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ABSTRACT

Designed especially for school personnel, this notebook provides an easy reference for those interested in locating materials, organizations, information, and general resources related to the achievement of sex equity and the implementation of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Services are listed under such topics as sex equity legislation, teaching strategies, instructional materials, vocational and physical education, guidance and career development, and personnel policies. INTRODUCTION

A senior high school counselor asks,

"Where can I find information on nontraditional jobs for women?"

A social science teacher wonders,

"Is there a curriculum dealing with the impact of sex stereotyping on males?"

The P. T. A. president of a rural school district writes,

"How can I find publishers of nonsexist books for preschool age children?"

A physical education specialist wants to know,

"Are there any organizations which provide speakers on Title IX compliance in physical education and athletics?"

These are only a few examples of requests which are continually received by the staffs of sex desegregation centers. They come from superintendents, classroom teachers, community leaders, parents and students who are becoming increasingly aware of the issue of equal educational opportunity. With this new awareness comes the need for resources to help educational personnel easily locate information regarding implementing Title IX* and achieving sex equity.

*Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 states "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

The staff of the Mid-Atlantic Center for Sex Equity (the sex desegregation assistance center for Region III of the United States Department of Education) has addressed this need by preparing this Resource Notebook. This notebook includes sections on specific services provided by organizations concerned with Title IX and sex equity, descriptions of the objectives and activities of these organizations, and subject and organizational indexes.

The section on "Services Provided by Organizations" is divided into nine categories, such as "Title IX and Allied Sex Equity Legislation" and "Educational Programs and Teaching Strategies." Some of the categories are further divided into functional headings; for example, "General Resources for Vocational/Technical Educators" and "Curricular Materials."

We have organized this guide so that it is easily used by people with varying responsibilities and needs. For example, a vocational education teacher seeking nonsexist instructional strategies for classroom use would first look at the category on "Vocational/Technical Education." Under this category, there is a section on "Specific Strategies for Ensuring Sex Equity in Vocational/Technical Education" which provides the names of organizations and examples of the types of assistance they can provide. This section also lists publications describing how to recruit students for courses nontraditional to their sex and how to treat female and male students equitably.

The next section contains an alphabetical listing of organizations, as well as descriptions of the services these organizations provide. Use this section to identify organizations, their major objectives, their history, and the ways in which they address Title IX and sex equity.

The final section is composed of two indexes. The first is an alphabetical organizational listing. The second is divided by subject, according to the specific needs of the educational community. Subjects include "Free Materials," "Scholarships," "Women's Collections," and "Conference and Workshop Assistance."

You will find the Resource Notebook most helpful if you use the following general guidelines:

- Verify that the specific services of the organization(s) are still available because conditions under which they operate can change; e. g., grants can terminate.
- Check current costs, special discounts for educational personnel, bulk rates, and the availability of single copies free of charge.
- Note the use of the symbol (\$) to indicate that there is a charge for specific materials or services.
- Check for pre-payment requirements.
- Determine membership requirements of organizations; e. g., some provide materials and services to members only.
- Review and evaluate materials according to specific school district needs, guidelines, or restrictions prior to using them.
- Consider the use of post-secondary resources for adaptation at the secondary level.
- Note that government documents may be reproduced without permission, provided credit is given.
- Allow adequate time for organizations to respond to your request for services or materials.

Personnel at the Mid-Atlantic Center hope you will find the Resource Notebook useful and welcome suggestions of additional organizations which should be included, corrections, or comments which can be incorporated into future editions. An evaluation form for additions, corrections, or comments is provided at the end of the directory.

MAJOR PROVIDERS OF TITLE IX AND SEX EQUITY SERVICES

Three major providers of compliance information and technical assistance services in the areas of sex equity and Title IX are the sex desegregation assistance centers, numerous state commissions, committees and councils on the status of women, and state education agencies.

The following sections describe basic services available from these groups and examples of resources and assistance provided. Also included are lists of the sex desegregation assistance centers and state commissions, committees, and councils on the status of women.

MAJOR PROVIDERS OF TITLE IX AND SEX EQUITY SERVICES

SEX DESEGREGATION ASSISTANCE CENTERS

There are ten sex desegregation assistance centers funded by the United States Department of Education under Title IV of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to assist public school districts in meeting the requirements of Title IX and achieving sex equity. Centers provide services free upon receipt of a request from a district superintendent.

In accordance with Title IV of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, these Centers have been created to help public school districts:

- Increase the understanding of personnel concerning the problems of sex bias in education and help them avoid this bias.
- Identify sex bias and sex role stereotypes in textbooks and other curricular materials and develop methods of countering their effect on students.
- Identify and resolve problems that arise in meeting the requirements of Title IX or obeying state laws which prohibit discrimination in education.
- Prepare and disseminate to parents and students materials explaining the requirements of Title IX.
- Develop methods to encourage student, parent and community support for, and involvement in, the sex desegregation process.
- Recruit women and men for employment in positions in which they are underrepresented.
- Develop procedures for preventing sex discrimination in employment practices.
- Provide nondiscriminatory counseling materials and techniques.
- Identify federal, state and other resources that can assist in sex desegregation.

The activities, publications, and services provided by the centers are numerous and varied. They are useful to members of the educational community; administrators, supervisors, teachers, students and parents.

For example, the Sex Desegregation Assistance Center of the Southwest has developed a Resource Bibliography, which contains non-sexist books, kits, posters, and multi-media suggestions for classroom use. They also offer Materials for Nonsexist Education, a catalog of resources in areas such as guidance and counseling, athletics, and vocational and career education. The Midwest Sex Desegregation Assistance Center has compiled nonsexist materials and resources into its 1980 Annotated Bibliography, which includes books, films, filmstrips, recordings, and brochures.



MAJOR PROVIDERS OF TITLE IX AND SEX EQUITY SERVICES

STATE EDUCATION AGENCIES

Personnel in each state and territorial educational agency can provide resource assistance to local school districts in the areas of Title IX, Title II, and other sex equity legislation. Many states employ educational personnel who can provide technical assistance in these areas. In addition, some states have major collections of non-biased audio-visual presentations and print resources which can be used by local districts. Several state educational agencies have developed materials on Title IX and/or the general sex equity area which usually can be obtained either free or for minimal charge by other SEAs or school districts in other states.

In order to determine the type of assistance a specific state can offer in the area of sex equity, contact the Title IX designee, the vocational education sex equity coordinator, or in the case of states which have been awarded Title IV funds for sex desegregation, the coordinator of this project.

Personnel funded under Title IV for sex desegregation advise and assist local education agencies in the implementation of Title IX and the achievement of sex equity. Sex equity coordinators are funded under the sex equity provisions of Title II, Education Amendments of 1976, to provide a range of services including creating awareness, monitoring policies and practices, providing information on employment and labor data, reviewing vocational educational programs for bias, and providing incentive systems to promote student enrollment in courses non-traditional to their sex.

Some examples of resources which have been developed by specific state education agencies follow. In most cases these resources are free of charge to local education agencies within the specific state and can be obtained at nominal cost by other state and local educational agencies.

- The California State Department of Education's Project S. E. E. (Sex Equity in Education) aids school personnel in reducing or eliminating discrimination in educational programs. Publications from that project include Title IX Signposts and the Observation, Commentary, Visitations (OCV) Handbook, an instrument which can be used for on-site evaluations for Title IX compliance. In addition, Sex Equity in Education Update, a newsletter, is published quarterly by this project. Audiovisual materials developed by the California Department of Education include the World of Apprenticeship tapes and the slide-tape presentation, Sex Equity in Career Opportunities: Those People Are Really Doing Those Jobs.
- The Delaware State Department of Education has several publications on Title IX and sex equity, such as Sex Equity in Delaware; a Resource Guide on Sex Equity Materials Available in Delaware; and Women's Work, Men's Work. In addition, a Guidebook for Sex Equity in Home Economics and a set of five modules on Sex Equity in Business and Office Occupations will be available in the fall of 1980.
- The District of Columbia school system has produced a film on women and nontraditional occupations entitled The Change. It also has documentation available on "Student Leaders' Project," in which students made presentations to their peers on expanded careers for females and males.
- Florida Department of Education has produced materials to assist in eliminating sex discrimination in vocational-technical education. Examples of these resources are Erasing Sex Bias Through Staff Training, All Things Being Equal, Guidance Strategies for Eliminating Career Sex Stereotyping, and a Handbook for Vocational Counseling to Eliminate Career Sex Stereotyping.
- Iowa's Department of Public Instruction has three publications available on sex equity in vocational education: Promoting Sex Equity in the Classroom: A Resource for the Teachers of Vocational and Technical Education, Eliminating Sex Bias and Sex Role Stereotyping in Vocational Education: A Workshop Resource Book, and Sexism in

Education: Reducing Vocational Education Stereotyping.

- Maryland's State Department of Education has several publications to assist local school districts in Title IX compliance and the provision of sex equity: Title IX and Physical Education; Resources for Sex Equity in Vocational Education; and The Changing Workplace: A Look at Non-Traditional Careers for Men and Women. In addition a slide-tape presentation, Vocational Education: Equity in Action, is available.
- Michigan's Department of Education has produced several publications on Title IX and sex equity, such as A Student Guide to Title IX, Susan B. Anthony Birthday Celebration Kit, Guidelines for Eliminating and Preventing Sex Discrimination, List of Resource Materials for Helping Students Expand Their Vocational Options, and Cabinets, Carrot Seeds and Computers: Great Opportunities in Vocational Education, a handbook for parents.
- Minnesota's Vocational-Technical Division has produced two sets of posters on nontraditional occupations and will have two publications, New Horizons at Work and Career Awareness in Rural Education, available in fall 1980.
- The New York State Education Department's Occupational Equality: Resources for Meeting the Challenge provides a summary of vocational education funded projects as well as annotating resources developed in New York State to reduce sex bias, sex stereotyping, and sex discrimination.
- The Oregon Vocational-Technical Division has a publication on exemplary sex equity projects, How We Did It, and a film with instructional materials, Doing What We Like, primarily for counselors.
- Pennsylvania's Department of Education has several publications on sex equity; for example, Training the Woman to Know Her Place. In addition, a forthcoming multi-media presentation, Vocational Education for a Changing World, will have a film, training guidebook, parents' handbook, posters, publicity photographs, and brochures which can be used to promote sex equity in vocational education. Pennsylvania has also produced several radio-television public service announcements on sex equity in vocational education.
- Virginia's Department of Education has publications which address sex equity in vocational guidance. Available through the state project at the College of Education, Virginia Tech (Blacksburg) are Exem-

plary Vocational Guidance Projects in Virginia (1978/79 and 1979/80 editions) and Resource Guide for Sex Equity in Vocational Counseling.

- The West Virginia Department of Education has produced Teachers, Administrators, and Counselors, a handbook on activities which assist schools in implementing sex equity in vocational education.

MAJOR PROVIDERS OF TITLE IX AND SEX EQUITY SERVICES COMMISSIONS, COMMITTEES, AND COUNCILS ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN

Commissions, committees, and councils on the status of women act as advisory bodies to state and local governments; nearly all of the states and many local jurisdictions have these organizations. Usually commissions play a significant role in identifying the needs of women and making recommendations based on these needs for legislative or other remediation. Many commissions are active in sponsoring meetings and publishing materials on women's issues in order to increase understanding and awareness of women's needs. The commissions have participated in a wide range of projects, such as:

- sponsoring workshops on nontraditional careers for women
- promoting legislation to provide shelters for battered women
- publishing materials concerning the effects of divorce and property laws on women
- advocating legislation to change the rules of evidence in rape cases
- cooperating with schools and colleges in programs which promote sex equity for girls and women.

The activities of commissions for women are generally aimed at the overall goal of enabling women to participate fully in all phases of American life.

Examples of materials available from commissions are:

- The Delaware Governor's Commission on the Status of Women has emphasized employment issues and has held conferences such as "Women as Entrepreneurs." In addition, the commission has a report available on their Survey of Alternate Work Schedules in Delaware. Their Resource Book for Families in Crisis is also available.

- The District of Columbia's Commission for Women has a three-point program to:

- improve the economic status of women
- achieve equality under the law
- provide networking and clearinghouse functions.

The commission's Twelfth Annual Report summarizes their activities and gives an overview of their publications such as the Directory of Information and Referral Services for Women in the District of Columbia, and their slide-tape presentation advocating sex fairness in vocational education, Hey, What Are You Doing for the Next 60 Years?

- The Iowa Commission on the Status of Women has been involved in an employment project. This project gives students basic information about the skilled trades and has produced flyers such as "Craftswomen in the Schools" and "Nontraditional Jobs for Women." In addition, their publication, "Opportunities in Apprenticeship" will be available during mid-1980. The commission also has available two publications on Title IX and sex equity, Title IX: Questions and Answers and Sexism in Education: What Kind of Balance Is Found in Your Community School District?
- The Maryland Commission for Women is currently emphasizing study and action in the areas of spousal abuse and sexual harassment in employment. They are cooperating with the state personnel department in a survey of sexual harassment among state employees. Some of the materials available from this commission are Women Know Your Rights, Battered: A Survival Manual for Battered Women, and their newsletter, Maryland Women. Also available are programs from the 1979 state sex equity conference, "Focus on Title IX in Maryland," co-sponsored by the commission.
- The North Carolina Council on the Status of Women has been sponsoring the "Work Options for Women" program designed to train unemployed, low-income women in the skilled trades. This program recruits, places, and counsels women in skilled training programs. Further information can be obtained by requesting the flyer "Work Options for Women" from the commission.
- The Pennsylvania Commission for Women has as one of its priorities the area of education. This commission has two summary reports, the October 1978 summary of the work of the Task Force on Vocational Education and Apprenticeship Training and the November 1979 summary of girls' participation in interscholastic athletics, "Sex Discrimination in High School Sports." In addition, the commission has produced two films, Why Not A Woman? and It's Her Future.

- The Virginia Commission on the Status of Women has an education task force which has been working on continuing education for women. In addition, the commission has developed a handbook, Virginia Women and the Law.
- The West Virginia Women's Commission has available a Domestic Violence Directory: Services Available for Domestic Violence Victims which can be of use to both educators and community groups; in addition, this commission has plans to work in the area of educational equity for rural girls and women.

Since specific commissions vary in their current programs and staffing capabilities, elementary and secondary school personnel should check with their state commission in order to determine possibilities for cooperation and to determine whether there is a local commission(s) with which they could work. The Project on the Status and Education of Women began in 1971 and provides regular and timely information concerning women in higher education. The Project, which is funded by the Carnegie Corporation of New York and the Ford Foundation, develops and distributes free materials which identify and highlight federal policies and other issues affecting women students and higher education employees. Although primarily for post-secondary institution administrators, the project's publications contain valuable information for public elementary and secondary school personnel and others interested in sex equity issues.

The publications of this project provide information concerning sex equity, sex equity laws, and judicial decisions. Its newsletter, On Campus with Women, is published quarterly. Other publications cover topics such as Title IX, other legal requirements (affirmative action, executive orders), recruiting students and employees, minority women, financial aid, and women in sports.

In addition, as part of a one-year funded grant from the Women's Educational Equity Act Program, the project is researching and developing materials on institutional policies and services for older than average aged women students. The Women's Re-entry Project is compiling information on campus programs and policies which have improved the recruitment and retention of re-entry women students. Careers, Inc. has developed a primary career education series to assist young students in becoming aware of careers and beginning an exploratory process. In this elementary career area the Johnny Career Series, which was sexist, has been changed to the Johnny and Judy Series, which portrays males, females, minorities in introductory career stories readable by children. Also available are 11 nonbiased career kits on such topics as professional, semi-skilled, health, and industrial careers. Included as one of the career kits is a Cluster File organized around the 15 Department of Education occupational interest areas. This kit is designed to be used by students with minimal professional supervision.

The Catalyst Information Center is a major national clearinghouse for information on women and work. Originally funded by a grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Center was organized in January 1975. Currently the Center has two major facilities; the Catalyst Library and the new Audio-Visual Center. Both are open to the public without charge.

The Center's professionally staffed library contains more than 4,000 catalogued items related to women in the labor force, to expanding career options for women, and to business, government, and social trends. The collection is comprehensive and is updated constantly. The library includes the following materials: books, periodicals, government reports, pamphlets, clippings, bulletins, affirmative action reports, dissertations, statistical surveys, and conference papers. Individuals and groups can use the library, which offers a large number of self-guidance publications, including 60 of Catalyst's own career information and self-guidance books. The staff handles requests for information in person, by phone, or by mail.

The Audio-Visual Center will be located at Catalyst headquarters in Manhattan. It is being developed as a clearinghouse and viewing center for audio-visual materials relating to women and careers. Corporate counselors, EEO and personnel staff, trainers and educators, and other interested groups will be able to examine these materials in order to determine which are most relevant to their needs.

Plans for the Audio-Visual Center include in-house production of Catalyst educational presentations. The A-V Center will also include a permanent collection of selected audio-visual materials for examination and study.

Catalyst also publishes bibliographies in a number of areas for a minimal charge; for example, "Women: Achievement," "Black Women," "Economics of Sex Discrimination," "Women in Mathematics," and "Women in Skilled Trades." A free list of these bibliographies is available. New Books on careers and employment are What To Do With the Rest of Your Life: The Catalyst Career Guide for Women in the 80's and Marketing Yourself: the Catalyst Women's Guide to Successful Resumes and Interviews. The Center for the American Woman and Politics was established as a national resource center on women's participation in the political process. It provides statistical data and information to schools, organizations, and libraries. The information is provided in such publications as Women in Public Office: A Biographical Directory and Statistical Analysis, a reprint of ~~the~~ statistical analysis concerning women in public office, and Profile of Women Holding Office, a study comparing male and female officials serving in equivalent offices. The center has conducted and sponsored research on such topics as barriers encountered by women public officials and the relationship between sex roles and participation on local boards of education. Consultation services, special projects, and conferences are also part of its activities. For example, through a center project, the Public Leadership Education Network, women are given the opportunity to participate in internship programs and continuing education workshops which stress the realities of political involvement. In addition, faculty and students serve as advocates for expanding women's roles in public affairs.

The Women's Rights Project conducts activities in the areas of law and social policy. Staff attorneys file suits and participate in litigation dealing with sex discrimination (e.g., WEAL, et al. v. Hufstedler). New legislation is published, along with comments. These are useful for updating school personnel and for secondary classroom information. Topics dealt with include health, insurance, women in the workforce, and education. Staff personnel also provide research assistance and organizational strategies for setting up new coalitions (e.g., Women and Poverty), review new procedures, and testify before appropriate committees on behalf of women's legislation concerning sex discrimination in education.

The Congresswomen's Caucus is a coalition of women serving in the U. S. Senate and House of Representatives. These women organized so that they could play a more vital role in the legislative process on issues affecting women.

In the Area of Title IX the Caucus requested the former Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to issue new guidelines and directives which will clarify the intent and promote fair and reasonable enforcement of the law. Further monitoring strategies are under consideration.

The Caucus has formed the Women's Research and Education Institute. This institute is studying a number of other topics related to women. Inequities in the social security system for women, women in federal jobs, equal credit, women in business, military treatment of women, and the law are being considered on a short-term basis. Other topics such as work-sharing; women and pensions; hiring, placement, and promotion of women in the federal government; and women's health have been proposed for a long-term study by the institute.

The center operates as a loan library to persons with interests and responsibilities in the areas of sex equity in occupational and career education. The National Assessment of Educational Progress has been surveying the knowledge, skills, understandings, and attitudes of young Americans (9, 13 and 17 years of age plus young adults). Since 1969 it has conducted assessments in art, career and occupational development, citizenship, literature, mathematics, music reading, science, social studies, and writing. The National Assessment is a project of the Education Commission of the States, funded by the National Institute of Education, U. S. Department of Education.

Four of the National Assessment reports offer data which document areas of similarities and differences in male-female achievement. Although the research does not delve into the reasons for these differentials, the data should be useful for educators as they carry out program planning and research. These reports are entitled Male/Female Achievement in Eight Learning Areas and Educational Achievement and Sex Discrimination. These publications are available from the National Assessment at nominal cost or through ERIC.

The National Assessment has also completed a study on women and mathematics. The two reports from this study are: National Assessment of Achievement and Participation of Women in Mathematics: Technical Report and Achievement in Mathematics: An Overview.

The Education Development Center serves as the dissemination center for programs and products developed under the Women's Educational Equity Act (WEEA). Prior to dissemination, products developed under WEEA grants are reviewed by EDC to assure that they address the educational equity needs of women.

The WEEA print and audio-visual materials are designed to be self-instructional; however, some support services are available through EDC if necessary.

Materials generally fall into topic areas such as awareness of sex-role stereotyping, career preparation, educational leadership, and curricular materials. There are materials to assist educational personnel at nearly every level,

including those who have responsibility for teacher training.

A catalog describing materials can be obtained from EDC at no cost. It can assist school personnel in determining product applicability to specific program needs.

The ERIC system disseminates information through specialized clearinghouses across the country. These clearinghouses identify, acquire, and process educational information (documentary form) in specific subject areas such as social studies/social science or teacher education. The clearinghouses develop topical bibliographies, literature reviews, and summaries in their specific areas. The non-journal literature (Abstracts are announced in the monthly abstract journal, Resources in Education) is reproduced and is available in paper copy or microfiche. Abstracts of journal articles are published monthly in Current Index to Journals in Education. Duplicates are available through The ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS), P.O. Box 190, Arlington, Virginia. Specific relevant topics covered by ERIC include "Sex Role Development in Young Children," "Multi-cultural Education: Teaching About Minority Women," "Women's Athletics Counseling Women for Life Decisions," and "Counseling Women for Non-traditional Careers."

The Federation of Organizations for Professional Women was founded to provide a mechanism for increasing women's professional status and for improving the impact of public policy on women. It was organized in 1972. The federation is composed of around 100 organizations committed to attaining equal opportunity for women in education and employment. Organizations whose goals coincide with the federation's goals are eligible for membership. Individuals may become "Friends of the Federation."

The federation provides three basic services:

- Representation of women's concerns to national policy makers via such groups as the National Coalition for Women and Girls in Education and the Coalition for Women's Appointments
- Monitoring and improving research on women's issues and delivery of service to women in specified priority areas such as health through the Women and Health Roundtable
- Network building and information exchange, which bring together organizations and individuals with common purposes.

Two research centers have been developed by the federation: the Center for Research on Women in Higher Education and the Professions at Wellesley College, and the International Center for Research on Women in Washington, D. C.

The Feminist Press is a non-profit, educational organization which publishes books for the women's studies classroom including reprints of important and neglected women's writings, biographies, children's books, and a wide array of curricular and bibliographic materials for every educational level.

In addition the press sponsors a clearinghouse for information on nonsexist education and Title IX. It is also engaged in sex equity projects, seeking educational change in elementary and secondary schools. Examples of these projects include teacher workshops creating nonsexist classrooms and an inservice course for teachers, counselors, librarians, and administrators, entitled "Changing Learning: A Nonsexist Approach to Teaching." At these workshops and inservice courses teachers are given curricula outlines, institutional strategies, and course materials, such as Women's Studies for Teachers and Administrators: A Packet of In-Service Education Materials, and Strong Women: An Annotated Bibliography of Paperbacks for the High School Classroom. Among its new publications appropriate for elementary school teachers and secondary students, is an anthology entitled Out of the Bleachers: Writings on Women and Sport, which includes the personal histories of women athletes as well as over 40 photographs of women involved in sports; Rights and Wrongs: Women's Struggle for Legal Equality; Women Working, an anthology of stories and poems; and Black Foremothers, the stories of Ellen Craft, Ida Wells, and Mary Church Terrell.

A new bibliography of interest to parents and elementary teachers is Books for Today's Children, which includes a subject index containing such topics as "Working Mothers," "Sensitive Males," and "Adventurous Females." Their other programs include a speakers bureau, consulting services, and informational resources.

Girl Scouts of the United States of America, founded in 1912, provides opportunities for girls to develop their potential, make friends, and become a vital part of their community. The program offers a broad range of activities which address members' current interests and their future roles as women. The program encompasses science, the arts, and the out-of-doors.

The Girl Scouts offers many publications and activities which can assist educators. One publication, A Look at Girl Scouts Now, presents many innovative scouting ideas. In this report, scouting activities come under seven categories: Girls Becoming Women, Strengthening Minority Presence, Acting for a Healthier and Safer Community, Widening International Opportunities, Camping in New Ways, Preserving Our Nation's Resources, and Growing Through the Arts and Sports. Under "Girls Becoming Women" there are descriptions of Scouts working for Congressional staff members to sample government careers, Scouts exploring medical careers, and a vocational exploration project in Arizona called "Walk-A-Day," which gives Scouts an opportunity to perform someone's job in the community for a day. Girl Scouts also offers a vocational education resource kit, "From Dreams to Reality."

Girl Scouts participate through the 15,700 troops and 341 councils in the United States. Many are affiliated in some way with local schools. Subpart B, Section 86.14(b) of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 indicates that Girl Scouts of the USA is exempted from coverage, and hence can remain single sex and still receive assistance from schools. In 1975 the Girl Scouts voted to continue limiting active or associate membership to girls.

Information Systems Development had the contract for the Women's Multicultural Resource Project. WMRP is a data base on women of all cultures, races, and ethnicities in the United States which was completed in late 1979; however, products continue to be available. Major ethnic groupings include Hispanic, Anglo-American, African, Afro-American, Middle Eastern, and Native American. The search for materials on ethnic women

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has been conducted over a six-year period and has been used to prepare the Sourcebook of Multicultural Resources for Women's Studies and Bilingual Multicultural Programs, available through The Education Development Center for the Women's Educational Equity Act Program (800-225-3088). The project personnel indicate that "it is expected that the data base will be used to formulate special bibliographies on women and to assist researchers in locating specialized materials, archival data, and commercial publications on ethnic women."

The project has developed extensive files on women's studies programs and syllabi, files on bilingual and ethnic heritage programs, and extensive information about minority women. These files are available for conference workshops, and other consulting work. Personnel from Information Systems Development are available on a fee for service basis. Other publications available from the WMRP are Diosa y Hembra...: History and Heritage of Chicanas in the U.S., The Chicana Feminist, and Chicana Readings: A Preliminary Bibliography. A forthcoming publication, scheduled to be available in 1980, is the Handbook on Educational Strategies and Resources for Sex Cultural Relevant Classroom Practices and Materials.

The Math/Science Network was established to promote the participation of girls and women in mathematics and science and to encourage their entry into nontraditional occupations. The network's goal is to increase the number of women interested in and qualified for math and science based jobs in the 1980's and 1990's. It is an association of 500 scientists, educators, engineers, parents, community leaders, and business/industry persons which began in the San Francisco Bay area in 1974 and was awarded a Carnegie Corporation grant in 1978 to develop programs and disseminate materials.

The activities of the network are focused on students, women returning to careers, and persons who have a part in influencing the choice process: parents, educators, legislators, employers, and mathematics and science professionals. Many of its activities take place in the California area. Network members have held pre-college conferences, initiated summer engineering programs for high school women, designed and conducted a "Math for Girls" course for 8-12 year olds, and provided inservice training for educators. It has also developed college courses in math and science for women. Another activity is the model program in pre-calculus at Mills College. This pre-calculus program prepares students for calculus in one semester no matter what the student's background.

At the Resource Center at Mills College the staff provides strategies to public school personnel for increasing the number of young women in math and science careers. They disseminate information through the local math/science network. The resource center has produced materials such as Count Me In: Educating Women for Science and Math, which documents educational and occupational opportunities in these nontraditional fields. Films include The Math-Science Connection: Educating Young Women for Today, directed towards parents, educators, and other concerned adults; and Sandra, Zella, Dee and Claire: Four Women in Science, a film intended for junior and high school women and men. These resources can be obtained through the Education Development Center (see entry in this notebook).

The main mission of The National Center for Career Education is to communicate career education to the people of the United States and to improve, for youth, the orderly transition from school to work. NCCE has been designated by the United States Department of Education as the national repository for career education materials and has received the entire career education library of the United States Department of Education. In addition to collecting, storing, and sharing resource materials, NCCE provides training and technical assistance to educators in the area of career education. This organization is involved in all 50 states and has 10 affiliate universities across the nation. A topic index is available on each of 40 areas of career education, and custom computer searches are also available. NCCE can also provide mini-libraries of documents on specific areas of career education.

One of the specific areas with which NCEE deals is equity education. It offers items such as a Materials Assessment Instrument, which will assist educators in identifying sex bias in texts and career materials, and an index on Equity Education for Grades K-12, which gives abstracts of materials related to sex and ethnic equity in career education. All of the materials catalogued into the NCEE are assessed for sex and ethnic bias. If materials are biased, it is noted.

The commission was established to change and effect policies and action plans concerning working women. Its focus is on women in the workforce who are employed in clerical, sales, service, factory, and plant jobs, "the 80%." The staff provide general information about occupational segregation of women in the workforce. For example, they have produced a slide show on the concentration of women workers in low-paying, low status occupations. The staff are available to show and discuss the slides with educational personnel and students. Their fee is limited to transportation and meal costs. Some of the commission's (center's) most recent publications appropriate for school use include An Overview of Women in the Workforce and News About Women at Work in the Mid-Atlantic region. Also of interest is its report of the Research Roundtable on Working Women, which can be used as a model for other groups involved in discussing the problems of working women in non-professional, non-technical occupations. Major funding is through a grant from the National Institute of Education, with other funding from private corporations and unions.

The committee's goal is to train people to be more effective in working with schools. It has developed a series of handbooks for parents, some of which include "The Rights of Parents in the Education of Their Children" and "Parents Organizing to Improve Schools." There is a 24 hour toll-free phone (800-NETWORK) to help parents get information and assistance. An eight times per year newspaper, NETWORK, keeps the public informed on current education news. The committee also monitors citizens' participation in Individual Educational Plans. In addition, they conduct training sessions which teach parents and citizens how to deal more effectively with the public school system. From this work a PARENT'S NETWORK has been established to support positive action and local parent-citizen groups. Their membership now includes 325 groups of 200,000 people.

The National Council of Jewish Women is a multi-faceted organization dedicated to improve the quality of life for individuals as well as to strengthen Jewish communities. Its main focus is to design programs based on community needs. These include operating family outreach centers, creating homes and services for the elderly, developing community-based programs for juvenile offenders, and participating in the Federal Job Corps vocational

training program (by recruiting and screening young women and by providing support services). Other activities include conferences on women's roles, on justice for children, and on education of the disadvantaged. In addition, members focus on day care facilities and services for children, foster care programs, and the educational needs of the disadvantaged. The council advocates on behalf of human and constitutional rights and sex equity related issues and participates in national and state conferences. In fact, major NCJW resolutions include "equal access to quality educational services as a fundamental right for all individuals" and a working commitment towards the elimination of sex discrimination in the workforce.

Its national publications include the NCJW Journal, a quarterly; the Washington Newsletter, a bi-monthly update of legislation pertinent to NCJW program interests; Continuing Choices, a comprehensive handbook of projects for the aging; Children Without Justice, an in-depth report of the juvenile justice system; Innocent Victims, a manual on child abuse and neglect, with possible courses of remediation; Women Helping Women, a series which describes such projects as counseling, single parent aid, crisis hotlines, and support for displaced homemakers; and Windows on Day Care, a nationwide survey aimed at establishing day care standards.

Historically, the NCJW has been responsible for many firsts, including being the first organized Jewish women's group in the United States (1893), the first women's organization to initiate "Meals on Wheels" and other programs for the elderly, such as the Senior Service Corps and the Retired Senior Volunteer Program. The main concerns of the Science Education Directorate of the National Science Foundation are to increase the participation of women in science education and careers, to upgrade science studies for the early adolescent, and to increase the participation of minorities in science. Grant programs have been established to implement these three important areas. For example, the Women in Science Program was established in 1976 to develop and test methods of attracting women to and retaining them in scientific careers. The Visiting Women Scientists Program, a pilot program for high school students, has been completed and its results will be available for circulation in 1980. The Science Career Workshop program is targeted for high school students as well as college and university students. They are designed to enable women to make informed decisions about careers in science and engineering by providing them with advice on preparation for such careers, as well as information about job opportunities. All the funded programs include plans for continuing activities, such as ongoing career counseling and the development of annual science career workshops.

The Directorate also publishes brochures, such as Information Dissemination for Science Education for elementary and secondary school levels, and Resource Centers for Science and Engineering, specifically tailored for minority students and students from low income families. Established in 1973 as a direct result of pressure from citizen action groups, this office acts as an enforcement agency within the city limits for employment and housing discrimination laws and ordinances dealing with sex, marital status, parental status, and sexual orientation. Personnel both conduct investigations and negotiate settlements. They also work in coordination with the Seattle's Women's Commission. Workshops are presented on affirmative action, credit, and the employment picture for women and minorities. Training is provided to help clients obtain promotions and to get women into the skilled crafts. The office publishes informational brochures on the anti-discrimination laws of Washington state and enforcement brochures on fair housing and equal employment opportunities. The staff provides on-call information and referral services for Washington residents as well as out-of-state clients. Questions deal with issues such as the rights of sexual minorities, employment, housing, and legal issues related to women. Referrals on speakers can be made for classroom and schoolwide use. Topics include ERA, new trends for working women, and affirmative action.

The President's Advisory Committee for Women is chartered to advise the President and disseminate information regarding the status of women in the nation. The project originated as a state model program for expanding career educational opportunities for secondary students in vocational education. It presently operates as a statewide project and disseminates a handbook useful in combating sex bias and stereotyping in vocational education. "Enter Strategies" explores the rationale for examining nontraditional employment roles, reviews laws related to sex discrimination and vocational education, and designs strategies for institutions to combat sexism. Project HEAR is one of two career education projects in the country. HEAR is a program that combines career education with human growth and development processes, sex stereotyping affect and vocational choice psychology to reduce the effects of gender role limitations.

PROJECT HEAR (continued)

Project HEAR consists of primary, intermediate, and secondary learning units, each integrated into a student's regular curriculum over a 45-day time span. Learning units are sequentially organized, ungraded, and designed for use in any existing classroom structure with any discipline; they may be adapted to multiple learning needs. Project HEAR's materials combine reading, writing, verbal, audio-visual, simulation gaming, and kinesthetic learning experiences.

Project HEAR aims to expose students to the concepts of growth and change and to make them aware of their needs, skills, strengths, aptitudes, feelings, and motivations. The program relates a variety of occupational information to the student's self-concept. Emphasis is placed on choosing and examining alternatives in order to make decisions. At the elementary school level, the primary goal of the program is to change students' attitudes toward the world of work and to break down occupational stereotypes. At the upper levels, the program aims to increase students' knowledge of the world of work and to align their occupational choices with their occupational interests.

No special facilities or equipment are needed for successful implementation. Curriculum units are packaged in classroom sets with supplies for 30 students. Staff training by project development personnel is required for adoptions. Each training session is uniquely developed for adopters and averages two days in duration. Awareness materials are available at no cost. Visitors are welcome at project site by appointment. Project staff are available to attend out-of-state awareness meetings (costs to be negotiated). Training is provided at project site (adopter pays only its own costs). Training is also conducted at adopter sites (costs to be negotiated).

The Women's Employment Division is designed to place qualified minority females in managerial, professional, and technical jobs within private industry. Its primary focus for placement is industries and occupations where minorities and women are underrepresented. This program is an outgrowth of research which indicated that minority females are greatly under-utilized within private industry despite the fact that qualified women are available. It began in 1972 as a pilot program in Atlanta, and based on its success, now operates as a national project with offices in various regions of the country. The program on Women in Nontraditional Roles includes placing women in nontraditional occupations, providing career counseling and planning to minority women, and preparing applicants for entry into the work force.

The Resource Center on Sex Roles in Education was established in 1973 to help elementary-secondary educators achieve sex equity in education. During the first phase of its operation, the center developed numerous technical assistance materials on Title IX compliance plus instructional resources on sex role stereotyping. For example, it created workshop packages for the implementation of Title IX such as The Context of Title IX, The Teachers Role, The Title IX Regulation and Grievance Process, The Counselor's Role, The Physical Activity Specialist's Role, and Planning for Change. The center also provided sex equity training and technical assistance services to administrators, teachers, counselors, community groups, and education associations.

In 1978, the center was established within the Council of Chief State School Officers as the Resource Center on Sex Equity. Its projects and activities now focus primarily on state-level education programs and services. The United States Commission on Civil Rights is a temporary, independent, bipartisan agency established by Congress in 1957 to:

- Investigate complaints alleging denial of the right to vote by reason of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin, or by reason of fraudulent practices;
- Study and collect information concerning legal developments constituting a denial of equal protection of the laws under the constitution because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin, or in the administration of justice;
- Appraise federal laws and policies with respect to the denial of equal protection of the laws because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin, or in the administration of justice;
- Serve as a national clearinghouse for information concerning denials of equal protection of the laws because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin; and
- Submit reports, findings, and recommendations to the President and Congress.

In 1972 the jurisdiction of the commission was expanded to include discrimination on the basis of sex. Because of this added mandate the commission has published several guides which address laws concerning sex discrimination in the United States. A Guide to Federal Laws and Regulations Prohibiting Sex Discrimination explains current federal laws, policies, and regulations that prohibit sex discrimination. Sex Bias in the United States Code identifies and analyzes sex-biased references in the United States Code which forms the basis of federal law, and therefore addresses laws which allow implicit or explicit sex-biased discrimination. One of its newest publications, Women's Rights in the United States of America, is a report prepared by the Women's Rights Task Force of the United States Department of Justice at the request of the Interamerican Commission of Women.

The commission's quarterly periodical, Perspectives: Civil Rights Quarterly, periodically address sexism. Volume 6, Number 3, for example, concentrates on "Sexism and Racism: A Feminist Perspective." The commission also publishes proceedings of pertinent conferences and forums; for example, the report on the 1978 Nevada "Public Forum on Women's Rights and Responsibilities."

The Office for Civil Rights (OCR) is responsible for the administration and enforcement of departmental policies under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin in programs and activities receiving federal financial assistance; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in educational programs; and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicapping conditions.

Copies of the rules and regulations for laws such as Title IX, Section 504, and Title VI can be obtained from public affairs at the Office for Civil Rights. In addition, policy clarifications can also be obtained at this office. The December 1979 Intercollegiate Athletics Policy Interpretation is available from OCR as are the vocational education program guidelines for eliminating discrimination and denial of services.

OCR investigates complaints based on civil rights laws which are forwarded directly to regional offices and the national office from students, educational personnel, or other citizens. In addition, school personnel may call or write their regional office for responses to questions about Title IX, Title VI, and Section 504.

The National Institute of Education was created by the Congress in 1972 as the primary federal agency for educational research and development. Its mission is twofold: to promote educational equity and to improve the quality of educational practice.

To achieve these goals, NIE supports research and dissemination activities aimed at helping individuals to realize their full potential through education, regardless of race, sex, age, economic status, ethnic origin, or handicapping condition.

NIE has organized its work around three broad program areas: Teaching and Learning (T&L), Educational Policy and Organization (EP&O), and Dissemination and Improvement of Practice (DIP). Sex equity is an important concern in all three program areas.

T&L supports a Social Processes/Women's Research Team, a Mathematics Learning Team, and a Home, Community, and Work Program. EP&O supports a Women's Studies Team, the National Commission on Working Women, policy studies related to teenage pregnancy, and a congressionally-mandated vocational education study which is examining (1) the targeting of funds for women and other populations, and (2) assessing the degree to which consumer and homemaking education programs are eliminating sex stereotyping. DIP supports a Minorities and Women's Program, with associated research and evaluation activities intended to benefit women specifically, and the ERIC Clearinghouses, which provide the public with numerous sex equity publications.

NIE funds research, development, evaluation, dissemination, and technical assistance projects. The majority of the sex equity projects are research projects and fall into seven content categories.

- Women in Mathematics, Science, and Technology. The focus here is in funding research grants to help identify social processes that facilitate or inhibit the learning and achievements of women in the three disciplines.
- Sex Equity in Careers and Employment: The projects focus on working women, preadolescent children, and the various factors that influence aspirations and attitudes of girls and boys.
- Sex Equity in Elementary and Secondary School Practices: The objective is to fund research on reading, athletics, student/teacher interactions, multicultural perspectives, school policies, and testing - all of which relate to sex equity. Several of these projects focus on identifying and rectifying race as well as sex bias.
- Women with Special Needs: The needs of minority women has produced several specialized publications on Black, Mexican American, and Native American women, with additional NIE-funded research addressing the vocational education needs of rural women and women in jail. NIE is also participating in Department of Education policy studies on teenage pregnancy.
- Women Educators: The focus here is on the kinds of problems women have had and on the kinds of influence they wield as community leaders, school board members, administrators, teachers, and R&D personnel.
- Women in Higher and Continuing Education: The objective is to identify the types of discrimination on women students, women faculty, and higher education administrators, with almost all the projects concentrating on colleges and universities rather than junior colleges. Many of the projects in this category, specifically those designed to increase the participation of minorities and women in educational R&D, are funded by the Minorities and Women's Program. For information on their most recent projects, contact this program directly.
- General Projects on Sex Equity: This category covers projects and publications dealing with such facets of sex equity as legislation, dissemination of information on sex equity R&D, and the development of guidelines on how to avoid sex bias in educational research.

Specific programs in the sex equity areas are listed in "Finding Funds for Programs Relating to Women's Education Equity." This January 1978 publication was sponsored by the Women's Educational Equity Act Program in the U. S. Department of Education and is available from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402, or from ERIC (number ED 156-102).

The administration of programs in vocational education is the responsibility of Office of Vocational and Adult Education. The office has identified the achievement of sex equity as a priority area and is working to incorporate equity activities in all phases of its operation. The Vocational Education Act of 1963, as amended by Title II of Public Law 94-482 places strong emphasis on the elimination of sex discrimination, sex bias, and sex stereotyping in all vocational education programs. Part A of this act requires each state to assign personnel to work full-time to assist the state in eliminating sex discrimination and sex stereotyping and to submit one and five year plans which work toward this goal. States are also allowed to expend Vocational Education Act funds for grants to overcome sex bias.

OVAE, and its predecessor, Bureau of Occupational and Adult Education, has funded sex equity projects since 1976 and include, The Special Vocational Education Needs of Women, Sexism in Education: Reducing Vocational Education Stereotypes, Local Vocational Advisory Council Involvement in Effecting Sex Equity in Education, and Increasing Sex Fairness in Vocational Education.

The National Center for Research in Vocational Education at Ohio State University has the major contract for the development and dissemination of programs of national significance in vocational education and provides a catalog of materials on request (see entry in this notebook).

Of importance also in the area of sex equity is the requirement of the Vocational Education Act for advisory councils on the national, state, and local levels. These councils are required to have both sexes represented including persons who are advocates for women in vocational education.

This office administers the Women's Educational Equity Act (WEEA), which was passed as part of the Special Projects Act of the Education Amendments of 1974 and reauthorized in 1978 as Title IX, Part C of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (Education Amendments of 1978). The WEEA authorizes the support of activities aimed at eliminating sex bias in education. The program office awards grants and contracts for the development, evaluation, and dissemination of sex-fair curricula and textbooks; for guidance and counseling activities; for in-service training of educational personnel, and for the expansion and improvement of women's programs in vocational education, career education, physical education, and educational administration.

The major concern of the grants program has been to satisfy immediate demand by developing materials and programs which can be replicated or adapted by large numbers of agencies, institutions, and individuals. The reauthorized act established a new, second program in addition to the original program. This new program will provide grants for projects of local significance to assist individual school districts and other institutions in their attempts to meet the requirements of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.

This reauthorized act required the program to establish priorities for funding for the original program of demonstration projects, beginning with Fiscal Year 1980. The following priorities have been established:

- Model projects on Title IX compliance
- Model projects on educational equity for racial and ethnic minority women and girls
- Model projects on educational equity for disabled women and girls
- Model projects to influence leaders in educational policy and administration
- Model projects to eliminate persistent barriers to educational equity for women.

WEEA contract efforts have included the support of activities such as the Title IX Equity Workshops Project, the Women's Educational Equity Proposal Writing Workshops, and the Dissemination Center for the Women's Educational Equity Act Program.

Information about grants and grant applications is available from the program office. Also available is information on specific projects, which can be obtained from the program office by requesting the Annual Report. Materials produced under WEEA grants can be ordered for minimal cost, through the Education Development Center (see EDC in this guide).

The Bureau of Labor Statistics has responsibility for the Labor Department's economic and statistical research activities; it is the principal fact-finding agency in the field of labor economics, particularly with respect to the collection and analysis of data on manpower and labor requirements, labor force, employment, unemployment, hours of work, wages and employee compensation, prices, living conditions, labor-management relations, productivity and technological developments, occupational safety and health, and structure and growth of the economy. The information which is collected by the Bureau is issued in monthly press releases, in special publications, and in its official publication, the Monthly Labor Review. Most of the statistical reports issued by BLS contain data by sex of workers. In addition, the booklet Tomorrow's Jobs offers predictions of types of workers who will be in demand and has a section on where to find additional information on work. Of particular interest to counselors are the Occupational Outlook Handbook and the Occupational Outlook Quarterly, which provide up-to-date information on jobs and predict future needs for specific workers.

Publications are also issued on specific topics, such as Where to Find BLS Statistics on Women. This guide gives sources for characteristics of working women, historical data on the increased entry of women into the labor force, where women are employed, women's earnings, characteristics of families headed by working women, educational levels of working women, and unemployment of women. BLS also does studies on the work life expectancies of men and women, such as the "Length of Working Life for Men and Women," published in the February, 1976 issue of the Monthly Labor Review. Publications are of nominal cost and can be reproduced.

The Employment and Training Administration is responsible for:

- The conduct of specific work experience and work training programs
- The funding and overseeing of programs conducted under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973 (CETA)
- The conduct of a continuing program of research, development, and evaluation.

The following services of the Employment and Training Act are of particular importance to school personnel:

- The United States Employment Service maintains a system of nearly 2,500 public employment offices. The USES provides special assistance to youth between 16 and 24 years of age. Their Cooperative School Program is aimed at easing the transition from school to work through placement counseling and job finding services, and the Summer Employment Program refers school youths to private and public summer job opportunities.
- The Office of National Programs is responsible for employment and training programs including the administration of the National Apprenticeship and Training Act. Field representatives from the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training are available to work with schools in regard to apprenticeship programs. In a special effort to assist minority youth and women in the consideration of apprenticeship programs, the Apprenticeship Outreach Programs in approximately 100 cities offer counseling and preparation for required pre-apprenticeship tests.

The Employment and Training Administration's CETA program will be increasingly focused toward working with economically disadvantaged youth. This program, as well as other similar programs, will be emphasizing a partnership of government with employers and educators in order to provide further assurance that training programs will result in specific job opportunities.

The Employment and Training Administration offers several publications which can be of assistance to counselors and students considering apprenticeship training: Apprenticeship Now, An Equal Chance to Be an Apprentice, and Apprenticeship and CETA: Technical Assistance Guide. In addition, back issues of its periodical, Worklife, include articles on sex equity in employment, such as the February 1979 "Inside a Nontraditional Jobs Exploration." Also available are Program Fact Sheets on various areas in the Employment and Training Administration such as "Apprenticeship."

The Women's Bureau, established in 1920, is the only federal agency devoted exclusively to the concerns of women in the labor force. Its major objectives are to improve the economic status of all women and to reduce discrimination based on sex and race. It participates in the development of government policies and programs which affect women's employment and their employability. The bureau's assistance and information should be considered a primary resource for secondary guidance departments and for elementary and secondary level educators.

The Women's Bureau acts as an advocate, defending the rights of working women; as an advisor, providing technical assistance in the development of programs to help women with employment-related problems; as a stimulator, initiating model employment programs; as a catalyst, bringing groups together to share programs and resources; as a watchdog, monitoring federal and state legislation and other legal issues; and as a clearinghouse, providing economic, legal, and other information about women and work.

The bureau works with many groups and agencies in areas such as employment and training, sex discrimination, sex stereotyping and non-traditional jobs, occupational safety and health, collection and dissemination of statistical information about women, occupational trends, international programs, and the use of women volunteers in federal and community programs.

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Several issues of primary concern to the bureau are also priority issues for elementary and secondary educators and students: promoting non-traditional jobs for women, especially in apprenticeship and construction work, and in professional and management jobs; providing realistic educational and career counseling materials, increasing employment opportunities for young women; and assisting teenage mothers in achieving self-sufficiency.

A special focus of the Women's Bureau is on establishing direct linkages with certain groups of women who have had difficulty entering the economic mainstream; groups such as minority women, mature and re-entry women, displaced homemakers, young women, battered women, women offenders and ex-offenders, low-income women, rural women and women business owners.

Publications from the bureau are an important resource for elementary and secondary school personnel who are working on career counseling. "Publications of the Women's Bureau" lists all available brochures and reports and indicates which ones are available in Spanish. Single copies of these publications can be obtained free from the bureau or any of its regional offices. Since they are government publications, they may be reproduced by school systems. They can also be purchased in bulk at a discount from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office. Publications are grouped in the following categories: about the Women's Bureau ("Women's Bureau: Working for Equality in Employment for Women"); facts about women workers ("Why Women Work," "Twenty Facts on Women Workers"); nontraditional employment ("Women's Guide to Apprenticeship," "Women in Nontraditional Jobs: A Conference Guide"); special groups ("Young Women and Employment: What We Need to Know About the School to Work Transition," "American Indian Women"); standards and legislation affecting women ("Ban Against Pregnancy Discrimination," "Brief Highlights of Federal Laws and Orders on Sex Discrimination in Employment," "Legal Status of Women"); child care ("Federal Child Care Legislation"); and annual reports on the status of women.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) is the principal federal agency in fair employment enforcement and has the following major functions:

- Coordination of all federal equal employment programs
- Ensurance of equal employment opportunity for federal employees
- Enforcement of the Equal Pay Act and the Age Discrimination in Employment Act.
- Enforcement of Title VII of The Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission was created by Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and became operational in 1965. EEOC can provide educational personnel with copies of rules and regulations for specific equal employment laws and orders, affirmative action guidelines, and interpretive guidelines in specific areas of equal employment opportunity. For example, in the area of pregnancy discrimination, the April 20, 1979 Federal Register (available from EEOC) contains questions and answers on the Pregnancy Discrimination Act entitled "Guidelines on Sex Discrimination: Adoption of Final Interpretive Guidelines: Questions and Answers." Also available are the "Affirmative Action Guidelines: Technical Amendments to the Procedural Regulations," as well as news releases giving information about proposed guidelines or revisions, such as the February 4, 1980 release on "EEOC, Labor Proposes EEO Guidelines on Reproductive Hazards." Charges of discrimination against public and private employers and labor organizations should be sent to EEOC field offices.

The United States Student Association functions as a clearinghouse for student issues. Its constituency is from post-secondary institutions, but the focus of its efforts concerns all student-related issues. Its Target Reports gives an in-depth exploration of one issue per edition. For example, one edition dealt with Title IX and how students can work to assure that this right is not taken away, and a future issue will cover the topic of "Women's Studies and Social Change." Another publication is News Update, which includes articles on pertinent conferences, new publications, and a legislative update, all directed at student interests. A new publication useful for secondary students is the Student Guide to Better Financial Aid Services. The association's other activities include lobbying Congress to represent student interests, sponsoring conferences, workshops, educational services for students and student leaders, and communicating with national student groups from other countries. Women Educators is a nonprofit educational organization which promotes equality of opportunity for women in the field of educational research. A group of feminists and consultants formed Women on Words and Images for the purpose of developing resources to combat the effects of sexism in education. Their resources are books, pamphlets, curriculum materials, and audio-visual resources appropriate for parents, elementary and secondary teachers, counselors, and students. These materials include Dick and Jane as Victims, a study on sex stereotyping in children's readers, Help Wanted, an analysis of sex stereotyping in career education materials, and Sexism in Foreign Language Textbooks, with accompanying slide-tape shows. These slide-tape shows and books may be obtained at a bulk rate. One of their newest publications, Channeling Children, concerns sex stereotyping in prime time television. The staff also provides workshops on sexism in education for a fee.

As an assistance center for various women's groups, the Women's Action Alliance provides help for women who wish to develop skills for organizing and effecting change within their communities. They publish Women's Action Almanac, a directory of issues of significance to women's national organizations. The Women's Action Alliance also includes The Non-Sexist Child Development Project. This project is in Room 603 at the same address. It is the national resource center for nonsexist early childhood education. The project is designed for parent education programs and to develop in-service teacher training programs. The staff has developed classroom materials, educational toys, multiethnic resource photographs, books, a training manual to promote educational equity in early childhood (Project T. R. E. E.), and multi-media resources. Nonsexist films include The Sooner the Better, designed for teachers, and The Time Has Come, created for parents. The packets for classroom use include a "Community Careers Flannel Board," which shows examples of men and women dressed in nontraditional work clothes or uniforms and resource photos for mainstreaming on disabled adults and children. In addition, it publishes a quarterly newsletter, Equal Play.

WEECN is a national network funded by the Department of Education. The staff services the public by answering questions, gathering resources, and performing computer searches on women's educational equity issues. Its publications include information guides such as Sex Bias in Achievement, Interest, and Aptitude Testing, and Sex Equality in Vocational Education; annotated bibliographies such as Nonsexist Career Counseling for Women, part I & II and Hispanic Women and Education; and a continuing reference volume, Resources in Women's Educational Equity, V. IV, containing altogether over 15,000 citations from computer bibliographic data bases that can be searched. Its free quarterly news bulletin contains announcements, listings of available publications from organizations, and news articles on relevant projects, programs, or conferences. The WEAL fund works in a variety of ways to help eliminate sex discrimination in education and employment. It is a nonprofit organization mandated to secure and defend equal rights for everyone, by providing legal defense assistance and information on Title IX and other equal opportunity laws. It also provides management training conferences for recipients of WEEA grants, sponsors an internship program specializing in action projects, and assists in the development of organizational and administrative skills for women returning to the job market or students interested in short-term employment experience. In addition, the staff serves as advocates of wider opportunities for women in the military. Its publications include a Higher Education Kit which focuses on the Title IX regulations and sex equity, and a Sports Kit dealing with Title IX and athletics.

It also includes the project SPRINT, which is a free public information service on physical education and athletics. It publishes a free newsletter quarterly in physical education and athletics called In the Running. SPRINT was created by Women's Equity Action League and the Educational and Legal Defense Fund in 1972. It is currently funded primarily as an information service for intercollegiate athletics, but will continue to provide on-call services for elementary and secondary related issues. The staff is attempting to get more funding in elementary and secondary education.

This organization operates as a change agent in the field of communications. It was established as a nonprofit research and educational organization in 1972. Activities include a publishing program, a support network for women involved with the media, and an examination and analysis of issues related to communications. Media Report is published monthly and contains information such as results of rating prime time television programs for sexism, a study showing the effects on men and women of reversing male/female roles in network commercials, and statistics on employment of women and minorities in the communications field. All past Media Reports are indexed by subject in an annual annotated Index. Categories include journalism, education, discrimination, job training, and policy decisions in communication. Another publication, the Directory of Women's Media, contains a listing and description of over 500 women's groups (publishers, film, video, and multi-media). Finally, teaching materials for classroom use on women and media, including a documentary source book, are also available. Bulk orders may be obtained with a discount purchase.

Staff and members of the Women's Legal Defense Fund provide free legal services to women in the Washington, D. C. area. Their litigation has achieved precedent-setting nationwide cases concerning women. For example, the fund was successful in defending the right of a pregnant high school student to complete her studies. In addition, the fund monitors federal organizations charged with enforcing anti-discrimination laws in order to ensure compliance. It also provides speakers for workshops, schools, and conference presentations in the areas of employment discrimination, name change/retention, domestic relations, and credit discrimination. Counseling for women is given in these same areas as well as the rights of battered women. Among recent publications are booklets explaining laws that affect women in the areas of job discrimination, credit discrimination, and domestic relations.

The Women's News Service is a publisher of major news affecting women's rights and legislation affecting sex discrimination.

Its newsletter, Washington Women's Representative, is a twice monthly publication which covers all federal actions affecting women and monitors proposed legislation on sex equity. The newsletter also lists current publications from various governmental agencies which may be useful for classroom activities and an update of content materials on civil rights issues helpful for teachers' own information. These include:

- Getting Uncle Sam to Enforce Your Civil Rights (free)
- Putting Women in Their Place (Federal Women's Program)

Spokeswoman is published 12 times a year and includes articles appropriate for secondary students and public school personnel. The magazine deals with education issues, such as sex discrimination suits and an analysis of why there are so few women scientists; and family issues, including studies on divorce and child custody. Congressional hearings and legislation are discussed and a unique section on "Networks" is provided. A column by Ellen Goodman appears monthly and "Research Forum", discussing current and proposed projects in the area of sex equity, appears every other month. The Women's Sports Foundation was formed by top female athletes in 1974 to:

- Encourage and support the participation of women in sports activities.
- Provide general assistance and encouragement to girls and women in sport.
- Educate the public about women's athletic capabilities and the value of sports for women.

Several services provided by the Women's Sports Foundation are of particular use to secondary school personnel working with physical education, athletics, and scholarship programs. The foundation publishes an annual college scholarship and sport camp guide; provides sport camp scholarships for disadvantaged girls; works with other organizations to improve programming; and maintains an information and resource center on women's sports. The foundation has an extensive library on women and sport, and serves as a clearinghouse on the subject. In addition to the Annual Scholarship Guide (mentioned above), which lists over 10,000 athletic scholarships for women at post-secondary institutions, the Women's Sports Foundation also publishes a periodical, Women's Sports, and booklets such as the Physical Conditioning Guide.

The YWCA Public Affairs program operates under the following principles in the area of sex equity:

- To assure women equal pay for equal work and to maintain conditions necessary to protect their health and safety,
- To provide adequate guidance and counseling services and training opportunities for both women and girls in the work force,

- To support equal access of women to all educational possibilities
- To require that there be no barriers based on race, sex, physical or mental handicaps or minority status
- To develop programs to assure quality education - non-racist, nonsexist, non-agist, multilingual, and multicultural.

The YWCA's goals for the 1980's reaffirms the above mentioned principles. They include:

- Elimination of racism
- Implementation of programs in employment for young women and third world women
- Cooperation with and assistance to third world countries.

Activities include counseling, training teachers to teach in multicultural classrooms, therapeutic programs for the handicapped, career planning, sports programs, media assistance, shelter and meal programs. A special emphasis is placed on activities related to career readiness for teenage women and career retraining for displaced homemakers. Its publications include Women - A Power for Change, A Job at the End, Let's Try a Workshop with Teen Women, and Child Care, A Plan that Works. Local YWCA's are highly independent and plan activities targeted to local community needs.

Historically, the association began in 1855 with two separate organizations in England. One was Emma Robart's Prayer Union, which was concerned with the spiritual welfare of girls and women, and the other was the General Female Training Institute, established primarily to house nurses returning from the Crimean War. In the United States, the association has its roots with working women. In 1858, it was established as the Ladies' Christian Association, with the objective of offering support towards "the temporal, moral, and spiritual welfare of the self-supporting young woman."

INDEXES

The Resource Notebook contains two indexes -- one by organization and one by subject. The first index indicates all entries about specific organizations in both the services provided and organization description sections. The subject index identifies specific sex equity classifications and refers the reader to organizations in the description section.

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
