

HISTORIC STATE EXPENDITURES ON STUDENT-ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS






INTERSTATE MIGRATION OF STUDENTS






ATTENDING IN-STATE INSTITUTIONS



RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS






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GROSS COSTS TO STUDENTS ATTENDING SCHOOL BY POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION SECTORS








RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS




LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR




RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS

Educational Coordinating Commission. By State statute has coordinative relationship with all educational boards and institutions. Conducts studies for and makes recommendations to Executive Department and legislature. Recommends program development, modification or improvement to Executive Department and legislature.

- Need Grant Program A need-based grant program to provide aid to needy students at public and private university and four-year schools, community and junior colleges, and hospital schools of nursing. It is intended to help equalize educational opportunity to all income levels.
- <u>Cash Grant Program</u> A need-based grant program to provide aid to students at public and private university and fouryear schools, community and junior colleges, and hospital schools of nursing on the basis of their academic aptitude, achievement and need.
- Foreign Student Fee Remission Program A need-based tuition-remission program to enrich the cultural mix at public four-year schools by providing financial assistance to needy students from foreign countries.
- State 235 Fee Remission Program at Eastern Oregon College A need-based tuition-remission program to encourage and facilitate the enrollment of undergraduates at Eastern Oregon State College. Prior to 1973, such a program was available at all public, four-year schools.
- Oregon Guaranteed Student Loan Program A loan program to insure access for all Oregon students with financial need to loan resources.
- Private Awards The Oregon State Scholarship Commission assists organizations and private donors in the administration of privately funded aid programs.
- witche Student Exchange Program A tuition-remission program which aids students in-participating western states to obtain access to fields of professional education that are not available in their home states. Funds appropriated by a sponsoring state-reimburse the receiving school through payment of an institutional support fee for the educational service offgred. The student does not receive a cash stipend.
- State Veteran's Educational Benefits A non need-based grant program to provide assistance to students (veterans) who are no longer eligible for federal educational benefits. In addition to public and private university and four-year schools, community and Junior colleges, proprietary and vocational-education institutions, this program is intended for home study, apprenticeships, on-the-job training and flight schools...








HISTORIC STATE EXPENDITURES ON STUDENT-ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

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
RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE
AND OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS




INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR

(Out-of-State Students in School in-State)










LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR







LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR





The Rhode Island State Scholarship Program (Office of Student Assistance, Department of Education) - A need-based grant awarded to scholastically eligible Rhode Island residents who are secondary school graduates desiring an associate's or bachelor's degree from an accredited college in the U.S. or Canada.

The Nursing Education Scholarship Program (Office of Student Assistance, Department of Education) - A need-based grant program for Rhode Island residents who wish to be trained as registered nurses or who are seeking an undergraduate or graduate degree in nursing. Students may enroll in in-state or out-of-state schools.

Business-Education Teachers Scholarship Progrem (Office of Student Assistance, Department of Education) - A grant program for Rhode Island residents attending Bryant College to become teachers in the field of business education.

war Orphans Scholarship Program (Office of Student Assistance, Department of Education) - A grant program for Rhode Island residents who are children of those serving in any war in which the U.S. has been engaged and died as a result, or were fifty percent disabled. Enrollment must be at in-state schools.

University of Vermont Medical School Agreement - Birect State Law.

University of Parmyslvania/Cornell University Veterinary School Agreement - Direct State Law

Rhode Island Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Training Grants (Department of Social and Rehabilitative Services) - A need-based grant program to assist handicapped resident individuals to overcome said handicap and engage in competitive employment. Enrollment may be at in-state or out-of-state schools. Case service funds are matched-80% federal; 20% state.

Rhode Island Higher Education Loan Plan (Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Corporation) - A loan program to aid and assist Rhode Island students to obtain a higher education through attendance at in-state or out-of-state schools. Residents must be citizens of U.S.A. or intend to become citizens.



INTERSTATE MIGRATION OF STUDENTS



RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS







DESCRIPTIONS OF STATE-SPONSORED STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

- South Carolina Tuition Grants Program A state funded grant program providing awards to needy state residents attending instate private institutions.
- South Carolina Student Loan Program (FISL) Educational loans to financially assist residents students in meeting their educational costs at in-state and out-of-state schools.
- Academic Common Market A tuition-reciprocity program to share among the fourteen states in the area served by the Southern regional Education Board (SREB), certain post-baccalaureate academic programs at the least possible cost to each of the participating states and at the least possible cost to their residents pursuing those programs outside of their own states. Students are enrolled on an in-state tuition basis. They must demonstrate a scholastic ability to participate in this program.
- Contracts for Services Through the Southern Regional Education Board, contracts with institutions in the region are arranged to provide guaranteed spaces for State residents in certain degree programs not offered in the State. Contracts in Veterinary Medicine, in Optometry and in Occupational Therapy are currently in force. Students are selected by contracting institutions and receive waiver of out-of-state tuition differentials, or reduced tuition in the case of independent institutions.
- South Carolina State Grants Program A grant program to help provide South Carolina residents opportunities to pursue academic programs not offered in South Carolina by furnishing some amount of financial assistance for attendance at out-of-state degree granting institutions.
- South Carolina Free Tuition for Certain Veterans' Children A tuition-remission program to assist dependents of deceased or totally disabled parents (in line of duty of "service-connected death or disability), POMs and MIAs to attend in-state public schools.
- South Carolina Medical and Dental Scholarship Program A conditional loan program to provide medical and dental resident students with loans, repayable by medical practice or dental practice in "shortage" areas in South Carolina. Students must attend accredited medical and dental co-reges in the U.S.

In the fourteen-state region sérved by the Southern Regional Education Board, each state-which chooses to participate in the Academic Common Market nominates those post-baccalaureate academic programs in its public institutions which it wishes to open to residents of other SREB states at reduced charges. Each participating state then selects from the offerings of the other "Market" participants the program which it chooses for its residents. There are no out-of-state charges to students in the Academic Common Market programs, even though the students do attend institutions outside of their own states.

Contracts for Services are arranged in those areas viewed by the state as desirable for a number of its residents but in which no degree is offered by South Carolina institutions. Currently, the contracts are in Veterinary Medicine and Optometry, but the program is not limited, on a permanent basis, to any particular programs. Demand and availability determine the areas of study in which contracts are arranged. Other areas of study might be added and contracts now in force might be terminated.





HISTORIC STATE EXPENDITURES ON STUDENT-ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS



RESIDENT STATEMENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-SEATE INSTITUTIONS




LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR



ATTENDING IN-STATE INSTITUTIONS







The legislative act establishing the TSAC required that the Board of Directors be composed of the Governor, Executive Director of the Tennessee Higher Education Commission, Chancellor of the State Board of Regents, Commissioner of the Department of Education, President of the University of Tennessee, State Treasurer, Comptroller of the Treasury, Commissioner of the Department of Finance and Administration, President of the Tennessee Council of Private Colleges, Chairman, Tennessee Council of Private Colleges, President of Tennessee Proprietary Business Schools, and three lay members appointed by the Governor.

By legislative stipulation, funding for TSAC shall be requested through the . Tennessee Higher Education Commission.

The State Treasurer and Comptroller are elected to their posts by the legislature. Commissioners are appointed to their posts by the Governor; other board members who serve by virtue of their office are elected to their posts by their respective boards.

DESCRIPTIONS OF STATE-SPONSORED STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

- Tennessee Student Assistance Award (Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation) A grant program of assistance to needy undergraduate resident students to attend the accredited in-state institution of their choice.
- Medical Loan Scholarship (Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation) A conditional grant/loan program designed to encourage resident medical students to locate and practice medicine in an area of Tennessee where there is a shortage of physicians. Students may attend in-state or out-of-state medical schools and must qualify by point
- on point ranking, designed to help eliminate a shortage of persons in Tennessee that are qualified to teach in the state's schools of nursing or to administer those schools. Recipients must be state residents with B.S. degrees in nursing and attending in-state or out-of-state graduate schools.
- Guaranteed Student Loan Program (Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation) A program of loan insurance designed to enable Tennessee residents to borrow from private lenders to help pay their cost of education at institutions approved by USOE. While the student is enrolled, the interest is paid by USOE in most cases.
- Academic Common Market (Tennessee Higher Education Commission) A tuition-reciprocity program to share among the states in the area served by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB), certain post-baccalaureate academic programs at the least possible cost to each of the participating states and at the least possible cost to their residents pursuing those programs outside of their own states. Students are enrolled on an in-state tuition basis.

NUMBER OF NEED-BASED GRANT PROGRAM RECIPIENTS AN









INTERSTATE MIGRATION OF STUDENTS




RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE









Enrollment must be at public institutions.


LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING










RELATIVE IMPORTANCE OF FEDERAL AND STATE **PROGRAM FUNDING BY SECTOR**





- Incentive Grant Program (Vermont Student Assistance Corporation) A need-based grant program to provide "access with some choice" to needy Vermont residents desiring undergraduate study attendance at UVM College of Medicine or any approved waterinary school.
- Honor Scholarships (Vermont Student Assistance Corporation) A scholarship which awards \$100 to the top scholastic senior at each Vermont high school who plans to attend a postsecondary institution.
- National Guard Scholarships (Vermont Student Assistance Corporation) A non need-based program which provides scholarships to the children of members of the Vermont National Guard who, since 1955, have been killed while on active or inactive duty. Recipients must be residents attending Vermont public schools.
- Vermont Guaranteed Student Loan (Vermont Student Assistance Corporation) A non need-based program which provides for the guarantee of loans disbursed to resident students by participating lending institutions in accordance with the provisions of the Guaranteed Student Loan Program.
- <u>Vermont Senatorial Scholarships (State Finance Division)</u> A grant program which provides assistance to needy resident students pursuing postsecondary education.
- Vermont Enlisted Men's Scholarship (Vermont National Guard) A need-based grant program which provides a semester's tultion at an in-state public college or university for a member of the National Guard who re-enlists for a period of three years or for a person who enlists for six years.





SOURCES AND DISTRIBUTION OF NEED-BASED GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS













RELATIONSHIPS OF STATE AGENCIES

Independent legal entities; however, institutions are coordinated the council of higher education. The agencies involved in the program are the State Council of Higher Education, the State Department of Health, Virginia Education Loan Authority, State Education Assistance Authority and the Division of War Veterans' Claims.

The Council of Higher Education is advisory to both the Governor and the General Assembly (legislature) for all matters pertaining to higher education. With regard to student aid, it reviews and makes recommendations regarding the institutions' budget requests for student aid, and, in addition, administers the State's two statewide aid programs, including the need-based program. The Council, the Virginia Education Loan Authority, and the State Education Assistance Authority are separate state agencies grouped, along with the institutions, under the state Secretary of Education. Each of the three agencies has its own controlling board. The State Department of Health likewise has its own board of control and reports to the Governor through the Secretary of Human Affairs. The Division of War Veterans' Claims is a small agency under the Secretary, of Administration.



The Council is dependent. In the administration of its aid programs, upon the Attorney General's Office for legal counseling and upon the Management and Systems Analysis Department for the consideration of data processing services.

DESCRIPTIONS OF STATE-SPONSORED STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

- College Scholarship Assistance Program (State Council of Higher Education for Virginia) A program designed to provide need-based grants and conditional loans to Virginia undergraduate students enrolled in Virginia institutions of higher education. The program's purpose is to serve as one means of guaranteeing that financial condition will not prevent Virginia students from gaining access to higher education. NOTE: Only grants were given in 1976-77.
- vide financia wassistance for Virginia students wireled in Virginia private colleges and universities. Its purpose is to help narrow the "tuition gap"—the difference between the generally higher cost of private institutions and the lower tuition charged by the state-supported institutions. With this concept, the program encourages student freedom of choice in matching individual educational goals with the academic offerings of a diverse system of higher education. MOTE: By legislative direction, the program is being converted into solely a grant program.
- State Teachers Scholarships (State Department of Education) A conditional load program which provides for the awarding of teaching scholarship loans to resident students preparing to teach. This is accomplished by attendance at non-profit institutions of higher education in the Commonwealth whose primary purpose is to provide collegiate or graduate education and not to provide religious training or theological education. This program will be entirely phased out by the end of 1977-78.
- Wursing and Dental Hygienist Scholarships (State Department of Health) A conditional grant program based on scholastic ability which provides financial assistance to Virginia residents by attending in-state accredited schools of nursing.
- Virginia Education Loan Authority This program was established in 1972 and was intended to be a state loan program financed through the sale of bonds. It was only recently activated, however, and has not yet made any loans. A director is now planning the operation of the program for 1978-79.
- Academic Common Market A tuition-reciprocity program to share among the states in the area served by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB), certain post-baccalaureate academic programs at the least possible cost to each of the participating states and at the least possible cost to their residents pursuing those programs outside of their own states. Students are enrolled on an in-state tuition basis.
- virginia Guaranteed Student Loan Program (State Education Assistance Authority) A program to help Virginians who need to borrow money for the expenses of college or post high school vocational education. Through Participation Agraements with Virginia lending institutions, the Program enables those institutions to make long-term personal loans to students for educational expenses. The Authority, as an agency of the State of Virginia, provides lenders with a 90% guarantee of loan principal. Students may enroll in in-state or out-of-state.
- Virginia Medical and Dental Scholarships (Virginia Commonwealth University and the University of Virginia) A conditional grant program, based on scholastic ability and need, designed to train individuals as physicians or dentists and to increase the supply of these persons in certain press of Virginia. Students may be residents or non-residents and may attend public universities and four-year institutions, or Virginia Commonwealth University or the University of Virginia.

Originally any student enrolled in teacher education, now limited to certain areas. Program will be entirely phased out by 1977-78.

Twelve awards in the amount of \$500 each may be made for hygienists annually. Nursing scholarships may not exceed \$4,009 each at the graduate level and \$2,000 at the undergraduate level.

Students are required to work for the Virginia Bepartment of Mental Hygiene and Hospitals or institutions in the Department of Welfare for the number of years equal to the number of years of scholarship. (If no vacancies exist, student must practice family medicine in an "area of need" of Virginia for that number of years.) This is not a stude-based program. Funds are authorized for the use of two institutions.

Statute authorizes eight dental scholarships at V.C.U in the amount of \$1,500 each, and at a total of 60 medical scholarships in the amount

of \$2,500 each for the two institutions (Virginia Commonwealth University and University of Virginia).







SOURCES AND DISTRIBUTION OF NEED-BASED GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS











- State Work-Study Program A work-study program established to provide financial assistance to needy students by stimulating and promoting their employment; and to provide each needy student, wherever possible, with employment related to their academic pursuits. Recipients may be resident or non-resident students enrolled in in-state schools. Students enrolled in theological programs are excluded from participation.
- State Need Grant Program A grant program to assist needy or disadvantaged Washington residents in obtaining a postsecondary education in one of Washington's public institutions.
- Aid to Blind Students A tuition-remission program which provides eligible needy blind students with assistance in procurement of equipment or services required due to their blindness while attending public postsecondary institutions in Washington.
- 3% Testion and Fee Waiver Program A fultion-remission program to assist resident needy and disadvantaged students to meet postsecondary education costs by waiving tuition and fees at public four-year institutions and community colleges in Washington.
- Tuition Waiver Program for Children of Deceased or Incapacitated Veterans A tuition-remission program to provide educational opportunity at state funded postsecondary institutions for needy resident persons whose parents or parent was killed or totally incapacitated from engaging in any normal employment by reason of service in armed forces of the United States.
- WICHE Student Exchange Program A tuition-remission program which aids students in participating western states to obtain access to fields of professional education that are not available in their home states. Funds appropriated by a sponsoring state reimburse the receiving school through payment of an institutional support fee for the educational service offered. The student does not receive a cash stipend. Washington students participate in out-of-state optometry programs. They must demonstrate a financial need in order to be eligible.


LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR





The West Virginia of Regents is authorized by state statute to administer the Higher Education Grant Program (official) while the Grant Program (official) while the Grant Program is centralized to very high agree in its operation, colleges and universities actually disburse the Grant funds to recipients. By check of transfer funds (for public colleges), the Board forwards funds to institutions in the name of individual recipients for actual disbursement.

... Recommendations to the Movernor and the State Legislature regarding funding needs are made annually by the Board of Regents. Grant Paggram administrative runds and student award funds are individual components of the state budget adopted by the Legislature and Coroved by the Governor. Any changes in statutory regulations and provisions must, of course, be approved by these two branches of State government.

The Advisory Council on West Virginia Grants was created by the Board of Regent's several years ago so that the Board could benefit from the advice and counsel of certain key individuals in state government and education. Current membership includes: public and private higher education officials, high school counselors, college student, representative from the Governo's Office, and chairmen of the Education and Finance committees of the Legislature. The Advisory Council is invited to provide input and make suggestions to the Board of Regents on such matters as eligibility criteria for grant recipient, the administrative operation of the Grant Program, appropriate relationships between the several student aid programs, etc.

The Undergraduate Scholarship Program (tuition and fee waiver program) operates under the direction of the Board of Regents, but is relatively more decentralized in its actual operation than the Higher Education Grant Program. Within certain Board policy provisions, public colleges and universities select students who are recommended to the Board for tuition and fee waivers. Varying kinds of student characteristics and talents are recognized by the various schools in making waiver recommendations.

Undergraduate Scholarships (Tuition & Fee Waiver Program) - A tuition-remission program designed to provide tuition and fee waivers to students determined to be deserving scholastically, athletically, or by extracurricular activities (and in some cases by need) by public colleges and universities in West Virginia.

Academic Common Market - This tuition-reciprocity program is an interstate agreement among southern states for sharing academic programs. It enables graduate students in designed academic areas of member states to enroll in selected out-of-state graduate degree programs at in-state tuition and fee rates.

Mest Virginia War Orphans Program - Notes deministered by the Board of Regents.

Graduate Fellowships - Teachers of Handicapped Children - Not administered by Board of Regents.




RESIDENT AND NON-RESIDENT STUDENTS

ATTENDING IN-STATE INSTITUTIONS




RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE




LEVELS OF FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM FUNDING BY INSTITUTIONAL SECTOR





- Wisconsin Tuition Grants 7 A need-based program to provide tuition equalization grants to resident students enrolled in Wisconsin independent institutions of postsecondary education, including nursing schools.
- Wisconsin Higher Education Grants A grant program, based on scholastic ability and financial need, to provide access for resident students interested in attending in-state public universities and vocational schools.
- Wisconsin Indian Student Assistance Grants A program to provide grants in cooperation with BIA, to needy Wisconsin Indian students, and in so doing ensure access to higher education. Recipients may enroll in in-state schools, including nursing schools.
- Wisconsin State Student Loans A loan program to insure access for all Wisconsin resident students with financial need to loan resources.
- Wisconsin Guaranteed Student Loans A program to provide access to private loans for all students.
- Minneseta-Wisconsin Reciprocity Program A tuition-reciprocity program to allow maximum freedom of choice to Wisconsin and Minneseta residents by removing the border between the two states for resident tuition rates in public institutions:
- Wisconsin State Veterans Benefits A grant program to provide grants to needy Vietnam Era veterans to offset educational expenses while attending in-state institutions; including nursing schools.
- <u>Wisconsin State Vocational Rehabilitation</u> A program which provides grants to needy bandicapped persons and thereby enables them to attend postsecondary educational institutions.
- Talent Incentive Program A grant program to provide access to in-state postsecondary institutions for needy non-traditional, disadvantaged and minority students who are Wisconsin residents.




RESIDENT STUDENTS ATTENDING IN-STATE AND OUT-OF-STATE INSTITUTIONS



Because the information collected may not have been totally comprehensive, that is, there may have been state programs which were overlooked or for which the dollars awarded data were not available, these figures may not reflect total state dollars to student-aid.

The figures do not include BEOG or the campus based programs.

Effective Buying Income: A classification exclusively developed by Sales & Marketing Management, its personal income less personal tax and nontax payments. Personal income is the aggregate of wages and salaries, other labor income (such as employer contributions to private pension funds), proprietors' intole, rental income (which includes imputed rental income of owner-occupants of nonfarm dwellings). dividends paid by corporations, personal interest income from all sources, and transfer payments (such as pensions and welfare assistance). Deducted from this total are personal taxes (federal, state, and local personal contributions for social theorem. The resultant figure is commonly known as "disposable personal income.", Market Statistics removes from this figure compensation paid to military. and diplomatic personnel stationed overseas to arrive at Effective Buying Income

Effective Buying Income is a bulk measurement of market potential. "It indicates the general ability to buy and is essential in comparing, selecting, and grouping markets on that basis. But for products that appeal to specific income classes, the percent of households by Effective Buying Income groups should be considered.

Population: Bureau of the Census! The population distributions-by ethnic status and by sex, were derived in the following manner. For the population 15 and over, the percent distribution by Sex was taken and the percent distribution by ethnic status was derived from 1970 cellsus data. These percentages . were then applied to 1976 state population estimates (Bureau of Census) to arrive at the estimates shown.

The data on Ethnic Status were estimated by obtaining a percentage distribution of FTE enrollments by ethnic status from the 1974 OCR survey. These percentages were then applied to the 1976 FTE total enrollment (obtained from the MCES 1976 OFE survey) to obtain the distribution shown.

The data on enrollments by sex were obtained from the NCES 1976 OFE Survey.

The data on fostitutional sector were obtained from the NCES 1976 VFE survey.

The data on student level were estimated by obtaining a percentage distribution from the NCES 1975.0FE. survey and applied to the total obtained from the 1976 OFE survey. (The 1976 OFE survey did not collect data by the lower/upper division; graduate, professional categories, thus the 1975 data were utilized).
