ABSTRACT

A survey was conducted from mid-January to mid-April 1980 in order to evaluate patterns of use for individual titles within the periodical section of the Undergraduate Library (UGL) of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Bound volume usage was measured by affixing self-adhesive markers to volume spines when reshelving, and later counting these markers. A total of 1,151 of the 7,281 bound volumes were marked. Considering the years 1950 to 1979, volumes from 1961 to 1979 satisfied 90.2 percent of user needs. Only 15 of the 45 titles held before 1950 were used. Current periodical usage was evaluated using a survey attached to all journal issues arriving in the library during the study period. A total of 517 surveys were retrieved from the 604 current issues received; 73 issues were lost. Undergraduate use of the periodicals was 75.2 percent; graduate use was 15.2 percent; and use by others was 9.6 percent. There were 3,187 uses by patrons, indicating an average of 6 uses per surveyed issue. The cost of conducting this survey was minimal. Appended to the survey report are a list of UGL journal holdings by title, and statistics of both bound volume and current issue usage for each title. Sample data collection and evaluation forms are also provided. (ESR)

INTRODUCTION

The Undergraduate Library (UGL) at the University of Illinois provides service to the entire campus, including faculty, staff and graduate students, although its primary function is to satisfy the majority of needs expressed by the undergraduate student population. To this end, a basic collection of materials in a variety of formats is maintained. Specialized materials are usually located in one of the 37 departmental libraries located on the Urbana-Champaign campus. Each of those departmental libraries has monographs and serials pertaining to its subject field, (e.g. physics, music, commerce). The Undergraduate Library provides a core collection of materials which would be used in the fundamental courses in each discipline, as well as a browsing collection for recreational reading. Serials in the UGL also are geared for serving both curriculum and recreational reading needs.

At the University of Illinois, serials are divided into two basic categories -- continuations and periodicals. Continuations are those serials received twice a year, or less frequently. Periodicals are received three or more times per year. With relatively few exceptions, technical processing of serials is handled in a centralized processing unit in the Technical Services Department of the library system. This processing unit checks-in, marks, routes and claims serials for all 37 departmental locations as well as for the main library book stacks. At present, the University of Illinois receives approximately 63,000 serials. In the UGL, 333 periodical titles are maintained. 272 of these periodical titles are active and currently being published.

Due in part to anticipated space restrictions, it was decided that the periodical collection in the UGL should be examined to identify high and low use titles. Once the circulation history of a title had been determined it was theorized that certain low use titles could be transferred to other locations while additional subscriptions could be acquired for high-use items. The following report describes a survey undertaken to evaluate user needs and circulation patterns for individual periodical titles.

BACKGROUND

During the sixteen week spring semester at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, a study was conducted to measure periodical use at the Undergraduate Library. The study period began on January 14, 1980 and ended April 14, 1980. This period included new student week and mid-term examinations. When the survey ended, there were three weeks of classes and a final examination week remaining in the semester.

The Undergraduate Library, located south of the University's quadrangle and east of the Main Library, is open 8 a.m. to midnight Monday through Friday; 9 a.m. to midnight on Saturday; and 1 p.m. to midnight on Sunday. The library currently maintains 7281 bound periodical volumes and purchases 272 titles in its periodical section, none of which circulate. These titles are comprised of many popular items used for browsing and curriculum purposes, as well as scholarly publications.

The objectives of this periodical study were to:

- 1) identify all titles from most through least used,
- 2) identify type of patron use (undergraduate, graduate, or other) of current issues.
- 3) identify bound volume use by title and year, and
- 3) determine the loss rate, by title, of current issues received by UGL.

The following objectives were developed after the survey was compiled:

- 1) compare and contrast current issue use by title with those that have bound volumes,
- 2) identify current issue titles that were not received during the survey period, but that are being paid for, and compare and contrast these issues with bound volume use, and
- 3) identify, through bound volume use, those titles which can satisfy 90% of the patrons' needs. The data results for individual periodical titles are shown in Appendixes 2 and 3.

METHODOLOGY

Bound Volumes

The evaluation of bound volume use was conducted by having a self-adhesive green dot affixed once to the spine of each bound volume being reshelved. One FTE clerical worker and students employed in the UGL's periodical section were responsible for the reshelving and placement of dots. This type of measurement was reported by Shaw in his study of bound volume use at Case Western Reserve University.¹

Patrons were encouraged not to reshelve bound volumes. UGL employees also affixed dots to those volumes which were misfiled or returned to other locations within the Undergraduate Library on the assumption that these volumes had been used during the time of the study.

During the thirteen week study, 1151 of the 7281 bound volumes in the UGL periodical section received green dots.

Current Issues

For the evaluation of current periodical usage, an 8½ x 11 sheet of paper was stapled to the second page of each current issue checked in to UGL, (Figure 1). The current issue survey form was divided into columns and patrons were asked to indicate on the next available line, their school status: University of Illinois (UI) undergraduate student (U), graduate student (G), or other (O). Although it was never expected to receive 149 responses per issue, the survey form provided space for this number of responses in order to limit replacement of completed survey sheets.

Additional processing of each title occurs upon receipt in the UGL periodical section. The Library Clerk II (FTE civil service employee) responsible for the periodical section notes receipt of each current issue in a periodical file. The issue is then placed on display shelves in the periodical section and is available for patron use. Although periodicals are not allowed to leave the periodical section, there is still a large amount of theft and vandalism to issues.

During the current issue survey, 604 current issues of 185 titles were received and checked in to the periodical section by the Library Clerk II. The check-in average was 43 issues per week or 3.2 issues per title.

The frequency of publications received by UGL, varies with each title. Of all titles, 32.2% are published quarterly, 51.4% are published monthly, and 16.4% are published weekly or bi-weekly.

No current issues for 1980 were sent to be bound until after the completion of the survey. This insured full evaluation of use for all current issues.

Although the methodology described above is not original, it was the most cost-effective for the purposes of this study. The most popular tabulation of journal usage appears to be collecting data from photocopy and other form requests. Johnson and Trueswell,² Basile and Smith,³ and Pope⁴ all utilized information on forms which were part of the normal routine in their respective libraries. The study by Langlois and Von Schulz⁵ most closely parallels this study.

Langlois and Von Schulz used a simple form filled out by the user to collect data for current issue usage. For older journals, they simply requested users not to reshelve materials. The staff involved in the Langlois and Von Schulz study collected, recorded pertinent data and reshelved the older materials several times a day. By assigning dots to such materials, staff could reshelve materials in the present study and collect the data at a later time. Otherwise the surveys are very similar, particularly in the attempt to make materials as accessible as possible.

As Line points out, "no measure of journal use other than one derived from a local-use study is of any significant practical value to libraries".⁶ Agreeing with this premise, the present study clearly reflects the needs and problems peculiar to the Undergraduate Library at the University of Illinois. However, the methodology involved is extremely simple and inexpensive and can be easily adapted by other institutions. To some extent the findings of this study can be utilized by other institutions housing a general journal collection. Other undergraduate libraries and community college libraries will discover the findings of this study quite pertinent to their own collections. Many journal usage studies have been undertaken by special technological libraries. These studies oftentimes employ automated tabulation programs. However, as Wender states, although "access to a computer program saves time, the librarian without one can do acceptable studies of journal usage by a counting and tabulating method which thoroughly analyzes both requests and requesters."⁷ This simplified methodology appears to be most appropriate for the general periodical collection.

RESULTS

Although the official ending date of the survey was Monday, April 14, the bound volume data was compiled on Saturday, April 12 and the current issue data, on Sunday, April 13. Because of the popular use of the periodical section throughout the week, and UGL's hours, the weekend was an ideal time to compile the data. Saturday mornings and evenings are less busy than usual and the UGL does not open until 1:00 p.m. on Sundays. This allowed time to gather data without hindering patrons' use of periodicals.

For evaluation, all bound volumes were shelved and put in proper order. Every bound volume was then entered on a data sheet designed for this purpose (Figure 2). It took approximately nine hours to go through all bound volumes and indicate use on the data sheets.

All periodicals titles were assigned a five letter mnemonic code which appears at the left of each data sheet. If a bound volume was dotted, an X was written in the column corresponding to the year of the volume.

Tables I and II indicate bound volume usage.

¹Those years not listed in Table II had bound volumes for which no usage was indicated, and consequently, they are not included. (45 titles have holdings before 1950. Of those 45, only 15 titles were used. The other 30 titles had no usage).

CURRENT ISSUES

Six hours were spent detaching 517 surveys from current periodical issues. The loss rate of issues was established by counting the issues shelved as compared to the issues checked in during the survey period. The data from the surveys was compiled at a later time. This took an estimated total of five hours.

The current issue data sheet (Figure 3), used the same five letter codes as did the bound volume data sheet. Columns reflected use of current issues by the varying types of patrons.

The following symbols were used:

IT - issues totaled; those issues received in UGL's periodical section during the survey period. For consistency, current issues for April were not included in the survey.

ST - surveys totaled; all surveys that were removed from each issue. These forms provided information on use of issues.

LR - loss rate; this figure was determined by dividing the total number of issues received per title (IT) by the number of issues actually on the shelf.

U - undergraduate student; (total) use per title.

G - graduate student; (total) use per title.

O - other; (total) use per title. This included those who did not fit into the "U" or "G" categories, ie., faculty, staff or visitors.

T - total use; U, G, and totaled.

T/ST - total use divided by surveys totaled. This determined

the use per issue rounded to the nearest whole. Each current issue survey (ST) in hand represented each current issue per title.

One conclusion which can be drawn from the current issue survey, is that a small number of titles account for a high percentage of use. More explicit data follows in Table III.

A total of 604 current issues were received by UGL. 517 surveys were retrieved equaling 85.6% of the total surveys attached to each issue. Of the 604 issues checked in, 73 were lost (12.1%). This figure is considered unusually low for UGL. It is surmised that having a survey attached to the current issues deterred some users from stealing the issue.

Total undergraduate student use of the periodical station was 75.2%; graduate student use was 15.2%; and use by others was 9.6%. There was a total of 3187 uses by patrons which indicates an average of 6 uses per surveyed issue.

COST

The cost of conducting this survey was minimal. The time spent in having survey sheets stapled into current issues as they were checked in was not determined. Nor was the time spent in having self-adhesive dots affixed to the spine of volumes being shelved and evaluated. However, the time (and consequent cost) would be minimal as compared to a more sophisticated survey method.

The major expense involved relates to the time spent in designing data sheets and surveys, compiling data and responding to problems in the survey area. Since the compiler was employed at the UGL in a pre-professional capacity, the supervision of the project was handled as one of several duties. Time spent in designing forms and compiling statistics was not included in work hours. Consequently, manpower costs cannot be evaluated.

Supply costs were very low. Self-adhesive dots were purchased for less than two dollars. (Three boxes of 450 dots each were required). Survey forms (650) and data sheets (35) were commercially reproduced at six cents per sheet for a total expense of \$41.10. In-house reproduction would have greatly lowered this cost. The supply costs coupled with the efficient use of staff resulted in a worthwhile project being completed for a minimal amount of money and time.

Unlike the sophisticated automated system outlined by Maxin,⁸ the means of tabulating results for this study cost very little, do not require campus computer facilities or the involvement of several staff members. Using the simple methodology outlined,

any library, be it special, academic or public, can survey its periodical usage in an inexpensive manner.

CONCLUSIONS AND IMPLICATIONS

As the results of the survey indicate, the UGL periodical collection receives extensive use. Some of the problems encountered in the survey result from factors beyond the control of the Undergraduate Library. One of the major problems is non-receipt of items. Rather than sending repeated claims to publishers, subscriptions should be cancelled for those titles that show little or no current issue use. Swifter action should be taken with titles that indicate high use when the current issues are not delivered. Duplicate subscriptions should be purchased for high use items as well as for those with high loss rates. Microform copies should be considered for duplicate subscriptions. Titles in non-print format already available in the library should be promoted.

At present, the UGL periodical section does not suffer from lack of space for bound volumes. This situation will not last indefinitely. By comparing current issues use with bound volume use, individual titles with little or no use can be transferred to the stacks or to a library where the title would serve more specialized users.

With budgetary constraints in mind, the UGL, based on the results of this survey, has made some changes in its periodical section already. Low use titles are being considered for transfer

now and high use titles will have binding and claiming priorities. There appear to be a greater number of current issues not received by UGL from the processing units than the average of the other departmental libraries on campus. This problem requires further investigation.

The physical arrangement as well as staffing of UGL's periodical section has been modified so that there is greater control and visibility in this area. In order to deter vandalism, additional copying machines have been acquired.

Other institutions may find it of benefit to compare the use of UGL periodical titles, both bound volumes and current issues, to their own periodical holdings. By examining the use of a particular title, it will be possible to determine whether to retain it in an easily accessible area or in storage. Based on this study titles published prior to 1961 could be removed from a high usage area, or possibly discarded. In the UGL study, volumes issued after 1960 satisfied 90.2% of the users' needs. Certain journals such as the Journal of General Psychology, received no use at all and are candidates for removal. Comparison of these results with an institution's own periodical holdings can provide a valid basis for weeding or acquisition of specific journals.

The journal usage study described above can be utilized in two ways. One way is to compare holdings in the UGL with another institution's holdings and make acquisition and/or weeding decisions based on this information. The second way to use this study is to follow the methodology for a journal usage study in another

setting. This will provide an inexpensive study in terms of both staff time and dollars. For the UGL at Urbana-Champaign, this study provided information regarding the validity of its periodical collection, as well as statistical vindication for making decisions to transfer or withdraw certain titles.

Such a study can and should be repeated at regular intervals in order to justify the expenditure of funds on journals. As an administrative tool, such studies are well worth the time and cost involved.
