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ABSTRACT

The latest in a series of publications celebrating the bicentennial of American independence, this annotated bibliography lists the Library of Congress holdings concerning America during the Revolutionary War. Listed are the Library's most important primary and secondary sources, including books, manuscripts, serials, maps, and atlases. There are 12 chapters (the first 9 in Volume 1, the rest in Volume 2) as follows: (1) Research Aids; (2) General Studies--Regional, State and Local; (3) The British Empire and the American Revolution; (4) The Colonies on the Eve of Independence; (5) The West during the Revolutionary Era; (6) The War for Independence, 1775-1783; (7) The Loyalists in America and in Exile; (8) Diplomacy and Other International Aspects of the Revolution; (9) The Confederation and the Consolidation of the Revolution in the States; (10) the Making of the Constitution; (11) Economic, Social, and Intellectual Life in Revolutionary America; and (12) Biographies and Personal Primary Sources. Also included is an essay, "The Preservation and Publication of Documentary Sources on the Revolution." Concluding the publication are an index and a listing of Advisory Committee names. (RM)

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PREACE

SINCE ITS ESTABLISHMENT in 1800 the Library of Congress has become, through purchase, copyright deposit, exchanges, the acquisition of special collections, and the donations of benefactors, the largest repository of Americana in the world. As the Bicentennial of American independence approached, the Library began to plan a publication program that would reveal the breadth of its resources for the study of one of the major events in the American experience. When Congress approved the Library's general plan in 1968, several historians, all specialists in early American history, were added to the staff. Their task was to prepare guides to original sources, bibliographies, facsimile reproductions of historic prints and documents, exhibits, and other special programs. Since then, more than two dozen volumes have been published, among them *Manuscript Sources in the Library of Congress for Research on the American Revolution* (1975), *The American Revolution in Drawings and Prints; a Checklist of 1765-1790 Graphics in the Library of Congress* (1975), and *Maps and Charts of North America and the West Indies, 1750-1789; a Guide to the Collections in the Library of Congress* (1981).

Revolutionary America, 1763-1789: a Bibliography is a guide to the more important printed primary and secondary works in the Library's collections. Compiled over a ten-year period, the bibliography represents a comprehensive review of monographs, doctoral dissertations, collected works, festschriften, pamphlets, and serial publications in both general and special collections. It is intended to serve a wide audience, whether professional historians seeking new fields of inquiry, students examining various aspects of the Revolution for the first time, or librarians, journalists, and other interested readers searching for specific information on a limited topic. Because the Revolution has been variously treated as the culmination of the colonial experience, as the beginning of American national life, and as an event to be compared instructively with other revolutionary movements of the modern era, the selection policy was designed to encompass as many interests, needs, and approaches as space permitted. To introduce the user to the preserva-

tion and publication programs that have served as the bedrock of twentieth-century historiography, the compiler has included, at the end of volume 2, an essay entitled "The Preservation and Publication of Documentary Sources on the Revolution," which contains more than four hundred cross references to the major series of published primary sources listed in the bibliography. When compilation began, it was decided to include only materials published through December 1972. The establishment of a firm cutoff date ensured that the search and annotation procedures would not be interrupted by the continued need to update the files and that the user would have a well-defined starting point for further bibliographic investigation. Moreover, it was felt that the literature produced during the Bicentennial era would be voluminous and discrete enough to merit a separate publication.

SEARCH AND SELECTION PROCEDURES. To be certain that *Revolutionary America* would reflect accurately the Library's holdings, a three-year search of LC catalogs and bibliographies was undertaken, and two thirty-six-thousand-card working files (main entry and subject) were assembled. The compiler and staff members of the Bibliography Section reviewed thousands of trays or cards under appropriate subject headings in the Main Catalog, by classification categories from A to Z in the LC Shelflist, and through a variety of approaches in the special collection catalogs of the Law Library, Local History and Genealogy Reading Room, Geography and Map Division, Rare Book Collection, and Microform Reading Room. Library of Congress card stock was ordered for all potential entries selected. For doctoral dissertations, the staff surveyed and typed nearly two thousand cards for likely entries in Warren F. Kuehl's *Dissertations in History* (entry 520) and *Dissertation Abstracts International* and its antecedents (entry 519). The assembled files were then compared with listings in more than two hundred published bibliographies in the Library's collections, such as the *Writings on American History* (entry 63), that touch on some

phase of the American Revolution. Nearly fifteen thousand cards for additional monographs, pamphlets, and especially periodical articles were typed during the process. After the amassed subject file was arranged by call number, a four-year shelf search was undertaken to discover new material not identified in the review of catalogs and bibliographies, to verify the accuracy of the available bibliographic information, and to identify those entries that required annotation. During the process, 910 serials were sampled or searched volume by volume for relevant citations. Final selections were made from well over one hundred thousand separate items reviewed by the compiler and staff. Criteria such as research value, uniqueness of coverage, and historiographical significance were employed in making the selections. As compiled, *Revolutionary America* lists more than twenty thousand titles in 14,810 numbered entries.

Before the search and selection procedure began, certain exceptions were made in the coverage of material. Most of these relate to eighteenth-century publications. Given the large number of contemporary pamphlets, tracts, and broadsides in the Rare Book and Special Collections Division (over seven thousand for the period 1763-89) and the availability of comprehensive guides to eighteenth-century imprints (see entries 358 and 365), only about five hundred pamphlets of advocacy that were important in shaping political and constitutional thought during the Revolution were included. Second, because most early state records have been microfilmed (see entry 616), the bound journals, minutes, and proceedings or the session laws of the colonial and state assemblies, councils, and senates in the collections of the Rare Book and Special Collections Division and the Law Library were also excluded. The same was true of the eighteenth-century newspapers in the Serial and Government Publications Division and the rare book collection. A checklist of eighteenth-century newspapers at the Library of Congress (entry 470) was already available, and most early American newspapers have been widely distributed on either microfilm or microcard (see entry 471).

ARRANGEMENT OF ENTRIES. The arrangement of entries into twelve topical-chronological chapters is relatively straightforward. As the table of contents indicates, a listing of bibliographies, guides to eighteenth-century imprints and manuscript collections, and maps, atlases, and geographical aids serves as a starting point for inquirers. All general studies of the Revolutionary period, whether historiographical or

narrative, are grouped together in chapter 2. Since the writing of purely local history has passed out of fashion in the past half-century, information about Revolutionary events in many regions, counties, and towns can be found only in the local histories that appeared in great number between the Civil War and the First World War. These are arranged by place rather than author under each of the states from Maine to Georgia. Works that focus on Great Britain and the empire during the Revolutionary era, especially the imperial connection between the mother country and the North American and Caribbean colonies, can be found in chapter 3. The first of the chronological chapters, chapter 4 treats pre-Revolutionary events up to the Declaration of Independence. Chapters 6, 9, and 10 continue the sequence, dealing in detail with the War of Independence, the establishment of revolutionary governments in the states, the efforts of the Continental Congress to respond to events during the Confederation period, and the drafting and ratification of the Constitution. Works on the frontier and early developments in the territories of the Old Northwest and the Old Southwest are located in chapter 5, while studies of the Loyalists in the colonies and later in Canada, Great Britain, and the West Indies are in chapter 7. Although many treatments of Revolutionary diplomacy and international relations are linked directly to wartime events or internal politics in Europe and America, they are grouped together with general diplomatic histories in chapter 8. Chapter 11 includes material on nearly all aspects of Revolutionary life and culture, such as commerce and shipping, money and finance, slavery, law and legal institutions, demography, ethnic groups, religion, education, science, medicine, literature, and the fine arts. Chapter 12, which contains one-third of the titles in the bibliography, is a unique listing of works by and about 2,138 participants in the Revolutionary struggle. One of its notable features is a system of cross references in the headnotes to those persons for whom there is a biographical sketch in the *Dictionary of American Biography* (entry 12577), the *Dictionary of National Biography* (entry 12655), or both. The headnotes themselves were compiled primarily to identify the subjects by their geographical locations, occupations, and activities, and to provide terms that would make them more accessible through the index.

Under the topical headings in each chapter, entries are arranged alphabetically by author and title. Exceptions to this format occur in chapters 2 and 12. Because most users searching for regional and local histories

would be more likely to know the place names than the names of the authors, the secondary works in chapter 2, "Regional, State, and Local Histories and General Document Collections," are arranged alphabetically by the name of the region, county, parish, or town given in the title. In chapter 12, entries under the name of each individual figure are divided into two categories. Works written by the subject are listed first and are arranged alphabetically by title. Biographical studies about the subject are listed second and are arranged alphabetically by author.

CONSTRUCTION OF ENTRIES AND BIBLIOGRAPHIC STYLE. Entries in the bibliography are constructed according to the general rules established in *Bibliographical Procedures & Style; a Manual for Bibliographers in the Library of Congress* (Washington, 1954), as modified to accord with the 1967 *Anglo-American Cataloging Rules*. The purpose of this bibliographic style is to provide references that can be readily identified in Library of Congress catalogs and, by extension, in the many other institutions throughout the United States where Library of Congress catalog cards are used and where the Library's published catalogs are available. Authors' names are based on the form in which the Library's catalogers have established them. Long titles, particularly in eighteenth-century pamphlet literature, have frequently been shortened by the omission of subtitles or repetitious wording. The form of the publisher's name in imprints follows in general the practices recommended in the 1967 *Anglo-American Cataloging Rules*. In describing pagination, references to preliminary pages numbering fewer than five have been omitted. Call numbers have been included as a further aid to exact identification. Items in the Library's collections that were uncataloged at the time of compilation are indicated by the symbol DLC. Although many reprint notes have been included, no attempt was made to provide comprehensive coverage. The user should refer to the *Guide to Reprints* and other standard bibliographic sources for fuller or more recent information.

Brackets have been used in bibliographic entries to indicate information supplied by catalogers and bibliographers that does not appear on the recto of the title page or in the body of the work. For example, if the author of an anonymous or pseudonymous eighteenth-century pamphlet has been identified, the name, enclosed in brackets, will precede the title. Brackets have also been commonly used around series information or dates of publication not found on the

title page. In this bibliography bracketed call numbers indicate that the work cited is no longer available in printed form in the Library's collections but has been replaced by microfilm or microfiche. The Microform Reading Room call number invariably follows such a bracketed classification number. Finally, pagination figures derived from a source such as *Dissertation Abstracts International*, which is known to combine separately paged sections of the work it described, have also been placed in brackets.

ANNOTATIONS. Both bibliographic and descriptive annotations have been written to aid users in determining which works may best meet their needs. Because of the limitations of time and space, annotations were restricted to studies of unquestionable historiographic significance, to representative monographs or articles that provide a broad treatment of a particular subject, to interpretive works that present a unique point of view, and to studies with unclear or misleading titles. Annotations were also supplied to explain how works covering a far broader period are useful for the study of some phase of the Revolution. Slightly more than 40 percent of the entries in chapters 1-11 received annotations ranging in length from a single sentence to several paragraphs. Most often they were restricted to 125 words or less. These annotations and notes were not written as reviews; they are more nearly abstracts intended to reflect the author's own opinion or approach. To avoid the use of extensive quotations, they are in many cases a paraphrase of the author's words. The length of the annotation bears no direct relationship to the importance of the work annotated. The content of well-known studies may be self-evident, while less conspicuous books or articles may require more detailed description to place them in proper relation to the subject or subjects with which they deal.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS. Throughout the preparation of this bibliography, the compiler benefited from the experience and knowledge of other Library of Congress staff members, especially those in the Shelving Section of the Subject Catalog Division, the Rare Book and Special Collections Division, the Law Library, the Geography and Map Division, the Manuscript Division, the Microform Reading Room, and the Loan Division. Within the General Reading Rooms Division itself (formerly the General Reference and Bibliography Division), many members of the staff, who were either permanently or temporarily

CHAPTER ONE

Research Aids

BIBLIOGRAPHIES AND REFERENCE WORKS

BIBLIOGRAPHIC CONTROL of the books, periodicals, government documents, manuscripts, and maps available for the study of the American Revolution is fragmentary at best. What is more, research aids containing references to the Revolutionary era normally cover much broader periods, subjects, and interests. Because of the uneven quality of existing research tools and the difficulty in determining individual research needs, it was considered advisable to include in this chapter a number of general works more useful to the beginning student than to the specialist and as likely to be found in the collections of the college or public library of moderate size as in the collections of the large research library.

The arrangement of entries proceeds from the general to the particular; from larger geographic areas to smaller. Union catalogs of manuscript collections, for example, are listed before guides to single depositories. For additional leads to bibliographic sources, one should consult the footnotes or listings in specialized monographs, doctoral dissertations, and articles in the remaining chapters. The bibliographies of local history in chapter 1, for instance, may be supplemented by references included in state, county, and town histories in chapter 2. Many of the subject bibliographies may be similarly augmented by citations in secondary works in later chapters: Biography and Genealogy in chapter 12, Diplomacy in chapter 8, Military and Naval in chapter 6, and Religion in chapter 11.

The section on the Revolution in volume 4 includes a six-page essay on its causes and conclusion, as well as shorter treatments of diplomacy, finance, the army and navy, Revolutionary committees, profiteering, and military campaigns. More information on topics from the period 1763-89 appears under headings scattered throughout the work. The entry for the Revolution in the index volume contains numerous citations under such sub-headings as Funding of the Debt, Indians, Distribution of Wealth, Enlistments, and Mobilization of the Army. The editor and his staff also prepared a one-volume *Concise Dictionary of American History* (New York, C. Scribner's Sons [1962] 1156 p.).

For various regions special dictionaries have been compiled. *A Dictionary of American English on Historical Principles* (Chicago, University of Chicago Press [1938-44] 4 v. (2552 p.) PE2835.C72), edited by Sir William A. Craigie and James R. Hulbert, concentrates on those features that distinguish the English of the American colonies and the United States from that of England and the rest of the English-speaking world. Included are the names of plants, trees, and animals, and special terms from the fields of geography, medicine, law, business, education, and the like. Andrews and Davenport arrange the entries according to collection and depository and note briefly the history, scope, and content of the relevant material found at each institution. Based upon their personal searches, they describe the manuscripts individually, providing the identification number, date, and names of signatories, plus a synopsis of the content of each document. Of the more important guides published thereafter, the *Index to the Additional Manuscripts . . . Annual accessions lists of manuscripts, broadsides, and British transcripts acquired by the division were included as appendixes to the reports for the years 1900/1901-1919/20, issued separately (Washington, Govt. Both compilers divide the entries according to six periods of American history, very briefly identify the principal, indicate the scope, content, and size of the collections, and provide an index.

Since no single published source describes all of the Library's manuscript holdings for a given historical period, the staff of its American Revolution Bicentennial Office has prepared a comprehensive guide to manuscripts and reproductions from the Revolutionary era. "The *Atlantic Neptune* was the first great marine atlas of views and charts covering the east coast of North America from the St. Lawrence River southward to the Mississippi River. . . . In many instances the charts were the earliest published detailed surveys of the areas shown and were of such a quality that they were in general use as the standard charts of the east coast for over fifty years. . . . [The atlas] is divided into four series: Nova Scotia, New England, the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence, [and] New York southward. . . . The original charts and views from which these plates have been reproduced are in the collection of Augustus P. Loring."

The *Neptune* was based largely upon the surveys conducted under Des Barres' direction between 1764 and 1775. During the Revolution he supervised a staff of over 20 specialists, at his London headquarters, in compiling from the survey data some 250 charts and in engraving copper plates to reproduce them. These charts were used extensively by the British Navy during the later years of the war. Because bound volumes of the *Neptune* were usually assembled according to the order of a particular ship's captain, no two extant volumes are identical in content. Moreover, the revision of individual charts ensured even greater variation among subsequent volumes. The noted collector Henry N. Stevens has identified upwards of 800 separate states of the original charts—see his *Catalogue of the Henry Newton Stevens Collection of the Atlantic Neptune, Together With a Concise Bibliographical Description of Every Chart, View and Leaf of Text Contained Therein, as Also of Certain Other States Observed Elsewhere*, corr., rev. & augm. by Henry Stevens (London, H. CHAPTER TWO

General Studies; Regional, State, and Local

This chapter includes those general primary and secondary works that do not fall within a specific topico-chronological category and local histories that are not confined to a particular event or subject.

HISTORIOGRAPHY

IT HAS BECOME a commonplace that each generation reinterprets the past. For the American Revolution this statement is especially appropriate. No two scholars working independently and using the same sources have reached identical conclusions regarding the causes and consequences of the Revolution. Patriot and Loyalist views were substantially recast by 19th-century nationalist historians such as George Bancroft and John Fiske. Their interpretations, in turn, have been challenged in the 20th century by the writings of the imperial, Namierite, progressive, and neo-Whig schools (see the introduction to *Periodical Literature on the American Revolution: Historical Research and Changing Interpretations, 1895-1970*, entry 48). Fortunately, the path of Revolutionary historiography has been well charted in historiographical essays, collections of selected writings, and biographies of historians, many of which are listed in this section. It should be pointed out, however, that only general treatments appear here. Historiographical writings concerning particular aspects of the Revolution, such as the Stamp Act crisis, western settlement, military affairs, loyalism, diplomacy, or the Constitution, will be found in the appropriate subject chapters.

CHAPTER THREE

The British Empire and the American Revolution

THE EMPHASIS in this chapter is on British politics and the formation of imperial policy as it affected the American colonies. Only more general works are included for other aspects of British life such as agriculture and internal trade or fine arts and aesthetics. Moreover, works on the implementation of British

policy in the mainland colonies, the role of British arms in the Revolutionary War, the flight of the American Loyalists within the empire, and Anglo-American diplomatic relations during and after the war will appear in chapters 4, 6, 7, and 8, respectively.

In 1771, for example, proceedings in Parliament were made public for the first time as a result of pressure from the public and the press. By 1775 the voice of the opposition had been so strengthened by the London press, which reflected radical sympathy for the American cause, that even the crown was compelled to respond to public opinion.

In his study of the composition and political attitudes of the population, the nature of the provincial administration, and the implementation of British imperial policies in Quebec from 1760 to 1775, the author concludes that Americans erroneously linked the Quebec Act with the so-called Coercive Acts, despite the fact that all its important provisions had been decided upon before 1770, and none was significantly affected by conditions in colonies other than Quebec. On the other hand, British officials misjudged the Canadian temper in drafting the act, and the restoration of the French feudal system in Quebec, while pleasing to the clergy and old ruling classes, fostered opposition among the bourgeoisie and the *habitants* or common people who thus became more susceptible to revolutionary arguments. Canada, he adds, remained in the empire only because of the vigor and ability of its English defenders and the mismanagement of the American offensive. CHAPTER FOUR

The Colonies on the Eve of Independence: From Resistance to Rebellion

THE FOCUS of this chapter is the state of the mainland colonies within the old empire, their constitutional and political histories to 1775, and their responses to British legislation from the Pistole Fee controversy to the Coercive Acts. Works on the First and Second Continental congresses and the Declaration of Independence, the symbolic end to British rule, are

included in this chapter, but those studies that treat the transition from colonial to state government, especially the formation of extra-legal committees and conventions after 1774, are in chapter 9. Works on legal, economic, and social affairs during the provincial period will be found in chapter 11.

Convinced of the historical reality of these arguments, American leaders adopted political, constitutional, and even moral positions that transformed a rebellion into a revolution.

Woodard concludes that the increasing accumulation of capital, pressure of financial problems, colonial wars, and boundary disputes were important factors in the decline of the proprietorship system.

Beginning with the Stamp Act crisis, the issues raised by British policy and the activities of land speculators, especially the eastern-based Susquehanna Company, solidified the factions into opposing Conservative and Whig parties who vied for control of government. When the death of the ex-Governor Thomas Fitch in 1774 left the Conservatives leaderless, their opposition to the Whigs declined rapidly, leaving only a small group of Tories to contest radical control.

He had sponsored no reform save royal government and, intending to avoid factions, had led a discredited one. Franklin's image as a venerable scientist-philosopher, however, remained unsullied.

CHAPTER FIVE

The West During the Revolutionary Era

THE FRONTIER REGION that had been partially settled before the American Revolution was later dubbed the Old West by Frederick Jackson Turner. Stretching from New England to Georgia, the frontier cut across present-day geopolitical boundaries and included the backcountry of New England, the Mohawk Valley of New York, the Susquehanna River valley and western portion of Pennsylvania, the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia, and the southern backcountry beyond the

fall line. Material found in this chapter under Northern Frontier and Southern Frontier, therefore, should be supplemented with the appropriate regional, state, and local studies in chapter 2. Works that are specifically directed toward a western phase of the Revolutionary War, such as Sullivan's Indian Campaign or Clark's expedition against Detroit, will be found in chapter 6.

Political maneuvering within the Chatham ministry caused elements of all three plans to be implemented, making a "chaos" of western policy until 1773-74 when the North ministry belatedly attempted to assert imperial authority over at least part of the Mississippi Valley through the Quebec Act. The revolutionary impulse, according to Alvord, was attributable at least in part to "British muddling" in the West.

Viewing the first constitution from the vantage point of those who wrote it, the author finds that the greatest change that occurred between 1776 and 1787 was not in ideas or attitudes but in the distribution of power. Forced by events to accept independence, the conservative remnants of the old ruling class demanded a strong central government that would serve as a bulwark against internal revolution, aid the merchant class, and control western lands. Their desires were overridden, however, by democratic radicals who created a "league of sovereignties" under the Articles designed to prevent the national government from infringing upon the rights of the states. 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PREFACE

SINCE ITS ESTABLISHMENT in 1800 the Library of Congress has become, through purchase, copyright deposit, exchanges, the acquisition of special collections, and the donations of benefactors, the largest repository of Americana in the world. As the Bicentennial of American independence approached, the Library began to plan a publication program that would reveal the breadth of its resources for the study of one of the major events in the American experience. When Congress approved the Library's general plan in 1968, several historians, all specialists in early American history, were added to the staff. Their task was to prepare guides to original sources, bibliographies, facsimile reproductions of historic prints and documents, exhibits, and other special programs. Since then, more than two dozen volumes have been published, among them *Manuscript Sources in the Library of Congress for Research on the American Revolution* (1975), *The American Revolution in Drawings and Prints; a Checklist of 1765-1790 Graphics in the Library of Congress* (1975), and *Maps and Charts of North America and the West Indies, 1750-1789; a Guide to the Collections in the Library of Congress* (1981).

Revolutionary America, 1763-1789; a Bibliography is a guide to the more important printed primary and secondary works in the Library's collections. Compiled over a ten-year period, the bibliography represents a comprehensive review of monographs, doctoral dissertations, collected works, festschriften, pamphlets, and serial publications in both general and special collections. It is intended to serve a wide audience, whether professional historians seeking new fields of inquiry, students examining various aspects of the Revolution for the first time, or librarians, journalists, and other interested readers searching for specific information on a limited topic. Because the Revolution has been variously treated as the culmination of the colonial experience, as the beginning of American national life, and as an event to be compared instructively with other revolutionary movements of the modern era, the selection policy was designed to encompass as many interests, needs, and approaches as space permitted. To introduce the user to the preserva-

tion and publication programs that have served as the bedrock of twentieth-century historiography, the compiler has included, at the end of volume 2, an essay entitled "The Preservation and Publication of Documentary Sources on the Revolution," which contains more than four hundred cross references to the major series of published primary sources listed in the bibliography. When compilation began, it was decided to include only materials published through December 1972. The establishment of a firm cutoff date ensured that the search and annotation procedures would not be interrupted by the continued need to update the files and that the user would have a well-defined starting point for further bibliographic investigation. Moreover, it was felt that the literature produced during the Bicentennial era would be voluminous and discrete enough to merit a separate publication.

SEARCH AND SELECTION PROCEDURES. To be certain that *Revolutionary America* would reflect accurately the Library's holdings, a three-year search of LC catalogs and bibliographies was undertaken, and two thirty-six-thousand-card working files (main entry and subject) were assembled. The compiler and staff members of the Bibliography Section reviewed thousands of trays of cards under appropriate subject headings in the Main Catalog, by classification categories from A to Z in the LC Shelflist, and through a variety of approaches in the special collection catalogs of the Law Library, Local History and Genealogy Reading Room, Geography and Map Division, Rare Book Collection, and Microform Reading Room. Library of Congress card stock was ordered for all potential entries selected. For doctoral dissertations, the staff surveyed and typed nearly two thousand cards for likely entries in Warren F. Kuehl's *Dissertations in History* (entry 520) and *Dissertation Abstracts International* and its antecedents (entry 519). The assembled files were then compared with listings in more than two hundred published bibliographies in the Library's collections, such as the *Writings on American History* (entry 63), that touch on some

phase of the American Revolution. Nearly fifteen thousand cards for additional monographs, pamphlets, and especially periodical articles were typed during the process. After the amassed subject file was arranged by call number, a four-year shelf search was undertaken to discover new material not identified in the review of catalogs and bibliographies, to verify the accuracy of the available bibliographic information, and to identify those entries that required annotation. During the process, 910 serials were sampled or searched volume by volume for relevant citations. Final selections were made from well over one hundred thousand separate items reviewed by the compiler and staff. Criteria such as research value, uniqueness of coverage, and historiographical significance were employed in making the selections. As compiled, *Revolutionary America* lists more than twenty thousand titles in 14,810 numbered entries.

Before the search and selection procedure began, certain exceptions were made in the coverage of material. Most of these relate to eighteenth-century publications. Given the large number of contemporary pamphlets, tracts, and broadsides in the Rare Book and Special Collections Division (over seven thousand for the period 1763-89) and the availability of comprehensive guides to eighteenth-century imprints (see entries 358 and 365), only about five hundred pamphlets of advocacy that were important in shaping political and constitutional thought during the Revolution were included. Second, because most early state records have been microfilmed (see entry 616), the bound journals, minutes, and proceedings or the session laws of the colonial and state assemblies, councils, and senates in the collections of the Rare Book and Special Collections Division and the Law Library were also excluded. The same was true of the eighteenth-century newspapers in the Serial and Government Publications Division and the rare book collection. A checklist of eighteenth-century newspapers at the Library of Congress (entry 470) was already available, and most early American newspapers have been widely distributed on either microfilm or microcard (see entry 471).

ARRANGEMENT OF ENTRIES. The arrangement of entries into twelve topical-chronological chapters is relatively straightforward. As the table of contents indicates, a listing of bibliographies, guides to eighteenth-century imprints and manuscript collections, and maps, atlases, and geographical aids serves as a starting point for inquirers. All general studies of the Revolutionary period, whether historiographical or

narrative, are grouped together in chapter 2. Since the writing of purely local history has passed out of fashion in the past half-century, information about Revolutionary events in many regions, counties, and towns can be found only in the local histories that appeared in great number between the Civil War and the First World War. These are arranged by place rather than author under each of the states from Maine to Georgia. Works that focus on Great Britain and the empire during the Revolutionary era, especially the imperial connection between the mother country and the North American and Caribbean colonies, can be found in chapter 3. The first of the chronological chapters, chapter 4 treats pre-Revolutionary events up to the Declaration of Independence. Chapters 6, 9, and 10 continue the sequence, dealing in detail with the War of Independence, the establishment of revolutionary governments in the states, the efforts of the Continental Congress to respond to events during the Confederation period, and the drafting and ratification of the Constitution. Works on the frontier and early developments in the territories of the Old Northwest and the Old Southwest are located in chapter 5, while studies of the Loyalists in the colonies and later in Canada, Great Britain, and the West Indies are in chapter 7. Although many treatments of Revolutionary diplomacy and international relations are linked directly to wartime events or internal politics in Europe and America, they are grouped together with general diplomatic histories in chapter 8. Chapter 11 includes material on nearly all aspects of Revolutionary life and culture, such as commerce and shipping, money and finance, slavery, law and legal institutions, demography, ethnic groups, religion, education, science, medicine, literature, and the fine arts. Chapter 12, which contains one-third of the titles in the bibliography, is a unique listing of works by and about 2,138 participants in the Revolutionary struggle. One of its notable features is a system of cross references in the headnotes to those persons for whom there is a biographical sketch in the *Dictionary of American Biography* (entry 12577), the *Dictionary of National Biography* (entry 12655), or both. The headnotes themselves were compiled primarily to identify the subjects by their geographical locations, occupations, and activities, and to provide terms that would make them more accessible through the index.

Under the topical headings in each chapter, entries are arranged alphabetically by author and title. Exceptions to this format occur in chapters 2 and 12. Because most users searching for regional and local histories

would be more likely to know the place names than the names of the authors, the secondary works in chapter 2, "Regional, State, and Local Histories and General Document Collections," are arranged alphabetically by the name of the region, county, parish, or town given in the title. In chapter 12, entries under the name of each individual figure are divided into two categories. Works written by the subject are listed first and are arranged alphabetically by title. Biographical studies about the subject are listed second and are arranged alphabetically by author.

CONSTRUCTION OF ENTRIES AND BIBLIOGRAPHIC STYLE. Entries in the bibliography are constructed according to the general rules established in *Bibliographical Procedures & Style; a Manual for Bibliographers in the Library of Congress* (Washington, 1954), as modified to accord with the 1967 *Anglo-American Cataloging Rules*. The purpose of this bibliographic style is to provide references that can be readily identified in Library of Congress catalogs and, by extension, in the many other institutions throughout the United States where Library of Congress catalog cards are used and where the Library's published catalogs are available. Authors' names are based on the form in which the Library's catalogers have established them. Long titles, particularly in eighteenth-century pamphlet literature, have frequently been shortened by the omission of subtitles or repetitious wording. The form of the publisher's name in imprints follows in general the practices recommended in the 1967 *Anglo-American Cataloging Rules*. In describing pagination, references to preliminary pages numbering fewer than five have been omitted. Call numbers have been included as a further aid to exact identification. Items in the Library's collections that were uncataloged at the time of compilation are indicated by the symbol D.I.C. Although many reprint notes have been included, no attempt was made to provide comprehensive coverage. The user should refer to the *Guide to Reprints* and other standard bibliographic sources for fuller or more recent information.

Brackets have been used in bibliographic entries to indicate information supplied by catalogers and bibliographers that does not appear on the recto of the title page or in the body of the work. For example, if the author of an anonymous or pseudonymous eighteenth-century pamphlet has been identified, the name, enclosed in brackets, will precede the title. Brackets have also been commonly used around series information or dates of publication not found on the

title page. In this bibliography bracketed call numbers indicate that the work cited is no longer available in printed form in the Library's collections but has been replaced by microfilm or microfiche. The Microform Reading Room call number invariably follows such a bracketed classification number. Finally, pagination figures derived from a source such as *Dissertation Abstracts International*, which is known to combine separately pagged sections of the work it described, have also been placed in brackets.

ANNOTATIONS. Both bibliographic and descriptive annotations have been written to aid users in determining which works may best meet their needs. Because of the limitations of time and space, annotations were restricted to studies of unquestionable historiographic significance, to representative monographs or articles that provide a broad treatment of a particular subject, to interpretive works that present a unique point of view, and to studies with unclear or misleading titles. Annotations were also supplied to explain how works covering a far broader period are useful for the study of some phase of the Revolution. Slightly more than 40 percent of the entries in chapters 1-11 received annotations ranging in length from a single sentence to several paragraphs. Most often they were restricted to 125 words or less. These annotations and notes were not written as reviews; they are more nearly abstracts intended to reflect the author's own opinion or approach. To avoid the use of extensive quotations, they are in many cases a paraphrase of the author's words. The length of the annotation bears no direct relationship to the importance of the work annotated. The content of well-known studies may be self-evident, while less conspicuous books or articles may require more detailed description to place them in proper relation to the subject or subjects with which they deal.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS. Throughout the preparation of this bibliography, the compiler benefited from the experience and knowledge of other Library of Congress staff members, especially those in the Shelving Section of the Subject Catalog Division, the Rare Book and Special Collections Division, the Law Library, the Geography and Map Division, the Manuscript Division, the Microform Reading Room, and the Loan Division. Within the General Reading Rooms Division itself (formerly the General Reference and Bibliography Division), many members of the staff, who were either permanently or temporarily

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matters that concerned them, the small number of votes cast in the ratification process indicates apathy and possibly consent rather than disfranchisement.

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Beginning with the work of Charles A. Beard, the authors review interpretations of the struggle over the drafting and ratification of the Constitution. Elkins and McKittrick contend that the dispute was not between competing economic groups or those holding differing ideologies or even between some favoring localism and others espousing nationalism. Instead, it was a contest between a lethargic older generation of revolutionists—Anti-Federalists whose careers were launched before 1776 and who remained state-oriented—and an energetic group of younger politicians—Federalists who rose to positions of authority during the Revolution and who identified with the continental war effort and with a national government that would uphold the underlying commitments of their culture: republicanism and capitalism.

Because several colonies had successfully managed fiat money, agrarian interests generally favored similar expedients. Mercantile capitalists and their allies, on the other hand, demanded a uniform currency and a debt funded by Congress. Recently arrived bondsmen knowing little English, possessing few work skills, and laboring on back country lands ran away and formed communal bands on the frontier. Acculturated Africans and American-born Negroes, who spoke English and worked on the main plantation usually as servants or artisans, most often became truants and thieves. The third group, consisting of articulate, relatively independent slaves who frequently hired their own time, sought individual fulfillment before 1775 within the black communities of urban centers like Williamsburg. Encouraged by Lord Dunmore's emancipation and inspired by Revolutionary ideology, they later attempted to overthrow the slave system in such plots as Gabriel Prosser's rebellion in 1800.

Eventually, most *politiques*, like James Pemberton, joined the reformers in movements for social betterment, beginning with the abolition of the slave trade.

They felt that through the use of their natural faculties they could bring their ideas and conduct, and hence the institutions under which they lived, into harmony with the universal natural order, thus gaining immortality through the memory of posterity. Becker concludes that the *philosophes'* ideology was just as absolutist and doctrinaire as that of the medieval scholastics.

CHAPTER TWELVE

Biographies and Personal Primary Sources

ENTRIES FOR THE individual figures in this chapter are arranged alphabetically by the name of the subject. Following each biographical headnote, citations are divided into two categories—works written by the subject (arranged alphabetically by title) and works written about the subject (arranged alphabetically by author). Material considered for inclusion in this chapter falls into four major categories: separate monographic or pamphlet publications, doctoral dissertations, articles in historical periodicals, and printed primary sources published either separately or in historical periodicals. Although desirable it would have been difficult, given the magnitude of the task, to prepare and to include citations to biographical information about subjects contained in such multi-

volume series as the *Pennsylvania Archives* (119 v. in 120), the *State Records of North Carolina* (26 v.), or the *Parliamentary History of England* (36 v.). Fortunately, bibliographic notices to these and hundreds of other standard sources are provided with the sketches in the *Dictionary of American Biography* and the *Dictionary of National Biography*. Nearly 30 percent of the subject entries in this chapter are also entries in either the *DAB*, the *DNB*, or both. For those who may wish to consult either of these works for supplementary bibliographic information, an asterisk (*) has been placed after the names of subjects in this chapter whose names appear in the *DAB* and a dagger (†) for those in the *DNB*.

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OVERVIEW

The Preservation and Publication of Documentary Sources on the American Revolution

Introduction

The character and meaning of the American revolutionary experience have been the subject of debate for nearly two centuries. Changing attitudes, interests, and assumptions and the increasing availability of evidence have led each generation to view the Revolution from its own perspective. In the first 50 years after the Declaration of Independence, men and women of various political and sectional loyalties created a national historical tradition in an effort to tie more firmly the bonds of union. During the middle years of the 19th century Revolutionary historiography passed into the hands of gifted amateur scholars whose faith in the American democratic experiment led them to idealize the accomplishments of the Founding Fathers and to attribute to them great wisdom and virtue. With the development of history as a professional discipline and the growth of America's role in the world, scholars at the turn of the 20th century began to apply "scientific" principles to their study of the Revolution and to view it within the larger context of the Atlantic community. At the same time, the social ferment that accomplished rapid industrialization induced still others to reinterpret the Revolutionary upheaval as a series of internal class struggles for political dominance within each of the new states. After 1945 historians caught up in the psychology of the Cold War began to construe the Revolution as a defense of American liberties against foreign manipulation and subversion. Like all historical movements, the Revolution encompassed so many conflicting strains that it gave rise to and continues to support several pluralistic interpretations.

Beneath this literary record, however, lie the documents that form the permanent record of the past. The most important factors bearing on the historian's ability to interpret complex events are the nature and the availability of evidence. Today, stu-

dents of the American Revolution are aided in their research by bibliographies and manuscript guides, by large depositories with professionally trained staffs that collect, preserve, and organize historical materials, and by numerous technological innovations of comparatively recent origin. Yet, for more than a century after the Revolution, the greatest challenge lay in rescuing from neglect, decay, and destruction the documentary evidence upon which written history depends. Amateur scholars and antiquaries took the first, halting steps in the early days of the Republic by forming societies for the preservation and publication of documents. Following the War of 1812, their precedent inspired a growing number of collectors, historical societies, state agencies, and the federal government to seek out the records of the Revolutionary generation and to support the publication of selected sources. As beneficial as these efforts were, however, it was not until the end of the 19th century, when the newly organized American Historical Association stimulated professional interest in historical study, that pressure was effectively exerted for improvement in the preservation and organization of archival records, the compilation of calendars and descriptive guides, and the publication of primary sources. By the mid-20th century the cumulative effect of growing professionalism on collectors and scholars transformed Revolutionary historiography. Historians who now study the nation's founders are deeply indebted to those who developed the first archival and historical programs in the United States.

Colonial and Revolutionary Period

During the colonial period little or no effort had been made to preserve or publish government documents or private papers. Since a government's right to the official papers of its servants was not a firmly

established principle, colonial officials frequently took their records with them when they left office. Only records that affected everyday life and were essential for social continuity, such as platbooks, deeds, tax rolls, wills, court proceedings, and the acts of legislative bodies were preserved with regularity. The physical conditions under which they were kept varied from colony to colony. Few colonial governments built separate depositories, and even when they did, they were unable to safeguard against the effects of fire, water, vermin, and negligent clerks. And personal papers were not only subject to the same physical dangers as official documents but also to the hazards of frequent changes of residence and the vagaries of inheritance.

Toward the middle of the 18th century a growing interest in history and a desire to emulate European academies and learned institutions led to the incorporation of several literary and philosophical societies, among them the Library Company of Philadelphia (1731), the Library Society of Charleston (1748), and the New York Library Society (1754). More than three dozen public, private, and academic institutions of note had been established by the eve of the Revolution. Yet even among the educated elite who formed such societies, there was little appreciation of the relationship between historical records and the writing of history. Collections were meager by European standards—only Harvard College had more than 3,000 printed works. And many of these collections, such as the priceless library of Thomas Prince, were destroyed during the War for Independence.

The lack of a strong archival tradition, trained clerks, and adequate facilities thus contributed greatly to the loss of documents created by the Revolutionary generation—a fact that provoked concern among contemporaries. In 1791 Thomas Jefferson complained that the War had “done the work of centuries” in despoiling public records stored in state and local offices. John Adams also regretted the fact that many of the secret papers and proceedings of the committees of the Continental Congress were scattered or deliberately destroyed. His concern over the loss of Confederation records was dramatized in 1800 by a fire that devastated the records of the War Department. The survival rate among collections of private papers was equally poor. In a fit of melancholy shortly before his death, James Otis, Jr., consigned to the flames his considerable political correspondence from the years 1760 to 1770. Samuel Adams and William Ellery destroyed many of their personal papers and directed that friends holding letters from them do the same. While the manuscripts of Stephen Hopkins were swept

away in a flood, those of Otho Williams were lost at sea, and those of John Rutledge and Joseph Warren were accidentally burned.

Thus, having few organized collections or depositories to draw on, those who wrote the earliest histories of the Revolution were compelled to copy much of their material from the only readily available source on the War—Dodsley's *Annual Register of World Events* (entry 2565). As a result, the works of patriot historians such as the Rev. William Gordon (entry 996), Dr. David Ramsay (entry 1022), and Mercy Otis Warren (entry 1037), and Loyalist writers like Joseph Galloway (entry 3261), George Chalmers (entry 988), and Peter Oliver (entry 1018) have been largely ignored by later generations. Yet, despite the narrow base of their research, these early historians had been participants in a highly dramatic civil war. In preparing their accounts they incorporated their own experiences and used a variety of personal papers to develop sharply etched views of men and events that still merit consideration. Historical reconstruction changed significantly in the next few decades, however, as early national historians benefited from the efforts of those compilers who undertook the first programs of historical preservation.

EARLY ATTEMPTS TO COLLECT AND PUBLISH SOURCES

Considering the magnitude of the problems they faced and the conditions under which they labored, the achievements of the editors who attempted during the early years of the Republic to gather and publish Revolutionary manuscripts appear all the more remarkable. Public interest in documentary publication was not as acute as it would be in another half century when the deeds of the Founding Fathers had receded far enough into the past to attain romantic luster. The practical men of affairs who directed the fledgling nation through its earliest trials were too preoccupied with the business of politics and commerce to reflect nostalgically on a heritage so recently created. Concerned and hopeful antiquaries nonetheless launched several projects that proved beyond their means to complete.

As early as 1774 Ebenezer Hazard of Philadelphia announced that he intended to publish a series of “American State Papers” that would serve as a documentary base for a comprehensive history of colonial development. Encouraged by the promise of a subsidy from the Continental Congress, Hazard solicited copies of papers from officials in every state and transcribed many documents himself during his travels

for the postal service from 1775 to 1789. The first two volumes of his *Historical Collections*, published in 1792–94, covered the period from 1492 to 1656. But they sold so poorly that the Revolutionary documents he planned to include in two succeeding volumes remained unpublished, passing through several hands before eventually becoming part of the collections of the Library of Congress. Matthew Carey's *Official Letters [of George Washington] to the Honourable Congress [1775–78]* (entry 14674), transcribed from originals in the Department of State, met with the same reception, causing him to abandon the project. Hezekiah Niles' first editorial effort, the *Political Writings of John Dickinson* (entry 13217), was also spurned by the public, but he remained undaunted, choosing to make the papers of the Revolutionary generation a regular feature of the *Weekly Register* that he launched in 1811 in Baltimore. One of his more noted achievements came in 1822 when he published in his *Principles and Acts of the Revolution in America* (entry 1181) the major speeches, orations, and proceedings from the period 1765 to 1789. Of all the early editorial efforts, however, the most enduring proved to be William Waller Hening's compilation of *The Statutes at Large [of Virginia, 1619–1792]* (entry 2165), based in large part on Thomas Jefferson's invaluable collection of manuscript laws.

Despite the generally poor reception accorded printed documents in the years following the Revolution, they became an important feature in the serial publications issued by the three major historical societies established through the efforts of Jeremy Belknap, a Boston clergyman and historian, John Pintard, a New York merchant and promoter, and Isaiah Thomas, a Worcester printer and antiquary. Based largely upon the European model of the academy as well as the literary and philosophical societies established in the colonies, the Massachusetts Historical Society (1791), the New-York Historical Society (1804), and the American Antiquarian Society (1812) were made up of amateur and semiprofessional scholars whose stated goals were to collect and preserve sources, to publish the more important documents in their transactions, and, in so doing, to promote a general spirit of inquiry. As corresponding secretary of the most productive society, Belknap made known his intention to keep a sharp lookout for worthwhile collections and to pursue them aggressively. In his constant travels through the New England states he solicited compilations of local data and secured either the originals or copies of Revolutionary papers that soon appeared in print in the Society's *Collections*, first issued

in 1792. Over the next 25 years subscribers were provided with a steady flow of local records and history interspersed with selections from the letters, diaries, and journals of noted figures such as Benjamin Church, Richard Henry Lee, Paul Revere, Ezra Stiles, Charles Thomson, and Jonathan Trumbull.

As sources for the study of the Revolution became more plentiful, those who wrote histories during the early years of the Republic began to ignore the old partisan divisions that filled patriot and Loyalist histories and to make the Revolution a symbol of national, or at least party, unity. Local chroniclers like Jeremy Belknap of New Hampshire and Massachusetts (entry 1330), Benjamin Trumbull of Connecticut (entry 4405), and John Daly Burk of Virginia (entry 2169), asserted the importance of their states and the contributions that local political leaders made to the creation of the Union. At the same time, they also emphasized achievements that transcended state and regional boundaries and pointed to the nation's unique origins. Their work served to buttress a growing national conviction that the rebellion against Great Britain was only the first step in a concerted action leading to the drafting and ratification of the Constitution. Indeed, in his *History of America* (entry 1015), Jedidiah Morse skipped entirely the factious interlude of the Confederation period, allowing the Constitution to appear as the direct and necessary outcome of the Revolution. Together with Abiel Holmes (entry 1058), Mason Weems (entry 14697), John Marshall (entry 1066), and other first generation historians, Morse helped to manufacture a new past for America, one in which the Federal Constitution became the symbol and reality of national life. Convinced that the purpose of history was to instruct as well as to explain, they created a historical tradition in which they depicted the American Revolution as the beginning of a world movement to free mankind from the shackles of despotism. The trend toward the creation of a common past was also strongly affected by a shift in public interest which dramatically accelerated the pace of historical and documentary publication during the second quarter of the 19th century, to the point that some scholars have referred to it as the golden age of historical editing.

From the Jubilee of Independence to the Centennial

Few events in the 19th century caused Americans to reflect more intently upon the meaning of their

Revolutionary heritage than the simultaneous deaths on the afternoon of July 4, 1826, of Thomas Jefferson and John Adams. For over 40 years the celebration of the Fourth of July had been a purely political and partisan affair with both Federalists and Democratic-Republicans claiming to be the true conservators of Revolutionary values. But as James Monroe noted in his second inaugural, the nation had entered an "era of good feelings" after the War of 1812. The deaths of Adams and Jefferson laid to rest nearly a half-century of partisanship and marked the nationalization of the holiday. Coming close on the heels of Lafayette's triumphant tour of the United States in 1824 and 1825, the Grand Apotheosis, as one eulogist dubbed it, contributed to a growing national faith that God's hand was guiding the American experiment.

At the same time, publishers of popular and historical magazines became increasingly conscious of the young nation's cultural immaturity and the lack of a substantive body of published historical data on America. New-found pride in the accomplishments of the Founding Fathers, who now loomed larger than life in the public imagination, persuaded them that the study of unvarnished records from the past would lead their readers to a fuller understanding of the nation's origins and heighten civic consciousness by example. With a zeal for minutiae, the editors of such journals as the *North American Review*, the *Historical Magazine*, and the *Virginia Historical Register and Literary Companion* added to their normal fare numerous pages of extracts from private correspondence, official journals and reports, newspapers, and even parish records in a seeming effort to develop overnight a national historical tradition. In a time of rapid expansion and growth, documents from a simpler, bygone era also provided a measure of comfort and intellectual security. By thus appealing to popular interest in the heroic deeds of Revolutionary leaders, publishers helped to create a receptive audience from the impressive historical compilations that came from individual collectors, private societies, state agencies, and the federal government between the Jubilee and the Centennial of independence.

INDIVIDUAL COLLECTORS

At first, the efforts of dedicated and persistent individual collectors overshadowed those of private and public institutions in the preservation of manuscripts. The writing of Revolutionary history, except for purely local studies, would have been far different in the 19th century had it not been for the enterprising feats of such men as Jared Sparks, Peter Force, George

Bancroft, Henry and Benjamin F. Stevens, and Lyman Copeland Draper. Not only did they amass substantive collections of Revolutionary documents from all the states and make them available for research, but they rescued from neglect and destruction materials that otherwise might not have survived.

Following the examples set by Hazard and Belknap, Jared Sparks, a Unitarian minister and editor of the *North American Review*, undertook on the eve of the Jubilee the first major tour of the federal archives in Washington, the state archives from Georgia to New Hampshire, and the more important collections of historical papers in private hands. In his journal he expressed great dismay at finding large gaps in the colonial and state records and commented sarcastically about the apathy and ignorance displayed by the officials responsible for what remained. In a noted article that appeared in the *Review* for October 1826, Sparks called upon gentlemen of "leisure and inquiry" in all the states to establish historical societies whose primary objects would be to collect all relevant manuscripts, pamphlets, assembly journals, and statutes, to publish and disseminate the most important, and to preserve for future historians those of less value. Particularly concerned that the papers of delegates to the Continental Congress, Revolutionary governors, and military officers be preserved, Sparks publicly congratulated Richard Henry Lee for depositing his grandfather's papers in the American Philosophical Society at Philadelphia and those of his great-uncle, Arthur Lee, at Harvard. Having discovered that many essential records for colonial history were "shut up in the office of the Board of Trade in England," Sparks recommended that copies of all papers relating to America be obtained and deposited in the archives at Washington.

Although it would be over a century before his scheme came anywhere near realization, Sparks devoted the remainder of his productive life to editing and writing nearly 70 volumes of documents and biography. Based on the innumerable transcripts and original manuscripts that he borrowed or obtained from foreign archives, state officials, and private collectors, Sparks published within the space of 25 years the *Diplomatic Correspondence of the American Revolution* (entry 8367), multivolume editions of the life and writings of Gouverneur Morris (entry 14052), George Washington (entry 14674), and Benjamin Franklin (entry 13381), and the *Correspondence of the American Revolution; Being Letters of Eminent Men to George Washington* (entry 14674). But more valuable than these works, which suffered from editorial

inconsistency and Sparks' tendency to delete from documents passages that detracted from the heroic postures of his subjects, were the 266 volumes and 9 boxes of documents and transcripts that Sparks left to Harvard University. Among them were some of the original papers of Sir Francis Bernard, George Chalmers, and George Washington, copies of letters written to major figures such as Robert Morris, Philip Schuyler, John Sullivan, Anthony Wayne, and George Clinton, and diplomatic correspondence from the Yorke, Stormont, and Grantham papers in the Public Record Office in London and the Gerard and Luzerne papers in the Archives nationales in Paris. Considering the paucity of the Revolutionary material that existed in any one place before, it is not surprising that Sparks' collection served as a major source of research for the remainder of the century.

At the time that Sparks made his celebrated tour of the states, Peter Force, a Washington newspaperman, politician, and publisher launched one of the most ambitious schemes of historical collecting and editing ever undertaken. Relying in part on a congressional subsidy, Force amassed over a 35-year period from virtually all sources and states nearly 23,000 books, 40,000 pamphlets, 250 volumes of colonial and Revolutionary newspapers, 1,200 maps and views, 429 volumes of original manuscripts, and 360 volumes of transcripts that were meant to serve as the basis for his multivolume *American Archives*—a documentary treatment of American history from its beginning to 1789. Only nine folio volumes from the fourth and fifth series covering the years 1774–76 had been published (entry 8688) when Secretary of State William L. Marcy withdrew federal support. Although he found himself in reduced circumstances after lavishing nearly all of his available funds on his library, Force refused several offers from dealers to buy selected portions and continued his practice of allowing historians such as Sparks and George Bancroft free access to his materials. Convinced that Force possessed the finest corpus of Americana ever assembled, the sixth Librarian of Congress, Ainsworth Rand Spofford, proposed to the Joint Committee on the Library in 1867 that Congress purchase the Force collection to ensure its preservation. Congress acted swiftly, accepting the committee's endorsement of Spofford's report and appropriating \$100,000 for that purpose. In April of that year the collection was moved to the Library of Congress where it continues to form an impressive proportion of the Library's holdings of Revolutionary maps, pamphlets, and documents.

Since there were no major depositories when he

began research for his magisterial *History of the United States* (entry 1043), George Bancroft was compelled, like Sparks and Force, to collect for himself much of the material that he would use. Traveling extensively and spending freely, he purchased original letters of Samuel Adams, Joseph Hawley, and General von Riedesel, among others, and uncovered in his searches the minutes of the Boston Committee of Correspondence for the years 1772–74. Bancroft also obtained from individual collections in the United States transcripts from the papers of such figures as Benjamin Rush, George Mason, Oliver Ellsworth, John Glover, William Samuel Johnson, and John Langdon. While minister to Great Britain from 1846 to 1849, he supplemented the transcripts ordered from London, Paris, and Berlin archives in the mid-1830's with his own researches in European depositories. Bancroft's total cumulation of colonial and Revolutionary records, now in the New York Public Library, eventually reached 416 bound volumes.

Both Sparks and Force had employed a young Yale graduate, Henry Stevens of Vermont, to search local archives in the United States. Little did Sparks realize when he financed Stevens' trip to London in 1845; however, that his young protege would not only supply some states with irreplaceable indexes of their colonial and Revolutionary records in British repositories, but that he would also uncover a large cache of missing Benjamin Franklin papers (now in the Library of Congress) and establish himself as a major London dealer providing rare books and incunabula for the British Museum and many important collectors in America such as John Carter Brown. Stevens also inspired the awesome task undertaken by his younger brother, Benjamin Franklin Stevens, who searched for manuscripts relating to Revolutionary America, 1773–83, in major depositories throughout England, Holland, France, and Spain and compiled a massive 183-volume indexed calendar to 161,000 documents (Stevens' *Catalogue Index of Manuscripts*) that was sold in 1905 to the Library of Congress. Long interested in facsimile reproduction, the younger Stevens produced and sold in 24 folio volumes 2,107 *Facsimiles of Manuscripts in European Archives Relating to America, 1773–1783* (entry 8448).

Historians of the Revolutionary frontier also had their collector in Lyman Copeland Draper, who devoted half a century to acquiring documents and transcripts from the period 1750–1815 and to recording interviews with early settlers and their descendants along the Allegheny frontier from New York to Alabama. Hoping to gain enough data for comprehen-

sive biographies of western heroes whom he greatly admired, Draper traveled thousands of miles during the 1840's, assembling material on the Virginia and Pennsylvania frontiers, the fur trade, the border wars, the western land companies, the settlement of Kentucky and Tennessee, and the Battle of King's Mountain. He also compiled whole series of papers on the lives of major western figures such as Daniel Boone, George Rogers Clark, Joseph Brant, Josiah Harmar, William Irvine, Simon Kenton, Isaac Shelby, George Croghan, William Preston, and Thomas Sumter. Although Draper wrote little himself, his priceless records, totaling 486 volumes, were deposited at his death in the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, of which he had been corresponding secretary and superintendent from 1854 to 1866. Not only did these records provide the backdrop for the provocative thesis advanced by Frederick Jackson Turner, who used the collection before it was opened to the public in 1893, but they also served as the basis for hundreds of monographs and biographies about the settlers of the trans-Appalachian frontier.

In considering the accomplishments of the great 19th-century collectors, it is difficult to ignore the service rendered by those who sought out manuscripts almost entirely for their symbolic value—the autograph collectors. With sufficient wealth to indulge their interests, professional men such as William B. Sprague, an Albany clergyman, Thomas A. Emmett, a New York physician, Simon Gratz, a Philadelphia lawyer, Robert Gilmore, a Baltimore merchant, and Israel K. Tefft, a Savannah merchant, adapted to American conditions the fashionable European hobby of collecting the papers of the nobility by concentrating on the manuscripts of America's "aristocracy"—those who established the independence of the United States and its constitutional form of government. Whether they appreciated the timelessness of historical records, sought vicarious identification with important figures of the past, or tried through their investments to build a collection of economic value, their endeavors saved countless manuscripts from destruction. In the 1820's, when the Reverend Dr. Sprague began to gather his first "Signers" collection by exchanging with Judge Bushrod Washington 1,500 transcripts for original letters signed by George Washington, the papers of the Revolutionary generation were widely available—so much so, in fact, that by the time of his death in 1876 Dr. Sprague owned some 40,000 autographed letters of colonial and Revolutionary leaders. The disposition of Sprague's vast collection is difficult to trace, but others who followed

him often protected their life's work by donating their holdings to research institutions. The Emmett Collection at the New York Public Library numbers some 10,800 pieces while the Gratz papers at the Pennsylvania Historical Society of Pennsylvania contain nearly 175,000 items. Despite the most diligent efforts, only about 40 Signers' sets have been compiled due to the relative scarcity of letters by Thomas Lynch, Jr., of South Carolina and Button Gwinnett of Georgia.

HISTORICAL SOCIETIES

Although historians are often frustrated over the private ownership of the papers of public figures, it is clear that the energetic activities of autograph collectors contributed immeasurably to the field of documentary preservation and publication in the first half of the 19th century. The same general impulse that guided individual collectors was also responsible for the surge in the number of private historical societies established in the larger cities, state capitals, and university towns of the East. Less than a dozen had been organized before 1820, but nearly 100 were created in the next half century. Reflecting the newly acquired wealth and leisure of the educated, professional classes in New England, statewide societies modeled on that of Massachusetts appeared in rapid succession in Maine (1822), Rhode Island (1822), New Hampshire (1823), and Connecticut (1825). Although the middle states contained half of all the town and country societies formed along the east coast during the period, those with a statewide focus developed more slowly—the Historical Society of Pennsylvania was established in 1826, 20 years after that of New York, and the state societies organized in New Jersey (1845) and Delaware (1864) lagged even farther behind. In contrast, hardly more than a dozen local societies appeared in the southern seaboard states because of a comparative lack of interest, funds, and urban centers to serve as focal points. The Virginia Historical and Philosophical Society of Richmond, organized in 1831, was the first state society to appear in the South. Others followed later in Georgia (1839) and North Carolina and Maryland (1844). The South Carolina Historical Society in Charleston was not formed until 1854.

Established by men of affairs—statesmen, lawyers, merchants, clergymen, physicians—these new ventures were prompted by a mixture of motives. These included a patriotic interest in the preservation of historical materials, desire for the advancement of learning, curiosity about local origins, and concern for state and local prestige. Wounded pride may also have played a role, for a portion of the records of

every region had already been lost to the avidity of individual collectors. Almost all of the early societies were supported solely by private funds or endowments. State aid, although requested in many cases, was seldom forthcoming. With financial limitations restricting their activities, the societies were usually dependent for the growth of their collections upon the zeal of individual members. These early organizers tended to limit their acquisitions to local materials—newspapers, artifacts, county, town, church, and school records, and papers of local politicians, educators, churchmen, and businessmen—materials that would meet the needs and reflect the activities of their own regions and people. Moreover, their search was guided by contemporary interest in political and military history, to the detriment of sources reflecting social and economic life. Because they focused almost exclusively on the pre-1789 period, the early societies influenced the course of Revolutionary historiography by the very nature of the sources they preserved and published.

Many of the documents secured by the state societies appeared in the collections, proceedings, memoirs, and transactions that they published between the Jubilee and the Centennial. Rarely, however, did the editors devote an entire issue to a single theme. Most volumes are amalgamations of speeches, addresses, lists, and rosters, intermixed with single or small groups of reprinted manuscripts and sources. They show little foresight or overall planning and are nearly impossible to bring under rigorous bibliographic control, notwithstanding the impressive attempt by A. P. C. Griffin in his *Bibliography of American Historical Societies* (entry 50). Despite the avowed interest of the societies in reprinting the records of the Founding Fathers, the appearance of important selections of Revolutionary material in their publications was sporadic and fortuitous. Over a 35-year period the Massachusetts Historical Society published in its *Collections* papers of Governor Thomas Hutchinson (entry 13675), Timothy Newell's journal of the siege of Boston (entry 5889), and letters of Thomas Cushing from 1767 to 1775 (entry 13153). Of its neighboring societies, the New Hampshire Historical Society included the records of the state's Committee of Safety, 1775–84, in its *Collections* (entry 8880), while the Rhode Island Historical Society printed miscellaneous Revolutionary correspondence, 1775–82 (entry 8978), and Simeon Thayer's journal of the invasion of Canada (entry 5966). The Connecticut Historical Society published the correspondence of Continental Congressman Silas Deane, 1774–76 (entry 13189). In the middle states

the Historical Society of Pennsylvania issued a greater number of documents in the years between 1845 and 1860, printing in its *Bulletin* letters of Robert Morris (entry 14058), the journal of Isaac Senter (entry 5963), the minutes of the Northumberland County Committee of Safety, 1776–77 (entry 9080), and papers relating to the Battle of Brandywine (entry 6167). The journal of Lt. William Feltman (entry 13329) on the southern campaign appeared in its *Collections* for 1853 and the Revolutionary journal of Major Ebenezer Denny (entry 13199) was published in its *Memoirs* for 1860. Scattered through the publications of the New Jersey Historical Society were miscellaneous Revolutionary letters by Governor William Franklin, Richard Stockton, and the Earl of Stirling (entry 12694), but almost nothing of substance from the period was included in the serials of the New York and Delaware societies. Few primary sources appeared in the southern publications as well. The Maryland Historical Society issued the journal of Charles Carroll kept during his visit to Canada in 1776 (entry 13004) and documents touching on wartime events in Baltimore (entry 2147), while the South Carolina Historical Society printed the London papers of Henry Laurens (entry 13804) and the journal of the second Council of Safety (entry 9256). In Georgia the historical society published the letters of Sir James Wright to the Earl of Dartmouth, 1774–82 (entry 14796), and in Virginia the society printed the letters of Governor Thomas Nelson, Jr., for 1781 (entry 9190). Overall, however, a review of the total contents of the serials issued by the privately endowed societies through the mid-19th century reveals little that can be used systematically by present-day scholars and indicates the narrow antiquarian focus of their editors.

STATE GOVERNMENTS

At the time of the Jubilee the state governments were also caught up in the wave of patriotic enthusiasm that inspired the efforts of individual collectors and the proliferation of historical societies. During his 1826 tour Jared Sparks discovered that no state had provided for the effective concentration of its documents in a separate depository. Since older records had usually been left in the care of the originating office or agency, such indifferent and decentralized control had already resulted in severe losses. Therefore, at the urging of several persons newly attuned to the nation's heritage, some states began in the mid-1820's to take the steps to recover, preserve, and publish their historical records.

Surprisingly, these early efforts focused on

American sources in British and European depositories. In 1827 the North Carolina legislature passed a resolution requesting the governor to obtain from British officials permission for an agent to make transcripts of the state's colonial records in the State Papers Office. Although no copies were actually made at the time the survey taken resulted in the publication of an *index to Colonial Documents Relative to North Carolina* in 1843. Thereafter, a significant number of American scholars journeyed abroad to examine the contents of British libraries, museums, and record offices. South Carolina's agent, Henry Granger, spent three years in London copying the state's documents, abstracts of which were later printed in the Historical Society's *Collections* (1857-59). The 22 folio volumes of Georgia records, procured at state expense by the Reverend Charles Wallace Howard in the late 1830's, became the basis of the Georgia Historical Society's collections. Private funds were raised in both Maryland and New Jersey to retain in London the services of Henry Stevens, who provided each state with an analytical index of nearly 2,000 of its documents, the latter of which was published in the *Collections* of the New Jersey Historical Society in 1858. By far the most successful of these foreign copying projects was sponsored by New York, which supported John Romeyn Brodhead four years in English, French, and Dutch archives transcribing 80 volumes of records for which the New York legislature published a full calendar in 1845.

In addition to retrieving material from abroad, attempts were made to improve the conditions under which state documents were stored and to preserve their contents through publication. Despite a lack of facilities and professional expertise, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, and South Carolina made substantial gains. In 1836 the New Hampshire legislature authorized the governor to recover the alienated archives of the state and to have the others arranged and bound, and in 1867 New Hampshire issued the first of many volumes of its *Provincial and State Papers*. In 1831 the Massachusetts legislature provided for the construction of fireproof record vaults in the State House and five years later retained the services of the Reverend Joseph Barlow Felt to arrange and bind the state's colonial and Revolutionary archives. Employing his own arbitrary topical classification, which has confounded scholarly critics ever since, Felt salvaged 328 folio volumes of documents that might well have perished. From these, William Lincoln edited the journals of the Massachusetts provincial congresses and the Committee of Safety,

1774-75 (entry 8937). In New York, the legislature generously provided for the publication of the journal of the votes and proceedings of the General Assembly, 1766-76 (entry 4416), the journals of the Provincial Congress and Committee of Safety (entry 9023), and the journal of the Legislative Council, 1691-1775 (entry 4414). When it directed in 1847 that all public records be transferred to the State Library in Albany, the legislature supported two projects that were far more comprehensive. Based on the transcripts procured in Europe by Brodhead, Edmund B. O'Callaghan edited *The Documentary History of the State of New York* (entry 1747) and, with Berthold Fernow, *Documents Relative to the Colonial History of the State of New York* (entry 1748). In Pennsylvania a selected committee reported in 1851 on the deplorable condition of the state archives, and a joint memorial from the American Philosophical Society and the Historical Society of Pennsylvania encouraged the legislators to authorize publication of the so-called "Colonial Records of Pennsylvania," which contained the minutes of the Provincial Council from 1683 to 1775 (entry 4502) and the minutes of the Supreme Executive Council from 1777 to 1790 (entry 9097). Samuel Hazard was then employed to edit over 10,000 documents from the years 1664 to 1790 to complement the "Colonial Records." These became the first series of the *Pennsylvania Archives* (entry 1973). To provide a finding aid, Hazard supervised the compilation of a general index to all 28 volumes. The South Carolina legislature, which helped finance the publication of John Drayton's *Memoirs of the American Revolution* (entry 4764) and Robert W. Gibbs' *Documentary History of the American Revolution* (entry 2314), used the disastrous fires in government offices in Columbia in 1843 and 1844 to justify the centralized storage of its records in fireproof vaults in the new State House. The work done by J. S. Green, who was commissioned in 1850 to gather, arrange, and index South Carolina's colonial and Revolutionary records, laid the basis for one of the most comprehensive state archives on the east coast.

Unfortunately, the other states failed to take similar steps, although some made sporadic efforts to bring together and publish scattered sources. North Carolina reprinted the proceedings of its provincial congress of 1775 (entry 9230), Maryland issued the proceedings of the conventions held in Annapolis in 1774-76 (entry 9161), New Jersey published selections from the correspondence of Governor William Livingston, 1776-86 (entry 9065), Connecticut began a series of its colonial records, and Rhode Island em-

ployed John K. Bartlett to edit the *Records of the Colony of Rhode Island [1636-1792]* (entry 1641). Yet little interest was shown in preserving the documents themselves. Although Maryland placed some of its colonial and Revolutionary records in the historical society at Baltimore for safekeeping in 1846-47 and again in 1878, they were not organized until after the Civil War when Brantz Mayer provided a rough topical arrangement and had them bound in the so-called "rainbow" books (see entry 740). In Delaware, Virginia, and Georgia nothing at all was done until late in the 19th century. In fact, as a result of frequent fires, Arnold's raid of 1781, and the burning of Richmond in 1865, Virginia arrived at the Centennial with fewer of its Revolutionary records intact than any of the original states. Indeed, the Civil War wreaked havoc on records throughout the South.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

The federal archives in Washington suffered similar neglect. Because of Charles Thomson's continuity in office as secretary of the Continental Congress, its official documents had been carefully preserved despite frequent moves. In 1789 Thomson relinquished the Continental and Confederation records in his keeping to the newly created Department of State. When the War and Treasury departments were established soon thereafter, they were entrusted with those portions of the records that pertained to their functions. But a House committee appointed in 1810 to inquire into the condition of the prefederal documents found them to be in great disorder. Its recommendation led to the passage of the first archives act for the systematic preservation and arrangement of the national records. Congress provided fireproof rooms in a building west of the White House that contained the State, War, and Navy departments. Some of the War, Navy, and Treasury papers were destroyed in 1814 when the British captured Washington, and the Treasury records suffered again in 1833. But the documents in the Bureau of Rolls and Library of the Department of State, including the journals of the Continental Congress, the diplomatic correspondence of the Revolutionary and Confederation periods, and the original drafts of important state papers, escaped such perils throughout the 19th century.

Following the passage of the archives act of 1810, the federal government played a surprisingly expansive role in sponsoring the publication of historical documents and preserving the papers of leading statesmen. At first such actions appear to be an anomaly in a period traditionally viewed as one of restrained

federal activity in the face of local and private initiative. Yet as the editors of popular magazines, historical serials, and state documents well knew, the public was eager to have historical collections widely available, even if financed by the government. Before the Centennial, Congress supported no fewer than 18 major projects of documentary publication, producing nearly 325 volumes at a cost of well over \$7,000,000. Funds were expended in several ways: by assigning government employees to do research, subsidizing editors and publishers, purchasing large editions for free distribution, and procuring through private sale the papers of several of the Founding Fathers. During the 1820's Congress focused on the publication of major official records, issuing the *Journals, Acts and Proceedings of the [Philadelphia] Convention* (entry 9436), the *Secret Journals of the Acts and Proceedings of Congress [1775-89]* (entry 8749), the *Journals of the American Congress from 1774 to 1788* (entry 8748), and Jonathan Elliot's *Debates, Resolutions, and Other Proceedings, in Convention, on the Adoption of the Federal Constitution* (entry 9531). In addition, the government allocated \$31,000 for Jared Sparks' *Diplomatic Correspondence of the American Revolution* (entry 8367), which was then supplemented by William A. Weaver's *Diplomatic Correspondence of the United States . . . 1783 to 1789* (entry 8366), and appropriated \$228,710 for Peter Force's *American Archives [1774-76]* (entry 8688). Shortly after Sparks' *Writings of George Washington* (entry 14674) appeared, Congress made its first major purchase of statesmen's letters, buying in 1834 200 bound volumes of Washington papers (including 62 volumes of letters by Washington and 119 to him) for \$25,000. In 1837 and 1848 the Madison papers were obtained in two installments for \$30,000 and \$25,000 respectively. The government also acquired in 1848-65 volumes of the Hamilton papers (\$25,000), 137 volumes of Jefferson's "public papers," which included 26,000 letters to him and drafts of 16,000 letters by him (\$20,000), and the remaining "private" papers of Washington (\$20,000). The series was completed the following year with the acquisition of the Monroe papers (\$20,000). Thus, in a period of 15 years Congress appropriated \$165,000 for the purchase of five major collections to be preserved in the Department of State's Bureau of Rolls and Library. But several of the appropriations included or were supplemented by funds for editing and publishing. The Joint Committee of Congress on the Library sponsored Henry D. Gilpin's edition of the first set of the *Papers of James Madison* (entry 13944), John C. Hamilton's *Works of*

Alexander Hamilton (entry 13523), Henry A. Washington's *Writings of Thomas Jefferson* (entry 13701), and Philip R. Fendall's *Letters and Other Writings of James Madison* (entry 13944), based on the second installment of his papers. When Charles Francis Adams published the *Works of John Adams* (entry 12681), Congress provided \$22,500 for the purchase and free distribution of 1,000 sets.

The utility of such beneficence was seldom questioned. In the public mind, the historical collections that received congressional, state, and local support were considered to be monuments to the great men and deeds of the Revolution. Yet the results of all the efforts to gather the minutiae of history between the Jubilee and the Centennial were decidedly mixed. The early editions of documents sponsored by the federal government tended to be limited in scope and unreliable in text. Except for Force's *American Archives* and Elliot's *Debates*, each would be done anew in the late 19th and in the 20th centuries. The records of the states were also uneven. Massachusetts and South Carolina had perhaps the most extensive and best organized holdings. But neither equaled the accomplishments of New York in obtaining copies of its colonial and Revolutionary records in foreign archives or of Pennsylvania in preserving a large proportion of its records through publication. The desperate condition of other archives, such as those of Delaware, would not become public knowledge until early in the 20th century. The 19th-century emphasis upon publication over preservation, moreover, had hidden dangers. For example, the editor of the first series of the Pennsylvania Archives, Samuel Hazard, used many original documents as printer's copy. Moreover, Pennsylvania's failure to provide better storage facilities for the remaining documents that he edited led to further deterioration and loss. Scholars noted long ago that Hazard's editing was uneven in quality and that he had, in some cases, taken great liberties in transcribing originals. As a result, some of the documents in his 12 volumes are known today only in their poorly edited or incomplete printed form.

Among the historical societies, those in the northern states held the largest collections. In a special report prepared in 1876 for the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Education, Henry A. Holmes revealed that the more than 100 reporting societies in the United States held 482,000 books, 568,000 pamphlets, 1,361 bound volumes of documents, and 88,771 portfolios and single manuscripts. Among them, the Massachusetts, New York, and Pennsylvania historical societies held over 20 percent of the books and

pamphlets, 70 percent of the bound volumes of documents, and 45 percent of the portfolios and single manuscripts. But the focus of even the largest societies remained local, unscientific, and antiquarian. Their publications were largely accumulations of disjointed fragments to which there were few decent indexes. Considering the relative availability of Revolutionary papers, the pace of their collecting appeared to have been unreasonably slow. In reviewing "Manuscript Sources of United States History" in the eighth volume of his *Narrative and Critical History* (entry 1080), Justin Winsor noted that many of the papers of major Revolutionary figures such as John Sullivan, James and Mercy Warren, Benjamin Lincoln, Philip Schuyler, John Jay, Gouverneur Morris, Charles Thomson, George Read, Caesar Rodney, Charles Carroll, and Patrick Henry were still in private hands. Yet, on balance, the state historical societies and their chief supporters were nearly the sole vehicles for the promotion of historical study in the United States for almost a century after the Revolution.

After the Centennial: The Culmination of the Antiquarian Tradition

By serving as the meeting place and research center for the chroniclers and antiquaries who gathered to celebrate the past or to argue the historical importance of their various communities, the historical societies that were established in profusion after 1825 played a central role in encouraging the compilation of hundreds of state and local histories that appeared before the end of the century. Because the majority of these societies had been established in the urban centers of the Northeast, by far the largest number of histories pertained to that region. In New England, for example, all the states passed statutes between 1860 and 1876 encouraging the publication of such works. Of the more than 1,000 compilations listed in Chapter 2, which reflects the total body of local histories available, fully 45 percent are studies of localities in New England, one-third relate to the middle Atlantic states, and only 22 percent treat the history of the southern seaboard states. The typical author of such a work, normally selected by a publication committee nominated at a town meeting, was a retired clergyman, lawyer, or doctor with a lifelong collecting hobby whose aim was to memorialize the town or region and those who settled it.

Indeed, in treating 19th-century historiography, scholars have perhaps drawn too much attention to the more popular works of the period, such as Robert

Sears' *Pictorial History of the American Revolution* (entry 1272), Lorenzo Sabine's *American Loyalists* (entry 8128), and Benson J. Lossing's *Pictorial Field-book of the Revolution* (entry 5034), while neglecting far more typical compilations of local facts, traditions, and anecdotes such as those prepared about the towns of Massachusetts (entry 1444), Connecticut (entry 1668), New York (entry 1753), and New Jersey (entry 1883) by John Warner Barber and Henry Howe. Together with John Thomas Scharf, Israel D. Rupp, and other compilers, Barber and Howe helped to launch a new phenomenon in local history writing that continued far into the 20th century—"memorial" histories of towns, counties, and regions. As the principal editors, men like Scharf and Thomas F. Jewett of Boston hired local antiquaries to write articles about social, economic, political, or military aspects of their regions which were then combined with long historical overviews and sold to the local populace on a subscription basis, sometimes with the aid of a subsidy from a municipal or state government. Once established, the format was further developed and capitalized on by commercial publishers such as the American Historical Company and the Lewis Historical Publishing Company in New York and the American Historical Society and the S. J. Clarke Publishing Company in Chicago. It was Jewett who induced Justin Winsor, librarian of Harvard, to compile and edit two notable examples of the genre, his *Memorial History of Boston* (entry 1482) and his *Narrative and Critical History of America* (entry 1080), both of which focus primarily on the colonial and Revolutionary periods.

The phenomenon that culminated in Winsor's distinguished works, however, had its origins in more fundamental concerns; for the local history movement of the 19th century had a decidedly genealogical orientation. Members of the declining mercantile and professional classes, faced with political and social challenges from the new manufacturing elite and threatened by the influx of German and Irish immigrants, began to wrap themselves in the mantles of their long-dead ancestors. The Civil War and the rapid burst of industrialization that followed only served to heighten the trend. Although slightly more than 100 historical societies had been formed along the east coast before the Centennial, an additional 84 were created in the 15 years after 1876. Located in smaller communities that lay near expanding urban centers, the new societies were mostly "pioneer," "old planters," "old residents," or "early settlers" associations that attempted to protect their sense of common

identity by promoting the study of 17th- and 18th-century history. Many of the documents collected by these societies—rosters of early town officials, ship passenger lists, early census records, muster rolls—were sought for their value in tracing direct lineage to the Founding Fathers and beyond. In Massachusetts, for example, the Essex Institute in Salem, the Society of Mayflower Descendants, the New England Historic and Genealogical Society, and several other societies, town committees, and private persons combined their efforts to publish after 1895 the vital statistics (birth, marriage, and death dates gleaned from town records, newspapers, family Bibles, and cemetery inscriptions) of over 200 Massachusetts towns from the early 17th century to 1850 (see entry 10749).

This renewed interest in early American history was reflected in the documentary publications of the older societies as well. But here the influence of new scholarly techniques made its mark as a number of European-trained historians took up archival and editorial positions. With such leadership the major compilations that appeared after the Centennial assumed a higher quality. The Massachusetts Historical Society began to issue in its *Collections* full-volume editions rather than extracts from the papers of such figures as Jeremy Belknap (entry 12828), Jonathan Trumbull (entry 14597), and James Bowdoin and Sir John Temple (entry 12884), while Connecticut's society produced full texts of the letters of London agent William Samuel Johnson to the governors of Connecticut, 1766–71 (entry 15724) and the orderly books and journals (entry 7931) and muster rolls (entry 7930) kept by Connecticut men during the Revolution. By far the most impressive achievement was the John Watts De Peyster Publication Fund series sponsored by the New York Historical Society. Among the volumes issued were the papers of General Charles Lee, 1754–1811 (entry 13815); the letters of Major General James Paterson, 1779–80 (entry 14169); the letters to General Lewis Morris, 1775–82 (entry 14054); the letterbooks of Lieutenant Governor Cadwallader Colden, 1760–75 (entry 4410); a volume of Revolutionary and miscellaneous papers that includes the letters of Charles Thomson, 1765–1816 (entry 14563), the Marquis de La Fayette, 1777–91 (entry 13802), and Robert Morris, 1775–82 (entry 14058); the journal of Captain John Montresor, 1757–78 (entry 13754); the letterbook of Captain Alexander McDonough, 1775–79 (entry 13192); the papers and journals of Lieutenant Colonel Stephen Hensle, 1773–89 (entry 13754); and five volumes of Silas Deane papers, 1774–90 (entry 13189). In 1890 the New Jersey Historical Society,

in conjunction with the state archives, began to publish under the half-title *Archives of the State of New Jersey* two series, the early volumes of which focused on the papers of the colonial governors and council. The pioneering *Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*, launched by the state's historical society in 1877, contained in the first 25 volumes hundreds of pages of Revolutionary documents. The society also printed Paul L. Ford's edition of the political writings of John Dickinson, 1764-74, as its *Memoirs* for 1895 (entry 13217). The Delaware society published in its *Papers* between 1887 and 1896 the minutes of the state council, 1776-92 (entry 9144), the diary of Captain Thomas Rodney, 1776-77 (entry 6085), the journal of William Seymour during the southern expedition (entry 14410), and the personal recollections of Captain Enoch Anderson (entry 12720), while the Virginia Historical Society printed the wartime orderly books of the state's First and Third regiments in its *Collections* for 1892 (entries 7085 and 6128).

The wave of historical publishing that followed the Centennial and the entry of the first professional historians into the archives was not, however, confined to the historical societies. G. P. Putnam's Sons attempted to capitalize on the growing academic and public interest in American history by commissioning 11 editors to reproduce in 80 volumes the papers of major Revolutionary statesmen. Based largely on the documents acquired by Congress and deposited in the Department of State, there appeared in steady succession Henry Cabot Lodge's *Works of Alexander Hamilton* (entry 13523), John Bigelow's *Complete Works of Benjamin Franklin* (entry 13381), Worthington C. Ford's *Writings of George Washington* (entry 14674), Henry P. Johnston's *Correspondence and Public Papers of John Jay* (entry 13699), Kate Rowland Mason's *Life [and Correspondence] of George Mason* (entry 13979), Paul L. Ford's *Writings of Thomas Jefferson* (entry 13701), Moncure Conway's *Writings [of Thomas Paine]* (entry 14143), Charles R. King's *Life and Correspondence of Rufus King* (entry 13766), Stanislaus M. Hamilton's *Writings of James Monroe* (entry 14025), Gaillard Hunt's *Writings of James Madison* (entry 13944), and Harry Alonzo Cushing's *Writings of Samuel Adams* (entry 12685), the last major commercial venture in documentary publishing.

The Growth of Professional Standards in Documentary Preservation and Publication

THE AMERICAN HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

Before the 1870's the writing of American history had fallen solely within the province of semiprofes-

sional scholars or talented amateurs who often transformed their avocations into second careers following successful ventures in business, medicine, or law. The transition from a classical curriculum to an elective system in American colleges and the development of the modern university based on professional training and scholarship, however, signaled the arrival of the teacher-specialist who established by the end of the century new canons of historical methodology and research. In many ways the professionalization of history may have been part of a larger shift in American culture from romanticism to realism, but it also had an impact on the development of reliable sources on the Revolution and their more intensive use; for the empirical approach adopted by professional historians centered on documentary criticism and the steady, patient accumulation of facts. Basing their research upon the haphazard collections of materials gathered by American historical societies, the new historians produced the first wave of local institutional studies that became the hallmark of the seminar systems established by German-trained Ph.D.'s at The Johns Hopkins University and Columbia University. At the same time historians began to adopt stricter standards in documentary collecting and editing and to develop common centers of professional authority as had their colleagues in law, chemistry, economics, and political science. In their attempt to dominate the field of historical scholarship, promote reform among local historical societies and state archival agencies, and nationalize the study of American history, the new professionals established the American Historical Association in 1884 under the leadership of Herbert Baxter Adams of Johns Hopkins. Adams, as the Association's first corresponding secretary and a member of the Executive Council, succeeded in obtaining in 1889 a federal charter for the AHA and a congressional subsidy for office space in Washington and for publication of the society's *Annual Report*. Nine years later the Association assumed support of the *American Historical Review* which had been established as a private venture in 1895 under the editorship of J. Franklin Jameson. By the turn of the century the *Review* had become the recognized organ of professional historians in the United States, setting national standards through the quality of its articles, documents, and book reviews. The Association's new status and the *Review's* success signaled the beginning of a new era, for they coincided with the creation of large numbers of research institutions (federal and state agencies, college and university libraries, and privately endowed depositories), the compilation of elaborate bibliographies and manuscript guides, the

growth of technological services, and the development of new avenues of scholarly publication, communication, and support that combined to transform historical research in the early 20th century.

HISTORICAL MANUSCRIPTS COMMISSION

Those who were most instrumental in creating these new departures exerted pressure through various divisions of the AHA, focusing their attention first at the federal and, later, at the state level. In 1895 the Association established a Historical Manuscripts Commission, based on the British precedent of 1869, and appointed J. Franklin Jameson and four other scholars to draft guidelines for the development of manuscript collections in the United States. Publishing its recommendations in the AHA *Annual Report* for 1896, the commission urged that privately owned documents be deposited in existing agencies, that these agencies extend and upgrade their holdings by including neglected sources for social and economic history, and that the federal and state governments support documentary publication programs. The commission's further resolve that a full listing of available guides to American archives be compiled resulted in the publication of Edmund C. Burnett's *List of Printed Guides to and Descriptions of Archives and Other Repositories of Historical Manuscripts* (entry 677). In the meantime, the commission itself began publishing documentary collections and research guides in an expanded AHA *Annual Report*, beginning with the letters of Stephen Higginson, 1783-1804 (entry 13602), and the correspondence of Phineas Bond, the first British consul to the United States, 1787-94 (entry 12869). Jameson also provided an introduction to the "Colonial Assemblies and Their Legislative Journals" (entry 414) and furnished a "Guide to the Items Relating to American History in the Reports of the English Historical Manuscripts Commission and Their Appendices" (entry 557).

CARNEGIE INSTITUTION OF WASHINGTON

The work of the Historical Manuscripts Commission was furthered by the AHA Council in 1901 when it appointed Jameson, Charles Francis Adams, and Andrew C. McLaughlin to explore the possibility of establishing an institute for advanced historical studies, a move that nearly coincided with the creation of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, which adopted the AHA panel as an advisory committee and in 1905 appointed Jameson as director of its Department of Historical Research. Until the dissolution of the department in 1923 there followed a period of

immensely creative activity as Jameson launched an effective campaign of propaganda and persuasion in an effort to impress upon public officials and historians alike the critical need to collect, preserve, and organize manuscripts, especially in the federal and state archives. Jameson's personal letters and those he wrote in his capacity as department director (now in the collections of the Library of Congress) attest to the extraordinary range of his activities and influence. Continuing to support projects just begun, such as the *Writings on American History* (entry 63), Edmund C. Burnett's *Letters of the Members of the Continental Congress* (entry 8743), and Charles M. Andrews' survey of manuscripts for American colonial and Revolutionary history in London archives (entries 539 and 540), Jameson commissioned or shouldered the major responsibility for many other undertakings, such as Helen H. Catterall's *Judicial Cases Concerning American Slavery and the Negro* (entry 10264), Elizabeth Donnan's *Documents Illustrative of the History of the Slave Trade to America* (entry 10319), Charles O. Paullin and John K. Wright's *Atlas of Historical Geography of the United States* (entry 907), and, in his capacity as chairman of the American Council of Learned Societies, the compilation of the *Dictionary of American Biography* (entry 12577), which includes over 500 biographical essays on Revolutionary figures. More significant, perhaps, was the publication of the Carnegie guides to American materials in archives in the United States and abroad. Following the publication of Claude H. Van Tyne and Waldo G. Leland's *Guide to the Archives of the Government of the United States in Washington* (entry 764), Jameson oversaw the work of 16 scholars who published between 1907 and 1943 nearly 20 volumes containing their descriptions of relevant collections in British (entries 539, 540, and 562), Spanish (entries 529, 536, and 537), French (entries 525 and 532), Italian (entry 526), German (entry 530), Canadian (entry 591), and West Indian (entry 597 and 603) depositories.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

Because of their timely appearance these volumes served as the principal finding and ordering aids used by the Library of Congress as it carried out the extensive foreign copying program begun in 1905 by Herbert Putnam, one of its most innovative and enterprising chiefs. In fact, a very close relationship developed among the major institutions and the professional elite in Washington between 1900 and 1940. The AHA continued to stimulate the growing demand for documentary preservation; the Carnegie Institution published guides to domestic and foreign

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records; and the Library of Congress assumed the major task of collecting and preserving manuscripts at the national level. Shortly after he became Librarian in 1899, Putnam brought Worthington C. Ford from the Boston Public Library to head the recently created Division of Manuscripts. At that time the division held some 43,000 uncataloged and cataloged documents which came largely from the "Loyalist Papers" transferred from the Smithsonian Institution in 1866, the Force Collection obtained in 1867, the Rochambeau Collection purchased by Congress in 1882, and the Joseph M. Toner Collection donated between 1882 and 1896. In 1903 Theodore Roosevelt ordered that the records of the Continental Congress and the Philadelphia Convention as well as the papers of Franklin, Washington, Jefferson, Hamilton, Madison, and Monroe be transferred from the Department of State to the Library. To embellish this great body of Revolutionary material, Putnam developed an ongoing program of ordering from European depositories handwritten transcripts (later, photostats and microfilm) of colonial and Revolutionary manuscripts by using as a key Steven's *Catalogue Index of Manuscripts in the Archives of England, France, Holland, and Spain Relating to America, 1763-1783* which the Library obtained in 1905. Within a few years, however, the Library was able to rely on the much fuller Carnegie guides. Putnam also proved adept at soliciting gifts and raising funds to purchase additional collections. In 1925 James B. Wilbur gave the Library an endowment of \$192,671, the income from which is still used to obtain foreign reproductions. This donation was greatly enhanced in 1927 when John D. Rockefeller, Jr., provided a total of \$450,000 over a five-year period to be used for the same purpose. Having obtained 300,000 transcripts and facsimile folios by that date, the Library added nearly 2½ billion more pages under the new program. In total, the Library's *Manuscript Sources in the Library of Congress for Research on the American Revolution* (1975), compiled by John R. Sellers, Gerard W. Gawalt, Paul H. Smith, and Patricia Molen Van Ee, describes 479 collections of foreign reproductions obtained from 84 European, Canadian, and Mexican depositories. Together with the 1,128 domestic collections in the Manuscript Division, they represent the largest body of Revolutionary sources available for research in the United States. Large sections from both groups, such as the Colonial Office papers from America and the West Indies and the papers of the early presidents, are available on microfilm.

Other programs and collections at the Library have also been vital to the study of the Revolution. While chief of the Division of Manuscripts, Worthington C. Ford began to edit the *Journals of the Continental Congress* (entry 8748). Later, under J. Franklin Jameson's tenure as chief (1928-37), John C. Fitzpatrick, with 30 years of experience in the division, compiled for the Washington Bicentennial Commission the *Writings of George Washington* (entry 14674). Among collections of contemporary printed sources, the newspaper and rare book collections at the Library are second only to those of the American Antiquarian Society in Worcester, Massachusetts. The Library's rare book collection contains more than one-third of the 39,162 books, pamphlets, newspapers, journals, and broadsides listed in Charles Evans' *American Bibliography [1639-1800]* (entry 358). Of these, slightly more than 7,000 fall into the Revolutionary period. The Library's files of 18th-century newspapers contain over 525 titles in nearly 2,200 volumes. By the same token, the Geography and Map Division houses the largest collection of Revolutionary maps and views in the United States—nearly 3,500 plates, charts, atlases, and manuscript maps.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES

The American Historical Association, the Carnegie Institution, and the Library of Congress were thus successful in creating a national focus and a central depository for the study of American history. But professional historians recognized the need for a truly national archival program to preserve the country's documentary heritage. The campaign for a national repository had been long and tedious, originating in post-Civil War demands by federal agencies for a hall of records to store noncurrent material. In his position at the Carnegie Institution, J. Franklin Jameson became the protagonist in the struggle, encouraging the AHA Council to form in 1909 the Conference of Archivists and to petition Congress in 1910 for a national archives modeled on the British Public Record Office. After several interruptions and false starts, the movement culminated in the National Archives Act of 1934 and the appointment of a North Carolina historian, Robert D. W. Connor, as the first Archivist of the United States. Faced with the task of managing nearly 10,000,000 cubic feet of federal records created since 1774, Connor and his staff surveyed the holdings of various departments and agencies in Washington and elsewhere, devised organizational principles and policies, and began the ongoing process of transferring

selected record groups to the new Archives building or its outlying branches. Of the 409 record groups acquired by the agency and described in its *Guide to the National Archives of the United States* (1974), 26 contain documents from the Revolutionary period, the most important of which are the records of the Continental and Confederation congresses and the Constitutional Convention (transferred to the Archives from the Library of Congress in 1952). As part of its program of documentary publication on microfilm, the National Archives has made nearly all of these records, with appropriate guides, widely available. More than a little credit for the Archives' accomplishments must go to those members of the American Historical Association whose promotional efforts in Washington made the fate of the nation's records a matter of public and official concern.

The Establishment of State and Local Programs in the 20th Century

PUBLIC ARCHIVES COMMISSION

At the local level members of the AHA also campaigned for the reform of state archives and historical societies. In 1899 the Association created a Public Archives Commission to investigate the condition of state and local manuscript records and to take steps to improve the functions of public depositories. Between 1900 and 1906 the commission's agent surveyed local records in all state and some county and municipal archives along the eastern seaboard, publishing their findings in the AHA's *Annual Report*. The most thorough reviews were made by Herman V. Ames and Albert E. McKinley in Pennsylvania (entries 709-710), John Spencer Bassett in North Carolina (entries 779-780), and Ulrich B. Phillips in Georgia (entry 801). On the whole, the commission's reports showed that the accumulation and care of archival material varied greatly from state to state with the worst conditions being found in Delaware (entry 728). The commission's efforts stimulated local demands for reform and were responsible for the passage of legislation in many of the states relating to the preservation, custody, and administration of noncurrent records. By the end of the First World War five eastern states had created independent historical records commissions as part of the state government, four maintained their archives in state libraries or historical societies, two used the office of the secretary of state as the principal depository, and two others

divided their records among several departments and divisions.

SOUTHERN STATES

The Public Archives Commission's greatest success was achieved in the southern states, which acted almost simultaneously in redressing the regional imbalance in state archival administration that had existed throughout the 19th century. Unlike New England, the South had few well organized historical societies; thus the states were forced to create new governmental agencies for the care of public documents. These agencies usually performed a triple function, serving as collectors, custodians, and publishers. In Virginia, for example, the archives had traditionally been preserved in the State Library by the secretary of the commonwealth. In the 1870's, efforts were made to obtain transcripts of Virginia records in England through the offices of W. Noel Sainsbury. Shortly thereafter, William P. Palmer edited the *Calendar of Virginia State Papers [1652-1869]* (entry 2164), which included land patents, court records, state papers, council proceedings, and public and private correspondence from the Revolutionary period as well as the letters and proceedings of the Committee of Correspondence and Inquiry, 1773-75, and the journal of the Committee of Safety for 1776. Stimulated by the activities of the Public Archives Commission, however, the Virginia legislature empowered the newly established State Library Board to create an Archives Division and a Historical Publications Division to preserve and publish the colonial and Revolutionary records of the state. In steady succession there appeared under the editorship of John P. Kennedy, Henry R. McIlwaine, and others, the *Journals of the House of Burgesses of Virginia [1619-1776]* (entries 4612-4615), the legislative and executive journals of the colonial council, 1680-1775 (entries 4610-4611), the official letters of governors Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Nelson, and Benjamin Harrison; 1776-83 (entry 9189), and the *Journals of the Council of State of Virginia [1776-88]* (entry 9184). In its bulletins and annual reports or as separate publications, the State Library also issued a list of Revolutionary soldiers of Virginia (entry 8061), a compilation of justices of the peace, 1757-75 (entry 4676), and the proceedings of the committees of safety of the counties of Cumberland and Isle of Wight (entry 9179), Caroline and Southampton (entry 9178), and Westmoreland and Fincastle (entry 9191).

A similar program was launched in Georgia as a

result of Ulrich B. Phillips's survey of its depositories. In 1922 the legislature directed that transcripts of Georgia material in the Public Record Office in London be obtained and that the state's colonial and Revolutionary records be published. A special Office of Compiler of Records was created for former governor Allen D. Candler who prepared and published in 28 volumes *The Colonial Records of the State of Georgia [1732-82]* (entry 2359), and *The Revolutionary Records of the State of Georgia [1767-85]* (entry 9292). Fourteen volumes in the first series were devoted to the proceedings of the governor and council, 1754-82 (entry 2360), the journals of the upper and lower houses of assembly, 1755-82 (entries 2361 and 4785), and the extant statutes for the years 1754 to 1789 (entry 2362). The *Revolutionary Records* contain such material as the journals of the Provincial Congress, 1775-76, the Council of Safety, 1775-77, and the House of Assembly, 1781-84 (entry 9289); the minutes of the Executive Council, 1778-85 (entry 9283); the records of the sales of confiscated estates, 1769-82; and the journal of the Land Court for 1784. Unfortunately, the failure of the legislature to appropriate additional funds at the time has prevented the publication of an additional 14 volumes of *Colonial Records*.

In North Carolina a single man, William L. Saunders, was largely responsible for publishing the state's historical records. His background as an editor, his political power, and his position as secretary of state from 1879 to 1891 enabled him to obtain legislative sanction for procuring North Carolina documents in foreign archives and publishing the *Colonial Records of North Carolina [1662-1776]* (entry 4686). Saunders' success prompted the legislature to support the efforts of state supreme court justice Walter Clark in publishing a companion series, *The State Records of North Carolina [1777-90]*, issued in 16 volumes between 1895 and 1907 (entry 9232). Saunders had included in the earlier volumes the journals of both the assembly and the council, the correspondence of the royal governors, and a wide variety of other official documents. The later series kept the same overall focus, but also embraced correspondence of prominent public and military figures, colonial and state statutes from 1715 to 1788, and material from the Public Record Office from 1730 to 1776 that Saunders was unable to include in the *Colonial Records*. As a result of these efforts, the Public Archives Commission's report on its archives, and the steps taken in other southern states, the legislature established in 1903 the North Carolina Historical Commission which over-

saw between 1909 and 1914 the publication of a four-volume index to the colonial and state records, compiled and edited by Stephen B. Weeks. The commission (now the Division of Archives and History) has successfully maintained the state's archival preeminence by actively collecting all types of manuscripts, publishing finding aids, and issuing since 1924 one of the leading state historical magazines, the *North Carolina Historical Review*.

Efforts to organize and publish South Carolina's rich archival holdings were aided in 1894 when the general assembly, at the urging of the state's historical society, created a historical commission to complete the task of securing copies of the state's colonial documents in England. It was not until 1905, however, that the assembly empowered the Historical Commission to care for the state's archives, then in the office of the secretary of state, and to publish historical records, which between 1905 and 1949 reached nearly 60 small volumes of primary material. These included documents relating to South Carolina's role in the Revolutionary War (entry 8090), the journals of the general assembly for 1776 (entry 9261), and of the House of Representatives for 1782 (entry 9263), the payment of claims against South Carolina growing out of the Revolution (entry 8094), the journal of the commissioners of the South Carolina navy, 1776-80 (entry 8091), the audited accounts of Revolutionary claims against the state (entry 8093), and the senate journal for 1782 (entry 9264). Yet these represent but a small fraction of the state's records, and it was not until the Archives Act of 1954 that the Historical Commission was abolished and its function transferred to the new Archives Department under the direction of James H. Easterby who developed a plan for extending the series of published colonial records. Thus far Easterby's initiatives have resulted in publication of Indian affairs documents for the period 1750-65 (entry 5557), the journals of the provincial congresses, 1775-76 (entry 9254), the *Journals of the General Assembly and House of Representatives, 1776-1782* (entry 9262), the *Journals of the Privy Council, 1783-1789* (entry 9265), and *The Journal of the Commons House of Assembly* (entry 4759) which will cover the period 1736-76, but has only reached the year 1750.

Among the southern states, Maryland's program has been quite successful. As the de facto archival agency of the state, the Maryland Historical Society, with the support and authority of the state legislature, began to issue in 1883 the *Archives of Maryland* (entry 2120). Under a succession of editors from William

Hand Browne to Aubrey C. Land, the series has reached 72-odd volumes. Among them are the pre-Revolutionary journals of the general assembly and provincial council (entry 4572), the correspondence of Governor Horatio Sharpe, 1753-71 (entry 4573), the proceedings of the council of safety, 1775-77 (entry 9163), and of the state council, 1775-89 (entry 9165), and muster rolls and lists of Maryland soldiers in the Revolution (entry 8037). Moreover, a special commission was created in 1935 to take charge of the newly constructed Hall of Records built in Annapolis on land donated to the state by St. John's College. Among the records placed in its keeping were the "rainbow series," whose content has been carefully described in the *Calendar of Maryland State Papers* (entry 740), composed of the Black Books (miscellaneous colonial and Revolutionary documents to 1785), the Blue Books (Bank Stock Papers dealing with paper money during the Confederation period), the Brown Books (civil and military correspondence focusing on the Revolutionary period), the Red Books (military documents largely from the years 1773-81), and a volume of executive miscellanea.

MIDDLE ATLANTIC STATES

From the middle of the 19th century, Pennsylvania steadfastly supported the publication of its official records. In addition to the first series of *Pennsylvania Archives [1664-1790]* (entry 1960), eight more series totaling 108 volumes were issued between 1874 and 1935 under the successive editorships of John B. Linn, William H. Egle, George E. Reed, Thomas L. Montgomery, Gertrude MacKinney, and Charles F. Hoban (entry 1973). Sources for the Revolution, with a heavy emphasis on military affairs, are concentrated in the second and third series edited by Linn and Egle. Among the scattered groups of miscellaneous documents from the period, there appeared 15 volumes devoted to the minutes of the Board of War (entry 8003), rosters of Pennsylvania's battalions and Continental Line (entry 8004) and associated battalions and militia (entry 7996), documents relating to the Connecticut settlement in the Wyoming Valley (entry 1961), minutes of the Board of Property and other references to land (entry 1962), commissions issued by the province of Pennsylvania with official proclamations, 1733-90 (entry 1967), the wartime accounts of the county lieutenants, 1777-89 (entry 9100), and further muster rolls of the navy, line, militia, and rangers, 1775-83 (entry 7995). The minutes of the council for the Revolutionary period had been published in the *Colonial Records* (entry 4502). The pa-

pers of the Revolutionary governors were part of the fourth series (entry 1968); the election returns of the Pennsylvania counties from 1756 to 1759 formed part of the sixth (entry 1964); and the votes and proceedings of the House of Representatives from 1682 to 1776 (entry 4500) made up the entire eighth series. In response to the Public Archives Commission's surveys in Pennsylvania and the efforts of the AHA, the Division of Public Records was established as part of the State Library in 1905. The first custodian organized the archives in chronological series and preserved them in bound volumes. After seeing through publication the final 40 volumes of the *Pennsylvania Archives*, the division and its records were absorbed by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, an independent state agency created in 1945. Four years later the commission issued a guide and finding list to all 138 volumes of the *Archives* and *Colonial Records* (entry 98).

Archival development in New York took a different course. Until they were moved to the State Library in Albany in 1847, New York's records were kept in the office of the secretary of state. Edmund B. O'Callaghan selected many of them for publication in his *Documentary History of the State of New York* (entry 1747) and *Documents Relative to the Colonial History of the State of New York* (entry 1748). In 1884 the State Library and its newly created Manuscripts and History Section were put under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. During this period the state issued *The Colonial Laws of New York From the Year 1644 to the Revolution* (entry 4419) and the journals of Major General John Sullivan's expedition against the Six Nations in 1779 (entry 6499). New York's publication program was considerably enhanced after 1895 with the appointment of Hugh Hastings as state historian, an office separate in function from the State Library. While the library issued a *Calendar of Council Minutes, 1668-1783* in 1902 (entry 1750), the State Historian's office published the *Public Papers of George Clinton, First Governor of New York, 1777-1795, 1801-1804* (entry 9021), the *Military Minutes of the Council of Appointment of the State of New York 1783-1821* (entry 9018), the *Ecclesiastical Records, State of New York* (entry 11163), and the *Minutes of the Commissioners for Detecting and Defeating Conspiracies in the State of New York [1777-81]* (entry 9013). The devastating fire in 1911 that destroyed over two-thirds of the State Library's manuscript holdings, however, led the Board of Regents to create a Division of Archives and History that shared overlapping ju-

jurisdiction with the state historian's office and the Manuscript and History Section of the State Library in organizing and publishing what survived. Although the division has printed selected documents on the Sullivan-Clinton campaign in 1779 (entry 6522) and the orderly books of the Second and Fourth New York regiments, 1778-83 (entry 7956), the state's archival program has waned in the past half century.

More than in any other state, the Revolutionary War made a chaos of New Jersey recordkeeping as a result of the depredations of contending armies, the burning of nearly all county courthouses, and the frequent moves of the new state government. In 1872 the state legislature authorized funds to obtain transcripts of colonial documents abroad and to publish the official register of New Jersey officers and men in the Revolution (entry 7979), the minutes of the state's provincial congress and council of safety, 1775-76 (entry 9060), and a reprint of the minutes of the New Jersey ratifying convention of 1787 (entry 9632). More important, at the request of the New Jersey Historical Society, the state began to issue three series known collectively as *Documents Relating to the Colonial, Revolutionary, and Post-Revolutionary History of the State of New Jersey* under the editorship of William Nelson, William A. Whitehead, Abraham V. Honeyman, and others (entry 1882). Given the gaps in available records, however, the editors have been unable to produce a fully rounded series of documents. Of more than 40 volumes published, 36 were devoted to five groups of material. The first 10 focused on the colonial executive, 1631-1776, with the tenth containing the papers of Governor William Franklin, from 1763 to 1776 (entry 4473). Another six volumes were devoted to the journal of the governor and council, 1682-1775 (entry 4472), one to marriage records, 1665-1800 (entry 10803), and nine more to a calendar of New Jersey wills, administrations, etc., 1670-1800 (entry 10805). To achieve some balance in treatment, William Nelson edited 11 volumes of extracts from colonial newspapers published between 1704 and 1775 (entry 4470) that provided outside evidence for many aspects of New Jersey life not covered by official records. A second series of five volumes, issued between 1901 and 1917, extended the coverage to 1792 (entry 9059). Nelson also conducted for the state's Public Record Commission and the AHA's Public Archives Commission full surveys of New Jersey's holdings. After a critical review of the state's archival practices appeared in the AHA's *Annual Report* for 1916 (entry 703), the legislature created the Public Record Office, which merged with the State Library

in 1941 and was changed to the Bureau of Archives and History in 1945. The Bureau completed the first series of *Documents* by extending the coverage of wills and administrations to 1817 and began recently to issue yet a third series. Edited by David A. Bernstein, the first volume to appear is the *Minutes of the Governor's Privy Council, 1777-1789* (1974).

Delaware's archives were devastated to an even greater extent than those of New Jersey. Formed in 1776 from the three lower counties of Pennsylvania, the state stored its records for more than a century in the loft and basement of the capitol at Dover where they were subject to vandalism, theft, and fire. By 1906, Edgar B. Dawson, who investigated the state's holdings for the AHA's Public Archives Commission, found that no state had less material for writing its history than Delaware. Aroused by public appeals, the legislature established a Division of Public Records, changing its name in 1911 to the Public Archives Commission. The first state archivist presided over the publication of the surviving Revolutionary records. The first three volumes of the *Delaware Archives* (entry 8030) contain military and naval records (regimental rolls, militia lists, names of pensioners, memorials, and petitions) and miscellaneous correspondence. The commission has also reprinted the *Proceedings of the [Constitutional] Convention of the Delaware State* (entry 9142) and the *Votes and Proceedings of the Houses of Representatives [1765]* (entry 4554).

NEW ENGLAND

In New England there was generally less pressure to alter traditional archival practices or to launch new publishing programs, especially in view of early accomplishments in the field. New Hampshire's records, although small in volume, had been well maintained by the secretary of state in both the state library and the historical society. Over a 76-year period the legislature provided for the publication under several editors of the most important colonial and Revolutionary documents in a series known by its composite title as the *Provincial and State Papers* (entry 1326). Included in the series were papers from the Wentworth administration, 1764-76 (entry 4263); various documents from the period 1776-83 (entry 8877); records of the towns, 1778-84, with an appendix containing the journals of the constitutional conventions of 1778-79 and 1781-83 (entry 8878); miscellaneous documents, 1779-92, including letters of the Committee of Safety, 1779-84 (entry 8876); rolls and documents relating to soldiers in the Rev-

olutionary War (entry 7855); early state papers, 1784–93 (entry 8875); and miscellaneous Revolutionary documents (entry 7852). The state published separately the index to the journals of the House of Representatives, 1711–84 (entry 627) and the colonial and state statutes (entry 1327).

Connecticut was also able to publish a large proportion of its surviving archives. Under the direction of the state librarian, James H. Trumbull and Charles J. Hoadly edited a chronologically arranged series of *Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut [1636–1776]* (entry 4383). A continuation, *The Public Records of the State of Connecticut [1776–]* (entry 8986), has been edited by Hoadly and Leonard W. Labaree. While the last three volumes of the original series focus on official documents and reports from 1763 to the Revolution, the first six volumes of the state papers contain the journals of the Council of Safety and various state conventions from 1776 to 1789.

In Massachusetts, the strength of the publishing programs of the major historical societies in the Boston area affected the response of the state government. Since the end of the 18th century the state has maintained its archives in the office of the secretary of commonwealth. Just before the Civil War the secretary began issuing *The Acts and Resolves . . . of the Province of Massachusetts Bay [1692–1780]* (entry 4309). These were followed by 17 volumes of *Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors of the Revolutionary War* (entry 7908). Other projects, such as editing the *Journals of the House of Representatives of Massachusetts* (entry 4307), have been taken up by the Massachusetts Historical Society.

In Rhode Island the *Records of the Colony of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations in New England [1636–1792]* (entry 1641), has served as a staple research source for over a century, but other major series based on the records maintained by the secretary of state have not appeared. Gertrude Kimball's *Correspondence of the Colonial Governors of Rhode Island, 1723–1775* (entry 4372), for example, was sponsored by a private organization, the National Society of Colonial Dames.

The care and maintenance of state archives thus vary widely. Those states that lacked strong archival traditions at the turn of century created independent archival agencies or commissions within the state governments, whereas states with privately-sponsored publication programs tended to leave their records in the care of secretaries of state or divided among several departments or divisions. Much of the credit for the development of new programs can be attributed to

the investigations and influence of the American Historical Association's Public Archives Commission. At the same time, the AHA, in its attempts to take stock of national historical resources, turned its attention to those institutions first responsible for the development of a tradition of preservation—the state and local historical societies.

THE CONFERENCE OF STATE AND LOCAL HISTORICAL SOCIETIES

At the annual meeting of the AHA in Chicago in 1904, the first Conference of State and Local Historical Societies was held to consider the condition and role of the 400 to 500 associations created during the previous century. Benjamin F. Shambaugh, Franklin L. Riley, and Reuben Gold Thwaites were appointed as a committee to circulate questionnaires among the societies and to recommend the best method of organizing state historical work and promoting cooperation. The committee reported the following year in Baltimore that older privately endowed societies, such as those in Massachusetts, New York, and Pennsylvania, had attained a high level of autonomy and usefulness and that elsewhere, especially in the South, state historical organizations had allied with departments of history in the state universities in an effort to strengthen their programs. Locally, town historical societies were the rule in New England, while counties had become the unit of organization in other parts of the country. The committee believed that such decentralization actually hindered the collection and dissemination of historical material and that organization and cooperation were essential; perhaps in the form of a centralized depository in each state for records not purely local in nature. It further recommended that all manuscripts held by state and local societies be systematically cataloged and full inventories widely distributed. One of the immediate results of the committee's efforts was the publication of a guide to those sources already in print, A. P. C. Griffin's "Bibliography of American Historical Societies," as the second part of the AHA's 1905 *Annual Report* (entry 50).

In 1908 a new Committee on the Cooperation of Historical Societies and Departments was appointed to make inquiries into the holdings of local associations and to publish their findings in the *Annual Report*. Unfortunately, fewer than 20 percent of the societies responded, and pleas issued at future meetings of the Conference of State and Local Historical Societies were to little avail. The conference continued to be part of the annual meeting of the

AHA for the next 30 years, but it was superseded in 1942 by the American Association for State and Local History, which assumed the tasks of coordinating the activities of institutions and individuals interested in the promotion of state and local history and serving as a clearinghouse for programs in the field.

Although attempts to organize and focus the activities of local societies were less successful than the AHA anticipated, local institutions continued to proliferate, nearly doubling their number, from 500 to 1,000, by the eve of the Second World War. A major development during this period was the transition in state and local historical publications from irregular and fragmentary collections and proceedings to professionally edited journals such as the *New-York Historical Society Quarterly*, the *Maryland Historical Magazine*, and the *Georgia Historical Quarterly*. Yet, despite the increasing emphasis on scholarship in historical publication, many smaller societies were faced with the need to popularize their activities and to combat spiraling costs by broadening the basis of their support in the local community. The more self-sufficient societies, however, were able to continue documentary publication in some form or another.

NEW ENGLAND

In New England the Massachusetts Historical Society remained a focal point for the other societies in the region, and its *Collections* and *Proceedings* continued to be models for others to emulate. Over 200 volumes had appeared before 1900. Its program continued unabated after the turn of the century with the publication of the diary of John Quincy Adams, 1787-88 (entry 12682), the letters and papers of John Singleton Copley and Henry Pelham, 1739-76 (entry 13112), letters and papers relating to the commerce of Rhode Island, 1726-1800 (entry 9809), the journals of Josiah Quincy, Jr., 1773-75 (entry 14258), and the letters of John and Samuel Adams and James Warren (entry 14669). Other volumes include the letters and papers of the colony's London agent, Jasper Mauduit, 1752-65 (entry 3093), Worthington C. Ford's guide to broadsides and ballads printed in Massachusetts from 1639 to 1800 (entry 473), and commissions of Massachusetts privateers in the Revolution (entry 7373). In addition, the society began in 1919 to publish 36 projected volumes of the *Journals of the House of Representatives of Massachusetts (1715-80)* (entry 4307). Subsequently, funding difficulties led to less expensive means of reproduction, such as two series of rare imprints selected by Worthington C. Ford that were distributed among subscribing libraries, including the

Library of Congress, under the title *Photostat Americana*. The society also issued photostats of newspapers in its collections, such as *The Boston News-Letter*, 1740-76, *The Georgia Gazette*, 1763-73, and, in collaboration with the Virginia Historical Society, *The Virginia Gazette*, 1736-80. In 1955 the voluminous Adams family papers were deposited in the society's care, and a microfilm edition of the great bulk of the papers was prepared for sale to interested depositories and scholars. Under the general editorship of Lyman H. Butterfield, Harvard University Press began publishing in letterpress selections from the well-known family diaries and correspondence, a program that will reach an estimated 100 volumes in several series. Thus far the focus has been on the 18th century with the appearance of *The Diary and Autobiography of John Adams*, the *Adams Family Correspondence* through 1782, and *The Legal Papers of John Adams* (entry 12681). A new series of the political correspondence of John Adams is now being edited by Robert J. Taylor, who succeeded Butterfield in 1975.

Elsewhere in New England, the New Hampshire Historical Society issued 17 volumes of source material in the 19th century but ended its *Collections* with Otis G. Hammond's edition of the letters and papers of Major General John Sullivan, 1771-95 (entry 14525). It also issued separately in 1937 Samuel Lane's journal of the years 1739-1803 (entry 13795). Thereafter, it directed its publications to more popular works, such as *Historical New Hampshire* which was launched in 1944. The Rhode Island Historical Society included the papers of William Vernon and the Navy Board, 1776-94, in its *Publications* for 1901 (entry 8755) and issued separately Theodore Foster's minutes of the South Kingston convention of March 1790 (entry 9614), the letterbook and correspondence of Esek Hopkins (entry 13631), and the correspondence of Governor Samuel Ward, 1775-76 (entry 14663). Its *Publications* ceased in 1941, to be replaced by *Rhode Island History*, which contains sources relating to Captain James Miliace's patrol of Narragansett Bay in H.M.S. *Rose*, 1774 (entry 3974) and the minutes of the court-martial proceedings relating to the destruction of the *Gaspee* (entry 3977). From its newspaper collection, the society microfilmed and distributed widely a complete file of the *Providence Gazette*, 1762-95. The Connecticut Historical Society had provided its members with 30 volumes of colonial and Revolutionary material in its *Collections* during the 19th century. To those works it added the lists and returns of Connecticut men in the Revolution, 1775-83 (entry 7930), the correspondence and

documents of governors Thomas Fitch, 1754–66 (entry 4385), and William Pitkin, 1766–69 (entry 4386), the Revolutionary letters of Joshua and Jedediah Huntington (entry 13667), the correspondence among Silas Deane, his brothers, and their business and political associates, 1771–95 (entry 13189), and the journals of Israel and Rufus Putnam on their exploration of the Mississippi River, 1772–73 (entry 14253). The Connecticut society also adopted in 1934 a more popular format in its quarterly *Bulletin*, in which it has included such items as 1774–75 fragments from the diary of Silas Deane (entries 4148–4149) and an analysis of the correspondence of Samuel Peters and Benjamin Trumbull (entry 14192).

MIDDLE ATLANTIC STATES

Among associations in the Middle Atlantic states, the New-York Historical Society's program of documentary publication continued through the John Watts DePeyster Publication Fund Series. From 1916 it issued the New York muster and pay rolls from the Revolutionary War (entry 6987), the proceedings of the board of general officers of the British Army at New York in 1781 (entry 6810), nine volumes of the letters and papers of Cadwallader Colden, 1711–75 (entry 13088), the minutes of the committee and the first commission for detecting and defeating Loyalist conspiracies in the state of New York, 1776–78 (entry 9014), the minutes of the Council of Appointment for the state of New York, 1778–79 (entry 9019), and the letterbooks and order book of George, Lord Rodney, 1780–82 (entry 14325). A second subseries of the society's *Collections*, the John Divine Jones Fund Series, contained the travel journal of Mrs. L. S. Aikman from Charleston to London (entry 12690), the Loyalist orderly book of Brigadier General Oliver DeLancey, 1776–78 (entry 6839), and a calendar of New York colonial commissions, 1680–1770 (entry 4412). Members of the society also contributed to the intricate task of editing the minutes of the Common Council of the City of New York from 1675 to 1776 (entry 4411), published by the city. In the *Collections* themselves the society included the papers of the Lloyd family of Long Island from 1752 to 1826 (entry 13865), the letterbook of John Watts, 1762–65 (entry 14685), and Philip L. White's edition of the Beekman family mercantile papers, 1746–99 (entry 12827). Although large-scale documentary publications have been curtailed somewhat during the past 40 years, the *New-York Historical Society Quarterly*, which began to appear in 1917, has contained numerous letters and documents, such as a new group of sources on the

Sullivan-Clinton campaign of 1779 (entry 6511) and letters of Governor William Livingston of New Jersey in 1782 (entry 9066).

The historical societies of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Delaware have published few single or multivolume document collections in the past 75 years, although the New Jersey Historical Society cooperated with the state archives in completing the 40-odd volume *Archives of the State of New Jersey*, begun in 1880. Its *Proceedings*, dating from 1845, passed through three series before becoming a quarterly journal in 1916. Occasional documents such as Revolutionary pension records (entry 7980) and the letters of Cornelia Bell Paterson (entry 14163) have appeared in its pages. Publication of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania's *Collections* and *Memoirs* ceased in the 19th century. Their place was taken by the pioneering *Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*, launched by Frederick D. Stone. The first general historical quarterly of its type, it established a pattern that is still widely imitated. For over a century the magazine's editors have published, in addition to articles and book reviews, documentary excerpts such as the historical notes of Dr. Benjamin Rush for 1777 (entry 14348), selections from the letterbooks of Thomas Wharton, 1773–83 (entry 14711), letters from William Franklin to William Strahan, 1757–82 (entry 13385), the orderly book of the Second Pennsylvania Continental Line at Valley Forge (entry 7103), letters of Benjamin Rush, 1765–1812, that were not included in Lyman Butterfield's two-volume edition (entry 14348), letters of Gilbert Barkly, a British spy in Philadelphia, 1775–77 (entry 7773), the William Allen-Benjamin Chew correspondence for 1763–64 (entry 12708), and a host of muster rolls, Moravian records from the Revolution, and miscellaneous Revolutionary correspondence. From its large and rich newspaper collection, the society has also issued on microfilm files of the *Pennsylvania Gazette*, 1728–89, *Pennsylvania Journal*, 1742–93, *Pennsylvania Chronicle*, 1767–74, and *Pennsylvania Packet*, 1771–90. Between 1879 and 1922 the neighboring Delaware Historical Society has published 67 volumes of *Papers*, among them the journal and order book of Captain Robert Kirkwood of the Delaware Regiment, Continental Line (entry 13771). A separate edition of letters to and from Caesar Rodney, 1756–84, edited by George H. Ryden, was published in 1933 (entry 14324). Delaware also turned to a more popular format in 1946—its semi-annual *Delaware History*—including in its pages minutes of the Council of Safety, 1775–76 (entry 9143) and documents of the Kent County Loyalists (entry 8225).

SOUTHERN STATES

The southern historical agencies have in the 20th century reduced the size and content of their serials and periodicals. The Virginia Historical Society, for example, abandoned its *Collections*, which had reached 11 volumes in 1892, in favor of the quarterly *Virginia Magazine of History and Biography*. Although the early volumes were genealogically oriented, they did include excerpts of legislative documents and papers of the House of Burgesses, 1764–76 (entry 4616), the proceedings of the Virginia Committee of Correspondence, 1759–70 (entry 4617), and the order books of the main army under Washington (entry 6292). The society's interest in documentary publication was revived in the 1960's as a result of statewide programs in Virginia history stimulated by the 350th anniversary of the Jamestown settlement. It has sponsored full editions of the diary of Colonel Landon Carter of Sabine Hall, 1752–78 (entry 13008), the letters and papers of Edmund Pendleton, 1734–1803 (entry 14178), and Edmund Randolph's *History of Virginia* (entry 2186). The society also continues to include such items as the pre-Revolutionary letters of Robert Beverly (entry 12842) and the daybook of Robert Wormeley Carter (entry 13010) in its *Magazine*.

The South Carolina Historical Society also halted publication of its *Collections* and began to issue in 1900 the *South Carolina Historical and Genealogical Magazine*. Select documents have appeared in installments of varying length through the years: the correspondence of Henry Laurens (entry 13804), the order book of the First Regiment, South Carolina Line, 1775–80 (entry 6586), the correspondence of Charles Garth, London agent for the colony, 1766–73 (entry 13418), the letters of Arthur Middleton, 1763–73 (entry 14013), the writings of the Reverend William Tennent, 1740–77 (entry 14550), and the letterbook of Peter Manigault, 1763–73 (entry 13951). In 1968 the society began to sponsor a multivolume edition of the *Papers of Henry Laurens* [1746 +] under the direction of Philip M. Hamer (entry 13804).

Unlike most southern organizations, the Maryland Historical Society found sufficient support to sustain two large-scale projects beginning with its *Fund Publications* in 37 volumes from 1867 to 1901, through the *Archives of Maryland* in 70-plus volumes from 1882 to the present. The society also founded its quarterly *Maryland Historical Magazine* in 1906, using it as a vehicle for the publication of discrete units of material such as the correspondence of Governor Robert Eden, 1769–77 (entry 13275), the Charles Garth

and p. 62 papers (entry 308), the letters of the Reverend Jonathan Boucher (entry 12879), the journals of the committees of observation in the middle and upper districts of Maryland, 1773–76 (entry 955), extracts from the papers of Charles Carroll, 1750–74 (entry 13004), the familiar letters of Governor Sharp, 1758–84 (entry 14413), and the letters of Alexander Hamilton, a Piscataway factor, 177–84 (entry 13524).

The Georgia Historical Society has also managed to maintain a relatively active program. Although few volumes of its *Collections* were published in the 19th century, those that have appeared in the 20th century contain a substantial number of Revolutionary documents. The proceedings of the first provincial congress of Georgia in 1775 (entry 9290), the proceedings of the Georgia Council of Safety from 1775 to 1777 (entry 9222), and a British account of the siege of Savannah in 1779 (entry 6638) were published in 1901, followed by the letterbook of Governor Samuel Elbert, 1788 (entry 9286), the letters of the Honorable James Habersham, 1756–75 (entry 13569), and the letters of Joseph Clay, a Savannah merchant, 1776–93 (entry 13061). The *Georgia Historical Society* began publication in 1917. Among the documents included each quarter have been the official letters of governors John Martin, 1782–87 (entry 9285) and Edward Telfair, 1786–87 (entry 9287), the minutes of the Executive Council for 1777 (entry 9284) not in Candler's *Revolutionary Records*, the proceedings and minutes of the governor and council, 1774–75 and 1779–80 (entry 4786) not in Candler's *Colonial Records*, the letters of the Commons House of Assembly to the Georgia colonial agent, 1762–71 (entry 4787), the minute book of the Savannah Board of Police for 1779 (entry 9293), and Henry Muhlenberg's Georgia correspondence, 1777–84 (entry 14070). The *Quarterly* also includes the texts of documents that have been subsequently reprinted in book form as part of the society's *Collections*, such as the papers of James Jackson, 1781–98 (entry 13690) and the papers of Lachlan McIntosh, 1774–99 (entry 13921).

Thus, a fairly clear pattern emerged in the activities of the major private historical institutions on the east coast. Those with adequate financing from endowments, trusts, and private donations, such as the Massachusetts and New York societies, were able to concentrate on large-scale documentary and bibliographic publication for a longer period of time, although the Massachusetts has been able to maintain a close attachment to "proceedings" and "collections" like the other states, rising publication costs and reductions of staff, time, and money have forced

all but a few to abandon the publication of whole manuscript collections and to turn to historical interpretation in the form of topically oriented, often illustrated journals and bulletins designed to appeal to a larger audience. If the purpose of most historical societies in the 19th century was to promote a healthy skepticism toward "official" versions of the past by exposing readers to the documentary details of history, then 20th-century institutions have substantially altered that purpose in their attempt to interpret the past broadly and to disseminate historical information among an increasingly greater number of people.

The Rise of Academic, Public, and Private Libraries

One of the more constructive developments in the preservation of historical sources to take place in the 20th century has been the establishment of major research institutions by universities, private collectors, and city governments to complement the work of historical societies and the state and federal governments. The creation of such repositories has not only diversified and strengthened the nation's research resources, but it has also made available to scholars important collections that might have remained in private hands, been obscured in massive public archives, or continued to be virtually inaccessible in foreign institutions.

The emergence of the professional historian as an important part of the college faculty at the turn of the century made the growth of manuscript collections in academic libraries almost inevitable. Few campuses were located near the established centers of research, thus making a strong case for bringing manuscripts, transcripts, or photocopies to the college or university library itself. With the growth of higher education in the 20th century, the size and quality of a library's manuscript holdings became both a status symbol and a means of attracting faculty and students to the institution. Within 75 years hundreds of new depositories were created at such institutions as Dartmouth, Rutgers, William and Mary, and Duke where virtually none had existed before. Three of the oldest universities in the East—Harvard, Princeton, and the University of Virginia—house some of the richest collections of Revolutionary materials. To some degree they illustrate the preservation function of academic establishments.

Benefiting from the generous contributions of 18th- and 19th-century alumni like John Sparks and the enlightened guidance of such librarians as John L.

Sibley and Justin Winsor, the Harvard Library entered the present century with an outstanding collection of Americana which includes for the Revolution dozens of miscellaneous groupings of diaries, letters, journals, and papers as well as correspondence of Arthur Lee, Paine Wingate, Benjamin Lincoln, Sir Francis Bernard, Thomas Gage, and William Tryon. Many are transcripts or photocopies of the originals found in archives scattered throughout Europe and the United States. The manuscript collection at Princeton University not only includes the Grenville Kane Early Americana Collection but also letters of French officer Louis Alexandre Berthier, Elias Boudinot, Nathaniel Gorham, Richard Stockton, John Witherspoon, Jonathan Dickinson, and several major groups of documents relating to the Revolutionary War in New Jersey. Although Virginia's early collections centered on the Richard Henry Lee papers, a sizable donation from Thomas Jefferson, and a core collection of Landon Carter, William Lee, Dabney Carr, and Wilson Cary Nicholas papers, its 18th-century holdings have been greatly enriched by participation in a project stimulated by the 350th anniversary of the Jamestown settlement. With the full participation of the Virginia State Library and the Virginia Historical Society, the University of Virginia library provided support for a full-time research agent in the various British depositories to seek out and microfilm documents relevant to Virginia colonial and Revolutionary history. The Virginia Colonial Records Project, as it came to be known, is a direct descendant of those visionary programs undertaken in foreign archives in the 19th century by men such as Sparks, Bancroft, and O'Callaghan. With the aid of a small staff, Dr. George Reese, the project's agent, sifted through nearly all of the major record groups in institutions such as the Public Record Office, the British Museum, and Lambeth Palace in London and the Archives nationales and Bibliothèque nationale in Paris. More than a thousand survey reports of one to 40 pages were prepared, each of which described the contents of hundreds of pages of documents that have been microfilmed and sent to the major research depositories in Virginia. An index to the entire series of survey reports is in preparation. By such generous contributions to scholarship, academic libraries have assumed the lead as the prime collectors of American manuscripts.

Important strides were also made early in the century by wealthy private collectors who founded and endowed separate institutions to perpetuate their libraries. Because of the size and quality of their colonial and Revolutionary holdings, the librar-

ics of John Carter Brown in Providence, William L. Clements at Ann Arbor, and Henry E. Huntington in San Marino have attained preeminence among research institutions for the period. Beginning in the mid-19th century, the Providence merchant, John Carter Brown (1808-1874), acquired through a series of discriminating purchases in the United States and Europe an impressive collection of printed Americana from the age of discovery to 1800. To ensure its preservation and scholarly use, his son, John Nicholas Brown, provided for the establishment in 1901 of a separate institution under the aegis of Brown University. The collections have been consistently enriched by a succession of perceptive librarians—Worthington C. Ford, Lawrence C. Wroth, and Thomas R. Adams, the latter of whom has recently published *American Independence* (entry 474), a bibliographic study of the American political pamphlets printed between 1764 and 1776 dealing with the dispute between Great Britain and the colonies. The collections now include over 25,000 rare books and a strong supporting reference library. The Michigan industrialist, William L. Clements (1861-1934), also began to collect printed books from the colonial period, but later, due to his friendship with Worthington C. Ford and University of Michigan historian Claude H. Van Tyne, turned to the acquisition of British manuscripts of the Revolutionary period, among them the papers of General Thomas Gage, the Earl of Shelburne, Sir Henry Clinton, Lord George Germain, William Knox, Frederick Lord North, John Wilkes, and Richard Oswald. In 1922 Clements gave his entire library as well as a separate building to house it to the University of Michigan where it has become the key American depository for research on the British side of the Revolution. In the West, the creation of the Huntington Library by Henry Edwards Huntington (1850-1927), nephew and business representative of the railway magnate Collis P. Huntington, has provided researchers with one of the most decorative and unique refuges for scholarship in the United States. Turning avidly to the collection of Anglo-American portraits, rare books, and manuscripts after his retirement, Huntington often purchased entire libraries as they became available. One prominent example was the noted Robert A. Brock Collection of 17th- and 18th-century Virginia which required an entire railroad car to transport it from Richmond to California. Among the nearly 1½ million manuscripts and rare books obtained altogether are letters of John Jay, Thomas Jefferson, Robert Morris, and Ebenezer Huntington, and 55 volumes of Revolu-

tionary War orderly books. Huntington chose to maintain his collection in a special library and art gallery built in the middle of the impressive botanical gardens on his ranch near San Marino. Control of the institution passed upon his death to a board of trustees who adopted a policy of inviting prominent scholars of the caliber of Louis B. Wright to become members of the permanent staff, thereby ensuring the development and continued use of the collections. The library not only subsidizes the publication of monographs based in part on its holdings but invites contributions from the outside to its prestigious *Huntington Library Quarterly*.

Not the least of the major research institutions that have developed in the last century are the municipal and county libraries that have acquired manuscripts of a regional character or have been made the repository for collections that are national in scope. Two prime examples are the city libraries of Boston and New York. The Boston Public Library, founded in 1852, contains the personal library of John Adams, donated by the city of Quincy, a large collection of books printed by Benjamin Franklin plus many from his own library, a substantial corpus of early Boston imprints, and the records of the city of Boston. Among the manuscripts that it holds are the correspondence of John Hancock, Henry Knox, and George Thacher, several volumes of Signers' letters, and material on the Burgoyne campaign. But the nation's premier municipal institution for research on the Revolution is the New York Public Library. Established in 1895, its vast research holdings were acquired and are now sustained by private funds, endowment income, and gifts, although the rest of the Library system operates on public funds. In its manuscript division of more than 9,000,000 documents are the large private collections of George Bancroft, George Chalmers, Thomas A. Emmett, and Paul L. and Worthington C. Ford, as well as dozens of miscellaneous manuscript groups. They contain letters by Horatio Gates, Phillip Schuyler, Peter Gansevoort, Henry Laurens, Timothy Pickering, Robert R. and William Livingston, William Smith, Benjamin Lincoln, Jedidiah Morse, Samuel Adams, Oliver Wolcott, George Clymer, and James Duane. The library's collection of 18th-century rare books and newspapers—over 90,000 items—ranks with those of the American Antiquarian Society and the Library of Congress.

It might seem that the voluminous collections gathered by such institutions as the New York Public, Clements, and Princeton libraries would help to simplify research on the American Revolution. But the

proliferation of the newer research depositories in competition with historical societies and state and national archives has created overwhelming problems of bibliographic identification and control. Given the heterogeneity of existing manuscript depositories, the peculiarities in their traditions and modes of service, and the variety of their collections, scholars have found it difficult to plan research effectively without adequate calendars, checklists, guides, or indexes. To resolve the problems of access several steps have been taken at the national level in the past 50 years to establish uniform practices for cataloging, describing, and reporting individual books and manuscript collections.

The Search for Control

Early in the century, the eighth Librarian of Congress, Herbert Putnam, recognized the difficulties that would soon confront depositories if a uniform system of cataloging and identifying books and sources were not adopted. Under his leadership the Library took three far-reaching steps by creating systems for distributing its printed catalog cards, compiling a national union catalog of books in other American libraries, and lending books and other sources to libraries for scholarly use. Somewhat later, the staff of the newly opened National Archives united with their colleagues in state and local organizations to create in 1936 the Society of American Archivists. Their goal was to develop uniform practices of archival preservation and administration. As a platform for continuing discussion they began to publish in 1938 the *American Archivist*. Both of these developments not only encouraged a great exchange of information and material, but they also paralleled the first major archival survey undertaken by the federal government—an attempt to describe in uniform manner the holdings of thousands of county, city, and town archives.

THE HISTORICAL RECORDS SURVEY

After publishing reports on over two-thirds of the state archives by the eve of World War I, the American Historical Society's Public Archives Commission lost much of its initial impetus until the early 1930's when it received many proposals for a new survey. Thereupon, the commission, acting at the direction of the AHA Council, published a pamphlet on *The Preservation of Local Archives; a Guide for Public Officials* (1932) and soon presented plans for a nationwide survey of state, local, and private archives. Although the AHA was unable to take action

then, a similar proposal drawn up by Robert C. Binkley, chairman of the Social Science Research Council-American Council of Learned Societies Joint Committee on Materials for Research, was presented to the Roosevelt administration in 1935 by Luther H. Evans. The result was the establishment, under Evan's direction, of the Historical Records Survey of the Works Progress Administration. After careful planning, Evans published in early 1936 a procedural *Manual for the Survey of Historical Records* which became the authoritative writ for over 3,000 unemployed teachers, file clerks, stenographers, and typists who covered every courthouse in the nation as well as hundreds of other depositories in the next three years, preparing by 1942 28 volumes of inventories of state archives, 628 volumes of county archives, 180 volumes of municipal archives, and 107 guides to manuscript collections. Among the more important works touching on the Revolutionary period were a calendar of the manuscripts in the New Jersey State Library (entry 695), a catalog of the Du Simitiere papers in the Library Company of Philadelphia (entry 714), guides to manuscripts in the Historical Society of Pennsylvania (entry 716), the North Carolina Historical Commission (entry 784), and the Southern Historical Collection of the University of North Carolina (entry 786), and surveys of dozens of county and city archives in the original thirteen states. Expansion of the WPA survey to include early American imprints, under Douglas C. McMurtrie, as well as inventories of portraits, the records of early church congregations, and a Historical American Buildings Survey greatly increased public awareness of local documentation for the study of the colonial and Revolutionary periods. Moreover, the very success of the WPA project provoked greater concern for improved care of local archival records. As part of the same general thrust, the Library of Congress, in association with the University of North Carolina, launched a State Records Microfilm Project which reproduced between 1941 and 1950 the equivalent of 2½ million pages of legislative proceedings, statutes, executive and administrative records, and court records for the colonial and Revolutionary periods. A *Guide to the Microfilm Collection of Early State Records* was published in 1950 (entry 616). The Historical Records Survey and the State Records Microfilm Project gave researchers unprecedented access to early public records, but unofficial documents and personal papers stored in state and local historical societies or in academic and private libraries presented vast lacunae for which there still were no adequate guides.

THE NATIONAL UNION CATALOG OF MANUSCRIPT
COLLECTIONS

Out of the collaboration of Luther H. Evans, Robert C. Binkley, Douglas C. McMurtrie, and others in the late 1930's came proposals that led to the establishment by the American Historical Association of a Committee on Historical Source Materials under the general chairmanship of Herbert A. Kellar of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. Kellar's committee investigated several means of obtaining better information about the content of existing manuscript collections and recommended that the most efficient way of making such materials known was to create a centralized pool of data that would be continually supplemented and regularly published. The committee's proposal was adopted in 1949 by the Society of American Archivists and the American Association for State and Local History which formed a Joint Committee on Historical Manuscripts. With Lester J. Cappon as chairman, the joint committee took a series of steps that led to an offer by Luther Evans for the Library of Congress to assume responsibility for the creation and maintenance of a national register of historical manuscripts. The Council on Library Resources, a subsidiary of the Ford Foundation, provided a \$200,000 grant to establish the project which began operation in 1959 under the direction of Lester K. Born, head of the Manuscripts Section of the Descriptive Cataloging Division. The Library, in consultation with the American Library Association, adopted uniform rules for cataloging manuscripts and agreed to furnish each participating institution with printed cards for its reported collections. Eighteen volumes of the *National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections* (NUCMC) had been published through 1980 containing reports on 44,225 collections in 1,099 depositories (see entry 615). The cumulative NUCMC indexes include almost 462,200 references to topical subjects and personal, family, corporate, and geographical names. Despite the best intentions, however, many institutions are unable to catalog and report their holdings fully or on a regular basis. Still, NUCMC remains the most important step ever taken in the United States toward providing researchers with the basic information necessary in determining where their source material is most likely to be found.

To increase awareness of manuscript collections that had already been microfilmed, the Council on Library Resources, which initially sponsored NUCMC, also provided a grant of funds in 1957 to the American Historical Association's Committee on Documentary Reproduction, resulting in the publi-

cation of Richard W. Hale's *Guide to Photocopied Historical Materials in the United States and Canada* (entry 523), a union list of 11,137 manuscript collections available at local depositories. In the course of his work Hale succeeded in uncovering large masses of local documents that had been unused by scholars previously because they were unknown or relatively inaccessible.

Indeed, the development of relatively inexpensive techniques of photoreproduction within the past 40 years has succeeded in revolutionizing the distribution of historical materials. Libraries, historical societies, and commercial enterprises have begun to publish and sell extensive editions of photocopied materials, thereby reducing travel expenses. In the area of the 18th-century publications, for example, scholars have benefited immeasurably from the widespread availability of *Early American Imprints, 1639-1800* produced cooperatively by the Readex Corporation and the American Antiquarian Society. Using as guides Charles Evans' monumental *American Bibliography* and Roger P. Bristol's *Supplement to Charles Evans' American Bibliography* (see entry 358), the Readex Corporation, under the supervision of Clifford K. Shipton, has produced a microcard edition of the full text of nearly 50,000 books, pamphlets, newspapers, journals, and broadsides published before 1800, 17,925 of them between 1763 and 1789. For periodicals, University Microfilms produced in the 1940's 33 reels of microfilm containing the full runs of 88 18th-century magazines and journals. Although not all 18th-century newspapers have been filmed, the appearance of Clarence C. Brigham's *History and Bibliography of American Newspapers 1690-1820* in 18 installments of the American Antiquarian Society's *Proceedings* from 1913 to 1927 and as a separate and revised two-volume edition in 1947 (entry 452) prompted many depositories to film and distribute entire series of their holdings. In 1948 George A. Schwegmann, Jr., of the Library of Congress, began to report regularly on the inclusive dates of microfilmed issues of newspapers, the frequency of publication, and the location of positive and negative photocopies. The 1973 edition of *Newspapers on Microfilm: United States* (see entry 471) contains 32,640 reports on domestic newspapers by state and city of publication. It is supplemented annually.

The effects of such innovations have been far-reaching. It can easily be argued, given the increase in the number and quality of historical dissertations, monographs, and essays since World War II, that the development of new technical processes in the dis-

semination of documentary sources and the increasing involvement of professional associations, foundations, and the federal government in new programs of preservation and control have had a profound influence upon Revolutionary historiography. It is also evident that the Depression and an exhausting war had produced by midcentury a greater appreciation for history and the study of the origins of the United States. Nowhere was this better illustrated than in the rebirth of a national program for the publication of the documentary heritage created by the Founding Fathers.

THE NATIONAL HISTORICAL PUBLICATIONS COMMISSION

In the original legislation creating the National Archives, provisions for a National Historical Publications Commission (NHPC) had been made at the insistence of J. Franklin Jameson, who envisaged an active federal historical publications program. During the 1930's, however, Congress failed to act on the commission's proposals, and with the outbreak of the Second World War the commission became inactive. Not until enactment of the Federal Records Act of 1950, therefore, did a renewed commission receive a mandate to encourage preservation and publication of important historical documents. When Julian Boyd, the editor of *The Papers of Thomas Jefferson*, presented the first volume of the series to President Truman in a May 1950 ceremony, the President enthusiastically responded by directing the commission to develop a broad plan for making available the writings of American statesmen. In its final form, *A National Program for the Publication of Historical Documents* (1954) called for the microfilm and letterpress publication of the papers of 361 individuals as well as documentary histories of the Continental Congress, the ratification of the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights, and the work of the first federal Congress. The "priority" projects that were to receive first attention were the latter two documentary histories and five projects already underway—the papers of Thomas Jefferson (entry 13701), Benjamin Franklin (entry 13381), the Adams family (entry 12681), Alexander Hamilton (entry 13523), and James Madison (entry 13944).

With the passage of Public Law 88-383 in 1964 providing the commission with an annual appropriation of \$500,000 to make matching grants in-aid to other projects identified in its 1954 *Program* and its report of 1963, the NHPC entered a new phase. The Ford Foundation granted the commission an addi-

tional \$2,000,000 to fund its priority projects over the next decade, and the NHPC soon made matching grants for several new letterpress editions of documents, among them the papers of Henry Laurens (entry 13804), Isaac Backus, Nathanael Greene, John Jay, James Iredell, Jonathan Trumbull, George Washington, the Marquis de Lafayette, John Marshall, and the Susquehanna Company (entry 4392). The commission also inaugurated its program of microfilm publications, issuing grants for the papers of several persons, families, and institutions from the Revolutionary period—Henry Knox (entry 13773), Mercy Otis Warren, Thomas Penn (entry 713), Eleazar Wheelock, Charles Carroll (entry 13004), Edward Dromgoole (entry 782), Thomas Burke (entry 12957), Artemas Ward (entry 14659), Timothy Pickering (entry 14200), John Nicholson (entry 14097), Winthrop Sargent (entry 14367), Benjamin Lincoln (entry 13847), Sir Andrew Snape Hamond (entry 13530), James Monroe (entry 14025), the Carter and Lee families of Virginia, (entries 13008 and 13814), the Lloyd and Calvert families of Maryland, the Forbes family of Massachusetts, the Stevens family of New Jersey, the firm of Baynton, Wharton, and Morgan of Philadelphia (entry 14046), and the minutes of the Provincial Council of Pennsylvania, 1682-1776 (entry 721). Although supported by other funds, a number of projects have been endorsed and assisted by the NHPC, including the journal and letters of Francis Asbury, the papers of Henry Bouquet, Archbishop John Carroll, George Mason, and Robert Morris, and the Program for Loyalist Studies and Publications.

Another major accomplishment of the NHPC was the publication in 1961 of the *Guide to Archives and Manuscripts in the United States* (entry 618). Under the leadership of the executive director, Philip M. Hamer, the commission's staff made independent investigations and solicited reports from depositories throughout the country in an effort to identify institutions holding documents pertinent to commission-sponsored editorial projects. The final compilation indicated that some 1,300 depositories had holdings estimated at more than 27,000 collections varying in size from a dozen to half a million documents. The first such general guide of its kind, it has proven indispensable as a basic reference tool in libraries throughout the country.

The Fruits of the Bicentennial

With the successes of the NHPC, (now reconstituted as the National Historical Publications and

Records Commission), the entrance of commercial firms into the field of documentary publication on microfilm, and the inception of extensive programs for the bibliographic control of manuscripts, materials for the study of the American Revolution have become available on a scale barely imagined just 50 years ago. Moreover, plans for the observance of the Bicentennial accelerated the process. Various commercial firms, such as Arno Press, University Microfilms, and G.K. Hall's Gregg Press, have reproduced whole series of primary and secondary sources on the Revolution that have long been out of print (see, for example, entries 1025, 3251, 3793, 6179, and 6583). The American Historical Association's Committee on the Commemoration of the American Revolution Bicentennial appointed a subcommittee on scholarly publications which has urged the Department of State to reissue Weaver's *Diplomatic Correspondence of the United States . . . 1783 to 1789* (entry 8366) and to fund a completely new edition of Wharton's *Revolutionary Diplomatic Correspondence* (entry 8367). At the local level, state historical commissions and Bicentennial agencies have undertaken popular information programs, producing and sponsoring hundreds of monographs, documentary histories, chronologies, pamphlets, and guidebooks about state and regional participation in the Revolution.

Bicentennial programs at the federal level have been equally valuable. At the National Archives a grant from the Ford Foundation has permitted the staff to compile a computerized index to the 204-reel microfilm edition of the *Papers of the Continental Congress*. The Library of Congress commemoration of the American Revolution began in 1969 with the preparation of guides to contemporary source materials in the Library, bibliographies, documentary and facsimile publications, musical programs, symposia, and exhibits. Among the more important publications to date are *English Defenders of American Freedoms, 1774-1778* (1972, entry 3112), reprints of six British pamphlets attacking the coercive policy of the North ministry; *Manuscript Sources in the Library of Congress for Research on the American Revolution* (1975), a guide to 1,138 domestic collections and 479 collections of foreign reproductions in the Manuscript Division; *The American Revolution in Drawings and Prints* (1975), a checklist, with photoreproductions, of 921 graphics from all areas of the Library's collections; and *Maps and Charts of North America and the West Indies, 1750-1789; a Guide to the Collections in the Library of Congress* (1981), an annotated review

of 2,154 contemporary manuscript and printed maps and their derivatives in the collections of the Geography and Map Division. A generous grant from the Ford Foundation has also permitted a new edition of Burnett's *Letters of Members of the Continental Congress* (entry 8743), which will contain more than 15,000 documents, three-fifths of which are not in Burnett, in a projected 25 volumes.

As the Bicentennial era unfolds dozens of bibliographic projects and documentary publications will be completed that will further reduce the difficulty of locating research materials. Together they will continue to make the American Revolution the best-documented era for study by both professional scholars and interested citizens. None of this would have been possible, however, without the enthusiastic dedication of 19th-century collectors, the development of a rigorous methodology for the preservation and publication of documents by the archival and historical professions, the construction of hundreds of libraries, museums, and depositories for the protection of manuscripts and records, and the widespread dissemination of research materials through photographic reproduction. If anything, the increased availability of evidence has permitted us to appreciate more fully the complexity and diversity of the Revolutionary experience. The sweeping generalizations that satisfied an earlier age have fallen in the 20th century before the accumulated weight of evidence. To reinterpret the Revolution in the light of the sources and writings now available is a challenge that the present generation of writers and historians has readily accepted. The entries in *Revolutionary America* attest to their continued pursuit of fresh viewpoints and a deeper understanding of the nation's origins.

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INDEX

THE INDEX CONTAINS nearly 100,000 references and cross references to the 14,810 numbered entries in the text. Entries 1–9306 appear in volume 1, while entries 9307–14810 are in volume 2. Given the time and staff available, it was not possible to compile a full subject index. The index is limited, for the most part, to proper names (authors, editors, compilers, historical figures, corporate bodies, geographic locations, etc.) with descriptive subdivisions. As a convenient guide, however, the headings for more than 700 subject units in the table of contents are integrated, with their inclusive entry numbers, into the alphabetical arrangement. The greatest number of descriptive subdivisions appear under the names of countries, colonies and states, campaigns and battles, and major Revolutionary era figures such as Benjamin Franklin, George III, Thomas Jefferson, William Pitt, and George Washington. Insofar as practical, descriptive subdivisions conform to the terms found in *Library of Congress Subject Headings*, 9th ed. (1980, 2 v.) Certain usages, however, are unique to this bibliography:

Monographs, articles, and sources that primarily treat the colonies under the British Empire are indexed under "Great Britain—colonies" or, whenever possible, under the specific region or colony. Works dealing with the states after 1776, however, are indexed under "United States" or the specific region or state. Entry numbers for works on western lands or territories throughout the period 1763–89 appear under such headings as Mississippi Valley, Ohio Valley, Old Northwest, Old Southwest, The West, or the names of states that were later formed in those areas.

Entry numbers 12673–14810 for Chapter 12, Biographies and Personal Primary Sources, are treated somewhat differently in the index because each entry also contains a biographical headnote. These headnotes include two sets of terms: first, geographic locations in which subjects were born, lived significant parts of their lives, and died; and second, descriptive terms related primarily to the subjects' occupations, the elective or appointive offices they held, and their military or naval service (e.g., lawyers, merchants, planters, assemblymen, judges, Revolutionary offi-

cers). The latter terms treat the subjects' activities through 1789, but not later. To avoid the duplication of hundreds of entries under the names of both colonies and states, *all* headnote index references to figures who lived on the North American mainland from New Hampshire to Georgia are listed under the names of the states. This is intended primarily to keep together under the same subdivisions references to persons who were active throughout the Revolutionary period, even though it causes some anomalies. For example, the Chapter 12 headnote entry number for Cadwallader Colden (1688–1776) appears in subdivisions under New York (State) rather than New York (Colony). Of course, this and other references to Colden throughout the bibliography appear under his name. The adjective "Revolutionary" is used in Chapter 12 headnotes and in subdivisions in the index to refer to service during the war. Descriptive subdivisions such as "Revolutionary officers" or "Revolutionary surgeons" listed in the index under each of the states refer to individuals who served in a Continental, militia, or irregular military unit between 1775 and 1783. No attempt was made to differentiate among the types of service. Terms such as "military officer" or "soldier," however, refer to service in the British or U.S. armies or the colonial or state militias before or after the war. For French participants who served in the Continental Army, listings are to be found under "France—Revolutionary officers" and "Continental Army—French officers." Officers in the French Army who fought in the Revolutionary War, on the other hand, are listed under "France—Armée—officers." Other foreign participants are listed under the names of their countries.

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
