
This report is intended to provide principals, department heads, teachers, and parents with specific information designed to assist them in isolating unsafe conditions, activities, and behavioral problems. The document is divided into three parts: (1) a pupil section, with tables showing where accidents occurred, what parts of the body were injured, the nature of the injury, and statistics relative to accident incidence; (2) an employee section, that contains tables showing accident totals by job classification, location, employee age, and number of work days lost; and (3) a summary section. 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PREFACE

The primary objective of the Safety program is to provide principals, department heads, teachers, and parents with specific information which will assist them in reducing school jurisdiction accidents.

Toward this end, the Denver Public Schools maintains the following memberships and/or liaisons:

- . Colorado Safety Association
- . National Safety Council
- . Denver County P.T.A
- . Denver Police Department
- . Denver Fire Department
- . Denver Emergency Preparedness Office
- . Society On Safety
- . Elementary School Safety Committee
- . Elementary and Secondary School Principals
- . Denver Traffic Engineering Department

Other activities include:

- . Distribution of Periodic Safety Bulletins to schools; Guidelines For Meeting School Disorders (Publication); Safety Practices In The Instructional Program (Publication); Safety Patrol Handbook;
- . providing emergency supplies to schools; and
- . evaluating all required school emergency drills.

Accidents are considered MAJOR (recordable) if medical care is received or necessitate absence from school for one-half day or more; accidents are considered MINOR (reportable) if they result in any other injury.

This report is principally designed to identify all major school jurisdiction accidents involving full time day school pupils and employees reported during the 1972-1973 school year. A careful review of the data will assist us in isolating unsafe conditions, activities and behavioral problems.

Most safety experts agree that ninety percent of all accidents are preventable. It is felt that the home environment, and specifically mothers, hold the key to a large part of the problem in that pupils who do not exhibit hostility, anxiety, frustration, and general instability, are involved in far fewer accidents than those who do.


In an earlier day when our society and the lives of people were less complicated, these characteristics were far less prevalent. The school district fully realizes its responsibility for the safety of all pupils and will continue to strive toward that end.

In 1970 the Colorado Supreme Court abrogated the Doctrine of Sovereign Immunity with regard to all claims arising after June 30, 1972. During its 1971 session, the General Assembly of the State of Colorado enacted legislation for restoring significant parts of that protection for governmental entities such as the school districts. However, School District Number One has purchased general public liability insurance protecting both it and its employees from liability. These conditions have called for a mandate to report all injuries promptly and completely.

This report is dedicated to the cause of safety in the Denver Public Schools. Safety practices will facilitate the teaching-learning process, and, after all, that is our task.




The 487 total number of accidents in junior high schools is shown below using the three main categories for school jurisdiction accidents.


The two amputations are significant and refer to the loss of a finger by two pupils: one was caught in a corridor door and the other resulted from a saw in shop class.

INCIDENCE OF ACCIDENTS BY TIME OF DAY



While September shows the highest incidence of accidents for junior high school pupils, this report is characterized by a consistent balance throughout the school year.



Grade seven is high for both boys and girls in junior high school. Why?





The total number of 510 accidents in senior high schools is shown below using the three main categories for school jurisdiction accidents.






INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

Varsity athletics resulted in sixty-nine accidents to boys and fifteen accidents to girls resulting in a total loss of 133 1/2 days regular attendance. Football shows the highest incidence for boys with thirty-eight reported injuries, while gymnastics, with twelve reported injuries, is high for the girls. Nearly 5,000 pupils participate in these programs.

Athletic injuries were singled out for specific analysis although they are part of the count for senior high school accidents. They include any injuries which occurred during practice as well as during competitions or games.

The extent to which we are successful can only be measured against the 1973-1974 school year. Will we have fewer accidents? Will pupils and employees be at school and on the job? Together, we can accept this responsibility.

CENTRAL STAFF can direct their efforts toward providing safer instructional materials and programs, staff development programs, and continual safety evaluations of the school district.

PRINCIPALS must be mindful of the overall school program and plant as they affect the safety of pupils and staff.

TEACHERS must accept the need for closer supervision of pupils in all activities in order to create a safer school environment.

PARENTS will find a comprehensive picture of the causes of accidents which will be useful in home instruction.
