ABSTRACT

These documents contain narrative analyses and tables of data pertaining to student enrollment and enrollment trends in Illincis public community colleges for fall 1975, spring 1976, and fall 1976. Data presented in tabula: form include: comparison and trends in enrollment data from 1965 through 1975, enrollment data for fall 1975 relating to headcount, full-time equivalent enrollment, enrollment by instructional program, enrollment by sex, comparison of full- and part-time enrollment, transfer enrollment, enrollment by age and ethnic status, enrollment by place of residency, enrollment by time and place of attendance, and enrollment by county of residence. For selected categories, comparative longitudinal enrollment information is presented. The same types of enrollment data are presented for spring and fall of 1976. A glossary of terms used in these volumes is appended. (JDS)

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STUDENT ENROLLMENT DATA AND TRENDS IN THE PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES OF ILLINOIS: FALL 1975

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In reporting the enrollment data for the Illinois Community Colleges, we have attempted to show the enrollments distributed by various categories which are relevant for specific purposes. In addition, we have provided some comparisons with the enrollments of past years as well as with the enrollments of other institutions in the state. Enrollments reported as of the end of registration or approximately the tenth instructional day of the fall term were used for consistency in the comparisons.

The historical and comparative data for this report were obtained from several previous surveys and studies which are identified in the text. The data relative to the current 1975-76 academic year were provided by the 49 community colleges in their fall semester enrollment report.

The "end of registration" or "10th day" snapshot enrollment, however, are not always the highest enrollments experienced at community colleges during a term. Due to the many short term courses and the use of "variable entry" admission many colleges have experienced a "cumulative" enrollment at midterm to be greater than the "snapshot" enrollment at 10th day. These are two distinct and different types of enrollment counts and must be clearly defined. Each type of enrollment count has its advantages for certain purposes.

Several colleges have reported corrected enrollment data to the ICCB for past years. Although this does present a real problem in consistency in reports from year to year, we felt that the magnitude of these corrections justified revising last years data in this new report. This will also provide for as accurate a historical analysis as possible.

HIGHLIGHTS OF FALL 1975 "END-OF-REGISTRATION" ENROLLMENT REPORT

- 1. Illinois public community colleges again showed the highest enrollment increases of all institutions of post-secondary education in Illinois with a 20.9% increase as compared to 5.6% for public universities and 1.6% for all private institutions.
- 2. Illinois public community colleges accounted for 80% of the total increase in headcount enrollment and 75% of the total increase in FTE enrollment for all higher education in Illinois.
- 3. The Illinois public community colleges presently enroll 311,181 students in credit courses which is nearly one-half (47.9%) of all students in higher education in Illinois.
- 4. The full-time-equivalent (FTE) student enrollment increased at even a higher rate than the headcount, showing an increase of 26,1% from Fall 1974 to a record FTE enrollment of 156,883 for the Fall, 1975 term.
- 5. The ratio of headcount to FTE decreased in the Fall of 1975 to 1.98 from 2.07 in the Fall of 1974, indicating that students are taking more courses per student.
- 6. The career/occupational instructional program area experienced the highest rate of increase from a year earlier with a +38% change. The last few years the high increases were in the general studies program area
- 7. The increase in the number of full-time students (+28%) has exceeded the increase in part-time students (+12%) this year which is a reversal of a trend of the past several years. The number of full-time students totals 100,727 (32% of the total) while the number of part-time students totals 210,459 (68% of the total enrollment).
- 8. The enrollment of female students (157,577) outnumbered the enrollment of male students (153,604) for the second consecutive year.
- 9. The analysis of student enrollment by age revealed that the median age of community college students enrolled during the fall 1975 term was 25 which represented an increase from the 23 reported in the fall of 1974.
- 10. The analysis of the fall 1975 enrollment by civil rights ethnic origin classifications showed that the community colleges enrolled a substantial number of minority students. The percentage distribution of the enrollment was as follows: Afro-American (Black) 20.5%, American Indian 0.4%, Oriental American 0.7%, Spanish American 4.5%, and Caucasian (White) 74.0%.



SUMMARY OF FALL, 1975 'END OF REGISTRATION' ENROLLMENTS IN THE PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES OF ILLINOIS

The Fall 1975 'End of Registration' student enrollment report shows that enrollments in Illinois public community colleges are experiencing a very high growth rate: The public community colleges enroll 311,181 students in credit courses in the instructional program areas. This is an enrollment increase of 53,816 headcount students (+20.9%) from 257,365 students enrolled in the Fall 1974 term. The full-time equivalent (FTE) student enrollment of 156,883 for the Fall, 1975 term showed a marked increase of 32,491 FTE students (+26.1%) over the 124,392 FTE enrollment reported in the Fall of 1974. This larger increase in FTE enrollments than in headcount enrollments is peculiar to this year only. In the past several years, the headcount enrollment was increasing at a higher rate than FTE. Table 1 presents student headcount and FTE enrollments in instructional (credit) program areas in the public community colleges of Illinois from 1968 through 1975. Figure 1 illustrates the growth rate in student enrollment in the Illinois public community colleges from 1968 through 1975. Tables A and B on the next two pages show historic enrollment data for each of the public community colleges of Illinois from 1965 through 1975.

Implications for Annual Apportionment FTE

The 'end of registration' enrollments are based on a snapshot count as of approximately the 10th day of the term. The FTE enrollment for the term is then obtained by dividing the number of student semester credit hours by fifteen. The annual apportionment FTE is based on cumulative counts as of the midterm of each semester with all terms for the entire year included. To annualize this FTE count the student semester credit hours are then divided by 30 to produce annual apportionment FTE. There is a close relationship between 10th day Fall term FTE and annual apportionment FTE. The graph below shows this relationship. Since fiscal year (FY) 1973, the annual apportionment FTE has exceeded the fall term FTE.




Figure 2. A Comparison of Fall Term 10th Day FTE with Annual Apportionment FTE in Illinois Public Community Colleges from FY1972 (1971-72) to FY1976 (1975-76).

Comparison With Other Institutions of Higher Education

In the fall 1975 term, the Illinois public community colleges enrolled 47.9% of all Illinois post-secondary headcount students enrolled in instructional (credit) programs. The large increase of 53,816 students (20.9%) in the public community colleges made up most of the enrollment increase of 67,308 (11.5%) reported for all institutions of higher education in Illinois by the Illinois Board of Higher Education. Figure 3 shows that the public community colleges of Illinois enroll a greater proportion of headcount students than any other type of institution in the state. Table 2 presents a comparison of the Fall 1975 headcount and FTE enrollments in the Illinois public community colleges with enrollments in all public universities in Illinois, and all private institutions of higher education in the state. Of all the institutions of higher education, the public community colleges have the largest segment of the headcount enrollment (47.9%) and are second in FTE enrollment with 35.8% of the total. The community colleges accounted for 80% of the total increase in headcount enrollment and 75% of the increase in FTE enrollment for all higher education in Illinois from 1974 to 1975.





Greatest Student Enrollment Increase in Career/Occupational Oriented Program Area

A distribution of the Fall 1975 student headcount enrollment data by instructional program area showed that the career/occupational oriented program area received the major increase in student enrollments (38%) over the Fall 1974 enrollment figures. This is a radical change from the past few years in which the general studies program area showed the largest rate of increase. In Section I the General Studies and Undeclared program areas have been consolidated. Section II of the report will show these categories separately. Figure 4 represents the growth rate in student enrollments from 1968 through 1975 by instructional program area. The figure reveals that the sharpest increase is in the number of vocational-oriented students enrolling in the community colleges. This seems to support the hypothesis that the present economic conditions are having a great impact upon enrollments in the community colleges.

Greater Increase in Full-Time Students

The increase in enrollment in the community colleges was unusual this year because the increase in full-time students (+28) was greater than the increase in part-time students which was +12% from a year ago. This is a reversal of a trend which has seen the part-time student enrollment increase at a much higher rate than the full-time student enrollment for the past several years. This greater increase in full-time enrollments is \$150 reflected in the greater increase of FTE (full-time equivalent) student enrollment as compared to headcount enrollment.

The number of female students enrolled in Illinois public community colleges during the Fall 1975 term was 157,577 (50.6% of total enrollment) as compared to the male student enrollment of 153,604 (49.4% of the total). This is the second consecutive year that the number of female students exceeded the number of male students in the community colleges of Illinois. The male enrollment this year increased at a slightly greater rate than the female enrollment, however. Last year the female students outnumbered the male students - 50.8% female to 49.2% male while this year the margin was reduced to 50.6% female to 49.4% male.

The Community Colleges Enroll a Substantial Number of Minority Students

The analysis of enrollment by civil rights ethnic classification shows that the community colleges of Illinois enrollment consists of the following distribution: Afro-American (Black) 20.5%, American Indian 0.4%, Oriental American 0.7%, Spanish American 4.5%, and Caucasian (White) 74.0%.

Age of Community College Students Increasing

The analysis of the student enrollments in the public community colleges of Illinois during the fall of 1975 indicates that the median age (the mid point) of all students whose ages were known was 25. This compares to a median age of 23 derived from the same analysis last year.

STUDENT HEADCOUNT ENROLIMENT BY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Table 5 on the following page presents the Fall 1975 student headcount enrollment as compared to Fall 1974, the number increase, and the percentage increase for each of the forty-nine public community college campuses and the thirty-nine public community college districts in Illinois. The table shows that of the forty-nine campuses, all but three showed increases in enrollment. Two campuses experienced over 100% increase in student enrollment.

There was a total headcount enrollment increase of 53,816 students over the Fall 1974 figure. The increase in headcount enrollment was 20.9% for all Illinois public community colleges.

Table 4 below summarizes student headcount enrollment and percent changes for the past three years (from 1972 through 1975) in credit program areas in Illinois public community colleges.

STUDENT FTE ENROLLMENT BY COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Table 7 shows the Fall 1975 student full-time-equivalent (FTE) enrollments in instructional programs for each of the forty-nine campuses, as well as the thirty-nine community college districts in Illinois. The FTE enrollments are compared with Fall 1974 enrollments. The table shows the number and percentage increase from the Fall 1974 figures. Of the forty-nine campuses, only two experienced a decrease in FTE student enrollment. The change in student FTE enrollment from Fall 1974 to Fall 1975 in all Illinois public community colleges was an increase of 32,491 (+26.1%). This increase in FTE enrollment is over twice as large as the 9.0% increase in 1974.

Table 6 below summarizes FTE enrollment and percent changes in credit program areas in Illinois public community colleges for the past three years (1972 through 1975).

Table 9 on the opposite page shows the headcount and FTE enrollment by type of instructional program area for each community college in Illinois. The instructional program area is determined by the student's major or curriculum of enrollment and not necessarily by his course enrollments. Hence, the apportionment FTE which is based on type of courses enrolled in may vary by category from the 10th day FTE enrollment.

Of particular interest revealed by this analysis is that the career/occupational program area showed the highest rate of increase (38%) from Fall
1974. Although all areas have been increasing during the past several years,
the general studies area has shown the highest increases in the past few
years. This may indicate a shift toward a higher proportion of semester credit
hours of occupational courses produced for apportionment funding during
FY1976 than in past years.

Table 11 (on opposite page) shows the headcount and FTE enrollments in each college by academic classification (freshmen, sophomore and unclassified). In general, students who do not complete traditional admission procedures or who are not pursuing a degree or certificate curriculum are denoted as unclassified. Students who do complete traditional admission procedures and are pursuing a degree or certificate curriculum are classified as either freshmen or sophomores depending on the number of credit hours of college courses completed.

The reasons for the large portion of freshmen students in the community colleges are that many students are enrolled in one-year certificate curriculums, many part-time students complete traditional application procedures and are classified as freshmen, and many college transfer students attend the community colleges for less than two years before transferring to a senior institution.

Table 10 (below) shows a summary of the enrollments by academic classification for 1975.

Table 13 shows the headcount enrollment in each of the community colleges of Illinois distributed by male, female, and total headcount.

The distribution by sex shows that the number of male and female students enrolled in the community colleges is fairly evenly distributed. The number of male students enrolled was 153,604 (49.4%) while the number of female students was 157,577 (50.6%). This is the second year that the number of female students exceeded the number of male students in the community colleges of Illinois.

Table 12 (below) shows a comparison of the male-female enrollment distribution from 1972 through 1975. A complete distribution of the enrollment by sex was not available prior to 1972.

Table 15 (on opposite page) shows the number of full-time students (students enrolled for 12 credit hours or more) and the number of part-time students (students enrolled for 11 hours or less) enrolled in the community colleges. The community colleges are serving a much larger number of part-time students than full-time students. In past years there has been a rapid increase in part-time enrollment, but this year the full-time enrollment has started to accelerate.

Table 14 (below) shows how the part-time and full-time enrollments have changed from 1972 to 1975. The largest increase in full-time enrollments occurred this year (27.7%) whereas part-time enrollments increased (17.9%) this fall which is a smaller increase than in 1974. Sixty-eight percent of community college students in 1975 were part-time students.

ANALYSIS OF COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENTS BY RESIDENCY OF STUDENTS

Table 17 (on opposite page) shows a distribution of students enrolled in the public community colleges of Illinois distributed by type of residency (In-District, Out-of-District, or Out-of State). Out-of-District students are students whose legal residency is in Illinois but outside the boundaries of the community college and includes both students from school districts which do not belong to a community college district as well as chargeback students from other community college districts. In-District students are ones whose legal residency is within the boundaries of the community college district and who are attending that community college.

The distribution by residency reveals that the community colleges of Illinois serve primarily students from within their own district boundaries. Over 96 percent of the total enrollment was In-District. Out-of-District students represented approximately 3.5 percent of the total enrollment in the public community colleges in Illinois. Out-of-State residency includes students enrolled from other states as well as from foreign countries. Only 704 (0.2%) Out-of-State students were enrolled in the community colleges.

Table 19 (on opposite page) shows the FTE (full-time equivalent) student enrollment in each of the public community colleges in Illinois by time of attendance - day, evening, and Saturday and/or Sunday. Day attendance is defined to be enrollment in classes which meet between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 4:59 p.m. Evening classes are ones which meet between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 6:59 a.m. Monday through Friday. Saturday and Sunday classes are ones which meet anytime on Saturday or Sunday.

Day attendance accounts for the largest segment in the community colleges of Illinois (64.6% of the total); however, evening attendance makes up a substantial part of the total FTE enrollment as well (34.3% of the total). In the Fall 1975, the evening attendance increased (31%) while the day attendance increased (21%) from the Fall 1974 figures.

ON-CAMPUS FTE ENROLLMENT

Table 21 (on opposite page) shows the on-campus FTE enrollment in each of the community college districts distributed by time of attendance. The Day On-Campus FTE enrollment is presently used as a criteria for space needs to justify capital budget requests. The Day On-Campus FTE does make up the largest segment of on-campus enrollment with 70% of the total, however, the evening enrollment is also very sizeable with 37,062 FTE for 29% of the total.

Table 23 (on opposite page) shows the headcount enrollment in instructional programs in each of the public community colleges of Illinois by place of attendance - on campus, off campus, extension, and home study. On campus (attendance centers which are a part of the college campus) attendance accounts for the greatest portion of the attendance enrollment (72.4%). Off campus (in district attendance centers which are not a part of the college campus) and extension (out-of-district attendance centers) enrollments accounts for 27.4% of the total enrollment. Home study make up only a minor part of the total enrollment in Illinois community colleges.

Table 25 (on opposite page) shows the number of new transfer students at each of the public community colleges of Illinois by type of institution from which they transferred in Illinois and all out-of-state institutions. This analysis shows that the community colleges received 5,032 new transfer students from the public senior colleges of Illinois and an additional 3,318 new transfers from private senior colleges in the state. These students transferring from senior institutions into the community colleges are known as "reverse transfers" and make up a substantial number of students statewide.

Table 24 (below) shows a summary of the transfer data and a comparison, with the fall 1974 transfer enrollments.

Table 31 (opposite page) shows the proportion of the population living within each community college district that is enrolled in instructional programs at the community college. A separate ratio is shown for student headcount and for full-time equivalent (FTE) student enrollment. The head-count enrollment is used to show the number of individuals being served regardless of whether they are full-time or part-time. The FTE enrollment is used so that an equated measure can be obtained.

The Going Rate represents the percent of the population actually enrolled in instructional programs by a community college at a given point in time only. Over a period of time the percent of the population served by the community college would quite naturally be much higher.

Comparison of the going rates among districts having similar characteristics is very useful; however, one must make sure that he considers such factors as density of the population, availability of permanent buildings, proximity of competitive institutions of higher education, and many other particular circumstances. When properly utilized, the going rate is very helpful as one factor in predicting future enrollments. It is also a measure of the extent of service the community colleges are providing to the districts.

Any references the instructional programs in Table A-1 through Table 10 refer to the instructional program major of the student.

DEFINITIONS

- Age. The chronological age of students as of the last day for which Fall term registrations or withdrawals are traditionally allowed without penalty (normally the tenth day of the term).
- Baccalaureate Program. The instructional program which includes transfer, college parallel, liberal arts and sciences and baccalaureate-oriented fields of instruction, and refers to those courses classified by the HEGIS taxonomy numbers which are less than 4990, excluding those numbers ending in the --91 and --99 series which are classified as general studies.
- County of Residence. Location where Illinois students claim legal residence.
- Community Education. Those non-credit instructional activities under public service which have been established to provide an educational service to the various members of the community and are not part of degree or certificate programs. Community education includes, but is not limited to, non-credit short term instructional activity, professional review sessions. workshops, seminars, etc.
- Community Service. Those activities under public service concerned with making available to the public various resources and unique capabilities that exist within the institution. Examples of community services may be conferences and institutes, general advisory services and reference bureaus, urban affairs, international affairs, radio and television, consultation, and similar activities which meet the test that the primary intent for establishing is to provide services which are beneficial to groups and individuals outside of the institution.
- Day. Between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 4:59 P.M.
- Ethnic Origin. Refers to the civil rights racial category of students as self-reported or otherwise determined. The categories reported do not correspond to scientific definitions but to racial, ethnic, cultural, color and lingual background of the student.



Ethnic Origin (Continued)

- .. Afro-American Students who identify themselves ethnically as being of Negro, Black or Afro-American descent.
- .. American Indian Students who identify themselves as being of native American Indian descent, including Canadian and Alaskan natives. Does not include Caucasian Americans.
- .. Caucasian Students who identify themselves as being White and generally of Euro-Asian background who are not a member of one of the specific ethnic groups as defined by the Office for Civil Rights.
- .. Oriental Students who identify themselves ethnically as being of Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Hawaiian, Samoan, or Filipino or other Southeast Asian or South Pacific origin.
- .. Spanish Surnamed Students who identify themselves as being of Chicano, Mexican American, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Latin American, South Central American, South American or traditionally Spanish origin.
- .. Other and No Indication Students not included in any of the other categories.
- Evening. Between the hours of 5:00 P.M. and 6:59 A.M.
- Extension. A student who has a majority of his certificate or degree credit course load (credit hours) taught outside of the junior college's legal district boundaries. Exclude students enrolled in home study courses.
- Freshman. A student who has completed fewer than 30 semester hours (45 quarter hours).
- Full-Time. A student taking twelve or more semester or quarter credit hours during a regular semester or quarter. Institutions not on the semester or quarter system should consider students taking at least 3/4 of the normal load as full-time students.
- Full-Time-Equivalent. The statistical student unit calculated by dividing all credit hours (both certificate and degree) generated at the college by 15 credit hours for any term.
- General Studies. A student enrolled in courses of a general studies curriculum leading to the degree of Associate in Liberal Studies. Associate in General Studies or certificate in one of the general studies areas.
- Geographic Origin. Location where student claims legal residence at time of registration.
- Headcount. The number of different individuals enrolled in certificate and degree credit instructional programs at a college.
- Home Study. Number of individual students who have a majority of their certificate or degree course load (credit hours) taught by the college via mail, radio, television. or newspaper.
- In-District. Students who live within a community college district and are attending the community college in that district.
- In-State. Students who attend an institution in the state in which they are legally domiciled.
- Occupational/Career. A student in a community college in the occupational/career instructional program and pursuing a certificate or an associate degree curriculum primarily designed to lead to initial or upgraded employment upon completion of the curriculum.



- Off-Campus. A student who has the majority of his degree or certificate courses (credit hours) tought in facilities at temporary or satellite instructional stations located other than on the main campus and in facilities not leased or controlled by the college but within the community college district.
- On-Campus. A student who has the majority of his degree certificate courses (credit hours) taught on the main college campus (in facilities on property owned or leased or controlled by the college) excluding all off-campus, home study and extension students as defined herein.
- <u>Out-of-District</u>. A student attending a community college who has his legal domicile or permanent residence not within the boundaries of the community college district but within the State of Illinois.
- <u>Out-of-State</u>. A student who has his legal domicile or permanent residence outside the State of Illinois.
- <u>Part-Time</u>. A student enrolled in less than 12 semester or quarter credit hours per regular academic term.
- Sophomore. A student who has completed at least 30 scmester hours (45 quarter hours) but has completed fewer than 60 semester hours (90 quarter hours) or a student without a previous degree who has more than 60 semester hours and is continuing to pursue an associate degree at a community college.
- <u>Transfer</u>. A student who entered your institution for the first time this Fall and who had previously attended another institution of higher education.
- Unclassified. (Unclassified refers to a student not curriculum.) A student enrolled in one or more certificate courses or degree credit courses who (a) does not fulfill minimum requirements of entrance as a regular student, or (b) is not pursuing an associate degree curriculum, (c) is not pursuing a certificate curriculum, or (d) has previously completed a degree.
- Undeclared. A curriculum identifier. A student enrolled in decree credit or certificate courses who is not pursuing an associate degree or certificate or has not decided which instructional program to pursue.

HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Community colleges of Illinois have experienced an increase in headcount student enrollment during the second term of 1975-76 (winter quarter for colleges on quarter system or spring semester for colleges on semester system), with a total count of 312,645 students enrolled in instructional program areas. This is an increase of 14% from the second term of 1974-75 and an increase of 1% from the fall 1975 term. (See Page 2)
- FTE Student enrollment totals 152,764 for the winter/spring term of 1975-76, an increase of 20% from the winter/spring 1974-75 term but a decrease of 3% from the fall 1975 term. (See Page 4)
- 3. The enrollment in the occupational/career program areas increased by 23,484 (30.6%) from the winter/spring term 1974-75, which was a substantially higher rate of increase than in the baccalaureate or general studies areas. (See Page 6 for details)
- 4. Freshmen students accounted for 52.6% of the total second term 1975-76 enrollment with sophomore students accounting for 23.9% and unclassified students accounting for 23.5%. (See Page 8)
- 5. In-district students composed 95.0% of the total student enrollment in the community colleges of Illinois with 4.8% of the students being from Illinois but out-of-district and only 0.2% of the students enrolled are from out of state. (See Page 12 for details)
- 6. Day attendance accounted for 64% of the total student enrollment during the winter/spring term 1975-76, which represents a decrease of one percent from a year ago. (See details on Page 14)
- 7. Enrollment at on-campus locations accounted for 80.1% of the total winter/spring term 1975-76 enrollment with enrollment at in-district off-campus locations accounting for 19.3% of the total and out-of-district locations accounting for 0.6% of the total enrollment. (See Page 16 for details).



INTRODUCTION

Student enrollment data for the second term 1975-76 (winter quarter for colleges on quarter system and spring semester for colleges on semester system) is based on 10th day (end of registration) data. This type of enrollment data is considered to be snapshot enrollment. Snapshot enrollment counts reflect the number of students attending a given institution on a particular date. Usually, the second term enrollment at institutions of higher education are somewhat lower than the fall term enrollment for the same year. This has generally been the case in Illinois public community colleges as well, however, during 1974-75, the second term enrollment exceeded the fall term enrollment of that year. This unusual increase in second term enrollment was due to the economy and fast increasing enrollment in the community colleges throughout the nation. This year, the second term enrollment is following a pattern much like the years prior to 1975. The enrollment data shows that headcount enrollment has remained relatively the same from the fall 1975 term but the instructional FTE enrollment has actually decreased by approximately 3% from the fall term data. It must be pointed out, however, that the total second term enrollment is still considerably greater than the second term enrollment of the previous year. The increase in headcount enrollment from a year ago is 14.0% and the increase in FTE enrollment is 20.3%.

COMPARISON OF SECOND TERM FY1976 HEADCOUNT ENROLLMENTS WITH FALL 1975 AND SECOND TERM FY1975 ENROLLMENTS

Table 1 on the opposite page shows the headcount enrollment data for second term 1976 compared to the headcount enrollment data for the fall of 1975 and the second term of last year for each community college. Also shown in the Table is the percent change from the second term of FY1975 to the second term of FY1976 and the percent change from the fall term 1975. It must be pointed out that the colleges that are on the quarter calendar system have reported data for the winter quarter. In several of these cases, the winter quarter enrollment is lower than the spring quarter. Although the statewide average shows an increase of 38,705 students (14%) from a year earlier and an increase of 1464 students (0.5%) from the fall term, seven colleges have experienced enrollment decreases from a year ago and 28 colleges showed slight decreases from the fall 1975 term.

Oakton Community College has a large increase from the fall 1975 term which is due to the fact that student enrollment in the main Oakton Niles Adult and Continuing Education Program (MONACEP) have not been reported with the regular enrollment report previously. The student enrollments from this program, included in this report, are students that are enrolled in credit programs in the general studies area. Therefore, although the percent increase appears very high in this report, the actual increase of enrollment at Oakton is not that high.

The very large increase at Oakton is due to the inclusion of enrollments in credit courses in the MONACEP program which were previously not reported in the enrollment reports.

COMPARISON OF SECOND TERM FY1976 FTE ENROLLMENTS WITH FALL 1975 AND SECOND TERM FY1975 ENROLLMENTS

Table 3 on the opposite page shows the FTE enrollment in the community colleges by college for the second term FY1975, fall 1975 and the second term FY1976. The statewide totals show that the FTE enrollment increased by 25,787 FTE students from the second term FY1975 to second term FY1976. This increase represents a 20.3% change in just one year. The FTE enrollment reported during this term is slightly lower (-3%), however, than that reported for the fall term 1975. Table 2 below shows a summary of the statewide totals for enrollment reported in the second term FY1975, the fall 1975 term and the second term FY1976.

In analyzing the FTE Enrollment Report in Table 3 on the opposite page, it can be noted that only three of the community colleges had enrollment decreases from a year earlier. However, a majority of the community colleges showed a slight decrease in FTE enrollment from that recorded in the fall of 1975. These results seem to indicate that the enrollment patterns of the past are again emerging after the unusual spring last year. We must not take this enrollment decrease in the second semester to mean that we are going to continue to have enrollment decreases in future years because an enrollment decrease in the second term is to be expected. On the contrary, since the enrollment decrease in the second term was so slight, we might continue to have a steadily increasing enrollment from year to year if the trends of the present time continue.

SECOND TERM STUDENT HEADCOUNT FTE ENROLLMENT BY INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM AREAS

Table 5 on the opposite page shows headcount and FTE enrollment: in each of the public community colleges of Illinois by instructional program area. Table 4 below, shows a comparison of the enrollment data by program area showing the state summaries. This table reveals that the occupational/instructional area has shown the largest growth from the winter quarter/spring semester 1974-75 to the winter quarter/spring semester 1975-76 (plus 30.6%). All of the other instructional areas also showed a very positive growth rate from a year earlier with the exception of the undeclared area which showed a decline of 26.5%. In comparing the winter/spring 1975-76 enrollment by program area to that of fall 1975, we note a drop of 3.3% in the baccalaureate area, a very slight drop of 0.3% in the occupational area and increases of 1.2% in general studies and 31.7% in the undeclared category. In combining the general studies and the undeclared categories, there is an increase of 5.1% from the fall, 1975 term.

SECOND TERM ENROLLMENT IN INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS BY ACADEMIC CLASSIFICATION

Table 7 on opposite page shows the headcount and FTE student enrollment in the instructional program areas distributed by academic classification for each of the public community colleges of Illinois. In observing the relatively large proportion of freshmen, one must note that the community colleges enroll many students in programs of one year or less in length. In addition, many part-time continuing education students who take only one course per term are also included in the freshmen count if they have a declared major. The unclassified category is utilized primarily for part-time continuing education students who do not have a declared major.

Table 6 is a summary of the instructional enrollment by academic classification. This table shows the percentage of students in each of the classifications both by Headcount and FTE enrollment.

SECOND TERM ENROLLMENT IN INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM AREAS BY SEX AND TYPE

Table 9 on opposite page shows the student enrollment data for the instructional program areas distributed by sex and type for each community college. At the present time, there is a great concern for providing ample educational opportunities for women students. Many community colleges are exploring additional ways of serving the educational needs of women. As a whole, the community colleges in Illinois enroll almost as many women as men. A summary of the student enrollment distributed by sex is shown below in Table 8. This table shows that although the community colleges enroll more men as full-time students, they enroll more women as part-time students. The total number of male students reported was 160,028 (51.2%) while the total number of female students reported was 152,617 (48.8%).

In comparing the number of part-time and full-time students, the tables show 92,915 full-time students (30% of the total) and 219,730 part-time students (70% of the total). During this term, the number of part-time students increased at a higher rate than the number of full-time students.

Table 11 on opposite page shows the headcount and FTE enrollment in the instructional program areas by type of residency for each of the public community colleges of Illinois. Out-of-district enrollment includes both students from other community college districts and students from high school districts that are not a part of a community college district. Out-of-district students attend on either a chargeback basis or else pay their own additional out-of-district tuition. Both in-district students and out-of-district students are from Illinois. Less than one percent (0.2%) of the students enrolled in Illinois public community colleges are from out of state. The large majority of students (95%) are residents of the community college district that they attend.

PROGRAM AREAS BY TIME OF ATTENDANCE

Table 13 on the following page shows the FTE enrollment in the instructional program areas for the winter quarter/spring semester of FY1976 distributed by type of attendance for each of the public community colleges in Illinois. The DAY FTE enrollment was additionally split into ON-CAMPUS and NOT-ON-CAMPUS because the DAY ON-CAMPUS FTE enrollment is presently utilized for capital development considerations. The NOT ON-CAMPUS category includes OFF-CAMPUS, EXTENSION and HOMESTUDY.

Table 12 below shows a summary of the FTE enrollment in the instructional program areas distributed by type of attendance. This analysis shows that 63.8% of the enrollment is generated in daytime hours with 34.8% being produced in the evenings. Last year, 65% of the total enrollment was produced in daytime hours. Hence, the evening enrollments are still growing at a faster rate than the total.

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colleges, we have attempted to show the enrollments distributed by various categories which are relevant for specific purposes. In addition, we have provided some comparisons with the enrollments of past years as well as with the enrollments of other institutions in the state. Enrollments reported as of a census date which is the last day of regular registration or approximately the tenth instructional day of the fall term were used for consistency in the comparisons.

The basic categories used in communit, colleges are academic classification and curriculum major of the student. The academic classifications are freshmen, sophomores, and unclassified. Unclassified students are those who have previously completed degree programs as well as those who have not completed traditional admission requirements. The classifications by curriculum major are baccalaureate, occupational career, remedial/developmental, vocational skills, general studies and undeclared. Undeclared majors are those students who take a number of courses at the community college but have not chosen or been assigned to a specific curriculum.

The historical and comparative data for this report were obtained from several previous surveys and studies which are identified in the text. The data relative to the current 1976-77 academic year were provided by the 49 community colleges in their fall semester enrollment report. Two additional colleges (the Chicago City-Wide College and the Illinois Eastern College of Continuing Education) will begin operation during FY1977 but did not have enrollments for the fall 1975 texm.

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HIGHLIGHTS OF FALL 1976 "END-OF-REGISTRATION" ENROLLMENT REPORT

- 1. The public community colleges of Illinois enrolled 325,830 students in credit courses which is an increase of 8,954 students (+2.8%) from the Fall 1975 term.
- 2. The full-time equivalent (FTE) student enrollment of 154,000 in the community colleges during Fall 1976 was a decrease of 3,471 FTE students (-2.2%) from the Fall 1975 term. This decrease in FTE enrollment was the first ever experienced by the Illinois public community college system.
- 3. In comparison to other institutions of post-secondary education in Illinois, the public community colleges experienced the highest increase in head-count enrollment (+2.8%) as well as the largest decrease in FTE enrollment (-2.2%). The community colleges persently enroll 49% of all students in higher education in Illinois and account for 35% of the total FTE enrollment.
- 4. The number of full-time students (95,141 29% of the total) decreased this year by 7%, while the number of part-time students (230,528 71% of the total enrollment) increased by 9%. This shift explains the increase in headcount enrollment and a decrease in FTE enrollment.
- 5. The career/occupational instructional program area experienced the highest rate of increase in Fall 1976 from a year earlier with an 8% increase. This is the second consecutive year that the career/occupational program area has had the largest rate of increase in enrollment.
- 6. The enrollment of female students (171,761) outnumbered the enrollment of male students (154,069) this Fall for the third consecutive year.
- 7. Community colleges enroll predominately students residing within the colleges' district boundaries (94.8% of total), with 5% of the students being out-of-district, and only 661 (0.2%) being students with out-of-state residency.
- 8. Although the majority of the course enrollments (64.6%) occur during the day (7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday), a substantial portion (34.0%) occur during the evening (5:00 p.m. to 6:59 a.m., Monday through Friday) and 1.4% of the course enrollment occur Saturday and/or Sunday.
- 9. An analysis of the enrollments by place of attendance showed that 82% of the students attended classes primarily on-campus while 18% of the students attended classes at off-campus locations.
- 10. A comparison of enrollments with district populations at each community college showed that an average of 3% of the population of the state is enrolled in the community colleges. The rate of enrollment varies from a low of 1.5% to a high of 7.7% of the population of the district at the various community colleges.

SUMMARY OF FALL, 1976 'END OF REGISTRATION' ENROLLMENTS
IN THE PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES OF ILLINOIS

The Fall 1976 'End of Registration' student enrollment report shows that enrollments in Illinois public community colleges have stabilized for the first time since the system was created in 1965. The public community colleges enrolled 325,830 students in credit courses in the instructional program areas. This is an enrollment increase of 8,954 headcount students (+2.8%) from 316,876 students enrolled in the Fall 1975 term. The full-time equivalent (FTE) student enrollment of 154,000 for the Fall 1976 term showed a decrease of 3,471 FTE students (-2.2%) from the 157,471 FTE enrollment reported in the Fall of 1975. This decrease in FTE enrollments is the first decrease ever experienced by Illinois public community colleges.

Table 1 presents student headcount and FTE enrollments in instructional (credit) program areas in the public community colleges of Illinois from 1968 through 1976. Figure 1 illustrates the growth rate in student enrollment in the Illinois public community colleges from 1968 through 1976. Tables 2 and 3 on the next two pages show historic enrollment data for each of the public community colleges of Illinois from 1965 through 1976.



Comparison With Other institutions of Higher Education

In the Fall 1976 term, the Illinois public community colleges enrolled 49% of all illinois post-secondary headcount students enrolled in instructional (credit) programs. Figure 2 shows that the public community colleges of Illinois enroll a greater proportion of headcount students than any other type of institution in the state. Table 2 presents a comparison of the Fall 1975 headcount and FTE enrollments in the Illinois public community colleges with enrollments in all public universities in Illinois, and all private colleges with enrollments in all public universities in Illinois, and all private institutions of higher education in the state. Of all the institutions of higher education, the public community colleges had the largest increase in headcount enrollment and the largest decrease in FTE enrollment. The trends in Illinois are also being reported nationally. Two-year college enrollment nationwide increased only 1.5% this year while the enrollment in four-year universities decreased 2.2% nationally. The main reasons for enrollment stabilization seem to be a 34% decrease in veterans carollment, increases in tuition, and more people are working. These reasons seem to be as applicable to the Illinois public community colleges as elsewhere.



Greatest Student Enrollment Increase in Career/Occupational Oriented Program Area

A distribution of the Fall 1976 student headcount enrollment data by instructional program area showed that the career/occupational oriented program area received the major increase in student enrollments (8%) over the Fall 1975 enrollment figures. Figure 3 shows the distribution of the Fall 1976 enrollment by instructional program area. The three major areas shown enroll approximately one-third of the students each.



Greater Increase in Part-Time Students

The part-time student enrollment in the community colleges increased 9% in the Fall 1976 term while the full-time enrollment dropped by 7%. This is a reversal of the Fall 1975 figures which showed a greater increase in full-time student enrollment.

Female Students Outnumber Male Students in Illinois Community Colleges

The number of female students enrolled in Illinois public community colleges during the Fall 1976 term was 171,761 (52.7% of total enrollment) as compared to the male student enrollment of 154,069 (47.3% of the total). This is the third consecutive year that the number of female students exceeded the number of male students in the community colleges of Illinois.

In-district Students Make Up 95% of Community Collage Enrollment

The community colleges of Illinois enroll predominately students with residency in their own districts. Of the 325,830 students enrolled in community colleges during the Fall 1976 term, 308,813 (94.8%) were in-district students, while 16,350 (5.0%) of the students were out-of-district students, and only 661 (0.2%) students were from out-of-state.

Table 6 on the following page presents the Fall 1976 student headcount enrollment as compared to Fall 1975, the number increase, and the percentage increase for each of the forty-nine public community college campuses and the thirty-nine public community college districts in Illinois. The table shows that of the forty-nine campuses, twenty-four showed increases in enrollment while twenty-five showed decreases in enrollment. Only one college, John Wood, experienced an increase of over 100% in student enrollment, and it is the newest community college, only beginning its second year of operation.

There was a total headcount enrollment increase of 8,954 students over the Fall 1975 figure. The increase in headcount enrollment was 2.8% for all Illinois public community colleges.

Table 5 below summarizes student headcount enrollment and percent changes for the past four years (from 1972 through 1976) in inscructional credit program areas in Illinois public community colleges.

enrollments in instruccional programs for each of the forty-nine campuses, as well as the thirty-nine community college districts in III nois. The FTE enrollments are compared with Fall 1975 enrollments. The table shows the number and percentage increase from the Fall 1975 figures. Of the forty-nine campuses, thirty-one experienced a decrease in FTE student enrollment, while eighteen showed an increase in enrollment. The change in student FTE enrollment from Fall 1975 to Fall 1976 in all Illinois public community colleges was a decrease of 3,471 (-2.2%). Only one college, John Wood, experienced an increase in FTE student enrollment, but it is the newest community college, only beginning its second year.

Table 7 below summarizes FTE enrollment and percent changes in instructional credit program areas in Illinois public community colleges for the past four years (1972 through 1976).

Table 10 on the opposite page shows the headcount and FTE enrollment by type of instructional program area for each community college in Illinois. The instructional program area is determined by the student's curriculum major of enrollment and not necessarily by his course enrollments. Hence, the apportionment FTE which is based on course enrollment may vary by category from the 10th day FTE enrollment.

This analysis showed that the career/occupational program area had the largest rate of increase (7.9%) from Fall 1975. The baccalaureate program area decreased slightly (0.9%) from Fall 1975. This is the first time since Fall, 1972 that the baccalaureate program area experienced a decline in enrollment by student's curriculum major.

Table 9 below shows a comparison of Fall 1975 and Fall 1976 head-count and FTE enrollment by instructional program area.

Table 12 (on opposite page) shows the headcount and FTE enrollments in each college by academic classification (freshmen, sophomore and unclassified). In general, students who do not complete traditional admission procedures or who have previously completed a degree are denoted as unclassified. Otherwise, students are classified as either freshmen or sophomores depending on the number of credit hours of college courses completed.

The reasons for the large portion of freahmen students in the community colleges are that many students are enrolled in one-year certificate curriculums, many part-time students complete traditional application procedures and are classified as freshmen, and many college transfer students attend the community colleges for less than two years before transferring to a senior institution.

Table 11 (below) shows a summary of the enrollments by academic classification for 1976.

MALE-FEMALE ENROLLMENT DATA FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED IN ILLINOIS PUBLIC COMMUNITY COLLEGES DURING FALL TERM 1976

Table 14 shows the headcount enrollment in each of the community colleges of Illinois distributed by male, female, and total headcount.

The distribution by sex shows that there are approximately 17,500 more female students than male students enrolled in the public community colleges of Illinois. The number of male students enrolled was 154,069 (47.3%) while the number of female students was 171,761 (52.7%). This is the third year that the number of female students exceeded the number of male students in the community colleges of Illinois.

Table 13 (below) shows a comparison of the male-female enrollment distribution from 1972 through 1976. A complete distribution of the enrollment by sex was not available prior to 1972.

ANALYSIS OF FALL 1976 ENROLLMENT DATA BY TYPE OF ENROLLMENT

Table 16 (on opposite page) shows the number of full-time students (students enrolled for 12 credit hours or more) and the number of part-time students (students enrolled for 11 hours or less) enrolled in the community colleges. The community colleges are serving a much larger proportion of part-time students than full-time students.

Table 15 (below) shows how the part-time and full-time enrollments have changed from 1972 to 1976. In Fall, 1976, full-time enrollments decreased (5.6%) from the previous year's enrollment figures. This was the first year that full-time enrollment decreased. Full-time students accounted for 29.2% of the total students enrolled. The majority of students enrolled (70.8%) were part-time students.

ANALYSIS OF COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENTS BY RESIDENCY OF STUDENTS

Table 18 (on opposite page) shows a distribution of students enrolled in the public community colleges of Illinois distributed by type of residency (In-District, Out-of-District, or Out-of State). Out-of-District students are students whose legal residency is in Illinois but outside the boundaries of the community college district in which they enrolled and includes both students from school districts which do not belong to a community college district as well as chargeback students from other community college districts. In-District students are ones whose legal residency is within the boundaries of the community college district and who are attending that community college.

The distribution by residency reveals that the community colleges of

Illinois serve primarily students from within their own district boundaries. Approximately 95% of the total enrollment was In-District. Out-of-District students represented approximately 5.0 percent of the total headcount enrollment in the public community colleges in Illinois. Out-of-State residency includes students enrolled from other states as well as from foreign countries. Only 661 (0.2%) Out-of-State students were enrolled in the community colleges.

Table 20 (on opposite page) shows the FTE (full-time equivalent) student enrollment in each of the public community colleges in Illinois by time of attendance - day, evening, and Saturday and/or Sunday. Day attendance is defined to be enrollment in classes which meet between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 4:59 p.m. Evening classes are ones which meet between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 6:59 a.m. Monday through Friday. Saturday and Sunday classes are ones which meet anytime on Saturday or Sunday.

Day attendance accounts for the largest segment in the community colleges of Illinois (64.6% of the total); however, evening attendance makes up a substantial part of the total FTE enrollment as well (34.0% of the total). In the Fall 1976, both day and evening FTE enrollment decreased by 1.7% and 3.7% respectively from the Fall 1975 figures.

Table 19 (below) shows a summary of the total FTE enrollment by time of attendance for Fall 1976.

ON-CAMPUS FTE ENROLLMENT

Table 22 (on opposite page) shows the on-campus FTE enrollment in each of the community college districts distributed by time of attendance. The Day On-Campus FTE enrollment is presently used as a criteria for space needs to justify capital budget requests. The Day On-Campus FTE does make up the largest segment of on-campus enrollment with 72% of the total, however, the evening enrollment is also very sizeable with 33,921 FTE for 27% of the total.

Table 24 (on opposite page) shows the headcount enrollment in instructional programs in each of the public community colleges of Illinois by place of attendance --on-campus, off-campus, extension, and home-study. On-campus (attendance centers which are a part of the college campus) attendance accounts for the greatest portion of the attendance enrollment (81.6%).

Off-campus (in district attendance centers which are not a part of the college campus) and extension (out-of-district attendance centers) enrollments accounts for 18.1% of the total enrollment. Home-study makes up only a minor part of the total enrollment in Illinois community colleges.

Table 26 (on opposite page) shows the number of new transfer students at each of the public community colleges of Illinois by type of institution from which they transferred in Illinois and all out-of-state institutions. This analysis shows that the community colleges received 6,445 new transfer students from the public senior colleges of Illinois and an additional 3,661 new transfers from private senior colleges in the state. These students transferring from senior institutions into the community colleges are known as "reverse transfers" and make up a substantial number of students statewide.

Table 25 (below) shows a summary of the transfer data and a comparison with the fall 1975 transfer enrollments.

Table 28 on the next page indicates the Fall 1976 student headcount enrollment in Instructional Program areas as classified by student curriculum major in
each of the public community colleges of illipois. Of the five areas in
which a student may declare a major, the Baccalaureate program area showed
the largest enrollment, 107,364 (33%) of the total. The Occupational program area was second in enrollment with 105,700 students (32.4%). General
Studies, Remedial/Developmental and Vocational Skills followed with 11.6%,
11%, and 6.8% respectively. A little over 5 percent of the total enrollment were students who had not yet declared a curriculum major.

Table 27 below shows a summary of the student headcount enrollment in instructional program areas as classified by student major.

Table 30 on the following page shows the actual Fall 1976 10th day apportionment FTE enrollment by the eight funding categories for each of the public community colleges in Illinois. The distribution into the various categories were based on course enrollments by PCS and HEGIS codes. Of the 153,324 FTE students reported, the baccalaureate and general academic category showed the largest enrollment, 78,720 (51.3%) of the total. Business, Personal Service, and Public Services, Remedial/Developmental, and Natural Science and Industrial Technologies were next with 16.1%, 10.4%, and 8.2% of the total respectively. As you will note, the total FTE does not correspond with FTE enrollment presented elsewhere in this report. This is due to the fact that several of the colleges submitted figures inconsistent with the rest of their enrollment report.

Table 29 below shows a summary of the actual Fall 1976 10th day apportionment FTE enrollment by type of course.

PROPORTION OF DISTRICT POPULATION SERVED BY COMMUNITY COLLEGES OF ILLINOIS

Table 31 (opposite page) shows the proportion of the population living within each community college district that is enrolled in instructional programs at the community college. A separate ratio is shown for student headcount and for full-time equivalent (FTE) student enrollment. The head-count enrollment is used to show the number of individuals being served regardless of whether they are full-time or part-time. The FTE enrollment is used so that an equated measure can be obtained.

The Going Rate represents the percent of the population actually enrolled in instructional programs by a community college at a given point in time only. Over a period of time the percent of the population served by the community college would quite naturally be much higher.

Comparison of the going rates among districts having similar characteristics is very useful; however, one must make sure that he considers such factors as density of the population, availability of permanent buildings, proximity of competitive institutions of higher education, and many other particular circumstances. When properly utilized, the going rate is very helpful as one factor in predicting future enrollments. It is also a measure of the extent of service the community colleges are providing to the districts.
