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**ABSTRACT**

This report presents comprehensive statistics on the organization, staff, pupils, and finances of public elementary and secondary schools in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and the outlying areas of the United States. Detailed data are provided for the survey year 1973-74, as well as selected historical data that, in some instances, reach back to 1869-70. Some private school data are also included. Initial tables provide a historical summary of public school statistics and data on school administrative units at the state, local, and regional levels. Subsequent tables provide data on a state-by-state basis on the number of public schools and school systems, number of public school employees, public school enrollment by grade, school age population, average daily attendance, high school graduates, and school lunch programs. Concluding tables present state-by-state financial data for public elementary and secondary school systems, including data on revenue and nonrevenue receipts for public schools, total expenditures, current expenditures, capital outlays, interest on school debt, status of school bonds, value of school property, average salaries of instructional staff, and expenditures per pupil. 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# Statistics of State School Systems 1973-74

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## HIGHLIGHTS

**Enrollment.**—In the 1973-74 school year, 45,409,000 pupils were enrolled in 88,700 public elementary and secondary schools.

**High school graduates.**—Public high schools graduated 2,762,000 students in 1973-74, representing 76 percent of the class which had entered grade 9 in 1970-71.

**Instructional staff.**—Instructional staff in public elementary and secondary schools numbered 2,425,000 in 1973-74, an increase of 4.5 percent over the number in 1971-72. During the same period, enrollment decreased by 1.5 percent.

**School systems.**—Local school systems continued to consolidate, with the number of systems decreasing from 17,300 between 1971-72 and 1973-74.

**Revenue.**—In 1973-74, public school systems received \$58.2 billion (mainly income from appropriations and taxes), with 50.1 percent derived from local sources, 41.4 percent from State sources, and 8.5 percent from the Federal Government.

**Expenditures.**—In 1973-74, public school systems expended \$57.0 billion, with 87.8 percent for current expenditures, 81.7 percent for capital outlay, and 2.7 percent for interest on the school debt.

**Average salary.**—Average annual instructional salary in public elementary and secondary schools was \$11,185 in 1973-74. The salary in the State (Alaska) with the highest average (\$16,053) was more than twice that in the State (Mississippi) with the lowest average (\$7,865).


**Current expenditure per pupil.**—The current expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance was \$1,207 in 1973-74. For individual States, averages ranged from \$780 (Mississippi) to \$2,053 (Alaska).

**Pupil transportation.**—In 1973-74, 21.3 million pupils were transported to and from school at a cost of \$1.9 billion, representing a 23.2 percent increase above the 1971-72 expenditure. This averaged \$87 per pupil transported.

**Capital outlay.**—Capital expenditures by local school systems and school building authorities for sites, buildings, and new equipment were \$5.0 billion in 1973-74; in 1971-72, they were \$4.5 billion.

**School debt.**—Reflecting the large amounts borrowed in recent years for school construction, interest payments on the school debt in 1973-74 were \$1.5 billion, the outstanding indebtedness at the end of the year was \$37.7 billion.

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## FOREWORD

This report presents data on the largest segment of education in the United States—the public elementary and secondary schools. Although the report's data tables are primarily for the 1973-74 school year, about one-fifth of them include trend information showing comparisons with earlier years.

The Office of Education began its periodic statistical reports on elementary and secondary education with the 1869-70 school year. Statistics for the school years 1869-70 through 1915-16 were included as part of the annual reports of the U.S. Commissioner of Education. For the years 1917-18 through 1957-58, a report was issued as a chapter in the Biennial Survey of Education in the United States, for each school year ending in an even number. Since 1957-58, survey reports formerly assembled in the Biennial Survey have been issued as independent publications. Current responsibility for these reports rests with the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), which Public Law 93-380, in August 1974, transferred from the Office of Education to the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Education.

Recognition must be given to all members of the Elementary and Secondary Surveys Branch, NCES, for their assistance in preparing this publication, with special recognition to Paul M. Dunn for help in preparing the statistical tables, and to Lena M. McDowell and Judy A. Anderson for their typing services.

We are grateful for assistance given by State education agency research and statistics personnel who provided State summaries of local school-system data on pupils, staff, property, finance, and services. Without this help, NCES could not publish State-summarized information about public education for the Nation.

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## INTRODUCTION

### Scope of the Report

This report presents comprehensive statistics on the organization, staff, pupils, and finances of public elementary and secondary schools in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and the outlying areas<sup>1</sup> of the United States. It provides detailed data for the school year 1973-74 and historical trend data for selected items of information, in some instances going back to 1869-70.

The report, in addition, gives national (but not State) enrollment figures for the following types of schools:

(1) elementary and secondary departments of institutions of higher education, (2) federally operated schools on Federal installations, (3) Federal schools for Indians, and (4) residential schools for exceptional children. Some private school data are included for regular private correspondence schools; proprietary, vocational, and trade schools; and private schools of art, music, and dancing.) Table A recapitulates the types of schools (and their respective enrollments) that operate at the elementary and secondary levels.

National totals in this report represent data summations for the States constituting the United States as of the time the data apply. Thus, for the years 1919-20 through 1957-58, national totals include 48 States and the District of Columbia. Data for Alaska are included in U.S. totals beginning with 1958-59, for

Hawaii, beginning with 1959-60. Available data are given for Alaska and Hawaii for earlier years, and these may be combined with the U.S. totals when comparable totals to the 50 States and the District of Columbia are needed. (See table 1.)

Direct comparison should not be made between the District of Columbia and individual States because the District's school system corresponds to that of other large cities rather than to that of an entire State. The latter, for instance, has rural areas in addition to densely populated urban areas.

### Sources of Data and Survey Procedures

Many of the data for this report were furnished by the State education agencies of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and 7 outlying areas in response to report forms (OE 2350-11 and 2350-12) developed by the National Center for Education Statistics. OE Form 2350-11 was keyed to *Handbook I, The Common Core of State Educational Information* (OE Bulletin 1953, No. 8), which provided uniform education terminology and definitions. The financial items in OE Form 2350-12 were keyed to *Handbook II, Financial Accounting for Local and State School Systems* (OE Bulletin 1957, No. 4), which has been the basic guide to financial accounting for public school systems.

This report summarizes information from many reporting units. State summary data for local schools were based on those supplied by local or intermediate administrative units and represent the cooperative efforts of about 3.5 million school personnel.

NCES mailed survey forms to States and outlying areas 6 months after the end of the school year, recognizing that few State education agencies would be able to collect and summarize school district data in any shorter period. The response date was set 2 months after the mailing, although respondents were asked to forward the information as soon as available. In most cases, respondents sent in data several months late: 90 percent of the States responded within 6 months; the remainder took even longer. Since the reports in this series are both comprehensive and historical, State education agencies and NCES have to devote many months of effort to their preparation. As a result, publication is usually not possible until about 2 years after the survey forms have been mailed out.

Data-processing procedures sought maximum accuracy and completeness. Each completed State report form was carefully reviewed for mathematical accuracy, internal consistency, and general adherence to prescribed definitions and terminology. The data were then compared with those for previous years and with published reports of the respective States. Letters and telephone calls helped to obtain missing data from respondents and to resolve outstanding questions.

In some cases, data furnished by the States were supplemented by information or records in the Education Division of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Annual reports covering the National Defense Education Act, the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, and Public Laws 815 and 874 (School Assistance to Federally Affected Areas) provided additional information on revenue from the Federal Government.

To ensure comparability in reporting receipts from the Federal Government for the School Lunch and Special Milk Programs and for net expenditures for "Food Services," data were adjusted on the basis of reports issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Publications of the Government Division, U.S. Bureau of the Census, were consulted to obtain more complete data on State and local education agency contributions to employee retirement systems. Data on bonds issued were supplemented by data from records in the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Education and the publication *Bond Sales for Public School Purposes, 1973-74*.

Except for the adjustments just noted, the statistics presented in this report are generally based upon the information supplied by education agencies of the States and outlying areas. Not all States were able to provide every item of information requested; however, all data furnished by the States have been included, and in only a few areas was it necessary to make estimates for missing data.

## ADMINISTRATIVE ORGANIZATION OF PUBLIC ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY EDUCATION

Constitutionally, public education is not a responsibility of the Federal Government but of the States. Generally, States delegate operational and financial responsibilities to county and other supervisory districts and to local education agencies.

### State Boards of Education

During the 1973-74 school year, State boards of education for elementary and secondary schools operated in all States except Wisconsin. In 43 States, these boards also supervised vocational education, the other 7 States (Colorado, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Oklahoma, Washington, and Wisconsin) had separate boards for vocational education.

A total of 567 persons served on State boards of education, which ranged in size from 3 members in Mississippi to 30 in Illinois (table 2). Although most State boards were served by State education agency personnel, 27 States reported separate board staffs, totaling 259 professional employees and 190 secretarial and clerical assistants in 1973-74. Staff size averaged

17 members, ranging from 1 each in 9 States to 114 in Illinois.

### State Departments of Education

Each State has an education agency headed by a superintendent or commissioner of education. In 1973-74, staffs of State education offices totaled 22,400 persons, (50 chief State school officers, approximately 11,800 supervisory and professional staff members, 10,100 secretarial and clerical assistants, and 500 plant-operation and plant-maintenance employees [table 2]). Supervisory and professional staffs of the State offices include deputy and assistant superintendents or commissioners, directors of divisions, chiefs of organized services, consultants, specialists, and regional and district supervisors.

### Intermediate Administrative Units

The continuing reorganization and consolidation of local education agencies has led to a decline in the need for intermediate administrative units. For the 1973-74

school year, 20 States had 1,078 such units operating between the State and local levels, as compared with 1,111 reported in 1971-72 and with 1,739 in 1963-64 for 26 States. The chief responsibility of these units, which include counties, parts of counties, and supervisory unions, is not to operate schools but render consultative, advisory, and statistical services and to exercise regulatory and inspection functions. Many intermediate units also operate special classes and supervise instruction, health, attendance, and pupil transportation.

The 20 States with intermediate administrative units reported approximately 2,800 intermediate district board members in 1973-74 (table 3). Staffs of intermediate units consisted of about 1,600 superintendents and other administrative staff, 1,600 instructional personnel (other than principals and teachers), 450 other professional personnel (attendance officers, visiting teachers, and health personnel), 1,100 secretarial and clerical assistants, and approximately 4,500 miscellaneous personnel.

#### Local Education Agencies

The actual operation of schools is generally the responsibility of local education agencies (LEA's). These LEA's are organized as public corporations under the jurisdiction of boards of education responsible for administration of all public schools in the area. LEA's provide the machinery for local control of schools and are largely responsible for the location and size of schools, the types of education programs and services offered, and the amount of financial support to be provided locally. The size and characteristics of LEA's vary from State to State. (See table 4.)

Reorganizations and consolidations have led to a continuing decline in the number of public school systems in the States; the total has fallen from 19,200 in 1969-70 to 17,300 in 1971-72 and to approximately 16,700 in 1973-74 (table 5). About 360 of the 1973-74 total of 16,700 operated no schools and made other arrangements for the education of the pupils in their jurisdictions.

Table 6 gives the number of local school systems by enrollment-size groupings. Of the operating school systems reporting pupils enrolled, 29 percent had fewer than 300, 26 percent had between 300 and 1,000, 34 percent had between 1,000 and 5,000, and 12 percent

had 5,000 or more. Thus, over 50 percent of the local school systems are still relatively small with under 1,000 pupils despite considerable progress in consolidating small units.

Each school system has a school board, usually consisting of from three to nine members, vested with policymaking and supervisory authority. The vast majority of school boards are elected by popular vote; others are appointed by various government officials. School board members totaled 95,000 in 1973-74, a decrease of 2,500 (or 2.5 percent) from the number in 1971-72. Administrative staff members of local school systems consisted of 12,900 superintendents and 23,000 assistants. The instructional staff of 2,425,400 constituted 64 percent of all local school system employees.

Noninstructional personnel in local school systems (tables 14 and 15) are engaged in activities such as attendance enforcement, health and recreation, pupil transportation, the lunch program, and the operation and maintenance of the school plant. In 1973-74, 48 States and the District of Columbia reported 1,261,700 noninstructional personnel. Approximately 1,288,000 noninstructional personnel are estimated to be employed in local school systems.

Overall, some 3.9 million persons were directly concerned with the operation of the public elementary and secondary schools in 1973-74. This total included board members (generally serving without compensation); administrative staffs at the State, intermediate, and local levels; and instructional and noninstructional staffs. It is significant that 99 percent served at the local levels.

Table 9 shows the State average size of the local school systems in terms of schools and pupils. For the entire United States, operating school systems had an average of more than 5 schools, an average daily attendance (ADA) of about 467 pupils per school, and a total ADA of about 2,536 per system. However, the enrollment of the median school district was 838. Furthermore, 1 percent of the systems enrolled 25,000 or more pupils and educated about 29 percent of all public school pupils in the United States<sup>2</sup>. Except for

Hawaii, which operates as a single school system, large numbers of schools per system were reported by Maryland (56), Florida (29), West Virginia (24), and Louisiana (22)—all of which operate countywide school systems. Small numbers were reported by Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, and Vermont—each averaging about 2 schools per system. (Because of a change in procedures requiring that combined elementary-secondary schools be reported as single units, these data are not entirely comparable with data

for years prior to 1969-70; see section on Number of Public Schools.)

Excluding Hawaii, which has a single State-operated school system, the States having the largest ADA per system were Maryland (33,482), Florida (20,922), and Louisiana (11,539). The smallest ADA per system was noted for such sparsely populated States as Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, and Vermont.

## NUMBER OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS

A school is defined<sup>3</sup> for this report as "a division of the school system consisting of a group of pupils composed of one or more grade groups, organized as one unit with one or more teachers to give instruction of a defined type, and housed in a school plant of one or more buildings. More than one school may be housed in one school plant, as is the case when the elementary and secondary programs are housed in the same school plant."

In 1973-74, there were 88,700 public elementary and secondary day schools (63,800 elementary, 23,600 secondary, and 2,300 combined elementary-secondary [table 7]). Of the 62,800 elementary schools, 1,400 were one-teacher schools.

Data were reported on combined elementary-secondary schools organized as a single unit with both elementary and secondary grades. Schools with elementary grades (65,100) represented the sum of the 2,300 combined schools and the 62,800 solely elementary schools. The same 2,300 were added to the 23,600 solely secondary schools to obtain a total of 25,900 schools with secondary grades.

Large-scale closings of one-teacher schools, school district reorganization, and increased pupil transportation services have steadily reduced the number of elementary schools in recent years. During the past 10 years, the number of one-teacher schools has dropped sharply—from 9,900 in 1963-64 to 1,400 in 1973-74 (table 8). For the same decade, consolidations reduced the number of school districts from 31,700 to 16,700 and the number of public school pupils transported increased from 38.7 to 51.5 percent of total ADA.

The extensive school building program necessitated by rapidly rising enrollments in recent years did not increase the number of elementary and secondary schools, because the newer schools were larger and accommodated more pupils than the older schools. From 1963-64 to 1973-74 the average daily attendance per school (both elementary and secondary) increased from 360 to 467. States having the largest ADA per school included Hawaii (737), Florida (722), and New York (672); those with the smallest included Nebraska (162), South Dakota (166), and North Dakota (168)<sup>4</sup>.

## INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

"Instructional staff" are those employees who render direct and personal services that embrace teaching, aid teaching, or improve the teaching-learning situation. Included are supervisors of instruction, prin-

cipals, teachers, audiovisual and television instructors, guidance personnel, librarians, and psychological personnel.

Supervisors of instruction or consultants provide direct leadership to other instructional staff for improving the learning situation and instructional methods at a particular level or in a particular subject. Principals are the administrative heads of schools, usually with major responsibility for school coordination and supervision. The instructional staff exclusive of supervisors of instruction and principals is referred to in this report as the "nonsupervisory instructional staff."

Data on personnel were reported in terms of number of positions rather than number of individuals occupying those positions during the school year. In 1973-74, instructional staff totaled 2,425,400—an increase of 103,800 (4.5 percent) over the number in 1971-72 (table B)—and consisted of 37,700 supervisors of instruction, 100,500 principals, 2,155,500 classroom teachers, 44,200 school librarians, 55,700 guidance personnel, 9,300 psychological personnel, and 22,500 other nonsupervisory instructional personnel (tables 10 and 13).

Separate data on classroom teachers were collected for the first time in the 1953-54 survey. In earlier years, information was requested for the combined group of classroom teachers and other nonsupervisory instructional staff. Some States, however, did not report nonsupervisory instructional staff separately, and thus the figures on classroom teachers include an undetermined number of other instructional staff. The reported numbers indicated a total of 2,155,500 classroom teachers (1,176,000 elementary and 979,500 secondary); these accounted for 89 percent of the 1973-74 total instructional staff (table 12).

Beginning with the 1953-54 survey, respondents were asked to report separately the numbers of men and women classroom teachers. Indications are that at the elementary level the percentage of male teachers has increased during the period 1963-64 to 1973-74, moving upward from 14.5 to 16.8 percent. However, at the secondary level, the ratio decreased slightly from 53.9 to 53.6 percent. Since such percent changes are of different bases, they are not additive, and the overall data show that during the 10-year period the percentage of male teachers rose from 31.1 to 33.5 percent.

## GROWTH OF SCHOOL-AGE AND TOTAL POPULATIONS

The elementary-secondary school-age population (ages 5-17 years) increased 7.2 percent between 1963-64 and 1973-74, whereas the total population increased by 11.3 percent. The 51 million school-age children in October 1973 represented 24.2 percent of the total U.S. population of 210 million. Recent years have seen

a reversal of the trend in which the school-age population increased at a faster rate than the total population: in 1967-68, school-age population peaked at 26.1 percent of total population, and in 1971-72 and 1973-74 it decreased to 25.5 and 24.2 percent, respectively.

## ENROLLMENT OF INDIVIDUAL AGE GROUPS OF THE SCHOOL-AGE POPULATION

Table C gives the estimated school enrollment of the population 5 to 17 years old, by age and sex, as of

October 1973. The data include pupils enrolled in public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools

on a full-time or part-time basis in day and evening sessions. Compulsory school-attendance laws have made attendance of the 7- to 13-year age group almost universal. Of the 14- to 17-year-old population,

91.1 percent were enrolled (97.4 percent of the 14- and 15-year-olds and 84.8 percent of the 16- and 17-year-olds).

## ENROLLMENT IN PUBLIC ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY DAY SCHOOLS

Information concerning the number of pupils served by the public schools from prekindergarten level through the secondary grades is needed as a basis for planning the educational program. Data on pupil membership and attendance, as well as on the number of days in the annual school term, indicate the extent of the school services provided (tables 16 through 23).

### Total Enrollment

Total enrollment in public elementary and secondary schools has shown a more consistent growth, decade by decade, than has the elementary-secondary school-age population. Pupil enrollment rose from 7.6 million in 1870-71 to 26.4 million in 1933-34, a peak not to be equalled or surpassed until 1951-52. The lower number of births during the depression years of the 1930's and the war-time conditions that followed resulted in a gradual decline in enrollments to a low of 23.2 million in 1944-45<sup>5</sup>, when the downward trend was reversed.

The subsequent growth was steadily upward, reaching an all-time peak of 46.1 million in 1971-72. However, in 1973-74, 45.4 million pupils were enrolled in full-time public schools, a decrease of 672,000 or 1.5 percent from the number reported in 1971-72 (table D).

Cumulative public-school enrollment decreased an estimated 0.8 percent between 1971-72 and 1973-74. The decrease, however, varied considerably among the States, with 16 States still showing increased enrollments (table 19).

Cumulative enrollment information in this report was collected on a State-by-State basis, representing a count of the total number of different pupils registered at any time during the school year in each State. Pupils enrolled in two or more States during the school year are counted more than once, thus abnormally increasing the enrollment figure for the Nation. The membership-by-grade data are an unduplicated count of pupils in membership in the fall of 1973 (table 16).

The enrollment-by-grade data in table 18 are cumulative and also reflect the abnormal increase referred to above.

### Enrollment in Kindergarten and Grades 1 Through 8

Enrollment in kindergarten and grades 1 through 8 reached a peak of 21.3 million pupils in 1929-30 (table 1). It declined in each subsequent year through 1944-45 (to 17.7 million) and rose steadily since then until 1971-72 and 1973-74 when decreases of 0.3 million and 0.9 million, respectively, were reported. The slowing in the rate of growth in the school-age population together with a decline in the birth rate accounts for the reversal in enrollment for nursery-kindergarten and grades 1 through 8 (tables 1 and 16).

### Enrollment in Grades 9 Through 12

The enormous increase in the number of pupils enrolled in grades 9 through 12 represents one of the major developments in the public school system. While the population of high-school age (14 to 17 years) more than doubled since 1889-90, enrollments in grades 9 through 12 multiplied more than 60 times. Within this period high-school enrollments, after reaching a peak of 6,714,000 in 1940-41, declined to a low of 5,554,000 in the war year 1943-44. Since then, the trend has been generally upward, reaching a peak of 14,076,000 in 1973-74 (table 16). This enrollment growth reflects the increased birth rate following World War II as well as a continuing trend for a greater percentage of the high-school age group to attend high school.

### Average Daily Membership

The average daily membership (ADM) for a school year is the average number of pupils belonging (present and absent) each day. It is computed for an individual school by dividing the aggregate of *pupil-days' membership* by the number of days the school was actually in session. The ADM for a State is the sum of the ADM's for all the schools, which may vary in length of school terms. The national ADM in 1973-74 was an estimated 44.6 million pupils, a decrease of 1.4 percent over the 45.2 million estimated for 1971-72. The 1973-74 total includes estimates for the three States that did not report this information (table 22).

For the years prior to 1955-56, membership figures were not available nationally to compute the necessary ratios.

The ratio of average daily attendance (ADA) to ADM has shown minor fluctuations since 1955-56, when the percentage was first estimated on a national basis. ADA as a percentage of ADM was 93.0 in 1973-74, the lowest percentage recorded since 1957-58.

### Average Daily Attendance

The average daily attendance (ADA) for an individual school during a school year is the aggregate days' attendance divided by the number of days the school is actually in session. The ADA for a State is the sum of the ADA's for all schools in the State which may have varying lengths of school terms. The national ADA decreased from 42.3 million pupils in 1971-72 to 41.4 million in 1973-74, or 1.9 percent. The ratio of ADA to total enrollment was 91.3 percent in 1973-74 (table D).

### Length of School Term

The average length of the school term for a State is the aggregate days of attendance of all pupils divided by the ADA and reflects the average number of days schools are actually in session. The average length of school term increased from 132 days in 1869-70 to 173 days in 1929-30. In the 1950's, the school term leveled off at about 177-178 days. A peak of 179 days was reached in 1961-62 and was slightly less but about the same for the following years, reaching a new high of 179.3 in 1971-72 and decreasing to 178.7 in 1973-74 (tables 1 and 22).

## PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

As would be expected from the enrollment growth in grades 9 to 12, the number of public high school pupils graduating annually has increased manyfold during the present century. After reaching a peak of 1,161,000 graduates in 1941-42, the number fell to fewer than 1 million annually during the remaining war years (table E). In the postwar period the number fluctuated upward, reflecting increases in the number of pupils reaching the normal graduation age and the greater holding power of the schools. After remaining at about the million mark through 1951-52, the number of graduates increased at varying rates in the following years, reaching a peak of 2,762,000 in 1973-74. In 1973-74, graduates represented 94.8 percent of the 2,913,108 pupils enrolled in the last year of high school at the beginning of the 1973-74 school year.

Percentages have fluctuated narrowly from 93 to 95 percent during the past decade.

The public high schools' holding power steadily increased since the mid-1950's. However, beginning in 1969-70, the percentages of pupils of the class entering grade 9 four years earlier who subsequently graduated show declines—from 78.1 in 1969-70 to 76.5 in 1972-73 and 75.6 in 1973-74 (table E).

In addition to the graduates from regular public day high schools in 1973-74, some 40,000 persons received high school graduation diplomas for attendance at public evening and adult schools, and 175,000 persons earned high school equivalency certificates on the basis of examinations (table 24). Not included are an estimated 252,000 nonpublic high school graduates.

## PUPIL TRANSPORTATION SERVICES PROVIDED BY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

State legislation for reorganizing school systems and consolidating widely scattered school attendance areas has greatly increased the need for pupil transportation services. Also, many school districts have utilized pupil transportation services to help equalize educational opportunity.

During the 1973-74 school year, 21.3 million public school pupils, or 51.5 percent of the pupils in ADA, were transported to schools at public expense (table 25). In addition, some 623,000 nonpublic school pupils were transported at public expense. The proportion of public school pupils who were transported ranged from 21.7 percent in Nebraska and 24.8 percent in Hawaii to 75.3 percent for West Virginia and 74.6 percent for Louisiana. Further increases in the numbers of pupils transported are anticipated as small schools, which still exist in substantial numbers, are replaced by

larger centralized schools and as court-ordered and other busing plans are implemented.

In 1973-74, 236,000 school buses (accommodating 12 or more pupils) and 31,000 other vehicles transported 22.0 million school children traveling 2.6 billion miles on regular school bus routes to and from school. Total public expenditures for pupil transportation—including operation, maintenance, and the replacement of buses (but not capital outlay for additional buses)—were \$1.9 billion or 3.7 percent of the total current expenditures for public elementary and secondary education. The average annual cost per public school pupil transported was \$87 in 1973-74, with the range in State per-pupil costs extending from \$43 in South Carolina, \$46 in Alabama and \$47 in North Carolina to \$210 in Alaska, \$181 in New York, and \$172 in North Dakota (tables 25 and 41).

## PUBLIC SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAMS

In 1973-74, an average of 21.8 million pupils per day (about 53 percent of pupils in ADA) were served lunch in organized school lunch programs. Among individual States, percentages served ranged from 30 to 86, with the schools of 11 States serving lunches to more than 66 percent of their pupils and 3 States to less than 33 percent. During the year, school lunch programs were operated for 6 months or more in 81,200 public school plants (table 26).

These data relate to all lunch programs operated from funds under control of the school administrative unit; they include those both receiving and not receiving Federal school-lunch aid.

In June 1946, the 79th Congress passed Public Law 396. Generally known as the National School Lunch Act, the law provided for cash grants and for the Department of Agriculture, acting through SEA's, to

allocate surplus commodities for school purposes. Section 32 of Public Law 320, 74th Congress, which authorizes purchase and distribution of foods under surplus removal programs as one method of encouraging consumption of agricultural commodities, also makes foodstuffs available to schools. This program was amended under section 416 of the Agricultural Act of 1949 to provide for distribution to schools of commodities acquired under price-support legislation.

Federal assistance to school lunch programs was initiated in 1935 on a limited basis as one means of providing a market for surplus agricultural commodities. Some 20 years later, the Agricultural Act of 1954 authorized reimbursement payments to elementary and secondary schools participating in the Special School Milk Program. In 1973-74, the Federal Government contributed funds amounting to \$1.1 billion and commodities valued at \$332 million for operation of public school lunch and milk programs (table 29).

## SOURCES OF INCOME FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Public school system operating funds derive almost exclusively from local property taxes, State sales and income taxes, and Federal income taxes. Very little if


any of the operating revenues for elementary and secondary education derive from such nonpublic sources as gifts, fees, and tuition.

Funds for constructing schools and providing physical facilities are generally obtained at the local level by issuing and selling school bonds (creating debt) and from current revenues or the accumulation of current revenues. Some States grant or loan funds to LEA's for school construction.

## Revenues

Revenues, which constitute the major portion of school income, are defined as additions to assets that do not increase the school indebtedness and do not represent exchanges of school property for money. They are derived regularly from specific sources, such as appropriations from taxes levied for general purposes by Federal, State, county, and local governments; receipts from taxes levied specifically for school purposes; income from permanent funds and endowments; and income from leases of school lands and such miscellaneous sources as tuition, fees, interest on bank deposits, and gifts (chart 1).

Revenues increased continuously since World War II, reaching \$50.0 billion in 1971-72 and \$58.2 billion in 1973-74 (tables F and G). While the proportion of revenue from Federal sources has generally risen over the years (From 0.4 percent of the total in 1929-30 to 2.8 percent in 1947-48 and 8.5 percent in 1973-74), it is still a relatively minor source. Federal support of education, it should be noted, has not been in the form of general aid but has been designated for specific purposes; including aid for vocational education, for school lunches, for the school systems receiving funds under Public Laws 81-815 and 81-874, and for a variety of special programs under the National Defense Education Act and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

State support of public schools (generally derived from nonproperty tax sources such as income, sales, and business taxes) tends to broaden the school tax base and to aid in equalizing educational opportunity within the State. Revenues from such sources increase with rises in price levels, population, and volume of business transactions.

The proportion of public school revenues received from State sources increased from 16.9 percent in 1929-30 to 30.3 percent in 1939-40, then to a peak of 39.8 percent in 1949-50. From 1951-52 to 1967-68, the State percentage has fluctuated in a narrow range between 37.4 and 39.5 percent, reaching a new peak of 41.4 percent in 1973-74 (table G). In 1973-74, the proportion of State funds in individual States ranged from 7.7 percent in New Hampshire to 72.0 percent in Delaware and 88.9 percent in Hawaii, which has a State-operated school system (table 30).

As the proportion of public school revenues received from Federal and State sources has increased, the proportion received from local and county sources

(derived largely from property taxes) has fluctuated downward in recent years, from 58.3 percent in 1947-48 to 52.8 in 1971-72 and 50.1 percent in 1973-74 (tables G and 30).

Receipts from other local revenue sources (gifts, and tuition and transportation fees received from patrons) were \$1.9 million, or 3.2 percent of total revenues, in 1973-74 (tables 29 and 30).

State-by-State variations in the proportions of receipts from Federal, State, and local sources are the product of available financial resources as well as the unique fiscal and taxing characteristics of each State.

## EXPENDITURES FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Total amounts expended for public schools include payments for current expenses, capital outlay, and

## Nonrevenue Receipts

Nonrevenue receipts are defined as those receipts which either incur a future obligation or change the form of an asset from real and personal property to cash and therefore decrease the net amount and value of real and personal school property. Money received from loans, the sale of bonds, the sale of property purchased from capital funds, and proceeds from insurance adjustments constitute most of the nonrevenue receipts. Since most nonrevenue receipts are used for capital outlays, they have tended to fluctuate with the amount of school construction activity.

After reaching a low of \$94.8 million in 1943-44, reflecting the curtailment of the school building program during the war, nonrevenue receipts have risen markedly during the postwar period. They rose from \$64 million in 1949-50 to \$2.6 billion in 1959-60, but then fell off to \$2.5 billion in 1961-62 and 1963-64, before rising to \$3.9 billion in 1971-72 and to \$4.4 billion in 1973-74 (table 28).

## Balances Carried Over From Previous Year

In 1973-74, reporting States carried over balances of \$8.1 billion from the previous year. Such beginning balances are not a surplus of unused funds but are considered an important part of the regular funds available for spending, generally earmarked for specific purposes. For the 43 States reporting balances, 47.4 percent of the total balances was earmarked for current operation, 43.4 percent for capital outlay, and 9.2 percent for bond interest and redemption. It should be observed that, although the balance of \$8.1 billion at the beginning of the 1973-74 school year showed a 24.6-percent increase over the \$6.5 billion balance reported for the corresponding data 2 years earlier, the increase can largely be attributed to the increase of 18.6 percent in expenditures and a need for corresponding increases in balances. Balances normally represent the working funds needed to maintain continuing programs and reserves for future capital expenditures or debt retirement (table 28).

debt service. Current expenditures are relatively consistent. However, the other two categories—capital

outlay and debt service—are subject to wide fluctuations among the States, since they relate closely to school construction programs, which come at irregular intervals.

### Total Expenditures

Public school systems expended \$57.0 billion in 1973-74, an increase of 19 percent over the \$48.1 billion spent in 1971-72. Included in the total were current expenditures for elementary and secondary schools, community services, summer schools, capital outlay, and interest on school debt (chart 2).

In any historical review of school finance data, allowance must be made for the declining value of the dollar. In the 1973-74 school year, for example, the dollar bought about 30 percent of the commodities and services that it did in 1939-40. Tables 1, 47, and 49 present historical trends in expenditure data in both unadjusted dollars and in dollars adjusted to reflect their 1973-74 purchasing power.

Factors contributing to the increase in school expenditures over the years, in addition to expanding school enrollments and depreciation of the dollar, include the following: (1) schools are in session for longer terms, (2) school employees are receiving relatively higher salaries, (3) the average number of pupils per teacher has been reduced, (4) the educational programs have been enlarged to include additional subjects and services, (5) secondary enrollment, with higher unit costs, represents an increasing proportion of total enrollment, and (6) migration of the school-age population has increased the need for additional new school buildings.


Bond redemption, while a disbursement item in any one year, is not included in expenditures, since it is in fact the repayment of funds borrowed and expended in a prior period. Its inclusion in a statistical series would duplicate the previously reported expenditures. A breakdown of total expenditures and percentages by major account for selected years is given in table H.

### Current Expenditures

In 1973-74, current expenditures for public elementary and secondary schools amounted to \$50.0 billion, or 87.8 percent of expenditures for all educational purposes (tables H and 31). Current expenditures for other programs under jurisdiction of local boards of education (summer schools and community services) totaled \$453 million in 1973-74, an increase of 15 percent over the \$395 million reported in 1971-72.

The proportion of expenditures for *administration* (State, intermediate, and local levels combined), stable for a number of years, was 4.0 percent of total expenditures in 1973-74. The proportion for *plant operation* (including salaries of janitors and the cost of fuel, water, power, supplies, etc.) started to decline during the 1940's and dropped to 6.2 percent of total expenditures in 1969-70. However, it increased to 6.5 percent in 1971-72 and 6.7 percent in 1973-74. Expenditures for *plant maintenance* (activities concerned with keeping the grounds, buildings, and equipment at their original condition of completeness or efficiency, either through repairs or by replacement of property), have shown little percentage change in recent years. In 1973-74, these expenditures constituted 2.6 percent of the total. Other school services (including attendance and health services, the school lunch program, and pupil transportation) accounted

for 7.4 percent of total expenditures in 1973-74 (tables H and 32).

*Instruction* and *fixed charges* are the two major accounts that have increased in past years as proportions of total expenditures. Principally as a result of increases in salaries of instructional personnel and a reduction in the pupil-teacher ratio, the proportion of

expenditures for *instruction* rose from 55.1 percent in 1963-64 to 57.2 percent in 1973-74. In addition to salaries, the instruction account also includes the cost of free textbooks, teaching supplies, school library books, and other instructional supplies and expenses. The proportion of total expenditures for *fixed charges* (including State, intermediate, and local payments to teacher retirement funds, social security, insurance

premiums, and rent) rose from 6.3 percent in 1963-64 to 9.9 percent in 1973-74. This increase in fixed charges may be attributed mainly to larger employer retirement contributions, including payments for social security, in several States.

### Current Expenditures per Pupil

Overall figures on current expenditures indicate general trends, but only when such expenditures are related to the pupil load are these costs brought into sharp relief. An accurate unit of measure recommended for computing per-pupil expenditures is average daily membership (ADM); it considers the number of pupils for whom provision is made rather than the number actually present. However, ADM was not available for all States. The estimated average annual *current expenditure per pupil in ADM* for the Nation was \$1,123 in 1973-74 (table 43).

The annual *current expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance (ADA)* increased from an average of \$460 in 1963-64 to \$1,207 in 1973-74. For 1963-64, average expenditure per pupil in ADA by State ranged from \$249 to \$744, with an almost threefold difference of \$495 between the State with the highest figure and that with the lowest. Ten years later (1973-74), the dollar difference between the highest and lowest State averages (\$1,299) had more than doubled. Yet the highest average for a State (\$2,079) was still about three times the lowest (\$780). State averages give no indication of the range of expenditures among local school systems within States. However, State per-pupil expenditure comparisons do call attention to differences, thus giving impetus to further study of disparities (tables 48 and 49).

### Average Salaries of Instructional Staff

Before 1919-20, salary information was available only for teachers. Since then, the Office of Education and the Education Division have been collecting data on salaries for the entire instructional staff, including supervisors of instruction, principals, teachers, librarians, guidance and psychological personnel, and others. Average annual salaries of the instructional staff are obtained by dividing the total amount paid to the instructional staff as salaries by the full-time-equivalent number of such personnel.

Except for several depression years in the middle 1930's, average salaries of the instructional staff have increased steadily. The average annual salary in unadjusted dollars rose from \$6,200 in 1963-64 to about \$11,200 in 1973-74, an increase of 79 percent in 10 years. However, when adjusted to reflect the rise in the Consumer Price Index (restating the 1963-64 average salary in 1973-74 dollars), the increase was 19 percent.

The four States in 1973-74 with average salaries above \$13,000 contained 23 percent of the instructional staff of the Nation, while the lowest four States, with average salaries of \$8,500 and less, contained about 4 percent of the instructional staff members. As shown in columns 6 and 11 of table 47, the four States with the highest average were Alaska (\$16,053), California (\$13,875), New York (\$13,300), and Michigan (\$13,050). The four with the lowest were Mississippi (\$7,865), Arkansas (\$8,139), Oklahoma (\$8,500), and South Dakota (\$8,500).

### Capital Outlay

Capital outlay embraces any expenditure that results in acquisition of fixed assets or additions to fixed assets. Included in capital outlay are expenditures for land, construction and remodeling of buildings, additions to buildings, improvement of grounds, and purchase of initial or additional equipment. Such expenditures are generally financed from bond issues or other types of borrowing, and fluctuate much more widely than current expenditures.

After World War I, school construction accelerated, peaking in 1925-26, when expenditures for this purpose amounted to \$411 million (about 20 percent of total expenditures). Capital outlay expenditures then declined, reaching a low of \$59 million (3.4 percent of total expenditures) in the depression year 1933-34. The outbreak of World War II cut short an upturn in the second half of the decade, and capital outlay fell to a new low of \$54 million in 1943-44 (2.2 percent of total expenditures). The tremendous growth in enrollments during the postwar period and the accumulated backlog of construction needs necessitated large outlays for school facilities and equipment. Capital outlay increased from \$2.1 billion in 1953-54 to \$3.0 billion in 1963-64, \$4.5 billion in 1971-72, and \$5.0 billion in 1973-74. However, capital outlay represented only 8.7

percent of total expenditures in 1973-74, compared with 14.0 percent in 1963-64.

Amounts expended by State and local public school-housing authorities are included in the expenditures for capital outlay reported in table 43. The annual capital outlay per pupil in ADA was \$120 in 1973-74 (table 48). For individual States, the per-pupil expenditure ranged from \$17 to \$333. However this State-by-State comparison may be misleading because a capital outlay program in any State may extend over several consecutive years.

### Interest on School Debt

The third major category of school expenditures (after current expenditures and capital outlay) is interest payments on bonded and other school debt. Interest payments jumped from \$701 million in 1963-64 to \$1.5 billion in 1973-74, reflecting the increasing long- and short-term indebtedness incurred by local school systems and State agencies (table 44). Over the decade, interest payments per pupil in ADA rose from \$19 to \$37. Despite this increase, 1973-74 interest payments represented only 2.7 percent of total expenditures, compared with a peak of 3.3 percent in 1963-64.

In view of the long-term financing necessitated by a high level of school construction and increased interest rates, interest payments are expected to remain around 3 percent of total school expenditures for the next several years.

### Outstanding School Indebtedness

Indebtedness for public schools is incurred by bond sales and long-term loans to finance construction of school facilities and, by taking short-term loans, to pay operating expenses pending receipt of revenue. Although local school systems incur most of the debt for public schools, other governmental units (States, counties, cities, townships, etc.) also assume obligations. In addition, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Maine, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin have used the "authority plan," in which public schoolhousing authorities were developed as a means of circumventing strict debt limitations. Although the mechanism may vary, each authority finances the construction, supervises the erection, and leases the finished school building to the local education agency. The debt is repaid from rents

collected by the authorities. When the bonds have been retired and other obligations of the authority met, the ownership of the building normally passes to the school system.

School indebtedness has generally fluctuated over the years with the amount of school construction. Thus, reflecting a decline in capital outlay during the 1930's and World War II, the end-of-year school indebtedness dropped from \$3.1 billion in 1931-32 to \$2.1 billion in 1945-46. With the upswing in school construction during the postwar period, indebtedness rose to \$6.9 billion for 1953-54 and, between 1963-64 and 1973-74, increased from \$23.6 billion to \$37.7 billion (table 45).

### Value of School Property

To obtain some measure of the total amount of money that has been invested in public school plants (including sites, buildings, and equipment), the States were asked to report the original cost of school property plus the cost of all additions and alterations. If information on original cost was not available, values were reported on some other basis, such as replacement costs and insurance appraisals.

Table 46 presents data on the total value of school property and the value per pupil in ADA for the District of Columbia and the 31 States that were able to report this information. Data shown for 2 States are for years prior to 1973-74. The 33 States and D.C., with slightly more than one-half of the ADA nationally, reported the total value of school property in 1973-74 to be \$52 billion, about \$2,500 per pupil in ADA. Because the valuation was not always on the same basis, care should be exercised in making State-by-State comparisons.

### Economic Indexes Related to Financing Public Schools

Table 50 presents three economic indexes which point up some of the problems faced by individual States in financing public schools: (1) column 2, educational burden (number of school-age children to be supported by the productive adults in the labor force); (2) columns 3, 4, and 5, financial ability to support public education; and (3) columns 6 and 7, effort (relation between resources and expenditures).

The educational burden is often measured by comparing ratios of the number of school-age children (5-17 years old) per 1,000 adults 21 to 64 years old. In 1973-74, this ratio was 578 children per 1,000 adults in Mississippi (high-burden State) and 435 children per 1,000 adults in New York (low-burden State).

Financial ability to support public schools, as measured by State personal income per pupil in ADA, was more than twice as much in New York (\$34,603) as in New Mexico (\$16,687). Thus, it appears that the poorer States not only have proportionately more children to educate but also have fewer resources to draw upon.

Effort to support public schools, as measured by the percentage that State and local revenue for


elementary and secondary schools is of State personal income, ranged from 3.8 percent in Nebraska to 7.0 percent in Vermont. It should be noted, however, that some of the States that ranked high in "effort" had relatively low levels of per-pupil expenditures. Of the six States making the greatest effort, three (Alaska, Delaware, and New York) were among the six States with the highest levels of current expenditures per pupil in ADA.

No claim of conclusiveness is made for the economic indexes presented in table 50. Rather, they are offered to show the influence that economic differences among the States have on the types of educational programs they can afford.

### COMPARISONS OF SELECTED DATA

Chart 3 shows comparisons of rates of change in selected data. The number of local school systems declined at a slower rate than did the number of one-teacher schools. Conversely, the total number of instructional staff expanded at a greater rate between 1971-72 and 1973-74 than between 1969-70 and 1971-72, even though the enrollment trend has reversed and declined from the peak school year of 1971-72. The rate of increase for students graduating from high school decreased between 1971-72 and 1973-74, suggesting that it may be approaching a peak in 1975-76. Current expenditures, although increasing rapidly, did not rise as quickly as in the earlier period between 1969-70 and 1971-72. However, when considered in conjunction with the enrollment decline, the rate of increase in current expenditures per pupil in ADA rose slightly. The reversal in capital outlay is due to the variability of capital planning; in real terms capital outlay has declined. Finally, interest on school debt and average annual salary of instructional staff increased, but at a slower rate.

## NONPUBLIC ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS

The importance of nonpublic schools in American education was indicated by the increase in nonpublic enrollment from 8 percent of the combined enrollment in regular full-time public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools at the beginning of the present century to 16 percent in 1968-69. Since 1968-69, the ratio has decreased to around 10 percent in 1973-74. Nonpublic schools, while subject to certain regulatory State controls, are under operational control of private individuals or church-affiliated or nonsectarian organizations. Whether operated on a profit or nonprofit basis, nonpublic schools are generally supported by private funds as distinguished from public funds. In 1973-74, nonpublic elementary and secondary schools contained an estimated 5.1 million pupils and 267,000 instructional staff members (table I). In recent years, Catholic school enrollment has accounted for between

80 and 90 percent of the total enrollment in nonpublic elementary and secondary schools.

Table 51 gives the number of regular nonpublic schools with their enrollment, instructional staff, and high school graduates.

Table 52 presents State data on both public and nonpublic schools—enrollments, instructional staff, and high school graduates, together with the percentage of nonpublic enrollments in all schools. It will be noted that the proportion of pupils attending nonpublic schools varies from State to State. In 1973-74, the proportion that nonpublic school enrollments represented of total enrollments in both public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools ranged from 16.7 in New York to 1.2 in Utah.

## I. TECHNICAL NOTES

These notes, designed to provide background information on the preparation of this publication and to help in interpreting its summarized data, pertain to data limitations, comparability, coverage, adjustments of dollar amounts to degrees of inflation, and the form used in collecting the data.

### Limitations of Data

Data for this report were furnished by State and Territorial departments of education of the States, the District of Columbia, and outlying areas on a questionnaire from the National Center for Education Statistics. It should be recognized that the States have to overcome many difficulties in obtaining complete and accurate information from their numerous local and intermediate administrative units, which, in turn, must report on a uniform basis the data needed for effective planning of local and State educational programs.

Public elementary and secondary education is primarily a State and local responsibility, and records and report systems in each State are designed mainly to meet legal and administrative requirements. However, it is felt that a standard form for collecting data from all of the States and other areas tends to minimize variations in data collection. Handbook I<sup>1</sup> and the later handbooks on school activities, school property, staff, and pupils which provide uniform educational terminology and definitions were available in each State education agency as a guide to uniform reporting. Where State education agencies have deviated from prescribed definitions and instructions, the statistical tables in this report have been annotated accordingly. As the effort of the States to implement the handbooks progresses, the data reported in this survey will become more complete and accurate.

### Comparability With Bureau of the Census Data

The Bureau of the Census collects and publishes data on enrollment and, to some extent, data on the organization and finances of public schools. However, because of differences in data-collection methods, definitions, coverage, and time references, these data are only roughly comparable with those collected by

the Office of Education from the various State and other area departments of education.

### Geographic Coverage

All references to national totals are for the United States, which, beginning with 1959-60, comprised the 50 States and the District of Columbia. National totals for the years prior to 1959-60 represent totals for the States constituting the United States as of the time to which the data apply. To the extent available, data are shown separately for each of the outlying areas of the United States, namely American Samoa, Canal Zone, Guam, Puerto Rico, Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, and the Virgin Islands. However, these are not included in the national totals.

### Adjustments in Terms of 1973-74 Dollars

Adjustments of certain expenditure and income data in terms of dollars in 1973-74 purchasing power are based on the *Consumer Price Index* published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, U.S. Department of Labor. Monthly index numbers were averaged on a July-to-June basis to correspond with the school year.

### Estimates of the Population and Labor Force

All population and labor force data were obtained from publications of the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Population figures shown for the United States include persons in the Armed Forces stationed in each State, but exclude members of the Armed Forces overseas. Beginning in 1951-52, comparisons were made between the total U.S. population as of July 1 (the beginning of the school year) and the enrollments for the school year. Thus, the population estimates as of July 1, 1951, were compared with the enrollment data for the school year 1951-52. For all previous years, population estimates were as of the end of the school year.

The 5-to-17-year-olds of the population relate to the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States.

Per capita national income data are based on estimates of the total population, which includes the Armed Forces overseas.

The labor force includes persons 16 years<sup>2</sup> old and over who were employed or in the Armed Forces. Calendar-year averages of the labor force were converted to a July-to-June basis by taking a simple average of the appropriate calendar-year figures.

### National Income and Personal Income

Data on national income and personal income were obtained from the *Survey of Current Business*, pub-

lished by the Office of Business Economics, U.S. Department of Commerce.

National income is the aggregate earnings of labor and property (before taxes) which arise from the current production of goods and services by the Nation's economy.

Personal income is the current income received by individuals, by unincorporated business, and by non-profit organizations from all sources, including transfer payments (social security payments, veterans' benefits, etc.) and Government interest but excluding transfers among persons.

This report-form for the school year ending June 30, 1974 requests educational information for STATISTICS OF STATE SCHOOL SYSTEMS, a biennial publication of the Education Division. Terminology and definitions follow the Handbook Series of the State Educational Records and Reports Project. It is essential that definitions and explanations in the Handbook be observed in order that reports from the various States may be comparable.

Please note that the tables contain numbers in parentheses for many items adjacent to the data columns. These numbers, for statistical items in Part I, generally correspond to the numbered definitions in Handbook I, THE COMMON CORE OF STATE EDUCATIONAL INFORMATION. Attention is also called to the COMBINED GLOSSARY OF STANDARDIZED ITEMS AND TERMS which gives the latest revisions of all definitions used in the Handbook.

Every effort should be made to furnish figures for all items pertinent to your State. Where exact information is not available for any item, carefully made estimates are acceptable, provided they are labeled as

such ("Est."). Enter a zero (0) where the figure to be reported is zero and "N.App." in any cell which does not apply to your State. If an item is pertinent to your State but data are not available, enter "N.Av." DO NOT LEAVE ANY TABLE OR CELL BLANK. When reporting on positions of employed personnel, report the sum of the full-time positions and full-time equivalents of part-time positions.
