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
ABSTRACT

The projection is made that collegiate enrollment in the South will stabilize by the early 1980's and will decline in most states by the mid-1980's unless there are increases in the admission of part-time and older students and/or the share of the region's high school graduates who enter postsecondary education. Selected statistics are presented in tabular form on: population and economy; institutions of higher learning; enrollment; degrees; institutional finances; student finances; and faculty and administration. A list is also included of agencies responsible in each Southern state for coordination of postsecondary education. (LBH)

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FOREWORD

Growth of higher education in the Southern states, which SREB *Fact Books* have been documenting biennially for the past decade, is entering into a period when more attention will be paid to the educational outcomes than to the inputs. The earlier *Fact Books* have highlighted the dramatic acceleration of college admissions and attendance which were a major concern of colleges and universities in the 1950's and 1960's. Today there is increasing interest in number of degrees produced, levels of concentration, and quality of instruction.

The outcomes of education are not as easily seen nor as readily counted as are the inputs. This *Fact Book* still updates more about what goes into the educational process rather than what results from the educational experience. But those who are close to campuses across the region do have personal acquaintance with significant progress in the quality of educational outcomes, even while quantitative growth has been foremost. The progress has not been uniform, and numerical expansion has not always been matched with improvement in quality. A casual glance at future college age population projections (page 11) gives notice that enrollments are bound to level off in most states, and growth increasingly will be judged in qualitative rather than in quantitative terms.

We trust that this selection of statistics on postsecondary education in the South can assist in promotion and planning for continued improvement of the post-high school learning structure in the coming years.

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FACT BOOK HIGHLIGHTS 1975 AND 1976

POPULATION

From 1970 to 1975 the South's growth, now equal to that of the fast-paced western states, was nearly double the national rate. The SREB states increased their total population by 8.8 percent during the period.

The impact of this growth upon individual states in the South, however, has varied considerably (see Table 1). Nearly 25 percent of the South's growth and more than half its net immigration resulted from population changes in Florida. That state's population grew by 23 percent from 1970 to 1975.

Other states with substantial increases were Arkansas, Texas, and South Carolina. Those below the national average were Louisiana, Maryland, and West Virginia.

Migration Patterns


Historically, the South has been a region which experienced net outmigration. Beginning in the 1960's, more people migrated to the region than left. Until recently, this net immigration was entirely attributable to the white population. From World War II to the late 1960's, nearly 4.5 million more blacks left the South than migrated to it. But during the past five years, the number of blacks moving into the South slightly exceeded the number departing for other regions.

Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Growth

An important change occurred from 1970 to 1975 in a well established migration pattern in the United States. Metropolitan growth rates (the larger cities and their suburbs) fell behind the growth rates of nonmetropolitan areas. Nationwide, metropolitan areas were no longer gaining population through wholesale migration from nonmetropolitan areas.

Among the SREB states, there was considerable difference in the metropolitan and nonmetropolitan growth rates (see Table 2). For the region as a whole, metropolitan areas still grew faster than nonmetropolitan areas. Many of the fastest growing cities in the nation were in the region. Several of the states, however, mirrored the recent national phenomenon of faster growing nonmetropolitan areas. Nonmetropolitan growth rates exceeded metropolitan rates in Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, Maryland, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Population Projections: 1975-1985

The projections of population for the next ten years show continuation of the trend of faster growth for the region than for the nation as a whole. Much of that projected growth, however, is concentrated in Florida and Texas. Eight of the states in the region are expected to grow at a *slower* rate than the nation. It appears that the widely acclaimed "sunbelt" growth will continue to be concentrated in a few states.

College Age Population

The age group 18 to 24 is often used as a proxy for the college age population in projecting future enrollments because it accounts for over 70 percent of full-time enrollments and about 80 percent of undergraduate enrollment. The decline in the size of this group during the 1980's has been a major basis for the conservative enrollment projections of recent years. The college age population for each of the states in the region (Table 7) is adapted from the National Planning Association's state population projections. While the overall size of the population can be accurately predicted (the 18 year-olds of 1990 have already been born), its distribution among the states depends on the migration patterns of the future.

As Table A indicates, the U.S. total college age population will continue to grow through 1980 and then decline 5.5 percent from 1980 to 1985, and nearly 10 percent from 1985 to 1990. Patterns in the region are similar to those of the U.S. although the rates of decline during the decade are not as great. The net result for the South will be an increasing share of the college age population between now and 1990.

The changes in the college age population vary among the states in the region. Eleven of the states are expected to have substantially smaller 18 to 24 year-old

populations in 1990 than in 1975. Florida's college age population will continue to grow throughout the period. The 18 to 24 year-old population of Texas will decline in the 1980's, but still be above the 1975 level in 1990. Maryland's college age population will grow through 1985 and then decline by 1990 to the 1975 level. All of the changes in this important age group are graphically presented on page 11 of this *Fact Book*.

ENROLLMENT

Total 1975 fall enrollments increased 8.8 percent over 1974 levels, reaching 11.1 million students nationwide. The regional total increased 8 percent--up nearly 320,000.

This enrollment growth reflects the largest-ever group of 18 year-olds to enter the college age population as well as the impact of an economic recession which may have led many to choose college who would normally have sought employment.

The tables presented in this *Fact Book* reveal a number of significant enrollment trends in the South.

- Enrollment in private institutions in the South grew by 29,000 from 1973 to 1975, but the private sector's share of total enrollment continued to decline. In 1975 private enrollment accounted for only 15 percent of the region's total.
- The largest and most rapidly growing sector of public higher education in the region continued to be the two-year institutions--up 33 percent in full-time-equivalent enrollments from 1973 to 1975.
- Non-degree credit enrollment has grown more rapidly than other types of enrollment, increasing 25 percent from 1972 to 1974. Approximately 90 percent of this enrollment (which includes students enrolled in nontransferable vocational and technical curriculums of less than four years) is found in two-year institutions.
- Undergraduates, while still accounting for over three-fourths of all degree credit enrollment, comprised a smaller share of this total in 1974 than five years earlier.
- Out-of-state enrollment in the Southern states was a smaller portion of total enrollment in 1972 than in 1968 in all but one of the states of the region.
- Total black enrollment in the SREB states was estimated at 333,646 in 1974 (13.3 percent of all enrollment). Full-time black undergraduate enrollment reached 229,000, a 10 percent increase over 1972.
- Undergraduate engineering enrollment in the 1972-75 period began to rise again after declining during the 1960's. The regional total reached 61,922 in 1975, a 24 percent increase over the 1972 enrollments.

National Enrollment Projections

The latest edition of the enrollment projections prepared by the National Center for Education Statistics extends the higher education enrollment projections to 1984-85. The graphic of U.S. enrollment trends on page 23 illustrates the projected growth and decline of a number of types of enrollment. Total public and private enrollment is expected to peak at 11.8 million in 1983 and then begin declining. This projection does not yet account for actual 1975 enrollment levels, which exceeded the estimate for that year.

Not all types and levels of enrollment, however, show declines. The fastest growing series are for part-time, non-degree credit, and enrollment in two-year institutions, all of which show continued growth through 1984-85.

Regional and State Enrollment Projections

The regional and state enrollment estimates found in Table 12 of this *Fact Book* project a continued increase of total enrollment in the region from 1975 to 1980, a period of stable enrollment from 1980 to 1985, and a decline from 1985 to 1990. Because the region is expected to have an increasing share of the nation's declining college age population, the national enrollment declines projected for the 1980's are expected later and with less severity in the South.

Table B illustrates the rise and fall of projected state enrollments. During the period 1980 to 1985, the states are equally divided between those showing continued growth or stable enrollments and those beginning to decline. By the 1985-1990 period, decline is projected in all but two of the states in the region.

In projecting state and regional enrollments, the same assumptions were made about the changes in the ratio of enrollment to college age population as were made by the National Center for Education Statistics in their national projections. The size of that future population in the states is obtained through adaptation of the National Planning Association's population projections. These projections account for both natural increase and migration among the states.

Important elements in projecting enrollments include estimating both the size of the future college age population and the degree of attendance. We have assumed in our projections that the ratio of enrollment to 18 to 24 year-olds (our proxy for participation) will increase in each of the states at a uniform rate. There are, however, several states in the region where this ratio is well below that of the nation (see Table 13). These states have an opportunity to counter the declining size of the 18 to 24 year-old group by increasing the percentage which attend college. Other states, which have already "caught-up" to the nation, must look to other age groups which have not traditionally attended college in large numbers in order to combat the decline.

There is another significant factor which can affect enrollments. Projections in the past (including those published in this *Fact Book*) have concentrated on estimating consumer demand for higher education. With widespread commitment to higher education in the past, the supply, in terms of spaces available, was assumed to respond to the demand. This may not always be true in the future. Some states, reacting to increased costs and legislative reluctance to increase funding, have already enacted enrollment ceilings. Such actions would, of course, affect projected enrollment.

DEGREES

One of the measurable outputs of higher education is degree production. The enumeration of the number and type of degrees awarded provides no information, however, on the quality of the programs from which they came or their value to recipients. Degree output can provide valuable clues for policymakers on the changing structure of higher education and, when combined with information on employment demand, provide information on oversupply and undersupply of certain kinds of graduates.

Table C summarizes for the region the number and rates of change for various degree levels during two recent periods. The tables found in the degree section of this *Fact Book* provide similar information for each of the states.

- The growth in the number of doctorates awarded slowed considerably—dropping from the most rapidly increasing type of degree in the 1968-71 period to the slowest in 1971-74.
- First professional degrees replaced doctorates as the fastest growing type of degree in the 1971-74 period—increasing from a 12.3 percent growth rate in 1968-71 to 48.8 percent in 1971-74. However, recent changes indicate a significant slowdown in first professional degree production.
- Master's degree production continued at its high rate through both periods. The number of master's degrees awarded in 1973-74 was nearly double the number awarded in 1967-68.
- At the undergraduate level, associate degree production accelerated in the 1971-74 period, while bachelor's degree increases slowed substantially.

INSTITUTIONAL FINANCES

This *Fact Book* provides information on appropriations both from data published by the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges (M. M. Chambers) and that collected through SREB's data exchange with state higher education agencies.

The 34 percent increase in appropriations for the region as a whole during the two-year period, 1973-75, was well ahead of the 28 percent national increase. Several of the states, however, were below this national average. The two-year increases ranged from a low of 10 percent in Georgia to a high of 63 percent in Texas (see Table 31).

When appropriations are related to personal income, the regional average of \$12.10 per \$1000 is also somewhat higher than the U.S. average of \$10.93. The range in the South is from a low of \$8.53 in Maryland to a high of \$17.75 in South Carolina.














