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
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ABSTRACT

Compiled as a component of the United States Department of Agriculture's Student, Parent, Educator, Administrator, Children SPEAC for Nutrition Demonstration Project, this selected, annotated bibliography was designed to aid concerned individuals in developing and/or operating a preschool nutrition education curriculum. Topics include early childhood development; day care and preschool curricula; food related activities; child care food service operation and management; teaching techniques, strategies, and administration; children's books relating to food and nutrition; and newsletters. 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## INTRODUCTION

This annotated bibliography was compiled as a component of the USDA SPEAC For Nutrition Demonstration Project. Literature searches through Eric, AGRICOLA, CDI, AND Mdler were conducted. Entries from these searches and additional resources reviewed by the project coordinator form the basis for the annotated bibliography. Its development is a cooperation effort between Minneapolis Public Schools, Minnesota State Department of Education, and the University of Minnesota. Ames, Louise Bates. Child Care and Development. J. B. Lippincott Co., Philadelphia, Penn., 1979. Textbook

A teachers manual and student copy comprise this book. Current information on child development, families, children with special needs and careers is emphasized. The feelings of young children is discussed by age of the child.

Child care will provide answers in childhood development birth through age six. Basic information, lists, charts and records are an accurate resource included in this book.

Chow, Marilyn P., Barbara A. Durand, M. N. Feldman. Handbook of Pediatric Primary Care. A Wiley Medical Publication. John Wiley & Sons, 605 - 3rd Ave., New York, New York 10016. 1979. \$19.50 Book

Although written for the nurse practitioner and medical personnel the terminology is clear and easy to follow. It would serve as a guide for group and individual nutrition assessments. Milk and milk substitutes, food guides of some cultural, ethnic and specialty diets, and developmental charts are the highlights of this book. A guide to use with the parents of a young child.

This book is designed to give parents and educators information needed to help the child develop in the first 36 months of life.

Content is arranged both according to the components of a program and curriculum areas. A useful guide for teacher educators in planning a course on how to work with the young child.
