CHAPTER 1 WISCONSIN LIBRARY NETWORK The Planning Environment

The Library Media Information Sciences planning environment in Wisconsin is at present diffuse but cooperative. The growing volume of projects and programs involving multitype library cooperation and network developments will necessitate more coordinated planning structures.

The Wisconsin Council on Library Development is charged by statute with advising the State Superintendent 'with regard to the state's programs for library development and interlibrary coordination.' As a small group of citizens, librarians and state agency representatives it has advised the Division for Library Services, and focused attention on several broad areas of cooperative planning. From July, 1974 through June, 1975, it sponsored a Task Force on Library Manpower and Education, whose summary recommendations are included in Chapter 3. Beginning in September, 1975, it sponsored a Task Force on Interlibrary Cooperation and Resource Sharing, whose recommendations will strongly influence Wisconsin library network planning.

The Council of Wisconsin Librarians, incorporated as a non-profit educational group, has taken leadership in planning and overseeing several important library networking activities. Its Board, composed mostly of representatives of academic libraries, but including representatives from the Division for Library Services, State Historical Society of Wisconsin, and the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board, is responsible for planning Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service, and a Wisconsin Library Consortium for participation in the Ohio College Library Center.

Professional associations are also vital links in the planning process for Wisconsin's library network. No attempt is made here to list all professional association activities in this field. Two of the most important in recent years are the creation of a Wisconsin Library Legislative Network, and the adoption (in 1973) of a WLA Intellectual Freedom Policy Statement and attendant Handbook of Procedures for its Intellectual Freedom Committee.

Task Force on Interlibrary Cooperation and Resource Sharing

The Task Force on Interlibrary Cooperation and Resource Sharing was established by the Division for Library Services in conjunction with the Council on Library Development. The 45 members of the Task Force were chosen for their representation of varying types and sizes of libraries or library systems, geographical regions, library associations or organizations, or specialized positions. The Task Force began its work September 1975 and will issue a final report in June 1976. The project is funded by Title I of the Library Services and Construction Act through the Division for Library Services. Charles Bunge serves as Chairman and Sally Drew as Coordinator of the Task Force.

The goals of the Task Force are:

- a. To ensure Wisconsin citizens the most effective and efficient use of the resources of all Wisconsin libraries by formulating and recommending an action-oriented program for interlibrary cooperation and resource sharing.
- b. To ensure that planning for interlibrary cooperation and networking in Wisconsin is done within the context of the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science.

The work of the Task Force was undertaken in two segments. The 45 member group met five times to discuss problems involved in cooperation and resource sharing to hear alternative plans and solutions, and to share ideas and opinions in an attempt to define the best approach for Wisconsin to take in formulating a statewide plan for cooperation and resource sharing between all types of libraries. The Task Force coordinator undertook a research project to provide basic information on current interlibrary loan and reference referral volume and patterns in Wisconsin. A survey questionnaire was mailed to all academic, special and public libraries and a sample of school libraries. To provide illustrative and more detailed background information, 11 libraries agreed to serve as case studies by recording daily transactions for interlibrary loan and reference requests sent out of the library. The results of the research project and the recommendations of the Task Force members will be published in a final report at the end of June, 1976.

WISCONSIN LIBRARY NETWORK Division for Library Services

The Division for Library Services is responsible for supervision, improvement and coordination of public and school libraries. It administers the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act Title II program as well as the Library Services and Construction Act.

A milestone in Division history was reached in April, 1975, when two new bureaus were created: Bureau of Public and Cooperative Library Services, and Bureau of School Library Media Programs. With the continuing Bureau for Reference and Loan Services, the Division is now able to re-focus its planning and development activities.

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The Bureau of Public and Cooperative Library Services gave much of its attention to better management of its ESCA responsibilities. New application and evaluation forms were developed to insure more accountability. Working with eleven public library systems, and with fifteen county library planning committees was a continuing heavy responsibility. Considerable progress was made on a Public Library System Manual, working with a committee from the System Directors Organization.

The Bureau for Reference and Loan Services experienced a busy and rewarding year, with increased service demands made by its diverse clientele. Increased and improved services were delivered to clients in Wisconsin correctional institutions. The largest cooperative project of the year was the work with the

State Superintendent's Advisory Committee on the State Document Depository Program.

The Staff of the Bureau of School Library Media Programs has been occupied during 1975 with the work of three important task forces, and with the DPI team which developed Wisconsin's State Plan for ESEA Title IV. The three task forces (on long-range plans; certification, and school media standards revision) are expected to complete their work in late 1976. The Bureau also worked to develop criteria to implement Standard J, one of the thirteen legislated standards for school districts. The Standard requires that each school district shall provide "adequate instructional materials, texts and library services which reflect the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society".

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Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction

The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction (BAVI) of the University of Wisconsin Extension maintains an ever-expanding library of 16mm films, presently consisting of more than 15,000 prints. All films are available on a rental basis and recommendations for purchase are accepted. For their clients, BAVI will also procure titles not presently in the library either by purchase or by renting from other film centers throughout the U.S.

Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction films are available to every Wisconsin resident. Schools, organizations, industries, clubs and individuals may use these films; however, they may not be used when admission is charged. When booking openings permit, films are sent outside Wisconsin. Films produced by the University of Wisconsin Extension will be sent anywhere and BAVI will send these films for preview (if sold by BAVI) at no charge if purchase is contemplated. The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction films are listed in *BAVI University of Wisconsin Extension Films 1975-77*.

In addition to the film rental center, the BAVI offers a variety of other services. On the University of Wisconsin-Madison Campus it provides instructional development consultation, AV equipment rental, equipment repair facilities, audio tape duplicating service, equipment operators and projectionists.

Statewide, the faculty and academic staff of the Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction are available to assist schools and other groups with problems in the instructional technology area. This includes in-service workshops and demonstrations or programs tailored to meet specific needs in the audio-visual or instructional technology fields.

The Bureau of Audio-Visual Instruction is located at 1327 University Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin 53706, Telephone No. (608) 262-1644. Dr. Hal Riehle is the Director.

Bureau for Reference and Loan Services

Rounding out a ten-year period of steady growth and development, the Bureau for Reference and Loan Services in 1975 processed more than double the number of service requests than it did in 1966. Requests completed at the Reference and Loan Library were twice the number completed in the earlier period, and the number of requests completed via interloan increased by nearly six times.

Growth in interloan productivity has continued steadily since the development of formal contracts with the Milwaukee Public Library and WILS, and the installation of teletype equipment at appropriate area headquarters libraries. During 1975, the TWX equipment was modified to permit teletype transmission via State leased DAIN (Dial Access Intercity Network) telephone lines. Unfortunately, the resulting substantial savings in line costs were offset by the greatly increased costs of TWX equipment. Three public library systems utilized TWX equipment and the Southeastern Wisconsin Union List to route selected interloan requests directly to Milwaukee Public Library.

Increasing volume and changing patterns of service demands on the Bureau instigated revision of methods for handling incoming requests. The traditional method of separating "reference" inquiries from "author-title" requests was phased out in favor of a system for categorizing requests according to three levels of difficulty. A series of general training sessions was conducted to familiarize all library staff with the routine operations of the library, and a new Library Staff Committee was organized to help identify and solve library problems.

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Bureau services to State institutions reached a high level of activity during the year and a pilot program with the new Federal Correction Institution at Oxford was explored. A workshop with the correctional institution librarians was sponsored to improve coordination of interloan and special reader services. Collections of high interest, low vocabulary materials were placed in a number of institutions, and depository collections of new books were rotated monthly with four correctional facilities.

The "Video Project" which began in 1972 entered a new phase during the year when Milwaukee Public Library ended its Community Video Exchange project and integrated video activity with the Milwaukee County Federated Library System. The Bureau's videocassettes were returned from that project to form the core of a traveling video collection, a comprehensive package of equipment and software available to public libraries to explore the potential of video materials within the library's community.

New printed music materials were added to the library collection, expanding and supplementing the collection of sound music recordings and the Fulcher collection. Study scores, piano-vocal scores, performing editions and popular folios in a wide range of musical interests were included.

Special promotional materials for the Bicentennial observance were prepared and distributed by the Bureau. With the coordination of CLIP, exhibits of historic documents, posters and related materials were assembled and scheduled for display in various libraries throughout the state. The *Bicentennial Reading, Viewing, Listening* lists, compiled for the American Issues Forum, were dispatched to all libraries; and a separate issue of *Accent* was issued describing the special materials available to foster Bicentennial programs.

The Advisory Committee for the DPI Library concluded an extensive survey of that library's purposes and performance and formally presented its findings to the State Superintendent. Among the recommendations was the name change from "DPI Professional Library" to "DPI Library." Though the report reflected a growing service responsibility for the library, the new biennial budget reduced the staff of the library to one.

At year's end, with prospects of significantly reduced funds, the Bureau was seeking methods to sustain a quality level of service with fewer and fewer dollars. Activities relating to the Document Program are reported separately in these pages; general statistics for the year follow:

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Cooperative Children's Book Center

The Cooperative Children's Book Center, located at Helen C. White Hall on the University of Wisconsin--Madison campus, is a project of two state agencies: The Department of Public Instruction and the University of Wisconsin. The Division for Library Services of the Department of Public Instruction and the Library School and the School of Education of the University of Wisconsin all participate in the policy making, promotion, use and support of the Center. The Center started in 1963. It has only a few counterparts in the country.

Broadly stated, the main objective of the Center is to provide a noncirculating children's book center where individuals and groups may examine, read and evaluate children's and young people's books. (The Center defines children's books generally as those of interest to individuals under 14 years of age.)

The Center develops bibliographies and produces a checklist called "Materials for Distribution," which is revised regularly and sent upon request. The Center publishes the CCBC Circular several times a year. This contains news about the Center and the world of children's literature. The Circular has a mailing list of approximately 1,800 public libraries and branches, elementary and junior high school librarians, children's book editors, and publishers' library promotion personnel. The Center schedules the use of the traveling exhibits of children's books at Reference and Loan Library for the libraries of the state. Requests should be sent to the Center.

Six collections of books are available:

- a. CURRENT—trade and reference titles of the last 18 months provided by some seventy publishers of children's trade books
- b. BASIC—a core collection of significant titles
- c. EXHIBITS—such as Newbery, Caldecott, and Lewis Carroll Awards
- d. HISTORICAL—a collection of 19th and early 20th century titles that is being assembled from gifts and special purchases
- e. BIBLIOGRAPHICAL—aids in book selection and evaluation
- f. CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT—Recommended titles useful for classroom use or individualized reading programs

Approximately 15,500 volumes are owned by the Center. In addition to providing the above book collections, the Center also provides a sampling of audiovisual materials of particular significance in children's literature.

Patrons include the University community, a variety of general adult patrons, such as browsers, nurses, collectors of historical books, teachers, and school and public librarians.

The Center is staffed by Virginia Moore Kruse, librarian, a stenographer and several part-time library assistants (usually students of the University of Wisconsin School of Education and Library School).

The budget for the Center for 1975-76 from the Division for Library Services, University of Wisconsin Library School and University of Wisconsin School of Education was \$42,940, of which \$37,590 was to be spent for salaries and \$5,350 for materials, services and capital outlay.

The Cooperative Children's Book Center is located at 600 N. Park Street, Room 4290, Helen C. White Hall, Madison, Wisconsin 53706.

Coordinated Library Information Program

The Cooperative Library Information Program (CLIP) was started by the Division for Library Services in April, 1970, as a project under Title III of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA). It grew out of the recognition of the importance of public communication for Wisconsin libraries of all types—public, school, academic and special—and the belief that the exchange and development of good public relations ideas and materials would benefit and assist all libraries. The program was initiated with a part-time director, Marian S. Edsall, with the assistance of an advisory committee composed of librarians representing all types of libraries and from various areas of the state. In 1975 the project was retitled "Coordinated Library Information Program, Inc.," and incorporated as a non-profit organization, under a Board of Directors.

The following activities have been part of the CLIP program during the 1970-76 period:

- a. A bimonthly newsletter, *Tips from CLIP*. This publication serves as a medium of exchange of information, ideas and materials. Previously sent free to Wisconsin libraries, it is now on a subscription basis of \$2.00 per year (January to December) to in-state subscribers, \$5.00 per year out-of-state. Wisconsin Public library systems, school library coordinators, and other library agencies can order in bulk at reduced rates. 1976 circulation: 3850
- b. Production of promotional materials. Those materials which can be produced more economically in large quantities have been made available for local use, including: posters, bookmarks, brochures, bumper stickers, counter cards, book list covers, plastic book bags, etc.
- c. Statewide Children's Summer Reading Program. An annual theme, related materials, and a program manual have been developed for purchase at cost by all Wisconsin libraries wishing to participate. (In 1976 this program will be taken over by the Children's and Young Adult Services Consultant in DLS.)
- d. Workshops. CLIP has sponsored or participated in

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- numerous workshops on the subjects of public relations and publicity.
- e. Statewide media coverage. Television and radio spots, promoting libraries and library use, have been distributed, taped radio programs made available, and newspaper releases sent out.
- f. Circulating library exhibits. Seven circulating exhibits have been made available to libraries for display.
- g. Assistance to other agencies. CLIP has assisted with National Library Week promotion and other Wisconsin Library Association sponsored activities; served as a resource to UW-EX and others for conferences, ETN programs and classes; consultation by mail, phone, or in-person has been available on a limited basis.
- h. Cooperation and exchange with regional and state library agencies outside Wisconsin. The state program has been enriched and augmented through contact and exchange with library agencies and association outside Wisconsin.
- i. Public Relations Council. In 1975 a PR Council was formed by CLIP, composed of 16 designated representatives from the Wisconsin Public Library Systems and of some of the larger unaffiliated libraries. An addenda to the *Wisconsin Standards for Public Library Systems*, Section H, "Service" was prepared in cooperation with DLS to aid in implementing that section on Public Information Service; standards were formulated for libraries of all sizes. The Council, meeting at bi-monthly intervals, assists with coordinating state and regional activities for effective use of available resources, and considers a relevant or timely PR topic in depth at each meeting.
- j. Miscellaneous. Statewide library contests have been conducted, a library logo developed for general use, and 12 packets of sample materials prepared for circulation.

The Coordinated Library Information Program has generated a greater awareness of the need for good public relations on the part of all libraries and the importance of promotion and publicity as part of a library's total service program by offering advice and practical suggestions for such activities and providing some tools to aid librarians at the local system and state levels.

Instructional Television Radio Broadcast and Cable Television

Wisconsin established its educational television system as a statewide network in September 1972 with the activation of WPNE-TV, Channel 38, Green Bay. WPNE-TV joined WMVS, Milwaukee, and WHA-TV, Madison, in the effort to bring broadcast instruction and enrichment to pupils and adults

throughout the state. In the fall of 1973 two additional television stations, Channel 28, WHWC, Menomonie, and Channel 31, WHAD, La Crosse, were activated to serve Wisconsin children and adults. After many unforeseen delays, Channel 20, WHRM, Wausau, went on the air October 27, 1975. This completed the originally intended statewide educational TV network. However, at least one additional educational broadcast unit may be necessary to establish basic coverage for the state. During 1973-74, there were approximately 470,000 student viewings of educational TV programs in Wisconsin. In 1974-75 this had increased to approximately 622,000. During 1974-75 9,004 teachers indicated they used radio and/or TV in their classrooms.

In addition to direct state network television operations, arrangements have been continuing with Channel 8, WDSE, Duluth, to carry approximately 50% of the Wisconsin TV instructional programming in an effort to serve the extreme northwest corner of Wisconsin. Thus, a most substantial portion of Wisconsin's school children are served by instructional television broadcast which offers almost sixty courses to these same public and private school children.

At the same time our former statewide radio coverage by WIA-FM is now made possible by WERN, the state radio network. This radio network, along with other offerings, carries twenty-four programs during each school year for Wisconsin's school children. In 1974 school radio listeners numbered about 49,000. In 1975 this number had apparently increased to approximately 65,000.

The Educational Communications Board (ECB), along with the Department of Public Instruction, enjoys a most unique organizational/utilization pattern for telecommunications in Wisconsin. This presently consists of six Regional Broadcast Instruction Councils. Each is based in a Cooperative Education Service Agency located near a transmitter, and each has representation from all sectors of education, including the Department of Public Instruction and the Educational Communications Board. Such a pattern provides local/regional input into program selection and evaluation, the fostering of good utilization practices, and the distribution of supportive materials. "Friends of Broadcasting" groups of adults operate in the various areas to help with information on night-time broadcasting to homes. Also, in the summer of 1974, elementary age viewers had available some instructional programming which will be expanded in 1975.

Cable television continues to interest Wisconsin educators as it demonstrates a means of positive signal reception and possibilities for local interconnects and regional networking. While some school districts report having connections to local cable systems, only a few are used systematically for local instructional purposes. Innovative cable television practices at the local and regional level are increasing.

Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee (L.COMM)

The Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee (L.COMM) is an intertype organization made up of libraries and information

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centers within the four county metropolitan Milwaukee area including the counties of Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Washington, and Waukesha. Currently 106 academic, public, school and special libraries participate in LCOMM, working together to encourage a network of communication among all types of information centers.

The major objectives of the Council are 1) to stimulate and facilitate optimum use of existing information resources; 2) to improve these resources and services in an effort to further local as well as statewide cooperative library development; 3) to provide the facilities and organization needed to help solve the research, administrative, and service problems of common interest to members.

Activities undertaken in pursuit of the above stated objectives include the following: 1) publication of a directory of libraries and information centers in southeastern Wisconsin (published cooperatively with the Tri-county Library Council); 2) implementation of the "Infopass" program of reciprocal patron access among LCOMM member libraries as well as member libraries of the Tri-county Library Council and the Illinois Regional Library Council; 3) publication of a monthly newsletter focusing on current awareness aspects of librarianship; 4) sponsorship of continuing education activities such as workshops, orientation tours of area libraries, roundtable discussion groups; 5) development of a written long range plan for cooperative area library service; 6) development of an effective cooperative acquisitions program; 7) clearinghouse activities covering a broad spectrum of library related information needs. All services provided with exception of the Infopass program with the Illinois Regional Library Council, have been on an informal basis. Member institutions are invited to participate in all activities, but participation is strictly voluntary.

Activities under investigation by the Long Range Planning Committee include delivery service; reciprocal borrowing privileges; establishment of a telecommunications network; publication of a compendium of data base services available; expansion of clearinghouse activities to include vendor, serials, and consultant information; provision for access by member libraries to on-line bibliographic data base services, e.g. Ohio College Library Center (OCLC).

Since its inception LCOMM has been funded primarily through the federal USA Title III program. In addition, the Council averages approximately \$1,200 per year income from membership dues. Dues are based on the combined personnel and materials budget for each member institution and range from \$10 to \$35. This year LCOMM also received a small grant from a local foundation.

The Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee (LCOMM) is located at the Milwaukee Public Library, 814 West Wisconsin Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53233. Susan Keller is the LCOMM Coordinator.

Legislative Reference Bureau

The legislative reference bureau was originally created by chapter 168, laws 1901, as part of the free library commission. It came to be known as the legislative reference library, which was its official name until 1963. Chapter 149, laws 1963, renamed it a bureau and transferred it to the jurisdiction of the newly created joint committee on legislative organization.

Although it is still primarily a legislative service agency, the statutes direct the Legislative Reference Bureau to also serve state departments, students of government and citizens generally. Thus, the Bureau provides a great variety of information on all aspects of state and local government to everyone who needs such assistance. The Bureau's facilities are available on a factual, nonpartisan basis.

The functions of the bureau are to:

1. Collect, index and make available in the most suitable form to legislators, other public officials, students of government and citizens generally, information relating to governmental subjects which will aid the legislature and others in the performance of their duties.
2. Prepare studies and reports on matters of concern to legislators and others and publish such studies.
3. Draft legislation for legislators and others authorized to utilize such services.
4. Prepare a bill analysis for all legislation.
5. As a service to the chief clerks, enroll all bills passed by the legislature.
6. Maintain a collection of public documents of Wisconsin, other states and the federal government.
7. Carry out loan and exchange arrangements with other states.
8. Prepare copy for and edit the Wisconsin Blue Book.
9. Coordinate and administer the scheduling and use of computer programs and machine time to facilitate the use of computers and other modern office machines by the legislative branch.
10. Provide for the processing and printing of certain legislative documents.
11. The chief is an ex-officio member of the Wisconsin commission on interstate cooperation and the commission on uniform state laws.

The Legislative Reference Bureau has a staff of 39.8. It is divided into 3 sections: The reference and research staff (comprised of research analysts and librarians), the legal

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section (legislative attorneys), and the data processing and administrative staff

The Bureau's noncirculating reference collection includes Wisconsin Statutes, session laws, legislative journals and indexes, Supreme Court Reports, Attorneys' General's Opinions—all since the beginning of statehood—and all the bills introduced in the Legislature since 1897.

The Legislative Reference Bureau is located at Room 201 North, State Capitol, Madison, Wisconsin 53702. Dr. H. Rupert Theobald is Bureau Chief.

Madison Area Library Council

The Madison Area Library Council (MALC) was formed early in 1970 as a direct result of a survey of library cooperation for the Madison area by Dr. Charles A. Bunge of the University of Wisconsin Library School. The study, financed by Title III of the Library Services and Construction Act, was initiated at the request of a School-Library Cooperation Committee of the Madison Public Schools and Public Library.

The purposes of MALC are, "to promote and implement programs of cooperation and communication among all libraries and other information sources in Dane County in order:

- 1) To assure the most effective use of the resources and services of the area
- 2) To facilitate the improvement of existing library service activities, and
- 3) To provide a basis for initiating new resources and services as needed."

Membership in MALC is open to any Dane County library or information center. In 1975, 93 public, academic, school, and special libraries were members of MALC. These included the county's major libraries as well as most of the area's important smaller institutions.

In July, 1975 a purchase of services agreement between MALC and the South Central Library System (SCLS) established an arrangement through which SCLS libraries may participate in all MALC activities and receive, and be included in, MALC publications on the same basis as MALC members. Non-public libraries in the SCLS area may also affiliate with MALC.

The 15-member Board of Directors is selected by a formula which provides representation for all types of libraries. The responsibility of Board membership is rotated among all members.

MALC is financed through membership dues (scaled to the size of the library or system), the sale of publications, and the SCLS purchase of services agreement. It has, in the past, received several grants from the LSCA Title III.

MALC is responsible for a number of publications. It publishes a monthly newsletter, the *MALC Informer*, to inform members about MALC activities and those of local libraries. A *Directory of Staff Members* in area libraries is revised annually. A revised edition of *Newspapers Currently Received in Major Madison Area Libraries* is being compiled. MALC also has published a *Directory of Libraries and Information Sources in Dane County*, a *Union List of Periodicals in Dane County Libraries*, and a list of *Campus Collections at the University of Wisconsin Madison Campus*.

MALC sponsors orientation tours of local libraries so staff members can become better acquainted with each other and with the collections and services of other institutions.

Continuing education programs and workshops are planned to bring new ideas and methods to local librarians and to provide up-to-date overviews of important topics that the working librarian may not have time to investigate.

MALC sponsors and encourages meetings of specialists to discuss common interests and mutual problems.

MALC ad hoc committees work to solve specific problems cooperatively.

MALC works to increase awareness of legislation of interest to the library community.

Milwaukee Public Library

The Milwaukee Public Library is the state's largest public library. It has a collection of nearly 2.4 million volumes and had an operating budget of over \$7.4 million in 1975. The library serves as the Milwaukee County Federated Library System headquarters and resource library, and serves as a statewide resource through contract with the Division of Library Services.

Milwaukee Public Library had a staff of 420 persons in 1975. Of these employees, 30 percent held graduate degrees in library science, 2 percent held graduate degrees in a field other than library science and 6 percent held bachelor degrees.

The Milwaukee Public Library has 12 branches and operates 4 bookmobiles and 3 mobile vans. As system headquarters it serves the nine public library members of the Milwaukee County Federal Library System. In 1975 Milwaukee Public loaned 3,488,280 items directly to library patrons. In addition, it loaned 9,615 items to system libraries.

The Division for Library Services began contracting for services with the Milwaukee Public Library in 1967. The purpose of the contract is to augment the ability of the Division's Reference and Loan Library to serve the needs of its statewide clientele. Milwaukee Public Library received \$75,000 from the Division for Library Services in 1974-75 to provide statewide access to Milwaukee Public Library services and resources. In 1975 the

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Reference and Loan Library submitted 15,471 interloan requests to the Milwaukee Public Library.

The Milwaukee Public Library is located at 814 W. Wisconsin Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, 53233. The library director is Henry E. Bates.

Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries, Inc.

Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries, Inc. (NEWIL) is a group of 30 libraries which have joined in a cooperative effort to share knowledge and ideas as well as materials. Copies of magazine articles, books, and audiovisual materials are loaned among NEWIL member libraries.

Libraries in northeast Wisconsin are welcome to join NEWIL. Types of libraries represented are university, two-year and four-year college, technical, high school, and city or county-wide public libraries. NEWIL boundaries include Brown, Door, Kewaunee, Manitowoc, Marinette, Oconto, Shawano, Menominee, Outagamie, and a portion of Winnebago Counties. Monthly meetings are held throughout the area.

NEWIL was founded in 1967 at the urging of Mr. Gerald Somers, director of Brown County Library, and the Directors of the University of Wisconsin—Green Bay, St. Norbert College, and Lawrence University Libraries.

The ultimate goal of NEWIL activities is better service for the patrons of member libraries, especially through interlibrary loan of materials.

A Union List of Periodicals, updated and printed each year since 1968, affords each member library a quick identification of periodical holdings of the entire group. It is the first source that interlibrary loan departments search when they cannot supply requests from their own magazine holdings. A second major cooperative effort of NEWIL culminated in September of 1971. The Instructional Media Catalog (IMCAT) lists the AV materials located in member libraries and their media centers. The first supplement was published in January of 1973. Work is currently being done on the second edition of IMCAT. A NEWIL Courtesy Card, issued on a one-time basis, entitles its user to all privileges of a specified library. Its use is reserved for cases when the needs of library patrons cannot be met through normal interlibrary loan channels. The Directory of NEWIL libraries provides information on the staff, lending policies, hours, etc. of member libraries. NEWIL libraries participate in exchange of duplicate materials, usually by means of lists of duplicate materials distributed by the offering library.

Public Library Systems

Public library systems are the result of legislation enacted in December of 1971 designed to encourage groups of public

libraries to organize and cooperate in order to fulfill the library needs of persons residing in the defined system area. Systems vary in size from single county to ten county organizations. State aid to public library systems totaled \$2,912,760 in 1975.

Systems operating in 1975 were:

Special Education Instructional Materials Centers

In recent years, as a result of great interest in the problems of special education, and also as a result of state and federal funds, a number of Special Education Instructional Materials Centers (SEIMC) have been established in the state. These centers are operated by Cooperative Educational Service Agencies. The centers provide a variety of print and non-print materials useful in working with students who have exceptional educational needs. The centers work closely with public school teachers and children.

The Centers now operating in Wisconsin are at Gillett, Cumberland, Elmwood, Chippewa Falls, Stevens Point, Oshkosh, Onalaska, Portage, Fennimore, Janesville, Ashland, Minocqua and the City of Racine. A Specialized Center serving all visually impaired children throughout the State is located at the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped at Janesville.

State Historical Society of Wisconsin

The Library Division is one of the 8 major divisions of the State Historical Society. It is responsible for organizing and making available the volumes and pamphlets which constitute the historical collection. The State Historical Society of Wisconsin, Library Division is located at 816 State Street, Madison, Wisconsin 53706.

The Library's historic function has been to develop and service an outstanding collection of research materials in American history. This tradition is more than one hundred years old. The 1973-1975 biennium brought an increase of \$54,000 for the purchase of printed and microform research materials, and three new paraprofessional staff members who were assigned to the reclassification program which the Library inaugurated in 1966 as the result of an outside survey made of the Division's operations. These increases of money and staff have made

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significant differences in the level of various programs and services of the Library.

The intake of printed and microform materials in the biennium increased to 110,198 items, as against the 72,225 items acquired in the 1971-1973 period, bringing the total collections to 1,283,351 items. The acquisition of bound volumes increased to 14,571, compared with 12,557 in the previous biennium. The pamphlet collection was enriched by 4,157 catalogued pieces, many of which are publications of obscure, ephemeral, and marginal social and political organizations. The Library's collections of government publications includes selections from U. S. and Canadian federal, Canadian provincial, and U. S. state and local governmental units. The acquisition and use of microforms continues to increase faster than the use of printed publications. Printed and manuscript materials acquired in microform increase the scope of the collections in more durable format, but they do not necessarily decrease the physical bulk of a library's holdings. And even the storage and servicing of microforms becomes a problem when they begin to approach a half-million pieces and account for 42 per cent of the total materials circulated in a year.

Printed and microform materials circulated in the past biennium totaled 235,266 items, compared with 208,373 and 211,302 in the two previous biennia. In addition to the circulation of materials to patrons in the building, the Library's interlibrary loan function makes many of its resources available to readers and scholars throughout Wisconsin and the United States.

Perhaps the most significant work output during the biennium was that which occurred in the reclassification of the general collection, buttressed by the new staff assigned for the purpose. This program was begun in 1966 as an additional workload of the existing cataloging staff. Between 1966-1967 and 1974-1975 a total of 30,355 titles was reclassified from the old Cutter system to the Library of Congress system. Over one-half of the titles reclassified, 15,409, were done in the 1973-1975 biennium. Even with this remarkable performance, reclassification will be an ongoing program for several more biennia. This increased intake of printed and microform materials new to the collection, along with the reclassification program, has substantially increased the number of new cards filed in the various catalogs. There were 128,128 in 1969-1971, 177,683 in 1971-1973, and 279,301 in the last biennium.

In addition to the public card catalog, other bibliographic aids have been provided to patrons and libraries to facilitate their using an increasingly complex collection. A small brochure was produced for general distribution as a capsule guide to the contents of the collections and their location in the Society building. As the legal depository for Wisconsin state documents, the Library is obligated by statutes to prepare and distribute periodic checklists of new publications issued by state governmental agencies. These listings are published monthly and compiled annually. A new format was introduced in 1974 in which the documents are listed in catalog card form. This in effect pre-catalogs Wisconsin documents for other libraries in the state who need only to reproduce the entries for their own

collections of state publications. A substantial nationwide checklist of underground publications, based in large part upon the Library's holdings, was compiled by a Society librarian and published by the Society Press. Members of the Library and the Archives-Manuscripts staffs collaborated in compiling a guide to sources on women's history in the Society's several divisions. A Library staff member also collaborated with a University of Wisconsin Memorial Library staff member in compiling a campus-wide checklist of black newspapers and periodicals. The acquisitions staff began a quarterly column in the Wisconsin Magazine of History to note and review Wisconsin local history publications.

State Law Library

The State Law Library was established by the congressional act of 1836 which created the Wisconsin territory. The purpose of the library was to supply books for the Supreme Court and the Legislature. Originally the Library also contained miscellaneous and nonlegal material, but since about 1866 its holdings have been limited to legal material.

The Library is administered by a board of trustees which is composed of the justices of the Supreme Court and the Attorney General. The board establishes all policies and appoints the librarian and other personnel.

The Wisconsin State Library is a public library, but its main service is as the legal resource center for the Wisconsin supreme court, the department of justice, the legislature, members of the executive department and the various executive agencies, and members of the bar of Wisconsin. Although much of the collection is noncirculating, xeroxing facilities are available at a nominal cost. Reference and basic research services are provided.

The holdings of the State Law Library, comprising 130,000-145,000 volumes, consist of

- a. Session laws and statutory codes, court reports, administrative rules, legal indexes and digests for the U. S. federal government, the 50 states and territories of the U.S.

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- b. Legal and bar periodicals—933 titles of which 505 are current.
- c. Treatise collection covering various topics of law and a government documents section.
- d. Foreign law section including statutes and court decisions from England and Canada.
- e. Appeal papers. There are cases and briefs for almost all Wisconsin supreme court cases, but none for other jurisdictions.

The Library is staffed by the State Law Librarian, Marcia Koslov; the Deputy Librarian, Dennis Austin; a technical services librarian; and a part-time law student. The staff totals 3.5 in Full Time Equivalents.

The budget for the State Law Library for 1975-76 was \$107,500.

The State Law Library is located at 310 East, State Capitol, Madison, Wisconsin 53702. Marcia Koslov is the Director.

Tri-County Library Council, Inc. (TLC)

TLC was formed in September, 1974, as a not-for-profit organization whose purpose is to coordinate cooperative activities between all types of libraries in Racine, Kenosha and Walworth counties. Council programs are determined by area needs as identified by the membership and approved by the governing board. The primary goal of these programs is to assure for all area residents improved access to available information resources as a further step toward statewide library network development.

In keeping with this primary objective, TLC has implemented several programs which have had a very positive influence on area library service.

- a. A comprehensive survey of information resources in Racine, Kenosha and Walworth counties which revealed many local resource collections previously not well-known;
- b. Publication of Libraries and Information Centers in Southeastern Wisconsin—a library directory which was compiled and produced jointly with the Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee (LCOMM);
- c. Inauguration of Infopass, a program designed to facilitate improved access to participating libraries and information centers in Southeastern Wisconsin that might otherwise be restricted to outside use;
- d. Publication of a monthly newsletter which reports on Council activities as well as local, state and national library news of interest.

For continued development toward improved access to information, TLC has planned these additional activities for the 1975-76 fiscal year:

- a. Compilation and publication of a union list of serials for Racine, Kenosha, and Walworth counties to facilitate interlibrary loan service among participating agencies;
- b. Cooperation with other councils and state projects to provide continuing education workshops and seminars for librarians and other persons concerned with information collection, retrieval and distribution;
- c. Identification of continuing library needs by means of a coordinated public existing and potential library services available in each type of library.

Other cooperative projects are continuously explored for potential use in the future.

Any library, information source, or cooperative agency coordinating or representing such institutions is eligible for membership. Currently, the Council serves 44 members which account for 16 public, 102 school, 5 academic, 3 technical college and 18 special libraries.

Participation in TLC activities is entirely voluntary and at the discretion of the local library's governing board. Membership in TLC in no way affects the autonomy of an individual library.

TLC has received two Library Services and Construction Act Title III grants, one for activities to be carried out during the current fiscal year. Additional support comes from membership dues which are based on the institutions' or systems' materials budget, and publication sales, if any.

TLC has adopted the use of the Infopass Program which was designed and shared by the Illinois Regional Library Council and is aimed at solving the problems of library users who need access to resources they are not otherwise qualified to approach in person, i.e. over and beyond the assistance their own libraries can provide through existing use policies.

An Information Passport, or Infopass, may be issued by a Council member librarian in accordance with the stipulated guidelines of the programs. Location of information sources and Infopass privileges are designated by the participating agencies in Libraries and Information Resources in Southeastern Wisconsin.

TLC has a reciprocal Infopass agreement with both LCOMM and the Illinois Regional Library Council.

The Tri-County Library Council is located at University of Wisconsin—Parkside Library, D115D, Kenosha, Wisconsin, 53140. Mary Alice Seemeyer is Coordinator.

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Tools for Sharing Resources

The libraries in Wisconsin, cooperating formally and informally to provide better service for library patrons, have shown a willingness to share resources. They have worked through a variety of channels to produce tools for sharing resources: union lists of serials, periodicals, and audiovisual materials, directories of libraries and information centers, and, in one instance, master's theses.

The 9 former state universities in Wisconsin have been producing a computerized union list of periodicals for a number of years. The libraries rotate the editing and print-out of each revised edition. Copies are distributed to the 9 participating libraries (Eau Claire, La Crosse, Oshkosh, Platteville, River Falls, Stevens Point, Stout, Superior and Whitewater) and to the Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS) office. Another cooperative effort of the former state universities is Master's Theses and Seminar Papers-Former Wisconsin State Universities: 1935-1972. A catalog which came out in 1973 is University of Wisconsin System Video Tape Catalog. It contains the holdings of all former state university system libraries that wished to participate.

As mentioned in another section of this Service Record, Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries (NEWIL), Madison Area Library Council (MALC), Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee (LCOMM), and Tri-County Library Council (TLC) have produced a number of tools to encourage resource sharing including

In addition to publication of these intertype library councils, the Lake Superior Association of Colleges and Universities recently completed a KWOC Title Index and Non-Print Media Catalog; the Southwest Wisconsin Association of Libraries produced a

Southwest Wisconsin Library Directory. A union list of non-print materials was jointly produced by CESA 14 and the Southwest School/Public Library Access Project. It includes the holdings of the Karrmann Library at UW-Platteville, CESA 14, Southwest Wisconsin Vocational-Technical Institute and the Southwest Wisconsin Library System. Other local and regional organizations have produced a variety of union lists and directories to facilitate resource sharing in the areas they serve.

The Wisconsin Union List of Biomedical Serials, which came out in 1973, offers the medical and biomedical holdings of over 60 participating libraries and partial coverage of other holdings. The *WIM List of Biomedical Serials, 1975* provides an update of Wisconsin Medical Library holdings and includes holdings of some libraries in Minnesota and Illinois.

In 1974 the Union Catalog of Serials Currently Received in the Libraries of the University of Wisconsin--Madison was published. This bibliographic tool includes current serials holdings of Memorial Library, its 10 Branch Libraries, Steenbock Memorial Library (Agriculture), and the Engineering Library.

The University of Wisconsin--Madison Memorial Library has a microfilm record of its holdings as listed in its card catalog as of January 1, 1969. The WILS interloan office at the Memorial Library and MINITEX at the University of Minnesota have exchanged microfilmed copies of their campus union card catalogs. The Reference and Loan Library also has a microfilmed copy of the Memorial Library union card catalog.

The Milwaukee Public Library has a computerized union shelf list which has been reproduced on microfiche for public libraries in seven southeastern counties. The Reference and Loan Library also has a copy of this list.

The Council of Wisconsin Librarians (COWL) has produced or is currently exploring a number of resource sharing tools. In 1975 COWL published a *Survey of Machine-Readable Bibliographic and Numerical Data Bases and Related Services in Wisconsin*. This publication lists 59 data bases which are available in Wisconsin libraries, giving a description of each data base, the subject coverage, its availability, the year it began, frequency of update, current size, the printed equivalent, the thesaurus used, search strategies, and the person(s) to contact for additional information. Currently COWL is exploring the possibility of a statewide data base of serial holdings. A committee chaired by Joseph A. Boisse is communicating with MINITEX and a number of local libraries whose holdings will form the initial basis of the union list. A projected six-year effort is set for the development of a data base which will include the holdings of all libraries in the state that agree to share their resources either by interloan or for on-site use. Still in the beginning stages of exploration is a resource sharing tool for non-print media.

University of Wisconsin--Madison Libraries

The University of Wisconsin--Madison Memorial Library is the state's largest academic library. It has nearly 3 million volumes in its collection and has an operating budget of over \$7

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million dollars in 1974-1975. The library had a staff of 315.2 in Full Time Equivalents (FTE) in fall of 1975.

Enrollment on the University of Wisconsin--Madison Campus for 1975-1976 included 27,705 undergraduate and 9,319 graduate students

There are over 60 libraries and information centers on the Madison campus. These range from large resource libraries such as the Health Science Library, the Law Library, the Engineering Library and the Agricultural and Life Science Library to smaller specialized libraries such as Map and Air Photo Library.

Wisconsin Document Depository System

For more than seventy years the state library agency has carried a statutory responsibility to promote the availability and use of Wisconsin public documents. Since 1903 this objective has been more or less achieved through a state document depository system. Libraries were "admitted" to the system upon application and with official assurance that they had "more than one thousand volumes" and could "suitably care for and advantageously use public documents printed by the state."

By 1973 there were fifty-five libraries in Wisconsin designated as state depositories. However there were no regulations defined as to depository responsibilities, no records kept as to when or why a library became a depository, and there were no guidelines available as to criteria to be used in granting depository status. Furthermore the actual distribution of documents to the libraries was haphazard, decentralized, and generally disorganized. It was evident that something needed to be done.

Although the Division for Library Services is charged with designating libraries as state depositories, it is the Department of Administration which, according to current law, is responsible for the actual distribution of the documents. However, the law is somewhat confusing and contradictory in this area, and, in fact, the Reference and Loan Library has been dispatching documents to depositories for several years. Therefore in October, 1973 Reference and Loan began an in-depth study of the program and all related problems.

To facilitate the study, basic objectives were defined:

Objectives: to make Wisconsin public documents generally available to people everywhere in the state. To achieve this goal, a number of conditions had to be met.

1. In addition to the historical collections of documents in Madison, comprehensive collections of public documents must be available at strategically located points throughout the state.
2. Document collections in depository libraries must be organized for and oriented to maximum public access and use.

3. All libraries in Wisconsin, both depository and nondepository, need information about state documents: how and where to acquire them, and how to borrow them through interlibrary loan.

Since September of 1973 many changes and improvements have been initiated in the depository program. The first phase of the study was a survey of the depositories to determine individual library involvement and interest in continuing to serve as a depository. This survey showed that the size and type of the libraries in the system varies greatly and, that the ability to cope with a large document collection as well as the patron demand for government publications varied as well. In view of these differences a three-level hierarchy of depositories was developed.

1. Historical depositories which are defined in the current Statutes, the State Historical Society and the Legislative Reference Bureau.
2. Regional depositories ten of the present depositories designated to serve specific areas of the state with comprehensive document collections and services.
3. Selective depositories libraries meeting basic service standards and exercising options on the types and depth of documents collected.

The first step in implementing this new structure was the designation of the regional depositories. The process of selecting regional libraries involved studying all established depositories in order to determine which libraries were best equipped to handle regional responsibilities. The state was divided into ten regions based upon population, number of libraries and the existence of public library systems or proposed library systems. Other criteria used were the ratio of public to academic library depositories and federal depository status of designated state depositories.

In July of 1974 the ten regional depositories were named. At the same time a list of available series of Wisconsin documents was sent to all other depositories for their selection. Libraries were given the option of selecting to receive everything available but were encouraged to choose only those items which would be useful for their particular community.

The next phase of the depository system study was the writing of the *Manual for Wisconsin Document Depositories, Guidelines for Standards and Procedures of the Wisconsin Document Depository Program*. Intended as a "procedural" manual which would give the program uniformity and structure, this also serves as a written agreement of the mutually agreed upon principles on which the depositories operate. This *Manual* was adopted by the libraries and made effective January 1, 1975.

After two years of study and revision a foundation for a well-structured distribution program for state publications has been established. However, the study also identified many related

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issues of concern which as yet remain unsolved. To assist with the remaining issues an Advisory Committee was appointed in July, 1975. Responsibilities of the Committee fall into three categories:

- A Evaluation
 - 1. Review existing depository designation and determine effectiveness
 - 2. Review appeals and complaints presented by individual depositories and make recommendations
 - 3. Review recommendations of Division for Library Services staff regarding depository library activity
- B Implementation
 - 1. Recommend criteria for depository designation
 - 2. Recommend working definition of "public document"
 - 3. Identify common problems experienced by depository libraries
 - 4. Recommend a statewide public relations program to promote the concept of public access to public documents
- C Planning
 - 1. Recommend broad-range goals of the depository system
 - 2. Recommend state budget policy for the document distribution program
 - 3. Recommend revised legislation to facilitate the document depository system
 - 4. Consort with other states to secure federal government support for all public document programs.

The Committee began meeting immediately, giving top priority to "recommending revised legislation." The proposed legislation was completed in December, but was submitted too late in the legislative session for action. The passage of this legislation will be a major concern for the committee during the next year.

Wisconsin Health Science Library Network

With increasing emphasis being placed on continuing education and recertification becoming mandatory in a number of health occupations, more and more health professionals are demanding rapid and easy access to current and highly specialized information materials. In order to respond to these demands, libraries of all sorts are utilizing the Wisconsin Health Science Library Network, a portion of the nationwide Biomedical Communications Network. Through this network local libraries seeking health information not within their own collections refer requests to stronger and larger area collections. These libraries, in turn, may refer requests to the state resource libraries which receive back-up from other resource libraries in the six state area of the Midwest Health Science Library Network and ultimately, the National Library of Medicine. The two Wisconsin resource libraries are the Medical-Dental Library of the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee and the UW Wm S. Middleton Health Science Library in Madison.

The Wisconsin Health Science Library Network has been undergoing an intense period of growth and refinement during the past few years. Perhaps the most important accomplishment of this period has been the strengthening of local health science libraries through the formation of local library cooperatives or consortia. There are six health science library consortia within Wisconsin. These consortia are (1) the Fox River Valley Area Library Cooperative, (2) the Northern Wisconsin Health Science Libraries Cooperative, (3) the South Central Wisconsin Health Planning Area Cooperative, (4) The Southeastern Wisconsin Health Science Library Consortium, (5) the West Central Wisconsin Health Science Library Consortium and (6) the Western Wisconsin Consortium. Consortia members now bear the primary responsibility for supplying the more common materials for local needs. While members are predominantly health science libraries, there are an increasing number of technical institute, university and public libraries that utilize membership in these cooperatives to meet the health information needs of their users as well. Membership is free and continues to be open to all interested libraries. Cooperative programs presently include interlibrary loan, reference service, development of union lists, coordinated serials acquisition and retention programs and educational programs.

Wisconsin health science librarians continue to take an active role in directing activities that will influence them as a whole. To provide input to state health science library programs, a representative from each of Wisconsin's health service agency areas, roughly the same geographic area covered by each consortium, has been elected. The area representatives form the coordinating body of the Wisconsin Health Science Librarians. Such a task has been the recent organization of a state consultation program in which practicing hospital librarians will supply their expertise and knowledge to institutions with new developing health science libraries. Each representative is also responsible for communicating to his or her constituents decisions and announcements made by the area representatives and for conveying any comments, complaints and questions of their constituents to the area representatives' group and the resource library directors.

While the activities described above are generally continuations of projects begun within the past two years, a number of new projects have also been implemented within the past year:

- 1. An Ad Hoc committee has been formed to rewrite section H24.11 of the *Wisconsin Administrative Code: Rules of the State Board of Health*, standards for health science libraries.
- 2. A network interlace has been formed between WILS (Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service) and the Midwest Health Science Library Network. This provides access to the collections of the libraries located on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus to participants in the Wisconsin Health Science Library Network and health science libraries in five other states. This is especially helpful for administrative, psychological and sociological materials.

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The first step towards the development of a regional plan for the Midwest Health Science Library Network has been taken. Various information-seeking meetings involving library users, non-users, librarians and any other interested individuals have been taking place throughout the state. The aim of these nominal group meetings is to identify with direct involvement of health professionals and other users of health information the various problems they face when attempting to locate or obtain the information they need. This is the first time that the actual users of health information have had a direct opportunity to provide input about the types of information and services that they would like to have available from a health information network.

Finally, the promotion of existing health science library resources to potential users of these collections has increasingly become the responsibility of consortium members as the availability of library resources passes by word-of-mouth from health professional to health professional. However, informing potential users of the readily available materials and getting them to utilize these materials is still frequently one of the most difficult tasks of health science libraries throughout Wisconsin.

Wisconsin Information Retrieval for Education (WIRE)

Those who require access to educational research and resource information can find reference assistance to the computerized files of the Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) system through WIRE (Wisconsin Information Retrieval for Education).

Headquarters for the WIRE program is in the Department of Public Instruction, Information Systems Section of the Division for Management and Planning Services. Cooperating centers are located currently in Waukesha at the offices of the Cooperative Educational Service Agency 16 (CESA), and CESA 9 at Green Bay. WIRE uses computer terminals connected to the Madison Academic Computing Center on the University of Wisconsin Madison campus to search over 200,000 entries in the ERIC files. Abstracts of the citations retrieved are then sent to the patron. Typical entries in ERIC include reports, speeches, conference proceedings and other "fugitive" materials in the field of education. The system also indexes over 600 educational periodicals in the Current Index to Journals in Education file (CIJE).

WIRE operates on a system of partial cost recovery. Clients outside the Department of Public Instruction staff are required to pay \$10 per search. The charge includes any followup searching required to meet the client's need as specified in the original request. Clients are encouraged to come into the offices of DPI and cooperating CESA agencies to place request. Where this is impractical, phoned or written requests are acceptable. Normal turn around time for the service is ten days to two weeks including mailing. Information in the ERIC file covers almost any subject area which has any relation to the field of education.

Clients are encouraged to specify information requests in the same manner as one obtains reference assistance in the library. It is not necessary for the client to supply key-words to use the system.

Wisconsin Information Services

Information Services, originally established by the University-Industry Research Program in 1963 to serve Wisconsin's business and industry information needs, has broadened its services and expanded its scope to serve business and industry throughout the U.S.

Under the auspices of the College of Engineering, and the University-Industry Research Program, Information Services draws upon the University's scientific and technical libraries, information centers, and academic expertise of the faculty. Information Services provide a full range of services and in-depth information which may not be locally available to business and industrial personnel.

A professional staff provides access to interlibrary loan, photocopy, research, reference and referrals, library planning consultation for special business and industrial libraries and free on site use of University libraries and information centers. Recently Information Services expanded its literature searching capabilities and now has access to over forty computer data bases as well as over 300 hard copy abstracting and indexing services. Fees vary according to the complexity of request; over 20% of the requests are answered without charge.

Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS)

The Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS) was established at the University of Wisconsin Madison Memorial Library in the fall of 1972 by the Council of Wisconsin Librarians, Inc. (COWL) through a formal contractual agreement with the University of Wisconsin Madison to provide access to Madison campus library collections and share resources among Wisconsin's public and private academic institutions of higher education. WILS was located on the Madison campus in recognition of the unique and extensive library resources available and, as such, is engaged in loan of books, and materials in microformat, as well as photocopy of periodical articles, from Madison campus library collections, including the

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State Historical Society of Wisconsin. WILS serves 27 campuses of the University of Wisconsin System, 19 private academic institutions, and citizens of Wisconsin through their public libraries.

The WILS Office has been funded since its inception by the 46 participating academic libraries. In addition, a Division for Library Services (DLS) request for state funding of a resource contract with the University of Wisconsin--Madison for library services and resources through WILS began in the 1973-75 biennium in the amount of \$125,000 for the two year period, and for the 1975-77 biennium at a level of \$145,000. These funds provide base support to the WILS operation, which has undertaken direct responsibility for backing services to the clientele served by the Reference and Loan Library for materials available in the University of Wisconsin--Madison Campus Library System. With service to the academic libraries and the clientele served by Reference and Loan, WILS is providing a viable service to the citizens of the state of Wisconsin.

In late 1974, COWL applied for and was granted LSCA Title III (Interlibrary Cooperation) funding by DLS to provide for a WILS Teletype Network for a six-month period, January through June, 1975. At the termination of the grant period, 25 libraries retained this communication link and financed it out of their library budgets. In addition, WILS received an HEA Title II grant (College Library Resources) for purchase of library materials and services for the 1975-76 fiscal year.

The purpose of WILS is to provide maximum and equitable multiple use of Wisconsin library resources with a minimum of effort and without conflict of interest. In times of cost escalation, insatiable user demands, uncertain funding, and the literature/information explosion, cooperative use and planning are essential in order to make judicious use of available funding and library resources. A program such as WILS helps in this by supplementing local resources and enabling libraries to provide the necessary service to meet the needs of students, faculty and citizens of the state of Wisconsin which they could not offer independently.

The service provided by WILS includes expanded and expedited interlibrary loan. Patrons who have information needs that cannot be met by their own library are assisted by having their requests transmitted via teletype or, in some cases, by U.S. Mail to the WILS Office. Program personnel search, locate and retrieve the material from any of 22 libraries and several other special collections on the Madison Campus, charge out or photocopy the material in the host library and return it to the WILS Office where it is prepared for mailing. Approximately 60% of the filled requests are in the mail within 48 hours of the initial receipt of the request by WILS. Longer periods for mailing result from items circulating on the Madison Campus, lost, at the bindery, not yet received, etc.

In addition to having the capability of accessing collections in all other WILS participating libraries, WILS has initiated an interface with MINITEX (Minnesota Interlibrary Telecommunications Exchange) which provides access to major additional library resources for all members of both networks. In an

attempt to facilitate this access, WILS and MINITEX have exchanged microfilmed copies of their respective campus union card catalogs, as well as printed serials lists. WILS also has pilot projects underway with the Medical-Dental Library of the Medical College of Wisconsin and with the Midwest Health Science Library Network (MHSLN), a component of the National Library of Medicine, to provide materials on a reciprocal basis.

During the 1974-75 fiscal year, WILS processed in excess of 68,000 requests, an increase of 39% over the previous year, with an overall success rate of 80%. Academic library filled requests totaled 44,963, or 84% of requests submitted; public library filled requests totaled 9,260, or 63% of requests submitted. During this year, 93% of all filled requests were satisfied by Madison Campus Library System resources. Although the percentage of successful fills for public library requests is lower than for the academic libraries, it is understandable in view of the fact the public libraries request books over periodical articles at the rate of 4 to 1, while academic libraries reveal a reverse ratio. Books are in constant demand and in circulation to the 40,000 plus faculty, students and staff on the Madison Campus and are, therefore, not as readily available as periodicals which do not circulate on the campus. It is estimated that the level of requests WILS will process in 1975-76 will exceed 75,000.

Less than 2% of the books borrowed from Madison Campus library collections and loaned through WILS have had to be recalled from Madison campus patrons. This is a significant statistic and appears to shatter the myth that large academic research libraries cannot share their resources without conflict of interest. During the life of WILS, over 1,000,000 photoduplication exposures have been made and forwarded to requesting libraries. Staffing levels for WILS have gone from an initial complement of six, to 32 at the end of fiscal 1974-75. Of this number, five are full-time employees, while 27 are student assistants who work on the average of 20-30 hours per week. It is estimated that the staff figure will increase slightly during 1976, although WILS should experience a leveling off in volume of requests within the next two years.

While the scope, services and work load of WILS have increased at a phenomenal rate since 1972, future needs and goals are receiving constant attention. Among these are: (1) the realization for the need and a serious commitment by the entire Wisconsin library community to the development of a Wisconsin Serials Data Base to include holdings of academic, public, school, special and state agency libraries, who agree to share their resources via interlibrary loan or on-site use, as the only way to achieve effective and efficient sharing of serial resources on a statewide basis; a COWL committee has been at work for the past year pursuing this goal; (2) continued investigation for avenues of funding for a comprehensive WILS Teletype Network since expiration of the LSCA grant, and legislative funding for the entire WILS operation which has its precedent with the Minnesota legislative funding of MINITEX; (3) providing a formal, more comprehensive reference and information service as an important and essential component of WILS service to the state; (4) providing access to machine-readable

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
bibliographic data bases, such as ERIC, CHEMCON, NY TIMES INFORMATION BANK, etc; (5) active participation of WILS in the emerging MIDNET (Midwest Region Library Network), of which it is a member of the Board of Directors, to be a component in the services which this regional network will offer, as well as benefiting from those services.

WILS, as a member of the Wisconsin Library Consortium (WLC), which at the present time comprises seven University of Wisconsin System libraries, now has access to the Ohio College Library Center (OCLC) data base. The UW contract with OCLC provides that any library in Wisconsin may gain access to OCLC under the same agreement. The WILS CRT (cathode ray tube) terminal has been designated the WLC Network Terminal and is also being used by WILS staff to serve participating libraries for verification, citation and location information.

Wisconsin Library Services to the Visually and Physically Handicapped

In 1961 state legislation enabled the establishment of a Wisconsin Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped in the Milwaukee Public Library, under a contract administered by the Department of Public Welfare (now the Department of Health and Social Services). The Regional

Library was established as an extension of the Library of Congress, Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped.

In 1970, responsibility for the contract with the Milwaukee Public Library to administer the Regional Library was transferred to the Division for Library Services.

The Regional Library receives talking books and machines, cassettes and cassette machines, and braille materials from the Library of Congress. The state contract provides funds for staff and operating costs. The Milwaukee Public Library houses and administers the Regional Library and provides its large-print book collection for circulation. It is important to note that the reading materials supplied by the Library of Congress do not adequately fill the needs of readers. Specialized and local interest materials must be supplied from state or donated funds.

Wisconsin has approximately 44,200 individuals who, because of temporary or permanent visual or physical disabilities, are unable to read ordinary print comfortably, and thus require and are eligible for the Regional Library's specialized library materials.

The 1975 Annual Report of the Regional Library reveals that there are 7,109 readers registered for services in the following categories:

Cassettes	1,578

Some readers are users of more than one form of material and are counted twice. The actual number of persons registered, therefore, is about 5,500. The service of the Regional Library is extended also to 591 agencies, as follows:

The Library of Congress, Division for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, multiplies each institution by 10 to determine total readership. In this calculation, the total readership of the Regional Library would be 13,019. The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Health and Social Services, provides information on potential eligible readers to the Regional Library, and helps to inform those eligible readers of available services. Several public libraries have developed noteworthy service programs, usually in cooperation with the Regional Library. Numerous agencies, volunteers and volunteer groups have made valuable contributions.

A second major library resource for the blind and physically handicapped in Wisconsin is the Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped in Janesville, which serves not only its resident student population but also eligible users throughout

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the state with school-related materials. The school is administered by the Division for Handicapped Children, Department of Public Instruction. The school receives one copy of each appropriate talking and braille book through the Regional Library from the Library of Congress. A Professional Services Center has been established at the school with these functions:

- a. Work with Wisconsin School for the Visually Handicapped teachers in preparation of materials: videotape, audiotape, compressed speech, games and other aids, print (Bruning copier), laminating and braille.
- b. Provision of a retrieval system of materials for local public school systems.
- c. Provision of an inventory to clarify what materials are available and where they are located.

The Volunteer Services Center, located in the Milwaukee Public Library, is the only centralized transcription agency for blind and partially-sighted individuals in Wisconsin. It began in October, 1965 with 11 volunteers; today, over 250 men and women volunteer their time to help in its programs. They transcribe materials in three media: braille, enlarged type and tape records. Materials vary from cookbooks to the Greek classics to children's 'picture' books (with cats and mittens the child can feel). The books are not only transcribed, but illustrated and bound at the Center. These services are available to any eligible person in the state. The Center operates entirely on donated services and funds.

Wisconsin Library Services to the Institutionalized

The Division for Library Services has, since 1966, been able to contribute significantly to the improvement of library services in

state institutions and residential schools for the handicapped, and to other agencies responsible for the care and training of handicapped or institutionalized persons. Great credit for the division's contributions rests with two federal programs administered by the Division: the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA), and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), Title II.

Under LSCA, the residential facilities eligible for funds are operated by three major state departments: 1) Department of Health and Social Services; 2) Department of Public Instruction; and, 3) Department of Veterans Affairs. These institutions and residential facilities, and the programs carried on by them, are described in further detail in the 'Comprehensive Long-Range Program for Library Services in Wisconsin,' (WISCONSIN LIBRARY BULLETIN Supplements, September-October, 1972-75).

Persons confined in local and county agencies for custody, care, training, or rehabilitation have benefited from service programs of many public libraries in the state. Added efforts to improve library services in county jails, both to inmates and staff, were begun in 1973. The development of public library systems will enhance these many extension and outreach programs.

State correctional and mental institutions have been provided with substantial infusions of legal reference and research materials as a result of efforts of the State Public Defender's Office, utilizing Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds granted by the Wisconsin Council on Criminal Justice.

Non-library organization, volunteer groups, and individual volunteers make a significant contribution to the provision of library service to persons who are institutionalized in local, county, and state administered facilities.

CHAPTER 2 LIBRARY AND MEDIA ORGANIZATIONS

CHAPTER 3
LIBRARY EDUCATION
Task Force on Library Manpower and Education

The Council on Library Development, the advisory body to the Division for Library Services, Department of Public Instruction, is appointed by the Governor. It has responsibility for insuring the availability and promoting the development of quality library resources and services for all citizens of Wisconsin. One of its functions is to evaluate library personnel requirements and make recommendations concerning personnel certification and library education and training programs, including those for continuing education.

A major responsibility for assessing library manpower requirements in Wisconsin and making recommendations for library education and training programs to meet the needs of the library personnel who must cope with the changing role of libraries rests with the Council on Library Development.

The Council took the first step to gather the necessary data to carry out its responsibility toward library personnel by appointing a Task Force on Library Manpower and Education in December, 1973. The Task Force was broadly representative of all library, media and information groups, types of libraries in the state and levels of personnel positions. The Task Force was charged with the mission of studying the Wisconsin library manpower, education and certification needs and resources for the next decade and to report their recommendations to the Council on Library Development by June 30, 1975. The Task Force functioned through a Steering Committee and three working groups, one on library manpower requirements, one on certification requirements for library personnel and one on library education. Muriel Fuller, University of Wisconsin Extension, Department of Communication Arts, was chairperson of the Task Force. David Hoffman was the Task Force Coordinator.

The following was taken from *Final Report of the Task Force on Library Manpower and Education to the Council on Library Development June 30, 1975*. Copies of the Task Force Final Report are available from the Wisconsin Division for Library Services.

Summary of Task Force Recommendations

The Task Force reviewed the available data on present and potential future requirements for personnel in library, media, and information programs. It noted a variety of factors which will have effect on the numbers of persons required to provide library services during the decade ending in 1985. It considered factors which will affect Wisconsin's need for library personnel, and it noted the variety of factors, trends, and issues identified in the course of its study.

The Task Force considered the material gathered on present education programs in Wisconsin and the policies and guidelines on library education adopted by the American Library Association, as well as the responses to questionnaires addressed to library administrators, library staff members, school administrators, and public library board members, in arriving at recommendations on library, media education, including both

degree programs and continuing education. The following are the final recommendations of the Task Force on Library Manpower and Education.

The Task Force Recommends:

- 1) That *Library Education and Manpower*, a statement of policy adopted by the Council of the American Library Association, June 30, 1970, serve as the guideline within which library education programs in Wisconsin are developed, except to the extent that it must be modified by certification structures developed by legitimate certifying bodies within the state which have had the cooperation of the library profession.
- 2) That care be taken that the quantity of technical and professional courses taken at the undergraduate level does not crowd out general liberal arts and science education. It further recommends that to this end those responsible for library education programs at both undergraduate and graduate levels maintain effective and continuing contact with counselors and advisors for undergraduate students.
- 3) That strong efforts be made to develop and continue articulation and coordination between library/media education programs at their several levels.
- 4) That the newly-formed Education Section of the Wisconsin Library Association take the initiative, through the formation of a sub-section or other appropriate unit, in bringing together representatives of all the library/media education programs in the state, to meet together for continuing study and review of library/media education needs and for joint planning where appropriate.
- 5) That universities which offer master's degrees in library science, audio-visual communications, or educational media, develop cooperative plans which, subject to policies governing the individual university or imposed by relevant accrediting bodies, would permit students to take advantage of unique strengths in other departments or on other campuses when appropriate to career goals.
- 6) That universities offering master's degrees in library science, audio-visual communications, or educational media, review the possibilities of offering their courses on other campuses which do not have similar programs, when appropriate library, laboratory, or other facilities are available.
- 7) That the Council on Library Development establish a broadly-representative group, charged with continuing study of degree-oriented library education in Wisconsin, including but not limited to the following items.

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Task Force on Library Manpower and Education

- a) Employers' expectations of the knowledges and skills graduate library programs in Wisconsin should provide to meet the needs of their libraries.
 - b) Student perceptions regarding the appropriateness of their education.
 - c) Identified needs for skills not currently being met which are feasible to be included in graduate curriculums.
 - d) Identified needs which should be the responsibility of the employer through the provision of in-service training and of the employee through participation in continuing education programs.
- 8) That the Division for Library Services establish a library/media continuing education council, representing institutions with different levels of library/media education programs, the several professional associations in the library/media field, and representatives of persons employed in libraries and media centers with different levels of education and different levels of job responsibility. It recommends that this Council be charged with: identifying and assessing continuing education needs of library/media personnel; working with appropriate agencies to see that programs are developed to meet these needs; keeping up to date the information already gathered about current library/media education programs; and taking responsibility for state-wide publicizing of these programs. It further recommends that the Division provide staff and funds to support the work of the Council.
 - 9) That those responsible for setting personnel policy, and those responsible for the administration of library/media programs be encouraged to recognize continuing education as one of the bases for promotion or salary advancement, for personnel at all levels of responsibility
 - 10) That library/media personnel at all levels be encouraged to participate in appropriate continuing education programs.
 - 11) That a model orientation program for public library board members be designed, using the joint efforts of the Wisconsin Library Trustees Association, the Wisconsin Division for Library Services, representatives of local government library administrators, and the University of Wisconsin - Extension, Department of Communication, which might be used or adapted by local libraries or library systems.
 - 12) That Wisconsin Library Trustees Association and American Library Trustees Association examine their membership recruiting procedures to determine whether their means of reaching potential members are as effective as they might be.
 - 13) That organizations or agencies preparing programs for public library board members take the relative importance assigned to various topics by library board members into consideration as they plan such programs.
 - 14) As a part of the Library/Media Continuing Education Council, there be a committee on programs for library board members with at least representation from the Wisconsin Library Trustees Association, the Wisconsin Division for Library Services, the University of Wisconsin-Extension Department of Communication, the several levels and types of library/media education programs, library administrators, and local government. It recommends that this committee be charged with: reviewing on-going education programs for library board members, identifying needs not met by on-going programs, working with appropriate agencies or organizations in appropriate ways to meet those needs, and making information about such programs available to library board members throughout the state.
 - 15) A program of certification for public library personnel, as follows:

Certification Agency: The Division for Library Services of the Department of Public Instruction, advised by the Council on Public Library Certificates and Standards.

Types of Certificates: Three grades, for heads of libraries and for other positions on library staffs as determined by local library boards. Libraries may require personnel with professional or technical preparation in other fields, but certification in other specialties is not proposed.

Grade I: Requiring a bachelor's degree from a college or university approved by an accrediting association of more than statewide standing, and in addition a fifth-year degree from a library school program accredited by the American Library Association; the Division may satisfy itself by examination or evaluation of credentials whether persons who hold fifth-year degrees from library school programs not accredited by the American Library Association are competent to provide professional library work ably and efficiently, and if so, it shall grant them Grade I certificates upon application.

Grade II: Requiring a bachelor's degree from a college or university approved by an accrediting association of more than statewide standing, including or supplemented by courses in public library administration, selection of library materials (including non-print materials), the organization of library materials, and reference and information service.

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Grade III: Requiring at least two years of study in a college or technical institution, in a program which includes courses in the liberal arts and sciences and course work in librarianship at least equivalent to the University Extension Directed Home-Study Course A-50, Basic Library Management for Public Librarians. The Division may approve other course work as equivalent.

Types of Certification: All certificates should be issued for five-year periods. Permanent certificates issued under previous certification programs should continue to be valid for the position which the incumbent holds at the time of adoption of the new program.

Renewal of Certificates: Certificates may be renewed upon evidence that the holder has participated in continuing education in librarianship which is either directly related to the position held or will permit advancement in the profession. The Council on Public Library Certificates and Standards should define continuing education requirements, including numbers and types of programs that would qualify persons for recertification and a method of verifying participation of the chief librarian and staff members in continuing education. Upon the second consecutive renewal a life certificate shall be issued.

Application of Certificates: Head Librarians: Administrators of public library systems, and head librarians in all libraries serving at least 10,000 population should hold Grade I certificates. Heads of libraries serving at least 2,500 persons but not more than 9,999 persons should hold at least Grade II certificates. Heads of libraries serving fewer than 2,500 persons should hold at least Grade III certificates.

Application of Certificates: Staff Positions: Unless otherwise required in the *Administrative Code*, the library system or local library board should determine the grades of certificates to be held by persons in various positions in the system or library.

Enforcement: Funds disbursed by the Division for Library Services should not be distributed, directly or indirectly, to any public library which does not employ as head librarian a person who holds appropriate certification.

- 16) A program of certification for school media personnel, as follows.

Certification Agency: The Department of Public Instruction.

Types of Certificates: Three types, as listed below:

Media District Supervisor: Requiring successful experience as a school media specialist, and courses beyond the master's degree in principles of school administration, supervision or personnel management, and school librarianship, educational technology, or information science.

Media Specialist (Level I): Requiring a teaching license and a master's degree from a program that combines library technology, and curriculum. The academic preparation will provide for the development of competencies relating to the provision of effective media programs.

Media Specialist (Level II): Requiring a teaching license and a bachelor's degree from a program that includes courses in library science and educational technology. The academic preparation will provide for the development of competencies relating to the provision of effective media programs.

Terms of Certification: Terms of certification, and renewal, should be consistent with teacher certification practices. Renewal should recognize the importance of continuing education.

Application of Certificates: The Media District Supervisor certificate should be held by persons responsible for supervision of district-wide media programs. The Media Specialist (Level I) certificate should be held by persons responsible for building-level programs which combine library and audiovisual services. The Media Specialist (Level II) certificate should be regarded as minimum requirement for persons responsible for building level programs. Professional media personnel other than those responsible for administration of district or building level programs should hold certificates at a level determined by the local school district.

Application of Certificates to Non-Public Schools: Although non-public schools are not obligated to employ licensed or certificated media personnel, they should be encouraged to do so, and qualified personnel in non-public schools should be encouraged to seek certification.

LIBRARY EDUCATION
Library/Media Education Programs in Wisconsin

Library and media education programs are offered in a variety of public and private post-secondary institutions in Wisconsin. Continuing education programs for library and media personnel are offered by these institutions, and by a number of governmental agencies and professional organizations. This review

attempts to include those campus-based programs which lead to diplomas or degrees in the library science and audio-visual fields or meet requirements for certification by an appropriate government or professional agency. It also examines continuing education programming by other library-related agencies and

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organizations, including the major professional library and media bodies in the state.

One-and Two-Year Programs

District One Technical Institute has a one-year program leading to a diploma for audio-visual assistants. The program is designed to train individuals in audio-visual equipment operation and utilization and to give an understanding of the relationship of media to the whole area of communication. General education courses and library orientation are included in the program, as well as instruction in the audio-visual field.

Alverno College and Gateway Technical Institute have two-year programs leading to associate degrees in library science or library/media education. Graduates of these programs meet library education requirements for Grade 3 Public Librarian Certificates required for heads of public libraries in communities of 2,000 to 4,000 population, and required of certain positions in larger libraries, depending on local library policies.

The Madison Area Technical College, the Milwaukee Area Technical College, and the Western Wisconsin Technical Institute have two-year programs leading to associate degrees in visual communications or visual media. Technicians who complete these programs are trained to work with professional personnel in the production of materials and the operation and maintenance of audio-visual equipment.

Undergraduate Programs— Library Science and Audio-Visual Minor

Undergraduate programs leading to a minor in library science, library media education, or instructional media are offered on fifteen campuses: Alverno, Marian, Northland, Silver Lake and Viterbo Colleges, and the University of Wisconsin units in Eau Claire, LaCrosse, Madison, Milwaukee, Oshkosh, Platteville, River Falls, Stevens Point, Superior and Whitewater. The State Department of Public Instruction has approved programs in each of these institutions leading to a three-year license for school librarians. Courses in library administration, selection of materials, reference and cataloging and classification, offered in each of these programs, are accepted by the Department's Division for Library Services as meeting librarianship course work requirements for Grade 2 Public Librarian Certificates. A minor in library science from any of these institutions will meet the library education requirements for provisional certification as a librarian in rules established by the State Board of Vocational, Technical, and Adult Education.

The University of Wisconsin - La Crosse offers an undergraduate minor in AudioVisual Media to students in the College of Arts, Letters and Sciences, and in the College of Education. In the latter, it fulfills audio-visual education requirements for certification as Audio-Visual Director by the Department of Public Instruction

Undergraduate Programs—Library Science Major

The University of Wisconsin—Oshkosh offers an undergraduate major in library science which meets, for School of Education students with professional education requirements, certification as school librarians and audiovisual coordinators. Students in the College of Letters and Science with a major in library science meet requirements for a Grade 2 Public Librarian Certificate, and are eligible upon graduation for paraprofessional positions in public, academic, and special libraries. A practicum in a non-school library is required for both Education and Letters and Science students; those in Education also take an Education practicum.

Graduate Programs—Master's Degrees in Library Science.

Graduate programs leading to master's degrees in library science are offered at the University of Wisconsin campuses in Madison, Milwaukee and Oshkosh. The master's degree in library science offers one means of fulfilling educational requirements for an unlimited credential as school librarian established by the State Department of Public Instruction, and one means of meeting the professional education requirement for standard five year certification for librarians issued by the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education. A master's degree in library science or related area is one of the requirements for School Librarian Supervisor, a certification offered by the Department of Public Instruction but not presently required by Wisconsin public schools. It is part of the educational requirement for positions in the Librarian, Librarian Supervisor, and Public Library Consultant series in Wisconsin State Civil service. Specific educational qualifications for librarian positions in Federal civil service vary according to level of responsibility and scope of assignment.

The master's degree is recognized as a basic educational requirement for beginning professional librarian positions in the American Library Association's policy statement "Library Education and Manpower", adopted by the Council of the American Library Association, June 30, 1970. The American Library Association is authorized by the Commission on Post Secondary Education (formerly the National Commission on Accrediting) as the accrediting agency for graduate programs of library education leading to the first professional degree.

Persons with fifth-year degrees from library school programs accredited by the American Library Association meet the professional requirements for Grade 1 public library certification in Wisconsin, and as such are eligible to hold positions as heads of public libraries in counties or municipalities of 8,000 population or over (except cities of the first class, to which such certification does not apply) and as heads of public library systems.

There is no uniform statewide educational requirement for employment of librarians in academic or special libraries, although the American Library Association's standards for college libraries (those adopted in 1959 and the 1975 revised

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draft not yet presented for adoption at the time of this writing) specify as professional preparation for a librarian a graduate degree from an ALA-accredited program. Actual requirements of academic libraries in Wisconsin vary from institution to institution. Relatively few of the special libraries listed in the *1973 Wisconsin Library Service Record* indicated employment of one or more persons with fifth-year degrees in library science; many of the libraries have less than one person in total staff, including all levels of education.

Graduation from a library school program accredited by the American Library Association is one of the requirements for certification as a Medical Librarian under the Code for Certification and Training of Medical Librarians of the Medical Library Association; under the Code for Certification of Health Sciences Librarians and Library Technicians, to be implemented in 1976, the requirement continues. Certification by the Medical Library Association is voluntary and not necessarily a condition for employment in a medical library. A graduate degree from a library school program accredited by the American Library Association fulfills one of the requirements for certification by the American Association of Law Libraries. This certification is voluntary and not necessarily a condition for employment in a law library.

Graduate Programs— Post-Master's Programs in Library Science

The Library School of the University of Wisconsin—Madison offers two programs of study beyond the master's degree: a sixth-year specialist program and a doctoral program.

The Specialist in Librarianship Certification program is a second-year graduate program, combining specialization in librarianship with advanced study in an academic discipline or related professional field. An applicant for admission to the program must hold a fifth-year professional degree in library science and have had at least two years of professional library experience following that degree. A statement of professional interest and reasons for wishing to enter advanced study must be submitted. Programs are tailored to the particular needs of the student; an oral examination in the area of specialty is required, as is a specialist paper.

The Library School of the University of Wisconsin—Madison also offers a Ph.D. program preparing librarians for the fields of education, research in librarianship, and administration of large systems of libraries. The doctoral degree is a research degree. A minor in an outside field is required; further work in another academic field is permitted. Applicants for admission must hold a master's degree in Library Science from an accredited library school, and should have completed at least two years of professional library experience following the first professional degree prior to engaging in doctoral study.

Graduate Programs— Audio-Visual Communications, Educational Media, Educational Technology/Instructional Materials

Graduate programs in the audio-visual and instructional materials fields are offered at four units of the University of Wisconsin: La Crosse, Madison, Milwaukee, and Stout.

The program at the University of Wisconsin—La Crosse has as its objectives: to train audio-visual directors and coordinators, for the elementary and secondary schools of Wisconsin and other states; to train media specialists to administer and supervise instructional materials centers; to provide audio-visual specialists and coordinators for business, industry and other institutions of higher learning; to train professionals to provide leadership in design, implementation, and evaluation of programs in education which makes the fullest use of new media; and to prepare teachers to operate and properly utilize audio-visual media in the classroom. The degree of Master of Science in Audio-Visual Media is offered.

The program in Educational Technology and Instructional Materials within the Department of Curriculum and Instruction at the University of Wisconsin—Madison places emphasis on instructional development in the broad sense, and draws students from a variety of professional fields in addition to those in education. Its objectives include the development of an understanding of theory and research in media, the preparation of teachers with media competencies, and of trainers with instructional design capability. The Degrees of Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in Curriculum and Instruction, with an emphasis on Educational Technology are offered. The Department of Curriculum and Instruction at the University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee offers courses in instructional technology and instructional media which, as a part of a Master's Degree in Curriculum and Instruction, will meet requirements for certification as an Audio-Visual Director by the Department of Public Instruction.

The program at the University of Wisconsin—Stout is designed to prepare students for a professional career in educational media. Upon completion of the program the student is qualified to plan, produce, and utilize media, teach courses in the audio-visual area, and administer media programs in education, industry and government. Each graduate will be proficient in the production, storage, retrieval, and distribution of media; well grounded in curriculum, communication, and learning theory and administrative procedures, and have a basic knowledge of research techniques. The degree of Master of Science in Audio-Visual Communications is awarded.

Off-Campus Programs

Many of the library/media education programs within the University of Wisconsin system offer courses for academic credit in off-campus locations. Some of these have been within the immediate area of the campus (i.e., communities in the surrounding counties) and some have been offered on the

opposite side of the state, depending on the nature of the course and the specific needs of the students enrolled.

Campus-Based Non-Credit Programs

More than half of the library education programs considered in this review offer non-credit continuing education opportunities through workshops, seminars, colloquia, conferences, and the like. The level of annual programing varies, according to constraints on faculty time and on budgets.

In addition to workshops designed to meet specific needs in an area or institution (e.g., special programs designed for library/media personnel in a given school district), some of the programs have held annual conferences for librarians for some years.

University of Wisconsin-Extension Programs in Library Science

The Department of Communication of the University of Wisconsin—Extension offers a course in *Basic Library Management for Public Librarians (A-50)* which is one means of meeting the library education requirement for Grades 2 and 3 Public Librarian Certificates. The course is in 14 2-hour sessions on the UW-Extension's Educational Telephone Network, and, while planned for heads of smaller public libraries, is also open to staff members. Enrollees must be employed in a Wisconsin public library.

Through its Independent Study program, the University of Wisconsin—Extension also offers two correspondence courses in library Science: A-54, *Organization of Library Materials I*, and A-55, *Organization of Library Materials II*. These courses are offered for the in-service training of those who have or seek responsibilities on a library staff, but they are not offered as a substitute for professional library education and do not earn academic credit toward a degree from the University of Wisconsin.

The University of Wisconsin—Extension's Educational Telephone Network continues to be the medium for a number of in-service and continuing education programs for library personnel.

Medical Library Service Program Middleton Medical Library

The Medical Library Service program of the Middleton Medical Library provides a statewide continuing education program for medical library personnel. A series of medical library

seminars is offered over the University of Wisconsin—Extension's Educational Telephone Network.

The Medical Library Service also provides an annual workshops for medical librarians. The workshops vary in length according to subject. Continuing Education courses designed by the Medical Library Association are from time to time offered in this workshop series.

Wisconsin Audio-Visual and Library Associations

The Wisconsin Audio-Visual Association and its satellites offer a number of programs during the year for the continuing education of its members. Recent topics have included: copyright, new national standards, and the implications of recent state legislation. WAVA has from time to time sent official representatives to leadership conferences held out of state and on some occasions has been able to provide some expenses for travel. WAVA and the Wisconsin Association of School Librarians held a joint spring meeting in February 1975 to consider the national media standards issued jointly by the American Association of School Librarians and the Association for Educational Communications and Technology.

The Wisconsin chapters of the Special Libraries Association and the American Society for Information Science were co-sponsors, with the University of Wisconsin—Extension, Department of Communication, of a one-day workshop on Information Services in Madison in 1975. Both chapters have periodic meetings for their members.

The Wisconsin Library Association and its divisions provide a variety of continuing education opportunities through spring meetings and workshops as well as the annual conference in the fall.

The Division for Library Services

The Division for Library Services is actively involved in continuing education programs, participating in planning and in funding, with other organizations and agencies. In addition, the Division staff participate in planning and carrying out workshops for public and school library systems; the Division has initiated a statewide project to develop video training expertise in public libraries (to include training in use of equipment and script writing in individual libraries and library systems, and video production); Division grants make possible attendance at out-of-state workshops for selected Wisconsin librarians and provide scholarship support for some of the students enrolled in the University Extension course A-50, *Basic Library Management for Public Librarians*.

CHAPTER 5
FEDERAL LIBRARY PROGRAMS IN WISCONSIN
Elementary Secondary Education Act, Title II (ESEA II)

Elementary Secondary Education Act, Title II (ESEA II)

ESEA Title II is a federal program which provides grants in aid to school libraries. The intent of these grants is to encourage the development of school library media programs through the purchase of library books, filmstrips, records, tapes and other non-equipment forms of media. The program began in 1965 and over the past eleven years nearly twenty million dollars has been allocated to public and non-public schools throughout the State. Each school building has been receiving a basic grant which is determined by student enrollment and an add-on feature for showing agent need. In addition the basic grant schools have had the opportunity to apply for special competitive grants of up to \$20,000. 1976 is the final year for this program as it consolidates into the ESEA Title IV-B program.

ESEA Title IV-B is a federal grant in aid program to schools. It is a consolidation of three long standing programs into a new single program, the consolidated programs are ESEA Title II (library materials) NDEA Title III (equipment and critical subject areas) and ESEA Title III (guidance, counseling and testing). The name of the program is "Libraries and Learning Resources" however, the monies need not be spent just on libraries but may be used in all areas of the school curriculum for materials, equipment, remodeling or guidance related services. The FY 76 budget for Title IV-B is approximately 1.5 million dollars. FY 77 is approximately 3 million dollars. Allocations are made to schools on a per pupil allocation with no consideration given for greater needs; also, competitive projects are no longer a part of the program.

**FEDERAL LIBRARY PROGRAMS IN WISCONSIN
Library Services and Construction Act, Titles I and III (LSCA)**

The federal Library Services and Construction Act reached its 20th year during this 1975 year of the Service Record.

times a year to review Wisconsin LSCA progress in terms both of the long-range plan and of each annual program.

The purposes of the program have not changed; they remain "...extension and improvement of public library services in areas of the States which are without such services or in which services are inadequate..." The original limitation to rural services only, was removed in 1964. Special focus was added in 1967 for library services in state institutions, for the blind and physically handicapped, and for interlibrary cooperation. "LSCA" remains a categorical aids program. It was not affected by the block grant factors legislated in the Education Amendments Act of 1974.

Slightly less than \$16 million have come to Wisconsin from LSCA since 1956 beginnings. The state's share of the national appropriation for Title I this year is \$1,023,147 for public, institutional, and handicapped library services, and \$50,109 for Title III, intertype services. The Division has approved grants in the following broad classifications:

Each state library agency must develop and maintain a comprehensive, long-range plan for library development. (By statute, Wisconsin's "state library agency" is the Division for Library Services.) Its long-range plan has been published each year as a supplement issue of the *Wisconsin Library Bulletin*. (Cf. *Wisconsin Library Bulletin*, September-October 1975 Supplement)

This plan, along with detailed individual project information and a state agency contract with the Federal Government for each year of LSCA operations, maintains eligibility for all Wisconsin public libraries, institution libraries, and intertype library organizations to apply for funds from the federal program

This listing does not show that eleven of the projects are for services to the disadvantaged, for a total of \$87,290.

The federal Act requires each state to establish an Advisory Council with members representative of the librarianship and clientele served by the program (public, institutional, handicapped, and intertype services). The Council meets several

Responsibility for administration of LSCA in Wisconsin is placed with the Division's Bureau of Public and Cooperative Library Services. Project monitoring and evaluation are ongoing tasks of Bureau consultant staff.

FEDERAL LIBRARY PROGRAMS IN WISCONSIN
Higher Education Act, Title II A and B (HEA II)

HEA Title II-A provides basic grants of up to \$5,000 to college and university libraries to acquire books and audiovisual materials, plus supplemental grants to build up library resources in developing institutions and special purpose grants to support consortium development. Under the basic grant program, each accredited or provisionally accredited institution of postsecondary education is entitled to a \$5,000 basic grant for library resources. Nationally, over 3,000 academic institutions are eligible for basic grants. The national appropriations for HEA II-A for FY 1976 was \$9,975,000. In Wisconsin 58 academic

institutions and 22 nonprofit library agencies shared \$300,836 in FY 1975.

HEA Title II-B is concerned with library training and demonstration projects. Two-thirds of the funds appropriated under Part B are designated for programs which provide training for librarians and library educators. The remaining one third is for support of library research and demonstration projects. The national appropriation for HEA II-B for FY 1976 was \$1,500,000.

CHAPTER 6
ACADEMIC LIBRARY SERVICES
Academic Libraries—State Summary

A National Summary

The National Center for Education Statistics, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare carried out a survey of all academic libraries in the United States in 1975. A total of 2,977 academic libraries were contacted with 95 percent (2,817 institutions) responding. The following nation-wide academic summary is based on information provided by that survey.

For all institutions of higher education, the total expenditures for libraries increased at an average annual rate of only 5 percent, from 1972-73 to 1974-75. This is considerably less than the previous average annual rates of increase of from 12 to 15 percent, for the years from 1967-68 to 1970-71. The expenditures for salaries and wages increased at an average annual rate of 8 percent, compared to the average annual rates of 14 to 16 percent for the previous years. It is interesting to note that the expenditures for books and microforms increased at an average annual rate of only 1.4 percent from 1972-73 to 1974-75 (although the cost of books increased 4 percent per year), when expenditures for books and microforms increased at an average annual rate of from 8 to 13 percent from 1967-68 to 1970-71. During the same period (1972-73 to 1974-75) the expenditures for periodical subscriptions increased at an average annual rate of 18 percent, which was in line with the 17 percent average annual increase in the cost of periodicals for these years.

The total staff of the college and university libraries increased at an average annual rate of 1.3 percent (from fall 1973 to fall 1975), compared to previous average annual increases of 4 percent (from fall 1968 to fall 1971). During the past two years clerical and other staff members of the libraries increased at an average annual rate of 2.4 percent, compared to the average annual rate of increase of 4 percent for previous years. During the same period the number of librarians increased at an average annual rate of 1.5 percent. However, professional staff other than librarians decreased at an average annual rate of 9 percent from fall 1973 to fall 1975.

With respect to holdings, the number of volumes of books held at the end of the year increased at an average annual rate of 4 percent, as did periodical subscriptions, from 1972-73 to 1974-75, compared to the average annual rate of increase of from 6 to 8 percent for books, and from 5 to 18 percent for periodical subscriptions, for the years from 1967-68 to 1970-71.

Wisconsin Academic Libraries

In 1975 there were 75 institutions of higher education operating in Wisconsin. This included 44 public institutions and 31 private institutions. The public institutions included 13 four year University of Wisconsin (UW) campuses, 14 two year University of Wisconsin Center System campuses, and 16 Vocational, Technical, Adult Education (VTAE) district campuses. The University of Wisconsin Center System also maintains a library in Madison which serves all institutions in the Center System. The 31 private institutions include 21 four year Liberal Arts colleges and universities, 4 professional schools, 4 theological seminaries, and 2 two year junior colleges. All of these institutions maintain libraries.

Total enrollment in these academic institutions increased from 229,772 in fall 1974 to 240,861 fall 1975, an overall increase of 4.8 percent. Enrollment increased 5 percent in public institutions and 3.4 percent in private institutions. As in 1974, 87 percent of all students in 1975 were enrolled in public institutions.

In 1975 the total number of volumes owned by academic libraries was 9,609,659 volumes, an 8.5 percent increase over the 8,853,822 volumes owned in 1974. The number of volumes added increased slightly from 537,588 volumes added in 1973-74 to 548,847 volumes added in 1974-75, an increase of 2%. The number of periodical subscriptions also increased slightly from 107,358 in fall 1974 to 109,279 in fall 1975, an increase of 1.8 percent.

In 1974-75 academic libraries reported spending \$23,692,160 for salaries, books, periodicals, audio-visual materials, binding and all other operating expenditures. This compares to \$15,686,054 spent by academic libraries in 1970-71, \$16,290,513 spent in 1971-72, and \$19,126,030 spent in 1972-73 and \$19,943,762 spent in 1973-74. Eighty-three percent of the total amount spent in 1975 was spent by public institutions.

Of the total amount spent in 1974-75, 58.4 percent was spent for salaries, 29.1 percent was spent for books and other print materials including materials in microform, 3.2 percent for audiovisual and other non-print material, and 9.3 percent went for all other operating expenditures. The per student expenditures by academic libraries was \$98.36 for 1974-75 based on a comparison of total enrollment and total library operating expenditures.

Academic libraries employed a total of 1,042.5 employees in full time equivalents in fall 1975 (excluding maintenance staff and students serving on an hourly basis). Of this total 79.2 percent are employed in public institutions.


CHAPTER 7
SCHOOL LIBRARY MEDIA PROGRAMS
Annual Report

The growth of the centralized library media programs continues in Wisconsin schools. The library media center which gathers, organizes, makes accessible, and promotes the use of full range of print and audiovisual materials and technology is becoming an essential part of a quality educational program.

The latest survey of school media program development was taken during 1975. A comparison of this data with that from the 1965 ESEA Title II survey shows the dramatic developments that have taken place in ten years.

A centralized school library media program is the most efficient way of making accessible collections of print and audiovisual materials, equipment, facilities, and staff to promote effective use.


**Percentages of Public School Buildings

The picture is somewhat distorted by the large number of schools with small enrollments. This makes it necessary to look at the number of students being served by centralized libraries.

During the 1974-75 school year 499 Wisconsin public schools did not provide their students with centralized library facilities. The combined enrollment of these 499 schools was 90,023. Ninety-six of the 499 schools had enrollments of over 300 students.

The Wisconsin map (Figure 1) showing the Cooperative Educational Service Agencies (CESAs) indicates the following distribution of schools in each CESA without centralized libraries:

Further analysis revealed that about 83% of the elementary school students enrolled in Wisconsin schools in 1974-75 were provided with centralized library services. However, one of every six students found no centralized library facility available to serve his educational needs.

Local expenditures for the purchase of student library books, periodicals and newspapers, audiovisual materials, and other library expenses showed considerable growth during the period from 1965 to 1975, reflecting increased local support for library media collection development. In 1965 public school districts spent about \$4.5 million for these four categories of materials. This increased to \$12.3 million in 1975, an increase of 275%. Per pupil expenditures for this group of categories was \$5.27 in 1965, and had increased to \$13.26 in 1975, a growth of 252%.


The Common School Fund monies are paid to the public schools by the Department of Public Instruction each year in January. These payments are authorized by State Statute 43.70 and are based on the number of children between the ages of 4 and 20 residing in the district. State statutes indicate that the money thus received must be used for the "purchase of library books and other instructional materials for school libraries." The total amount of these segregated payments has risen from \$929,796 in 1965 to \$2,306,401 in 1975.

With the increase in expenditures the size of instructional materials collections has shown dramatic growth. In 1965 only about 15% of all public schools had book collections which met state standards of 10 books per child or 6,000 books, whichever was larger. In 1975, 74% of all public elementary and secondary schools had book collections larger than ten books per pupil. Of the 74% about 9% had book collections which exceeded twenty books per child or 20,000 volumes, whichever was larger. A similar growth has occurred in the size of collections of audiovisual materials. For example, in 1975, 62% of all schools had filmstrip and sound filmstrip collections of over 500 titles or one per student, whichever was greater.

Since 1965 the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title II program has provided over \$16 million for the purchase of instructional materials for Wisconsin public and private schools. Schools have tended to increase the proportion of this fund spent for audiovisual materials. In 1965 about 75% was spent for print and 25% for audiovisual materials. Currently, over 80% of the ESEA Title II funds are being used to purchase audiovisual materials.

The continued growth of expenditures and collections has caused many schools to build, remodel, or improve their library media center facilities. In the period between 1972 and 1975, one thousand two hundred thirty-five public and private schools indicated that they had "expanded or improved" their library media centers.

Improved facilities and larger collections alone do not mean an improved media program. Professional library media staff are essential to build collections and promote most effective use of the center and its resources. There has been a steady growth in the number of school librarians and audiovisual coordinators and directors in Wisconsin schools. In 1965 there were 942 school librarians reported to the Department of Public Instruction. This number has grown to 1264 certified librarians working in the public schools in fall 1975. Most of this growth has occurred in elementary schools where media staffs have been increased 56% during the 10 year period. There was an increase of 44 professional school library positions from fall 1974 to fall 1975 alone. School districts reported that there were 326 certified audiovisual coordinators and directors serving in Wisconsin schools. This growth in professional media staff coincided with similar expansions across the United States. For

the first time since 1962 the Library General Information Survey (LIBGIS I) of the National Center for Educational Statistics in 1974 surveyed school media programs in the United States including Wisconsin. The national survey showed that forty-four million pupils had access to 507 million books and periodicals in public schools under the supervision of certified library staff consisting of 55,000 women and 7,000 men. The 74,600 schools with library media centers reported library expenditures totaling \$1,182,000,000, of which 69% was for salaries and 14% for books, 2% for periodicals and 6% for audiovisual materials. A more comprehensive statistical report is planned for publication in the near future.

Wisconsin has used ESEA Title II funds extensively to help establish and improve school library media programs. Since 1969 about 25% of each year's approximate \$2 million ESEA Title II allotment has been given in competitive special project grants. A total of 689 special projects were awarded between 1969 and 1976 to start and improve library media programs at the school building, district, and regional levels in Wisconsin. These projects have proven very effective in stimulating media program growth.

The FY 1976 ESEA Title II projects were concentrated on establishing twenty-three Exemplary Library Media Centers, geographically distributed throughout the state (Figure 2). The schools were selected because they had good library media programs in operation. The grant of \$10,000 enabled each school to strengthen its collection while promising to open its doors to visitors interested in seeing good programs in operation. 

These will be the last ESEA Title II competitive grants awarded. As of July 1, 1976, ESEA Title II has been consolidated with NDEA Title III and ESEA Title III—guidance counseling and testing, into the new ESEA Title IV-B. This is a formula grant program to each school district which has the local option of determining how to allocate funds among the three program purposes. Library media personnel should be knowledgeable about the new program and participate in discussion regarding the use of these funds in each school district.

The latest incentive for continued program development has been provided by the passage of the thirteen standards in chapter 121.02 of the Wisconsin statutes. Standard J indicates that: "It (the school district) shall provide adequate instructional materials, texts and library services which reflect the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society."

The administrative rule or criteria for this particular standard is as follows: (j) "All students in grades K-6 shall be provided with library/media services performed by or under the supervision of Department certificated library and audiovisual personnel. All students in grades 7-12 shall be provided with library/media services performed by Department certificated library and audiovisual personnel. A Department certificated person in the library/media field shall be designated to provide direction and coordination for the district's library/media program. All students shall be provided access to a current, balanced collection of books, basic reference materials, texts, periodicals, and audiovisual materials which depict in an accurate and unbiased way the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society. There shall be on file a written school board approved long-range plan for library services development formulated by students, teachers, library and audiovisual personnel, and administrators. This plan shall point the direction toward programs described in the current *Standards For School Library/Media Programs* published by the Department "

State law required that all public school districts meet the standard and administrative rule by July 1, 1975. Some schools have not met all the requirements. The Department is committed to providing consultant help to those districts not in compliance so that they may meet the mandate as soon as possible

Standard J has caused most districts to upgrade library media services, especially in elementary schools where inadequate or no library services were provided previously. Schools have most problems with the writing of a district long-range plan for

library services development. A great deal of consultant time was spent during the year (1975) on workshops and individual district meetings to help plan for media program development.

A very important event of 1975 occurred in April with the reorganization of the Division for Library Services into three bureaus, the Bureau of Reference and Loan Services with John Kopischke as Director, the Bureau of Public and Cooperative Library Services with Kathleen Imhoff as Director, and the Bureau of School Library Media Programs with Ben Franckowiak as Director. The Bureau of School Library Media Programs professional staff includes Richard Sorensen and Darrell Van Orsdel, School Library Media Consultants, and Ralph Whiting, Instructional Media and Technology Consultant. In addition to being responsible for school media program development in the schools, the Bureau operates the Department of Public Instruction Audiovisual Service Center for the entire Department staff.

The staff of the Bureau of School Library Media Programs has been occupied during 1975-76 with the work of three important task forces. At a "Dynamics of Leadership" workshop at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, in June, 1975, participants made recommendations regarding the establishment of the following task forces:

1. Long-Range Plan Task Force, which is developing a written plan for school library media program development from a state level perspective.
2. Certification Task Force, which is developing a certification proposal for media professionals who work in Wisconsin schools.
3. School Media Standards Revision Task Force, which is revising the *Standards For School Library Media Programs, 1972-75*.

The three groups, broadly representative of the library media community and educational administrators, have been working since September, 1975, and hope to have the projects completed by late summer or early fall 1976. ESEA Title II administrative funds are supporting these three vital projects.

In spite of all the progress that has been made in developing improved school library media programs, much remains to be done. Too many children still attend schools with inadequate or no library media center services. The Division for Library Services and its Bureau of School Library Media Programs will continue to put forth a maximum effort in providing leadership to help school districts work for equalization of learning opportunities for young people in Wisconsin schools through the provision of excellent school library media programs.

PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICES
Public Libraries—State Summary

Public library system development continued in 1975 as three new systems began operations. Currently, eleven systems, providing services to 60.4 percent of Wisconsin's population, are in operation. Systems received full formula funding of 1975 operations, but systems were informed that 1976 payments would be at approximately 50 percent of the 1974 level. Public libraries served more people than ever and further lowered the number of unserved residents. The following is a description of statewide public library activities in 1975.

Population Served

Wisconsin's population in 1975, as estimated by the Wisconsin Department of Administration, was 4,581,701. Of this total, 4,402,178 residents, or 96 percent of the population, had legal access to public libraries. This reflects a steady decline in the number of unserved residents that began in 1973 with formations of the first public library systems. The decrease in the unserved population in 1975 can be attributed to the formation of new systems, the establishment of countywide service programs in non-systems areas as a step toward system membership, and an increase in the number of communities without public libraries contracting for service with neighboring municipalities that do have public libraries. In all, 40,000 more residents had legal access to public libraries in 1975 than had access in 1974.

Of the 96 percent of the population having legal access to public libraries in 1975, 2,766,899 residents were served by public library systems. The percentage of persons served by library systems was 35 percent in 1973, 44.6 percent in 1974, and 60.4 percent in 1975. The number of persons residing in system areas has increased from 1,583,859 persons in 1973 to 2,766,899 persons in 1975, an increase of nearly 75 percent. Projections indicate that the percentage of persons in system areas will be nearly 64 percent in 1976 and over 70 percent in 1977. The county is the basic unit of the library system. Of Wisconsin's 72 counties, 36 counties were system members in 1975.

Two multi-county public library service program organizations provided service to 255,255 persons in 8 counties. These organizations operate under procedures defined and financed locally and account for library service to 5.6 percent of Wisconsin population. In addition, 12 counties offer countywide library service programs to 607,207 persons, or 13.3 percent of the total population. These 20 counties with regional and countywide service programs are natural building blocks for system development. Individual community public libraries provide library service to 772,817 persons or 16.9 percent of the total population.

In 1975, 179,523 Wisconsin residents (4 percent of the population) did not have legal access to public libraries. These

unserved residents live in 17 of Wisconsin's 72 counties. Approximately 55 percent of the unserved live in what can be considered rural counties, while 45 percent reside in counties that are urban in nature. The number of unserved residents have declined from 326,577 in 1973, the first year of system operation, to 179,523 in 1975.

Public Libraries and Professional Public Libraries

During 1975, 347 public libraries operated in Wisconsin. Of this number 172 were members of public library systems. As system members these libraries had the back-up support of system headquarters and resource libraries. In addition to being able to call on systemwide resources to fill requests, system libraries, in many cases, received grants from the system to improve and enrich their own collections. System staff is also available to member libraries in order to help them better meet the demands of their public. Of the remaining non-system libraries, 86 public libraries operate with varying degrees of support from countywide library programs. Of these 86 libraries, 39 libraries are members of multi-county regional library cooperative service organizations. Finally, 89 public libraries operate outside of a regional cooperative structure serving their user with the support of the State Reference and Loan Library.

Although some of the 347 public libraries in Wisconsin are large enough to provide high quality library service and programs, the vast majority of the public libraries have operating budgets too low and collections too small to locally meet the needs of the user. Cooperation and resource sharing are vital to the attempts of these libraries to meet public demand and to ensure that all residents of Wisconsin receive at least adequate library service. The following charts indicate the distribution of public libraries according to library budget and book collections.

As can be seen from the above, 46.7 percent of Wisconsin public libraries have operating budgets of less than \$10,000 and 45 percent of all libraries have book collections of less than 10,000 volumes. Over 75 percent of all libraries have budgets of under \$50,000 and have less than 30,000 volumes in the library's book collection. Since staff salaries constitute between 60 and 65 percent of a normal libraries' operating expenditures, the low total operating budgets of many of the libraries would seem to indicate too many communities are being served by less than an adequate number of librarians. Libraries that are open for only 5 to 20 hours are not uncommon in Wisconsin. Small public libraries in system areas benefit greatly by having local collections reinforced with materials available through system headquarters and resource libraries. In addition, grants to system member libraries often mean extended hours of service to the public. Of the 21 public libraries with operating budgets of over \$250,000, 12 libraries act as system headquarters or resource libraries.

The number of professional public librarians, in full-time equivalents, increased from 386.1 in 1974 to 432.4 in 1975, an increase of 11.9 percent. The rate of increase is the same as that of 1974. The increase in positions is due, in part, to public library system development, full formula funding in 1975, and improved and expanded facilities in some parts of the state. Of the total number of professional public librarians in Wisconsin, 126.1 or 29.2 percent are employed by Milwaukee Public Library.

Public Library Collections and Direct Loans

Wisconsin's public libraries continued to expand and improve materials collections in 1975 although the rates of increases in the different materials categories were somewhat lower than in previous years. The number of total volumes held by Wisconsin libraries increased from 10,491,408 in 1974 to 10,681,565 in 1975, an increase of 1.8 percent. The number of titles added in 1975 was 401,527. This represents an increase of 20.5 percent over 1974. However, the total number of volumes added in 1975 remained at approximately the 1974 level with 701,888 volumes added in 1975 and 699,540 added in 1974. As in 1974, of the

total volumes held at the end of 1975, nearly 6.6 percent were new acquisitions.

The number of periodical titles, excluding duplicates, subscribed to by public libraries increased to 33,060, a 5.7 percent increase over 1974. Slide and film strip collections showed a slight decline in 1975 decreasing from 48,669 units in 1974 to 48,116. Sound recordings, including discs, cassettes, and tapes, owned by libraries showed an increase in the number of titles held of 18.2 percent. The total number of sound recording titles held by libraries was 275,676.

Direct loans to public library users in 1975 increased 3.2 percent over 1974. The number of direct loans was 23,514,734 items in 1974 and 24,267,399 items in 1975. The number of direct loans per person in Wisconsin for 1975 was 5.3. The stabilization in the number of direct loans over the last several years is probably due to many factors, not least among these being the increased in house use of library materials and services by the public.

Public Library Operating Income

Public Library Operating income for 1975 was \$32,090,188, an 18.6 percent increase over operating income in 1974. Approximately 50 percent of the total increase in income was the result of increased local and county appropriations. Nearly 29 percent of the increase was due to increases in state aid (the result of new systems) and increased income from all types of federal programs (not including federal revenue sharing). As in 1974, the first year of full formula funding for system, state aid did not replace local effort and did not slow local government increases in appropriations.

County appropriations jumped from \$2,379,706 in 1974 to \$3,438,815 in 1975, an increase of over 44 percent. The appropriations from local public library supporting municipalities increased from \$20,419,763 in 1974 to \$21,928,497 in 1975, an increase of 7.3 percent. Part of the reason for the high county increase and the relatively low local municipality increase is the shift in tax bases in some counties. Some counties now levy one countywide tax to support library services. This replaced the practice of a city paying for library support from city taxes and the county paying for library support from taxes collected from areas outside the city. In effect, the city library becomes a county library. Together local municipalities and counties appropriated \$25,367,312, an 11.2 percent increase over the 1974 appropriations and near the 10.9 percent increase of 1974 over 1973.

County and local municipalities accounted for 79 percent of all library income in 1975, with counties contributing 10.7 percent of all library revenues and localities 68.3 percent. State aid to public library systems account for 9.1 percent of all operating income. Of the remaining 11.9 percent of all income, all types of federal grants accounted for 2.9 percent, contract income accounted for 1.4 percent, and endowments, gifts and all other income accounted for 7.6 percent.

PUBLIC LIBRARY SERVICES
Public Library—State Summary

Public Library Operating Expenditures

Total public library operating expenditures for 1975 were \$30,329,201, 19.5 percent higher than 1974 expenditures. This percent increase in expenditures is substantially higher than those experienced in the preceding five years. Full-formula funding of public library systems and increased commitments by local and county governments provided the resources to meet rising library costs.

Expenditures for salaries, wages, and employee benefits, which account for 66.1 percent of all library expenditures, were \$20,066,546 in 1975. This represents an increase of 15.0 percent over these type expenditures in 1974. The probable causes of the increase were the 12.0 percent increase in the number of professional public librarians in Wisconsin and the presumably higher salaries and benefits paid as a result of the impact of inflation.


Total expenditures for all types of library materials increased from \$3,978,600 in 1974 to \$5,018,156 in 1975, an increase of 26.1 percent. Library materials are defined to include books, periodicals, microforms, sound recordings, and filmstrips. Although library collections were improved and enlarged throughout 1975, a large part of the increase in expenditures

was caused by the higher costs of all types of library materials. Expenditures for library materials accounted for 16.6 percent of all expenditures as compared to 15.7 percent of all expenditures in 1974.

Contract expenditures and expenditures for all other operational costs totaled \$5,244,499, or 17.3 percent of all operating costs. The other operating expenditure category includes the cost of utilities, rent, travel, dues, and supplies, and contracts with non-library agencies for building maintenance, equipment, supplies, etc. The contract expenditures category includes the costs of contracts with other libraries and library agencies for materials, services, personnel, etc. Contract funds flowing between libraries often results in dollars being counted once as a contract expenditure and then being counted again as operational expenditures by the receiving library. State totals have been adjusted to avoid inflated expenditure figures.

Library capital expenditures from all sources were \$2,723,180 in 1975 as compared to \$3,241,649 in 1974. Because the state aid to public library systems is primarily a service program and not a construction program and because federal funds available for construction were minimal, the majority of the capital expenditures were made local funding sources.

Public Library Systems

In December of 1971 the library law of Wisconsin was enacted providing state aid for public library systems.

The intent of the new law was to modernize the structure of public library service in line with governmental trends in the state and library trends throughout the country. Even though there were over 340 public libraries in Wisconsin, some 275,000 residents had no legal access to library service. Many of those who did have access had relatively limited service at the local library. Through cooperation and coordination among libraries of different sizes the public can receive a variety and depth of essential library materials and services.

The major emphasis of the law relates to public library systems. In the context of the law, a system is defined as a group of libraries organized to share services and materials to meet the full needs of all the people within a defined area. Cooperative programs, based on this philosophy, have been operating in Wisconsin for over fifty years, and many of them have been called "systems" regardless of how they are organized. However, to be certified as an approved system, it must be organized according to Chapter 43 of the state statutes.

To establish a system, the county board of supervisors appoints a library planning committee consisting of local citizens to study the library needs of the county. This planning committee meets with similar committees in adjacent counties to determine the feasibility of establishing a multicounty system; or the committee meets with the board of an already approved system to investigate the possibilities of joining that system. Upon determining the best method for the county, the committee would file a report of its findings and its recommendations to the County Board of Supervisors, and to the Division for Library Services, Department of Public Instruction. If the Division approves the plan, then the county board would act on the recommendations. Upon approval by the county board, those communities which maintain a public library would decide if they want to participate in the system or exempt the municipality from the system service.

Each system is governed by a board of trustees appointed by the county board(s). In a multicounty system the number of trustees from each county would be in proportion to its population, with each county having at least one representative. In no case, though, can a system have more than twenty trustees. Members are appointed for a three year term, with one-third being reappointed or replaced each year.

The system board, as a legal body, is responsible for establishing system policies and ensuring means to provide for equal service to all residents of the area. It is accountable for the proper expenditure of the monies appropriated for the system. One of the most important duties of the board is to file its annual plan describing the program for library services to be carried out the subsequent year and for the use of the state aid it will receive.

System services are financed by appropriations from the counties participating in the system and by state aid. The

formula for determining the amount of state aid is comprised of three parts:

1. \$5.50 per person in the system area.
2. \$6 per square mile in a single county system; \$9 per square mile in a two-county system; \$12 per square mile in a three-county system; \$15 per square mile in a four-county system; and \$18 per square mile in a system with five or more counties.
3. 7 percent of the total operating expenditures for all public library services in the system from local and county sources in the preceding year.

If the total state appropriation is lower than the amount to which each system is entitled, the Division for Library Services will pro-rate the funds among all the systems.

The Division for Library Services certified four systems the first year (January 1-December 31, 1973). These systems operating in 1975 were as follows:

1. LaCrosse Area Library System, consisting of Juneau, LaCrosse, Monroe and Trempealeau counties. The system serves 159,265 persons, includes 20 public libraries, and received \$161,545 in state aid for 1975 operations.
2. Northwest Wisconsin Library System, consisting of Ashland, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Iron, Sawyer, Vilas and Washburn counties. The system serves 125,015 persons, includes 21 public libraries, and received \$233,686 in state aid for 1975 operations.
3. Wisconsin Valley Library Service, consisting of Adams, Clark, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Oneida, Portage, Taylor and Wood counties. This system serves 366,520 persons, includes 33 public libraries, and received \$456,105 in state aid for 1975 operations.
4. Milwaukee County Federated Library System serves Milwaukee County (except the cities of Cudahy, and South Milwaukee). This system serves 967,603 persons, includes public libraries, and received \$1,028,831 in state aid for 1975 operations.

For the second year (January 1-December 31, 1974) the Division certified an additional four library systems to begin operations. These systems operating in 1975, were as follows:

1. Southwest Wisconsin Library System, consisting of Crawford, Grant, Iowa, Lafayette and Richland counties. The system serves 120,347 persons, includes 28 libraries, and received \$145,480 in state aid for 1975 operations.
2. Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System, serving the residents of Dodge and Fond du Lac counties. The 160,059 residents are served by fifteen public libraries.

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The system received \$142,708 in state aid for 1975 operations.

3. Manitowoc County Library System, serving 83,293 persons from three public libraries. The system received \$72,527 in state aid for 1975 operations.
4. Rock County Library System, serving 137,179 persons from seven libraries. The system received \$108,001 in state aid for 1975 operations.

For the third year (January 1-December 31, 1975) the Division certified three systems to begin operations. These systems were as follows

1. Brown County Library System, serving the 170,771 residents of the county from a central library and eight branch libraries. The system received \$135,171 in state aid for 1975 operations.
2. Outagamie County Federated Library System, serving 130,031 residents from seven public libraries. The system received \$92,064 in state aid for 1975 operations.
3. South Central Library System, consisting of Dane and Sauk counties. This system serves 346,816 persons from twenty-six public libraries. The system received \$336,642 in state aid for 1975 operations.

Because the state aid appropriation for 1973 was not sufficient for full formula funding for the first year, it was necessary to pro-rate at 47.5 percent of the formula. State aid payments to library systems totaled \$818,000 for 1973. In 1974 the appropriation was sufficient to fully fund systems. State aid payments to library systems totaled \$2,195,351 for 1974. Public Library systems were fully funded in 1975 also, receiving a total of \$2,912,760 in state aid.

County library planning committees continued working throughout the year studying library needs of county residents and preparing their final reports. Six of the counties were able to complete their work and to have plans approved by the Division and their respective county boards.

The counties of Door, Kewaunee, Marinette, Menominee, and Shawano joined with Brown County to form the Nicolet Area Library System which began operations January 1, 1976. In addition, Waupaca County joined Outagamie County to form the Outagamie-Waupaca Federated Library System which also became operational January 1, 1976.

As of January 1, 1976 there were 11 public library systems, including 42 counties, serving 2,921,987 persons (nearly 64 percent of the state's population) from 199 libraries.

BROWN COUNTY LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Brown County Library System began operations January 1, 1975. The System serves the 170,771 residents of the County through the Brown County Library, located in Green Bay, and the Library's eight branches.

Library planning for the development of a multi-county library system in northeast Wisconsin, centered around the Brown County Library, began several years ago. In 1975 area county library planning committees completed joint planning activities and submitted plans for a Nicolet Federated Library System to the Boards of Supervisors of the counties involved and to the Division for Library Services. These plans were approved and the new Nicolet Federated Library System began operations January 1, 1976. Joining Brown County to form this new system are the counties of Door, Kewaunee, Marinette, Menominee, and Shawano. In addition, Oconto county is expected to join the System in 1977.

System Activities and Services—1975

For this first year of operations the broad purpose of a Brown County Library System was to improve the level of quality of

public library services presently offered within the county, to inaugurate new services needed but not presently offered, and to strengthen cooperative ties with other kinds of libraries in the county. This included:

- A. Improving the quality of local library services in accordance with local needs.
- B. Strengthening the professional staff at the Central Library to provide better training and coordination of services throughout the county.
- C. Strengthening the collections of both print and non-print materials at the Central Library and in the branches.
- D. Increasing the Interloan Department staff work schedule of hours to provide more thorough handling and follow-up of interloan requests in the Fox Valley public library and NEWIL (Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries, Inc.) reference and interloan networks.

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- E. Building up the technical processing staff to improve output of materials to subject departments at the Central Library, to branch libraries, bookmobiles, special services in the county, and to facilitate provision of art-works, display materials, book-lists, brochures and other library publications.

The Brown County Library in 1975 continued to show progress in the development of its branch system, in growth of central library use, and in the variety and number of its activity programs. Additional staff and materials were added through state-aids and inservice training for the staff was improved.

At the year's end planning was proceeding for a new Ashwaubenton Branch with bidding scheduled for early 1976, a new Village of Howard Branch had opened in July, 1975, and re-furnishing of the Denmark Village Branch was completed. State funds financed the latter project and additions to the shelving in Howard. Full-time Branch Heads for the village branches allowed expansion of hours of service, and state-aids helped to strengthen reference and audiovisual materials in all branches of the system.

The position of System Reference and Information Librarian was a new one on the Brown County Library staff in 1975. Its broad responsibilities were those of in-service staff training and coordination of the library's reference and interlibrary loan services.

A number of in-service training opportunities were provided for all reference and interlibrary loan staff members, including all branch library and bookmobile personnel. There were two general reference workshops, two children's services reference workshops, presentations at the monthly extended services and children's services meetings and two/film cassette programs on library issues.

The coordination of reference and interlibrary loan services involved a variety of activities. To further communication between the closely related reference departments and interlibrary loan department, a monthly meeting of department heads was established. A monthly newsletter was created to promote the sharing of information on reference services and materials. A uniform format for gathering and tabulating reference statistics was developed. This involved a two week survey of reference questions received at the library and the development of a standard definition of a "reference question." A procedure was devised to simplify the process by which

libraries within the Brown County System borrow books from each other.

Working with each branch librarian, the reference collections at the branch libraries were evaluated. A list of basic reference books was prepared to serve as a guide for reference collection development. Three of the branch librarians requested assistance in re-evaluating their non-fiction collections.

At the year's end, two projects were near completion: the development of a combined list of all of the periodicals received and held by the Brown County Library System; and the creation of a self-guided cassette tour of the central library.

Many of the programs developed in 1975 are of an on-going nature and will be continued in 1976. An additional responsibility in 1976 will be the selection of all materials for the four county branch libraries. A goal for the year is the development of an up-to-date reference collection in each branch library. Members of the Nicolet Area Federated Library System will be invited to participate in the in-service training programs held for the Brown County Library staff.

The System added to the central library's collection of periodicals and newspapers on microfilm in order to provide magazines, newspapers and the Wisconsin Census that were in demand but unavailable. Planning continued to upgrade the audio-visual materials collection of the system headquarters library.

The System expanded holdings of circulating materials through acquisition of trade books and paperbacks of popular and frequently requested subjects. Duplicate copies of out of print materials for students of local history and for community interests generated by the Bi-Centennial were provided.

In order to develop a better understanding and implementation of the techniques for working with the institutionalized and handicapped, system staff participated in workshops, seminars and conferences concerning this subject. The number of specialized materials available to the institutionalized and handicapped was increased.

Throughout the year the System continued to build a staff of professional librarians. Plans were made for the expansion of system services into the five counties that will be joining the system in 1976.

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LA CROSSE AREA LIBRARY SYSTEM

The formation of the La Crosse Area Library System was the result of several years of regional cooperation to provide adequate library services to the residents of west central Wisconsin. Began in November, 1965, as a federally-funded demonstration project designed to meet a growing demand for strengthened services from public libraries, this regional cooperative group succeeded in improving library resources available to library users as well as in implementing programs to provide library services to previously unserved persons. In 1972, the La Crosse Area Library System, made up of the counties of Juneau, La Crosse and Monroe, received provisional certification from the Division for Library Services to begin operations in 1973. Establishment as a state recognized system brought with it the promise of state aid funds to assist in the development of system services and resources. Contractual agreements already existing among member counties, as well as some federal aid, provided additional funds for library system operations. The La Crosse Public Library became the system's headquarters library and on January 1, 1973, system operations began. On January 1, 1974, Trempealeau County became the fourth county member of the system.

System Activities and Services—1975

In 1975 the La Crosse Area Library System continued operations with its four member counties, Juneau, La Crosse, Monroe, and Trempealeau. Each of the twenty member libraries again received book and cassette grants and summer reading program materials, as well as continued interloan and TWX service. Several staff members were added at the headquarters library and existing programs acquired new dimensions as they developed past their initial stages.

In June a new head librarian was hired for the Children's Department of the La Crosse Public Library. New and active programs became the focus, with daily after-school workshops and invitations to children and parents for participation and suggestions as the highlights. Intensive weeding and inventory of the children's collection was undertaken and completed in 1976.

In July a System coordinator was added to the staff. The Coordinator's responsibilities included providing consultative

services to each of the member libraries and assistance in the preparation of the monthly workshop sessions for system librarians. Librarians were requested to submit their own suggestions for topics of interest to be covered in the workshops. Workshops included presentations on maps in the library, weeding library collections, and evaluating reference books.

Several staff members participated in the ETN course "Indian Library Services" and the ETN hook-up was also used by interested professional persons from the community.

In October a headquarters library book sale was organized and sponsored by the Friends of the La Crosse Public Library, with assistance from the staff. It proved to be a success in generating good publicity as well as funds.

A new stop was added to the bookmobile route and a new and larger bookmobile has been ordered and will be in use by Fall 1976. A new system vehicle was purchased to facilitate travel to member libraries and to state and district meetings.

Extensive video and printing equipment was acquired and will soon be put into active use. A series of educational programs is planned in order to acquaint staff members with the operation of these items.

The Mail-A-Book program, after a full year of operation, has shown a steady increase in circulation, with a second catalog and two more supplements offering six hundred new titles to users.

The Films-by-Mail program has also been heavily used, with a new catalog presently in preparation as a supplement to the existing one.

Administrative Librarian Gertrude Thurow announced her retirement for the end of 1975. The head librarian of the Musser Public Library in Muscatine, Iowa, James William White, was chosen as the new La Crosse Area Library System administrator and head of the La Crosse Public Library.

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MANITOWOC COUNTY FEDERATED LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Manitowoc County Federated Library System serves 83,000 residents of Manitowoc County with walk-in service from the 3 public libraries in the county, Kiel, Two Rivers, and Manitowoc. The System began in 1964 as a federally funded demonstration project and received its first county support in 1966. The System began operation January 1, 1974.

System Activities and Service—1975

The Manitowoc County Federated Library System has continued the programs initiated in 1974 or previously established as county demonstration programs.

The Manitowoc Public Library serves as System headquarters and administers System services by contract with the Manitowoc County Federated Library Board. These services include the Mailbox Library, Young Adult services, 16mm film program, circulation coordination, and the delivery circuit. In addition the headquarters library keeps all records of the System, conducts in-service training sessions, handles reference and inter-loans for member libraries, and produces county-wide library public relations.

The major thrust in serving the rural population of the county has been the Mailbox Library which grew in several ways during the year. Service was extended to Calumet County in October under a federally funded project. The Mailbox prepared the first Outagamie County catalog edition also in October. There were, in all, five editions: Manitowoc, Calumet, Wisconsin, Outagamie, and Rock. Both Outagamie and Rock conduct their own mailbox operations. This cooperative effort results in greatly lowered catalog costs for all participants.

The Young Adult Department's core book collection has grown to 2,692 books at the headquarters library and smaller collections at Kiel and Two Rivers libraries which receive additions on

a periodic basis. To acquaint teachers and others who work with young people with YA services, six mailings were sent to public and parochial schools in the county and to area youth service organizations.

From the beginning of county-wide service in 1965, all borrower's cards from county libraries were honored at all libraries. An extension of this activity has been the circulation coordination of the Two Rivers library with the automated system of the headquarters library as part of the System function. Started in 1974 this has continued satisfactorily during 1975.

The 16mm sound film collection has grown from 60 titles in the first year of the System to 150 titles. The major portion of the collection is housed at the headquarters library for spot bookings. However, mini-packets are rotated to member libraries to supplement local and system Wisconsin Film Circuit memberships. Branching into audio cassettes the System acquired 409 during the year, produced a catalog of cassette and related materials holdings, and deposited cassette duplicates on request from member libraries.

The weekly delivery circuit has continued successfully during the year, transporting reference and inter-loan materials, film packets, rotating book collections, art reproduction on extended loan, and AV equipment.

During the year a county coordinator was added to the headquarter's staff. Funded with state and federal funds, the position has proved most helpful. Member libraries have had a specific contact at headquarters, and even more important, the systemwide activities have gained from continuity. Unfortunately, the cut in state aids will curtail this position.

MID-WISCONSIN FEDERATED LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System began operations January 1, 1975. The System provides services to the residents of Dodge and Fond du Lac counties through the 15 member public libraries. In 1974 Fond du Lac county operated as a single-county system and planned with Dodge County for the formation of the present two-county system. Fond du Lac

Public Library acts as the System resource and headquarters library.

System Activities and Services—1975

The Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System is organized as a federated system to provide improved library services, including

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reference and information, referral and general loan of library materials, in-service training and workshops for librarians, consultant services to libraries, and other general services to libraries and residents of Fond du Lac and Dodge Counties. These library services are in large part carried out by the Fond du Lac Public Library as System headquarters and resource library. Fond du Lac Public Library provides for the integration of the services of the System with those of the library, so that both staff services and library materials are available to all the residents of the system area. The headquarters provides space for the system offices and houses the system library collection.

In 1975, the System received federal funds to implement several area-wide projects. A grant was used to purchase the New York Times on microfilm for the years 1898 through 1930, plus cabinetry to house the microfilm. The collection, which now runs in serial, 1898 to date, is housed in the Headquarters Library and serves as a basic reference resource for all libraries in the System area. An audiovisual grant was spent on art reproductions, microfilm reader printers for three member libraries, and 16mm motion picture projectors for four member libraries. Right-to-Read funds were used to begin a 16mm film library to serve Continous Care Centers in Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties. In addition, a library enrichment grant was used to purchase cassette players, a cassette duplicator, cassette earphones, and cassette storage cabinets for the libraries in the system. This grant was also used to purchase reference books which were distribute . to all system libraries.

In order to promote and encourage local participation and to cover establishment costs, the System Board made direct grant payments to all libraries in the System. In compliance with the goal of the System Plan, all of the libraries in the System area agreed to the adoption of a system-wide library card.

During 1975 ten workshops and lectures were conducted by the System staff. Meetings were held at the System headquarters and at member libraries throughout the System. Workshops included tours of the Wisconsin Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped and the Government Printing

Office in Milwaukee as well as a field trip to North Central Distributors, and Wisconsin Periodicals. Guest speakers provided lectures on various aspects of librarianship.

In accordance with the System plans, professional librarians from the Headquarters Library visited librarians in Dodge and Fond du Lac Counties to discuss technical problems and collection development.

The Printing Center provided all member libraries with booklets, pamphlets, stationery, book images, and other promotional materials during 1975. The production of the Books-by-Mail Catalog for the Dodge County Library Service was also accomplished by the Printing Center in 1975.

In compliance with the System Plan a bi-monthly newsletter was developed. The newsletter is edited by the Coordinator of System Services, Fond du Lac County, and attempts to provide information on current publishing trends and issues in the profession. Most important of all, it is an attempt to bring all of the librarians together through an interchange of ideas and suggestions or activities in each individual library.

The System provided all member libraries with promotional materials in support of National Library Week, the Wisconsin Summer Reading Program, and Children's Book Week.

Credit cards were distributed to all member libraries in order to offer toll free telephone service to the libraries in the System area. An experimental teletype line between the Headquarters Library of Fond du Lac and the Williams Free Library of Beaver Dam, a System member and headquarters for the Dodge County Library Service, was installed in the latter part of 1975. Teletype use is being monitored to determine if this service should be continued.

In order to maintain rapid delivery of books and rare and expensive materials, such as art reproductions and pieces of sculpture, the System purchased a van which will establish a bi-weekly delivery service in 1976.

MILWAUKEE COUNTY FEDERATED LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Milwaukee County Federated Library System, offering library services to 967,603 persons, is the most populous of all Wisconsin systems. System members originally included the public libraries in Brown Deer, Greendale, Shorewood, Wauwatosa, West Allis, Whitefish Bay, and Milwaukee. Oak Creek and Hales Corners joined the system as of January 1, 1975. Milwaukee Public Library acts as the headquarters and resource library.

System Activities and Services—1975

System administrative services helps to create agendas for both the System Board and the System Technical Advisory Committee and produces, publishes and distributes minutes of the meetings for both these groups. All communication emanating from the System, both inside and outside, comes from the administrative services section. All pertinent records of system activities are maintained as part of the administrative services section. Administrative services section coordinates procedure manual inserts and memos to Federated Library System

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members. The installation, maintenance and operation of the Electronic Circulation Control System is a part of the administrative services section's responsibilities. This control system was installed in 1975 and is in partial use at this time. Full operation will come up gradually as the Federated System's materials collections are barcoded. The barcoding is a continuous process carried on by Federated staff and regular staffs of the Federated System libraries. This program is proceeding according to schedule. In conjunction with this activity is the re-registration of all borrowers in the Federated System area. The re-registration process results in the issuance of Federated System Library Cards with a barcode identification. This process needs to be completed before the control system can be fully operative.

The Milwaukee Public Library's headquarters personnel section assists and coordinates with the administrative section the recruiting and hiring of system personnel.

Bibliographic Center Services of the System include the continuing development of the Union list of books in the System on microfiche and provides equipment to System members to read the microfiche. This is an on-going activity and eventually all materials in all member libraries in the system will be a part of the Union Shelllist. The System also produces, through its Multi-Media Office and the Processing Division, lists of materials purchased by the System, including multi-media materials.

System Bookmobile Service includes an Over 60 Bookmobile which moves throughout the county into the communities of system members to give service to nursing homes, county institutions, residential units and day centers where the elderly are located. A smaller van is also maintained by the system to serve the smaller housing units where the residents live or are being cared for. Associated with the bookmobile services for the elderly is a Shut-in-Service which maintains contact and library service with those people who are over 60 and living alone but have no way to get library service.

The Federated Library System maintains a budget which provides for the development of multi-media collections within member agencies as well as a pool collection housed at the Headquarters Library of multi-media materials. The Multi-Media Office coordinates a program of previewing 16mm films, videotapes, filmstrips and audio cassettes for possible addition to the Federated System's collection which involves representatives from all System member libraries in helping in the selection of these materials.

Bulk loan of materials are limited to videotapes which are selected by each member library for temporary placement in their libraries. The System maintains a central pool collection of videotapes, cassette tapes, and filmstrips.

The System media service maintains videotape equipment housed in each of the member libraries as well as maintaining standby equipment for loan to agencies. In addition, the media office maintains a collection of filmstrip machines which can be loaned to member libraries. The media office also is developing

a film collection which will be housed in the Milwaukee Public Museum but which will be booked through the media office.

The Headquarters Library in 1974-75 participated in a LSCA Grant which developed a last copy depository in the Headquarters Library from the libraries around the southeastern Wisconsin area. This headquarters activity will be continued for those system members who have materials they wish to treat as a "last copy" item.

All materials purchased by the Federated System either for the pool collection or for the System members is centrally acquired and centrally processed. The Federated Library System supports the cataloging of such material and with procedures agreed upon by all System members. All materials of this nature are standardized not only in the way they are cataloged but in terms of the catalog cards and bindery procedures. All Federated System materials and equipment are centrally acquired. Materials and equipment are purchased by the Headquarters Library through the City and distributed to System members.

The System maintains daily delivery service from the Headquarters Library as well as delivery service between member libraries.

The System develops workshops and training courses for System members including workshops for the handling of media materials and equipment, programming for community services, training for the operation of circulation control equipment, and coordinates and pays for member participation in the ETN programs. Milwaukee Public Library in-service, in-house training activities are available to System member librarians.

The Headquarters Library, through a contract with the State, furnishes interlibrary loan service through the Interlibrary Loan Office in the Headquarters Library to and from its System members.

The Federated System supports intertype library cooperation through participation in the activities of the Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee as well as financial support for the association's newsletter.

The System has sponsored, through a LSCA Grant, the development of publicity about the System which includes a brochure, news releases, posters, and a television commercial.

The Headquarters Library maintains administrative staff who are available on a daily basis for questions from System members in the area of audiovisual, adult services, collection building, library building and planning, library administration, children's services, work with young adults, public relations, and any other special need expressed by a System member.

The System is sponsoring a reciprocal borrowing contract and a System card. Over a period of a year and a half, the System has developed a reciprocal borrowing contract through meetings and conversation with System members, their Boards, and their local officials.

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The Headquarters Library maintains reference services supported by the County for the use of residents in Milwaukee County.

System programs are proceeding as expected. Many of the programs supported by the System have forged new directions

in library service in Milwaukee County and new relationships; e.g., a film contract with the Milwaukee Public Museum, a reciprocal borrowing contract among communities in the System, and extended Over 60 service to the county. Such changes take time but will continue to build on the now solid basis of cooperative library services in Milwaukee County.

NORTHWEST WISCONSIN LIBRARY SYSTEM

The counties of Ashland, Bayfield, Burnett, Douglas, Iron, Sawyer, Vilas, and Washburn form the Northwest Wisconsin Library System. The Vaughn Public Library, Ashland, is the headquarters library, with the Superior Public Library, Superior, acting as the system resource library. Arrangements developed between the Superior Public Library and the Vaughn Public Library ensure rapid interloan service, coordinated material buying, staff coordination and interlibrary communication. Funding for the system operations is provided by member counties, federal grants and state aid. The Northwest Wisconsin Library System service area has a history of regional multi-county cooperation and was one of the first systems to become operational having received provisional certification to begin system activities January 1, 1973.

System Activities and Services—1975

The Vaughn Public Library, system headquarters, provides the system's administrative services. Among 1975 activities were the preparation and dissemination of specialized system service related materials. A booklet containing information on the functions of the System and the services offered, including a listing of System Board members and librarians, was printed and distributed to 5000 patrons and area librarians. In addition, membership directories (listing all libraries in the system, hours open, telephone number and head librarian) were printed and provided to all libraries and the public. The headquarter library was also responsible for distributing a statement of system purpose and policy, 1975, as amended by the System Board.

Bookmobile service to rural residents remains a major activity of the System. Because the counties forming this System are sparsely populated with many small towns, a bookmobile service is a key service for reaching residents not within reasonable distance of a public library. The purchase of a new bookmobile has provided the means for distributing, in addition to books, art prints for adults and children and 8mm films for home use. At present, the System has two bookmobiles serving eighty-two stops and eighteen libraries. In addition, a van delivers books on a special service basis to thirty-nine hospitals, nursing homes, jails, and senior citizen housing units.

The Mail-A-Book service, which began on a partial basis in 1974, was expanded in 1975 to include the entire System area.

In 1975, this program had 4,410 registered users and a book circulation of 32,494. This service was very effective in reaching rural System residents.

The System has continued its policy of building the collections of System member libraries. Reference works were placed in all libraries. A four volume printed index to the fifty-one volumes of Wisconsin Necrology (held by the Wisconsin Historical Society) was printed and distributed to System libraries. Encyclopedias were provided to ten member libraries.

All libraries in the System, with the exception of Superior Public Library, received on a two month basis a rotating collection of books, phono records, and framed art prints. In addition, over 200 8mm films were purchased and a catalog printed for use by the System libraries. A program of purchasing and distributing 8mm projectors was begun and will continue in 1976.

The Vaughn Public Library, as the headquarters library, acts as the central pool for materials such as books, films, art prints, and periodicals. It also holds specialized materials, expensive materials, and little used material that is not practical to duplicate. The Superior Public Library, the system resource library, acts as the center for the storage of 16mm film and reference materials.

Centralized cataloging and processing of system materials are on-going activities of the headquarters library. In addition, system staff assist smaller libraries in cataloging and processing of books purchased locally. All System materials to be placed in member libraries are purchased on the system level and all member libraries are invited to use this service for local purchases.

Improving communication and developing communication systems among member libraries were major System activities in 1975. Among member libraries, primary reliance is on mail and telephone communication. Each library was provided with a telephone credit member. The headquarters library relies on teletype for communication with the Wisconsin Reference and Loan Library and the Milwaukee Public Library, a state resource center.

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The System headquarters in cooperation with the Superior Public Library directed a system-wide publicity program via radio, T.V. and newspaper.

System workshops were held to improve communication between the headquarters and System libraries, to review the objectives and goals of the System, and to provide continuing education opportunities for system librarians.

Services to native Americans were expanded with system staff assisting in library development on reservations. A library was

established on one reservation and planning continues for libraries on two additional reservations.

The Northwest Wisconsin Library System and the Wisconsin Valley Library Service entered into an intersystem library agreement that provides that any person holding a valid borrower's card from a library belonging to either System, may borrow library materials directly from libraries belonging to the other System.

OUTAGAMIE COUNTY FEDERATED LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Outagamie County Federated Library System was inaugurated January 1, 1975. The annual plan stated the objectives of the system as follows: first, to provide adequate library service to the approximately 35% of the county residents living beyond the jurisdiction of a public library and second, to assist and supplement the development of local libraries. Of the seven public libraries in Outagamie County, five chose to join in 1975: Appleton, Hortonville, Kaukauna Kimberly, and Seymour. The Appleton Public Library serves as headquarters for the system.

System Activities and Services—1975

The first priority of the Board of Trustees of the Outagamie County Federated Library System was administrative organization and the appointment of a librarian. Election of officers took place, contracts with member libraries were signed, policy statements and system board by-laws were drafted, system employee fringe benefits were defined, suitable office space was rented, and an administrator was hired effective June 30, 1975. Since the hiring of a system librarian and support staff was delayed, system objectives for 1975 were only partially met.

For many years before the formation of the system, Outagamie County libraries enjoyed resource sharing and interlibrary loan privileges. Any public library in the county was able to borrow materials or collections of books from another library or to avail itself of the resources of the Appleton Public Library. Furthermore, Outagamie residents enjoyed "walk-in" service at any of the county libraries. With the introduction of the System, these services, especially interlibrary loan, have experienced a marked increase.

In November a mailbox library program was begun in an effort to provide easily accessible reading materials for county residents living outside the jurisdiction of a local public library. The Manitowoc County Library System provided guidance for the project, took responsibility for selection and purchase of paperback books, and provided a catalog which was modified to

Outagamie's specific needs. The catalog was mailed to 10,500 rural residents during the months of November and December.

A rotating book collection, consisting of select collections of reading materials to be circulated in bulk to county libraries, was introduced. Large print books were purchased, processed, and placed in libraries that had not previously been able to provide such materials. In the fall an order was placed for a book van, designed to transport the rotating book collection and also to provide general delivery service and to serve as a communications tool. However, production of the van was considerably delayed with completion scheduled for June, 1976.

Development of an audiovisual collection at the county library headquarters began with the purchase of AV equipment and materials ideally suited to Children's Services. Filmstrip projectors, sound filmstrip viewers, and cassette player recorders were ordered although delivery on these items was not expected before 1976. As a component to the audiovisual collection, fine art reproductions were purchased and distributed to area libraries on a rotating basis. Further expansion of this AV collection is anticipated for 1976.

The system, through its own staff or by contractual arrangement with the Appleton Public Library, provides professional consulting services upon request. In 1975 the system was called upon to assist in reference collection development, upgrading of staff, and budget preparation. At least one field visit was made to each of the seven Outagamie libraries in order to identify specific problem areas and to assess future goals and objectives.

Only one of the seven public libraries in Outagamie County must travel long distance to reach the headquarters library. Long range planning does include a provision for credit card privileges for the one library in question. Meanwhile, in an effort to promote communication, a monthly newsletter is published. The newsletter circulates to system board members, the Appleton Public Library trustees, county library directors and department heads, other library systems, and select individuals.

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Although in-service training had not been an immediate objective of the system's annual plan for 1975, a workshop, held in November, was warmly received by area librarians. Such was the demand for in-service training that a series of workshops were proposed for the following year.

The Board of Trustees gave considerable attention to Waupaca County's request to join the system by attending planning sessions and county board meetings. In September, a two-county system was endorsed by the Board of Supervisors of Outagamie and Waupaca Counties; Waupaca County joined the system January 1, 1976.

ROCK COUNTY LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Rock County Library System (RCLS) is a federated single county library system completing its second year of operation in 1975. Participating members include public libraries in Beloit, Clinton, Edgerton, Evansville, Janesville, Milton and Orfordville. These libraries bring services to the 137,803 residents of Rock County. Previous to the System, 37,267 Rock County residents were without library service, except by random individual township contracts. The System office is located in the Janesville Public Library. Both Beloit and Janesville Public Libraries act as resource libraries.

System Activities and Services—1975

A major activity of the System in 1975 was the beginning of a Books-By-Mail program. The objective of the Books-By-Mail (BBM) program is to provide library service to rural and homebound persons by providing access to a listing of books which can be used at the individual's convenience, and to offer library services to individuals who, because of occupation, health, or residency, could not use a local library.

The first Mailbox Library catalog, which listed over 700 titles, was mailed in February and March on a staggered basis to all households in Rock County, except those in the cities of Beloit and Janesville.

From 14,073 catalogs mailed, 1,883 orders were received and 6,308 books circulated. The System pays postage one way with the patron paying return postage. Orders were received from all townships, villages and eligible cities.

During the summer, a survey was sent to 100 patrons with 57 returned. For 29% of respondents, BBM was their first experience with a public library. There were many praises for the BBM program, and expressions of hope that the program would continue.

The second Mailbox Library catalog, also purchased from Manitowoc County Library System, was mailed in November and December to rural routes and to known homebound. Persons living in the municipalities of Clinton, Edgerton, Evansville, Milton and Orfordville picked up their catalog from the local libraries. In the first two months 2,030 books were circulated.

In order to help member libraries develop local library collections, the System awarded grants to participating libraries. All of the libraries use part, if not all, of the grant money to increase their materials collections.

Many of the System libraries are faced with inadequate book budgets and shelving space. Bulk loan collections provided through the System enables these libraries to custom tailor their purchases and to borrow either current popular or seldom used titles from the System.

Communication among system libraries continues to improve. System offices can call six of the seven libraries on a local exchange. A telephone credit card is available for use by all seven libraries.

Persons may borrow from and return materials to any of the seven libraries. In June weekly deliveries were begun utilizing federal CETA funds. Deliveries are used to return books borrowed by patrons from one library and returned to another library, books borrowed by patrons on inter-library loan within the System, and materials from the System loaned to member libraries. In addition to the weekly deliveries there is daily service between the two resource libraries.

There are monthly meetings for librarian in-service training. The System registered all libraries for the ETN "Continuing Education for Public Librarians" series. During months not covered by ETN, workshops were planned on State standards.

Within RCLS there is a mini-network. Libraries in Edgerton, Evansville and Milton (northern section of county) forward requests they were unable to answer to Janesville. Libraries in Clinton and Orfordville (southern section of county) forward requests they were unable to answer to Beloit. Requests from Beloit and Janesville are checked daily against each other's collection before sending via teletype to the State Reference and Loan Library.

Since February 1975 each library forwards to the system a main entry card for each adult title cataloged. This will be the basis for a union list of holdings for the future. This list is also checked on requests for current titles before sending the request to the Reference and Loan Library.

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Upon request of the System, the Association of Beloit Librarians and the Association of Janesville librarians appointed members from their organization representing elementary, secondary, academic, special and public libraries, plus system representation, to an intertype library committee. This committee met 5 times. A questionnaire for purposes of compiling a county-wide directory was distributed in fall. A directory listing all librarians in Rock County is expected to be published in 1976.

A Public Information program is a major activity of the System. To inform all county residents of the existence and advantages of the county library system, and to encourage the use of its materials, services and programs, was and will continue to be a primary goal of RCLS Board and Coordinator.

Several specific public information activities were carried out in 1975. A tent was rented through monies from federal grant during county fair for display of media and materials available through RCLS. Releases for all programs of RCLS are provided to all eight county newspapers and three radio stations. The Coordinator was a monthly guest for three months on Janesville cable TV station. Also the Coordinator appeared on the Beloit cable station for an interview. October 20-25 was RCLS week. The Coordinator visited each community for one-half day, and showed system-produced video tapes. On a continuing basis, the Coordinator speaks on invitation to various clubs, committees and groups to keep RCLS in public view, and to answer any questions about programs, services and materials.

The System Coordinator's time is divided between system administration and adult services. Children's librarians from resource libraries are available for consultation with the Coordinator and other libraries.

Library cards from any of the seven participating libraries are honored at all libraries. Cards issued to township residents are also honored at all public libraries. There is not a universal RCLS card but any Rock County resident having a library card may use any library. Patrons adhere to the rules governing the library from which material was borrowed.

All participating libraries accept information questions on walk-in or telephone basis from any person regardless of whether or not they have library card. Questions not answered at local library are forwarded to resource libraries. If not answered there, questions are sent to the System office, where requests are sent to the Reference and Loan Library via TWX. During 1975, 2,485 requests were sent to the State Reference and Loan Library.

LSCA grant funds were used for member library materials enrichment in 1975. All of the libraries expressed a need for audiovisual materials. Framed art reproductions, 16mm films, loops and loop viewers and video equipment were purchased. Framed art is available in five non-resource libraries on rotating basis. 16mm films are rotated between resource libraries. Each library received a loop viewer and has access to loops on rotating basis. Video production is primarily done in Beloit by half-time CETA funded person.

In addition, LSCA funds were used to purchase Super 8mm films and a 16mm and 8mm projector. Also, blank video tapes were purchased.

A LSCA Public Information grant was awarded to the System. Monies from this grant were used to purchase a table model offset machine which will be used for the printing of system materials. Two brochures informing rural residents of services and programs provided by system will be mailed. Also, bibliographies and bookmarks will be distributed.

In summary, the Rock County Library System continued the "open door" policy which permits any Rock County resident to borrow materials from any public library. In addition to continuing 1974 programs, RCLS instigated the formation of an inter-type library cooperation committee, the Books-By-Mail program and a delivery system. In addition to regular system programs and activities, the coordinator administered three federal grants.

SOUTH CENTRAL LIBRARY SYSTEM

Director: Quentin de Streef

The South Central Library System received provisional certification from the Division for Library Services to begin operations January 1, 1975. Dane and Sauk counties form this System. The System serves 346,816 area residents and includes 26 public library members. The Madison Public Library provides space for the system headquarters and serves as resource library through contract with the system board.

System Services and Activities—1975

This was the first year of operation for the South Central Library System. System administrative offices are located at the Madison Public Library. Dane and Sauk counties each have county library services which act as initial resource centers in their respective counties. These county services are in direct contact with the System Administrative Headquarters and the System Resource Centers. The System has contract agreements with the Madison Area Library Council (a multi-type library

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organization), the Southwest Wisconsin Library System, and the Madison Public Library.

In order to assist in local library development, the System awarded grants to all member libraries. The grant program was implemented in two parts. Initial funds were provided to member libraries to be used for purposes given high priority locally. Additional funds were awarded specially for the improvement of the informational services of the member libraries and for the improvement of audio-visual capabilities.

The Southwest Wisconsin Library System contracts with the South Central Library System for the provision of resource library services. Madison Public Library serves as that resource library, accepting title and subject requests for printed materials and requests for films and other special materials.

The Madison Public Library also serves as resource library for the South Central Library System through contract with the System Board. The services, resources, and facilities of Madison Public Library are available to all member libraries and

residents of the System area on the same basis and subject to the same regulations as it is available to Madison residents. The Library makes available staff for interlibrary loan services to all member libraries and provides staff for System workshops and training programs. Madison Public also strengthened its film and audio-visual program in order to improve its ability to serve the larger system area as well as its previous service area.

The South Central Library System contracts with the Madison Area Library Council (MALC), a multi-type library organization. All programs sponsored by MALC are open to libraries within the System area. In addition, all System libraries receive the publications of MALC. MALC will develop a directory of data processing facilities and data base services for area libraries.

The System public relations program began in 1975. A system brochure was published and arrangements were made for the use of area radio station time. Use of television in the public relations program is being examined.

SOUTHWEST WISCONSIN LIBRARY SYSTEM

System Director: Serena S. Nelson

The origin of the Southwest Wisconsin Library System was in a federally-funded demonstration project in 1959 designed to test the feasibility of centralized purchasing and processing for 27 small public libraries in Crawford, Grant, Iowa, Lafayette and Richland counties. The five counties took over support of this Southwest Wisconsin Library Processing Center in January 1962. As other cooperative services were added the name was changed in 1965 to Public Library Service Center of Southwest Wisconsin reflecting added services such as rotating supplementary collections to libraries, reference and referral, reciprocal library privileges throughout the five-county area, a bookmobile, consultant service to libraries and in-service training for librarians. Another name change to the Southwest Wisconsin Library System followed certification as a state recognized system on January 1, 1974. The Southwest Wisconsin Library System contracts with Madison Public Library as a resource library.

System Activities and Services—1975

Year-end statistics and evaluation of set objectives of the Southwest Wisconsin Library System attest to the fact that 1975 was a year of building and growth that expanded and improved overall library service throughout southwestern Wisconsin. Through System coordination and programs, more people than ever before got more books, other library materials and information they wanted and needed either through their local library or bookmobile.

Local library service in the 27 member public libraries saw marked improvement. The number of books and other materials loaned by the System headquarters to libraries as part of supplemental rotating collections as well as in answer to requests for specific books and information increased 50 percent in 1975. Reference and referral requests to System headquarters increased over 58 percent. The System was able to fill 62 percent of these; the rest were either referred to another library in the System or referred to Madison Public Library with which the System has a contract for back-up service as well as for reciprocal borrowing, which made Madison Public Library resources available to southwestern Wisconsin residents on a walk-in basis, with return of materials possible to any System library.

A materials enrichment project, LSCA I, planned by participating librarians and administered by the System, put about \$1,000 worth of record and cassette players and recordings in each of 26 of the 27 public libraries, one library choosing not to participate because of lack of space. The System acquired about 2,000 records and cassettes under the grant for circulation on the bookmobile and as back-up for answering special requests from libraries.

Local library service was also enriched through the availability of a \$500 drawing account for each library that qualified through workshop attendance and submission of a plan for the expenditure. With these funds, two libraries purchased 16mm projectors, five purchased copiers, two purchased typewriters and a number acquired furniture such as record browsers, added

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shelving, card catalogs, etc. Almost all used some of the account for reference, large type and current interest books. Six of the libraries used some of the money for wages to keep the library open more hours.

Centralized purchasing and processing continued to benefit the local libraries by giving them a greater discount than they could have received purchasing as individuals and giving them fully processed books at a service charge of 20 cents per volume. There was a 32 percent increase in the number of volumes processed by the System. A purchasing and processing unit cost study was made during the year which resulted in the decision that the System service was still the most effective way of providing it though the service charge will be increased in 1977. Workshops throughout the year were on topics of practical use, e.g., budgeting, by-laws and policies, new releases, circulation procedures, reference sources and children's programming. Each month, the System continued to publish an annotated materials selection list of new books, records and cassettes which were also discussed at workshops and on display for examination. Since the System subscribes to 12 reviewing journals which are used in the annotations, this makes the selection field much broader than any one library can afford. A study of the effectiveness of this list was made in 1975 with recommendations to be incorporated into the compilation in 1976. In 1975, five of the monthly workshops, instead of being centralized in Fennimore, the System headquarters, were held at member libraries with two alternate locations each time for greater convenience. Workshop attendance increased more than 60 percent in 1975. In addition to workshop service to librarians and trustees, the System staff received requests for and gave advisory service to each of the libraries, including 11 meetings with local library personnel and, or boards. One joint meeting was held for the System Board and members of local boards at which there were representatives of 12 library boards present. An LSCA grant for a School/Public Library Access Project, sponsored jointly by the System and CESA 14 and administered by the System, started providing better library service for students through cooperation between the public, school and academic libraries within the System area. Through the work of a liaison librarian hired under the grant, cooperation between public and school libraries on the local level was improved and several system-wide programs were developed: a periodicals-interlibrary loan program with University of Wisconsin-Platteville, Karrmann Library for public and school

libraries; a union list of a-v materials holdings at the System headquarters library, CESA 14, Karrmann Library and Southwest Voc/Tech Library from which all libraries could borrow with delivery made via a CESA 14 delivery van; reference and referral service at System headquarters for school libraries; and a newsletter circulated to all types of libraries. With LSCA funding for these programs ending June 30, 1976, the project Advisory Committee started planning for ways in which costs of these programs could be picked up locally.

A highlight of 1975 was the long-awaited delivery of the new and larger second bookmobile. It had been planned to operate two bookmobiles to improve service to about half the population of the five-county area which does not have reasonable access to a public library, with every-other-week service instead of monthly service which had been provided since 1968. However, by the time the new unit was delivered, it was felt that with decreased state aid funding for 1976, it would be impossible to operate both bookmobiles. Therefore, service remained with once-a-month stops, but the schedule was evaluated resulting in two low-circulation stops being eliminated and five new ones, including three county nursing homes, added. The System Board had also approved a books-by-mail program, but looking ahead to reduced funding in 1976, decided not to start it during 1975.

Following various delays, the loan from Farmers Home Administration was closed in May, and ground was broken for the new System headquarters building in July with completion date expected in mid-March, 1976. The new 10,600 square foot building will replace the two rented store-front buildings from which the System has been operating.

During 1975, the Southwest Wisconsin Library System continued to offer free collect phone service to participating libraries, scholarships for the A-50 and continuing education ETN courses, rotating exhibits and centralized publicity releases. During the year, a number of participating libraries have been encouraged to set up home-bound delivery service and establish collections in local nursing homes. Utilization of the systemwide reciprocal borrowing privilege continues to increase.

WISCONSIN VALLEY LIBRARY SERVICE

System Director: Wayne R. Bassett

The Wisconsin Valley Library Service began in 1961 as a multi-county cooperative library program to provide reference and interloan service to residents of this central Wisconsin region. On January 1, 1973, this service became one of the first four certified public library systems in Wisconsin. Member counties

were Clark, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, Marathon, Oneida, Portage, Taylor and Wood. Largest of the public library systems this system is headquartered at the Marathon County Public Library. On January 1, 1975, Adams County became a member of this system.

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System Activities and Services—1975

System administrative services are carried out by the Headquarters Library. Beginning in January and continuing through March, the system headquarters staff edited all of the annual reports for the local libraries before they were filed with the Division for Library Services in Madison.

The application for LSCA Materials Enrichment Grant was formally approved in January by the Division for Library Services. The funds under this program, outlined in the 1975 System plan, were divided according to the system state aid formula, with each county library board given the option as to how to allot the funds locally. The actual field work, the evaluation of local library collections, began in January and was completed in April by System personnel. The final evaluation report of the LSCA, Title I Federal Grant was submitted to DLS in September. The objectives outlined in the proposed project were reached or surpassed.

The three sub-committees of the System Library Advisory Committee all began work on their respective programs as outlined in the 1975 system plan. Out of their labors came:

- 1) recommendations concerning system-wide reciprocal borrowing
- 2) recommendations for some new system-wide services for the homebound and handicapped
- 3) a survey concerning architectural barriers
- 4) a format for a new system directory of libraries and librarians.

A meeting of the Library Advisory Committee was held in September and reports were given on sub-committee projects. The committee recommended that part II of the LSCA Materials Enrichment Grant be used to purchase films and related items in order to strengthen the System A-V collection.

Two special workshops, utilizing Mr. Raymond Holt, a library consultant and Mr. Gar Stock, University of Wisconsin Extension, were held for local librarians and trustees on the topics of management techniques, and assessment of community needs.

The 1976 budget was researched and developed during the first seven months of 1975, and presented to the system Executive Committee at its August meeting.

In the fall of 1975, system staff devoted a great deal of time to the development of the 1976 system plan and, in line with that, the evaluation of the 1975 system plan.

A survey of Architectural Barriers was produced and distributed by the Library Advisory Committee. It was hoped that the survey, in addition to providing basic data, would alert area librarians to the architectural problems faced by the blind and

physically handicapped patron. The survey makes it surprisingly apparent that while most of the system libraries are quite old, many of them are moderately equipped to serve the physically handicapped patron in basic ways, although, ideally, many changes should be made.

The survey did alert librarians to the problems faced by the handicapped. Due to the survey, one library has installed handrails on exterior steps and another library instituted outreach service to local nursing homes to serve those who cannot come to the library. Other ways in which the libraries serve special patrons are through collections of large print books; provision of magnifying equipment; ceiling projectors for the bedridden; wheelchairs for in-library use; cassette tapes and players; serving as depositories for talking book machines from the Wisconsin Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped; outreach programs to individual homes as well as to nursing homes and hospitals; and providing publicity through posters in the library, eye clinics, doctor's offices and other public places.

Intertype library activities received system staff attention in 1975. Public, school, academic and special libraries are represented on the Library Advisory Committee. Workshops and meetings for all types of libraries were held during the year.

An inter-system agreement with the Northwest Wisconsin Library System, headquartered in Ashland, was signed and went into operation in January 1975. This agreement allows for reciprocal borrowing for residents in both systems.

1975 saw an increase of 17% in requests for books and information at the Wisconsin Valley Library Service headquarters. Since 1973 requests have increased 37%. Over a ten year period, the increase has been 438%. (The Service was in operation before a System law for the state was passed.)

In order to aid local library development, the Wisconsin Valley Library Service provides direct grant to member libraries. The funds are used by the local libraries to expand library services to their communities.

Lamplighter, the WVLS newsletter, was issued monthly, except May. 50,000 placemats telling the System story were distributed through local libraries to restaurants in the System area. Approximately 10,000 metric conversion bookmarks were produced and distributed to area libraries. Five libraries had various handout material made up and duplicated by the system staff.

729 Large Print books circulated to 20 libraries on a rotating basis. 294 Miniature Art Prints were distributed to 10 libraries on a rotating basis. Summer Library Program material for the System area was ordered and distributed through the System office.

ETN registration was paid for any area librarian who was interested in participating in the Continuing Education Program. Twelve libraries registered. The CLIP subscription was paid for every library in the system area. 176 show-card signs

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were made for twelve libraries during the year. Area librarians responded to lists of give-away materials 113 times, requesting 1,645 items from January through December. A Directory of Libraries and Librarians was compiled and will be distributed early in 1976.

The 1976 system plan contains a budgeted sub-program devoted to creating Indian awareness of existing library services; developing a system of communication between the local libraries and adjacent Indian communities; developing services to existing Indian libraries within the system and promoting greater involvement and use of the libraries by Indian people.

The 1976 System Plan was presented to and approved by the WVLS Executive Committee and submitted and approved by the Division for Library Services in October. The following priorities were selected and developed by the system staff after discussion and input by the Library Advisory Committee.

1. System management
2. Reference and Loan Services
3. In-Service Training and Advisory Services
4. System collections evaluation and improvement
5. Services to meet Special Needs
6. Public Information
7. Library Service to WVLS Indians
8. Inter-type and Inter-system Services
9. System Grants to Local Libraries

These priorities were developed and selected in the context of:

1. System needs
2. Statutory and Administrative Code requirements
3. Wisconsin Public Library System Standards
4. Availability of funding
