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ABSTRACT

As part of a larger study prepared to provide local leaders with information on socioeconomic characteristics and household attitudes in four Kentucky counties, this databook on Whitley County is compiled from 1961 (open country area) and 1973 (open country and nonopen country area) surveys. The sampling procedure involved a random selection of small-area sample segments and then a random selection of households to be interviewed. Interpretive summaries are provided for the following survey components: (1) Residential Characteristics; (2) Household Characteristics; (3) Level of Living; (4) Occupational Characteristics; (5) Income Characteristics; (6) Social Participation; (7) Opinion of Change in Quality of Life in County, 1973; (8) Opinion of Change in Quality of Life in Own Family, 1973; and (9) Opinion of Quality of Life Change in the U.S., 1973. Significant survey responses indicated that when compared with the combined responses of all four counties surveyed, Whitley County had proportionately more: older people; craftsmen (30 percentage); employed homemakers; dissatisfaction with a man's chances of getting ahead, fringe benefits, and amount of money earned; and favorable views on local change and less favorable views on own family change and U.S. change in quality of life. 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PREFACE

The purpose of preparing this databook is to provide local leaders and officials with information obtained from sample surveys of households in Harlan, Perry, Whitley and Wolfe counties. The data were compiled from surveys in 1961 and 1973--made for somewhat different but related purposes. Both surveys included information on selected social and economic characteristics and attitudes of the households and of family members thereby permitting comparisons of households at two points in time. The 1973 survey also obtained considerable information on attitudes about changes in aspects of the quality of life in each county since 1960.

Area sampling procedures were used in both instances to identify households from which information was obtained. In the 1961 survey only residents in open country areas of each county were interviewed, while the 1973 survey included residents of non-open country as well as open country areas. The sampling procedure involved a random selection of small-area sample segments and then a random selection of households to be interviewed in each segment. The sampling rate of open country households in each county was determined by dividing the number of open country households in each county by the total number of open country households in all four counties. Proportionate sampling rates also were used in non-open country areas. Consequently, the data obtained and summarized in the tables approximate those which would have been obtained if a simple random sample of households in all four counties had been drawn. In both surveys the person(s) interviewed were the household Head and/or Homemaker.

The survey in 1961 was made as part of an Agricultural Experiment Station research project on Factors in the Adjustment of Families and Individuals to Changing Conditions in Low Income Rural Areas. The 1973 survey is part of a research project on Rural Development and the Quality of Life in the Rural South. These studies--made in cooperation with Agricultural Experiment Stations in several southern states¹--reflect an interest in rural development, which has been maintained for more than a decade, by members of the Department of Sociology. Support of these research studies by the Agricultural Experiment Station, College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, is gratefully acknowledged.

INTERPRETIVE SUMMARY

Residential characteristics. If we generalize from the 1973 sample, the great majority of Whitley County families, whether in the open country or non-open country (towns), own and live in a single family house on a hard surfaced road.¹ Most of those interviewed said they had not changed residence in the past 5 years and did not desire to move, although this was less true of those in the towns (Corbin and Williamsburg) than in the country. Except for the somewhat greater mobility of the families in towns than those in the country in the past 5 years, the residential characteristics of Whitley County residents in 1973 were much like those in all counties studied (Harlan, Perry, Whitley, and Wolfe).

Since 1961, access of open country residents to the outside has improved tremendously, as it has in the other counties studied--32 percent then compared to 73 percent now living on a hard surfaced road. In 1973 the proportion of families living on farms had decreased to 5 percent (from 12 percent in 1961). Home ownership and residential satisfaction did not change much during the 12 years.

Household characteristics. The typical household in Whitley County in 1973 had 1 to 3 persons (64 percent) and a male head of household (78 percent). Most heads of households had had from 5 to 11 years schooling (61 percent), were married (74 percent) and had children living at home (51 percent). Their median age was in the late 50's and more than a third were 65 years or older. One out of 5 heads of households was widowed.

Compared with heads of households living in the towns, those in the country had had less schooling, but in other respects the differences in household composition were small. The proportion of one- and two-person households in Whitley County is somewhat greater, especially in the country, than in the four counties combined, and somewhat more Whitley County families consisted of a single person or married couple aged 60 or older. More household heads were 65 and over. In other respects Whitley County households in 1973 were much like those in all the counties surveyed.

In the past 12 years the size of country households in Whitley County has become much smaller; slightly fewer have children 18 or older living at home and more consist of a single person or married couple aged 60 or older. Heads of households living in the country in 1973 have had a little more schooling than was the case in 1961. In most respects the change in Whitley County, or lack of it, has been characteristic of all the counties studies.

Occupational characteristics. Only about half of the heads of household were "fully able to work" and employed full-time in 1973. This was true of both town and country household heads, and the proportions for Whitley County were slightly lower than for all counties combined. Craftsmen were the largest occupational grouping of male heads (30 percent), and

this group comprised a larger proportion in Whitley than in the four counties. Twenty-three percent of the homemakers were also employed outside the home, and the proportion of country homemakers employed (21 percent) was higher than in the four counties (16 percent).

In the past 12 years the percentage of household heads living in the country who are retired has increased substantially. Among the employed male heads the proportion in farm occupations has decreased drastically and the proportion of craftsmen has doubled. The percentage of homemakers in the country who are employed has greatly increased though it is still relatively small. These changes are similar to those for the four counties combined.

The typical employed male household head liked most aspects of his work, including the hours, steadiness, kind of work, working conditions, amount of responsibility, and work associates. About one out of two liked his chances of getting ahead, fringe benefits, and amount of money earned; but the proportion disliking each of these latter aspects was substantial too. Except for the chances of getting ahead and fringe benefits, about which residents of towns were more favorable than country residents, the differences by residence were small. In their opinions about their work Whitley County residents were much like those in all four counties combined.

Since 1961, satisfaction with work has generally declined on the part of employed male heads in the country. On more than half of the aspects satisfaction declined substantially and on other aspects there was little change. The biggest declines were in satisfaction with a man's chances of getting ahead (73 to 48 percent), fringe benefits (62 to 40 percent), and amount of money earned (70 to 48 percent). Although employed male heads in all counties tended to be less satisfied with most aspects of their work, the drop in satisfaction was often greater in Whitley than in all counties combined. In some counties, but not in Whitley, satisfaction with steadiness of work and working conditions increased substantially.

Level of living. Four of five families in Whitley County live in a house with 4 to 6 rooms, and this is about the same as in all four counties. Most of the homes in Whitley and in all counties have the various modern conveniences and have them in about the same proportion, but Whitley is a little lower in the proportion with piped water and the facilities dependent on it. Whitley does not differ from the other counties in communication items.

However, Whitley's country homes have substantially fewer material possessions than those in towns, and for many items the differences in Whitley County are larger than in all four counties combined.

Compared with the situation in Whitley County in 1961, the homes of country residents are somewhat larger now and material possessions have greatly increased. The proportion of households having a hot water heater, home freezer, electric sewing machine, inside flush toilet, bath or shower, air conditioner, vacuum cleaner, and telephone more than doubled in the 12 years. As remarkable as this is, there are many families who still do not have such important items as piped water, a modern kitchen, or modern bathroom; and in many cases the improvement in level of living has been less extensive than for residents in country areas of the other counties.

Communication items also increased substantially in Whitley and in all counties. In Whitley, as in all four counties in the past 12 years, while incomes have increased and the number of children in households have decreased, material possessions have increased substantially.

Income. While over half of the families in Whitley County had 1972 incomes above \$4,000, about 1 family in 5 had an income below \$2,000. Proportionately fewer country than town families (45 to 69 percent, respectively) had incomes of \$4,000 or more and twice as many had low incomes. In these respects incomes of families in Whitley County were similar to (although slightly lower than) those in all the counties combined.

Incomes of country families have increased substantially in Whitley County since 1961, as in all four counties. Moreover, the rate of increase in incomes of country families in Whitley County has been somewhat greater than for the four counties, such that the difference which formerly existed has been considerably reduced.

Salaries, wages, and profits from business was the major source of income for most families (51 percent), followed by various sources of retirement income (41 percent). But considerably more country than town families depended mainly on retirement income. The proportion of country families mainly dependent on Social Security and other retirement income increased substantially in the past 12 years, while those mainly dependent on income from operating a farm or from welfare decreased. Those getting part of their income from investments quadrupled to 16 percent. In most respects the 12 year changes in incomes and sources of income are similar to those in the four counties.

About a third of the male household heads in Whitley County considered their current income unsatisfactory and 41 percent said it was insufficient. Half of the country families but only a fourth in the towns thought their income insufficient. In these respects income dissatisfaction of male heads in Whitley County was similar to that in the four counties. However, in the past 12 years proportionately more of those living in the country have become dissatisfied with their incomes and this increase in dissatisfaction was greater in Whitley County than in the four counties.

Social participation. Although one family in 5 in Whitley County in 1973 was not participating in any formally organized group, such as a church, lodge, or civic club, 3 out of 10 were participating at a relatively high level. In Whitley County, as in the four counties, participation in such organizations was much greater in town than in the country but participation rates were generally higher in Whitley. The proportions of country families in Whitley since 1961, who participate little or none and the proportion who are "high" or "very high" participators have both increased, with a big decrease in the middle category. The same trend is evident in all four counties, but to a lesser extent.

The most popular leisure time activities in 1973 were television watching, games, and other activities indoors (69 percent) and various outdoor activities (45 percent), of which hunting and fishing were perhaps most common. Compared to country people, those in towns more often engaged

in "participant," "spectator," "neighborhood and community," "indoor" and "formal association," activities. In general, families in Whitley County participated less actively in all forms of leisure time activities than did those in all the counties surveyed.

Opinions of change in quality of life. Most of the people surveyed (74 percent) felt that "in general and on the average" the quality of life for most people in Whitley County had improved during the past decade. Proportionately more in towns (84 percent) felt the quality of life for most people had improved than in the country (69 percent), and slightly more people in Whitley County than in all four counties felt that improvement had occurred. In this respect the subjective opinions of most people contrast somewhat with the objective facts of the amount of improvement in incomes and levels of living noted earlier.

More than half of the respondents saw improvement in most of the specific aspects of the quality of life, namely, public schools, higher educational opportunities, agriculture, medical care and services, welfare programs, the situation for poor people, transportation, incomes, job opportunities, recreational opportunities, public utilities, public housing, opportunities for both the young and the elderly and for Blacks, and the county as a place to live. Moreover, for 14 of these 16 quality of life aspects, half or more of the people surveyed thought that the current situation was "pretty good" or "very good." Although for some aspects, such as opportunities for the young and for the elderly, country people were as likely as those in towns to believe that improvement had occurred, for most aspects this belief was most prevalent among those living in the towns.

It is evident that the people of Whitley County were more optimistic than those of all counties combined as to the favorable direction of change in the past decade. In contrast to the other counties, substantially higher proportions of both town and country people in Whitley thought there had been improvement in the situations for agriculture, jobs, recreation, public housing, the young and the old, and for Blacks. Medical care and health services is the only quality of life aspect for which the Whitley majority for "improved" was smaller than in all the counties.

However, on some aspects of life--county government, law enforcement, obedience to laws, buying power of income, and religion--Whitley countians were more divided as to the direction of change in the past decade; and as to politics and political parties and the quality of the physical environment most were convinced that no change had occurred. Opinions of persons in all the counties were similarly divided on these matters, though Whitley countians usually assessed the situation a little more favorably than others. Substantially more in Whitley saw improvement in county government, though the percentage was still low.

Opinions of change in own family situation. When interviewed, one-third rated their own family situation as "fair" or "very poor" five years ago, but only 15 percent rated it that way currently. Forty-three percent thought their current situation was "good" or "very good" and 55 percent thought that they were "somewhat" to "much" better off than 10 years ago. However, about 1 out of 6 thought that they were "somewhat" to "much" worse off now.

Town and country people in Whitley tended to differ in their subjective assessments of what had happened in their personal situation in the recent past. Relatively fewer country people thought that they were "better off" and relatively more thought they were "worse off." Some who rated their family situation as "good" five years ago, now see it as only "pretty good", while many who regarded their former situation as "very poor" or "fair" now consider it as "pretty good." Thus, most country people (52 percent) now see their current situation as average while only a quarter (25 percent) of town people rate their situation this way and fully 62 percent say their situation is "good" or "very good." In all of the comparisons of Whitley and the other counties, both overall, over time, and between country and town people, Whitley countians assess their own family situations a little less optimistically than the people in the other counties assess theirs-- in contrast to their feeling more favorable than other counties about the quality of life change for "most people" and the improvement and present situation in most aspects of the county's life.

Opinions of quality of life change in the U.S. Whitley countians were clearly less satisfied with national than with local trends, and they were also less satisfied about life in the United States than were people in the other counties. More Whitley countians said that life in the U.S. is getting worse than said it is getting better. The majority said it was about the same or a mixture of better and worse, there was not much difference between town and country people on this question.
