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ABSTRACT

This catalog, the seventh in a series of annual listings of special adult education projects, was developed to facilitate the exchange of programmatic information among adult education practitioners about projects funded by states under Section 310 of the Adult Education Act. This catalog contains 382 project abstracts from 46 states. These immigrants may be confined to "dead-end" jobs which greatly delimit the immigrant's chances for upward mobility.
2. Some young immigrants have difficulty keeping up with their school work because of language barriers and drop out of the regular school program. Without a high school diploma their chances of finding gainful employment are curtailed and their future is bleak. Some are tempted to engage in criminal activities.
3. Asian immigrant women must adjust to a new lifestyle in the United States. They often must seek work to help support their families, but do not have the formal training to find meaningful employment.

The enumerated problems encountered by immigrants in Hawaii and immigrant characteristics can be seen clearly among the residents of Kuhio Park Terrace for whom the Susannah Wesley Community Center is presently providing services.

Due to large class enrollments and the various skill levels of the students, many teachers are not practicing the methods needed to make students proficient in composition. Few teachers in large class settings feel they can give the one-on-one attention to each student or the volume of writing experience that is needed to upgrade the student's abilities. In response to this literacy crisis, Mott Adult High School is implementing a Writing Lab as an adjunct to the English program. The Lab will not only stress the skills acquired in standard English classes, but also include writing approaches and activities that could be supplemental in such areas as Job Clubs and Reading Labs. The underlying philosophy of the Writing Labs is to reward developmental writing with academic credit, and to devote our efforts to alternative strategies of instruction--especially individual instruction and peer tutoring (collaborative learning). Students will come to the Lab by way of placement tests, recommendations by teachers, or personal initiative. Whatever the process or reason they enroll, each student is tutored individually, depending on the strengths or weaknesses of each. Unlike other writing Labs, this Lab is available to students of all abilities and is designed to meet the interests that are unique to an adult learning experience.

By increasing the educational levels of adult Indian learners through the most visible means available, i.e., the state community college system, it is felt that the low socio-economic and educational status of the majority of North Carolina's Indian population may be favorably impacted.

The major product will be the statewide development of career components within total adult educational programs through the adaptation/adoption of innovative career programs meeting local needs. 1. To gather relevant curriculum materials in order to identify those resources which are compatible with a program which attempts to integrate the skills of reading, writing, speaking, and listening into one ABE curriculum.
2. To study these resources to identify specific materials which are more likely to be effective in ABE/GED programs because they were designed primarily for use with adults presently functioning below the 9-12 grade level.
3. To familiarize present staff with job-search employability skills counseling techniques.
4. To preview existing software and acquire those programs relevant to the written curriculum and compatible with hardware recently acquired by the L.I.U's Adult Education Program.
5. To develop a curriculum model which integrates language arts, math, and employability skills for ABE students.
6. To build a curriculum (strategies, techniques, materials) according to that model, using effective, adult-oriented materials and creating original materials and devising appropriate teaching strategies where/when materials and strategies are not available and/or suitable for adults functioning at the APL 1 and 2 levels.
7. To field-test the curriculum during the second semester.
8. To revise where needed and produce a single-volume, usable curriculum (an integrated document containing enough appropriate strategies, techniques, and materials to provide the basic language arts, math, and employability skills components for at least a full year of instruction at this level).
9. To make this document available to interested ABE practitioners.

DESCRIPTION

For this adult basic education workshop module at the National Adult Education Conference, the presenter will engage workshop participants in a process-oriented instructional strategy for improving student writing learning. Not only will the presenter show examples of student growth in

writing as illustrated by actual pieces of writing from the presenter's own ABE/GED students, but also share recent research on the teaching of writing skills in a variety of adult education programs.

Participants will receive an annotated bibliography of books and articles related to writing in the work world, the home, the school, and the community. The presenter's discussion of Write-for-Life objectives will emphasize the benefits of regular process-oriented writing activities to student writing, learning and employability skills.
