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ABSTRACT

This resource guide identifies and describes basic sources used to trace California laws, regulations, and court decisions. The guide presents background and bibliographical information on specific resources in each of the following areas: (1) bills; (2) daily publications; (3) other legislative publications; (4) chapters/codes; (5) codes--individual volumes; (6) committee hearings; (7) committee reports; (8) court decisions/case law; (9) parallel citations; (10) citations; (11) administrative rules and regulations; (12) constitution; (13) periodical/newspaper indexes; (14) other legal resource tools; (15) directories (attorneys, judges, lobbyists, and state officials); (16) law dictionaries; and (17) legal research guides. For each cited reference, call numbers and/or shelf locations in the California State University, Fullerton are supplied. (THC)

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TRACING CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE AND ADMINISTRATIVE LAW

The following is a guide to the basic sources utilized in tracing California laws, regulations, and court decisions.

I. BILLS

A bill is a draft of a proposed law. A bill may be either a new law or the amendment or repeal of an old law. Bills are arranged on the Reference shelves chronologically by session date, and then in numerical order by Assembly (AB) or Senate (SB) bill number. Each printed bill contains the bill number, the date of its introduction and first reading, the name of the legislator introducing the bill, and the Legislative Counsel's cover digest explaining the bill:

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 2179, as introduced, Torres. Insurance: acupuncture. Existing law does not require health care service plans, disability insurance policies, self-insured employee welfare benefit plans, and nonprofit hospital service plans to provide coverage for expenses incurred as a result of treatment by a certificated acupuncturist.

This bill would do so. Specifically, it would require the aforementioned plans and policies, whether issued on a group or individual basis, to include acupuncture coverage under

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As bills work their way through committees and second and third readings, they are amended. Each time a bill is amended it is reprinted, thus providing a complete record of any changes made to the bill. Amended copies of bills are filed immediately preceding the previous printing of the bill. The reprinted version of the bill shows amendments by the use of **strike out type** for matter omitted, and *italic type* for new matter:

The word "bills" includes constitutional amendments, concurrent resolutions, joint resolutions, and House and Senate resolutions. All are shelved with the Senate and Assembly bills.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS are proposed amendments to the California Constitution originating in either the House or Senate. They require a two-thirds vote from each house and must be approved by a majority of voters at a general, primary, or special election.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS relate to matters to be treated in both houses of the California Legislature. They are used to approve city or county charters, create joint committees, adopt joint rules, and to memorialize the death of a prominent person.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS relate to matters connected with the Federal government, such as approval or disapproval of legislation pending in Congress.

HOUSE AND SENATE RESOLUTIONS relate to only one house of the Legislature. They are used to amend the house rules, to create committees, or to request a committee of the house to study a specific problem.

The Library keeps only the bills from the last five legislative sessions. Bills from previous sessions are available through Interlibrary Loan from the California State Library.

Copies of current pending bills are available free to the public from the California Legislative Bill Room, 1149 State Capitol, Sacramento 95814.

II. DAILY PUBLICATIONS

There are three daily publications printed for each house of the Legislature: the file, the history, and the journal. These publications provide the most current information on the status of pending measures. ACCESS TO THE FILE, THE HISTORY, AND THE JOURNAL IS THROUGH THE BILL, CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT, AND JOINT AND CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NUMBER.

The Files, printed daily during the Legislative session, provide the first preliminary information on a bill. They serve as a daily agenda for each house, listing the order of business, announcing the bills to be considered on the floor that day, and providing time and date of any scheduled committee hearings on bills. The Files include motions to reconsider, notices of intention to withdraw a bill from committee, and concurrences in amendments of the other house which are pending.

The information listed in the Assembly and Senate Daily Files is eventually incorporated into the Assembly and Senate Semifinal and Final Histories. The Library retains the Files until they are bound with the Histories.

The Histories are histories of legislation introduced and considered during a session by both houses of the Legislature. The Daily History shows the actions on all bills considered each day, with cumulative actions for each succeeding day until the last day of the week. At the close of each week, a Weekly History is published. Each Weekly History supersedes its preceding issue. The Weekly History is subsequently replaced at the end of the first year of a session by the Semifinal History, which, in turn, is finally cumulated into the Final History, which represents the entire history of all bills introduced during a session. The Histories also contain a list of legislators (with occupation, party, district, seat, office, telephone number, and mailing address), a list of officers of each house, a legislators' seating chart, standing committees, a list of bill numbers by authors, committee membership by name of legislator, and a list of press-radio-television representatives.

Arrangement is by bill, resolution or constitutional amendment number, then by date action was taken on a measure:

The Journals are the published proceedings of each house of the California Legislature. They contain the titles of all measures introduced, considered, or voted upon by the house, roll call votes, messages from the Governor (including veto messages), communications and letters of transmittal between houses, and the texts of amendments to bills. Arrangement is chronological by session date. Unlike the United States Congress, which publishes its debates in the Congressional Record, California Legislative debates are not published by the State--Journals are only a record of proceedings. The Daily Journals are eventually cumulated into bound Journal volumes. The bound versions include an alphabetical subject index and a "bill action" index, which indexes any proceedings information on measures introduced during a session.

The latest unbound Daily Journals are shelved next to the California bills; the final bound volumes are shelved in the California document stacks.

III. OTHER LEGISLATIVE PUBLICATIONS

The California Legislature also releases three other publications--the Legislative Index, the Digest of Significant Legislation, and the Table of Sections Affected--which provide subject and code access to Legislative measures.

Issued at the close of each session, the Digest is a subject-arranged listing of important bills passed into law, vetoed or killed during the legislative process which have "significant impact on people's lives, the economy and the government." Each listing provides a brief summary of the bill and the final roll call vote taken on the measure. Urgent measures are indicated by an asterisk (*) next to the bill number.

The latest edition of the Digest is shelved in the Reference Documents area; earlier editions are shelved in the Document stacks.

At the close of each session, when bills have become laws or chapters, the Table is cumulated and published in the "Statutory Record" volumes of the bound volumes of the Statutes and Amendments to the Codes (Documents State California L325 S).

IV. CHAPTERS /CODES

Bills which have been passed by both houses of the Legislature and signed by the Governor into laws are known as acts or "chapters." Passed bills are filed with the Secretary of State, who assigns a chapter number to bills as they are received from the Governor's office. A separate series of chapter numbers is assigned annually to bills and resolutions. For example, the first bill and resolution filed in 1984 are designated Bill Chapter no. 1 of 1984 and Resolution Chapter no. 1 of 1984. To find California laws, it is important to know both its chapter number and session year.

Chapters are published by the State in their full final form (the full text of the law as it was finally passed) and in codified and annotated formats by commercial publishing firms, such as Bancroft-Whitney (Deering's California Codes, Annotated) and the West Publishing Company (West's Annotated California Codes). (The State of California does not publish an official set of annotated statutes.)

Issued at the close of each session, the Statutes are the complete final version of bills as passed by the Legislature and



approved by the Governor. Published since 1850, they contain every law passed by the California Legislature. The chapters and resolutions are issued first in paperbound volumes, then in final hardbound volumes. Arranged in numerical order by chapter number, the final volumes include a subject index, a copy of the California Constitution, tables of code sections affected, and city and county charters approved by the State.

The California Codes consolidate, subject arrange, and annotate all existing California laws. Unlike the Statutes, which contain the complete texts of laws as passed, the Codes contain only important general and permanent laws *currently in force*. They exclude repealed or expired acts. The Codes are arranged into twenty-eight broad subject categories or code titles:

In addition, the Codes provide explanatory notes or annotations to the law. The annotations supply legislative background information, cross references to other appropriate code sections, and references to court cases, legal encyclopedias, journal articles, and law reports.

Deering's Codes has a complete four volume "General Index" to the entire code set, and individual indexes for each code title. The indexes refer users to specific code titles and section numbers:

All California hearings are shelved in the Documents stacks (Documents State California L500). VII. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Reports prepared by committee members and their staffs are ordinarily not published. A few committee reports are published in the Journals of the Assembly and Senate (Documents State California L500 J7 and L500 J7s) and indexed there.

VIII. COURT DECISIONS/CASE LAW

Reported decision of courts ("cases") are issued in California in both official and unofficial formats. Official decisions are known as *reports* or *court reports* and are issued by the Bancroft-Whitney Company under a State contract. Unofficial decisions are known as *reporters* or *court reporters* and are commercially published by the West Publishing Company. The court reports and court reporters provide basically the same information, but there are minor differences. California State courts prefer to be cited to the official reports rather than to the unofficial, so that legal documentation usually contains citations to the official publications. Not all the reports of cases decided in courts are published in the reports. The official reports will not publish an opinion if the case is considered routine and adds nothing to the law of the State. The court reporters, however, publish most opinions, and are issued more speedily by the publisher. Recent decisions appear weekly in the "advance sheets" or paperbound volumes of West's California Reporter (KFC 47 W4)

The court reports are divided into series and then arranged on the shelves in numerical order by volume number. Each published court decision generally contains the following elements: the names of the involved parties (plaintiff and defendant), the case's legal citation, the date of the court decision, a detailed listing of the facts of the case, the legal issues involved, and the actual decision of the court. Each volume of the reports includes a list of the presiding judges, a subject index, a Table of Cases, and a Table of Statutes and Codes. The Table of Cases is a listing of all cases contained in that particular volumes of the reports and their page references. Cases are listed under both the name of the defendant and the name of the plaintiff. Jones v. Smith, for example, would be listed both under Jones and Smith. The Table of Statutes and Codes lists chapters and code sections which have been interpreted by the courts:

While each volume of the court reports has its own subject, case name, and chapter and code section indexes, Bancroft-Whitney does not publish a cumulative index to the court reports. There are, however, privately published indexes to the sets, such as West's California Digest (KFC 57 W51) and Shepard's Acts and Cases by Popular Name (Reference KFC 57 W51), which lists Federal and State cases by their popular or commonly known names.

UNOFFICIAL COURT DECISIONS

Unofficial court decisions are published by the West Publishing Company as part of its National Reporter System, and by the Los Angeles Daily Journal in its Daily Appellate Report.

The National Reporter System divides the United States into seven regional districts-- Pacific, North Western, North Eastern, Atlantic, South Western, Southern, and South Eastern--and publishes all state appellate court decisions for each district. In addition to the seven units covered, the National Reporter System also publishes decisions of individual state courts. The Library has the following regional and State court reporters:

This set covers decisions of the California Supreme Court, Courts of Appeals, and Appellate Departments of the Supreme Court. It is issued with weekly updates called "advance sheets". These paperbound updates are discarded when the final bound volumes arrive. The advance sheets also update the California Blue and White Book (Reference Desk KFC 47 C222), which provides parallel citations to West's California Reporter and the Pacific Reporter from the California Reports and California Appellate Reports.



Like the reports, the court reporters are divided into series and then arranged on the shelves in numerical order by volume number. Each published court decision contains the following elements: the names of the involved parties (plaintiff and defendant), the case's legal citation, the date of the court decision, a detailed listing of the facts of the case, the legal issues involved, and the actual decision of the court. Each reporter volume includes the following features: a list of presiding judges, a Table of Cases Reported, a Table of Statutes Construed, and a Words and Phrases section, which defines the legal language used in cases. The Table of Cases Reported is a listing of all cases contained in that particular volume of the reporter and their page references. The Table of Statutes Construed lists California chapters and code sections which have been interpreted by the courts.

All volumes of the court reporters (including the advance sheets) are shelved in the book stacks.


The texts of the opinions contained in the Daily Appellate Report are eventually published in the advance reports of West's California Reports (KFC 47 W4). The Library keeps only the last three months of the Daily Appellate Report.

IX. PARALLEL CITATIONS

Since there are several reporting systems publishing at the same time, the same decision often appears in both the official and unofficial reports, and occasionally in law reports and journals. Frequently, the legal researcher will have a citation to only one report and want to obtain the citations to others, either to examine the other reports or complete the citation. Several legal indexes provide a listing of court cases and their citations in other reports. These citations (called "parallel citations") are usually strung together so the researcher can easily read all the citations of one case:




