ABSTRACT

Lists of foundations can aid the user in securing funding sources for projects in the areas of health, education, community development and/or social services. The user is cautioned that grantsmanship is a competitive process; grants application procedures vary from one foundation to another. In the absence of any specific guidelines, important items to include in a proposal are: statement of need and problem; identification of target population to be served or benefited in any way; objectives; plan of implementation, with timetable for completion of each phase of a project; proposed budget; available and proposed staff; and an evaluation plan. It is important to indicate other sources of support plans for continuation of a project once foundation funds are expended, and a proven record of accountability is always good supportive information. Approximately 180 foundations are listed from 25 different states. Each listing includes the foundation's name, address, and a brief summary of its purpose or support preferences. Although the list was prepared for persons working with Native American groups, the foundations named are not exclusively for Native Americans. Lists of Indian Health Service regional and area office contacts are included to facilitate acquisition of additional information or assistance. (RTS)

INTRODUCTION

This document presents a reference source of selected private foundations that provide support for human resources and is a revision of, and addition to, a previous publication* prepared and distributed in 1973 by the Phoenix Area Office of Indian Health Service. This new document is being distributed to persons working with Native American groups and communities wishing to apply for foundation grants for projects in the areas of health, education, community development and/or social services. The foundations listed are not exclusively for Native Americans, however.

In preparing this directory approximately 700 foundations were informed of the plan to publish this list and given the opportunity to be listed herein. First, an attempt was made to contact all foundations shown in the 1973 publication to ascertain whether or not they wished to be listed again or to make any changes in the information shown. Those who wished to be listed as before were not required to answer. Simultaneously, various foundation directories were screened for additional sources that might provide support in areas covered; and contacts were made to secure permission to list those appearing to meet the selection criteria. Foundations shown in the 1973 edition but not appearing in this new listing were omitted for a number of reasons: change in program emphasis, existing funds committed to ongoing programs, or foundation has been dissolved, etc.

* FOUNDATIONS THAT PROVIDE SUPPORT IN HUMAN SERVICES: A SELECTED LIST FOR INDIAN COMMUNITIES - April 1973.

Persons using this document should be aware of the fact that applying for a foundation grant is a highly competitive process; and it may take a year or more to have a grant approved and funded, depending on the frequency and kind of review process a given foundation uses. Grant application procedures vary from one foundation to another. It is suggested, therefore, that the initial approach be made by letter, including a request for application guidelines.

In the absence of any specific guidelines, important items to include in a proposal are: statement of need and problem; identification of target population to be served or benefited in any way; objectives; plan of implementation, with timetable for completion of each phase of a project; proposed budget; available and proposed staff; and an evaluation plan. It is desirable also to indicate other sources of support, if any, involved in the project. The latter is particularly important for a project in progress and for which funds are being sought to expand services or make capital investments for facilities or equipment. Further, it is important to note plans for continuation of a project once foundation funds are expended, especially if an ongoing service or program is to be established. A proven record of accountability is always good supportive information, so noting projects previously completed by the applicant or directed by a member of the present or proposed project staff is helpful.

Users of this document should be careful to note whether or not a foundation indicates its support is for local use only. If this restriction appears, it would be useless to apply if a proposed project would not serve the community of immediate interest to that foundation. Some foundations specify also that support will be given only to organizations or individuals.

The Office of Health Resources, Indian Health Service can provide additional information on most of the foundations listed in this document. The Office of Health Resources can also suggest other sources of support and approaches to securing funds for tribal and urban health projects. A separate list of Indian Health Service representatives in various Regional Offices of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare is also provided (Appendix B). These representatives should be contacted about funding provided through the Regional

Offices to States, in particular, and for individual project grants.

These representatives can also provide information about technical assistance and staffing support available through other Regional Office programs.


