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ABSTRACT

This guide to films and filmstrips on early childhood is organized into six categories: child development (normal and special, from infancy to preadolescence); community and parent education (helpful to persons planning parent programs); culture and children (showing children learning and developing in different cultures); current trends in early childhood education (such as programmed learning; free schools, home-based centers, open education); curriculum (useful for training students and parents in various approaches to learning); and teacher training (at college and university level). Each film is described briefly and rated with the Winick rating system which uses one-, two-, three-, or four-star ratings to provide the user with a comparative evaluation measure. Other bibliographic information provided includes: (1) length of showing time, (2) whether in color or black and white, (3) purchase or rental price, (4) distributor/rental sources, (5) producer, and (6) year released. 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INTRODUCTION

There are many people working with young children today in child care centers and in home-based situations. Every good child care program trains the adults who work in that center. Every good center provides thoughtful information to its parents. One of the best ways to set the stage for training or for parent discussion is through the use of films or filmstrips.

The Washington Center for Early Childhood Education receives many requests for audio-visual listings. There are many good films and filmstrips available in the State of Washington, but knowing where to go, how to order, and what is available without cost has been a problem particularly for the newcomer in the field.

In order to serve the staff of the WCECE and the people in the State who are striving for better early childhood training programs, this listing has been prepared. In many cases the catalog, Films for Early Childhood: A Selected Annotated Bibliography, compiled by Mariann Pezzella Winick has been used. Dr. Winick serves on the jury for Child Development and Teacher Training Films for the American Film Festival. Her annotations and * ratings seem to agree with this compiler's perceptions regarding many films available within this State. Therefore, with her permission, I have used her comments and indicated her authorship with (W) just below the starred rating. Some bibliographic data has been taken from the catalog of the source nearest to CWSC students and teachers. Others are written by the compiler.

In some cases films have not been rated. That means that they have not been previewed by this compiler, but the reader should be aware of their existence. As this catalog is up-dated, in the future, more ratings will be available.

I am grateful to the staff of the WCECE for assisting me in rating films. Each film has been considered on the basis of aesthetics, content, and audio-visual quality.

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SOME PRACTICAL NOTATIONS ON USING THIS FILM GUIDE

Six categories have been designated to describe the audio-visual materials in this catalog.

Each film will be listed with bibliographic data under the category that best describes its content and use. Films are also listed alphabetically in the index which appears at the beginning of the catalog. Each entry in the index is followed by a code letter or letters which refer to the heading under which the complete data on that film is given.

The categories are briefly:

- . CHILD DEVELOPMENT (Normal and Special) (CD)
Films related to growth and development from infancy to preadolescence. Although it is not our intent to provide a complete catalog of films for special children, the intent is to include the special child in the total developmental picture of the young child.
- . COMMUNITY AND PARENT EDUCATION (CPE)
Films helpful to students planning parent programs; helpful to teachers of future early childhood teachers, and films helpful to community leaders in promoting awareness of the need for support of early childhood programs.
- . CULTURE AND CHILDREN (CC)
Films which present children learning and developing in different cultures--some within the United States and some in other countries.
- . CURRENT TRENDS (CT)
Films which represent different trends in early childhood education or in open education. Includes programmed learning, free schools, home-based centers, nursery schools.
- . CURRICULUM (C)
Films that are useful in training students and parents in concepts and approaches to learning. Most films are valuable to the open concept environment.
- . TEACHER TRAINING (TT)
Films that are primarily of value to the college teacher of students wanting to train to work in open-concept schools or in early childhood programs.

The Winick rating system is used to provide the user with some comparative measures. The scale is a four, three, two, one-star scale:

A most unusual play park in action. Children actively involved in play and construction. An interesting feature of this park is that parents are not allowed. This film points out the marked contrast to our cement and sand adventure playgrounds. AECOM SERIES OF MOTOR SENSORI DEVELOPMENT * * *

Three films of some length, giving (W) a great deal of visual information on Piaget theory, related to infants from four months to twenty-two months. They are done under the direction of Dr. Sibylle Escalona.

Introduces a four and one-half-year-old patient and shows his behavior during his first meeting in eight months with his parents. 1964.

DAY IN THE LIFE OF A FIVE-YEAR-OLD

The Clarke School, North Hampton, Mass. Documents success of oral education of deaf children at Clarke School for the Deaf. A twenty-year-old girl whose progress is traced from childhood through adolescence into adulthood is shown. The sequences are helpful in seeing growth and progress. This film shows one of the approaches to education of the deaf.

EVERYBODY'S CHILD

Dr. C. R. Strother, Dr. Alice Hayden and Van Hinkle discuss the problem of mental retardation in Washington State and the need of alternative programs to adequately cope with retardation. The role of educational resources as well as current programs and plans for change within the state are discussed.

New and encouraging methods of treatment and therapy have been developed for the perceptually handicapped and brain damaged child. For many years, children with minimal brain damage were grouped with the retarded and did not receive special training. Now through programs of exercise and counseling, these children can be helped. 1969.

A special school for blind children in England. Children appear to be normal in many sequences. Indoor and outdoor activities are well presented. The approach used is one that bears attentive viewing and reflective thought. BBC-TV.

An unusual film, originally a TV program on the use of "mind drugs." Case histories of a child saved from mental retardation, and the partial recovery of an apparently hopeless psychotic, increase of I.Q. with drugs. Raises questions of chemical brain washing. A long film, useful for discussion, especially in regard to attitudes and values related to human growth and development. Carousel.

FEARS OF CHILDREN * * * *

A film of immense value if one is willing to ignore the dresses, manners and background of this older piece. The content is rich. Paul, a five-year-old, is involved in a series of fears. His fears, though observable to the adults, are not placed into any context. He is treated as a grown person rather than a five-year-old in need of protection and support from the adults about him. For those interested in symbolic behavior there are several scenes that offer good examples of Freudian ideas related to oedipal feelings. This film was the first made by Francis Thompson who later gave us ALIVE, seen at the Johnson's Wax Pavilion at the World's Fair. Cinematically it can hold an audience that should be told of its vintage so as to prepare them for the datedness of the sets. (Frequently students feel that the datedness of sets indicates a datedness of the material.) MHFB.

FIREMAN IS SAD AND CRIES, THE * * * *

Insight into the world of the child, his

fantasies, fears and visions. Paintings of children and children painting reveal commitment and sensitivity of these five-year-olds. Useful with students, parents, and with children themselves. Szir & Stantie.

FIRST STEPS

This is one of the few films on crippled children. The film is a United Nations contribution, and deals with the care and understanding needed by such children and their parents. Early training is the most important part of the film; home life and the value of a trained therapist in starting a child on the path to walking are seen.

FOOD AND MATERNAL DEPRIVATION

A filmed presentation of some of the work of a French research unit studying the effects of maternal deprivation on child development. Several typical attitudes are shown in the response of the child to adult giving him care; autistic, indifference, indiscriminate acceptance, excessive intake and active refusal. The children shown are between the ages of ten months and four years. It should not be used as an introduction to the subject. L'Assoc. pour la Sante Mentale de l'Enfance, Paris, France.

FOR DAWN AND OTHERS LIKE HER

Illinois Dept. of Mental Health Day treatment program for seriously and functionally retarded children and their families. Offers a view of what community groups might encourage state organizations to sponsor in meeting the needs of both children and families with special needs.

FOUR AND FIVE-YEAR-OLDS IN SCHOOL

Differences and overlap in the development of these two age groups. There is considerable overlap between four and five years and much individual variation. Shows four-year-olds largely perfecting and elaborating the skills and interests

of two and three-year-olds. Five-year-olds, are beginning to enter the world of older children. Portrays largely middle-class children.

FOUR CHILDREN

Four four-year-olds in a Headstart program are featured. They are observed at home and at school. Differences in behavior and development are observable. This film can be used to help develop observation and recording skills. Headstart.

FROM SOCIABLE SIX TO NOISY NINE

FRUSTRATING FOURS AND FASCINATING FIVES

The film is a bit dated, yet it can be viewed over and over again to help students develop their own observational skills. FRUSTRATION PLAY TECHNIQUES

The work of Dr. Eugene Lerner of Sarah Lawrence College in developing methods of dealing with frustration are well presented in this film. The film deals with how the child encounters and deals with ego challenges in the form of

blocking activity, frustration and hostility. Dr. Lerner sets up situations that will incur certain types of responses; the audience views a child responding to the situation. The film needs a good leader and well-prepared audience to benefit from a viewing.

This film records an experimental situation. Grasping by the infant is a very complex activity. Its relevance to learning processes and modes of attending to learning are well shown through the use of camera over a period of one year. GROWING UP WITH DEAFNESS * *

There are few films on education and the deaf available. This film features the methods used at the Lexington School for the Deaf in New York City. It is of special interest in that it acts as a follow-up film to one made ten years earlier. The same children are seen, now quite grown up, and flashbacks make their progress very dramatic. The methods observed deal with the teaching of speech and lip reading. To date a film on sign language has eluded this viewer. Campus films.

GROWING UP WITHOUT SIGHT * * *

This film, produced by Dorothy Burlingame and Clifford Yorckerin collaboration with Anna Freud, helps to clarify the life possibilities of the blind. The children shown are blind, highly intelligent, and are attending a nursery school for the blind. The role of teacher in planning and carrying through is seen as we follow three children through one part of the day. Hampstead Child Therapy Clinic, England.

GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT OF CHILDREN,
THE

This film allows us to glance inside the laboratory of the research worker in child growth and shows how highly sophisticated anthropometric instruments and methods are applied. The medical aspects of growth and some pathological deviations from the norm are illustrated. The study of growth is in a constant state of development. The film outlines the present state of knowledge, but also mentions some of the major problems that still remain unsolved. 1968.

GROWTH FAILURE AND MATERNAL DEPRIVATION

Demonstrates the essential features of infantile progressive emaciation in two children, one 13 months old and one almost four years old.
