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ABSTRACT

Unemployment increased substantially among all youth in the labor force except college graduates in the year ending in October, 1974. Data were collected as part of the Current Population Survey and relate to persons 16 to 24 years of age in the civilian noninstitutional population. Estimates on the number of graduates are based on a sample, and two tables are included in the discussion. High school dropouts were the most severely affected by increased job market competition, with their unemployment rate rising over four percentage points. Negro high school graduate and dropout unemployment rates were twice that of whites. Changes in the college student body reflected a higher percentage of 20 to 24 year old part time students who were combining work and school, with an increased enrollment among women. College freshman and college graduate unemployment rates remained approximately the same as in the previous year. Appended material takes up the bulk of the document and presents definitions and explanations of the basic labor force concepts, sample design, estimating methods and data reliability of the survey, and 17 supplementary tables. 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

# Students, graduates and dropouts in the labor market, October 1974

UNEMPLOYMENT INCREASED substantially among all youth in the labor force except college graduates in the year ending in October 1974. Between October 1973 and October 1974, the number of unemployed 16- to 24-year-olds increased by nearly 600,000. (See table 1.) Data collected once a year in October as part of the Current Population Survey provide information on students, graduates, and dropouts.<sup>1</sup> One-third of the unemployed were students, many of whom were looking for part-time work, but most were out of school and looking for full-time jobs. The unemployment rate among out-of-school youth rose from 8.2 to 10.8 percent and among students from 11.5 to 13.1 percent (not seasonally adjusted). The unemployment rate for all persons 16 years of age and over was 6.0 percent.

School enrollment status, years of schooling, training, and job experience all contribute to the qualifications of young persons seeking employment and either limit or broaden the range of their job opportunities. Among teenagers, labor force participation is more of an option, and school attendance limits their availability for employment. Among persons not enrolled in school, educational attainment, labor market experience, and marital status are key factors in their labor force status.

Almost 6 out of 10 youth 16 to 24 years old were not enrolled in school in October 1974. Three-fourths were at least high school graduates, including 7 percent who were college graduates and 15 percent who had attended but not graduated from college. The majority of out-of-school youth were in the labor force in October; participation rates ranged from 64 percent for the high school dropouts to 92 percent for the college graduates. (See table

1.) A greater proportion of high school graduates were in the labor force than a year earlier, while participation continued at about the same level for school dropouts and for those who had attended or been graduated from college. High school dropouts were the most severely affected by the increased competition in the job market. Their unemployment rate rose over 4 percentage points, compared with an increase of 2.6 percentage points among high school graduates and a smaller increase for persons with 1 to 3 years of college. The unemployment rate for Negro<sup>2</sup> high school graduates and dropouts remained twice that of whites.

College graduates numbered 1.5 million among the almost 20 million 16- to 24-year-olds not enrolled in school in October 1974. Although public attention has been directed toward the difficulties experienced by recent college graduates in finding jobs with career potential, they had not felt the impact of the declining economy as much as persons with lesser educational attainment. Their unemployment rate was about the same as a year earlier.

*1974 graduates and dropouts.* Of particular interest is the labor force status of high school graduates of 1974 who were not enrolled in college, and dropouts, during 1974, whose relatively limited work experience and training put them at a disadvantage. The labor force participation rate for men was lower for 1974 graduates (90 percent) than for all high school graduates (95 percent). (See table 2.) The labor force rate for women graduates (78 percent) was considerably higher than for all women high school graduates who had not gone to college (70 percent), possibly because of home and child-care responsibilities assumed since graduation which inhibited their labor force activity.

Some 800,000 youth in the 16- to 24-year age group left school during the year ending in October 1974 without completing high school, continuing the upward trend in the number of dropouts per year since the late 1960's. The labor-force participation rate of recent dropouts was about the same as in 1973. With the increase in layoffs and a lesser demand for unskilled labor, recent dropouts faced even greater jobseeking competition, and their unemployment rate doubled. Among blacks, recent graduates and dropouts had the same high unemployment rate, while the rate for white recent graduates remained about half that of white dropouts.

Student unemployment is generally regarded as a less serious problem than unemployment among youth seeking permanent jobs. Since 1967, the unemployment rate of students has remained consistently above that of out-of-school youth.

Over-the-year changes in labor force activity were among students 20 to 24 years old. Their number in the labor force and labor force participation rate were higher than in 1973, whereas the labor force rate for teenage students was unchanged (table 1). However, both teenagers and older students had higher unemployment rates than in 1973.

Changes in the labor force activity of older stu-

dents reflected the changing composition of the college student body. Most of the 280,000 over-the-year increase in college enrollment was among 20- to 24-year-olds who were studying part time while working on their regular job. From October 1973 to October 1974, the proportion of students attending college part time rose more than 2 percentage points to 17 percent. The rapid growth of community colleges in recent years has made higher education more readily available for young people in the work force. Also, combining school and work may be necessary in a time of rising educational costs.

*"New" college students.* Changes in the college student body can be found among the 875,000 16 to 24 year old students enrolled in October 1974 who were not enrolled in school a year earlier. As shown in the following tabulation, half of these returnees were freshmen; the others had dropped out at some time during their undergraduate or graduate study.

The increase in college enrollment was larger among women, some of whom may have interrupted their studies earlier and were now able to return to school. Almost 100,000 more women were part-time college students and also in the labor force in October 1974 than a year earlier. The number and proportion of women 20 to 24 who were full-time students and in the labor force also increased, quite possibly in response to increasing educational costs.

*Recent high school graduates in college.* Among the 3.1 million high school graduates in 1974, about half were enrolled in college in October of that year. (See table 2.) Both the number and proportion enrolled were unchanged from 1973. The proportion of blacks, which had dipped in 1973, returned to the level of the early seventies and was not significantly different from that for whites. Most 1974 graduates were 18 to 19 and were full-time students, although a higher proportion attended part time than in earlier years. Labor force participation and unemployment rates for these freshmen were unchanged over the year, in contrast to the overall increases among college students. □

#### FOOTNOTES

From October 1974 to April 1975, the number of unemployed youth 16 to 24 years old increased by 965,000 as their unemployment rate rose, from 12.5 to 16.9 percent (seasonally adjusted). This report, however, focuses on the situation as of October 1974 when supplementary information on youth in and out of school was collected and tabulated for the Bureau of Labor Statistics by the Census of the United States. Data relate to persons 16 to 24 years of age in the civilian noninstitutional population in the calendar week ending Oct. 12, 1974. Estimates of the number of graduates may differ from figures published by the U.S. Office of Education, which are based on the total population and all age groups.

Since the estimates are based on a sample, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census. Sampling variability may be relatively large in cases where the numbers are small. Small estimates, or small differences between estimates, should be interpreted with caution.

The most recent reports in this series were published in the *Monthly Labor Review* in September 1974, pp. 48-52 (graduates and dropouts) and October 1974, pp. 66-67 (school age youth), and reprinted with additional tabular data and explanatory notes as Special Labor Force Reports 168 and 170.

\* Data for all persons other than white are used to represent data for Negroes, since the latter constitute about nine-tenths of all persons other than white in the United States.

## Appendix

This report contains, in addition to the article from the August 1975 issue of the Monthly Labor Review, the following material:

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## Explanatory note

THE ESTIMATES in this report are based on supplementary questions in the October 1974 Current Population Survey conducted and tabulated for the Bureau of Labor Statistics by the Bureau of the Census. The basic labor force concepts, sample design, estimating methods and reliability of the data are described briefly in the following sections. 1/

### DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Population Coverage. Each month trained interviewers collect information from a sample of about 47,000 households located in 461 areas in 923 counties and independent cities, with coverage in 50 States and the District of Columbia. The estimates for this report include persons 16 to 34 years of age in the civilian noninstitutional population in the calendar week ending October 12, 1974. The civilian noninstitutional population excludes all members of the Armed Forces and inmates of institutions.

School Enrollment. The school enrollment statistics are based on replies to the enumerator's inquiry as to whether the person was enrolled in school. Enumerators are instructed to count as enrolled anyone who had been enrolled at any time during the current term or school year in day or night school in any type of public, parochial, or other private school in the regular school system. Such schools include elementary schools, junior or senior high schools, and colleges or universities. Persons enrolled in special schools not in the regular school system, such as trade schools or business colleges, are not included in the enrollment figures. Persons enrolled in classes which do not require physical presence in school, such as correspondence courses or other courses of independent study and training courses given directly on the job, are not reported as enrolled in school.

Full-Time and Part-Time Enrollment in College. A person is classified as enrolled in college full time if he was taking 12 hours of classes or more during an average school week, and part time if he was taking fewer hours.

High School Graduation Status. Persons who were not enrolled in school at the time of the survey were asked whether they had graduated from high school. Those who had graduated were asked when they completed their high school education. Persons who had not graduated, that is, school dropouts, were asked when they last attended a regular school. Those who were enrolled in college at the time of the survey were also asked when they graduated from high school.

Age. The age classification is based on the age of the person at his last birthday.

Race. The population is divided into three groups on the basis of race: white, Negro, and "other races." The last category includes Indians, Japanese, Chinese, and any other race except white and Negro.

Marital Status. Women are classified into three categories according to their marital status at the time of the interview: Single; married, husband present; and other marital status. A woman is classified as "married, husband present" if her husband was reported as a member of the household even though he may have been temporarily absent on business, vacation, on a visit, or in a hospital, etc., at the time of the interview. The term, "other marital status" applies to women who are married with husband absent, widowed, or divorced.

Employed. Employed persons are all those who, during the survey week, (a) did any work at all as paid employees or in their own business or profession, or on their own farm, or who worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family, or (b) did not work but had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labor-management dispute, or for personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for the time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs.

Unemployed. Unemployed persons are all those who did not work during the survey week, made specific efforts to find a job within the preceding 4 weeks, and were available for work or would have been available during the survey week except for temporary illness. Also included as unemployed are those who did not work at all, were available for work and (a) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off, or (b) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Duration of Unemployment. Duration of unemployment represents the length of time (through the current survey week) during which persons classified as unemployed had been continuously looking for work. For persons on layoff, duration of unemployment represents the number of full weeks since the termination of their most recent employment. A period of 2 weeks or more during which a person was employed or ceased looking for work is considered to break the continuity of the present period of seeking work.

Reasons Unemployed Persons Looked for Work. Unemployed persons are classified in the following six groups based on the reasons they are jobless: (1) "On layoff" if they expect to be called back to work; (2) "Lost job" if the job loss is permanent (these two groups are considered involuntarily unemployed); (3) "Quit job" if they ended their employment voluntarily; (4) "Left school"

if they graduated, quit, or were expelled from school; (5) "Wanted temporary work" if they were looking for short-duration work, either full time or part time; (6) "Other" includes persons who are looking for work for financial reasons, discharge from the Armed Forces, or for other reasons not included in any of the above groups.

Civilian Labor Force. The civilian labor force comprises the total of all civilian persons classified as employed or unemployed according to the above definitions.

Not in the Civilian Labor Force. All persons not classified as employed or unemployed are defined as not in labor force. Persons doing only incidental unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are classified as not in labor force.

Occupation, Industry, and Class of Worker. For the employed the data on occupation, industry, and class of worker refer to the job held in the survey week. Persons with two jobs or more are classified in the job at which they worked the greatest number of hours in the survey week. The unemployed are classified according to their latest full-time civilian job lasting 2 weeks or more.

Hours of Work. The statistics on hours of work relate to the actual number of hours worked during the survey week. For persons with more than one job, these figures refer to the number of hours worked in all jobs during the week.

Full-Time and Part-Time Workers. Full-time workers are persons who worked 35 hours or more during the survey week, and those who worked 1 to 34 hours but usually work full time. Part-time workers are persons who worked 1 to 34 hours during the survey week and usually work only 1 to 34 hours. Persons with a job but not at work during the survey week are classified according to whether they usually work full or part time.

Sums of Distribution. Sums of individual items--whether absolute numbers or percentages--may not equal totals because of independent rounding, of totals and components. Percentage totals, however, are always shown as 100 percent.

#### RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

Estimating Procedure. The estimating procedure used in this survey inflates weighted sample results to independent estimates of civilian noninstitutional population by age, race, and sex. These independent estimates are based on statistics from the 1970 Census of Population and other data on births, deaths, immigration, emigration, and strength of the Armed Forces.

Variability. Since the estimates are based on a sample, they may differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained if

a complete census had been taken using the same schedules and procedures. As in any survey, the results are also subject to errors of response and reporting. These may be relatively large in the case of persons with irregular attachment to the labor force.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability, that is, of the variations that might occur by chance because only a sample rather than the entire population is surveyed. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially measures the effect of response and enumeration errors but does not measure any systematic biases in the data. The chances are about 2 out of 3 that an estimate from the sample would differ from a complete census by less than the standard error. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

Tables 1 and 2 show approximations of the standard errors in this survey. They should be interpreted as indicators of the order of magnitude of the standard error rather than a precise standard error for any specific item.

The following examples illustrate their use. Table A shows that about 3,605,000 men 16 to 24 years old enrolled in school were in the labor force in October 1974. The same table shows that the population of this age-sex group, both enrolled and not enrolled, was 16,508,000. Table 1 shows the standard error on the estimate for this age-sex group to be approximately 75,000. The chances are about 2 out of 3 that the difference between the sample estimate and a complete census count would be less than 75,000. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference would be less than 150,000.

These 3,605,000 men represented 47.1 percent of all 16-to-24 year-old men enrolled in school. Table 2 shows the standard error of 47.1 percent with a base of 7,648,000 to be about 0.8 percent. Consequently, the chances are 2 out of 3 that a complete census count would have disclosed the figure to be between 46.3 and 47.9 percent, and 19 out of 20 that the figure would have been between 45.5 and 48.7 percent.

The reliability of an estimated percentage that is based on sample data for both numerator and denominator depends upon the size of the percentage and the size of the total upon which the percentage is based. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding absolute estimates of the numerators of the percentage, particularly if the percentage is large (50 percent or greater).


