ANIMALS IN AUTUMN

Illustrates typical autumn activities of a variety of animals-- searching for food, building warm homes, preparing to migrate or hibernate during the winter months. ANIMALS IN SPRING

ANIMALS IN SUMMER

Shows insects, frogs, snakes, squirrels, foxes, and bears in intimate glimpses of summer life in the animal kingdom. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1954)

ANIMALS IN WINTER

Shows the badger, woodchuck, chipmunk, caterpillar, owl, rabbit, blue jay, porcupine, bobcat and fox making various preparations for living through the winter. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1950)

ANIMALS OF THE DESERT

Shows numerous birds and animals living in a desert environment and describes the kinds of food they eat, ways they build their nests and the manner in which they protect themselves. (Bailey, 1963)

ANIMALS OF THE ZOO

Shows feeding time at the zoo and the different kinds of zoo animals and the food they eat. Also describes the conditions of native homes of some animals. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1933)

ANIMALS - WAYS THEY MOVE

Close-up action study of animal movements: Swimming- fish, porpoise, starfish, etc; land- millipede, rattlesnake, inchworm, grasshopper, toad, etc. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1956)

ANIMALS WITH BACKBONES

Shows the basic structural differences between vertebrates and invertebrates. Examples of the five groups of vertebrates - fishes, amphibians, reptiles, birds, and mammals - are shown and the characteristics of each group are emphasized. (Coronet, 1957)

ARCTIC BORDERLANDS IN WINTER

Life In Other Land series. Adaptation of plants and animals to an environment of unusually difficult living conditions, just south of the Arctic Circle; migrations and changes of animals preparing for winter; intense struggle for survival. (Coronet, 1948)

Depicts wild animals in their natural habitat, showing the care of mother animals for their young. The rock coyote, bear, skunk, raccoon, fox, rabbits, woodchuck, mink and others are shown. Traces the growth and development of the babies. (Grover Jennings, n.d.)

BEACH AND SEA ANIMALS

Describes the physical structure and activities of starfish, sea-urchin, crab, cuttlefish, octopus, crayfish, lobster, shrimp, snail, scallop and sea cucumber. Shows their methods of protection. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1957)

BEACH AND TIDE POOL LIFE

18 min sd col i-j-s-c \$6.75

Examines the varied life that inhabits the ocean shore including shellfish, sand dollars, algae, squid and other plant and animal life. Shows the dependence of these form of life on each other and on the sea. (International Film Bureau, 1968)

BEAR AND THE HUNTER

11 min sd b&w i-j-s \$3.75

Anund, the hunter, and his dog trail a great bear through the forests, over valleys and streams and into the mountains. When both man and dog are put to rout, bear proudly surveys domain. Photographed in northern Lapland. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1956)

BEAVER

10 min sd col p-i \$5.00

Describes the activities of the beaver in its natural environment; ways in which the beaver's teeth, feet, and tail help in swimming, eating, felling trees, and repairing a broken dam; the unique construction of a beaver house; importance of beaver as agent of conservation and as a valuable fur bearer. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1950)

BIG ANIMALS OF AFRICA

10 min sd col p-i \$5.00

A variety of the larger animals living in their natural environment, showing their size, shape, coloration, movements, and habits; includes the larger birds together with the land and amphibious animals. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1957)

BIG LAND ANIMALS OF NORTH AMERICA

11 min sd col p-i \$5.00

Shows various members of the sheep, deer, and bear family in their natural habitats; how they find food and shelter and protect themselves and their young. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1956)

BILLY AND NANNY--THE GOAT TWINS

11 min sd b&w p \$3.75

Antics of two baby goats as they grow up: feeding, milking and care of a flock of farm goats. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1953)

BIRTH OF THE RED KANGAROO

21 min sd col i-j-s-c \$7.50

Filmed sequence of the tamar wallaby in its native habitat and of a newborn young in the pouch of its mother. Describes mating, fertilization, method of detecting the occurrence of matings which are not observed, pregnancy, behavior of the pregnant female, the process of birth, and the journey of the newborn young of the red kangaroo to the pouch. (International Film Bureau, 1968)

BLACK BEAR TWINS

11 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Experiences of a family of campers observing a pair of small, hungry mischievous bears who play with blanket and ball, raid a beehive, nurse their stings in mud and swim in an adjoining lake. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1952)

BROWN BEARS GO FISHING

12 min sd col p-i \$4.75

Scenes of brown bears in Alaska as they eat, swim, fish, and care for their young. (Coronet, 1955)

CHIPMUNK AND HIS BIRD FRIENDS

10 min sd col p-i \$4.75

Shows chipmunks and squirrels storing their winter supply of acorns underground while birds search for insects in a pine tree; their sudden discovery of a bird food pantry which children have provided for them; closeups of many varieties of birds coming to eat the food. (Bailey, 1967)

CIRCUS ANIMALS

11 min sd b&w p-i-j \$3.50

Shows how circus animals travel in box cars and how they are unloaded and walk from the train to the circus grounds. Shows elephants helping unload tents and pulling wagons, the watering and feeding of elephants, camels and horses. A clown and his dog and a trained seal on horseback are some of the activities in the circus "backyard." (Academy, 1947)

COW

11 min sd col p-i \$5.00

A picture study of cows in a peaceful day in the pasture. Illustrates how they sound and presents close views of textures, colors, and shapes of cows and the activities of a new-born calf. (Dimension Films, 1968)

ELEPHANTS

11 min sd b&w p \$3.75

Illustrates the habits of elephants and how they are trained. Mumbo, a trained elephant, eats, drinks, bathes, scratches her back, does tricks and dances. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1940)

FARM ANIMALS

10 min sd b&w p-i \$3.50

Describes the feeding and milking of cows, feeding of hogs and piglets, shearing of sheep, caring for hens and chicks, the place of the riding horse, the farm dog and the cat and kittens. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1956)

FARM ANIMALS IN RHYME

11 min sd col k-p \$5.00

Uses whimsical rhymes to survey a farm and introduce familiar farm animals, to the sounds they make and the things they do. (Coronet, 1968)

FARM BABIES AND THEIR MOTHERS

10 min sd b&w k-p \$3.50

Introduces a cow and calf, ewe and lamb, sow and piglets, mare and colt, hen and chicks, cat and kittens, dog and puppies. The habits and economic importance of each animal are explained. (Film Associates, 1954)

FARMYARD BABIES

10 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

The farm dog, on her morning rounds, sees a variety of babies of the farmyard-- lambs, calves, colts, chicks and others. (Coronet, 1952)

FIREHOUSE DOG

10 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Freckles lives at the fire house, watches firemen clean and test fire engines, but is not allowed to go to a fire. One day the firemen take him along, and he wins a place as a regular member of the Engine Company Number One. (Film Associates, 1956)

FISH OUT OF WATER

11 min sd b&w i-j-s-c \$3.25

Fishermen have an exceptional grunion run. Shows grunion nesting in the sand, and the female's desperate struggle for survival after the eggs are fertilized. Laboratory analysis of embryonic development is made with photomicrography and time-lapse photography. (Moody Institute of Science, 1954)

FLIPPER THE SEAL

11 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Children at the zoo watch Flipper go through his antics, and one boy decides to learn more about seals. Commentary relates the seal's actions with printed words on the screen, such as waves, swimming, dive and fur. (Coronet, 1952)

FRANCES AND HER RABBIT

11 min sd col p \$5.00

Frances and Hopper, a white rabbit, are forced to stay indoors on a rainy day. As Frances paints a picture, Hopper selects the colors. (International Film Bureau, 1955)

GRAY SQUIRREL

11 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Cycle of squirrel's life from one week until fully grown. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1938.)

HERE COMES THE CIRCUS

10 min sd b&w p-i \$2.50

Shows all parts of the circus from the side show to the big top. (Castle, 1942)

HOPPY THE BUNNY

10 min sd col p-i \$3.75

Hoppy meets a raccoon and an owl, hops out of the deep woods and sees life on a farm. He is chased by a dog, but returns home safe and sound. (Coronet, 1952)

HOW ANIMALS DEFEND THEMSELVES

10 min sd b&w i-j \$3.75

Illustrates ways in which animals are adapted for protection against other animals and nature; speed and agility, tough shells and hides, sharp claws and beaks, camouflage and mimicry. (Young American Films, 1948)

HOW ANIMALS LIVE IN WINTER

10 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Winter scenes of birds, a snowshoe rabbit, raccoon, badger, skunk and deer are compared with some views of these animals at other times of the year to introduce such concepts as migration, hibernation and protective coloration which help children understand how animals adapt to winter living. (Coronet, 1956)

HOW ANIMALS MOVE

10 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Illustrates various ways in which animals are adapted to survive: wings, fins, bone structure and other adaptations. (Young America Films, 1948)

HOW NATURE PROTECTS ANIMALS

11 min sd b&w i-j \$3.75

Studies of various animal forms illustrate how some have special adaptations to hide themselves, some are adept at flight and others are equipped with special means to discourage attack by others. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1959)

HUMAN AND ANIMAL BEGINNINGS

13 min sd col p-i \$5.50

Presents basic information about human reproduction and concepts of the family. Views of a baby monkey, baby mice, newborn guinea pigs and rabbits, and fish, including eggs in which the live embryos are clearly seen. Uses animation and time-lapse photography to show a hatching duckling egg, human prebirth development and birth itself. (E.C. Brown, 1966)

KANGAROOS

10 min sd b&w i \$3.75

Habits and behavior of kangaroos in their natural habitat in Australia. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1953)

KITTENS ARE BORN

12 min sd col p-i-j-s-c \$6.25

Follows the female cat from pregnancy through labor and the birth of three kittens. Emphasizes the birth process and the parental care immediately following birth. (McGraw-Hill, 1971)

KITTENS, BIRTH AND GROWTH

11 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

Birth and first eight-weeks in the life of a family of kittens; two youngsters observe and help to care for the kittens. (Bailey, 1957)

LIFE IN THE OCEAN

16 min sd b&w i-j-s \$4.25

Many plants and animals of shore, shallow water, ocean depths and their relationship to each other, to the environment and to similar forms of life found on land are discussed. (Film Associates, 1955)

LIVE TEDDY BEARS

11 min sd b&w p-i \$3.75

The Australian koala bear, his appearance, size, food needs, and natural habitat are discussed. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1947)

MOOSE BABY (Revised Edition)

14 min sd col p-i-j \$5.50

A wildlife story about a baby moose as he grows from birth to maturity. Shows the moose as he learns from his mother, meets his forest neighbors and learns lessons of survival. (Arthur Barr, n.d.)

MOTHER CAT AND HER BABY SKUNKS

11 min sd col k-p \$5.00

A mother cat finds three orphaned baby skunks in the woods and raises them with her three kittens. She nurses them, bathes them and the kittens accept them as members of the family. (Encyclopedia Britannica, 1958)

PATTERNS OF THE WILD

26 min sd col \$1.75
