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**ABSTRACT**

This special labor force report, focusing on children of working mothers, summarizes findings from the 1977 annual survey of marital and family characteristics of workers in the population who are 16 years old and over. Data are given on: the numbers of children of various ages with working mothers, the percentages of black and white children living with a single parent, the number of children either wholly or partially dependent on their mother's earnings for a large share of their support; and the average size of families of working and nonworking mothers. The following supplementary tables, each dated March 1977, are provided in the appendix: (1) Number of own children under 18 and family income in 1976, by age of children, type of family and employment status of parents; (2) Number of own children under 18 and median family income in 1976, by age of children, type of family, employment status of parents, race and Hispanic origin; (3) Number of families with own children under 18 and family income in 1976, by age of children, type of family and employment status of parents; and (4) Number of families with own children under 18 and median family income in 1976, by age of children, type of family, employment status of mother, race and Hispanic origin. 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# Children of Working Mothers, March 1977

*Special Labor Force Report shows that, on average, black children are more likely than whites to have working mothers*

Since 1970, the total number of children under age 18 in families has declined steadily, from 65.8 million to 60.6 million (table 1). At the same time, the number of children whose mothers were in the labor force has increased by 3.3 million. These developments reflect the rise in the number of broken marriages, the steep decline in the birth rate, and the continuing increase in the labor force activity of mothers with young children. By March 1977, 28.9 million children, 47.7 percent of all those below age 18, had mothers who were either employed or seeking work. Of these children, 6.4 million were below age 6.<sup>1</sup>

Although most children continue to live with both of their parents, more than in the past are living with a single parent. Seventeen percent lived with one parent in March 1977, whereas 7 years earlier only 11 percent did. Most of the children in one-parent families lived with their mothers, with black children far more likely than white children to be in this type of family.

As expected, younger children are less likely than older ones to have working mothers. Of all children in husband-wife families in 1977, the proportions whose mothers were in the labor force ranged from 37 percent for those under age 6, to 48 percent for those 6 to 13, and to 55 percent for those 14 to 17 (table 2). For children living solely with their mothers these proportions were substantially greater.

Mothers of children age 6 to 17 have been joining the labor force at a quickening pace over the last couple of years. More than half of the 1970-77 increase in the number of school age children whose mothers work has occurred since 1975.

On average, black children are more likely than whites to have working mothers (55 versus 46 percent in 1977). However, there are significant differences by family type. About 60 percent of black children in husband-wife families had mothers in the labor force with little variation by age of the child (table 3). Forty-five percent of white children in two-parent families had working mothers, with older children much more likely than those who were younger to have a mother in the labor force. On the other hand, more than 6 of 10 white compared with 5 of 10 black children living with their mothers only had a working parent. These proportions were greater for whites at every age level.

A substantial number of children are either wholly or partially dependent on their mothers' earnings for a large share of their support. In March 1977, 13.7 million children were in families in which their fathers were unemployed, not in the labor force, or absent. The number in these circumstances had edged downward over the year, as a decline in the total whose fathers were unemployed or out of the labor force more than offset the slight upturn in the number whose fathers were absent. As in previous years, more than 5 of 10 black children and nearly 2 of 10 white children were living in one of these situations.

A mother in the labor force can make a significant addition to family income in each of the preceding circumstances. When the mother worked, the 1976 median income for families with children was \$13,900 for those in which the father was unemployed, \$11,600 for those in which the father was out of the labor force, and \$7,800 for those in which the father was absent. Corresponding medians when the mother was not in the labor force were \$8,800, \$7,100, and \$4,200.

As might be expected, incomes are higher for families with older children than for those with younger children. When the mother worked, median income in 1976 was \$21,300 for husband-wife families with children 14 to 17, compared with \$18,800 for families with children 6 to 13, and \$15,500 for families with children under 6. Incomes were lower for families in which the mother did not work, but the same order prevailed. Of course, the parents of older children are older themselves and, therefore, probably have acquired the skills, experience, and seniority required in higher paying jobs. Also, parents of older children are not as encumbered by day

care responsibilities and may have more flexibility in the types of jobs at which they work.

### Family size

The average size of American families has been dropping steadily since 1970. In families where there were any children, the average number in March 1977 was about 2 (2.02 for two-parent families and 1.99 for families in which only the mother was present.) Seven years earlier, families (regardless of type) generally had more children (2.29, on average). In 1977, as in previous years, there were fewer children in families with working mothers than in those in which the mother was not in the labor force.

The drop in average family size reflects the steep declines that have occurred in the birth and fertility rates since 1970. In 1976, these provisional rates (births per 1,000 population and births per 1,000 women 15 to 44 years of age) ebbed to their lowest

levels, 14.7 and 65.6, respectively.<sup>2</sup> However, provisional data for the first quarter of 1977 reveal that the birth rate was 6 percent higher, and the fertility rate was 4 percent higher, than the rates for the comparable period in 1976, indicating that the trough in these rates may have been reached.<sup>3</sup>

In general, however, today's young women expect to bear fewer children than in the past, with those in the labor force planning smaller families than their nonworking counterparts. Wives age 18 to 24 in June 1976 expected to have an average of 2.1 children during their lifetimes; on the average, those in the labor force planned 2.0 children and those outside the work force expected 2.3 children. Similar differences existed among older wives.<sup>4</sup>

The planning of smaller families and the increasing labor force participation of wives may be motivated by many factors, including what are perceived as economic realities. A study, updating a 1969 report by the Commission on Population Growth and the American Future,<sup>5</sup> estimated that in 1977 the total direct costs of raising a child from birth through college ranged from \$44,200 for those families whose after-tax income was between \$10,500 and \$13,500 to \$64,200 for those whose disposable income was between \$16,500 and \$20,000.<sup>6</sup> When the earnings

forgone by the mother were included, the estimated costs of raising children skyrocketed.

It was contended in the study that by staying out of the labor force until her child was 14 years old, a mother, on average, would forgo some \$100,000 in earnings, with the educational level of the mother affecting the amount. Earnings lost to a woman with an elementary education were calculated to be about \$75,000 while earnings lost to one with a post-graduate college education would be \$155,000. In any event, the computations on earnings forgone far outweighed what were considered the direct costs. Moreover, the marginal costs of any additional children represent substantial outlays. Consequently, the combination of forgone career opportunities and extensive costs may be among the prominent reasons young women are planning smaller families.

As the costs of having and rearing children increase, women may become more likely to remain in or quickly return to the labor force while their children are still young. In fact, the labor force participation rate for young mothers, living with their husbands, with children under age 3 has risen from 24 percent in 1969 to 34 percent in 1977. Because the Tax Reform Act of 1976<sup>7</sup> instituted a tax credit for child care expenses for all parents who meet the established requirements, mothers of young children, especially those with higher levels of education, may be encouraged to remain in or return to the labor force while their children are still young. □

#### Change in concept

The Bureau of Labor Statistics is currently developing alternative ways of tabulating and publishing family data without the arbitrary designation of family "heads." The use of the term "head" has been discontinued in all BLS statistics concerning husband-wife families. However, until other approaches are fully implemented, reports such as this will use "head" where the single parent or nonparent adult is never-married, widowed, divorced, or separated. ## Appendix

This report contains, in addition to the article from the January 1978 issue of the Monthly Labor Review, the following material:

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## Explanatory Note

Estimates in this report are based on supplementary questions in the March 1977 Current Population Survey conducted and tabulated for the Bureau of Labor Statistics by the Bureau of the Census. Basic labor force concepts, sample design, estimating methods, and reliability of the data are described briefly in the following section. 1/

### DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Population Coverage. Each month, trained interviewers collect information from a sample of about 56,000 households in 614 areas in 1,113 counties and independent cities with coverage in every State and the District of Columbia. Estimates in this report are for "own" children under 18 years old in the civilian noninstitutional population in the calendar week ended March 12, 1977. Also included are children whose fathers were members of the Armed Forces living with their families on or off post.

Children. Data on children refer to "own" children of the husband, wife or family head and include sons, daughters, stepchildren, and adopted children. Excluded are other related children, such as grandchildren, nieces, nephews, cousins and unrelated children.

Family. A family is a group of two persons or more residing together who are related by blood, marriage, or adoption; all such persons are considered as members of one family even though they may include a "subfamily", that is, a married couple or a parent-child group sharing the living quarters of the married couple or person maintaining the household. A "primary family" includes among its members the married couple or persons maintaining a household and all other related individuals within the household. A "secondary family" includes no member related to the person or persons maintaining the household. Secondary families may include lodgers, guests, or resident employees living in a household.

Age. The age classification is based on the age of the child at his/her last birthday.

Race. The population is divided into three groups on the basis of race: white, black, and "other races." The last category includes Indians, Japanese, Chinese, and any other race except white and black.

Hispanic Origin. Persons of Hispanic origin in this report are those persons who indicated that their origin was Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or some other Hispanic origin. The latter category includes persons from Spain as well as persons with combinations of types of Spanish origins. Persons who reported that they were of one of the specific Hispanic origin categories and a non-Hispanic category were included in the specific category. Persons of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

Employed. Employed persons are all those who during the survey week (a) did any work at all as paid employees or in their own business or profession, or on their own farm, or worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers in an enterprise operated by a member of the family, or (b) did not work but had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, labor-management disputes, or personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for the time off, or were seeking other jobs.

Unemployed. Unemployed persons are all those who did not work during the survey week, made specific efforts to find a job within the preceding 4 weeks, and were available for work during the survey week or would have been available except for temporary illness. Also included as unemployed are those who did not work at all, were available for work, and (a) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off, or (b) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Labor Force. The labor force comprises all persons classified as employed or unemployed according to the above definitions.

Not in Labor Force. All persons not classified as employed or unemployed are defined as "not in the labor force." Persons doing only incidental unpaid family work (less than 15 hours) are also classified as not in the civilian labor force.

Income. Income is the total amount of money income received in the preceding calendar year from (1) money wages and salaries, net rental income, and income from estates and trusts (2) net income from self-employment, (3) Social Security, (4) dividends, (5) public assistance, (6) unemployment and workmen's compensation, government employee pensions, and veterans' payments, and (7) private pensions, annuities, alimony, regular contributions from persons not living in the same household, net royalties, and other periodic income. The amount received represents income before deductions for personal taxes, Social Security, savings bonds, union dues, health insurance, and the like. The total income of a family is the algebraic sum of the amounts received by all persons in the family.

Median. The median is the value which divides the distribution into two equal parts, one part having values above the median, and the other having values below the median.

The medians as shown in this report are calculated from the corresponding distributions by linear interpolation within the interval in which the median falls. Therefore, because of this interpolation, the median value depends not only on the distribution of income but also on the income intervals used in calculating the median.

Sums of Distribution. Sums of individual items, whether absolute numbers or percentages, may not equal totals because of independent rounding of totals and components. Percentage totals, however, are always shown as 100 percent.

#### RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

Estimating Procedure. The estimating procedure used in this survey inflates weighted sample results to independent estimates of the civilian noninstitutional population by age, sex, and race. These independent estimates are based on statistics from the 1970 Census of Population and other data on births, deaths, immigration, emigration, and strength of the Armed Forces. To these figures were added the male members of the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post.

Variability. Since the estimates are based on a sample, they may differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same schedules and procedures. As in any survey, the results are also subject to errors of response and reporting. These may be relatively large in the case of persons with irregular attachment to the labor force. Particular care should be exercised in the interpretation of figures based on relatively small estimates as well as small differences between figures.

The standard error is primarily a measure of sampling variability, that is, of the variations that might occur by chance because a sample rather than the entire population is surveyed. As calculated for this report, the standard error also partially measures the effect of response and enumeration errors but does not measure any systematic biases in the data. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate differs from a complete census by less than the standard error. The chances are about 95 out of 100 that the difference would be less than twice the standard error.

The figures presented in tables 1 through 3 provide approximations of the standard errors of estimated numbers and percentages. Standard errors for intermediate values may be found by interpolation. Estimated standard errors for specific characteristics cannot be obtained from tables 1 through 3 without the use of factors in table 4. These factors must be applied to the standard errors in order to adjust for the combined effect of sample design and estimating procedure on the value of the characteristic. The determination of the proper factor for a percentage depends upon the subject matter of the numerator of the percentage, not the denominator.

The following examples illustrate the use of the standard error tables. An estimated 22,462,000 children 6 to 17 years old had mothers who were in the labor force in March 1977. Two steps, using both tables 1 and 4 are required to derive an estimate of the standard error of this figure. First, from table 1, a preliminary estimate of the error (261,000) is found by interpolation. Next, this estimate is multiplied by the factor 0.7 from table 4. Thus, the chances are about 68 out of 100 that the difference between the sample estimate and a complete census count would be less than 183,000. The chances are about 95 out of 100 that the difference would be less than 366,000. The 22,462,000 children 6 to 17 whose mothers were in the labor force represented 51.7 percent of all children 6 to 17. The standard error of this percent is found by multiplying the standard error (0.40) from table 2 by the appropriate factor from table 4 (0.70):  $0.40 \times 0.70 = 0.28$ . Thus, the chances are 68 out of 100 that a complete census would have resulted in a figure between 52.0 percent and 51.4 percent and 95 out of 100 that the figure would have been between 52.3 percent and 51.1 percent.

For a difference between two sample estimates, the standard error is found by using the following formula:  $SE = \sqrt{(s_1)^2 + (s_2)^2}$  where SE is the standard error of the difference and  $s_1$  and  $s_2$  are the standard errors of the estimates.

To illustrate this, table B shows that in March 1977, 51.7 percent of children 6 to 17 years old had mothers who were in the labor force compared with 37.6 percent of children who were under 6 (table E)--an apparent difference of 14.1 percentage points. From tables 2 and 4 the standard error of 51.7 percent on a base of 43,467,000 is found to be 0.28 and the standard error of 37.6 percent on a base of 17,117,000 to be 0.50. Thus, the standard error of the estimated difference of 14.1 percentage points is  $0.57 = \sqrt{(0.28)^2 + (0.50)^2}$ . This means that the chances are 68 out of 100 that the estimated difference based on the sample would vary from the difference derived using complete census figures by less than 0.57 percentage points and 95 out of 100 that it would differ by less than 1.14 percentage points. If the percentage point difference between two estimates exceeds the standard error of the difference at the level chosen by the analyst (for example, 68 out of 100 or 95 out of 100), the difference between the two estimates is considered significant.



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
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
