ABSTRACT

Also included are four tables listing the powers and responsibilities of state teacher standards and practices commission/boards, membership of state teacher standards and practices commissions/boards according to groups represented, qualification for membership on state teacher standards and practices commissions/boards, and association and commission/board contacts. 

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FOREWORD

The governing of a profession is a complex enterprise and has many facets, including entry into and continuation in the profession. Currently, the National Education Association is giving priority to those two facets. Involved are licensure, state approval of initial and in-service teacher education programs, national accreditation, and the processes for accomplishing all of these. Accordingly, the NEA has established criteria for determining whether it has met its own established objective in this area: "Practitioner determination of the standards and procedures for certification in the profession."

The criteria are as follows:

1. The state has either a legally established professional board which has legal responsibility for teacher licensure and for state approval of teacher education programs, or it has a board or commission which has the major say in the state about standards for certification and for accreditation of institutions which prepare teachers. (Note: The latter may be advisory to the state board of education at first, but even so, if it is created by law, it can assume the standards determination role if it functions effectively.)
2. K-12 practitioners comprise a group larger than any other membership group (e.g., college representatives, citizens, school board members) on the board or commission.
3. The established professional board must have the approval and support of the state affiliate, including constant attention to implementation and maintenance of the board or commission.

NEA affiliates may evaluate their own existing state boards and commissions against the above criteria. Those who are considering proposing laws to establish such boards are invited to contact NEA Instruction and Professional Development about the rationale for these criteria.

The content of this directory is factual only. Most of the boards or commissions listed have been created by legislative act. Others were established by state boards of education. No attempt is made to convey how effective the boards or commissions are or what has happened as a result of their work. The information was obtained from commission/board staffs as well as from executive secretaries of NEA state affiliates and from state departments of education. The directory also indicates the states where governance legislation is being considered or is pending.

While much of the information in this document will not change until existing legislation is either amended or added to, some may quickly become outdated--for example, association and commission/board contacts, and budgets. What is here, however, provides an overview of what exists nationally at this time. We intend that this information will facilitate communication among states as they implement existing laws and plan for improved laws.
