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ABSTRACT

The directory provides information on approximately 425 service programs for children with severe mental illnesses including autism and schizophrenia. Programs are listed alphabetically by name within state groupings. Usually provided are name, address, telephone number, name of director, and information on whether the program is day or residential, length of time program has existed, enrollment capacity, fees, physical description, admission criteria, staff, and program characteristics. Provided is an alphabetical index of all facilities with information on ages served, whether day or residential, and whether public school, summer, or recreational. Also included is the questionnaire used to survey facilities, and listings of chapters of the National Society for Autistic Children, international societies and representatives for autistic children, other directories, and legal service agencies.

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Foreword

This *Directory*, which catalogs service programs for children with severe mental illness, grew out of an urgent request to the National Institute of Mental Health from a citizens group, the National Society for Autistic Children. It represents a joint effort between this private advocacy group and a public agency to provide needed information to parents and other caretakers of children in distress.

Programs and facilities listed in the *Directory* include those which serve children diagnosed as autistic, schizophrenic, or as having any of the other childhood psychoses or severe mental disorders. Estimates of the prevalence rates of severe mental illness among children reported for the United States and England range from 2 per 10,000 to 4.5 per 10,000. Some of these children, labeled by diagnostic categories, have been denied the kind of care their individual circumstances require. We must go beyond summary labels and look carefully at the individual child's perception, speech, social relations, and sense of self. In this way we will learn more about his or her needs as a developing person with a variety of deficits, problems, and competencies.

As will be seen in this *Directory*, there has been a considerable increase in services to mentally ill children nationwide. In the last 10 years a significant number of new agencies have been established. The trends among all agencies are to provide more day care and school facilities and to involve parents more in the treatment process. The family, medical personnel, and educational personnel are joining forces to form a tripartite service team.

We hope that this *Directory* will assist those parents and professional personnel who need to find services for children and that it will also serve as a communications mechanism for agencies involved in the areas. Finally, it is our hope that this work will act as a further incentive for the inclusion of each child in the human services system in the most meaningful and effective way possible. We at the National Institute of Mental Health welcomed participation in this joint activity because, for all of us, the provision of excellent treatment services for every child in this country remains a major goal.

Preface

There is a rising social consciousness about the strange, tragic, and severely handicapping mental illnesses of early childhood. But there are still pitifully few services (and still fewer appropriate services) available anywhere at any price.

To compound the problem, parents are often cut off from information which would enable them to find even those few services. Because its members are primarily parents of children with one of the most severe forms of mental illness in children—autism—the National Society for Autistic Children (NSAC) is acutely aware of these problems. Through its Information and Referral Service, NSAC has worked diligently to match those who provide service with those who need it. Mail coming into our office reminds us daily of the critical importance of information and the urgency with which parents seek it. For several years we have felt the imperative for a new, updated directory. It was with this in mind that we approached Herbert L. Rooney, chief of the NIMH Citizen Participation Branch, with our proposal for this publication. The NIMH subsequently agreed to fund the project.

Until now, the only single useful publication for locating services for these children was the *Directory of Facilities for Mentally Ill Children in the United States*, published by the National Association for Mental Health. Unfortunately, that *Directory* has long been out of date. It, like most other directories of services for handicapped children (even mentally ill children), listed mostly services based on a medical model—this is, hospital or psychiatric services—and missed many of the smaller, but significant, education programs throughout the United States. Our acquaintance with families with an autistic child led us to believe that only a small portion of the population of psychotic children are in mental hospitals—and even fewer should be. Our hunch that education is “where the action is” turned out to be correct. The entries in this *Directory* reflect the trend of caring for the mentally ill child in his community, in a structured environment, close to his family. Most services are day programs. Even fewer children would need to be institutionalized if all had access to such programs.

Although the growing list of facilities is heartening, we caution parents to read the entries carefully. If, for instance, a child's label is *autistic*, he may not be eligible—even in many State mental hospitals with a children's unit; or, even if eligible, there might be a quota for children with this diagnosis. Also, there are relatively few programs designed specifically for the special needs of some children. Often, some categories of mentally ill children—notably autism—are “accepted” into already existing programs for some other kind of handicap.

Information for this *Directory* was compiled from each facility's or program's answers to a 56-item questionnaire, a facsimile of which appears in the Appendix. Although we used a set format to summarize the information, where possible we used the facility's own description of its program (omitting promotional adjectives). Readers can obtain more personalized views about these facilities by contacting a nearby NSAC chapter; a list of chapters appears in the back of this *Directory*.

And note these things as you read:

- If current enrollment lists only a small number, it is possible that the number reflects only the mentally ill children in the entire program.
- If fees are not mentioned, it is because no information was supplied.

• If there was a question about listing a facility in this *Directory*, we chose to err on the side of overinclusion.

Despite our efforts to provide maximum information in each entry, the *Directory* is not complete; parents are still quite on their own when making judgments about a program judgments that often profoundly affect their lives and those of their children. We hope that this *Directory* will help to make that judgment better informed and less painful. We hope, too, that it will give parents alternatives which possibly they did not have before.

We encourage users of the *Directory* to alert us to omissions, additions, errors (including purely mechanical ones), or any other kind of information which would be useful in serving the needs of mentally ill children.
