States that sex-discrimination evil exists long before library board chooses its man.

Points out that men are more represented in administration in all professions;
claims prejudice exists towards male librarian's image.

Survey of 70 libraries to determine attitude toward hiring and promoting married
women; majority reported placements were according to ability and educational
qualifications.
- Banning, Mrs. M.C. "Women as administrators." Library Journal 63:569 Aug. 1938
Author regrets that sex should influence administrative choice but thinks
militant feminist attitude toward condition equally bad.

- Alvarez, R.S. "Women's place in librarianship." Wilson Bulletin for Librarians 13:175-8 Nov. 1938
Supports position that women hold majority of library administrative positions.
- Munthe, W. "Librarianship - a feminine vocation?" In his American Librarianship from a European Angle pp. 155-60, Chicago: ALA. 1939
Random thoughts on the overfeminization of the profession, reflecting many points of view generally true for the 1930's.
- Kaiser, W.H. "War between the sexes." Wilson Bulletin for Librarians 13:336 Jan. 1939
Reply to Alvarez article; author feels that women do not have equal chance for advancement.
- Stokes, K.M. "Warning - soft shoulders." Wilson Bulletin for Librarians 13:470-1 Mar. 1939
Warns women not to expect soft treatment because they are women; they must be librarians first in order to get equality.
- Cowper, R.S. "Not in our stars." Library Association Record 42:166-7 June 1940
Discusses previous articles on status of women; urges women to demand equal pay for equal work, etc.
- Liddle, H. "Resigned on marriage." Library Assistant 34:67-8 Apr. 1941
States that women do not become unfit for work when married, so they should not be forced to resign.
- Matthews, Mrs. R.E.S. "Married women librarians." Library Journal 66:650-1 Aug. 1941
Discusses how married women suffer much more discrimination than single women in all fields.
- "Letter to the editor." Library World 46:84 Dec. 1943
An opinion that women are being held in lower positions by men supervisors.
- Library Association. "Royal Commission on Equal Pay." Library Association Record 48:56-7 Mar. 1946
States that men and women should be given equal pay for equal jobs; wants to avoid having profession dominated by one sex.
- Enser, A.G.S. "Shall the misses be masters?" Library Association Record 50:124-5 May 1948
Series of statistics presented showing preponderance of women in profession, which author feels is detrimental.
- Munn, R. "It's a mistake to recruit men." Library Journal 74:1639-40 Nov. 1, 1949
Author feels men will secure more attractive positions because governing bodies prefer men.
- Oboler, E.M. "Men librarians." Library Journal 75:66,98 Jan. 15, 1950
Claims that men make better administrators than women because of various physiological and psychological reasons.
- Banister, J.R. "Just how right is Mr. Munn?" Library Journal 75:141-2, 155 Feb. 1, 1950
Library boards pay a woman less than a man for doing same job.

- McDonough, E. "Men librarians." Library Journal 75:422,478 Mar. 15, 1950
Argues that delimitation of field into "women's work" and "men's work" is unfortunate, causing suspicion and mistrust.
- Heathcote, L.M. "Men librarians." Library Journal 75:518,520 Apr. 1, 1950
Claims that women resent inferior type of man entering profession, not men as such.
- Enser, A.G.S. "Figures and facts." Library Association Record 53:14-15 Jan. 1951
Statistics showing how many women as compared to men are in the British Library Association and in ALA.
- Hintz, C.W. "Personnel administration-discrimination, despotism, democracy." PNLA Quarterly 16:15-22 Oct. 1951
Out of 129 respondents, 65.1% feel discrimination exists against females.
- Vivian, M.E. "Discrimination against women in the professions; a survey of recent literature." PNLA Quarterly 16:83-9 Jan. 1952
Mentions research done on discrimination towards women, followed by bibliography on status of women in professions.
- Bryan, A.I. The Public Librarian: A Report of the Public Library Inquiry. New York: Columbia University Press, 1952. 474 pp.
Includes discussion of separate male and female economic and promotional patterns, with women at top in smaller libraries and men at top in larger libraries with higher salaries.
- Wilden-Hart, M. "Women in librarianship." Assistant Librarian 49:78-80 May 1956
Author feels women's inherent faults cause them to be passed over for many awards and opportunities.
- Lightfoot, R.M., Jr. "In defense of nepotism." Library Journal 82:1610-16 June 15, 1957
Urges that each applicant be considered solely on basis of merit.
- Hamilton, W.J. "American librarianship: some women." Library Review 124:238-47 Winter 1957
Discusses women who he believes were outstanding librarians.
- Holt, E.C. "Study of Western Reserve University Library School Graduates, 1934-1953." Master's Thesis, Western Reserve University, 1957, 29 pp.
- Harvey, J.F. "Variety in the experience of chief librarians." College and Research Libraries 19:107-10 Mar. 1958
Study shows higher percentage of male heads with greater variety of experience; married males considered most mobile, single females least mobile.
- "Fie, if thy name be woman!" Library Journal 84:556 Feb. 15, 1959
Report of Who's Who of American Women where editors found only a small number of librarians included.
- Paulus, M. "Why lady librarians don't get into Who's Who!" Library Journal 84:1166 Apr. 15, 1959
Contends most librarians were probably too busy to bother to fill in the questionnaire about who they are and how good they are.

Stone, L.H. "Visit to another world." Library Journal 84:1350 May 1, 1959

Asserts that few women will gain wholehearted knowledge of mankind and manners which characterizes a useful librarian.

Colton, G.A. "Women administrators." Library Journal 84:1712 June 1, 1959.

Argument over who make better administrators fruitless, because this is individual difference and few are good in all areas.

Harvey, J.F. "Apply, if thy name be woman." Library Journal 84:1712-13 June 1, 1959.

Defends 1957 study The Librarian's Career; considered women candidates for every vacancy he has had.

Haslam, D.D. "Why more men librarians in Britain?" Library Journal 84:3084-5 Oct. 15, 1959

Indicates normal practice until after World War II was to have a woman resign after marriage.

Elliott, L.R. "Salute to the vanguard." Texas Library Journal 36:7-10 Mar. 1960
Praises seven women who did solid professional work in the early 1900's in Texas libraries.

Simsova, Mrs. S. "Married women in libraries." Assistant Librarian 54:130-2 July 1961
Author feels women should not sacrifice personal lives for profession by not marrying.

Harvey, J.F. "Advancement in the library profession." Wilson Library Bulletin 36:144-7 Oct. 1961

Study shows males in 92% of high-level positions in large academic libraries and 66% in public libraries.

Joyce, C. "Suppliant maidens." Library Journal 86:4246-9 Dec. 15, 1961
Contends women's work is necessary but not to be taken seriously.

Schultz, S. "Remarks on women in theological librarianship: a panel on professional library personnel." In American Theological Library Association, Summary of Proceedings, pp. 100-10, Washington, D.C. 1961
Equality hampered because women are barred from ordination, which is required for faculty status.

Erlich, M. "Man-to-man talk." Library Journal 87:356,358 Feb. 1, 1962
Author thinks women have the right to be disgusted with male leadership in profession.

Goodfleisch, R. "More from Mineola." Library Journal 87:358 Feb. 1, 1962
Author wonders why men are entering librarianship and scooping up the best opportunities and salaries when field is so limited.

"Survey to be made of part-time jobs for women." Library Journal 87:4406-7 Dec. 1, 1962
Announces N.Y.C. study to find opportunities for part-time jobs.

Parrott, S. "Analysis of the Biographies of Librarians Listed in Who's Who of American Women, 1958-59." Master's thesis, Atlanta University, 1962, 44 pp.

"Cheesecake and charter." Liaison 38 June 1963
Claims that the physical attributes of women librarians are increasingly noticed and publicized.

Roberson, B.E. "Library trustees and library school directors: what are you looking for?" PNLA Quarterly 29:195-7 Apr. 1965
Library school graduate at age 50 offers her success story to prove older women are good potential source of help.

Shera, J.M. "A better class of mouse." Wilson Library Bulletin 39:677 Apr. 1965
Contends prestige of librarianship diminished during last century due to feminization of the profession.

Holden, M.Y. "The status of women librarians." Antiquarian Bookman 36:647-8
Aug. 23, 1965
Address at 1965 convention of National Women's Party

Moon, E.E. "Tokenism at the top? Women in minority." Library Journal 90:4019
Oct. 1, 1965
Editorial reacting to Holden's address, stating situation is not so simple.

Jordan, R.T. "In defense of women." Library Journal 90:5126 Dec. 1, 1965
Points out that the 74 Association of Research Libraries members have male directors.

Shera, J.H. "Kinder, kueche, und bibliotheken." Wilson Library Bulletin 40:365 Dec. 1965
Points out certain inherent dangers in experimental financial aid program to married women with families who are ready to return to study and work.

Gaines, E.J. "Library education and the talent shortage." Library Journal 91:1770-1
Apr. 1, 1966
Considers high proportion of women who withdraw from profession for motherhood not good for stable operations; that rapid personnel turnover inhibits solid, long-range programs.

Ward, P.L. Women and Librarianship: An Investigation into Certain Problems of Library Staffing. London: Library Association, 1966, 59 pp.
Study considers female labor force and suggests ways of re-entering profession after break for marriage and family.

"Hiring of married librarians recommended in British study." Library Journal 91:20-23 Apr. 15, 1966
News item summarizing Ward study.

"Married women who are also chartered librarians." Library World 67:334 May 1966
Ward report welcomed because married women librarians have deplored lack of opportunity to obtain employment.

Cronin, A. "The second career." Drexel Library Quarterly 2:339-44 Oct. 1966
Urges library profession to do more to recognize potential of group who want to re-enter field and make adjustments accordingly.

"Equal pay in the public library of South Australia." Australian Library Journal 15:191 Oct. 1966
Government implements five-year scheme to equate salaries.

Drennan, H.T., and Darling, R.L. "The public librarian." In Library Manpower: Occupational Characteristics of Public and School Librarians, pp. 1-14, Washington, D.C.: Government Printing Office, 1966
Median annual earnings 23.6% lower for women than men in 1961.

Blankenship, W.C. "Head librarians: how many men? How many women?" College and Research Libraries 28:41-8 Jan. 1967
A survey of administrators in 660 colleges.

"A study of 1967 annual salaries of members of the Special Library Association." Special Libraries 58:217-54 Apr. 1967
Most analyses not divided by sex, but mobility profile shows men more able to move for better positions than women.

Ginzberg, E. and Brown, C. Manpower for Library Services. Columbia Univ., Conservation of Human Resources Project, Sept. 1967.
Assessment of librarian resources in 1960's; gives some opinions on implications for field because of high proportion of women.

Brisley, M.A. "Cornelia Marvin Pierce: Pioneer in Library Extension." Master's thesis, University of Chicago, 1967, 80 pp.

Wells, S.B. "Feminization of the American Library Profession, 1876 to 1923." Master's thesis, University of Chicago, 1967, 105 pp.

Hooper, J. "Half a librarian is better than none . . ." Canadian Librarian 24:338-40 Jan. 1968
Advocates part-time employment, particularly for women with family who want to stay in profession.

Ormsby, A. "For want of a year." Assistant Librarian 61:91 Apr. 1968
British married librarian who must stop working regrets that her experience will not count when she returns later.

Ladenson, A. "Fair Labor Standards Act as applied to libraries." ALA Bulletin 62:389-401 Apr. 1968
Prohibition of employers from discriminating on basis of sex in payment of wages for equal work.

Seymour, G.M. "Part-time posts for married women." Library Association Record 70:134 May 1968
Laments lack of work for part-time librarians.

"Comment." Assistant Librarian 61:148-9 July 1968
Letters stating cases where married women aren't allowed part-time work to qualify them as chartered librarians in Britain.

Bradley, G. "Comment." Library Association Record 70:186-7 July 1968
Argues against part-time employment; claims it is not efficient library practice.

"Comment." Library Association Record 70:213 Aug. 1968
More letters regarding library profession as possible place for part-time work, but suggesting that this is difficult to obtain.

Porter, D.M. "Married women and librarianship." Assistant Librarian 61:226-7
Oct. 1968

Outlines four problems deterring married women from returning to a full or part-time job in the profession.

Bradley, B.W. "A Study of the Characteristics, Qualifications and Succession Patterns of Heads of Large U.S. Academic and Public Libraries."
Master's thesis, University of Texas, 1968
Survey of 50 largest public libraries showed 86% headed by males; all of 50 largest academic libraries with male heads.

Reynolds, A.L., and King, C. "Why not partnership librarians?" Bay State Librarian
58:3-4 Feb. 1969

Proposal for administrators to consider two part-time employees to fill one full-time position, particularly for women who wish to remain in field but have small children.

"Women in professional library work." New Zealand Librarians 32:4-31 Feb. 1969
Four sections dealing with N.Z. survey, a discussion on married women returning to work, and need for part-time work as a step in their careers.

Reamer, P. "Consider the wife as librarian." ALA Bulletin 63:309 Mar. 1969
Letter discussing difficulties of recruiting women for the profession and problem of lack of mobility of married women.

Schiller, A.R. "Academic librarians' salaries." College and Research Libraries
30:101-11 Mar. 1969
Results of a poll on salary of one out of every five academic librarians; men's salaries were higher than women's.

Schiller, A.R. "Widening sex gap." Library Journal 94:1098-2000 Mar. 15, 1969
Statistics supporting contention that women librarians likely to become increasingly disadvantaged in relation to men.

Sable, A.B. "The sexuality of the library profession: the male and female librarian." Wilson Library Bulletin 43:748-51 Apr. 1969
Deals with history of male dominance of profession and stereotype characteristics of male and female.

Marchant, M.P. "Faculty-librarian conflict." Library Journal 94:2886-9 Sept. 1, 1969
Argues that the faculty, predominately male, attributes inferior status to librarians, largely female, by transfer of status process: that upper reaches of library staff (male) tend to have faculty status while lower positions don't.

Ramsden, M. "Hanging together". (1969 presidential address) Assistant Librarian
62:158-64 Nov. 1969
Mentions that only 10% females make librarianship life-long career in Britain; consequently, males fill senior posts.

Barber, P. "Ladies in waiting." Synergy no. 24:22-25 Dec. 1969
Asks women to become aware, active, and questions why one is perpetuating inferiority complex by saying one would rather work under a man.

Morrison, P.D. The Career of the Academic Librarian: A Study of the Social Origins, Educational Attainments, Vocational Experience, and Personality Characteristics of a Group of American Academic Librarians. ACRL monograph no. 29. Chicago: ALA; 1969; 165 pp.
 Among many items studied, there are some data classified by sex.

Reeling, P.A. "Undergraduate Female Students as Potential Recruits to the Library Profession." Ph.D. thesis, Columbia University, 1969, 239 pp.
 Study of effectiveness of library recruitment whose subjects happen to be women.

Schiller, A.R. Characteristics of Professional Personnel in College and University Libraries. Research series No. 16. Springfield: Illinois State Library, 1969, 118 pp.
 A study of many items; of particular note, salaries of men and women show wider gap as experience increases.

Simpson, R.L., and Simpson, L.H. "Women and bureaucracy in the semi-professions." In Etzioni, A. ed. The Semi-Professions and Their Organization, pp. 196-265. New York: Free Press, 1969
 Explores problem of career commitment among women; argues that family roles and expectation of discrimination reduce women's performance.

Stone, E.W. Factors Related to the Professional Development of Librarians. Metuchen, N.J.: Scarecrow Press, 1969, 281 pp.
 Study includes 1956 and 1961 MLS graduates, with some background information for women in terms of education, experience, salary and need for continuing education.

Darter, P. "One point of view--born a woman." Assistant Librarian 63:42, 44 Mar. 1970
 States that women are missing out in British library profession and need to go out and prove themselves.

Murphy, E.D. "Women and blacks: sexual discrimination in the library profession." Library Journal 95:959 Mar. 15, 1970
 Parallels between blacks' and women's struggle for equal opportunity.

Schiller, A.R. "The disadvantaged majority: women employed in libraries." American Libraries 1:345-9 Apr. 1970
 Proposes actions by ALA to ameliorate situation of women who, though in majority, are disadvantaged.

Wetherby, P. "Librarianship: opportunity for women?" In 16 Reports on the Status of Professional Women. Pittsburgh: Know, Inc. Apr. 1970
 Brief report presented to first conference of Professional Women's Caucus.

Detlefsen, E.G., and Schuman, P. "Overdue: women's liberation movement-I." Wilson Library Bulletin 44:962,964-982 May 1970
 Surveys attitudes and stereotypes; indicates ways in which librarians can influence and change acculturated roles.

Hathaway, G.W. "Overdue: women's liberation movement-II." Wilson Library Bulletin 44:963,965 May 1970
 Urges that women be given information and freedom in their options within and without the institution.



Freedman, J. "Liberated librarians: a look at the second sex in the library profession." Library Journal 95:1709-11 May 1, 1970
Surveys aspects of, and suggests possible solution to, the fact of male ascendancy in librarianship.

"Discrimination discussed." American Libraries 1:644-5 July 1970
Letters commenting on Schiller's, article (Apr. 1970) with response by Schiller stating that action to overcome obstacles, of inequality need not wait for comprehensive research.

Detlefsen, E.G. "Women's liberation-meeting at the ALA conference."
AB Bookman's Weekly 46:90 July 20-27, 1970
Describes beginning of task force on women.

Forsman, C. "Up against the stacks: task force on status of women in libraries," Synergy no. 25:9 July-Aug. 1970
Discusses issues of salary and promotion discrimination, under-representation of women in library education and administration of libraries, need for improved working conditions.

Schuman, P. "Status of women in libraries: task force meets in Detroit."
Library Journal 95:2635 Aug. 1970
Identifies areas of action needed; administrative guidelines, investigation of materials portraying women, discrimination clearinghouse, information services for women.

Carpenter, R.L., and Carpenter, P.A. "The doctorate in librarianship and an assessment of graduate library education." Journal of Education for Librarianship 11:3-45 Summer 1970
Among many items surveyed is one showing that salaries for men with doctorates are far better at each age level and for each type of position than for women.

"SLA salary survey: 1970." Special Libraries 61:333-48 July-Aug. 1970
Shows that in all categories of survey (job function, subject, highest academic degree) men's salaries clustered above overall mean and women's salaries clustered below mean.

"Team employment." Library Journal 95:2853 Sept. 15, 1970
Letters in response to Freedman's article in May 1970 LJ.

Gilliam, B.H. "Housewife-librarian." Library Journal 95:3704-5 Nov. 1, 1970
Case of a mother on a part-time job; author laments lack of financial aid to part-time students.

Regnier, F.D. "Librarianship- a woman's profession?" University of Wisconsin Library News 15:11-13 Nov. 1970.

American Association of University Women. Campus 1970: Where Do Women Stand? Research Report of a Survey on Women in Academe, Washington, D.C.: Dec. 1970
Among many other topics in study, this survey shows women less likely to be head librarians in schools with enrollment over 10,000 and in public institutions; more likely in private schools or with enrollment under 1000.

Presthus, R. Technological Change and Occupational Responses. Washington, D.C. U.S. Department of Health, Education, Welfare. 1970 (ED 045 129)
States that avoidance of conflict, order, dependency are common among librarians; that these bureaucratic characteristics are aggravated by the uncertain career commitment common in female occupations.

American Library Association. Social Responsibilities Round Table. Task Force on Women. Newsletter Vo. 1-1970 —
Reports projects of task force and gives general news of women's materials and activities — 4 to 6 issues a year.

Rothenberg, L., Rees, A.M., and Kronick, D.A. "An investigation of the educational needs of health sciences library manpower: IV. Characteristics of manpower in health sciences libraries." Bulletin of Medical Library Association 59:31-40 Jan. 1971
Shows male professionals in survey had highest rates of job and geographic mobility and salaries.

Maloney, R.A. "The 'average' director of a large public library." Library Journal 96:443-5 Feb. 1, 1971
Study of directors in 26 libraries in 1969, 1950, and 1930, with analyses of age, sex, training, etc., showing fewer number of women in top positions.

Hughes, M. "Sex-based discrimination in law libraries." Law Library Journal 64:13-22 Feb. 1971
Survey shows that male head librarians have higher salaries than women, that there is a concentration of males in large law school libraries and administration positions at younger age.

Carey, J.T. "Overdue: taking issue with the issues." Wilson Library Bulletin 45:593-4 Feb. 1971
Author feels lack of mobility and childbearing of married women do not advance careers but that their retarded careers cannot be blamed on prejudice.

"ALA salary survey: personal members." American Libraries 2:409-17 Apr. 1971
Discloses salary figures which indicate inequities between men and women.

Shaffer, K.R. "Decision making" Library Journal 96:1677-80 May 15, 1971
Includes case studies from his book — one deals with a mother whose family responsibilities conflict with working.

Gerhardt, L.N. "Melvil! Thou shouldst be living." Library Journal 96:2567 Sept. 1, 1971
Editorial introducing issues of women in profession

Cassell, K.A. "The legal status of women." Library Journal 96:2600-3 Sept. 1, 1971
General discussion of federal laws against sex discrimination with some reference to the condition of librarians.

Lowenthal, H. "A healthy anger." Library Journal 96:2597-9 Sept. 1, 1971
Call to direct anger at situations which perpetuate inequalities between sexes in the profession.

Schuman, P., and Detlefsen, G. "Sisterhood is serious: an annotated bibliography."
Library Journal 96:2587-94 Sept. 1, 1971

Contains 116 items covering women's movement, with plea that librarians recognize programming according to sex.

Tuttle, H.W. "Women in academic libraries." Library Journal 96:2594-6 Sept. 1, 1971
Urges women to believe in own potential and ability and then develop own career.

"Equal employment opportunity: affirmative action plans for libraries."
American Libraries 2:977-83 Oct. 1971
Reviews federal legislation and gives suggestions for libraries to implement it; cites ALA resolution on equal opportunity for women.

"Women's lib reactions." Library Journal 96:3255 Oct. 15, 1971
Letters in response to Sept. 1 issue on women in profession.

"Affirmative action committee for women appointed at CU." Library Journal 96:3552-3
Nov. 1, 1971
University of California at Berkeley library staff charged to develop program to ensure women optimum employment and promotion.
