ABSTRACT

The pamphlet provides resources to help educators understand issues of sex discrimination and stereotyping and eliminate their occurrence in classrooms. An introductory section presents selection criteria for instructional materials which deal with issues of stereotyping and which promote individual student growth. Such materials should be affectively based, interdisciplinary, involve students in terms of their own lives, and eliminate stereotyping language. Section two contains two bibliographies. The first, with 55 entries, presents information about textbooks and instructional materials, employment, extracurricular activities, vocational education, counseling, and teacher behavior. The second, with 70 entries, describes fiction and nonfiction for background reading on the subject of women. The 139 entries in section three emphasize development of nonsexist instructional programs, counseling, and trade books for children and early adolescents. Section four lists 49 government documents, resources, and bibliographies. Almost all entries were published after 1970. Information is given on title, author, publisher, date, and price. I Introduction

As educators, we work each day for the present and future well-being of our students. We have become aware, however, that some of our best efforts can be undercut by the existence of sex-role stereotyping in the classroom. By making assumptions about the abilities, interests, and futures of boys and girls solely on the basis of sex, we hamper our efforts to promote our students' welfare.

In place of the rigid assumptions about each sex which stereotypes perpetuate, there is a growing awareness that children should be encouraged to explore a wide range of behaviors and goals so that as adults they will possess a healthy variety of abilities and interests. Girls who are not expected to achieve in mathematics, or boys for whom excellence in science is demanded as a matter of course, may internalize these expectations uncritically and fail to identify and develop their own unique abilities. When vocational education programs are structured so that girls are discouraged from learning to fix a car, or boys are told they need never learn to sew, these students are growing up with only a portion of the skills required for survival. They will always be dependent on some other person to perform the routine tasks of their daily lives.

We are also finding that limitations on the emotional expression of children can have equally serious consequences. When, in our classrooms, we discourage a boy's demonstration of affection or a girl's demonstration of assertiveness, we cut these children off from a means of expressing some of their most significant feelings. What will that boy do when he deeply loves? How will that girl behave when she has been treated unfairly? Children need to be in touch with a wide repertoire of feelings in order to experience themselves as complete persons.

As the awareness of the limiting consequences of sex-role stereotypes has grown among educators, we have begun to examine our own attitudes and our school environments, and to seek resources to create an educational setting where each student is encouraged to develop his or her full potential.

This booklet is an attempt to respond to that need for resources. The materials on the list were originally received in response to a request for display items for the National Education Association's 15th Annual Human and Civil Rights Conference, "Women's Rights. A Force for Educational Equity," held in February 1976. The request for materials was sent to 250 persons and organizations, whose names were culled from existing resource lists and from the clearinghouse files of the Resource Center on Sex Roles in Education. Among those contacted were trade publishers, women's groups, the federal government, and other public and private organizations which were known to have issued publications in the area of equal educational opportunity. Since the list represents only those materials which were actually received for display during the conference, some resources do not appear here. Also, since time restrictions made it impossible to carefully evaluate each publication, no endorsements are implied.

Instead, the list is intended as a starting point for educators as we begin to build collections of nonsexist resources which can increase our understanding of issues of discrimination and stereotyping and enable us to work toward their elimination in our classrooms. These resources must be evaluated according to their suitability to our own needs and to the abilities and needs of our students. In making selections for classroom use, it may be helpful to look for several characteristics typically found in instructional materials which deal with issues of sexual (or racial, ethnic or cultural) stereotyping and which promote the individual growth of students:

1. They are affectively based.

Dealing effectively in the classroom with the issue of sexism or any form of stereotyping or bias is not simply a matter of providing specific content or information which supplements or corrects that usually presented in textbooks. Any consideration of sexism involves the basic emotions and values of students and the ways they have learned to see themselves and to organize the world around them. Materials and activities should acknowledge and support students at this emotional/values level.

2. They involve the student in terms of his or her "real world."

Understanding of the issue of sexism is increased when the student is encouraged to investigate the reality of sexism in terms of his or her immediate experience—e.g., the media, school, the community—and to consider its effects on his or her own life situations and decisions.

3. They are interdisciplinary.

Consideration of sexism must be incorporated into every aspect of the school curriculum. To provide only separate units on women in literature is to minimize the extent of the problem of sex discrimination as well as the contributions of women in all fields.

4. They are based on the assumption that sexism is an issue for every student.

To approach sexism by designing courses which are primarily attractive to girls is to deny males the opportunity to discover and experience the ways in which they too are constrained by sexist values or stereotypes. Male and female students alike must understand the complex involvement and interrelationships of the historical and contemporary situations of each sex. Each student must also understand his or her stake in the elimination of sexism in our society.

5. They deal with issues of sexism from a multicultural viewpoint.

Materials and activities should recognize and affirm that males and females represent diverse racial, ethnic and cultural groups with a variety of values and experiences.

These characteristics can be applied broadly to an entire curriculum or to individual textbooks, instructional materials, and classroom activities. Additionally, textbooks and instructional materials now in our classrooms can be evaluated by more specific criteria in order to determine their sex fairness. The following criteria might be used in such an evaluation.

- Are females included in materials in proportion to their representation in the population
 - as central characters
 - as secondary characters
 - in illustrations
- Are portrayals of males and females free of stereotypes in terms of
 - physical characteristics
 - intellectual abilities
 - emotional characteristics
 - personality attributes
- Do portrayals of males and females in roles and activities reflect
 - the historical and contemporary contributions of both sexes to our society and its diverse institutions
 - the diversity of occupational roles filled by both males and females

- the diversity of cultural roles occupied by males and females
 - the nonstereotyped assignment of domestic and family roles
 - the availability of leadership roles in various social institutions to both females and males
- Is the language kept free of stereotypes by
 - using the universal rather than masculine terms when the word is commonly used to include females as well as males ("humankind" rather than "mankind")
 - avoiding the generic "he" when both sexes are to be included
 - avoiding constructions which imply that females occupy a secondary position (e.g., the farmer and his wife)
 - using gender-neutral titles or occupational role identifications (e.g., "sculptor" rather than "sculptress," "salesperson," rather than "salesman," etc.)

Other guidelines for evaluating sexism in textbooks and instructional materials have been prepared by several major textbook publishers, by state departments of education, and by teacher associations. A number of state departments and teacher associations have also developed other valuable materials, including resource lists, guidelines, workbooks, and instructional and training materials, which are designed to assist persons working to reduce sexism in schools. Educators are encouraged to contact their local organizations and to maintain a resource collection of materials for classroom and personal development.

The lists which follow are organized to facilitate use by educators. The first section is a compilation of resources which help to define the problem, the second section provides specific resources for educators to use in their work with students, and the third section provides direction for locating further resources. A brief introduction precedes the lists within each section. Each citation is as complete as possible, prices are listed when they were provided on the publication.

II Understanding the Problem— The Need for Nonsexist Education

SEXISM IN EDUCATION

These publications explore some of the manifestations and implications of sex role stereotyping and sex discrimination in education. They provide a context for planning by educators, and they supply specific information regarding such areas as textbooks and instructional materials, employment, extracurricular activities, vocational education, counseling, and teacher behavior. Of special note are the reports prepared by citizens' task forces which document sexism in local school systems.
