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ABSTRACT

Los Angeles City College (LACC) students were surveyed to determine their demographic and academic characteristics, and their attitudes toward their education. Of a random sample of 2,000 day and evening students, 1,266 responded. Data from the fall 1978 survey are compared to those from a fall 1976 survey and to fall 1978 district-wide statistics. The principal reason for attending college given by both day (42%) and evening (53%) students was to "acquire or improve occupational or technical skills." The second most frequently given reason was to "prepare to transfer to a four-year college." Major reasons for attending LACC were that the college was close to home, had no tuition, and had a reputation for good teaching. When asked if they would attend LACC if tuition of about \$5.00 per unit were charged, 25% indicated that they would attend, another 25% indicated that they would if they received financial aid, 25% indicated that they could not afford to attend, and the remaining 25% were uncertain. The principal study interest of day students was fine arts, with business and secretarial programs ranked second; among evening students, business was ranked first and fine arts ranked fourth. A bachelor's degree was sought by 60% of the respondents. About 60% of day students and 95% of evening students were employed. Teaching and the library were the highest ranked student services. Almost 20% had attended high school in a foreign country. (Author/MB)

PURPOSE OF THE STUDY

In Fall 1976, the LACCD Research Committee, with the cooperation of the District Office of Educational Research and Analysis, devised and administered a "Student Survey" to provide information about currently enrolled students. LACC cooperated in this endeavor, with the findings of this effort reported in Research Study #77-4.

After reviewing the information obtained in the 1976 survey, the Research Committee decided that it would be useful to attempt to obtain information of this type on a biennial basis. This study reports on LACC participation in the Fall 1978 survey.

PROCEDURE OF THE STUDY

A sub-committee of the District Research Committee revised the 1976 instrument and requested that it be administered to a representative sample of students. LACC was furnished approximately 2,000 questionnaires. Method to be used was to request instructor assistance by administering the questionnaire during a class session. Completed questionnaires were sent to the District Office of Educational Planning, where they were keypunched and analyzed on the District computer using SPSS (Statistical Package for Social Sciences) programs. The printout for LACC was furnished the LACC Research Office and forms the basis for the findings described in the next section.

FINDINGS

In order to approximate a random sample, all classes meeting at 9:00 AM Wednesdays and at 7:00 PM Wednesdays were listed (separately). Using a printout from the Office of Instruction showing numbers of students, classes were chosen randomly from these lists until a total of about 2,000, divided between the two lists in proportion to the day-evening ratio of the total population, was obtained. This process produced 35 day classes and 25 evening classes. Instructors of these classes were sent copies of the questionnaire and invited to participate. (Copy of invitation letter appended.)

32 (92%) of the day instructors and all 25 of the evening instructors administered the questionnaire and returned a total of 1,266 completed (or partially completed) copies to the Research Office.

Table 1 presents some characteristics of the sample respondents and comparable characteristics for the entire college population. In addition to errors due to sampling, differences can be attributed to two other facts, (1) the population statistics are as of the fourth week of the semester, the sample as of the thirteenth week, and (2) the sample figures are self-reported.

Table 2 lists the questions asked of the students and shows the number responding together with percents marking each of the possible responses. Figures are given separately for day and evening students*. Questions which were asked in 1976 also show figures for that project. Also 1978 District wide totals are included where available.

* Those students indicating all of their classes to start before 4:30 PM (Day) or after 4:30 PM (Evening).

OBSERVATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS

This study reports on a questionnaire survey of L.A.C.C. students in December 1978, the second of a planned biannual undertaking. The instrument was administered by faculty selected through a "randomizing" process. Faculty cooperation was excellent, in that 62 of the 65 requested faculty members participated.

1266 questionnaires were completed and returned to the Research Office for analysis. A comparison of sample characteristics with those of the entire population 9 weeks earlier indicates that the sample is representative in certain areas and questionable in others. Percent male and percent minority differ by less than 2%, although the sample percentage of Blacks is slightly underrepresented. Major difference between sample and population is that the former shows 57% full-time and the latter only 33%. Coupling this with the fact that the sample shows a higher percentage of younger students leads one to conclude that a higher percentage of older, part-time students withdrew from the college between the 4th and the 13th weeks. Investigations are now being made to check this further.

Following are some observations and conclusions based on analysis of the responses to the questionnaire:

- (1) Number one reason for attending college, stated by both day (42%) and evening (53%) students was to acquire or improve occupational or technical skills. Number two reason was "to prepare to transfer to a four year college," (36% day, 25% evening). This response is a shift from 1976 when the order was reversed.
- (2) Major reasons for choosing L.A.C.C. in particular were that the college is close to home, has no tuition, and has a reputation for good teaching. Influence of parents, friends, and counselors is apparently not an important factor.
- (3) When asked if they would attend L.A.C.C. if tuition of about \$5 per unit were charged, about one fourth of the students said yes, no problem, another fourth said yes, with some aid, another fourth said no, they couldn't afford it, and the remaining fourth said they were uncertain at this time.

- (4) When asked about the area of study of greatest interest to them, day students number one choice was fine arts, with business and secretarial second. Evening students first choice was clearly business, with fine arts ranking fourth.
- (5) About half of L.A.C.C. respondents indicated that they selected their high school courses to prepare for college.
- (6) About 60% of the respondents indicated they planned to obtain a bachelor's degree or higher.
- (7) The average distance students come to get to L.A.C.C. is a little over 5 miles, as it is for the entire district. Method of getting to school differs however. About a third of L.A.C.C. students take the bus, compared to less than half that figure district wide. Slightly over half of L.A.C.C. students drive their own car, compared to over three quarters districtwide.
- (8) About 60% of L.A.C.C. day students and 95% of evening students are employed for pay. For those who work, almost all evening students work full-time, while day students average about 22 hours per week.
- (9) Students were asked to grade twelve different services offered by the college and to indicate frequency of use of the service. Highest rated were teaching and college library, lowest was food services.
- (10) Reported median parental income was \$9,600 for day students, \$10,300 for evening students, both up about \$800 since 1976. Median parental reported income districtwide was \$15,800.
- (11) Almost one in five respondents indicated that they last attended high-school in a foreign country. Far East, South Pacific, Latin America accounted for about two thirds of these.
