ABSTRACT

Intended as a desk reference for persons involved in all aspects of education, this directory contains information on 56 online databases and 64 clearinghouses. The directory is divided into two main sections, each arranged alphabetically by name. Section one, "Databases," contains 1-page descriptions and sample records of 12 education databases and 3 multi-disciplinary databases pertinent to education. The information provided for each database includes major area(s), size, date established, update frequency, search aids, publications, types of source materials, document delivery, information contact, and commercial vendor(s). In addition, brief annotations are provided for 41 databases relevant to education. Section two, "Clearinghouses," contains profiles of education clearinghouses and clearinghouses concerned with education-related topics such as aging, child abuse, drug addiction, disabilities, grants, microcomputers, and women's sports. The profiles highlight services provided, publications, date established, principal clients, source materials, forms of information available, and information contact. 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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Intended as a desk reference for persons involved in all aspects of education, this directory contains information on fifty-six online databases and sixty-four clearinghouses. The directory is divided into two main sections, each arranged alphabetically by name. Section I, Databases, contains one-page descriptions and sample records of twelve education databases and three multi-disciplinary databases pertinent to education. The information provided for each database includes major area(s), size, date established, update frequency, search aids, publications, types of source materials, document delivery, information contact, and commercial vendor(s). In addition, brief annotations are provided for forty-one databases relevant to education. Section II, Clearinghouses, contains profiles of education clearinghouses and clearinghouses concerned with education-related topics such as aging, child abuse, drug addiction, disabilities, grants, microcomputers, and women's sports. The profiles highlight services provided, publications, date established, principal clients, source materials, forms of information available, and information contact. An introduction, as well as guides to interpreting the database and clearinghouse profiles, list of references, resource index, and subject index complete the publication.

FOREWORD

This directory of databases and clearinghouses is the fifth edition published by the Resource and Referral Service (RRS). The first was originally developed for an Information Resources Workshop held in Springfield, Illinois, October 1977, to acquaint educators with many of the educational resources available to them for improving educational practice. This first edition was so well received by workshop participants and others who saw it that the Resource and Referral Service was asked to update and expand it for distribution at the second National Dissemination Forum in Washington, D.C., in August 1978. The publication should be of particular interest to dissemination specialists, education and social science researchers, and educational practitioners.

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INTRODUCTION

Background

The original version of this publication was a looseleaf notebook containing descriptions of thirty-one databases and eighteen dissemination systems, plus a list of the sixteen ERIC Clearinghouses. The notebook was compiled for participants at an Information Resources Workshop in Springfield, Illinois, on October 4 and 5, 1977. Sponsors of the workshop were the Illinois Office of Education, the Midwest Regional Exchange at CEMREL, Inc., St. Louis, and the Resource and Referral Service (RRS) at the National Center for Research in Vocational Education, Columbus. Requests for additional copies of the notebook prompted the publication of *Information Resources for Education* (Information Series No. 123) a cooperative effort by RRS and the ERIC Clearinghouse on Career Education.

In 1978 the Steering Committee for the Second National Dissemination Forum asked RRS to prepare an updated publication (third edition) for participants as a companion volume for two other resources:

- *Dissemination Networks: Information Resources for Education*, Far West Laboratory for Education Research and Development, San Francisco, California.
- *Private Organizations and Associations: Information Resources for Education*, the Consortium of Associations for Educational Dissemination, 1815 N. Lynn Street, Suite 1000, Arlington, Virginia.

The fourth edition, published in 1980, was printed in limited supply for distribution to members of the RDx Exchange.

Format of the Fifth Edition

Section I, Databases, contains one-page descriptions and sample records for twelve education databases and three multidisciplinary databases pertinent to education; other selected databases considered relevant to education are announced with brief annotations.

Databases in the latter group are not necessarily less important. The choice of database(s) to search depends on the information needs of the client. The new format of this section provides an awareness of many databases currently available that are useful to educators. In a reference volume that is both compact and inexpensive. Comprehensive and detailed coverage of databases needed by online searchers is made available by commercial publishers and online vendors. Consult the list of references in the back of this volume for titles of such publications.

Procedures

Organizations (database producers and clearinghouses) listed in the previous edition were sent a copy of their profile and asked to update it. Organizations identified by project staff as candidates for inclusion were asked to write a profile following guidelines and a sample format. All profiles were edited for consistency in style and, in some cases, length of entry. The information contained in the profiles was provided or verified by the organization as of the date indicated. Organizations not responsive to the first contact or follow-up telephone call were not included. The brief annotations of databases were adapted from previous editions of this publication or from published sources not under copyright. The subject index was developed using descriptors from the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors* (9th ed.), 1982.

Twelve education and three multidisciplinary databases were selected for a one-page profile and display of a sample record. The sample record resulted, where possible, from a search for information on microcomputers.

Clearinghouses

Section II, Clearinghouses, contains one-page summaries of clearinghouses of interest to educators. The term clearinghouse refers to any organization or project that acquires and

disseminates specialized information resources. Sixty-four clearinghouses have been selected for inclusion. Many subjects are covered by the clearinghouses, including bilingual education, child abuse, disabilities, mastery learning, vocational education, and women's sports.

Activities performed by the clearinghouses include collecting, organizing, and disseminating resource information; responding to individual information requests; providing referral services and brokering requests for information and technical assistance; preparing of specialized bibliographies; and publishing of commissioned papers, research, and technical reports. Each clearinghouse offers publications or services that are available nationally.

Some clearinghouses produce databases that are described separately in the first section of this directory. Many also provide computer search services, and produce or repackage bibliographic publications on specialized topics from database references. Many of the clearinghouses are funded by the federal government in response to critical areas of concern to the nation's schools. Some of the clearinghouses listed in earlier editions are now defunct or no longer focus on information services. The information in this section is intended to assist educators in locating current resources on a variety of topics.

The information contained in this publication is accurate as of the date indicated at the bottom of each page. RRS verified the information, with the contact persons listed at the bottom of the individual summary pages. However, in this rapidly expanding field, the reader is cautioned that some of the information may be outdated by the time this publication is printed. AB Traditional computer-assisted instruction using drill and practice techniques has not been effective in teaching reading and language skills to children with communication handicaps such as deafness, autism, or cerebral palsy. Computer-based exploratory learning systems attempt to use childrens natural curiosity for educational goals. The Edison Responsive Environment, LOGO, and CARIS (Computer Animated Reading Instruction System) are three such systems. They involve such learning activities as commanding the computer to draw pictures or operate remote control toys. CARIS allows children to select words to form a sentence and then generates animated cartoons acting out the meaning of the sentence. Case studies of severely handicapped children using computer-based exploratory learning systems show that they eagerly involve themselves in the activities and demonstrate skills thought to be beyond their abilities. The rationale behind exploratory learning systems is the need to model normal communication development, in which language development is the product of communication. Such systems are also applicable to the communication problems of students with foreign language backgrounds. Fifteen references are appended. (RW).
