ABSTRACT

Four hundred sixty-nine high school students in six high schools were surveyed in order to obtain information regarding their postsecondary plans and goals, career preferences, educational/training preferences, and opinions about Roane State Community College. Among the findings revealed by the survey were: (1) an overall trend of increasing indecision on the part of seniors about plans after high school; (2) a majority of seniors were contemplating some form of education after high school whether or not they had a specific educational goal in mind at the time they were surveyed; (3) both educational program choices and occupational field choices were statistically significant by sex, with women notably selecting traditional fields; (4) 10% of the students planned to attend a junior/community college, 34% a four-year institution, and 25% a vocational/technical school; (5) cost of attendance, academic reputation, and location were cited as the most important factors influencing choice of a postsecondary institution; and (6) nearly half of the respondents planned to apply for some form of financial assistance. Extensive data analyses are included in the report and the raw data are appended. (JDS)

PREFACE

This High School Senior Study was conducted to provide the college, TAEC superintendents and TAEC staff with data on area high school seniors including postsecondary plans and goals, career preferences, educational/training preferences and opinions about Roane State Community College.

Appreciation is expressed to all those involved in the production of this study, including TAEC staff, participating TAEC superintendents and the following RSCC personnel: Dr. Agnes NamKung, Anne Powers, Jerry Guinn and Ann Alley.

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I. SUMMARY

Survey

Results: The results of the High School Senior Survey reveal an overall trend of increasing indecision on the part of seniors about plans after high school. A majority, however, are contemplating some form of continued education after high school, although educational plans may not be formulated as to content and time frame.

- The mean rating regarding how well high school had prepared seniors for occupations or education after high school was 2.7 - slightly above average. The response is statistically significant (at .05) by high school and (at .01) by system/county.
- 60% of the respondents planned to continue education after high school on either a part-time or full-time basis; 15% were undecided. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex, by high school and by system/county.
- Respondents indicated a low 5% for high school counselors and teachers respectively regarding the person seniors thought had been most influential on their plans for after high school. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county.
- Within the occupational field choices offered in the survey, business and office occupations drew the largest response (15%), followed by health occupations (8%) and construction-related occupations (7%); 13% were undecided. At most, 31% chose fields requiring a baccalaureate or graduate or professional degree. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex (with women notably entering traditional fields), by high school and by system/county.
- Within the top ten educational program choices offered at RSCC, 74% selected a College Transfer Program, 16% chose a two-year Career Education program (associate degree) and 12% of the respondents were undecided. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex, by high school and by system/county. Eyeballing the data for the top fifteen choices by sex reveals that the College Transfer programs and the one-year Career Education programs are skewed traditionally. Some two-year Career Education programs, however, are skewed non-traditionally (notably Accounting Technology and Police Science and Criminology).
- 29% of the respondents were undecided about the highest level of post-secondary education they expected to complete after high school - an indicator of non-specific plans for after high school. 16% indicated

no educational plans beyond high school (compared with 22% earlier in the survey indicating no plans for further education). The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex - more women than men planned to complete one-year and two-year programs in a 3:1 ratio. The response is also statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county.

- Of those indicating plans to continue education, 67% responded they planned to attend on either a full-time or part-time basis; 32% were undecided. There was a 6% non-response (based on the total survey respondents). The response is statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county.
- Regarding the type of educational institution they planned to attend (if planning to continue education), 34% indicated a four-year institution, 25% indicated a vocational or business school, 10% indicated a junior or community college and 24% were undecided. The response is statistically significant (at .05) by sex. Eyeballing the data shows that 6% more women planned to attend business or vocational schools; 2% more women planned to attend junior or community colleges; 5% more men planned to attend four-year colleges/universities and 3% more women were undecided. The response is also statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county.
- Only 25 of 457 respondents planned to attend RSCC, with 84 undecided. The response is statistically significant (at .05) by sex. 2% more women planned to attend RSCC. The response is also statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county.
- Regarding the time of day respondents planned to attend RSCC, 58 replied Day, 17 replied Evening, 11 replied Both and 106 replied Undecided (192 total responses). The response is significant (at .01) by high school and (at .05) by system/county.
- The top three (3) factors rated by senior respondents as most important in choosing a college or university were respectively: 1) cost of attending (29%), 2) academic reputation (28%) and 3) location (21%). The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex. 9% more women replied cost of attending, 3% more women replied academic reputation and 2% more women replied location. The response is also statistically significant (at .01) by high school and (at .05) by system/county.

- Regarding applying for financial aid, 44% of the respondents replied Yes, 26% replied No and 28% were Undecided. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex. 5% more women planned to apply for financial aid. The response is also statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county.
- 28% of senior respondents replied that they had "heard of RSCC" via friends; 23% indicated high school counselor or teacher. All RSCC-generated publicity received a 12% response or less. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by sex, by high school and by system/county.
- Only 5% of the respondents had heard the weekly RSCC radio programs. The response is statistically significant (at .01) by high school and by system/county. It is not statistically significant by sex.
- The mean rating of RSCC's reputation by seniors is 2.7 or slightly above average. The response is statistically significant (at .05) by high school, but it is not statistically significant by system/county or by sex.

Implications

for

RSCC: Potentially RSCC could be servicing high school graduates to an even greater extent than it is presently. The results of the survey indicate that RSCC has the opportunity to attract more than 84% of area high school seniors to its campus (based on the six high schools reporting results). This opportunity is reinforced by seniors' response that overall 1) cost of attending, 2) academic reputation and 3) location were the top three ranking factors in choosing a college or university.

Implications

for Area

High Schools:

Using the following indicators:

- 1) the overall trend of indecision among seniors about plans after high school
- 2) the low percentages (5% respectively) received by high school

counselors and teachers regarding the most influential person in seniors' plans for after high school

- 3) the 32% figure indicating "No One" as most influential in seniors' plans for after high school
- 4) the 57% overall "average" rating received by area high schools regarding how well seniors felt prepared for occupations or education after high school
- 5) the fact that a total of 136 seniors responded "undecided" about the highest level of education they expected to complete (almost 1/3 of the total seniors returning the survey)

the area high schools need to evaluate how they could more effectively be servicing their students in the area of career counseling by counseling and teaching professionals who know both the current area job market and the future area job market. Students should be encouraged to consider educational programs/training beyond high school for occupational fields in which they have potential. They need objective information from which to make plans that friends and parents may not be able to provide them. In addition, high school students, especially female students, need to be encouraged to consider entering non-traditional fields.

II. INTRODUCTION

In March, 1976 this research project was initiated in cooperation with the Tennessee Appalachia Educational Cooperative (TAEC), which serves the public school systems of Roane, Morgan, Scott and Anderson counties. The project was designed to survey the plans and opinions of the TAEC area high school seniors. Since almost 70% of RSCC's students are drawn from the four TAEC counties, information about their postsecondary plans is important to future college development.

Objectives of the survey included the collection and analysis of information about:

- a. student postsecondary plans and goals
- b. student career preferences
- c. student educational/training preferences
- d. student opinions about RSCC

III. RESEARCH DESIGN

On March 3, 1976 a proposal to conduct the research project was presented to the TAEC Board and approved. The survey instrument was designed (see Appendix G) and mailed to each Superintendent for examination and criticism. No changes were suggested. In April the TAEC distributed packets of surveys for each high school to the Superintendents. Completed surveys were received from 6 of the 15 TAEC high schools (3 of the 7 systems). The surveys were collected in May and forwarded to RSCC for coding, keypunching and statistical analysis. This process took a great deal of time, due to complications in data analysis. The data is presented to the RSCC staff, TAEC staff and all TAEC superintendents for their use.

IV. INTERPRETATION OF THE DATA

A. TOTAL SURVEY RESPONSES

A total of 469 high school seniors completed the High School Senior Survey at the following area high schools:

Observations about the survey: proceeding through the survey results, it can be observed that there was an overall change in the nature of the responses. The results reveal an overall trend of increasing indecision on the part of seniors about plans after high school. It appears that a majority of seniors are contemplating some form of education after high school, whether or not they had a specific educational goal in mind at the time the survey was completed.

There are some restrictions regarding these observations, however. The trend could be attributed, in part, to the nature of the questions in the survey which ranged from the direct to the conditional (questions predicated by "if"). The nature of the conditional questions did not always permit students to indicate that they had no plans for education after high school. In these instances, there were two possible options for the respondents. In an effort to complete the questionnaire as requested, it is probable that some students, for whom there was no related response to check, simply indicated "undecided." Not responding to some conditional questions would also be accounted for by the lack of an answer option for those not planning to continue their education. The results from these two response options, however, are not completely reliable because they were not used with consistency by the respondents. In addition, a few seniors "wrote in" their own responses to indicate that they did not fit into any of the categories listed on the survey for a particular question. No space was allocated for this procedure in most questions, thereby not encouraging other responses. On the other hand, the results seem to bear out the observation that as more options and ideas were presented for the consideration of the respondents, more seniors reflected an increasing and real indecision about their specific plans for after high school.

The overall responses to the 17 survey questions are as follows:

The mean (\bar{X}) rating = 2.7. The 57% "average" rating is reflected in the tabulations by high school as follows: Clinton High School (53%); Norris High School (45%); Oakdale High School (71%); Sunbright High School (77%); Wartburg Central High School (57%) and Scott High School (58%).

60% (278) of the respondents planned to continue their education after high school either on a full-time or a part-time basis. Within the tabulations by high school (see Appendices A through F), seniors planning to continue their education are as follows: Clinton High School (71%); Norris High School (76%); Oakdale High School (65%); Sunbright High School (39%); Wartburg Central High School (57%) and Scott High School (38%). The "undecided" response should be noted here, too: Clinton High School (11%); Norris High School (9%); Oakdale

High School (13%); Sunbright High School (21%); Wartburg Central High School (11%) and Scott High School (29%).

The overall response to this question would seem to indicate a fertile area for high school counselor and teacher input.

5. Question 5 dealt with occupational field choice. Students were asked to select their career preference (from the listing on Attachment A of the survey) and write the appropriate code number in the space provided. The top eleven (11) career preferences from the 443 total responses are tabulated below:

Overall, business and office occupations drew the greatest response with 65 (14.6%) followed by health occupations - 36 (8.2%) and construction-related occupations - 30 (7.3%). In addition, it should be noted that 37 (8.4%) indicated that their occupational choice was not listed and 59 (13.3%) were undecided about career preference. Of these top career preferences, at most 31% of the seniors responding would require baccalaureate or graduate and professional degrees. The implication for Roane State Community College is that it could be and should be servicing its area high school graduates to an even greater extent.

6. Question 6 asked students in which RSCC educational program they would probably enroll if they were to attend RSCC. Respondents were asked to consult Attachment B of the survey and indicate the appropriate code number in the space provided. The top ten (10) educational programs from 403 total responses are tabulated below:

Of the top ten choices, 109 (74%) seniors selected programs in the College Transfer category; 24 (16%) chose programs in the two-year Career Education category and 16 (4%) selected a Career Education program not yet approved at RSCC but a possibility for the future. Of the total 403 responses, 31 (7.7%) indicated that

their program choice was not listed and 45 (11.6%) reported that they were undecided.

For the top occupational/career preferences reported in TABLE I requiring postsecondary education degrees or other postsecondary training, there is an overall correspondence with the top educational program options selected from those offered by RSCC.

The percentages indicated above for the four-year degree program and two-year degree program correspond closely with the percentage responses tabulated for the top RSCC educational program choices (College Transfer Program and two-year Career Education Program respectively). It should be noted, however, that the ratio of "undecided" responses in Question 7 to "undecided" responses in Questions 5 and 6 is roughly 2:1, an indication that factors other than choice enter into the expected highest level of postsecondary education to be completed. It should also be noted that in Question 3, 101 (22%) indicated no plans for further education; by Question 7, however, the number has been reduced to 76 (16%) - total responses to both questions being 467. In addition it should be recalled that 278 (60%) indicated plans for education after high school in Question 3, whereas 255 (51%) indicated a highest expected level of postsecondary education with 136 (29%) "undecided" in Question 7, indicating an increasing level of indecision as the survey questions were answered.

It is notable at this point that a total of 298 (67%) plan to continue their education after high school and 141 (32%) are undecided. No direct option was presented in the question for those not planning to continue their education, although in Question 7, 76 seniors indicated that they did not expect to complete any postsecondary education.

327 (75%) of the seniors responding now plan some form of education after high school with 105 (24%) in the "undecided" category. Comparing the total responses to Questions 8 and 9 with those to Questions 3 and 7, there is an increase in non-responses to Questions 8 and 9 by 27 and 34 respectively. These increases account for 6% and 8% of the total response to Questions 8 and 9 and should be taken into account with the "undecided" response to these questions (those seniors for whom there was no related response who checked "undecided" or did not respond accordingly), as well as in light of the responses to Questions 3 and 7 for no further educational plans after high school. The difference in total responses does not account for one-half of those indicating no education plans after completing high school, reinforcing the observation that many high school seniors do not have definite plans for after high school.

Of the 44 seniors indicating that they planned to attend a junior or community college in Question 9, only 25 indicated plans to attend RSCC. The total response to Question 10 increased by 24 over Question 9, probably due to the fact that the question was direct, not conditional, in nature. In light of RSCC's role as an educational institution serving the area in which these high school seniors live, the college should take into consideration the results not only of this question, but also the results in Question 12 in which the top 3 factors students felt were the most important in choosing a college or university were: (1) the cost of attending (29%); (2) academic reputation (28%) and (3) location (21%). All of these are factors that could make RSCC a logical choice among area high school seniors.

The responses to this question were seemingly answered by many seniors on the basis of attendance at any type of educational institution, not RSCC as the question asked.

The total response to this question has decreased, probably reflecting in large part seniors with no plans for further education for whom the question was non-applicable. However, the number of those not responding does not account for all of those with no plans for further education, again supporting the observed trend of indecision among high school seniors about plans after high school.

The response to this question may indicate a significant level of lower income in the RSCC service area. The response to the income categories, however, is held in doubt in light of the "don't know" percentage and the belief that many respondents simply "guesstimated."

Once again, the non-response to this question does not account for one-half the number indicating no plans for further education, supporting the overall survey trend of indecision regarding plans after high school.

The mean (\bar{X}) rating = 2.7. The mean ratings from the six high schools individually are as follows: Clinton High School 2.6; Norris High School 2.7; Oakdale High School 2.5; Sunbright High School 2.3; Wartburg Central High School 2.7 and Scott High School 2.7. Overall 37% of the respondents rated RSCC above average. The 52% "average" response should be considered in light of the response to Question 12 in which 28% of those responding indicated academic reputation as the second most important factor in choosing a college or university and location as the third most important factor (21%).

19. Question 19 asked for Other Comments or Questions in written form.

Some comments/questions received:

1. Does RSCC provide scholarships for anyone who plans to play basketball while attending?

B. SIGNIFICANCE BY SEX

A Chi-squared statistical analysis revealed no significant difference by sex in the responses to Questions 2, 4, 8, 11, 13, 16 and 18 on the High School Senior Survey (Question 1 - sex indication - not being of concern). Therefore, it can be stated that there is no statistically significant relationship between sex and:

- a) how well seniors thought their high schools had prepared them for their occupations after high school or to continue their education after high school (Question 2)
- b) the person seniors considered to have been most influential in their plans for after high school (Question 4)
- c) the plans (if any) for seniors to continue their education after high school on a part-time, full-time or "undecided" basis (Question 8)
- d) the plans of seniors to attend RSCC (if at all) during the day, evening, both, or if they were undecided (Question 11)
- e) the best estimate by seniors of parents' (guardians') combined income before taxes (Question 13)
- f) whether or not seniors had ever heard the weekly RSCC radio programs (Question 16)
- g) seniors' personal opinion of RSCC's reputation (Question 18)

The remainder of this section will be concerned with the responses to Questions 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 12, 14 and 15 on an individual basis.

Table I displays the responses by sex to Question 3: What are your plans after finishing high school?

The derivation of a Chi-squared statistic reveals that there is a statistically significant relationship (at .01 level) between sex and seniors' plans after finishing high school. More men planned either to work full-time with no plans for further education or to enter military service, whereas more women planned to combine further education and work. Twice as many women as men indicated that they were "undecided" or had other plans after high school.

Table II presents the breakdown by sex of the top twenty (20) occupational field choices indicated in the response to Question 5 (with Attachment A of the survey form):

A Chi-squared statistical analysis of the data showed that a statistically significant difference by sex exists in the occupational fields selected by senior men and women (at .01 level). Eyeballing the data reveals the following observations:

- a) within the general occupational fields of Agri-business and Natural Resources, Business and Office Occupations, Health Occupations, Services Related to Consumers and Homemakers (including Education), Transportation and Personal Services, the following occupations are skewed traditionally:
 - Business and Office Occupations: 10.6% (47) women planned to become secretary - stenographers, clerical workers or bookkeepers compared with 0.4% (2) men.
 - Teaching (including administrators, counselors): 2.7% (12) women planned to enter this field compared with 0.2% (1) man.
 - Health Occupations: 7.7% (34) women selected Nurse - LPN, Nurse - RN or Other Health Service work compared with 0.4% (2) males choosing Other Health Service work.
 - Construction: 5% (22) males chose electrician, welder or equipment operator compared with 0.2% (1) female selecting equipment operator.
 - Personal Services: 2% (9) females planned to become beauticians; no males planned to enter the general field.

- a) - Agri-business & Natural Resources: 2.5% (11) males planned to enter land and water management areas compared with 0.4% (2) females.
- Transportation: 2.9% (13) senior men selected Maintenance compared with 0.4% (2) senior women.

- b) Within the general occupational fields of Business and Office Occupations, Construction and Health Occupations, the following specific occupations are skewed non-traditionally:
 - Professional Accountants: 2.5% (11) women compared with 2.3% (10) men planned to enter this occupation.
 - Data Processing: 0.9% (4) women planned to become computer programmers or operators while 0.4% (2) men indicated this field.
 - Construction Design: 0.7% (3) women compared with 0.9% (4) men planned to enter the areas of architecture, drafting and blueprinting.
 - Construction Design: 0.9% (4) senior women planned to enter the engineering field (civil, electrical, mechanical) joining 3.6% (16) senior men.
 - Health Occupations: 0.4% (2) women planned to become a doctor, dentist, psychologist or pharmacist along with 1.1% (5) of the male respondents.

Women entering non-traditional fields, however, only account for 14.6% of the total within the top 20 occupational field choices. The remaining 43 occupational fields selected substantiate the observable trend within occupational choices after high school: overall, women are entering traditional careers.

Table III breaks down the top fifteen (15) Educational Program Choices offered at RSCC by sex (the Table includes the options "Program Choice Not Listed" and "Undecided"). Program selections for Question 2 were made from the listing on Attachment B of the survey form.

A Chi-squared statistical analysis of the data showed that there is a statistically significant relationship (at .01 level) between sex and the choice of educational program (offered at RSCC). Eyeballing the data shown in Table III, the following observations are made:

- a) Within the College Transfer Programs, the following responses are skewed non-traditionally:
 - 3.5% (14) females and 2.0% (8) males selected an A.S. in Business Administration.
 - 1.5% (6) women and 2.7% (11) men indicated an A.S. in Pre-Engineering.
 - 2.0% (8) senior women and 1.2% (5) senior men chose an A.S. in Pre-Medicine.
- b) Within the College Transfer Programs, the overall response by men and women indicating A.A. - Art; A.S. - Business Education; A.S. - Elementary Education and A.S. - Health, Physical Education and Recreation can be considered to be skewed traditionally.

- c) Within the two-year Career Education programs, the following responses are skewed non-traditionally: A.S. - Accounting Technology 1.7% (7) women to 0.5% (2) men and A.S. - Police Science and Criminology 1.2% (5) women and 1.2% (5) men.
- d) Within the two-year Career Education programs, the breakdown by sex is skewed traditionally for the A.S. in Electrical & Electronics Technology, Electrical Engineering Option, Mechanical Engineering Option, General Clerical and Secretarial Science.
- e) Within the one-year Career Education programs and the category of possible programs in Career Education, the results are skewed traditionally for: 1) Certificate - General Clerical, 2) Nursing Technology and 3) Medical Lab Technology.

Table IV displays the responses by sex to Question 7: What is the highest level of postsecondary education that you expect to complete after high school?

A Chi-squared statistical analysis of the data reveals that there is a statistically significant relationship (at .01 level) between sex and the expected level of postsecondary education to be completed. The responses in Table IV show that:

- 3% more men than women expect to complete graduate or professional degrees;
- 6% more women plan to complete a two-year degree program (a difference that RSCC should consider regarding academic counseling, the service

area job market and the largely traditional occupation/career fields selected by senior women in the area);

- 3% more women were undecided on this matter;
- Combining the responses for two-year programs and one-year programs reveals that more women than men planned to complete these programs in roughly a 3:1 ratio.

Overall senior women in the high school area surveyed have lower expectations for the level of education they plan to complete after high school.

Table V presents senior responses by sex to Question 9: If you plan to continue your education after high school, will you attend:

The derivation of a Chi-squared statistic reveals that there is a statistically significant difference by sex and the type of educational institution seniors planned to attend after finishing high school (at .05 level).

Reference to Table V results in the following observations:

- 6% more women planned to attend a vocational or business school
- 2% more women planned to attend a junior or community college
- 5% more men had plans to attend a four-year college or university
- 3% more women were undecided regarding the type of educational institution they planned to attend.

Table VI shows the response data to Question 10: Do you plan to attend RSCC after finishing high school?

The results of a Chi-squared statistical analysis shows that there is a statistically significant (at .05 level, but not at .01 level) between the respondents' sex and their plans to attend RSCC after high school. Some observations of the data include:

- 2% more women plan to attend RSCC
- Of the 27 women indicating plans to attend a junior or community college (refer to Table V), 17 now indicate plans to attend RSCC.
- Of the 16 men planning to attend a junior or community college, 8 indicated that they plan to attend RSCC.

Although some of the "undecided" will probably elect to attend RSCC, the college should be attracting a larger percentage to its programs from the service area high school graduates.

Table VII records the responses by sex to Question 12: Which one of the following factors would be the most important to you in choosing a college or university?

A Chi-squared statistical analysis of the responses reveals a statistically significant relationship (at .01 level) between the sex of the respondents and the most important factor in choosing a college or university. Consideration of

the tabulated responses above shows that of the top 3 factors (refer to Part IV A, Question 12 responses):

- 9% more women indicated cost of attending as the most important factor
- 3% more women indicated academic reputation as the most important factor
- 2% more women indicated location as the most important factor
- However, 2% more men, indicated that size was the most important factor.

Table VIII displays the data for the responses to Question 14: Will you apply for financial aid if you continue your education?

The application of a Chi-squared test of significance reveals that there is a statistically significant difference (at .01 level) between sex and whether or not seniors planned to apply for financial aid:

- 5% more women than men indicated that they would apply for financial aid
- 3% more women were undecided as to whether or not they would apply for financial aid.

A Chi-squared statistical analysis reveals that a statistically significant relationship (at .01 level) exists between respondents' sex and the way in which high school seniors had heard about RSCC. No further observations on the data are made here, as it is believed that many students did not adhere consistently to the directions to mark all categories applying.

C. SIGNIFICANCE BY HIGH SCHOOL

Application of a Chi-square test of significance reveals that there is a statistically significant difference (at .01 level) by high school in the responses to the following questions:

Question:

- 3 seniors' plans after finishing high school
- 4 the person seniors' thought had been most influential in their plans for after high school
- 5 occupational field choice after high school
- 6 educational program - probable enrollment at RSCC
- 7 the highest level of postsecondary education expected to be completed
- 8 their attendance as full-time or part-time students (if continuing education)
- 9 the type of educational institution they planned to attend (if any)
- 10 whether or not they planned to attend RSCC (if continuing education)
- 11 the time of day they planned to attend (if attending RSCC)
- 12 the most important factor in choosing a college or university
- 13 their best estimate of parents' (guardians') combined income before taxes
- 14 whether or not they planned to apply for financial aid (if continuing education)
- 15 the way in which they had heard about RSCC
- 16 whether or not they had heard the weekly RSCC radio programs.

- 8 their attendance as full-time or part-time students (if continuing education)
- 9 the type of educational institution they planned to attend (if any)
- 10 whether or not they planned to attend RSCC (if continuing education)
- 11 the time of day they planned to attend (if attending RSCC)
- 13 their best estimate of parents' (guardians') combined income before taxes
- 14 whether or not they planned to apply for financial aid (if continuing education)
- 15 the way in which they had heard about RSCC

In Question 12 there is a significant difference by system/county at the .05 level (compared with .01 level by high school) regarding the most important factor in choosing a college or university.

In Question 18 there is no significant difference by system/county (although the response by high school revealed a statistically significant difference at the .05 level) regarding seniors' personal opinion (rating) of RSCC's reputation.

Question 1 is not of concern (sex indication).

V. RECOMMENDATIONS

RSCC's opportunity to attract more than 84% of area high school seniors needs to be evaluated in relation to:

- 1) the college's existing educational programs (do these programs respond to expressed needs of area graduating seniors?)
- 2) necessary and possible expansion of high quality educational programs and services
- 3) increased public relations efforts by the college to become well known as a quality educational option for area high school graduates.
- 4) accomplishing 1 - 3 above without compromising existing valued qualities because of potential increase in size and without cost becoming prohibitive or exclusive in nature.
- 5) increasing cooperative efforts between the college and area high schools in the area of career counseling (especially encouraging high school women to consider non-traditional career options and to raise the level of education they expect for themselves).

V. Recommendations

Area high schools have the opportunity to more effectively service their students in the area of career counseling by:

- 1) re-evaluating existing career counseling programs
- 2) encouraging students to consider educational programs or training beyond high school for occupational fields in which they show potential and interest
- 3) providing sound, objective information for students to consider
- 4) encouraging students to enter non-traditional fields, especially female students
- 5) encouraging female students to develop higher levels of expected education and training for themselves.
