ABSTRACT

This manual is designed to provide communities and development workers in the developing world with information about some organizations that provide resources for use in rural developmental efforts. Discussed in the introductory section of the guide are the role of the development worker in Third World nations, types of resources, procedures for designing a project, guidelines for choosing appropriate resources, and basic steps in obtaining resources. The next chapter is an index chart consisting of an alphabetical list of organizations that includes information on the organization's region or country of operation, available resources, and field of activity. The next section is an alphabetical listing of organizations according to the country in which their main office is located. When available, each entry in this section contains information concerning the address, basic functions, selected activities, resources, and significant publications of each organization. Concluding the guide are a selected annotated bibliography on appropriate technology and an annotated list of useful periodicals for development workers. (MN)

1. Introduction

The aim of this manual is to provide communities and development workers in the developing world with information about some organizations that provide resources--who they are, where they can be found, and how they can be used to support community development projects.

One of the Peace Corps' fundamental assumptions is that development involves a building of capacity and self-reliance. In planning a project, locating the resources necessary to implement it, and carrying it through, members of a community gain the skills necessary to define and meet their own development needs. Learning what resources--human, informational, natural, material, technical and financial--are available to them, and determining those which are appropriate to the situation, will enable community members to create their own responses to the problems they face.

The resources required to meet a community need often can be found within the community itself, but at times the most appropriate resources for solving a problem have to come from outside the community. For example, building materials may have to be purchased from the capital city or technical advice may be available only from a government official at the district headquarters. Obtaining these resources from outside the community may seem contradictory to the principal of self-reliance and indeed there is a real danger of creating dependency whenever outside resources are used. A com-

munity can make the best use of what is available and minimize this danger by casting its resource net first at the local level, then regionally, and, only when resources close by have been exhausted, nationally and internationally.

Development does not take place in a vacuum. A village struggling to find ways to meet its needs for pure water, accessible health care, adequate nutrition, sufficient fuel and comfortable shelter can learn from the successes and failures of other communities which have tackled these problems in the past. Just as the community can draw upon the experience of others and use ideas, processes and technologies developed in previous projects to plan its own project, so that community can become a resource on which others can draw in the future. A community then becomes part of the information network by sharing the experience gained in a project with neighboring villages, the government, sponsoring organizations and other development workers and their communities. Peace Corps' Information Collection and Exchange (ICE) and the other organizations listed in this manual make the information available on a wider basis to others in the developing world.

The Role of the Development Worker

The role and responsibilities of the development worker will vary greatly from community to community, culture to culture and project to project. Just as a development project should evolve from the community's definition of its needs, it follows that the roles of the project participants, including those of the development worker, should evolve in a similar manner. In the early stages of a project, the development worker may be primarily an organizer, at a later stage a technical advisor, and still

later a trainer. Often the development worker's greatest role is that of a facilitator--helping the community recognize the resources that exist within itself and linking the community with the network of resources of which it is a part.

Development workers themselves are resources for their communities. The value of development workers is not only in what they know, but also how much they are willing to listen and apply that knowledge appropriately to help the community reach its goals. The successful development worker must understand that his or her knowledge and skills only represent a potential benefit. Unless they are adapted and applied in a manner consistent with the traditions and value of the community, they will be of little use, and unless they are transferred to members of the community, they will be of only temporary benefit:

Ultimately the most important service the development worker can provide is to impart skills to the members of the community in which he or she works. Examples of these skills include project planning, identification of resources and use of technology. A development project then becomes more than digging a well or building a road; it becomes a process by which the participants become more self-reliant, better able to recognize and use the resources available to them and better able to plan and implement future projects on their own.

Types of Resources

Resources may be classified as human, informational, natural, material, technical or financial. Each of these types of resources is available to some extent in every community.

Human resources are the people who participate in a development project. For the most part the residents of a community constitute the bulk of human resources available to a given project. Traditional village leaders are an important source of organizational skills and support. Village craftsmen, local shop owners, traditional midwives and farmers or fishermen often have valuable skills to offer. All members of the community have ideas, labor or other resources to contribute.

It is important not to overlook any segment of the population. The women, the very young and the very old can make significant contributions. Moreover, as part of the community they should be part of the project and their support is often critical to the success of the project.

People outside the community may also form part of the human resource: extension workers, technical advisers, regional or national government officials, missionaries, representatives of development agencies and others.

Informational resources are the ideas and data contained in books, reports, films, records and other media as well as the experiences of individuals and groups that may be passed by word of mouth. Such resources supplement the skills and abilities of individuals involved in projects and help them to select, develop and use other resources. Local government agencies, research stations and development organizations working in the area often are useful sources of information. Peace Corps ICE and many of the organizations listed in this manual also provide informational resources. The information these groups provide is often drawn from the contributions of communities and development workers in the field.

Natural resources are the physical, chemical and biological features in and around the community. These characteristics of the community's

environment include quantities of sunlight and wind; topographic features such as hills, valleys, flatlands, wetlands, watersheds, lakes, rivers and coastlines; surface water and groundwater; stone, clay and other building materials; minerals and soil; trees and other valuable plants and domestic as well as wild animals.

Many natural resources are, for all practical purposes, non-renewable. That is, once used or destroyed, they will not be replaced by natural processes for hundreds or even millions of years. These include stone and mineral ores, geologic water deposits, topographic features, topsoil, and forests. The community must plan to use these resources over the longest period possible, and must protect them against unwise or unnecessary depletion. If a community loses its topsoil to erosion, for example, it may take hundreds of years to replace each valuable inch.

Renewable natural resources such as water, plants and animals also require careful management or their rate of use can easily exceed their natural rate of recovery. That is, the community must constrain its use of trees, surface water, wild animals and other renewable resources to levels that are sustainable by natural processes.

Material resources are manufactured items such as tools, nails, or construction supplies, that are or can be made in the community using locally available materials. Someone from an industrialized society may overlook certain material resources because of their simplicity. A simple reed mat spread in the sun to dry crops for example, may be more suitable and cost-effective than other types of dryers.

Technical resources are the processes and means by which people make use of resources to accomplish a particular task. In the previous

example, sun-drying is a technology, as is a methane digester or an oxplow.

Any technology should be appropriate to the values and conditions of the community. When evaluating the appropriateness of a technology, the community must take into account the social, cultural and natural environment of the locale as well as the economic and engineering feasibility of the design. A bulldozer might clear a foundation for a school faster than forty men, but who will repair the bulldozer when it breaks down? Who will pay for the fuel to run it? Is it really preferable to employing (and involving) forty men who may gain new construction skills in the project? And what about the hens that won't lay because of the noise, or the inability of soils in the cleared area to support vegetation due to compaction and/or erosion?

A traditional technology that has stood the test of time usually has done so for a reason. This is not to say that new technologies will never be appropriate or an improvement on the old, only that what is more "advanced" or "modern" is not universally applicable. Technologies are not sacrosanct; an appropriate one can be made more appropriate. But it should be remembered that the best technology is the one that will actually work and continue to work in all conditions at the locality over an indefinite period of time.

Financial resources are money in the form of locally-raised funds, cash gifts, personal savings, development bank loans, foundation grants or other funds from donor groups. Of all resources these perhaps present the greatest difficulty. In particular, the risk of creating dependency on outside sources is significant when financial resources are needed.

Without exception, local funding sources should be tapped before

any attempt is made to request funding from outside the community. The likelihood of obtaining financial resources from outside sources is very low. The availability of such funds is limited and the competition is intense. There are usually many more projects than funds available to do them.

Time constraints sometimes make it necessary for a community to request funds far in advance of the time when they will be needed. The application process may be long and involved and the donor may require a lot from the community in terms of scheduling, budgeting and evaluation of the project. Planning to meet these requirements can be a very useful exercise for the community, but the process can be difficult and time-consuming, especially if the community is applying for the first time.

Finally, a community has no control over the circumstances which affect the flow of the outside money. Funds can be cut off at any moment, even after the money has been promised and the project started up. External funds, in short, are a dangerous variable which can just as easily undermine an effort as they can contribute to its success. Such funds should be a project's last resort.

There are often financial resources within the community that can be used. Fundraising activities such as carnivals or community gardens are very useful for generating small amounts of money. However, the possible benefit of these activities should be judged in light of the additional resources--time, energy, people, and skills--they will require, as well as the community involvement they might encourage.

A direct appeal to the community for funds is another possible approach. Success will depend in part on the amount of money needed, the

effectiveness of the appeal, the size and wealth of the community and how much the community wants the project.

Designing a Project

Designing a project is largely a matter of matching available resources to the needs of the community. Effectively marshalling the different types of resources to solve a particular problem requires a well-defined plan. The project design should lay out the course of the project from beginning to end, building in a certain amount of flexibility to allow for changes as the plan is implemented. It should also provide for evaluation, not only at the end of the project, but periodically throughout the process.

The answers to a few basic questions can provide the community with the elements it needs to design a project. The development worker can play a part in framing the questions the community must ask itself before beginning a project:

What problem is the project being designed to address? The more clearly the community is able to define the problem and its causes and consequences, the closer the project will come to solving that problem.

What is the primary objective of the project? Setting realistic, achievable goals is central to the success of a project. Planning a series of smaller projects, each with a limited objective, allows the community to build on past successes. Each objective met creates greater self-confidence and skill to be applied to the next project.

In describing the desired results of the project, it may also be useful to try to predict possible negative effects. For example, an irrigation project may lead to higher rice production, but also increase the incidence of schistosomiasis by providing a hospitable environment for the snail which transmits the disease. These potential negative effects must be weighed against the benefits of the project in deciding whether to go ahead with the idea.

How will this objective be reached? What steps must be taken to achieve the desired results? The project can be broken down into a series of steps or tasks which constitute the essence of the plan. They should be carefully scheduled in a logical sequence and be within the scope of the community's resources.

What resources will be needed to achieve the objective? The resources needed to reach the objective should be listed. What tools and materials will be required? Who will be involved in the project? Generally speaking, it is best to keep the number of outside resources to a minimum and to first engage the interest, cooperation and skills of the people who will benefit from the project. This is true of all types of resources: the more locally-based the better.

How will these resources be used? Identifying a resource is one thing; deciding the best way to use it is another. If the village allocates Resource A to Activity A, will there be any left for critical Activity B? Priorities must be set early so that resources are not depleted before the crucial stages of the project are reached.

How long will it take to complete the project? The timetable of a project is crucial for a number of reasons. The length of the project

will probably affect the cost. The timing will affect the availability of resources, especially those which tend to be seasonal. (It is particularly important to be aware of the restraints on people's time and availability. It is unrealistic to expect the community to provide labor for a construction project during the busy farming season, or to expect a government official to participate in a project meeting on a day's notice.) Adequate time should be allowed for requests for outside funding or information or for ordering certain materials. Ultimately, too, the timetable provides a framework for the completion of intermediate tasks and for evaluating progress.

What are the main obstacles to the project's success? Obstacles should be anticipated in the planning stage of the project and possible ways of overcoming them outlined so that undue delays don't occur at crucial times during the project. There may be legal restrictions on the community's ability to handle money from funding agencies or customs duties to be paid on imports. Contacts with the proper government agencies may take time to establish. Political or economic instability may make it difficult to get materials or support for the project. A long lead time may be required for ordering imported materials or applying for outside funding.

There may be a reluctance to participate in or support the project among some members of the community. Change involves a certain risk for villagers, and what seems like a small risk to a development worker may be a large one for a subsistence farmer. If the project has the support of the majority of the community members, they can help the others overcome this resistance to change.

It is important to remember that there is always more than one

way to achieve any objective. Alternative approaches to the problem the community has identified should be outlined and these questions asked. Once the community has evaluated several possible approaches in light of these questions, its members must determine which project best fits the circumstances. The community's task then becomes first to choose which resources are most appropriate for the particular project and second to devise a plan for obtaining them.

Guidelines for Choosing Appropriate Resources

The availability of a given resources does not mean that it can or should be used on a particular project. A community must often choose from among several available resources those that are most appropriate for a project. Appropriate resources should:

- Bring about greater community involvement in the project. The use of the individual resources of key people in the village will increase community interest and participation in the project.
- Be available locally. Imported materials, outside funding and foreign advisers all can leave dependency in their wake. Using local resources provides the community with a chance to develop its own initiative, increase local participation and build community self-confidence and economic strength. Essential equipment that must be purchased from outside the community should be designed so that it can be repaired locally and replaced easily.
- Use appropriate technology. Projects should maximize the use of locally available technologies and technical skills.

- Be culturally acceptable. Projects should respect and build on the cultural strengths of the community.
- Be ecologically sound. Projects should allow for the long-term sustainable use of resources and should not be detrimental to the natural environment.

Basic Steps in Obtaining Resources

Once the community has decided what resources are needed, it must determine where the resources will come from. It is the community that wants the resources, so it should be the community that asks for them. The development worker can help the community formulate its requests and suggest organizations to contact, but the requests should come from the community. This is part of the process of skill transfer from the development worker to the people he or she works with. If the community members themselves make the request, they will gain experience and form contacts which will be useful to them in the future.

It has been said before that a community should begin by casting its resource net close to home. The more local the sponsorship and backing of the project, the greater the commitment of the backers. The more local the resource, the more likely it is to meet the guidelines of appropriateness set forth earlier. Once local resources have been exhausted, the community can then proceed to more remote sources with a clear idea of what is needed. For example, a community may decide it needs \$2,000 to buy cement to line several wells in the village. The community leaders begin by organizing a fundraising dance which yields \$250. They

then approach the district council for assistance from the district development fund. They obtain another \$250. An appeal to the national community development service yields another \$500. When the village leaders finally apply to an international organization for the remainder, their own commitment has been amply demonstrated and they can show that they have exhausted all other possibilities. The international organization then may provide the additional funding.

The checklist which follows outlines the basic steps in obtaining resources and it can be applied to each kind of resource--human, informational, etc.--in turn.

1. What resources are needed? Resources should be listed for each task that must be accomplished to complete the project.

2. When is the resource needed? The timetable outlined for the project earlier will allow the community to line up each resource ahead of time. This is essential if the project is to be completed without delay.

3. Is each resource available locally, regionally, nationally or internationally? Beginning locally, each level should be exhausted before proceeding to the next. The more remote the source of the goods or services, the greater the chances of their being late, costly, inappropriate or addictive.

4. What organizations or individuals can provide the resources at each level? The community members will already be aware of many resource groups and individuals which exist locally. The development worker can often be helpful in identifying less obvious local and outside

organizations and individuals which could provide assistance.

5. How do you obtain the resource? Is an application or personal visit required? Are there legal or other requirements that must be met?

6. Does the project timetable allow enough time to obtain the resource? Some material or financial resources may take time to obtain, and human resources may have limited amounts of time to contribute to the project.

7. Will the resource have to be adapted for the project or the community? Some technological designs may have to be adapted to suit local conditions. Informational resources may have to be translated into local languages.

The resource checklist is the final stage in planning a project. At this point, the development worker has helped the community identify a project design, determined the appropriate resources needed to accomplish it, and outlined how it will go about obtaining these resources. The community is now ready to begin the work of making the project design a reality.

2. A Guide to the Manual

This manual is a working document which includes some of the major organizations involved in self-help efforts in the developing world. It is anticipated that the development worker will be able to tap these organizations for resources during the course of his or her tour. We ask that you inform ICE about organizations active in your area that are either not listed here or are inaccurately portrayed. Additions and revisions from the field are welcome and will be published in the ICE Almanac (a supplement to the Peace Corps Times) bimonthly. Peace Corps libraries and resource centers will be able to update their looseleaf versions of this manual periodically, based on information in the Almanac.

This directory is not a comprehensive document. Further information regarding U.S.-based organizations providing development assistance on a country-specific basis may be found in the Technical Assistance Information Clearing House (TAICH) country report series. The TAICH also publishes listings of organizations by specialized focus, e.g., medicine and public health. Additional sources of ~~information include the National Council for~~ International Health which publishes a directory of U.S.-based agencies involved in international health assistance, and Voluntary Foreign Aid Programs-- Report of American Voluntary Agencies Engaged in Overseas Relief and Development, published by the Agency for International Development.

The directory is divided into two sections, the Index Chart and the List of Organizations.

The Index Chart

The Index Chart provides an easy reference list and summary of all the organizations contained in the manual. The Chart enables the user to identify those organizations he or she may be interested in contacting for resources. The Chart is set out in columns as follows:

Column 1-Page: The page listed in this column provides complete information on the organization.

Column 2-Region/Country of Operation: This column identifies the region or country in which the organization operates. Regions of operation are broken down as follows:

Column 3-Name of Organization
