Bendixson, Terence. Without wheels, alternatives to the private car. Bloomington: Indiana University Press, 1975, 256p.

This stimulating and timely book on the future of transportation has two central themes: first, it has become desperately urgent that we revolutionize our whole strategy for moving things and people around; second, there is no single panacea.

Terence Bendixson looks at the whole problem, covering everything from city planning to the design of vehicles.

He examines a number of new technologies including such things as driverless vehicles, electronic guidance systems and moving sidewalks, discussing the ways in which they can be put to use and also their limitations.

He also looks at new ways of using existing vehicles - trains, buses, taxis, bicycles and cars themselves - and most importantly examines new concepts of town planning and life-style that could reduce the need to travel. He gives detailed and fascinating information on experiments in cities from Scandinavia to California where forward-looking planners are trying to reduce their citizens' dependence on the car and to promote the best of all transport strategies - keeping people within walking distance of their needs.

Without Wheels is based on a world-wide survey of its subject. It is also distinguished by its combination of a radical approach with a refusal to be lured into the over-easy answers of "gee-whizz technology."

It comes at exactly the right moment, when we face both a soaring cost of energy and a rising tide of opposition to the old idea of cramming more and more cars and trucks onto the roads and destroying city and countryside to make room for them. Forthright and comprehensive, it signals the way toward our recovery from dementia automobilis, the black disease of expressways, streets, alleys, and parking lots that presently deface our cities and towns.

Preface: "The title "Pedestrian Planning and Design" may be considered by some to be a misnomer, since only the Good Lord can plan or design a pedestrian. The intent of the book, however, is to help fill the broad gap that exists in the planning and design of building and street spaces for comfortable and convenient human use. Much of this book is based on the author's dissertation, "Designing for Pedestrians," but this title was not used because it did not fully convey the objective and scope intended.

The beginning of the book establishes the importance of walking in urban design, and the problems of pedestrians in today's cities. There is a brief insight into some of the human physiological and psychological factors that affect the planning and design of pedestrian spaces. The traffic and space characteristics of pedestrians are developed in sufficient

détail for an understanding of pedestrian traffic relationships. Supplementary written and pictorial descriptions of pedestrian traffic interactions at various human space occupancies provide a useful supplement for evaluating the environmental design quality of pedestrian building and street spaces.

The objectives of pedestrian planning programs, study procedures and methods of plan implementation are illustrated, and the design discussion is supplemented by illustrative examples. The book closes with a short review of some of the programs that are in progress for the improvement of the pedestrian environment."

"Perspectives of Federal Transportation Policy contains the edited proceedings of an AEI conference in which academicians and government policy makers addressed questions of transportation regulation and federal transportation policy.

Part One looks at surface transportation James C. Nelson traces the history of the ICC and concludes that conditions today are very unlike those in existence when regulation was established. Alexander L. Morton argues that the railroads could be made more competitive and service improved through consolidation into a handful of transcontinental railroads. Robert D. Tollison and Alan K. McAdams criticize the Nixon administration's approach to regulatory reform and the Northeast railroad crisis, contending that more basic change is necessary. All four writers endorse deregulation.

Part Two is concerned with airline regulation. William A. Jordan examines the history of CAB regulation and concludes that Congress did not intend economic efficiency to be the overriding policy goal. In separate papers, George W. Douglas and Arthur S. DeVany both find that CAB regulation has resulted in excess capacity whose value to the consumers is not worth its cost. Each recommends lower fares and more competition, made possible by less regulation.

In Part Three, George Eads asks why economists have not had more effect on regulatory policy. He suggests they might do better by focusing on the equity effects of regulation rather than the narrower question of economic efficiency.

Part Four reviews federal transportation programs. Yale Brozen puts these in perspective by noting their common characteristic: each heavily subsidizes some sector of the economy, but meets its avowed objectives very inefficiently, if at all. Ross D. Eckert examines the Airport Development Aid Program and recommends using the price mechanism to allocate resources more efficiently. Likewise, George Hilton finds the Urban Mass Transit Program wasteful, because it unduly stresses rail transit lines using linear routes rather than broadly structured systems making greater use of buses. James C. Miller, III appraises Amtrak and concludes it will require continuing, perhaps increasing, public subsidy. Herbert Mohring finds the costs of the Interstate Highway System approximately double what would appear to be warranted.

In Part Five, government policy makers respond, John W. Snow, a deputy assistant secretary of the Department of Transportation, defends the administration's approaches to regulatory reform and the Northeast rail crisis. ICC Commissioner A. Daniel O'Neal

sees some room for return in surface transport regulation, while supporting regulation as necessary and desirable. Gary L. Seevers, members of the Council of Economic Advisers, expresses optimism over the chances for significant regulatory reform. Roy Pulsifer, assistant director of the CAB's Bureau of Operating Rights, argues that deregulation of the airline industry is very unlikely.

In the final part, DOT Under Secretary John W. Barnum outlines the many opportunities for academicians to influence transportation policy."
