
ABSTRACT

The Lake County (Indiana) Public Library provides a guide to materials for the deaf. The fiction list is annotated. 

THE ACUPUNCTURES MURDERS by D. Steward
Sampson Trehune is about to try acupuncture at the hands of a world-famous specialist. It is a last, desperate attempt to overcome the deafness he has suffered since childhood.

AND NOW TOMORROW by R. Field
Emily Blair, is one of the Blairs who have controlled the Peace-Pipe mills for generations. Happily engaged to marry Harry Collins, life looks to her smooth and fair, when an illness, which strikes suddenly, deprives her of her hearing.

CATCHER IN THE RYE by J. D. Salinger
In his psychological study of the rebel teen, Holden Caulfield, Salinger illustrates that while speech is silver, silence is golden. Holden gets fed up with modern life and speaks of pretending to be deaf so as to avoid useless conversations.

CHRISTMAS TALES by C. Dickens
In "DR. Marigold," one of Dickens Christmas Tales, the hero is a boasterous circus "barker" with a heart of gold. After the tragic death of his retarded daughter and wife, he adopts a deaf and dumb child, Sophy.

A DANCE TO STILL MUSIC by B. Corcoran
Margaret has lost her hearing and does not intend to go to any school for the deaf, so she doesn't go to any school. When her mother decides to remarry there seems nothing to do but to run away. A new life begins.

THE HEART IS A LONELY HUNTER by C. McCullers
The story takes place in the South. Its chief character is John Singer, a deaf mute, who,

when the story opens loses his only friend,
another mute

HIDE AND SEEK by W. Collins

As a result of a circus accident as a child,
the heroine becomes deaf and mute. She is
adopted by a compassionate artist whose
wife is bedridden. The first half of the
book focuses on the education and rehabili-
tation of the heroine.

HUE AND CRY by E. Yates

It is 1836 and the Austins, their two sons
and their daughter Melody, who can neither
hear nor speak, live on a New Hampshire farm.
Although members of the Hue and Cry, men
banded together to enforce the laws, the
Austins shelter an Irish boy who is wanted for
stealing a thoroughbred horse.

I AM ELIJAH THRUSH by J. Purdy

Albert Peggs is hired by the aged wealthy
Millicent DeFrayne to spy on Elijah, the
mime, poet, and painter.

Thursh finds himself in love with his great
grandchild who is deaf.

This is a short novel, demanding close
attention.

IN THIS SIGN by J Greenberg

This story deals with gifts and power, and
the silent world of the deaf. Abel and
Janice Ryder, leave an insensitive school
and home for the handicapped, marry and
enter life among the hearing.

THE MALLEN GIRL by C. Cookson

The central figure is Barbara, spoiled deaf
ward of Miss Brimore. Jealous of Sarah

Waite, Barbara throws the girl into a pit. Miraculously, Sarah lives. Another miracle takes place in the story; Barbara regains her hearing.

THE MORNING AND THE EVENING by J. Williams
Widow Darby had cared tenderly for her son, Jake, for forty years. But when she died, there was no one to watch over the gentle child-man, so the people of Marigold, Mississippi, sent him to an asylum, and then brought him back again—to his death.

THE NEW YORKERS by H. Calisher
The story deals with a wealthy New York Jewish family (one member of which is deaf), their family connections, friends and acquaintances, during an eventful 12-year-period, 1943-1955, in which the life of each member of the family is overshadowed by a dark and violent secret having to do with the death of the mother.

NOT IN THE CALENDAR by M. Kennedy
Two girls of the 1880's escape wasted lives largely through force of inner spirit. Wyn, born a deaf-mute, becomes a noted artist sustained in great measure by Caroline Knevett's instinct for encouragement which she eventually channels into work with deaf children. The crossings and separations of the girls' paths are told within a family history of the 12 Knevett children from manor house days at Slane St. Mary's through births, destinies, and deaths into the 1930's.

ORDEAL BY SILENCE by P. Andrew
Sponsors for the canonization of the deaf-

and-dumb monk, Philip of Evesham, present the deposition of 10 persons speaking in chronological order. Those testifying are a Welsh serving-woman who describes Philip's illegitimate birth, the foster brother who loved and protected him, a most unholy monk who tried to destroy him, a body servant of King Henry II who credits Philip with the king's deathbed repentance, a French spy employed by Prince John to discredit Philip, a kindly earl, a merchant whose ambitions were balked because of Philip, a Jew whose life he saved, a prostitute, and a second monk who found peace of soul through Philip.

OUR JOHN WILLIE by C. Cookson

Orphaned and impoverished by a mine disaster in England in 1852, David Halladay and his deaf and dumb younger brother, John Willie, are taken in hand by an eccentric yet kindly woman in the poignant but unsentimental peean to individual triumph over adversities human and mechanical.

PRINCE OF INDIA by L. Wallace

In The Prince of India the prince surrounds himself with six bodyguards—all of whom are deaf.

RAISE HIGH THE ROOFBEAM, CARPENTERS by J. D. Salinger

Salinger uses a deaf character to illustrate the ideal of silence and the blissful ignorance of those who are immune to our noisy world. It brings out that there is a striking simularity in the problems of the deaf and the dilemma of the modern man.

SEED BENEATH THE SNOW by I. Silone

Pietro Spina, younger son of a prominent family of southern Italy, who has long been in open rebellion against the Fascist government is forced to flee from home and seek refuge in the hills.

STRAWBERRIES IN THE SEA by E. Ogilvie

Deserted by her husband for a more attractive woman, Rosa flees to Bennett's Island to lick her wounds, set out her lobster pots, and work her way out of despair. Little by little things improve, thanks to cousin Edwin who has been deaf since birth, the people on the island and good hard work.

THE TALISMAN by S. W. Scott

In The Talisman, Sir Kenneth of Scotland, who is really the Prince Royal, disguises himself as a deaf slave in the service of King Richard. The King uses the deaf imposter as a spy to test the loyalty of his allies.
