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## A Comparison of Selected Characteristics of Private and Public Schools

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## A Comparison of Selected Characteristics of Private and Public Schools

Private schools represented nearly 20 percent of all elementary and secondary schools in the United States during the school year 1980-81. These 21,000 private schools enrolled more than 5 million students or nearly 11 percent of the total U.S. elementary and secondary enrollment. This bulletin indicates how these private schools and private school enrollments vary among the States and how the enrollment in sectarian and nonsectarian private schools is distributed among the various States. The private school data presented here are from responses to a national survey of private elementary and secondary schools conducted by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) during the school year 1980-81. The public school data are from the 50 State education agencies and the District of Columbia, by way of NCES' Common Core of Data System. An early release from the private school survey, Selected Statistics in Private Elementary and Secondary Schools, Fall 1980, has already been published.

### Private Schools by State

The proportion of all schools that are private schools varied widely by State from 33 percent in the District of Columbia and Hawaii to only 4 percent in Utah and Oklahoma. The following are the 10 States with the highest and lowest proportions of private schools (11 where there is a tie for 10th place).

### Private School Enrollment

The proportion of private school enrollment also varied considerably by State from 19 percent in Delaware to 2 percent in Utah. The proportions for enrollment are systematically lower than the proportions for schools because of the generally smaller

size of private schools. In fall 1980, the average school size for private schools was 239 and for public schools, 475. Shown below are the 10 States with the highest and lowest proportions of private school enrollment

The ordering of States "as percent private schools" and "percent private enrollment" is generally similar. There are, however, some States with disparate rankings. Louisiana, which ranks 12th in terms of percent of private schools (not shown in tabulation), is 3rd under percent private school enrollment (see tables 1 and 2). Differences in State rankings for the two characteristics are due to differences in the relative size of private schools to public schools in each State.

Of the 10 States with the highest percent private school enrollment, 6 were in the North Atlantic Region (Delaware, District of Columbia, Pennsylvania, New York, Rhode Island, and New Jersey). In the category of lowest percent private school enrollment, 8 of the 10 States were found in the West and Southwest Region (Utah, Oklahoma, Idaho, Wyoming, Alaska, Nevada, Texas, and Montana)

**Religious Affiliation of Private School Enrollment**

Nearly 84 percent or 4.2 million private school students attended schools reporting a religious affiliation. Iowa and Nebraska reported the highest proportion of enrollment in private schools with religious affiliation (98 and 97 percent, respectively). Of the 10 States with the lowest proportion of enrollment with religious affiliation, only 2, Mississippi and Georgia (40 and 46 percent, respectively), had a proportion lower than 50 percent.

Michigan, Rhode Island, and Pennsylvania also had more than 90 percent of their private school students in religiously affiliated schools (see table 3). Of the 10 States with relatively high religiously affiliated private school enrollment, 8 States (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, and Wisconsin) were found in the Great Lakes and Plains Region. On the other hand, 6 of the 10 States with relatively low proportions of religiously affiliated private school students (Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Alabama, and Virginia) were in the Southeast Region.

### Catholic School Enrollment

Catholic schools enrolled about 64 percent of the total number of private school students in the United States and 76 percent of the total number attending religiously affiliated schools. A greater proportion of private school students in Ohio and Rhode Island attended Catholic schools than in any other States in the country (85 and 84 percent, respectively). At the same time, South Carolina, Georgia, and North Carolina reported the lowest proportion (15, 16, and 16 percent, respectively). In Idaho and Alaska, a relatively small proportion of private school students attended Catholic schools (38 and 27 percent, respectively). However, the proportion of religiously affiliated private school students in both States was very high (94 and 85 percent, respectively) (see table 3).

### High School Graduates of Private Schools

Nearly 3.6 million students graduated from high school or the equivalent in the United States during the spring and summer of 1980. Private schools graduated close to 300,000 students, or more than 8 percent of the total number of graduating students (see table 4).

Vermont and the District of Columbia reported the highest proportion of graduating seniors from private schools (33 and 21 percent, respectively). In 11 other States, more than 11 percent of the students who graduated received their degrees from private secondary schools. On the other hand, 18 States reported less than 5 percent of their students graduating from private schools (see also table 4).

### Pupil-Teacher Ratios of Private Schools

In school year 1980-81, private schools had an overall lower pupil-teacher ratio (17.9) than public schools (18.8). It is interesting to note that this does not hold for 13 States.

In full 1980, Vermont and the District of Columbia had lower pupil-teacher ratios (11 to 1 and 12 to 1, respectively) in private schools than any other State (see table 5). Illinois, Michigan, and Nevada reported more than 20 students for every teacher in private schools.

## Methodology

### Private School Data

The private school statistics in this report are derived from the NCES 1980-81 private elementary and secondary school survey. The major purposes of this survey were to update the NCES 1978-79 list of private elementary and secondary schools and to report basic statistics from this updated list.

Contracts were awarded to two organizations to perform the survey functions. The National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA) surveyed the Catholic schools and Evaluation Policy Research Associates surveyed the non-Catholic private schools. The procedure followed by both organizations was similar. First, a list of all private schools was developed. Second, a survey questionnaire was mailed to every school on the list. Schools that did not respond to the first mailing were sent additional questionnaires, and in some cases, phone calls were made to obtain their responses. The list construction for the Catholic schools was relatively simple because of the existing diocesan school system network. The list was developed for the non-Catholic private schools by searching the 1978-79 NCES private school universe, State and local government directories of schools, and private school association directories, and by contacting local and regional private school authorities.

The survey objective, though unachievable, was to obtain information from every private elementary and secondary school that had a first or higher grade and enrolled students in the 1980-81 school year. Despite the efforts devoted to searching for schools, some schools were not included or were not contacted. Other schools failed to respond to one or more items on the questionnaire. These nonresponses were handled differently.

If a school was identified as operating in 1980-81 school year (even by the return of the questionnaire with a refusal to cooperate) the school was considered open. Any items not completed by open schools were imputed by using data from earlier surveys. In the few cases where these data were not available, the value from a similar school was used for imputation. Imputed values resulting from this imputation procedure amounted to 1 percent of the total students, 3 percent of the total teachers, and 6 percent of the total high school graduates.

The other type of nonresponse – the failure to include some open schools – was examined through the Statistical Analysis Group in Education (SAGE). SAGE conducted an intensive search in 21 sites across the country to help evaluate the undercoverage of the private school survey. It was determined from those sites that 100 percent of the Catholic schools and 75 percent of the non-Catholic schools were covered by the NCES list. Although the results of this study are not definitive because of its small size, they do indicate that the number of schools reported may be underestimated by as much as 15 percent and the total number of students, by 5 percent. The study also concludes that the undercoverage was greatest for small, non-Catholic schools and for new schools.

### Public School Data

The public school statistics contained in this report are taken from the NCES early release, *Statistics in Public School Systems, Fall 1980*. Data for the number of public high school graduates are taken from 1980 unpublished tabulations. All numbers are preliminary and are subject to some slight revision. The final estimates will be given in *Statistics of Public and Elementary School Systems, Schools, Students, and Staff, Fall 1980*.

Another source of potential error in these reports resulted because NCES had to estimate data for seven States that failed to report classroom teachers and pupil membership for fall 1980 and for five States that failed to report the number of teachers, pupils, and schools by the cutoff date.

The NCES estimate of October 1, 1980 membership for a State was computed by subtracting the previous year's 12th grade enrollment from total enrollment and adding the 1st grade enrollment of that year to the difference. The number of classroom teachers was estimated by applying the percent change in classroom teachers between 1978 and 1979 to the 1979 figure.

The number of schools was estimated by adding to the 1979 figure the difference in the number of schools from 1978 to 1979. The number of graduates was reported by every State.
