received. Failure to comply with this provision means that all or part of the loan must be repaid.

LOUISIANA

All funds received from fees paid by or in behalf of patients in state hospitals are deposited in a special account in the state treasury known as "the research and training account." Funds in this account are used by the state department of hospitals to conduct research in problems relating to mental illness and mental retardation and for training programs for psychiatrists, neurologists, special educators, psychologists, nurses, technicians, social workers, occupational therapists, medical students, interns, residents, physicians, and professional trainees.

Such training programs are designed to better qualify personnel for employment in state institutions and clinics for the mentally ill and mentally retarded as well as in hospitals owned and operated by the state.

MAINE

Any administrative unit may appropriate money for the education of teachers and other school personnel to meet the educational needs of mentally retarded children. These funds will be expended on a matching basis with funds made available by the department of education. The teachers and other school personnel trained with these funds will be reimbursed through matching departmental funds. Training under this section must be approved in advance by the commissioner.

MASSACHUSETTS

Special education scholarships not exceeding \$300 yearly may be given to high school graduates of the state who qualify for entrance into a public or private college other than the state college at Fitchburg. At any one time 25 scholarships is the maximum to each of the freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior classes. The maximum number of scholarships is 100 per year. The scholarship continues as long as the student remains in good standing and pursues certification as a special class teacher of the mentally retarded. No student may receive a scholarship for more than four years.

MICHIGAN

The department of education may make traineeship and fellowship grants available to persons interested in part-time or full-time study in programs designed to qualify them as teachers and other workers in special education. To qualify for a traineeship one must have earned at least 60 semester hours of college credit, and to qualify for a fellowship one must be a graduate of a recognized university. No more than 200 grants on a full-time basis may be given in any academic year, and they may not be in amounts exceeding \$1,500 per academic year for traineeships and \$3,000 for fellowships. Part-time students and summer session students may be granted awards on a prorata basis. Within a year after completing a program, the recipient is expected to work in special education in the state at the rate of two years for each year of study.

NEBRASKA

The state department may grant funds for the education of resource personnel.

NORTH CAROLINA

North Carolina residents enrolled in a college or university in the state are eligible for a "Scholarship Loan for Prospective Teachers of the Mentally Retarded." A full-time student may receive \$900 per academic

year, and a summer student, carrying a minimum of six semester hours, may receive \$150 for each six-week term. After completing the program the recipient must agree to teach in a public school or a public residential institution for the retarded for one school year per each year of assistance received.

OHIO

Details are not available, but in-service training for teachers of handicapped students is available in colleges and universities within the state.

OREGON

Scholarships may be awarded to qualified teachers wishing to obtain certification to teach the mentally retarded or emotionally handicapped. Each recipient will receive \$200 for living expenses and an amount for tuition fixed by the state board of higher education. In order for an applicant to receive a scholarship, the following conditions must be met: The school board in the district where the teacher is employed or is to be employed for the succeeding school year agrees to pay the teacher \$200 to match the \$200 paid by the state as part of the scholarship; and the teacher applying for the scholarship agrees in writing to complete the course and to teach in the school district that provides the matching funds for one year after receiving his teaching certificate to teach mentally retarded or emotionally handicapped children.

Scholarships are renewed in the same manner as they are originally awarded. If a teacher fails to complete the course or to teach in the public schools in the state after receipt of the award, he must remit to the state the funds received. If he teaches in a district other than the one which granted him the matching funds, he must reimburse the district, but not the state.

A teacher is eligible for two state-district scholarships provided he can complete the requirements during the quarter for which the scholarship is requested. Teachers who hold a 5-year mental retardation credential are not eligible for a second scholarship.

No scholarship funds are presently available to teachers who desire to improve their competencies to teach educationally able and gifted pupils.

TENNESSEE

The division for the education of the handicapped may make traineeship or fellowship grants to professional personnel desiring to work on programs for the education of handicapped children for either part-time or full-time study. To qualify for a traineeship, persons must have earned at least 60 semester hours of college credit, and for a fellowship, be graduate of a recognized college or university. The trainee and fellowship grants may be an amount of not

more than \$2,000 per academic year for traineeships; and not more than \$2,500 per academic year for fellowships, with an allowance of \$750 per year per local dependent.

Grants may be approved for persons contracted to work for the exceptional children program at state training schools or at various residential facilities for exceptional children throughout the state and/or those individuals planning to work in the exceptional child program in the state who sign a commitment stating that they will take an appropriate available job within the state upon completion of their studies. The commitments are binding upon those who sign them and receive scholarship aid, but the state board may waive them in the event of extreme and unforeseen hardship.

Training grants may be given to persons approved for participation as paraprofessionals in the exceptional child program. Persons receiving grants must meet state board professional and performance standards. These grants are limited to persons contracted to work in the exceptional child program or those individuals agreeing to work in the state with exceptional children after completing their training for a period of time specified by the state board.

VERMONT

Grants are available for persons interested in full-time or part-time study in special education.

VIRGINIA

Teachers of the public schools may be awarded scholarships for education in special education. These awards are made by the state board and the number of awards during any one year depends upon the amount appropriated by the General Assembly. The amount of each scholarship may not exceed the total tuition cost for all costs related to special education coursework taken by the applicant during a single semester. Each scholarship may be renewed as many times as necessary until the applicant has completed all courses needed to qualify him as a teacher of special education for the state board standards. Applications for scholarships must be accompanied by a notice of acceptance from an accredited institution of higher education conducting courses in special education. The application is forwarded to the state board through one of the local public school boards within the state for an endorsement. Priorities will be given to those applicants intending to study in state supported colleges and universities.

Before awarding any scholarship, the applicant must sign a written consent in which he agrees to pursue the course of instruction until completion, and thereafter serve as a special education teacher in the public schools of the Commonwealth for a period of years equal to the number of years of assistance.

WISCONSIN

Scholarships for potential teachers of handicapped children are available on the undergraduate level to Wisconsin residents. Selections are made in early spring, and the recipient is assured of funds for tuition and fees. If additional aid is desired, applicants may complete a Parent's Confidential State-

ment and the Financial Aids Office at the various training institutions will determine the amount, up to \$1,500 including tuition and fees, that can be awarded.

An amortization plan provides that the stipend can be cancelled by one-third the total amount for each year of teaching handicapped children in Wisconsin, either in a public or private elementary, secondary or special school. If the stipend is not fully

amortized at the end of a 5-year period, Higher Educational Aids will require payment.

Section III

PARAPROFESSIONAL AIDES

Paraprofessional aides, sometimes referred to as teaching aides, are used primarily to give individualized assistance to handicapped students thus freeing the teacher to perform other tasks. Formerly, these students' needs were met by providing them an education in a separate classroom.

Today emphasis is being placed on mainstreaming this child back into the regular classroom where he can take his rightful place with his peer group. In this setting especially he has need of added support and encouragement.

There is no comprehensive listing of paraprofessional aide training programs. Per-

sons interested in receiving training in this area should contact their local community college, junior college, adult education program, school district special education department or state director of special education (see Section IV) for assistance in locating a suitable program.

TEACHER TRAINING PROGRAMS

The program information for each school was obtained from an Information Center questionnaire, supplemented by *Special Education Careers Programs for Professional Training in Special Education, 1973*, and *Scholarship Program Education of Handicapped Children*, Summer 1973. This compilation does not purport to be a comprehensive coverage of all training programs in the nation since many colleges and universities did not respond to the questionnaire and others may have begun programs since the survey was taken in the Spring and Summer of 1973.

Programs preceded by an asterisk were federally funded in 1973-1974. These funds are used by the institutions in a variety of ways . . . some may award student assistance, others may use the funds for the support of the training programs, and many will use a combination of the former two alternatives.

In some instances we know that a training program exists, but we do not know the degrees offered nor the course of study. In these instances, we have included the program address, and leave program investigation to you the reader. The reader would also do well to consult the State Directors of Special Education for additional information concerning training programs in their state (see section for a list of State Directors).
