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ABSTRACT

This directory provides information on specific colleges and universities with a black heritage, including the academic and monetary requirements, financial aid, student activities, military programs, academic programs, a brief faculty profile, and campus characteristics. Institutions are listed in alphabetical order with cross reference tables indicating majors offered, general information, annual costs, cooperative education, testing requirements, number of students, percentage of black students, and varsity athletic teams. Introductory information is provided concerning the use of the guide, what determined the college for the student, what a college looks for in a student, how to choose a college, college expenses and financial aid, and the transfer student. 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Introduction



How To Use The Guide

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The "Moton Guide to American Colleges with A Black Heritage" is a directory which covers more than just information on specific colleges and universities. Following this section on how to use the directory are more sections on what it takes to go to college, the academic and the monetary requirements, and the necessary preparations which aid in finding the college for you. There is much involved in choosing a college and the following sections of information are provided to give you as comprehensive a picture of college life as possible.

Using this directory is a simple matter of knowing the alphabet. Each college or university is listed alphabetically according to the first word in the formal name of the school. For instance, Paul Quinn College will be listed under "P" for Paul. And that is essentially all there is to finding the colleges within the directory.

Once you have located the institution within the directory you will find seven sections which provide you comprehensive information on the college. For instance under the section of academics, both the types of degrees and majors offered are listed so that you can determine if this particular college might be what you are looking for. Under the student activities section is a general listing of activities and intercollegiate and intramural athletics offered by the school.

Should you want to contact the college the phone number and/or the address is provided. You will find this information directly beneath the name of the college. All correspondence should be directed to the Office of Admissions at each school.

So that you will not have to read every description of every college in finding what they offer, a cross-reference section is provided. The cross-references are time-saving tables which you will find handy in locating quick facts about the college. Now to use it. . . . Each

college is vertically listed at the top of the page. On the left side of the page is a listing of major offerings in alphabetical order. To find if a college offers a certain major, go to the top of the page, find the college you are looking for, then come down to the major you are looking for. If the college offers a particular major it will be indicated by a dot, if not, the space will be empty. If you cannot find a specific major, look at the major under which it would most logically be listed. For instance clothing and retailing is listed as home economics. A more detailed reference of major offerings is found within the description of each college.

The procedure used in locating the major area of study is also used in locating other information listed in the cross-reference tables.

Your Guide To Your Future

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A beginning like no other beginning, a new way of life, a different way of thinking . . . that is what comes with going to college. But right now let's back up to where you are at the present time, trying to find the right college for you. First, what are some of the colleges that you might consider? What reference sources do you seek in finding these colleges?

This is where the "Moton Guide to American Colleges with a Black Heritage" can help you. This guide provides a brief, yet comprehensive, description of 103 colleges including a listing of the colleges' undergraduate majors, approximate tuition and other facts and figures necessary to draw meaningful conclusions in your search for the right college.

This directory was conceived when we at the Moton Institute discovered that there was no complete reference book listing the colleges and universities with a Black heritage. Consequently, there was no way for you to consider many colleges because you were not aware of their existence. This guide can serve to

answer many of the questions you may have about college, as well as acquaint you with schools you may not have previously considered.

In order for you to get the most out of this directory, we have provided a glossary of terms and a comprehensive table of contents which will facilitate the location of information.



What Determines The College For You

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You determine the college for you. In your search for a college you will want to find the one that is best for you. But when you consider what the best colleges are, look at why they are labeled "best" and by whom. Is a college best because of a strong academic program, because the football team ranks number one year after year, because it boasts many famous graduates, or because a relative went there?



When looking at the list of reasons why an institution is considered one of the best see if what you think constitutes "best" coincides with what an institution maintains as being best. If the two do not coincide then the conclusion is simple . . . that college is not best for you.

Another thing to keep in mind is who makes the final decision in choosing a college. Your parents will most likely have college choices for you to consider. Listen to their advice carefully because they are likely speaking from experience and they naturally have your best interests in mind.

If a school is church affiliated, perhaps you can discuss some of the institution's offerings with a minister of the same denomination. He should have a general idea of the quality and reputation of the school under consideration.

You may want to talk with the admissions counselor of a college and receive first-hand information. They can provide you with a number of publications detailing what the school can offer you, both socially and academically.

The counselor can even arrange for you and your parents to visit the campus and tour the facilities.

If you are reasonably sure of the major area of study you are interested in, you may wish to contact the chairman of that particular division or department. He or she will be able to answer your questions and give a more detailed picture of what to expect within the major. You can also get some insights into the job market in this field.

In your search for the college best for you, friends will more than likely express convincing opinions on the college they would recommend. Remember, it is your objective that you are seeking to accomplish, not theirs, and it is you who will be attending the college. Make your decision a personal one rather than a precarious one.



What A College Looks For In You

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Probably the first things you think of in qualifying for admission to a college are the test requirements and high school grades. You should think of these things because they are a big part of the admissions process of most colleges. But test requirements and high school grades are not exclusive determinants in being admitted. Things like character, potential and attitude also count in acceptance decisions. In fact, more and more colleges are making efforts to accept many more students by providing conditional programs that a student may enter under and then move on to the regular college curriculum. Remedial courses in reading, mathematics and other areas where students may be deficient, are provided to help a student attain the regular college course level. If you find that you do not meet the requirements of a college that you would like to attend, don't feel discouraged, contact the

Director of Admissions and see what type of special consideration may be given to your application. If you

have the desire and potential to do college work, few will deny you the opportunity to prove yourself.



What Do You Look For In A College

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There are many things to look for in a college that can only be determined according to the objectives you seek. There are, however, at least three main things you should consider in selecting a college.

#1 Really know what your main purpose is in going to college. Define what your objective is. Perhaps you are interested in ecology or earth functions but you have not decided on a specific major. You probably should look for the college that offers geology, earth science or archeology, etc. That way you can decide on the concentration in which you are most interested. Perhaps college is only a beginning for

you, a basis for further study in your college major, or specialization in fields like law or medicine. Maybe you are headed for a professional athletic career and college offers the opportunity of perfecting your game while gaining a college education. Whatever your main purpose is, be honest with yourself and find out exactly what it is that you wish to accomplish in college.



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#2 After you have established your objective, see if it can be accomplished at the colleges you have in mind. Ask yourself this: can my educational aim be achieved at these particular schools? To answer this question, you will need specific information from the college (brochures, booklets) about the area of study you wish to pursue. For instance, you want to go into the field of journalism at a particular college and the only information you have about the journalism program is very general. Write the college and request information on a specific area, for example: radio and television, public relations or newspaper. Or, if you haven't decided which area of journalism you want to go into, request additional information covering all concentrations in journalism. There is a chance that some colleges will not have departmental brochures and they will probably send you a catalog or some other reference which clearly outlines the offerings open to you.



#3 Having selected some colleges that offer the educational program you want, of these decide which offers more of what you want. List your priorities and eliminate colleges according to them. For instance, if an urban location is the number one priority in choosing a college, then do not waste your time researching rurally located colleges. Or if you desire a college with a family type atmosphere, then those with small enrollments would most likely be favorable choices.



College Expenses--Financial Aid

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Granted, getting a college education today can be expensive. But before you decide to attend the college that may be less expensive than some others look at what you'll receive in the long run. Don't allow your objectives to be molded on the basis of dollars and cents.

Of course, reality is reality. If you really have very little money for college, then a budget for college expenses should be worked out. This can be done by sitting down, getting a pad and pencil and writing down the actual expenses. Basic costs will be tuition and fees, room and board. But there are other fees, too, such as laboratory costs, books and special activities. If you're staying on campus, as opposed to living at home, count on spending money on room furnishings such as sheets, a lamp, and other room necessities. Transportation costs . . . bus, air and sometimes taxi fare must be included. Remember, transportation costs also include expenses incurred each time you go home on holidays, weekends, etc. Many times shipping costs on trunks and luggage must be

allowed for. Naturally there are expenses for clothing, movies, pizza, and personal items.

When you've listed the items and their costs and allowed for incidentals such as the football game you hadn't planned on going to, add them together and the bottom figure is the yearly cost. Now that you have an approximate cost for college you can begin to inquire about college financial aid programs.

There are numerous financial aid programs available to you. Qualification for these programs is usually established through either the Parents Confidential Statement (PCS) provided by the College Scholarship Service or Family Financial Statement (FFS) provided by the American College Testing Program. Both forms provide information about annual income, assets, and expenses and thereby are the basis in determining your needs for



monetary assistance during college. You may secure either form from high school or college counselors or you can request a copy directly from the College Scholarship Service, P.O. Box 176, Princeton, New Jersey 08540; or the American College Testing Program, Box 168, Iowa City, Iowa 52240.

The scholarship or grant is one source of financial aid for which you might qualify. In addition to the colleges' scholarships and grants program, various states offer tuition grants, scholarships and loans. Community agencies, fraternal organizations and industries such as Standard Oil, General Motors, Sears Roebuck, Celanese Corporation, Alcoa, Kroger, and numerous others, every year give out scholarships and grants to qualifying students. These two sources of aid are given outright to students as gift-aid, with no stipulations for repayment.

Colleges may participate in major Federally funded student aid programs consisting of Grants, Loans and College Work Study. The loan program at most colleges is usually the most extensive

financial aid program that is offered. However advantages of these loan programs are that interest rates are kept to a minimum and repayment plans can be flexible and convenient. For detailed information regarding each of these programs, seek the advice and information of the Director, Office of Student Financial Aid at the college of your choice or the counselor at your high school.

Employment is one sure method of receiving money to help you through college. Most institutions have a work-study program in which you can obtain on or off-campus jobs that don't interfere with your academic schedule. Under the work-study program a co-op program that enables you to alternate in working one quarter and studying the next quarter is sometimes an option you might choose. In addition to the work-study program, many institutions have placement offices that are at your disposal in helping you find employment.

Although many financial aid programs are available to you, it is always helpful to begin by helping yourself. Earnings from summer

employment can be saved and applied to college expenses. You do not have to wait until the summer before you enter college to begin saving. If you have decided by your junior year in high school that you will be applying for college, then why not begin saving that summer?

One more thing, if you are seeking financial aid, then by all means apply for it early in your senior year.

The Transfer Student

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Many things are involved in transferring from one institution to another. One of the first things you should establish is the reason or reasons for the transfer. Then you should make sure a transfer will be to your advantage. For instance, you are required by most schools to take a certain amount of major courses at that one school. If you have already taken over half the courses in your major area of study, it would probably be unwise to make a change.

Since many colleges have different curriculum standards, often the amount of credit you've earned at one college won't be accepted at another college. This of course results in your having to take additional courses as well as to retake others.

It is also important for you to find out the graduation requirements of the college to which you wish to transfer. You should find out the exact number of credits that will transfer as well as those that will be lost in the transfer. If you're receiving some type of financial aid and will continue to need the aid,




check to see if the assistance you receive is transferable or if you will need to reapply for aid at your newly selected college.


Another aspect of transferring you should keep in mind is the type of institution you want to find. Would you prefer the same atmosphere and policies of your previous college, or would you prefer a college that is different? Maybe you have attended a small private school and now you would like to experience a large state college. Do not feel reluctant about the possibilities for transferring from a two-year community college or technical institute into a four-year school. Many colleges now have programs in which credit is accepted for training and skill previously developed at a technical institute. Possibly you can pursue a degree in the skill that you developed while in the technical school because there are four-year colleges that do offer degrees in some technical areas.

ALABAMA AGRICULTURAL AND MECHANICAL UNIVERSITY

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CHARACTER: Alabama A & M University was founded in 1875 and today is a public, four-year, coeducational university with a total fulltime day enrollment of approximately 3,496 (1,717 men, 1,779 women). The school is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

CAMPUS: The 850 acre campus is situated in the urban center of Huntsville. Forty-six buildings comprise the institution's facilities. The library houses approximately 204,647 volumes. Residence halls have a total capacity of 1,364. Thirty-nine percent of the student body lives on campus while 61 percent commutes.

FACULTY: Alabama A & M University has a complement of 208 fulltime faculty members, 35 percent of whom have earned the Ph.D. degree. The faculty-student ratio is 1 to 18.

ACADEMICS: The University's academic calendar is based on the semester system. Degrees offered include the Bachelor of Arts and the Bachelor of Science degree. 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The Robert R. Moton Memorial Institute, Inc.

The Robert R. Moton Institute, Inc. is a non-profit public corporation which provides a conference center for discussing problems of all dimensions.

The Institute, founded in 1958 to carry on the ideas and services of Dr. Robert R. Moton, stemmed from gatherings at his estate which have come to be called the "Capahosic Conferences."

Dr. Moton, the second president of Tuskegee Institute, retired from that position in 1933 to live in Virginia on the banks of the York River in Gloucester County.

Following the death of Dr. Moton, a group of friends and associates purchased the estate, formed the Robert R. Moton Foundation, and began operating the Moton Conference Center. Since the center opened, groups and organizations have met there to discuss such topics as education, employment, housing, voting, African development, and international peace.

In 1968, the Center began conducting workshops and fund raising programs involving college trustees, presidents and other officials. Today, the Center includes a library equipped with audio-visual aids, demonstration and recording equipment and a reference library on fund-raising and educational management for use by college officials and educators.

In addition to the Conference Center, the Moton Memorial Institute has guidance associations in four areas of college administration: the Moton Consortium On Admissions and Financial Aid (MCAFA), the Moton College Service Bureau (MCSB), the Moton Development

Consortium (MDC), and the Moton Management Improvement Program (MMIP).

The Moton Consortium on Admissions and Financial Aid offers college officials the opportunity to learn skills required for effective administration of programs in admissions, recruitment and financial aid. The Consortium demonstrates its ideas in workshops, campus visitations, and consultations. Technical assistance is provided by consultants and experienced professionals from the colleges.

The Moton College Service Bureau, a member of the Technical Assistance Consortium to Improve College Services, offers training in federal relations and proposal preparations seeking funds. Emphasis in workshops and writing seminars is placed on individual institutional planning and the development of proposals for federal support.

The Moton Development Consortium assists its 38 member colleges in organizing and implementing development programs. MDC also emphasizes fund raising, and offers programs in all areas of development.

The Moton Institute in cooperation with Hampton Institute and the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO) will conduct a year-round training program designed to meet the specific needs of business administrators of colleges serving predominately black and other minority student bodies. The program is designed to improve the allocation and management of the resources of these colleges by training in-service business officers from

these institutions. The instructional phase is a three-pronged program offering an orientation workshop; a follow-up consisting of an internship assignment or a program of on-the-site "shirt sleeve" technical assistance; and an evaluation workshop designed to evaluate both the experience of the participants and the subject matter areas of college business management. Faculty will be made up of outstanding persons in college and university management and prominent persons from the business world.

Future plans of the Institute include the completion of a Center for Advanced Study and the expansion of the Moton College Service Bureau.

The Center for Advanced Study will provide the opportunity for research and creative programs at higher levels for blacks and other minorities as well as for all others. The center which is to be located a short distance from the Moton Conference Center will have 16 residential units. Also, a complete library attuned to minorities, classrooms, workshops and special programs are available to supplement the regular academic programs.

The Robert R. Moton Memorial Institute, Inc. has a strong history of aiding black colleges in the areas of financial acquisition, administrative instruction, and program development. The expansion of the MCSB and the installation of new and varied programs of assistance demonstrates the Institute's dedication to the support of these colleges.

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
